

Mr. Feng requested a motion for CB1 to send a letter to NYC electeds and CMs Gutierrez and Restler, indicating CB1's support for Int 1139 and urging them to support and/or cosponsor the bill: Int 1139-2024: This bill would set hours of operation for adult-use cannabis retail dispensaries in New York City. All adult-use cannabis retail dispensaries would be permitted to open at 9:30 AM and would have to close by 9:30 PM. The Department of Consumer and Worker Protection would be responsible for enforcement. Violation of this local law would result in civil penalties of \$1,000 for a first violation and \$2,000 for each subsequent violation committed on a different day within a period of 2 years after the date of the first violation.


### **PROJECT SUMMARY**

- 1. Zoning Map Amendment to rezone Brooklyn Block 2260, Lots 35 and 7501 from an M1-2 zoning district to M1-5 and R7-1/C2-4 zoning district.
  - The proposed zoning map amendment to rezone Lot 35 to an M1-5 zoning district will facilitate interior modifications to the existing eight-story plus cellar and sub-cellar mixed-use building located at 347 Flushing Avenue, Block 2260 Lot 35, including a reduction in required parking and changes to interior uses.
  - The proposed zoning map amendment to rezone Lot 7501 to an R7-1/C2-4 zoning district will legalize the legal non-conforming residential use permitted by BSA variance (BSA Cal. Nos. 113-00-BZ – 117-00-BZ) at 760-768 Kent Avenue.
- 2. Zoning Text Amendment to amend ZR Appendix F to designate a MIH area with Options 1 and 2 coterminous with the R7-1/C2-4 zoning district.
  - The proposed zoning text amendment will facilitate the development of affordable dwelling units should Lot 7501 be redeveloped.







## **CORE** Overview



## **Our story**

In March 2021, former Mayor de Blasio announced the formation of the Racial Justice Commission and appointed 11 Commissioners, including Chair Jennifer Jones Austin and Vice Chair Henry Garrido, to focus on racial justice and reconciliation, with a mandate to identify and root out structural racism.

December 2021, Racial Justice Commission submitted three measures to the November 2022 ballot, which included forming an independent Commission on Racial Equity.





## **Our mission**

In November 2022,New York City voted overwhelming in the affirmative for all ballots thereby calling NYC government to establish the Commission on Racial Equity (CORE) to hold government accountable to racial equity plans, process, and progress and uplift community voice in government decision making.

# New York City Charter; Who we are

Preamble declares NYC a multiracial democracy and guides how the city carries out its **duties**, obligations, and authorities.

Three foundational values:

- 1. Our government Justly Values all Talents and Contributions.
- 2. Our government Ensures the **Condition of Thriving for Every Person**
- 3. Our government embraces Vigilance, Remedy, and Reconstruction

"We, the people of New York city, united in our resolve to build a just and equitable city for all, recognize the efforts of those New Yorkers, past and present, who fought for racial equity and social justice, honor the contributions of those New Yorkers who have suffered in the name of freedom, and acknowledge all who fought, struggled, and dreamed for a better life and a better city. Together, we stand on their shoulders as we move boldly toward a brighter tomorrow for ourselves, our children, and future generations."









### **Overview of CORE's Mandate**

CORE is responsible for holding government accountable to advancing racial equity in government operations and increasing community voice in government decision making.



Identify and propose citywide community equity priorities.





Track and publicly report on agency and citywide compliance with the racial equity planning process.



Respond to requests of the speaker of the council and its committees regarding racial equity concerns.



Receive complaints about agency conduct that may have the effect of exacerbating racial equity disparities and make recommendations to agencies to address such complaints where appropriate.

Review and publicly comment on the new citywide Racial Equity Plans.

# **2024 Community Equity Priorities (Set 1)**

The following Community Equity Priorities reflect the value that government **Justly Values All Talents and Contributions.** 

### NYC communities call on their government to prioritize and measure the following:

- 1. Remove the gaps in race, gender identity, sexual orientation, age, and disability in city jobs. Ensure that government work and staff reflect the city's commitment to equity and social justice
- 2. Fund communities harmed by racism and injustice to shape and get updates on NYC government plans.
- 3. Remove the gaps in race, gender identity, sexual orientation, age, and disability in city pay, promotions, and contracts.
- 4. Ensure NYC offices and partners get funds for community-based language access services in the city's most spoken languages.
- 5. Check for and remove any formulas and computer processes that may be biased based on race, ethnicity, or poverty. This will prevent inequities in health care, housing, policing, criminal justice, employment, social service and more.
- 6. Collect, analyze, and share data on access to government services with the public, categorizing it by specific groups harmed by racism and social injustice.



# 2024 Community Equity Priorities (Set 2)

### The following Community Equity Priorities reflect the value that government **Ensures the Condition** of Thriving for Every Person.

### NYC communities call on their government to prioritize and measure the following:

- 7. Expand access to safe, stable housing for those at risk of homelessness, eviction, and deed theft without delay. Access should be available to individuals and families.
- 8. Evaluate and remove fines and fees to reduce the impact on low-income people of all ages.
- 9. Use and expand non-punitive responses to mental health and all crises. These responses should rely less on police where possible. People should be allowed to decide or contribute to decisions about their own care.
- 10. Reduce racial and economic segregation and education gap by increasing support to schools. Help every student and family with education and other health related social needs.
- 11. Expand health, mental health, substance use, and disability services. They must meet the needs of families and individuals harmed by racism and social injustice.
- 12. Remove costs and barriers to CUNY enrollment and retention.
- 13. Increase access and lower the cost to basic needs such as quality food, transportation, medical, and housing.



# 2024 Community Equity Priorities (Set 3)

The following Community Equity Priorities reflect the value that government embraces **Vigilance, Remedy, and Reconstruction.** 

### NYC communities call on their government to prioritize and measure the following:

- 14. Expand access for those harmed by racial and social injustice to inform local emergency planning. These include plans to prepare for, act in, and recover from emergencies.
- 15. Remove barriers and increase access for people harmed by racial and social injustice to learn about, buy, and keep ownership of property.
- 16. Ensure all city employees and their agencies, including the police and social service providers, are held accountable for any harm and abuse of power.
- 17. Remove the gaps in racial, gender identity, sexual orientation, age, and disability access to job training and funds to start businesses.
- 18. Expand services to prevent, intervene, and provide care for people and families harmed by policing, jails, and court supervision.



The Transportation Committee met the Thursday, February 27, 2025 (CALLED TO ORDER: 6:41 PM; ADJOURNED: 8:50 PM) at CB1 District office, 435 Graham Avenue, Brooklyn, NY 11211.

A quorum was met.

#### **AGENDA**

#### 1. Presentation: Curb Management Action Plan

#### Presentation by Michael Sutherland, Open Plans

Mr. Michael Sutherland, from Open Plans, provided an overview of curb management and provided insight into how the NYCDOT and other cities around the country are addressing a growing demand for usage of the curb space on city streets. (Presentation attached).

Committee/Board:

Mr. Bruzaitis asked about the relationship between Open Plans and the NYCDOT. Mr. Sutherland explained that Open Plans is an advocacy organization with no formal relationship to DOT.

Mr. Vega expressed concerns that if garbage bins were to be placed in the curb space, they could interfere with our district's stated request for universal daylighting at intersections. A discussion followed about the importance of keeping intersection visibility open and safe.

Mr. Vega during the discussion renewed his concerns that because of the inefficient relationship with Con Edison it takes too long for lampposts to get fixed.

Mr. Kelterborn asked about loading zones and how the DOT assesses viable locations and implements them. Mr. Sutherland explained that the Freight and Mobility team at DOT is a small department and simply can't keep up with the need for a comprehensive approach to loading zones. Chair Bruzaitis suggested we invite the Freight and Mobility team to present at a future meeting so we could further discuss the need for loading zones throughout CB1.

Ms. Breitner commented on the need for better street markings at fire hydrants and at loading zones. The FDNY has been pleading with the public not to park cars in front of fire hydrants which can hamper their ability to effectively fight fires and save lives. Painted hatch marks to clearly mark fire hydrant no-parking zones could help with this.

Mr. Costa suggested that the DOT attempt a thorough inventory of loading zones throughout the district so that new ones can be installed where needed to fill in the gaps (similar to how the Parks department is approaching the planting of new trees in a systematic way).

Mr. Pferd: Suggested a joint meeting in partnership with the Economic Development committee and invited business owners so we can more deeply explore the need for loading zones from the perspective of local businesses. Mr. Pferd also observed that streets are dynamic, always changing as businesses come and go. The committee agreed and also noted that loading zones can be used not only for truck deliveries but also for passenger pick up and drop off, and other uses.

Ms. Espinal asked if there was a process for identifying best uses for curb locations and also inquired about how Open Plans is funded.

Mr. Sutherland explained that Open Plans often works with other advocacy groups as well as Business Improvement Districts (BIDs). Open Plans is a donor-supported not-for-profit advocacy organization whose financial statements are published on their website in accordance with the law.

Ms. La Borde provided the example of how effective curb management could be used to improve Kent Avenue where garbage overflows into the bicycle lane and sidewalks Mr. Weiser: asked again about how Open Plans is funded. Sutherland repeated his previous answer that their financials are available to the public on their website.

Mr. John Rozmus listed out some general concerns about how NYS law interacts with city law and repeated his previously stated dislike of public realm improvements in CB1.

Mr. Kevin La Cherra reinforced the importance of hatching to mark fire hydrant zones, urged the redesign of Loading Zone signs to make them more legible, expressed support for waste containerization, highlighted the utility of bike corrals for daylighting at intersections. Mr. La Cherra noted that the city has made accommodations for private car share businesses, and should do the same for public realm loading zone uses.

Mr. Sutherland stated that his understanding is that the car share locations are allocated based on usage, but agreed that the metrics should be expanded.

Mr. Brent Bovenzi expressed need for more visible signage for loading zones and also informed the committee about how technology can be used for effective management of loading zone spaces-camera enforcement, GPS tracking to charge trucks, etc.

Mr. Sutherland Open Plans is advocating for auto-enforcement.

#### 2. REVIEW: FY26 District Needs Statement

The committee reviewed the feedback received from the relevant agencies for the FY26 Budget Requests.

DNS Items 21 and 22: Committee resolved to remove items related to the MTA. Chair Bruzaitis will follow up directly with the MTA for these two items. All other budget requests to remain on the list at this time.

DNS Items 26: Committee resolved to schedule a joint meeting with the Parks Committee to discuss the need for increased pedestrian space on the Kent Avenue Greenway.

DNS Items 28. Committee resolved to schedule a joint meeting with the Education Committee to discuss safety efforts focused around schools.

#### 3. Discussion: Intersection Daylighting Locations.

Committee discussed that uploading the daylighting location request link to the website is a work-in-progress. Other discussions on this item were tabled to future meetings of the committee.

Mr. Brian Paul requested daylighting, and a curb bump out at the intersection of Olive and Metropolitan. This corner sees large numbers of pedestrian crossings due to its proximity to Cooper Park. In addition, the ADA access projects has not yet been completed at this location, making it a good candidate for an enhanced safety project.

#### 4. OLD BUSINESS

Ms. Breitner presented a list of uncompleted tasks for the Meeker Avenue project. She noted an excel spreadsheet created by board member Ms. LaBorde and asked that it be sent to electeds and NYC DOT.

(Spreadsheet attached).

Chair Bruzaitis to coordinate a request to DOT and the elected officials to attempt to bring this project to completion. As it stands, the partially completed project creates significant safety concerns.

Ms. Breitner provided an update on the impacts of the McGuinness redesign and noted that as of January 2025 according to Crash Mapper 3 cyclists were injured on the corridor; 71% decrease in crashes (over 10 years, but 37 crashes vs. 49 January 2024); 69% decrease in injuries; no appreciable evidence of increase traffic on adjacent street.

Mr. Radezky described a close call at Nassau and McGuinnss due to a driver attempting to illegally use the daylit space to run a red light. He expressed the need for better infrastructure at this location to prevent tragedies.

Chair Bruzaitis apologized that public comments regarding concerns with the McGuinness redesign sent to Mr. Radesky were not included in the January report.

The comments are included below:

Between Greenpoint and Calyer is a nightmare.

It's confusing, makes no sense.

It's crap, don't know why we have that concrete lane thing now (the divider near the entrance to the BQE at the southern end)

Lots of back up traffic

I'm more scared for my safety crossing the street because of cars racing to make the light especially cars that are turning into oncoming pedestrians. They want to make the light cuz they are so backed up waiting in traffic once they get the light they just want to make it so they get really close esp when they are turning.

Lots of noise from honking in the traffic.

Driggs from Russell to McGuinness is always backed up now when it didn't used to be.

I'm sure it's the same old tired complaints that most others have that'll just be disregarded. Aside from the safety issues with emergency calls, garbage collection, is anyone actually doing a study on how this effects the economy, the cost of goods, the cost of living, eventually the cost of rent, and eventually the demise of neighborhoods? I can go on and on.

There is without a question more traffic idling at lights. Public safety vehicles are not using the bike lanes in most instances and instead remain stuck for periods of time behind traffic. I have personally witnessed this on 5 separate occasions. The bike lanes are being used as a super highway for delivery workers on electric vehicles, and they more often lie unused, due to weather or a lack of need for two full lanes of bike traffic. I am most concerned with the pollution caused by vehicles being kept in traffic and of the consequences of vehicles moving to the side roads. This is blatantly happening. The traffic in the neighborhood is far worse in this quixotic quest to make a truck route "safe."

Quick trips now take 20 minutes or more.

It is way too confusing and doing exactly what everyone said it would – clogging up side streets.

The going around on the left and the right, driving down the parking lane, etc. and the danger of people getting sideswiped by a car on one side and a bike on the other when they are getting out of their cars in the parking lane, insane.

