# **General Board Meeting Minutes**

March 27th, 2025

#### DRAFT

#### **Public Session**

- Chairperson Clarisa Alayeto opens the public session.
- Carmen Santiago raises four questions about the board's actions regarding the Oasis contract, eliminating syringes, and implementing a 90-day inpatient care program.
- Clarisa Alayeto mentions the Health and Human Services Committee and invites Carmen to join for monthly meetings to address these issues.
- Carmen Santiago's second question is about reinstating foot patrols, which Clarisa Alayeto refers to the NYPD for an answer.
- Carmen Santiago's third question involves a drug dealer in a dark gray Hemi SUV, and her fourth question is about a store, Role of Fashion, obstructing the sidewalk.

# Antonio Whitaker's Announcement on Composting

- Antonio Whitaker, Assistant Director of Community Affairs at the Department of Sanitation, announces weekly curbside composting pickup in the Bronx, Manhattan, and Staten Island.
- He explains the importance of separating organic waste from trash and the benefits of composting, including renewable energy generation.
- Antonio Whitaker mentions the warning period ending on March 31, after which summons will be issued for non-compliance.
- He offers to answer any questions about composting and encourages community participation.

# John Sanchez's Announcement on Bronx Cleanups

• John Sanchez, newly appointed secretary for the Environmental Justice & Sanitation committee, announces three Bronx cleanups on April 12 and April 19.

- The cleanups will take place at 138th Street corridor, Willis Park, and Roberto Clemente Square.
- John Sanchez mentions the planting of trees around the Jackson Avenue area to create a greener environment.
- After the cleanups, there will be celebrations with various organizations sharing their work and DJ music, along with snacks.

### **Board Meeting: Roll Call and Agenda Approval**

- Chairperson Clarisa Alayeto conducts the roll call, noting four absences.
- The board approves the agenda and full board meeting minutes.
- Clarisa Alayeto introduces the next speaker, Sarita Daftary from Freedom Agenda, to present on the Close Rikers campaign.

### **Close Rikers Campaign Presentation**

- Sarita Daftary introduces herself and her colleagues from Freedom Agenda and Bronx Connect, explaining the campaign's goal to close Rikers and reduce incarceration rates.
- Edwin Santana and Anthony Springer from Freedom Agenda provide an overview of the coalition and the reasons for closing Rikers, including mass incarceration, financial costs, and moral implications.
- Anthony Springer highlights the disproportionate impact of incarceration on Black and Hispanic populations in the Bronx.
- The campaign's plan includes decarceration, replacing outdated jails with human-centered facilities, and investing in community resources.

# **Detailed Plan for Rikers Closure and Community Investment**

- Anthony Springer provides a detailed breakdown of the Rikers closure plan, including the need for 886 beds with 40% therapeutic units and outdoor recreation space.
- The campaign advocates for the city to expedite the completion of the new borough jails and to prioritize renewable energy and green infrastructure on Rikers Island.
- The presentation includes specific recommendations for community investment, such as converting the old 40th precinct into a Community Services Center and additional citywide investments in mental health and housing resources.
- The campaign urges the city to revert to the original planned capacity for the new jails and to ensure true outdoor space for inmates.

### **Community Board Discussion and Recommendations**

- Board members express support for the Close Rikers campaign and discuss the importance of community involvement in the planning process.
- Brenda Goodwin emphasizes the need for ongoing communication and collaboration with the community.
- Board members raise concerns about the environmental conditions in Rikers, the need for sensitivity training for staff, and the separation of juveniles in detention centers.
- The board votes to support the campaign with conditions, including the need for written commitments for supportive housing and community involvement in the design process.

### **Racial Equity Presentation**

- Lorenzo Van Ness from the Commission on Racial Equity presents the 2024 community equity priorities, which were developed through community feedback.
- The priorities include addressing gaps in city jobs, involving communities in government plans, and ensuring pay equity.
- Other priorities focus on language access, removing biased systems, disaggregating data, and providing housing for the homeless.
- The presentation also covers the Commission's mandate to review racial equity plans, receive complaints about city agency processes, and respond to requests from the City Council.

# **Voting Items: Renewal Application for the Lit Bar and Outdoor Dining License for INine Bistro**

- The board votes to approve the renewal license for the Lit Bar, a bar with a bookstore inside.
- The board discusses the outdoor dining application for iNine Bistro on Bruckner Boulevard, with concerns about the impact on sidewalk space and community needs.
- The board decides to approve the outdoor dining license with the condition that the business owner returns to discuss further concerns and potential adjustments.

