Approval of Minutes

- Mario moves to approve the minutes from the May 28th General Board Meeting, Theresa seconds the motion.
- Roll call and vote
- Vote: 19 Yes, 3 abstentions. The motion passes, and the minutes are approved.

Chairperson's Report

 June 11th District Cabinet Meeting: Didn't have a full board during this meeting. But DM will provide an update on the discussion. Will rearrange today's General Board Meeting agenda to move the vote for including the treasurer on the slate of positions.

District Manager's Report

- Thanks the community for their patience, commitment.
- The district office's work continues during the board hiatus.
- June 3: First summer preparation virtual call with Con Edison. Although there have been cuts to NOAA, it should not impact Con Ed's predictions. Cooling centers are open. Link to map website: https://finder.nyc.gov/coolingcenters/
- June 4: South Bronx JobCorps Career Fair. Although JobCorps funding was cut
 nationally, litigation is ongoing to undo those cuts and restore funding. Hearing on
 June 17, the judge issued an injunction, which has been appealed. As of now,
 Centers are closed, but staff remain on through June.
 - The June Job Fair was held in collaboration with the Mayor's Office. 15 organizations' tabled, but there was emphasis on local employers. About 100 job seekers.
- Ken expresses thanks to the Housing Chair, Nanette Matthews, for her invitation to attend the SHNNY/Supportive Housing Network of New York conference.
- Syringe Buyback Program: Vans parked at eight parks in NYC, including Echo Park.
 Participants can return used syringes for 20 cents each, up to \$10 a day. Ongoing every Tuesday through Saturday from 11 am 12 pm
- June 27: Clean up at Echo Park
- Reminder: Every library is a cooling center. Francis Martin closed for repairs through July 19th.

Elections for Executive Board Officers

- o Sargent at Arms
- The members running for the positions are:
 - o Sargent at Arms: Roxana Gonzalez-Jimenez
 - Read from her letter of intent- She is a retired USN Combat Veteran with 20 years of service. Since her return to the community, she has been dedicated to serving and making a difference. She joined CB5 in 2019, when she initially became chair of the Veterans Affairs Committee, and worked to bring resources to vets and to create partnerships with local entities.
 - 2nd Vice Chairperson: Juan Parra
 - Juan: He's here to do the best for the community. He is looking forward to making changes in the next session. Please find his biography in the folder.
 - 1st Vice Chairperson: Erachie Brown and Osiris Guzman
 - Erachie: Became chair of Cultural Affairs committee last year. This year, she has served as chair of the Parks committee. Her decision to join was motivated by a desire to help the community. She is very passionate. Felt mentored by Cheryl.
 - Osiris: Removes himself from the running for the position during the time of the meeting.
 - o Chairperson: Angel Caballero and Osiris Guzman
 - Osiris: Submits his candidacy on the floor. He has lived in the community for 25 years. Feels that things within the board are outdated. This board has authority, but we need to start acting on it. He can help do this by bringing new ideas. This is bigger than a chairperson position. Wants others to believe in a new chapter.
 - Angel: Running for his second term. We must hold ourselves accountable to the people. He ran initially on a platform of adhering to the bylaws. He works within the community and has seen numerous changes occur. He's been in the community for over 50 years, develops programs for youth and seniors. It has been a big challenge. But we must continue to work.

Results of the Election:

With 27 members present-

- Roxana: Elected with 27 votes.
- Juan: Elected with 27 votes.
- Erachie: Elected with 17 votes, 10 no decision votes.
- Osiris: Elected with 14 votes, 11 votes for Angel, 2 no decision votes.

Voting Item: Election of the Treasurer position

 Angel: Since it was voted on during a committee meeting, it must be brought to the full board to decide whether the position will voted on during the next session.

- o DM Ken: It is not whether the position will remain in the bylaws. The decision is whether we want to have an election for the position in the next season.
- Juan: asked a clarifying question, which was addressed in the remarks above by DM.
- Benjamin: Referenced the May 14th Governance meeting minutes. Believes that the position should be included tonight.
- Juan moves to vote to bring back the position during the next season, Dilletta seconds.
- Vote: 21 yes, 6 abstentions. The motion passes, and the position will be brought back for voting during the next season.

NYPD 46th Precinct Report

- Inspector Jeremy Scheublin, 46th Precinct:
 - o Clergy Council
 - o Precinct Council elections were recently held.
 - Speaking about quality-of-life enforcement:
 - Summonses are the main tool used. Increased 79% YTD, a third in the last 3 weeks. Most in response to 311 calls.
 - 46th precinct's 311 response time has decreased well below an hour since Scheublin's start with the precinct.
 - They don't go straight to enforcement. They understand that you can't "summon: your way out of issues/violence.
 - Q Team is coming soon. It is being piloted across the city.
 - Special projects Lieutenant Sergio De la Mota responds to 311 calls. During the summer, there is a shift in the types of calls: Loud parties, open hydrants, and late-night music. He implores people to understand that they are the important players in these types of improvements to quality of life.
 - Phone: 646-276-2821
 - Catherine: Ryer and 181st to 182nd: Many late parties, issues with double parking. What is being done?
 - Inspector: Cops posted until 2-3 AM. They are addressing the late parties, drinking
 - Beverly: Loud noise can be heard on Undercliff from Monday to Sunday until
 5 AM. Seems to be coming from the park across the river, but sounds like it is coming from the backyard.
 - Inspector: Will reach out to 34th Precinct Commanding Officer
 - Additional comments: Pop-up parties appear on Facebook at Sedgwick Avenue. When reported, 311 says it's a non-emergency. 1000s of people show up.
 - Inspector: Most of the area in the 44th precinct. But they are collaborating.
 - Theresa: Issues with late party until daybreak.
 - Inspector: encourages her to call him via cell.
 - Osiris: What approaches do they take to avoid escalation?

- Inspector: Described how these issues develop (some people don't have backyards, some don't have air conditioning) but these interactions between police and the community start with a conversation/warning.
- Dilletta: Encourages people to ask these questions at the Council meetings.
 There, you can speak to the officers who patrol the area. Next council meeting is Sept 16th.
- Charles: How can we get the Transit Division involved at 174/175th street, at Tremont? There is a lot of open drug use occurring in the train stations.
 - Inspector: Wants the commander of the Transit Division to attend the next board meeting. Will try to connect with Charles during the summer.
- Nanette: The District Manager's report mentions an initiative to increase life expectancy in NYC. One of the targets is opioid drug overdoses. Did the department receive funds from the Opioid Settlement Fund, and if so/how will it be operationalized?
 - Inspector: Can find out and follow up.
- Benjamin: A shooting happened when the children were returning from a trip.
 School at Tremont/Anthony. School has 3-5K, they still need protection.
 Doors are electronic. He is the parent leader at the school.
 - Officers are there from 12:30 PM to about 2 AM. Also has ppl at Echo Park, at Clay. They often flood the area.
 - Benjamin: doesn't believe 2 people are enough coverage for the school.
- Osiris: What are your recommendations for engaging more with one another to make the community safer?
 - Inspector: decreasing violent crime, QOL, get to know NCOs, and engage at meetings like this.
- New community affairs officer: Kennedy is no longer in the role.
 - It is a long hiring process

Bus drivers often stop in the middle of the street or right by the planters on the Grand Concourse, which are dangerous to navigate. Echo Park bathrooms.
- Mario Henriquez, South Bronx JobCorps Center
 - Voicing concerns regarding the funding cuts to AmeriCorps and JobCorps at the Federal Level. Advocating for the program and for his fellow students.