Side streets busier. Nassau between McG and Manhattan Ave very backed up now (wonder what Amber Steakhouse thinks) and Driggs is busier.

We avoid McGuinness now and try to take Russell when we have to go that direction. One neighbor said she had to sit through several light cycles every morning Driggs to cross McGuinness so she had to leave earlier to drop her kid at his school. To be fair, another parent said it's been fine for her driving her kid to school mornings at 7:30am. Saw a firetruck totally stuck in McGuinness traffic blowing its horn and not moving.

Our Uber driver had to hop the sidewalk to get us across Meeker when we were on our way to the airport.

The dangerous traffic situation that was largely contained to one boulevard has now metastasized all over the neighborhood.

Nassau is getting worse every day! From Nassau to Leonard is always congested.

Why did they need to do this? Watch the lights change on McGuinness and the traffic pile up during peak hours.

Creating traffic is not the answer.

We need 2 driving lanes!

This was a terrible plan that just makes residents' lives harder for no tangible benefit. People passing through and doing business in the area deserve to be angry too. Our elected officials hold us in contempt.

The lane design is obviously the wrong design. Speed cameras and a 20mph speed limit would have been a better solution. The traffic is horrendous and flooding into the residential blocks admit it's not working. Fix this.

So far we're surprisingly ok with it. It's definitely slowed down traffic. The volume on northbound lane has still been heavy, so honking. The slip lane on Graham is confusing. It is not clear what cars are supposed to do. Thankfully site lines are good so you can see bikes. On our block the loading zones seem to be working. Negatives: I definitely see more traffic on the side streets – Eckford & Leonard. Emergency vehicles are not getting through. I watch when I hear sirens and people aren't getting over because they can't. I've seen EMS & ambulances go down the bike lanes, but they have to be able to get over. I still don't believe a fire engine can use the bike lanes & I haven't seen any try. Very concerning given the 2 recent fires. There was a biker hit at Nassau & McGuinness last week but the video from the corner store showed it was bikers fault. Lots of electric bikes in the lane. Cars lining up for the car wash at Broom are backing up traffic southbound. And the jersey barriers on northbound near Nassau have not been replaced.

Chair Bruzaitis will reach out to Ronda Messer at DOT for an update on the McGuinness project.

Ms. LaBorde raised issue of the contractors using the Meeker pedestrian and bike lane as staging area for a BQE repair project. Chair Bruzaitis to discuss with Ronda Messer, DOT. Mr. Costa requested updates for Metropolitan/Grand/Morgan redesign; described unsafe conditions at Kingsland/Greenpoint Avenue. Chair Bruzaitis suggested we discuss it at a future meeting.

Mr. Weiser described the need for a redesign on Wallabout to accommodate the B48 bus route which conflicts with other buses in the area. Chair Bruzaitis to reach out to the MTA rep for an update.

Mr. John Rozmus (public) wished everyone Happy International Women's Day/Month; renewed his opposition to the Bedford Slip; noted that around Thanksgiving 2024 that due to G Train renovation at the Nassau Station there was a power/sewer outage between Lorimer and Manhattan Avenues.

#### 5. New Business

Mr. Kelterborn flagged the confusing markings on the bike/pedestrian section of the Williamsburg Bridge. Chair Bruzaitis to follow up with Ronda Messer and report back. Tracking number: DOT-678405-B4N9



## Pilot NYC's first "Smart Curbs" neighborhoods, testing new and innovative curb uses

#### High demand for curb spaces in dense commercial areas requires a comprehensive approach to curb management.

Work with Business Improvement Districts (BIDs) to test a blank slate approach to curb programming and activation. Test new policies and technologies to make curb access easier and adaptive to community needs.

## Prioritize curb uses to meet neighborhood needs

## A diverse array of curb needs necessitates policies to guide which uses get prioritized.

Publish a guide detailing how NYC DOT will prioritize curb uses in a way that is consistent with the city's transportation goals and needs while allowing flexibility to tailor curb management tools to local neighborhood conditions.

## Make deliveries to businesses and homes safer, sustainable, and more efficient

## The rapid growth of e-commerce makes accommodating deliveries at the curb essential.

Expand loading zones, implement microhubs, expand use of cargo bikes, incentivize off-hour deliveries, and pilot new types of loading zones (e.g., reservation, restriction of vehicles, time of day management).

## Pilot the East Coast's first low-emission zone

Curb management can play a role in incentivizing or requiring zero or low emission vehicles.

Study pricing, regulatory, and incentive options to develop a pilot program.

## Designate curb space to make passenger pickups and drop-offs easier

The surge in for-hire vehicle trips must be managed with better curb access for passenger loading.

Expand short-term loading, create taxi/FHV pickup/drop-off zones, and work with the Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA) to expand Access-A-Ride loading zones.









## Expand bike parking to make traveling by bike more convenient

#### NYC's bicycling boom requires additional bike parking without congesting sidewalks.

Expand on-street and sidewalk short-term bike and micromobility parking, continue expansion of Citi Bike, and create thousands of secure public bike parking spots.

## Provide space for Dining Out NYC, waste containerization, street furniture, and other public realm improvements

The curb lane provides an opportunity to create a cleaner, safer, and more vibrant public realm.

Implement the permanent Dining Out NYC program, provide space for waste containerization, and activate the curb lane with public space improvements like sidewalk widenings, Street Seats, and plantings.

## Test new technologies for remote and flexible curb management and enforcement

## Proven and emerging technologies can enable more efficient, data-driven, and user-friendly curb management.

Implement a more flexible and convenient parking payment system; work with MTA to use new authority to camera enforce bus stops, bike lanes, and double parking; in conjunction with Smart Curbs pilot, test technologies to improve data collection and remote curb management; move toward automated enforcement of more violation types; and expand access to curbside charging.

## Price on-street parking to increase commercial activity

## Parking pricing should reflect demand to encourage the most efficient use of limited space.

Standup a demand-based pricing proof of concept over the next year, update meter rates and geographies to reflect the market and increased demand, expand meters (regular and commercial) to improve access in commercial, industrial, and high demand areas, develop pricing mechanisms to support policy goals, improve fine structures, and adjust reserved curb space policies.







Very busy intersection in the morning rush hour, high numbers of pedestrians with children and dogs combined with truck traffic. Westbound traffic on Metropolitan can often be backed up to block crosswalks. Curbs have not yet been upgraded for ADA accessibility, creating an opportunity to increase pedestrian safety through design features like bulb-outs or raised crosswalks when that occurs. Signal timing is currently very fast, giving pedestrians only about 10-15 seconds to cross.

The Education & Youth met on Tuesday, March 4, 2025, at the CB1 District office, 435 Graham Avenue, Brooklyn, NY 11211 (Corner of Frost Street) at 5:00PM.

#### **ATTENDANCE**

The meeting was called to order at 5:40 PM. The invited guests were a no show, Superintendent David Cintron (NYC Department of Education District 14) and representatives from the mayor's office of Immigration.

#### 1. Policies and Procedures of ICE in Public Schools

The policies and procedures regarding ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) in Public Schools remain unclear to the Education & Youth Committee. Unfortunately, the invited presenters were unable to attend and explain the measures being taken to protect children or the training available to school staff regarding ICE.

The committee raised the following questions and concerns:

- Clarification regarding ICE entering schools.
- Whether any incidents have been reported.
- Are staff members adequately prepared? (Training)
- Availability of informational training workshops for parents.

- Distribution of informational flyers.
- Is ACS (Administration for Children's Services) involved in protecting children left without parents due to ICE intervention?
- Are school safety officers trained to handle an ICE encounter?
- Are workshops available for Parent Associations?

**Resolutions:** Ms. Cabrera made a motion, seconded by Ms. Lebron, to send a letter to the Mayor's office and the NYC Department of Education requesting information on the protocols adopted by schools regarding ICE detentions within public schools in NYC. The motion passed with 6 votes in favor, 0 against, and 0 abstentions.

#### 2. Review of the FY2025-2029 Proposed Five-Year Capital Plans

The committee discussed the proposed plan and raised several questions. The committee agreed to compile a list of questions, which Ms. Aguilar will email to the School Construction Authority (SCA). After expressing concerns to the District Manager, Ms. Pulgarin advised Ms. Iglesias that Ms. Cora Liu from the School Construction Authority Capital Plan Management Department had indicated she was open to receiving questions and would likely provide responses by Friday, March 7, 2025, by the end of the day.

The Education and Youth Committee still seeks clarity on whether the plan requires CB1's comments or approval.

#### Old Business - February 11, 2025

• Community Education Council District 14

A follow-up was discussed regarding the letter sent to the Education Council on October 16, 2024, concerning the rules and procedures for their meetings. The Education & Youth Committee has yet to receive a response.

A motion was proposed to forward the letter to the Brooklyn Borough President's Office, Hon. Antonio Reynoso, and Public Advocate Jumaane Williams. The motion was made by Sonia Iglesias and seconded by Iris Cabrera. The motion passed with 4 votes in favor, 0 against, 0 abstentions, and 1 recusal.

#### • Closure of Nuestro Ninos

Ms. Duran informed the committee that the city had granted Nuestro Ninos a one-year extension. Additionally, the CB1 office received an email from Mr. Reid (Office of the Mayor/Community Affairs) stating that "the matter is still under review."

At the regular meeting of Brooklyn Community Board No. 1, held on the evening of March 11, 2025, the board members reviewed statements from the community opposing the sidewalk cafe application submitted by **Deux Chats**, located at 27 Broadway. The board voted to support sending this letter.

The vote was as follows: 33 "YES"; 3 "NO"; 1 "ABSTENTIONS"; 0 "RECUSAL"

Community Board 1 has received testimony from neighbors opposing the Sidewalk Cafe application for the establishment during the March hearing and through email submissions (Please see attached documentation).

The community has raised several concerns regarding this establishment:

- 1. Noise Complaints: The establishment have been repeatedly reported as sources of disruptive noise, negatively affecting the quality of life for nearby residents.
- 2. **Pedestrian Safety and Crowding:** The proposed roadway setups may obstruct pedestrian flow and visibility, leading to potential crowding issues. This is particularly concerning in an area with hundreds of residents and families.

- 3. Garbage and Cleanliness: Residents have reported issues with garbage management around the establishment, further impacting the surrounding environment.
- 4. **Disruption to Adjacent Residences:** The Sidewalk Cafe setup is expected to exacerbate disturbances for residents living adjacent to these establishments.

Based on these concerns, the board voted to recommend that the application for Sidewalk Cafe setup for Deux Chats located at 27 Broadway be denied. This establishment has demonstrated a lack of neighborly consideration, causing ongoing disruptions to the community.

#### Richard Lobel presented.

Four neighbors, owners of four of the affected lots, are the applicants. They have included additional lots at the recommendation of DCP. The agency prefers, when feasible, to re-zone multiple lots, rather than one lot at a time, for efficiency and continuity. The inclusion of the additional lots will bring in mandatory affordability (MIH) to the block; the commercial overlay will bring conformity to the already existing non-conforming businesses.

The applicants propose choosing MIH Option One, which provides for the deepest affordability of the two options, i.e., an average of 60% AMI with some at 40%.AMI, rather than an average of 80% AMI. There will be a green roof with actual greenage; outdoor balconies; very efficient insulation and high efficiency appliances to accommodate the all-electric power source; and water retaining storage on the roof and in the building. The applicants will also have to take on the expense and responsibility to remediate the site. In addition, the applicants will pay the moving expenses for the current tenants. The applicants are willing to contribute to tree planting, and the presenter stated they will be happy to look at contributing to beautification of the streetscape.

#### Recommendation:

The committee voted unanimously to approve the application with the following conditions:

- The applicants will give the CB1 office and the community a point of contact to receive and respond to problems and complaints during construction. The applicants will actively communicate with the CB1 office and will provide the office with a schedule of activities that will affect the neighborhood.
- In good faith, the applicants will consider contributing to the enhancement of the nearby streetscape.

#### **2. DISCUSSION ABOUT THE ATLANTIC AVENUE REZONING**

After our discussion the committee agreed that the new GMDC development may be more applicable to our district. We will monitor that development, which is a true mixed-use project that may provide useful zoning tools for us. We will also look at the MX zoning that remains in our district with the possibility of adding housing use or tightening up the uses to restrict entertainment venues.

We will request from DCP maps of our MX sites and information regarding planned future development in our district.

# **Project Description**

- Victor Efremenkov, Nick Sklavounakis, Tibetan LLC, and Colleen Vitale (the "Applicants") propose a series of land use actions to rezone existing R6B and R6B/C2-4 zoning districts to an R6A/C2-4 zoning district within Williamsburg.
- The Project Area consists of Block 2327, Lots 5, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, and p/o 19 (a portion of North 7<sup>th</sup> Street between Bedford Avenue and Berry Street).
- The Applicants are also seeking a text amendment to establish a Mandatory Inclusionary Housing ("MIH") Area with MIH Options 1 and 2.
- The proposed actions would facilitate the development of 146 North 7<sup>th</sup> Street (Block 2327, Lots 13, 14, 15, and 16) with a new six-story, 26,874 (3.54 FAR) mixed-residential and commercial building. The proposed development would consist of ground floor commercial use and approximately 28 dwelling units, of which approximately seven would be permanently income-restricted.




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

The Committee met on the evening of February 25, 2025, at 6:30 PM at Swinging Senior Center, 211 Ainslie St. (Corner of Manhattan Ave), Brooklyn, NY. 11211

#### **ATTENDANCE:**

#### Public Safety and Human Services Committee (PS&HS)

- Present: Feng, Espinal, Aguilar, Argento, Barros, Dybanowski, Leanza, Lopez, Aprile\*' Judelson\*; quorum was achieved.
- Excused Absences: Bamonte, Bachorowski, Drinkwater, Kaminski, Rozmus\* (Motion by Dybanowski, seconded by Leanza, unanimous consent)
- Maria Aprile-Horowitz attended her first meeting as a committee member (non-Board Member)!
- Unexcused Absence: Indig



#### Women's Issues Committee (WI)

- Present: Peterson, Aguilar, Horowitz, Leanza, Sabel, Pool\*, quorum was achieved.
- Excused Absences: Bamonte, Kaminski (Motion by Leanza, seconded by Aguilar, unanimous consent)
- Unexcused Absences: Carbone, Chirichella, Raymond\*

#### **MOTIONS IN THE JOINT COMMITTEE MEETING**

Both motions passed unanimously.