# Discussion on Community Concerns and Stakeholder Engagement

- Chairperson Clarisa Alayeto emphasizes the importance of engaging with stakeholders to address concerns, mentioning Danny, Maura, and Ramona as those in favor.
- Committee Chairperson Daniel Barber highlights the need for the community board to be held to higher precedence and the impact of decisions on residents.
- 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice Chair Ngande Ambroise stresses the importance of not just saying no for the sake of it and suggests calling meetings to address issues seriously.

• 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice Chair Ngande Ambroise mentions a cooperative business in the community and suggests another meeting to have a conversation with the business owner.

## Update on Community Board Operations and Office Space

- District Manager Anthony Jordan provides a brief update on the community board operations, mentioning the loss of office space due to a flood and the support from the executive committee and colleagues.
- District Manager Anthony Jordan thanks the Department of Finance and Lincoln Hospital for their support in hosting meetings.
- District Manager Anthony Jordan addresses issues with phone calls being directed to staff's cell phones and encourages reaching out via email.
- District Manager Anthony Jordan mentions the Yankee scholarship opportunity and the need for board members to recommend young people.

### **Public Safety Report and Crime Trends**

- Sargeant Rivera from the 40th precinct provides a rundown on crime numbers, noting a downward trend in burglaries, rapes, robberies, grand larcenies, and felony assaults.
- Sargeant Rivera mentions notable incidents, including a homicide and a shooting, and introduces the Q team initiative to tackle quality of life issues.
- Captain Dill from PSA 7 provides additional crime numbers, noting a significant decrease in robberies and overall index crime.
- Captain Dill discusses the Q team initiative and its focus on quality of life issues, including noise, gambling, and traffic conditions.

# **Community Concerns and Police Presence**

- Ramona Ferreyra raises concerns about 311 complaints being closed without resolution and the need for better enforcement of quality of life issues.
- Ramona Ferreyra questions the increased police presence at Mitchell Houses and the lack of community engagement by officers.
- Captain Dillo explains the increased presence is due to a gang of violence in the area and the need to prevent homicides and shootings.
- Ramona Ferreyra suggests more engagement by officers to become part of the community and learn local statistics.

### **Traffic and Parking Issues**

 Ramona Ferreyra raises concerns about traffic and parking issues on 140/3 Street and Morris Avenue, including trucks blocking street lights and pedestrians being unable to cross.

- Ramona Ferreyra also discusses issues with tenant patrols and the need for police officers to do verticals in buildings to address noise and harassment.
- Chairperson Clarisa Alayeto and other speakers echo the concerns about traffic and parking, mentioning double-parked cars and the need for better enforcement.
- Patricia Simpson highlights the impact of illegal parking on emergency vehicle access and the need for better traffic management.

### **Elected Officials Reports and Legislative Updates**

- Courtney Aubain from Congress member Richie Torres's office provides updates on legislative initiatives, including the bodega app and health emergency legislation.
- Courtney Aubain mentions the need for privacy release forms to address complaints and offers to assist with the process.
- Jose Serrano's office provides updates on environmental conservation funding, congestion pricing, and foundational aid for public schools.
- Whitney Rimat from Assembly Member Amanda Septimo's office mentions the release of a report on community violence intervention programs and upcoming community partner day with the New York Botanical Gardens.

### Community Engagement and Upcoming Events

- Maritza Wiggins from Council Member Giovanni Williams's office discusses legislation to increase transparency surrounding e-bike and scooter corral zones and streamline emergency response efforts.
- Maritza Wiggins mentions an upcoming check presentation at the Hostos Point Rec Center for playground renovations and indoor track upgrades.
- Gloria Cruz from Deputy Speaker Diana Ayala's office highlights the participatory budgeting process and the importance of youth involvement in voting.
- Jumanah Escalera from the Bronx District Attorney's office announces a child safety fair and a prom dress drive, as well as workshops on youth rights and the arrest process.

# **Committee Reports and New Business**

- Christina Cover from the Education, Youth, and Young Adult Services Committee announces a youth job fair on April 5 at Dream Charter High School.
- Christina Cover encourages community members to promote the job fair, volunteer, and support young people in attending.
- Ramona Ferreyra announces her departure from the board due to personal and health reasons, thanking everyone for their guidance and mentorship.

• Chairperson Clarisa Alayeto calls for a motion to adjourn the meeting, which is seconded and approved by the members.

### **Action Items**

- Schedule a meeting with the iNine Bistro business owners to further discuss the outdoor dining setup.
- Reach out to the Yankee scholarship applicants and make recommendations to the executive committee.
- Send the privacy release form for the post office service issues to the full board.