- 1. **Recommendation for CB1:** to convene quarterly stakeholder meetings on violence against women, invite elected officials to co-host and attend, and request attendance from law enforcement and community organizations in CB1
  - a. WI Committee Member Pool motioned, WI Committee Member Horowitz seconded, motion passed unanimously.
- 2. **Recommendation for CB1:** to request aggregate numbers of domestic violence, rape, and gender-based violence data by zip code on a preferably monthly basis from Woodhull and Wyckoff Hospitals
  - a. WI Committee Member Pool motioned, WI and PS&HS Committee Member Leanza seconded, motion passed unanimously.

#### **MOTIONS IN THE PS&HS COMMITTEE MEETING:**

All motions passed unanimously.

- 1. **Recommendation for CB1:** to send a letter to FDNY seeking the evaluation by the FDNY Bureau of Fire Operations and Management Analysis and Planning indicating that CB1 is "adequately resourced" as is without an additional firehouse.
  - a. Espinal motioned, Dybanowski seconded, motion passed unanimously.
- 2. **Recommendation for CB1:** for CB1 to send a letter to CM Joann Ariola, Chair of the NYC Council Committee on Fire and Emergency Management, of CB1's need for more information related to siting a new firehouse in CB1 given the significant population increase and new construction since the 2005 rezoning.
  - a. Dybanowski motioned, Argento seconded, motion passed unanimously.
- 3. **Recommendation for CB1:** to send a letter to NYS electeds to write and introduce a bill that would require the NYS Office of Cannabis Management to publish the complaints that members of the public have submitted in relation to locations alleged to be illegal cannabis operations and/or have other violations. OCM shall be required to publish the list with the

following information: complaint issue date, location of alleged illicit activity, and number of complaints by location. OCM shall be required to produce an interactive map version linked to the list for public access.

a. Espinal motioned, Dybanowski seconded, motion passed unanimously.

- 4. **Recommendation for CB1:** to send a letter to the NYC Sheriff's office requesting CB1 be informed when raids are conducted, or illegal cannabis retail locations are shut down
  - a. Barros motioned, Lopez seconded, motion passed unanimously.
- 5. **Recommendation for CB1:** to send a letter to NYC electeds and CMs Gutierrez and Restler, indicating CB1's support for Int 1139 and urging them to support and/or cosponsor the bill:
  - a. Int 1139-2024: This bill would set hours of operation for adult-use cannabis retail dispensaries in New York City. All adult-use cannabis retail dispensaries would be permitted to open at 9:30 AM and would have to close by 9:30 PM. The Department of Consumer and Worker Protection would be responsible for enforcement. Violation of this local law would result in civil penalties of \$1,000 for a first violation and \$2,000 for each subsequent violation committed on a different day within a period of 2 years after the date of the first violation.
  - b. Aguilar motioned, Lopez seconded, passed unanimously.

#### 6. Recommendation for CB1:

- a. to send a letter as written to the 90th Precinct and the NYPD Transportation Bureau seeking more frequent police presence and enforcement at the intersection of Division Ave. and Wilson St.
- b. to send a letter as written to Natanya Division Car and Limo Service seeking a response to our letter including its plan to address dangerous traffic safety and congestion issues caused in part by its parked cars
- c. to send a letter as written to Yeshiva Kehilas Yakov Pupa and Kesser Tzvi & Keser Reizel Hall seeking a response to our letter including its plan to address the dangerous traffic safety and congestion issues during the day and in the evening caused in part by its operations
- d. to send a letter as written to Aperion Production Inc. seeking a response to our letter including its plan to address the dangerous traffic safety and congestion issues during the day and in the evening caused in part by its operations
- e. Feng motioned to approve all four recommendations as a packaged motion, Dybanowski seconded, passed unanimously.

#### **OPENING REMARKS**

• WI Committee Chair Peterson emphasized that violence against women has been a critical community topic since the 1960s.

• PS&HS Committee Chair Feng requested speakers limit remarks to five minutes due to time constraints

- We would like to specifically acknowledge Captain Joseph Wernersbach for courageously sharing his personal connection to domestic violence, which inspired his career in law enforcement.
- Special recognition goes to Leana Pardo from the North Brooklyn Coalition not only for outlining their critical services, but also for bravely sharing her personal experience with sexual violence and challenges to reporting the violence inflicted upon her.
- The information shared today will be invaluable as we work to address violence against women in Community Board 1.

#### Mayor's Office to End Domestic and Gender-Based Violence

Presenter: Kimara Lucius, Program Coordinator, Community Initiatives

- Key Points:
  - Provides free, confidential support through Family Justice Centers in every borough
  - Services include legal support, mental health services, and preventive education
    - Assistance with obtaining orders of protection

- Legal system navigation
- Divorce support
- Agency established in 2001, operates across all mayoral administrations
- Addresses multiple forms of abuse: physical, mental, emotional, financial, manipulation, isolation
- Conducts preventive education in 100+ NYC schools
  - Focus on healthy relationships, respect, and boundaries
- Also provides support to those who commit violence ("hurt people hurt people")
  - Acknowledge perpetrators may have been victims themselves
  - Support does not detract from accountability and responsibility

#### • Discussion:

- WI Committee Chair Peterson noted: "We don't know what's going on regarding violence against women in CB1" and "We don't hear about the work that agencies do in our district"
- WI Committee Member Pool highlighted: We would like to organize a regular convening of local government, community, and social service provider stakeholders to address violence against women in CB1, which will promote collaboration, awareness, and transparency, identify needs, overlap, best practices, challenges, and innovations to help us all provide a great standard of care for victim/survivors.
  - Goal to convene regularly with elected officials
  - Address the lack of consistent data from hospitals and law enforcement
- PS&HS Committee Chair Feng asked about violence against women data specific to Brooklyn CB1
- Data collection challenges highlighted by Ms. Lucius:
  - "Brooklyn is a big borough" with organizations often working "parallel and don't know what each other is doing"
  - Underreporting due to fear of retaliation or judgment
  - Domestic violence and homelessness connection
  - Victims may not directly disclose violence but request specific services like food assistance
- Ms. Lucius expressed interest in learning more about community needs on the ground
- PS&HS Committee Chair Feng committed to following up with ENDGBV for more information specific to Brooklyn CB1

#### NYPD 90th Precinct

**Presenters:** Captain Joseph Wernersbach (Commanding Officer), Sergeant Tim Keane (Domestic Violence Supervisor)

#### • Crime Statistics (2025 YTD):

- Murders: Down 100%
- Rape: Even (1% vs. 1%)
- Robbery: Down 17%
- Felony assault: Down 21%

- Burglary: Down 46%
- Grand larceny: Down 18%
- Grand larceny auto: Even (16% vs. 16%)
- Total crimes: 180 vs. 241 (25% reduction)

#### • Domestic Violence Statistics (2024 vs. 2023):

- Felonies: Down 2.5%
- Misdemeanors: Down 7.3%
- Brooklyn North: Highest citywide reduction (5.6%)
- Year-to-date reduction: 17.3% in major crimes

#### • Approach to Domestic Violence:

- Assessment: Evaluate victim vulnerability and service needs
  - Assess history and services to help victims immediately
  - Conduct follow-ups by phone and in-person
- Apprehension: Arrest perpetrators
  - Follow through with prosecution in DA's office
  - Seek high bail and orders of protection
- Compliance: "Taking a hard look at ourselves" to ensure no victims are missed

#### Additional Information:

- Captain Wernersbach shared a personal connection: his own mother was a domestic violence victim who never called police, which motivated him to become an officer.
- Detective squads interview victims and apprehend perpetrators while precinct officers follow up with victims. Oftentimes, victims/survivors will continue engagement with officers and detectives years after the initial incident to which the NYPD responded.
- Victim-centered approach focuses on follow-up services (therapy, counseling, housing).
- The 90th Precinct's officers work closely with Safe Horizon and the NYC Department for the Aging in elder abuse cases.
- Victims can text 911 if they feel unable to safely place a call.
- According to official NYPD policy and NYC laws, the NYPD is not permitted and does not collaborate with federal immigration enforcement.
- Services for victims after arrest include:
  - Lock changing
  - Shelter arrangements
  - Safety planning
- Captain Wernersbach noted that the 90th Precinct focuses on assessment, apprehension, and compliance, reiterating that bail determinations and sentencing are the jurisdiction of the judges.

#### NYPD 94th Precinct

Presenters: Captain Peña, PO Aquino, PO Vasquez

- Key Points:
  - Reported 6 felony assaults (3 open cases), 1 burglary
  - Rescued two children who were found rummaging through trash cans, discovering they were from an abusive household with a locked refrigerator

- o Domestic Violence team consists of two officers and one sergeant
- Officers provide work numbers and business cards directly to victims
- o Emphasized importance of reporting and connecting victims to services
- Approach victims as people, not statistics

#### • Discussion:

- WI Committee Chair Peterson raised concerns about victims being relocated instead of perpetrators.
- District Manager Johana Pulgarin asked about services for children and parental consent requirements.

#### **Brooklyn District Attorney's Office**

#### **Presenters:**

- Emmanuel De Jesus (Social Worker, Community Outreach and Training Coordinator, LGBTQIA+ Initiative Program Coordinator, Junior Clinical Supervisor)
- Talia Orvan (Licensed Clinical Worker, Elder Abuse Unit Coordinator)
- Key Points:
  - 40+ advocates and social workers providing multilingual services (Polish, Creole, Chinese, Korean, Spanish, and others)
  - 80% of DA cases involve special victims (domestic violence, elder abuse, sexual assault, crimes against children)
  - Support victims throughout legal proceedings
    - Located on same floor as Family Justice Center
    - While ADAs may change, victim services staff remains consistent
  - Work with the Office of Victim Services (OVS) to assist with compensation for crime victims
  - VINE program: Victims can opt to be notified when perpetrators are released
  - $\circ$  Elder abuse (60+ years):
    - 80-85% of perpetrators are adult children or grandchildren
    - Also handle cases involving intimate partner violence, caregivers, and home attendants
    - Work with JASA (social services organization serving CB1 residents in elder abuse cases)
  - Teen relationship abuse education programs
  - Focus on alternatives to incarceration when appropriate, especially when perpetrators have mental health issues

#### Woodhull Hospital

Presenter: Jessica Arocho, Director of Community Affairs and Director of Cure Violence Program

- Key Points:
  - Provides treatment component to domestic abuse cases through SART program
  - NYS Health Department-designated Center of Excellence for sexual assault treatment
  - Sexual Assault Response Team (SART) approved by NYS Department of Health
  - Sexual Assault Forensic Examiners (SAFE) program
  - Trained staff collect forensic evidence, accurately document injuries
  - Address emotional needs through rape counselors and forensic examiners
  - Collaboration with North Brooklyn Coalition for staff training

#### North Brooklyn Coalition

Presenter: Leana Pardo, Executive Director

- Key Points:
  - Services for anyone 18+ experiencing domestic violence or sexual assault
  - Free therapy, case management, support groups, and training

- Training program for volunteers (40-hour training) to sit with survivors during rape kit procedures
  - Funded by local Council Members
- Can provide training to any agency that needs it
- Currently serving 14 clients from CB1, including four rape cases (all occurred years ago)
- Ms. Pardo shared her personal experience with domestic violence, noting it took her four years to report her own rape
- Emphasized importance of community conversation about rape and sexual violence to reduce stigma
- Plans to improve North Brooklyn's own intake procedures in order to better track data on the amount of time between a survivor reporting an incident/experience and the date of the incident/experience
- Critical statistics shared:
  - 8/10 rapes committed by someone known to victim
  - 975/1000 perpetrators of sexual assault are released without conviction
  - Most cases are never reported to police, making rape even more difficult to prosecute.

#### **Right to Be Organization**

Presenter: Jorge Arteaga, Vice President of Movement Building

• Key Points:

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- Mission of the organization is to end hate and harassment
  - "Stand Up Against Street Harassment" campaign sponsored by L'oreal Paris
    - Launched in 2020
    - 60,000 people trained in NYC (30,000 in Brooklyn) in upstander training
- Addresses street harassment issues: catcalling, whistles, groping, staring, etc.
- Teaches the "5 Ds of Bystander Intervention":
  - Distract
  - Delegate
  - Document (give to the person experiencing harm)
  - Delay (noted that trauma was significantly reduced when victims received even a knowing glance)
  - Direct intervention (without escalating situation)
- Free trainings available, supported by funding from Council Members Gutierrez and Restler

#### Wyckoff Heights Medical Center

**Presenter:** Cadence Seffens, Sexual Assault Coordinator, Violence Intervention and Treatment Program

• Key Points:

- Violence Intervention Treatment Program responds to domestic violence and sexual assault cases in the Emergency Department
- Trains their own volunteer advocates
- o Licensed counselors work directly with survivors
- Support for co-survivors who are impacted by violence

#### Womankind

Presenter: Jennifer Le, Manager of Community Education and Outreach

- Key Points:
  - Established in 1982 as NY Asian Women's Center, renamed Womankind in 2017
  - o Services available for all victims regardless of gender or sexual orientation
  - Core services include two residential houses for survivors of gender-based violence
  - o 24/7 hotline with 18 Asian dialects and languages
  - Three community offices: Chinatown (Manhattan), Sunset Park (Brooklyn), and Elmhurst (Queens)
  - o Primarily serves East Asian, South Asian, and some Southeast Asian communities
  - Survivors of sexual violence often seek emotional support
  - o Emphasis on importance of culturally responsive care and resources

#### National Congress of Neighborhood Women

Presenters: Deborah Spiroff, Jane Pool

- Key Points:
  - Advocated for collecting "raw data" from healthcare providers in the district as most victim/survivors do not report to police, and now, have 20 years to report violence against women (New York Adult Survivor Act). Medical facilities serve unique role in being a vital link to critical services to combat aftermath of violence against women.
    - Need the actual number of cases from the two major healthcare providers
  - Concern about discrepancies between hospital data (like Wyckoff) and NYPD CompStat because the numbers reported between hospitals and local precincts are so drastically different.
    - NYPD 90th Precinct noted: the discrepancy can arise from victims/survivors showing up in the hospital, but declining at that moment to report with the local precinct physically closest to the hospital. It is also common for victims/survivors to seek support from a hospital or medical center, but then file a police report with the police precinct physically closest to where the victim/survivor lives.
  - Pratt project will produce an interactive installation about the lack of data collected on violence against women
  - Emphasized importance of bringing different stakeholders in domestic violence/violence against women together

• Ms. Peterson noted how many people in the room had personally experienced harassment or violence

**The Honorable Diana Reyna**, former Brooklyn Dep. Borough President and former Council Member of District 34

- Key Points:
  - Praised CB1 for organizing this "very impactful" meeting
  - Shared history of North Brooklyn domestic violence initiatives from the 1990s
  - Founded North Brooklyn Coalition from a steering committee
  - Safe Horizon provided critical funding
  - Collaboration with local organizations like St. Nicks Alliance
  - Praised the "incredible work of domestic violence officers who break walls of fear and shame"
  - Shared personal story about her mother confronting men who harassed women, which inspired her advocacy
  - Emphasized that different touchpoints need to work together

#### **PUBLIC COMMENTS**

- Community member indicated her support for CB1 to cover such topics like violence against women but expressed concern that many residents are unaware of monthly CB meetings, especially since not everyone uses email communication. She was present at the meeting only because a member of both CB1 committees informed her of the meeting in advance.
- Steve Chesler (CB1 Board Member): Praised organizations, law enforcement, and committees, stating it was one of the best meetings he had attended.
- CB1 Full Board Member/WI Committee member Katie Denny Horowitz and CB1 Full Board Member Chesler likened the idea of the quarterly violence against women meetings to the monthly Bushwick Inlet Park meetings hosted by CM Lincoln Restler, which have been very effective in helping organize community stakeholders interested in taking action together on various matters related to improving the park.
- Kimberly Vega (Council Member Jennifer Gutierrez's office): Joined the team in November 2024, expressed appreciation and committed to sharing information with her office.
- PS&HS Committee Member Lopez: Highlighted importance of teen dating violence prevention and youth education
  - Noted the good investment in early education of relationship violence to young people
  - Raised question about where teens specifically fit in the data and issues between child abuse and adult abuse: what is the cutoff? How are issues involving teenagers and adolescents handled?

#### **PUBLIC SAFETY & HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE MEETING**

• Committee Chair Feng called the committee to order to address agenda items.

- FDNY: He provided an update on Deputy Commissioner Sanchez's response to CB1's letter seeking more information about CB1's district need for a new fire house in accordance with CB1's surge in population over the last decade. The response indicated that the FDNY does not believe CB1 meets the threshold for siting an additional fire house, citing the FDNY Bureau of Fire Operations and Management Analysis and Planning's evaluation.
- Cannabis: Committee Chair Feng announced that after months of CB1 District Office staff follow-ups, the NYC Sheriff's Office finally responded to CB1's invitation to present on its work combating illicit retail cannabis establishments and vendors in CB1, and will present at the March 11 Full Board meeting. Committee Chair Feng called on to attend that Full Board meeting and requested that committee members and members of the public submit any additional questions for the NYC Sheriff to the committee chair or the District Office who would then submit those questions to the Cannabis Review Committee for consideration.
- Committee Chair Feng indicated that the agenda item on alternatives to the Metropolitan Pool amid its closure would be taken up by the Parks Committee so it would not be discussed as part of the agenda.
- Committee Chair Feng presented a series of motions to recommend that CB1 send letters on the matters aforementioned in the section titled "Motions in the PS&HS Committee Meeting." He provided printout versions of the four draft letters related to the safety issues related to business operations at the intersection of Division Avenue and Wilson Street in South Williamsburg along with printout versions of bills for the committee to consider recommending the Full Board submit a letter to local electeds indicating CB1's support or disapproval of different pieces of NYC Council and NYS Legislature legislation related to domestic violence, cannabis, shelters, crime, and law enforcement matters.
- The committee was in agreement to discuss them at the next monthly PS&HS Committee meeting on March 18, 2025, at 6:30pm. Committee Chair Feng indicated he would send over any updated materials in advance of that meeting.

Thank you for your recent letter regarding the establishment of a new firehouse in North Brooklyn. We appreciate the community board's concern for public safety and the ongoing commitment to ensuring effective emergency services. The FDNY continually assesses emergency response needs throughout the city due to re-zoning, proposed developments, major weather events, or other significant events requiring analysis of supply and demand. The department has an internal working group that reviews all rezoning proposals citywide. The group serves as a single point of contact with the New York City Department of City Planning and advises of potential new needs after a comprehensive review.

Pursuant to this request by Community Board 1, the district was thoroughly evaluated by both the Bureau of Fire Operations and Management Analysis and Planning for its need for fire apparatus, including its ranking over a 5-year period, relative to all community districts in the city, and a 20-year trend of fire and emergency incidents. In both cases, the department found the district to be adequately resourced in terms of overall workload, fire department performance, and risk rankings. The department shares the community board's concern regarding safety within the growing populations of Greenpoint and Williamsburg. In assessing fire company coverage, Community Board 1 is exceptional in comparison to the average community district.

We value the input of the community board and will remain attentive to the evolving needs of the area and continue to regularly evaluate fire operation services.

Our Public Safety & Human Services Committee has carefully reviewed this legislation and voted unanimously to support this measure, [which was subsequently endorsed by the full Community Board.] We believe this legislation addresses important quality of life concerns while still allowing reasonable operating hours for licensed cannabis businesses.

#### Key Points of Support:

- Consistent Operating Hours: Establishing uniform hours of operation (9:30 AM to 9:30 PM) creates clear expectations for both businesses and residents, eliminating confusion and potential conflicts.

On behalf of Brooklyn Community Board 1 (CB1) representing Williamsburg and Greenpoint, we are writing to formally request that the NYC Sheriff's Office establish a protocol to notify our board whenever enforcement actions are taken against illegal cannabis retail locations within our district boundaries. This request was reviewed and unanimously approved by our Public Safety & Human Services Committee before being endorsed by the full Community Board.

Illegal cannabis operations have proliferated throughout our neighborhoods, generating numerous complaints from residents and legitimate business owners regarding safety concerns, proximity to schools, and other quality of life issues. While we appreciate the Sheriff's Office's ongoing enforcement efforts, our board and the community we represent often remain unaware when raids or shutdowns occur.

We believe a simple notification process would provide several important benefits:

- 1. **Community Awareness:** Timely notification would allow CB1 to inform local residents about enforcement actions, demonstrating that their complaints are being addressed.
- 2. **Data Collection:** Notifications would help our board track enforcement patterns and better understand where resources are being deployed in our district.
- 3. **Feedback Loop:** This information would enable CB1 to provide more informed feedback to your office about locations that continue to operate despite enforcement or other emerging concerns.
- 4. **Public Confidence:** Transparency about enforcement builds public trust in the regulatory system and encourages continued reporting of illegal operations.

We recognize the operational sensitivities involved in enforcement actions and do not seek advance notice or detailed tactical information. Rather, we request a brief post-action notification that includes:

- Date of enforcement action
- Address of the location
- General nature of the enforcement (e.g., closure, seizure, etc.)

Our board is prepared to maintain appropriate confidentiality regarding any information shared and would work with your office to establish a streamlined notification process that minimizes administrative burden while maximizing community benefit.

#### **RE: Request for Information Regarding New Firehouse Needs in Community District 1**

Dear Chair Ariola:

On behalf of Brooklyn Community Board 1 (CB1), representing the Williamsburg and Greenpoint neighborhoods, I am writing to request your committee's assistance in obtaining critical information regarding fire protection needs in our district, which has experienced unprecedented growth since the 2005 rezoning. This request was unanimously approved by our Public Safety and Human Services Committee before being endorsed by the full Community Board.

Our district has undergone dramatic changes over the past two decades, with thousands of new residential units constructed and tens of thousands of new residents now calling North Brooklyn home. This transformation continues, with numerous large-scale developments currently under construction or in planning phases. However, our fire protection infrastructure has remained largely unchanged despite this substantial population increase and the development of formerly industrial areas into dense residential neighborhoods.

It is important to note that the need for an additional firehouse has been included in every CB1 District Needs Statement since 2007, reflecting our community's longstanding and consistent concern about fire protection resources in relation to our growing population. Despite nearly two decades of highlighting this need through our official budget priorities, this critical infrastructure gap remains unaddressed.

Recently, CB1 reached out to the FDNY to inquire about the need for a new firehouse in our district. While we received a response indicating that our district was "adequately resourced" and "exceptional in comparison to the average community district," the department did not share the specific data or metrics used to reach this determination, nor did they address how the dramatic population increase has impacted response times and coverage.

Therefore, we are requesting that the Committee on Fire and Emergency Management assist us in obtaining the following information:

- 1. The current average response times for all FDNY services (fire suppression and EMS) in Community District 1 compared to citywide averages and FDNY targets
- 2. Historical response time data showing trends since the 2005 rezoning
- 3. The specific metrics and methodologies used by FDNY to determine firehouse placement and coverage needs
- 4. Any assessments conducted regarding the impact of recent and planned development on emergency service delivery in our district
- 5. Information on how vertical growth (high-rise buildings) impacts FDNY resource allocation and response capabilities
- 6. The process and criteria used to determine when a new firehouse is warranted in a growing community

We believe that this information is essential for our community to understand whether our current fire protection infrastructure adequately serves our growing population. The safety of our residents must be paramount as our neighborhoods continue to develop and densify.

We would welcome the opportunity to testify before your committee on this matter and to work collaboratively with both the Council and the FDNY to ensure that our community's emergency service needs are properly addressed.

#### **RE:** Request for Information Regarding New Firehouse Needs in Community District 1

Dear Council Member Ariola:

At the regular meeting of Brooklyn Community Board No. 1, held the evening of March 11, 2025, the board members received a report from the Public Safety & Human Services Committee. Please be advised that the board members voted unanimously to support sending this letter.

On behalf of Brooklyn Community Board 1 (CB1), representing the Williamsburg and Greenpoint neighborhoods, I am writing to request your committee's assistance in obtaining critical information regarding fire protection needs in our district, which has experienced unprecedented growth since the 2005 rezoning. This request was unanimously approved by our Public Safety and Human Services Committee before being endorsed by the full Community Board.

Our district has undergone dramatic changes over the past two decades, with thousands of new residential units constructed and tens of thousands of new residents now calling North Brooklyn home. This transformation continues, with numerous large-scale developments currently under construction or in planning phases. However, our fire protection infrastructure has remained largely unchanged despite this substantial population increase and the development of formerly industrial areas into dense residential neighborhoods.

It is important to note that the need for an additional firehouse has been included in every CB1 District Needs Statement since 2007, reflecting our community's longstanding and consistent concern about fire protection resources in relation to our growing population. Despite nearly two decades of highlighting this need through our official budget priorities, this critical infrastructure gap remains unaddressed.

Recently, CB1 reached out to the FDNY to inquire about the need for a new firehouse in our district. While we received a response indicating that our district was "adequately resourced" and "exceptional in comparison to the average community district," the department did not share the specific data or metrics used to reach this determination, nor did they address how the dramatic population increase has impacted response times and coverage.

Therefore, we are requesting that the Committee on Fire and Emergency Management assist us in obtaining the following information:

- 1. The current average response times for all FDNY services (fire suppression and EMS) in Community District 1 compared to citywide averages and FDNY targets
- 2. Historical response time data showing trends since the 2005 rezoning
- 3. The specific metrics and methodologies used by FDNY to determine firehouse placement and coverage needs
- 4. Any assessments conducted regarding the impact of recent and planned development on emergency service delivery in our district
- 5. Information on how vertical growth (high-rise buildings) impacts FDNY resource allocation and response capabilities
- 6. The process and criteria used to determine when a new firehouse is warranted in a growing community

We believe that this information is essential for our community to understand whether our current fire protection infrastructure adequately serves our growing population. The safety of our residents must be paramount as our neighborhoods continue to develop and densify.

We would welcome the opportunity to testify before your committee on this matter and to work collaboratively with both the Council and the FDNY to ensure that our community's emergency service needs are properly addressed.

Thank you for your consideration of this request. We look forward to your response.

At the regular meeting of Brooklyn Community Board No. 1, held the evening of March 11, 2025, the board members received a report from the Public Safety & Human Services Committee. Please be advised that the board members voted unanimously to support sending this letter.

On behalf of Brooklyn Community Board 1 representing the Williamsburg and Greenpoint neighborhoods, we are writing to express our strong support for Introduction 1139-2024, which would establish standardized hours of operation for adult-use cannabis retail dispensaries in New York City.

Our Public Safety & Human Services Committee has carefully reviewed this legislation and voted unanimously to support this measure, which was subsequently endorsed by the full Community Board. We believe this legislation addresses important quality of life concerns while still allowing reasonable operating hours for licensed cannabis businesses.

#### **Key Points of Support:**

- 1. **Consistent Operating Hours:** Establishing uniform hours of operation (9:30 AM to 9:30 PM) creates clear expectations for both businesses and residents, eliminating confusion and potential conflicts.
- 2. Community Impact: Late-night operations of any retail establishment can create noise, loitering, and other quality of life concerns. The proposed closing time of 9:30 PM

appropriately balances business needs with residential quality of life in our mixed-use neighborhoods.

- 3. Support for Legal Market: Clear regulations support compliant businesses while distinguishing them from illicit operations that often operate with disregard for community concerns.
- 4. Enforcement Mechanism: The civil penalties of \$1,000 for first violations and \$2,000 for subsequent violations within a two-year period provide appropriate consequences while avoiding overly punitive measures.

As representatives of a community that has seen both legal dispensaries and illegal cannabis operations, we believe this legislation provides an important framework for responsible cannabis retail that respects both the businesses and the surrounding community.

We strongly encourage you to support and consider co-sponsoring Introduction 1139-2024. We also welcome the opportunity to discuss this matter further and would be pleased to provide testimony at any relevant hearings.

At the regular meeting of Brooklyn Community Board No. 1, held the evening of March 11, 2025, the board members received a report from the Public Safety & Human Services Committee. Please be advised that the board members voted unanimously to support sending this letter.

On behalf of Brooklyn Community Board 1 representing the Williamsburg and Greenpoint neighborhoods, we are writing to recommend legislation that would significantly enhance transparency regarding illegal cannabis operations in our communities.

Our district, like many throughout New York City, has experienced a proliferation of unlicensed cannabis retailers. Community members regularly express concerns about these operations at our public meetings, particularly regarding their proximity to schools, youth programs, and other sensitive locations. While we understand that the Office of Cannabis Management (OCM) collects complaints about these establishments, there is currently no public access to this data, making it difficult for communities to understand enforcement patterns or hold agencies accountable.

Therefore, Brooklyn Community Board 1 formally recommends the introduction of legislation that would require the New York State Office of Cannabis Management to:

- 1. Publish and maintain a publicly accessible list of all complaints submitted by members of the public regarding alleged illegal cannabis operations and/or other violations
- 2. Include in this list, at minimum:
  - o Date each complaint was submitted

- Location of the alleged illicit activity
- Number of complaints received per location
- 3. Develop and maintain an interactive map linked to this data for easier public access and visualization

This transparency measure would serve multiple important purposes:

- Enable communities to better understand the scope of unlicensed operations
- Help identify patterns and potential enforcement gaps
- Allow for more informed community planning and advocacy
- Support licensed, compliant businesses by highlighting enforcement against illegal competitors
- Increase public confidence in the regulatory system

We believe this legislation aligns with New York State's commitment to equity and community involvement in cannabis regulation. Similar transparency tools have proven effective in other regulatory contexts, such as the NYC Department of Buildings and Department of Health and Mental Hygiene.

Our Community Board would be pleased to provide additional input or testify in support of such legislation. We appreciate your consideration of this recommendation and your continued service to our North Brooklyn communities.

At the regular meeting of Brooklyn Community Board No. 1, held the evening of March 11, 2025, the board members received a report from the Public Safety & Human Services Committee. Please be advised that the board members voted unanimously to support sending this letter.

On behalf of Brooklyn Community Board 1 (CB1) representing Williamsburg and Greenpoint, we are writing to formally request that the NYC Sheriff's Office establish a protocol to notify our board whenever enforcement actions are taken against illegal cannabis retail locations within our district boundaries. This request was reviewed and unanimously approved by our Public Safety & Human Services Committee before being endorsed by the full Community Board.

Illegal cannabis operations have proliferated throughout our neighborhoods, generating numerous complaints from residents and legitimate business owners regarding safety concerns, proximity to schools, and other quality of life issues. While we appreciate the Sheriff's Office's ongoing enforcement efforts, our board and the community we represent often remain unaware when raids or shutdowns occur.

We believe a simple notification process would provide several important benefits:

1. **Community Awareness:** Timely notification would allow CB1 to inform local residents about enforcement actions, demonstrating that their complaints are being addressed.

- 4. **Public Confidence:** Transparency about enforcement builds public trust in the regulatory system and encourages continued reporting of illegal operations.

We recognize the operational sensitivities involved in enforcement actions and do not seek advance notice or detailed tactical information. Rather, we request a brief post-action notification that includes:

- Date of enforcement action
- Address of the location
- General nature of the enforcement (e.g., closure, seizure, etc.)

In addition to basic raid and shutdown notifications, Community Board 1 requests that the NYC Sheriff's Office provide notification in the following cannabis enforcement scenarios within our district:

- 1. When previously raided illegal cannabis operations reopen at the same location or relocate within the district
- 2. When nuisance abatement proceedings are initiated against properties hosting illegal cannabis operations
- 3. When multi-agency enforcement operations involving cannabis occur within the district
- 4. When formal notifications are issued to property owners regarding illegal cannabis operations in their buildings
- 5. When significant seizures of cannabis products occur, particularly those involving adulterated or counterfeit products that may pose public health risks
- 6. When any cannabis vendor, whether legally licensed or unlicensed, is found to have sold cannabis products to underage individuals

Our board is prepared to maintain appropriate confidentiality regarding any information shared and would work with your office to establish a streamlined notification process that minimizes administrative burden while maximizing community benefit.

We would welcome the opportunity to discuss this request further with you.

Thank you for your consideration and for your office's continued efforts to address illegal cannabis operations in our community.

Dear Chair Fuller,

I am writing to propose that CB1 adopt the following addendum to Section VI (Committee Membership) in the CB1 By-Laws in order to establish clear expectations for members (full board and non-board members) of committees:

VI. H. A member of a committee shall make every effort to attend the committee's meetings. In the event that a committee member has a conflict and will not be able to attend the committee meeting, the committee member shall provide a written request seeking an excused absence addressed to the relevant Committee Chair prior to the meeting's scheduled start time in addition to the process of notifying the Board Chair in Section VII. A. 4. All absences with or without advanced notice shall be excused if approved by a majority of committee members present.

VI. I. Three consecutive committee meeting absences or fifty percent non-consecutive absences of the most recent six committee meetings shall be considered substantial non-attendance at committee meetings. In the event that a committee member has reached substantial non-attendance at committee meetings, the Committee Chair shall provide written notice to the committee member of the member's non-attendance and the risk of recommendation to the Board Chair for removal.

In order to remain in good standing in the committee, the committee member must attend at least two of the next three committee meetings.

In the event that the committee member is not able to fulfill that requirement, the Committee Chair shall provide written notice of recommendation for removal to the Board Chair. Upon receipt of the written notice, the Board Chair may accept the recommendation for removal effective immediately with written confirmation.

These recommended changes will not only provide committee chairs with much needed support in securing consistent quorums, but also enable our committee members to maximize their own impact in advocating for and serving CB1's residents.

# **Current Text:**

# I. Officers

- A. The officers of the board shall be: Chairperson, First Vice Chairperson, Second Vice Chairperson, Third Vice Chairperson, Financial Secretary, Recording Secretary, and Member-at-Large.
- B. The duties of the officers shall be as follows:
  - 1. Chairperson
    - a. The Chairperson shall be the chief executive officer of the board and shall be responsible for the overall conduct of the affairs of the board.
    - b. Call and preside at all regular and public hearing meetings and special meetings of the board.
    - c. Appoint and remove the Chairperson and members of all standing and special committees unless otherwise specified in these by-laws.
    - *d.* Carry out the duties and serve on all committees and boards as prescribed by the city charter.
    - e. Prepare an annual report at the end of each calendar year for the board, borough president, and city council members from the community district.
    - *f. Responsible, along with the financial secretary, for the administration of funds obtained from sources outside of the city government.*

# VI. Committee Membership

- A. In addition to these committees outlined in the by-laws, the Chairperson or the board may establish whatever committees are deemed necessary to carry out the functions of the board.
- B. Membership on committees shall be open to any residents of community district no. 1; however, the Chairperson of each committee must be a member of the board.
- *C.* Each member shall be assigned to at least one committee and shall take an active part in its work.
- D. Non-board members of the committees may vote in committee, but the committee Chairperson shall report the vote of board members and non-board members separately, along with the complete tally. Minority reports must be presented on the floor by a board member.

- *E.* Each standing committee of the board shall meet, at a minimum, four times a year, preferable at least once during each quarter.
- F. By the date of the board's December meeting each committee chairperson shall submit a projected committee schedule for the upcoming year to the board Chairperson. These submissions will be reviewed by the executive committee, which shall establish a comprehensive projected committee calendar. This will be mailed to each board member by December 31st and distributed at the January board meeting.
- G. A monthly calendar of all scheduled board and committee meetings including public hearings, shall be compiled by the District Manager and mailed to each board member prior to the first of each calendar month. All meetings specified in the calendar shall be conducted, unless specifically canceled or rescheduled by the appropriate committee Chairperson. Notice of all such changes shall be sent to each board member and affected committee members. In addition, meeting notices and agenda of each scheduled committee meeting shall be sent by the district office to each committee member at least five days prior to the scheduled meeting date.


### VII. Declaration of Vacancy and Attendance Committee

- A. Since a quorum is necessary to do business, diligent attendance at meetings is a prerequisite to continued membership on the board. Since the City Charter permits the board to remove members, the following procedures for removal due to excessive absences shall be followed.
  - 1. When a member fails to attend 5 of the combined regular/public hearings required by these by-laws during the course of the calendar year, they shall be subject to removal proceedings.
  - 2. There shall be an elected attendance committee of three members.
  - 3. The attendance committee shall keep a record of the attendance of each member of the board at all regular and public hearing meetings. In order to assist this effort, all attending members shall be required to sign a sign-in sheet at each meeting in order to document their presence.

All members, who do not sign this sheet before the adjournment of the meeting shall be listed as absent by the attendance committee, unless they can independently verify their presence to the committee's satisfaction. Any member, who knowingly participates in a forgery involving the sign-in sheet shall be subject to disciplinary procedures. The penalty for knowingly participating in such action shall be removal from this board.

4. Members who cannot be in attendance because they are on official board business elsewhere shall be deemed to be present. Absences due to death, illness, a family emergency, or for some other reasonable type of explanation are excusable if approved by the executive committee or, in the case of committee meetings, by a majority of the board members present at the meeting. The attendance committee shall monitor such absences. Members must notify the board's office prior to the meeting.

- 5. The attendance committee shall notify a board member, who has been absent from four meetings in writing, by phone or in person within five days of the last absence. The notification shall inform the member that one additional absence will be grounds for removal from the board. Such notice shall also consist of a record of the attendance of the member and notification of the next meeting date and place.
- 6. The attendance committee shall meet with the board member when the board member accumulates 5 absences. At that meeting the member shall be informed of their attendance record and be provided with an opportunity to provide any justifications and/or excuses for said absences. After having heard the member's response, the committee will then vote on whether or not to recommend the member's removal. Should the committee recommend the member's removal, the attendance committee shall report said recommendation to the board at its next meeting, at which the board shall determine by majority vote whether or not to accept the recommendation to remove the member.
- 7. Notice of declaration of vacancy, along with copies of all related materials, shall be sent to the borough president and the members of City Council representing the area.
- 8. The member in question may appeal to the executive committee for review of the records of attendance.
- 9. The attendance committee shall issue a written quarterly report in April, July, October, and January listing the number of meetings held, meeting dates, and the attendance record of each member. The January report shall provide the final attendance records of all board members from the previous calendar year, and shall be forwarded to the borough president and the local council members. Committee attendance of board members shall be issued quarterly. Committee minutes shall show the board members present and absent from the committee meeting.

Below is my response to the members organizing by laws changes for review at the next Executive Committee meeting.

I had a conversation with BP Reynoso yesterday. He informed me that with other CB's he honors the vote of the full board for member removal for cause, and gives the board autonomy to remove that member following its vote. I explained that under BP Markowitz, legal had insisted that we amend our process in the interest of due process which has been incorporated into our by-laws. I am fine with keeping the current process in place both to allow for a transparent and just due process for appeals, however, I see a flaw in the process: Currently there is no time limit for removed members to appear before the Exec. Mr. Indig has not appeared before the Exec as part of the process and has now missed 3 opportunities to do so. It is unclear whether he will avail himself of the opportunity at the February 25th meeting. Nevertheless, I feel that expelled members, must consider the matter urgent enough to appeal to the Exec at the earliest availability, and not to do so is disrespectful to the board. Therefore, I propose the following change to the by-laws:

#### CURRENT:

VII. Declaration of Vacancy and Attendance Committee

8. The member in question may appeal to the executive committee for review of the records of attendance.

**PROPOSED CHANGES:** 

[REPLACE SS8 with the FOLLOWING]

8. Expelled members may appear before the Executive Committee to appeal the full boards vote of removal. The member in question SHALL appear at the earliest scheduled meeting of the Executive Committee following the board's vote of removal. The member in question SHALL inform the Executive Committee, either by written or telephone notice, that they will appear at the next scheduled meeting of the committee to appeal their expulsion by the full board NO LESS THAN 48 hours prior. Failure of the expelled member to appear SHALL result in their immediate removal. If the expelled member can show cause why they can not appear, the Executive Committee MAY rule to excuse their appearance for that meeting only. If excused, the expelled member MUST appear at the next scheduled Executive Committee meeting, and no excuse will be entertained by the committee should they fail to appear at that meeting and the vote of the full board for removal will be upheld.

The Executive Committee SHALL inform the Brooklyn Borough President within 48 hours of their ruling to either re-instate (with explanation) the member or uphold the vote of expulsion by the Board, and that they have directed the District Manager to purge members whose appeal has failed from the attendance roll immediately.

#### **MEETING CALLED TO ORDER**

Assistant District Manager, Mr. Luis Castrillon is conducting the meeting because District Manager Johana Pulgarin was attending a meeting called by Brooklyn Borough President Antonio Reynoso at Brooklyn Borough Hall. Assistant District Manager Castrillon called the Meeting to order and noted the agenda which included a round robin session.

#### **ROUND ROBIN SESSION**

**NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DOH&MH):** Ms. Afia McCausky, Community Liaison - Brooklyn North:

Ms. McCausky had no new updates. She advised that it is Flu season and people should practice good hand hygiene to keep germs away and to stop the spread of the Flu.

<u>NYC Department of Design and Construction (DDC)</u>: Ms. Delia Fabre - Community Construction Liaison

There is a Safe Route Project that is currently working at three locations Division Avenue and Williamsburg Street, Lorimer Street and Wallabout Street, and Union Avenue and Harrison Avenue. They are installing sidewalks, curb extensions, and new street lighting. On behalf of District Manager Pulgarin, Assistant District Manager Castrillon asked how are they doing outreach to the community? Ms. Fabre said she goes to the schools personally in the area and give them updates. Ms. Fabre also emails a newsletter every Friday with the construction updates. MS. Fabre works in the field and at the worksite.



<u>NYC Department of Social Services</u>: Ms. Yuri Sanchez - Brooklyn Borough Director Department of Social Services falls under the umbrella of Department of Homeland Services and Human Resources Administration.

Hope is celebrating its twentieth year of counting homeless people on the streets of New York City. On the night of January 28, 2025, Hope 2025 volunteers and staff partner agencies conducted the annual counting of homeless people on the streets of New York City. The data will be available in the spring. This annual counting helps get funding for various programs. Ms. Sanchez said that you can call 311 to report and request services for a homeless person or if you see an encampment. The agency will try and get the person and/or family into a shelter. New York City is a right to shelter city. New York City will, if the person is willing to be placed in a shelter, even families. They can get a shower and a meal. They can meet with a social worker to prevent homelessness. They have staff at housing court with computers to help people get resources, like an attorney or even help them get an one-shot deal to pay back rent.

Assistant District Manager, Luis Castrillon asked Ms. Sanchez if she knew anything about closing the migrant shelters. She said the mayor's office would be better able to answer that question.

#### NYC Department of Transportation (DOT): Ms. Ronda Messer, Community Liaison:

The winter season is among us and the weather creates potholes. In addition to the potholes, we have to worry about rainwater damaging in ground utility lines. On behalf of District Manager Pulgarin, Assistant District Manager Castrillon asked if there are any updates on McGuinness Boulevard. There are no updates for McGuinness Boulevard. Some work remains due to the weather, but they are pretty close to finishing it.

First Vice Chairperson, Simon Weiser asked if DOT is receiving complaints for McGuiness Boulevard. Ms. Messer responded that they still receive complaints, but they continue to monitor McGuiness Boulevard and make adjustments. They had to make an adjustment to change the signal light timing because it was off and creating too much traffic in one area. Once all of the construction is completed, they will monitor and make any necessary changes.

First Vice Chairperson Mr. Weiser stated that Community Board No 1 has passed a resolution for Sammy's Law to designate Brooklyn Community District 1 as the borough's initial 20 MPH Slow Zone. He also asked, how will this work. Ms. Messer advised that DOT has to conduct studies to determined which Community Boards and which streets/corridors will be used for the pilot program. The pilot program will not encompass the whole Community Board, only certain thoroughfare within.

**NYC Fire Department (FDNY):** Ms. Sandra Sanchez, Director of FDNY Community Affairs There have been no fatalities in Community Board No 1, but other Community Board Districts Brooklyn has seen some fatalities during the month of January. Cars blocking the fire hydrants have created dangerous issues for Firefighters. We encourage people to notify 311 or the local precinct to report cars blocking fire hydrants.

Ms. Sanchez provided the following statistics for the month of January:

Structural Fires - 59

Non-Structural Fires -96

Medical Emergency – 576

Non- Medical Emergency - 668

Total responses for Brooklyn Community Board No 1 is 1396 for the month versus 16458 total for all of Brooklyn. Ms. Sanchez said, compared to January 2024, there was a slight increase with

non-structural fires and non-medical emergencies showing increases and a decease for structural fires and medical emergencies.

First Vice Chairperson Mr. Weiser asked is there any education FDNY can provide to avoid fire, and do you know how the fires were started. Ms. Sanchez said, during the winter you see more fires because of space heaters, overloaded electrical outlets, cooking, the use of candles, and smoking in bed. We do not have the statistics for the causes of all of the fires. Ms. Sanchez said you can visit FDNYSmart website <u>https://www.fdnysmart.org/</u> for resources to prevent fires.

# **<u>NYC Department of Buildings (DOB)</u>**: Ms. Milach-Ann Thomas Holmes, Intergovernmental Affairs Liaison

DOB issues a violation. Depending on the class of the violation, Class 1 or Class 2, they have 30 days or 45 days respectfully or the court date to correct the violation. People are under the impression that they pay the fine at OATH and do not have to fix the condition. The conditions still need to be corrected regardless of paying the civil penalty. Civil penalties cannot be waived. You need to submit before and after pictures to get the Certificate of Correction to have the violation removed. DOB can assist you in getting the violation removed. They can also assist if permits are required to repair the condition. Some people submit before and after pictures and the inspector returns and finds the same violation existing.

<u>NYC Mayor Office:</u> Mr. Pierre Gedeon, Brooklyn Borough Director Community Affairs Unit Under Mayor Adams, New York City has accomplished the following:

- Removed 20,000 illegal guns off the streets.
- Created more than 63,000 affordable housing units.
- Given \$30 billion back to residents through various city, state, and government programs.
- 90% reduction in the cost of childcare for family of four earning less than \$50,000.
- 20 million jobs have been created.
- 70 different programs to help New Yorkers, e.g. cash assistance, rent freeze, childcare, and discounted MetroCards.

On Thursday February 27, 2025, New York City is having a job fair at 660 Powells Street, Brooklyn, NY 11212.

First Vice Chairperson Mr. Weiser asked if Mr. Gedeon had any leaflets he can share with us regarding the 70 different programs available. Mr. Gedeon provided some leaflets, (see attached). First Vice Chairperson Mr. Weiser asked about subway safety. People want to feel safe on the subway. Mr. Gedeon said with the help of Governor Hochul and Mayor Adams, more police are patrolling the subways.

NYC Parks: Mr. Jose Rivera, Supervisor: Mr. Rivera had no new updates to report.

<u>Community Board No. 1:</u> Assistant District Manager Castrillon thanked everyone for attending the meeting as well as for always connecting with CB#1 and working together. I am truly grateful to all of you. The meeting was concluded. The Assistant District Manager advised all attendees that the next District Cabinet Meeting will be held on Thursday, March 20, 2025.

# GOVERNOR KATHY HOCHUL ANNOUNCED MORE THAN 200,000 NEW YORKERS HAVE ENROLLED IN NEW YORK MOBILE ID

#### Mobile ID Is an Optional, Highly Secure ID Available on Your Smartphone

#### New York Mobile ID Now Accepted at Four New York Airports and More Than 100 Airports Nationwide

Governor Kathy Hochul today announced that more than 200,000 New Yorkers have completed the enrollment process for New York Mobile ID (MiD), a voluntary, highly secure digital version of a stateissued driver license, learner permit or ID. The Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) first announced the Mobile ID in June 2024.

"We're thrilled that more than 200,000 New Yorkers have embraced this revolutionary technology that enables secure, contactless identification right from your phone," **Governor Hochul said.** "Whether you want to get through airport security or order an alcoholic beverage, Mobile ID is raising the bar on the way New Yorkers can verify their age and identity, offering greater convenience and privacy."

Anyone with a valid New York State-issued driver license, learner permit, or non-driver ID can download the secure Mobile ID app on their Android or iOS device through Google Play or the App Store.

In tandem with the growth in Mobile ID users, the number of places where Mobile ID can be used continues to expand. Through a partnership with the Transportation Security Administration (TSA), New York's MiD is accepted at TSA security checkpoints at <u>more than 100 airports</u> across the country and at four airports in New York State, including all terminals at LaGuardia, John F. Kennedy, Syracuse Hancock, and Stewart International airports.

State bars, restaurants and other businesses with liquor licenses can also accept Mobile ID as a form of age verification during alcohol sales after the <u>New York State Liquor Authority issued an advisory</u> in October approving its use.

New York State Department of Motor Vehicles Commissioner Mark J.F. Schroeder said, "So much in today's world happens on your smartphone, and Mobile ID's strong growth in less than 10 months shows that so many New Yorkers have wanted a simple and secure way to access their driver license, permit or non-driver ID directly on their device. Mobile IDs will become increasingly important for consumers and businesses alike as more interactions go digital, and I'm proud that New York is one of the states leading the way."

The New York Mobile ID was designed to ensure user privacy and developed in compliance with the most <u>stringent international standards for personal identification</u> published by the International Organization for Standardization (ISO) as well as the Mobile Driver's License Implementation Guidelines created by the American Academy of Motor Vehicle Administrators.

The MiD app can only be unlocked through Face ID, TouchID, or a secure six-digit PIN. Personal information found on the MiD is encrypted and only accessible when the Mobile ID holder consents to sharing it.

Information is transmitted to a verifier through a secure, digital connection so the user never has to hand over their phone. And information about usage, including where, when, and what personal information the user has shared, is encrypted and stored only on their personal device. Data on when and where someone uses their MiD is not tracked, stored or transmitted.

You can get MiD in a few simple steps:

- 1. Download the New York MiD app from the App Store or through Google Play.
- 2. Register the phone number of the device the Mobile ID will be on. Your Mobile ID can only be on one device at a time to help protect your identity.
- 3. Take a picture of the front and back of your physical ID (driver license, non-driver ID, or learner permit), using your phone's camera.
- 4. Pose for a selfie. The app checks the photo and ID against information on file with the DMV to ensure you are who you say you are.

Once your information is verified, your MiD is active and ready to use wherever it is accepted, including in other states and countries. Learn more about New York Mobile ID online.

# HIICAP

## NYC's Super Team to Help New Yorkers Navigate Medicare

Eric Hausman could be called the Oracle of Medicare. While his vast knowledge of Medicare seems out of this world, it is grounded in decades of experience. After 26 years of "speaking with people about Medicare," he is most certainly an expert. His earlier introduction to health insurance was with a well-known health insurance company, followed by years of consulting work.

As Outreach Volunteer Manager, Mr. Hausman oversees a staff of about 40 volunteers at the Health Insurance Information Counseling & Assistant Program (HIICAP) at the <u>Department for the Aging/NYC Aging</u>. Mr. Hausman and his team at <u>HIICAP</u> are entrusted with helping New Yorkers navigate Medicare and other health insurance supports on their path to retirement.

HIICAP is New York State's free health insurance assistance program (SHIP). The program provides education on Medicare and various health coverage-related programs such as Medicare Part D, Medigap/Medicare Supplement Insurance, and private health insurance, including Medicare Advantage. HIICAP also advises on programs for lower-income New Yorkers, such as Extra Help/LIS, the Medicare Savings Programs, and Elderly Pharmaceutical Insurance Coverage (EPIC). HIICAP, one of many services available to older New Yorkers at the Department for the Aging, is powered by Mr. Hausman and his team of volunteers. HIICAP advises and educates on health

insurance through one-on-one phone, in-person counseling and presentations to community members and service providers.

The volunteers are mostly retirees from various specialties, including attorneys, social workers, and human resource specialists. However, despite some of the counselors' former professions, Mr. Hausman notes that the main qualifiers for a HIICAP volunteer counselor are great customer service skills and that they are "...patient, have a professional but friendly demeanor, and most importantly [their] attention to detail." Attention to detail seemingly goes hand in hand with quality customer service skills since individuals have their own needs and circumstances. The demand for personalized advice makes a cookie-cutter, one-size-fits-all approach impractical.

HIICAP counselors are ready to work with the public by completing an Introduction to Medicare webinar (available for the public) and additional online training. Volunteers are further prepared through mentoring, which entails the live observation of an experienced counselor. The volunteer then works directly with consumers under the careful observation of a more experienced counselor. Mr. Hausman expresses his appreciation for volunteer counselors, acknowledging that it is "very generous to volunteer" and that counseling work is "perfect" for individuals "looking for something that challenges them" as it "stretches" them as retirees.

#### Medicare Enrollment, Avoiding Penalties, & Affording Prescriptions

Typically, the first opportunity to enroll in Medicare is at age 65 and is available through a 7-month window called the Initial Enrollment Period (**IEP**) which is three (**3**) months prior to your birthday month, the month of your birthday (**1**), and three (**3**) months after your birthday. Disabled people, people with End Stage Renal Disease, or people with Lou Gehrig's disease may also qualify for Medicare prior to age 65. There are other opportunities to enroll in Medicare. January 1<sup>st</sup> through March 31<sup>st</sup> is the General Enrollment Period, this is the enrollment period for those who missed their IEP when they turned 65. October 15<sup>th</sup> to December 7<sup>th</sup> is the Annual Election (open enrollment) Period, individuals can change their prescription drug coverage or Medicare Advantage Plan. There are also Special Enrollment Periods which qualify a person for enrollment based on specific occurrences (qualifying events) in their life. These qualifying events include events such as moving to a location where your plan isn't offered, losing employer-based health insurance, or even natural disasters.

#### 7 Month IEP =

**3** months before birthday +**1** month of birthday +**3** months after birthday

#### **Original Medicare: Part A & Part B**

**Medicare Part A**, <u>hospital insurance</u>, is premium free if an individual or their spouse has at least 10 years of work history. Individuals eligible for Medicare who do not have a work history can buy Medicare Part A. Individuals who must pay but do not enroll when eligible may pay up to a 10 percent penalty for twice as many years they were not enrolled. If a person misses one year, they'll pay the penalty for two years. However, Mr. Hausman points out a penalty for Part A late enrollment is rare.

Mr. Hausman also explains exceptions where an individual at age 65 can delay enrollment. An individual can delay enrolling in **Medicare Part B**, <u>medical insurance</u> if they or their spouse are employed and have health insurance coverage through their employment. For others, however, failure to enroll in Part B may result in a (lifetime) 10 percent penalty of the standard premium for each (full) 12 months of delayed enrollment. The penalty calculation begins in the 8th (eighth) month–after an individual's 7 (seven) months initial enrollment period.

#### Part D Stands Alone

Mr. Hausman explains that **Part D**, <u>prescription drug coverage</u> is optional. Individuals with Original Medicare (Part A and Part B), have may have Medicare Part D as a "standalone drug plan".

Mr. Hausman also advises of the various options an individual may qualify for to **assist with prescription costs**, like the **Extra Help** program which he explains, "can help with the premium and cost sharing" or EPIC to "supplement Part D coverage and help with the cost." He continued, stating that, "some individuals may have drug coverage from their union or former employer, or Veterans Affairs."

While some people may not be on any prescriptions and thus see no need to get Part D, Mr. Hausman and his team reiterate to enrollees new to Medicare that although Part D enrollment is optional should they need prescription(s) in the future or change their mind and opt to enroll in Part D "they may have to wait for the next open enrollment period and may be subject to a late enrollment penalty." The late enrollment penalty for Part D is a (lifetime) 1 (one)percent penalty of the base beneficiary premium multiplied by the number of full months of delay.

The sage advice Mr. Hausman and the counselors give is indicative of HIICAP's purpose.



**Expert NOTE**: People with Extra Help are not subject to the late enrollment penalty. There are Medicare Savings Programs, Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB) and Qualified Individual (QI), that pay premiums and applicable penalties. Additionally, people qualifying for full Medicaid, or a Medicare Savings Program automatically get Extra Help.

Individuals not automatically receiving Extra Help can apply for it through the Social Security Administration.

#### **Clearing up Misconceptions about Medicare**

#### ×Misconception: You must be a citizen to be eligible for Medicare

**Correction:** Permanent residents are eligible for Medicare too. However, they must reside in the country for five consecutive years.

#### ×Misconception: You must have work history to qualify for Medicare.

**Correction:** A person can qualify for Medicare without work history. However, they would have to pay for (purchase) Medicare Part A. However, if they qualify for the Medicare Savings Program, QMB (Qualified Medicare Beneficiary), both Part A and Part B, will be paid by the Program.

# ×Misconception: You must have Medicare Part B first to be eligible for a Medicare Savings Program.

✓ **Correction:** People with Medicare Part A can apply for a Medicare Savings Program even if they are not enrolled in Part B. If approved for an MSP, they will be enrolled in Medicare Part B. Applying for an MSP helps people start their Medicare Part B coverage without delay.

#### ×Misconception: You must have Medicare Part D to enroll in EPIC.

**Correction:** People with Medicare can apply for EPIC; if eligible for the program, they can receive Part D drug coverage sooner.



A local big issue is that many people with Medicare were in **Medicare Advantage plans** (primarily with <u>Aetna</u> or <u>United Healthcare</u>), which terminated at the end of 2024. If they did not choose a new plan for 2025, they are in Original Medicare by default and **may not have Part D drug coverage**. Fortunately, there is a Special Enrollment Period for these individuals available through <u>the end of **February**</u> to allow them to enroll in a new plan to be effective the first of the following month.

#### National

The biggest change for Medicare nationally in 2025 is a new out-of-pocket cap on covered Part D drug costs at the pharmacy–\$2,000. The Medicare Prescription Payment Plan (MPPP) is connected to that, which allows people with Medicare with high out-of-pocket costs to spread out that \$2,000 over the year into monthly payments.

#### Keeping up with Medicaid

#### Medicaid Renewals – Timely Return Required

- Medicaid Recipients must renew their coverage every year. There are several ways to renew Medicaid coverage:
  - Return the Medicaid renewal packet in the return envelope provided. Recipients **must** complete and submit their renewal by the date listed on the renewal form. Recipients will lose their Medicaid coverage if they do not return the renewal for by the date listed.
  - 2. Call the FE-ABD Program at 347-396-4705 for free enrollment help.
  - 3. Renew online on <u>Access HRA</u>. If you do not have an Access HRA account, you can <u>create an ACCESS HRA account</u> and upload any required documents through the Access HRA app.
  - 4. Return renewal packet to a local HRA office. Locate an office here: <u>NYC HRA</u> <u>Locations</u>.

**ALERT:** Until June 2025 Medicaid cases due for renewal with <u>active SNAP</u> will be renewed for 12 months. Individuals will not receive a renewal packet. However, recipients will receive a notice advising them that their Medicaid is renewed. If you get a notice telling you that your Medicaid case is closed, please call 1-888-692-6116.



#### **Medicaid Applications**

In addition to proof of residency and citizenship/immigration status, Medicaid applicants will be required to supply proof of the following:

- Identity
- Household Income
- Resources/Assets (if applicable)
- Retirement accounts and annuities
- Social Security benefit amount
- Medicaid Applicants must show proof of Medicare application (proof of Medicare application not required for undocumented immigrants)
- Call 347-396-4705 for free assistance applying for Medicaid, Medicare, and the Medicare Savings Programs.

#### Statement of Basis and Purpose of Proposed Rule

The Office of Administrative Trials and Hearings (OATH) proposes to add a new section to subchapter F of Chapter 6 of title 48 of the Rules of the City of New York to establish a process by which the city sheriff may move to amend a judgment to designate a judgment debtor by the correct legal name. This proposed rule is necessary in order to implement New York City Administrative Code Section 7-551 (d) and provide the office of the city sheriff with a process to amend a judgment and correctly identify a judgment debtor when: (i) the judgment identifies the debtor solely by their address or (ii) the debtor's name is misspelled or contains errors.

OATH's authority for this rule is found in Section 7-551 (d) of the New York City Administrative Code and sections 1043, 1049, and 1049-a of the New York City Charter.

New text is <u>underlined</u>.

# Section 1. Subchapter F of Chapter 6 of title 48 of the Rules of the City of New York is amended by adding a new section 6-29 to read as follows:

#### § 6-29 Post Judgment Amendment of Records by the City Sheriff.

(a) The office of the city sheriff may move to correct the name of a judgment debtor in a judgment obtained in a proceeding brought pursuant to New York City Administrative Code Section 7-551 in circumstances where: (i) the name of a judgment debtor is misspelled or otherwise contains errors, or (ii) a judgment identifies a judgment debtor based entirely on the address or location at which a summons was issued pursuant to such section and the City Sheriff

wishes to include the legal name of such judgment debtor, provided that this section shall not be interpreted to give the office of the City Sheriff the authority to substitute the name of one debtor for another.

(b) The city sheriff must file a written motion pursuant to subdivision a of this section with OATH. The movant must also file an affidavit setting forth the facts and evidence relied on and an affidavit of service, by certified or registered mail and regular mail, of the motion on the judgment debtor at the judgment debtor's last known address and at the address such judgment debtor's representative provided at a hearing held pursuant to New York City Administrative Code Section 7-551. Such motion must be served on the judgment debtor and any other party. The motion must set forth the date and time of the hearing in accordance with the direction of the Office of the Chief Clerk, provided that such date and time will not be sooner than ten days after the service of such motion on the judgment debtor. At such hearing, any party may appear, with or without an attorney, cross-examine witnesses, present evidence and testify. If the judgment debtor does not appear at the hearing, the Hearing Officer may render a determination on the motion.

(c) If the Hearing Officer finds that the city sheriff has established, by a preponderance of evidence, (i) the correct legal name of the judgment debtor, (ii) that the judgment debtor is the party charged in the underlying summons and (iii) that service of the summons was properly made upon such judgment debtor, the Hearing Officer will grant such motion and issue a decision directing the amendment of the judgment to reflect the correct legal name of the judgment debtor and of all records relating to the proceedings commenced by the service of the summons or summonses, including the records of judgments filed with the civil court and in the office of the county clerk.

(d) The Hearing Officer's decision will be a final decision.

(e) An order correcting a judgment does not affect the duration of a judgment. The judgment will remain in full force and effect for eight years from the date that the judgment was originally entered.

(f) The City Sheriff may designate any agency to act on behalf of the City Sheriff in accordance with the provisions of subdivision d of section 42-04 of title 19 of the Rules of the City of New York.

**What are we proposing?** The New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene ("Department") is proposing to amend Chapter 3 ("Performance Summary Cards and Penalties for Child Care Programs") of Title 24 of the Rules of the City of New York to modify the information that will be presented on performance summary cards (PSC) issued to child care providers by the Department pursuant to Section 390-j of the New York State Social Services Law.

**When and where is the hearing**? The NYC Health Department will hold a public hearing on the proposed rules. The public hearing will take place from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. on March 27, 2025. The hearing will be conducted by video conference accessible via internet or telephone.

Can I review the comments made on the proposed amendments? You may review the comments made online at the website <u>http://rules.cityofnewyork.us/</u>. All written comments and a summary of the oral

comments received by the Department will be made available to the public within a reasonable period of time by the Department's Office of the General Counsel.

**What authorizes the Department to make these amendments?** Section 390-j of the New York State Social Services Law, as enacted by Chapter 513 of the Laws of 2016, requires the Department to adopt rules about the issuance of performance summary cards to child care programs. Sections 1043 and 556 of the New York City Charter ("Charter") give the Department the authority to make these proposed changes.

**Where can I find the Department's rules?** The rules of the Department can be found in Title 24 of the Rules of the City of New York.

**What laws govern the rulemaking process?** This notice is made according to the requirements of Charter §1043. This proposal was not included in the Department's FY2025 regulatory agenda as it is the result of recent analysis.

### **Statement of Basis and Purpose**

Social Services Law section 390-j (or "the Law") requires the Department to issue performance summary cards ("PSC(s)") to each child care program required to obtain a permit to operate in New York City and to adopt related regulations. The Law further requires that the PSC "summarize recent [health and safety] inspection violations and suspensions as required by rules promulgated by the department issuing such card." Effective January 28, 2018, the Department enacted such rules in a new Chapter 3 ("Performance Summary Cards and Penalties for Child Care Programs") of Title 24 of the Rules of the City of New York.

In December 2021, the Department amended Chapter 3 to modify the contents of the PSCs. Those amendments, which are reflected in the current rule, classified PSC violations into two categories: facility maintenance violations and program operations violations. Those amendments also distinguished violations within each category based on risk level (i.e., "Low" or "High" risk), and established display ratings (i.e., "Excellent", "Satisfactory", or "Needs Improvement") for each category of violations. The December 2021 amendments, however, provided for a level of detail in the PSC that proved unnecessary and presented complications. Specifically, the violation categories and risk levels were not easily understood by the public; the display ratings do not allow parents and caregivers to accurately compare child care facilities because such facilities are often assessed at different times; and technological constraints make implementation of Chapter 3 in its current form difficult.

Given these complications, the Department is now proposing to amend Chapter 3 to adhere to Social Services Law section 390-j in a manner that is consistent with the information displayed on the Department's Child Care Connect website. Providing consistent information on the website and PSC will help caregivers and providers assess the performance of their child care programs.

The proposed amendments are as follows:

<u>Underlined</u> language is new. Language in [brackets] is to be deleted. Ellipses (\*\*\*) indicate unamended text.

**Section 1.** Section 3-02 of chapter 3 of Title 24 of the Rules of the City of New York is amended to read as follows:

### § 3-02 Definitions.

When used in this Chapter, the following terms have the following meanings:

["Adjudicated violation" means a cited violation of the Health Code or Department rules sustained following a hearing or default, pursuant to a decision by a hearing officer at the Office of Administrative Trials and Hearings ("OATH") or pursuant to a settlement agreement between the Department and a child care program, to the extent that such decision or settlement agreement remains in effect. "Adjudicated violation" also includes cited violation for which a hearing has not been held but for which the hearing date has been rescheduled at the request of the child care program more than one time.

"Facility maintenance violation" means a violation of the Health Code or Department rules related to the physical space of the child care, reflecting an environmental hazard or other physical deficiency in the real property covered by the permit, including but not limited to a violation of requirements related to internal and external spaces, physical plant, equipment and structural maintenance, sanitation, egress, fire and general safety, lighting, ventilation, plumbing, food safety or pest control.

"**Higher risk violation**" means a violation, other than a violation of this Chapter, with a penalty amount fixed by the Health Code or Department rules at over \$200.

"**Initial inspection**" means an inspection conducted other than for the purpose of ascertaining whether a prior violation has been abated, or in response to a complaint.

"Lower risk violation" means a violation with a penalty amount fixed by the Health Code or Department rules at \$200, or a violation of this Chapter.]

"Permit" means a permit issued by the Department pursuant to Article 47 of the Health Code.

"**Permit suspension**" means a [suspension] <u>closure</u> of a child care program['s permit to operate] due to a violation of the Health Code or any rule promulgated by the Department[,other than a suspension that is subsequently vacated].

["**Program operations violation**" means a violation of the Health Code or Department rules related to permitting, written safety plan, staff qualifications, clearances, training, child supervision, child and staff health requirements, personal hygiene, child development policies, performance summary cards, records or documentation, Department inspections, or any other violation of the Health Code or Department rules that does not constitute a facility maintenance violation.]

"Site" means the location, specified in a permit, where child care services are provided.

["**Teaching staff**" means the education directors, group teachers, assistant teachers, and teacher aides of a child care program.]

**§ 2.** Subdivision b of section 3-03 of chapter 3 of Title 24 of the Rules of the City of New York is amended to read as follows:

(b) A performance summary card issued to a child care program shall include the following information, as known as of the date such card is issued:

(1) [ the number of full years the child care program has been permitted to operate at the site, except that more than 10 years of operation shall be indicated by "10+" and less than one year of operation shall be indicated by "<1";

(2) the number of children permitted to be cared for by the child care program at the site at any time;

(3) the number of teaching staff employed by the child care program at the site;

(4) the number of permit suspensions of the child care program's permit at the site during the previous three years] <u>a summary of inspection results for the 12 months preceding issuance of the card;</u> and

[(5)] (2) information on how to find the child care program's inspection record for the site online.

**§ 3.** Subdivision c of section 3-03 of chapter 3 of Title 24 of the Rules of the City of New York, relating to information from the prior year required to be included in performance summary cards, is REPEALED.

**§ 4.** Section 3-05 of chapter 3 of Title 24 of the Rules of the City of New York is amended to read as follows:

### § 3-05 Updated Performance Summary Cards.

Upon request from a child care program, [based on a change to the number of adjudicated violations for the prior calendar year that would change either of the program's ratings,] the Department shall provide such program with an updated performance summary card. The Department may also provide an updated performance summary card to reflect a new permit suspension. Updated performance summary cards shall reflect a child care program's [adjudicated] violations that were cited by the Department in the prior [calendar year] <u>12 months</u> and permit suspensions imposed in the [36] <u>12</u> months prior to the date of issuance. Upon receipt of an updated performance summary card, the child care program shall post [the] <u>such</u> updated card and dispose of the prior performance summary card in a manner that prevents its reuse.

**§ 5.** Subdivision a of section 3-06 of chapter 3 of Title 24 of the Rules of the City of New York is amended to read as follows:

(a) The holder of a permit of a child care program or any other person found to be in violation of any of the following provisions by a hearing officer at [OATH] <u>the Office of Administrative Trials and</u> <u>Hearings</u> or a successor tribunal must pay the following penalties for each such violation sustained:

(1) [For a violation of any provision of Article 47 of the Health Code for which a fixed penalty is not established by the Health Code or any other rule of the Department: \$200;

(2)] For a violation of Section 3-04(a) of this Chapter for operating without posting a performance summary card issued to the program: \$500; and

[(3)] (2) For a violation of any other requirement of this Chapter: [\$500] <u>\$200</u>.

We are pleased to announce the first phase of the full transition of the Fair Fares program to OMNY, the MTA's contactless fare payment system, following the conclusion of a successful Fair Fares pilot on OMNY between the DSS and the MTA.

The Fair Fares discount is available to New Yorkers, regardless of immigration status, between the ages of 18 and 64 whose income falls at or below 145 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). Visit the <u>Fair Fares website</u> to check for eligibility, apply online and begin saving 50 percent on subway and eligible bus fares or MTA Access-A-Ride paratransit trips.

The switch to OMNY will make it easier for working-class New Yorkers to manage their transit funds and help participants save even more with automatic fare capping, which ensures that no Fair Fares client will pay more than \$17 per week to ride the subway and eligible buses when using their Fair Fares-issued OMNY card.

During the first phase of the transition to OMNY, the Fair Fares discount will be available on Fair Fares-issued OMNY cards. All new program enrollees will receive a Fair Fares OMNY card instead of a MetroCard and will immediately be able to tap into the subway system or eligible buses after loading funds onto the card. Clients can add money to their Fair Fares OMNY card in the following ways:

- at one of the more than 470 <u>OMNY vending machines</u> installed in subway stations across the city,
- select retail locations,
- online by creating an OMNY account at <u>https://omny.info/register</u>,
- or by calling OMNY customer service at 877-789-6669.

Current Fair Fares Metrocard holders may request an OMNY card at their convenience via <u>ACCESS HRA.</u> Otherwise, they will automatically receive one when they renew their program enrollment or request a replacement card. Clients can continue to use any active Fair Fares MetroCard until they either expire, or 30 days after the OMNY card request or program enrollment renewal, whichever comes first.

In the second phase of the transition, participants will be able to apply their Fair Fares discount to preexisting OMNY cards, bank cards, or mobile devices, making it even easier and more convenient to save on transit costs.







### **RIPPING AWAY HEALTH CARE**

#### The Affordable Care Act

Thanks to the Affordable Care Act, tens of millions of Americans can afford high-quality health care. House Democrats built on the Affordable Care Act, delivering lower prices and expanding coverage.

Under the Republican budget plan, the 12,000 people who receive coverage under the Affordable Care Act in NY-07 would see their average premium go up by \$2,510 per year — a 50% increase.

Many families would face even steeper consequences. A 60-year-old couple with a household income of \$85,000 in NY-07 would see their health insurance costs increase by \$7,596 per year — a 105% increase in premiums.

#### Medicaid

Nearly 80 million Americans receive health care through Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program, which provide critical care throughout all stages of life. Medicaid covers everything from childbirth to nursing home care and everything in between.

In NY-07, the 286,768 people on Medicaid are at risk of losing their health care under Republican budget plans.

Dear CEO Christian,

We write to express our objection to Consolidated Edison's (Con Edison's) recent request to raise electric rates by 11.4% and natural gas rates by 13.3%.<sup>1</sup> While Con Edison reported higher-than-expected profits in Q3 2024, working-class New Yorkers are already struggling with extraordinary burdens due to years of high prices.<sup>2</sup> These rate hikes will only make it harder to make ends meet or, worse, lead to devastating shutoffs.

In December 2024, Con Edison's own reports show that approximately 460,000 households were behind on their utility bills for a total of \$948 million.<sup>3</sup> In 2023, the New York Public Service Commission already approved a rate hike that will see the average bill rise about 12% over three years for residential electric customers across Con Edison's service territory in New York City and Westchester county, and an estimated 20% over three years for residential gas customers in The Bronx, Manhattan and northern Queens.<sup>4</sup>

In response to inflationary pressures created by the COVID-19 pandemic and Russian invasion of Ukraine, which caused global energy prices to rise, we worked tirelessly over the past four years to pass the American Rescue Plan Act and Inflation Reduction Act. These historic investments included increased utility accessibility, affordability, and grid resilience through investments in programs such as the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), Homeowner Assistance Program (HAP), Home Electrification and Efficiency Rebates Programs, and the Department of Energy Grid Deployment Office, among others. These investments have in turn led to a decrease in inflation, interest rates, and energy costs.<sup>5</sup> Hiking rates now is inconsistent with the recovery we have worked so hard to achieve.

### Velázquez Rallies Community to Stop Republican Cuts to Vital NYC Health Centers

January 30, 2025 Press Release

BROOKLYN – Today, Congresswoman Nydia M. Velázquez (D-NY) joined local elected officials, community leaders, and health care workers at Community Healthcare Network (CHN) – Williamsburg to highlight the devastating impact a Republican funding freeze would have on the health and well-being of New Yorkers.

"Community health centers are a lifeline for millions of families in New York and across the country. But this week, Republicans put that care at risk by freezing federal grants, creating chaos and forcing some health centers to consider shutting down," said **Congresswoman Velázquez**. "And it doesn't stop there, this Republican scheme would have gutted Medicaid, pushed children out of Head Start, and slashed funding for first responders. Democrats won't stand by while working families suffer just so the ultra-wealthy can get another handout."

Earlier this week, the Trump administration threw the community health center system into chaos by freezing all federal assistance. On Wednesday, the OMB reversed the freeze on government grants and loans, but White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt later stated that Trump's Executive Orders on federal funding remain in place. This has only added to the confusion, leaving service providers nationwide uncertain about the future of their funding. Community health centers are a vital part of New York's healthcare safety net, providing primary care, behavioral health services, and dental and vision care to 2.3 million patients. More than half of them rely on Medicaid. Nationwide, these centers serve over 32 million Americans each year, nearly one in ten people, ensuring access to essential care for millions of families.

At the press conference, speakers welcomed the defeat of the funding freeze and pledged to fight against any future attempts to take away resources meant for hardworking Americans.

"The American people stood up. Democrats fought back. And in the end, Republicans backed down," said **Congresswoman Velázquez**. "But this was just round one. We will keep standing up in Congress, in the courts, and in our communities to protect the services New Yorkers rely on."

Freezing funding for community health centers isn't just a budget cut—it's a direct attack on the important care millions depend on. When these lifelines are at risk, it's the everyday working families who suffer the most, and we won't back down until their care is protected," said **Assemblywoman Maritza Davila**.

"Our CHN Williamsburg Health Center sees over 5,500 patients per year, of all different ages and needs. Some of my patients have been coming to CHN for 30 years now, holding deep trust in the care we provide. CHN is here to provide a full range of services, from primary care to behavioral health, dental, nutrition, obstetrics and gynecology and more, including supportive services for the LGBTQ+ community, like HIV treatment and transgender health services. Federal funding is critical in ensuring that these services remain accessible to those who need them most. ## Velázquez blasts Trump, Musk, and 'unfit agency heads' in powerful speech at Sunnyside

U.S. Rep. Nydia Velázquez delivered a powerful message at Sunnyside Community Services on Saturday, accusing President Donald Trump of "preying upon the most vulnerable" in society.

Speaking at the ceremonial inauguration of Assembly Member Claire Valdez, Velázquez urged New Yorkers to "fight back" against the Trump administration and called on the state legislature to shield the state from the harmful policies emerging from Washington.

Velázquez described Trump as "shameful" for targeting minority groups, alleging that the President is specifically targeting vulnerable groups to distract people from "the real issues."

She accused Trump of selecting people who are unfit to lead government agencies, contending that the main requirement to head a government agency under the Trump Administration is to not believe in the mission of that agency.

"They don't believe in climate change. They don't believe that working people deserve an increase in the minimum wage," Velázquez said during Saturday's speech.

Lee Zeldin, Trump's pick to head the Environmental Protection Agency, often voted against environmental legislation while serving in Congress and pledged to reverse New York's ban on fracking during an unsuccessful run for Governor in 2022. Zeldin, however, who was confirmed by the Senate last week, did state that he believes climate change is real, stating that he has a moral responsibility to be a good steward of the environment. Velázquez additionally accused Trump of distracting the public from the fact that Elon Musk is now the "shadow President" of the United States.

"Everything that the President is doing is just to distract us from the fact that Elon Musk is holding the string of the President and other federal agencies," Velázquez said.

Musk, who heads the newly created Department of Government Efficiency, has drawn strong criticism for his efforts to shut down the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), which administers billions of dollars of humanitarian, development, and security assistance in more than 100 countries worldwide.

Musk announced the closure of USAID early Monday, earning a strong rebuke from Democrats, who described the move as illegal and vowed to fight the closure in the courts. Several Democrats also contended that Musk wields too much power in the Trump Administration.

Democrats also responded angrily to reports that the Trump Administration has granted staff affiliated with Musk to the federal system that handles trillions of dollars in payments. The Treasury payments system, which disperses Social Security and Medicare, is run by non-political staff and is also responsible for paying out grants and payments to government contractors, some of whom compete with Musk-owned companies.

Velázquez called for Democrats to be "courageous" in the face of the Trump Administration and "instill a faith" in voters so they don't "jump to the other side".





### Ranking Member Velázquez Applauds Committee Passage of Seven Bipartisan Small Business Bills

WASHINGTON- Today, the House Small Business Committee passed seven bipartisan bills aimed at expanding opportunities for small businesses, improving federal contracting transparency, helping entrepreneurs with disabilities, and strengthening workforce pipelines to support entrepreneurs and workers.

"These bills address critical gaps in SBA programs to ensure small firms have a fair shot at federal contracts, access to skilled workers, and the resources they need to grow," said **Ranking Member Nydia M. Velázquez (D-NY)**. "From increasing transparency in government procurement to better supporting entrepreneurs with disabilities and women-owned businesses, these bills will help level the playing field for Main Street businesses across America."

#### H.R. 1642 – Connecting Small Businesses with Career and Technical Education Graduates Act

Introduced by Reps. Roger Williams (R-TX), Johnny Olszewski (D-MD), Robert Bresnahan (R-PA), Derek Tran (D-CA), and Tony Wied (R-WI)

This bill directs Small Business Development Centers (SBDCs) and Women's Business Centers (WBCs) to provide small businesses with information about hiring graduates from career and technical education (CTE) programs.

<u>H.R. 789 – Transparency and Predictability in Small Business Opportunities Act</u> Introduced by Reps. George Latimer (D-NY) and Mark Alford (R-MO)

This bill would require the Small Business Administrator to issue regulations addressing cancelled solicitations for small business contracts to provide for the disclosure of additional information; and to require Offices of Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization to help small businesses seek additional opportunities if a solicitation on which they made an offer is canceled.

#### H.R. 787 – Plain Language in Contracting Act

Introduced by Reps. Nick LaLota (R-NY) and Derek Tran (D-CA)

Requires federal procurement documents on <u>SAM.gov</u> to be written in clear, concise language to make it easier for small businesses to compete for contracts.

#### H.R. 1621 – Entrepreneurs with Disabilities Reporting Act of 2025

Introduced by Reps. Morgan McGarvey (D-KY) and Pete Stauber (R-MN)

Mandates the SBA to submit a report to Congress on the challenges entrepreneurs with disabilities face and recommend legislative solutions.

#### H.R. 1634 – ThinkDIFFERENTLY About Disability Employment Act

Introduced by Reps. Pete Stauber (R-MN), Lateefah Simon (D-CA), and Chris Pappas (D-NH)

Requires the SBA to collaborate with the National Council on Disability to increase employment and entrepreneurial opportunities for individuals with disabilities.

#### H.R. 1816 - WOSB Accountability Act

Introduced by Ranking Member Nydia Velázquez (D-NY) and Rep. Nick LaLota (R-TX)

Ensures federal agencies only count contracts awarded to SBA-certified women-owned small businesses toward their procurement goals, strengthening accountability and expanding opportunities for women entrepreneurs.

#### H.R. 1804 - 7(a) Loan Agent Oversight Act

Introduced by Reps. Daniel Meuser (R-PA) and LaMonica McIver (D-NJ)

Requires the SBA's Office of Credit Risk Management to submit annual reports to Congress on loan agent activity in the 7(a) loan program, enhancing oversight and reducing fraud risk.
