

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



The Committee met on the evening of December 1, 2025, at 6:00 PM at Swinging Sixties Senior Center, 211 Ainslie Street (Corner of Manhattan Avenue), Brooklyn, NY 11211.

Nine members constitute a quorum for this committee, a quorum was achieved.

#### **AGENDA:**

1. PRESENTATION NYC DEPARTMENT OF CITY PLANNING ABOUT NYC INDUSTRIAL PLAN DRAFT REPORT: The Department of City Planning, Small Business Services, and the Economic Development Corporation released the NYC Industrial Plan draft report, a major step toward establishing a comprehensive framework to support the growth and success of a modern, sustainable industrial economy with good-paying jobs. A full version of the draft plan, an accompanying Industrial Plan Explorer with interactive data, and a digital opportunity for feedback. Presenter: Senior Borough Planner, Lucia Marquez Reagan.

Andrew Jones presented. We were pleased that he was joined by Alex Sommer, Kerensa Wood, and Lucia Marquez Reagan.

The presenters explained that they have looked at our district's industrial use, considering factors such as jobs and on-the-ground building/land uses. They presented a map that divides areas into primary (suitable only for industry), secondary (suitable for industry/manufacturing and commercial), and "other" (possibly suitable for mixed or residential use). Where 50% or more of the land use is industrial, the area is a candidate for primary or secondary categorization.

The presenters confirmed that the data shows our North Brooklyn IBZ is still providing commercial, industrial and local service jobs, although not evenly distributed. The largest categories of these jobs are in construction, freight transportation, and film and motion picture production. These are still showing signs of growth.

They stated, however, that the data shows that our more southern IBZ (Greenpoint/Williamsburg IBZ) is showing a residential presence, and what appears to be a declining concentration of industrial jobs. They conceded that some residential presence is through loft law conversion, started in the presence of heavy industry.

The board's concerns, expressed at our last full board meeting, centered on the categorization as "other" of much of our two IBZ 's. Many board and committee members felt that the map and data do not accurately show the real jobs, businesses, and changes on the neighborhood level in our IBZ's. Furthermore, we suggested that with the encroaching residential development, good urban planning should allow and encourage growth of industries which support the construction and environmental needs of the new residential development. The committee pointed out that the land in these IBZ's is already suitable for such use, and our district has many industry-friendly assets, such as bridges, truck and maritime routes. Therefore, it makes sense to preserve these sites either in the primary or secondary categories, at least until the data being compiled by DCP and by Evergreen is complete. Finally, there is a serious concern about price speculation if there is an indication that these areas could turn residential.

The presenters advised us that they are willing to work with Evergreen and to consider the results of the research that it is funding.

#### 2. Recommendation:

The following motion was made:

- 1. In the North Brooklyn IBZ, the areas classified as "other" be classified as secondary.
- 2. In the Greenpoint/Williamsburg IBZ, the areas classified as "other" be classified as secondary, subject to change as a result of the Evergreen research project.
- 3. We support the other goals stated by the city, such as innovating green technologies, supporting modern and efficient freight movement, promoting clean and safe industrial spaces, improving the public realm, and adding zoning tools to enable expansion and growth of industry and manufacturing.















NYC has the largest reservoir of urban industrial land in the country, but our industrial stock is old. New construction is expensive and difficult, leading to competition between uses. Businesses want to invest in NYC, but the lack of affordable space is a headwind.

# What's going on?

- NYC has over 227M square feet of industrial space
- Most industrial buildings are small, but most industrial space is within large buildings
- Industrial rents are generally lower than other kinds of space in same areas
- Rents are rising, especially for newer space
- Restrictive and outdated zoning laws have made it more difficult to build new industrial space
- Many essential municipal service operations are concentrated in industrial areas
- Industrial jobs are shifting to outer boroughs
- Some industrial uses cannot safely locate near to non-industrial users

Nine members constitute a quorum for this committee, a quorum was achieved.

#### **AGENDA:**

1. PRESENTATION PROJECT LPC-26-01803 - LANDMARKED BUILDING AT 144

GREENPOINT AVENUE: This is a Land Use application. The project is a completely new design to the previously approved commercial project at this location. The project has new ownership and is now a multifamily residential project with 55 dwelling units, 20% of which will be affordable. The intent of the design is a standalone building, with a brick façade and regular cadence of windows recalling the historic tenement housing along Greenpoint avenue. Street wall height will be similar to the existing residential street wall on the avenue, and a projecting cornice will reduce sightlines of the set back upper floors. On a volumetric basis the proposed residential building is 30% smaller at 257,008 cubic feet from the previously approved commercial project which was 366,564 cubic feet. Our floor area has increased from the previously approved with the conversion and change to residential zoning but is still about 15% less than the allowable on the site. With the planned residential use the building will have 5 floors on the street facing part of the building versus 4 in the commercial use plan. The lot coverage is also reduced with our full open rear yard to improve the interior of the block. Presentation by Building Studio Architect, John Field, AIA.

The applicant made their hearing presentation during the combined hearing and board meeting on November 18, 2025.

What is striking about this new design is its stark contrast from the previous one (see the attached presentation file to view the comparison) which had a light gray facade and intricate ornamental window frame details. The committee approved the previous design.

At the preview presentation given to the subcommittee on October 16, 2025. The prevailing feedback provided by members was that this current design was too far removed from the historic district design context, especially referring to Italianate and other classic style buildings on both sides of Greenpoint Avenue. The consensus recommendation was for the applicant and their designer to take note of the prevalent use of arched lintels and windows on this block, and apply it to the window treatment at 144 Greenpoint Avenue. Additionally, they suggested more detail be incorporated into the window design, referencing the previous commercial building design plan which was well regarded by the subcommittee previously.

Project architect John Field revealed a significant revision to their current design. Arched stepped brick surrounds were added to the window design, and as well as alternating patterns of venting windows and fixed glass. Subcommittee members almost unanimously lauded these revisions. He also mentioned that the parapet and roof design could be adjusted and improved. Changes to the cornice and the addition of diamond shaped metallic tile at the top of the building were spoken to, as well.

Though not relevant to this landmarks application, at the full board hearing in October Mr. Field was asked about the affordable housing make up. At the subcommittee meeting he provided details. The building via the 485-x housing program will contain 20% affordable apartment units at 80% of AMI. Maximum rent for a studio is \$2,228 and for a one-bedroom \$2,430.

2. Motion by William Vega to Recommend the Board Approve the Design for Project LPC-26-01803 - Landmarked Building at 144 Greenpoint Avenue: Seconded by Matthew Isaacs

#### Dear Vice Chair Master:

At the regular meeting of Brooklyn Community Board No. 1 on the evening of December 9, 2025, and based on a recommendation from its Landmarks Subcommittee (Report Attached), the board members voted unanimously to approve sending this letter.

Community Board 1 has approved the design for Project Docket LPC-26-01803 concerning the landmarked property at 144 Greenpoint Avenue.

Below is the discussion of the Landmarks Subcommittee that led to the committee's recommendation to the Full Board to approve the project, resulting in the Full Board's approval:

The applicant presented the proposal during the combined hearing and board meeting held on November 18, 2025. One of the primary observations noted was the significant departure of the revised design from the earlier version. The previous proposal, which featured a light gray façade with ornamental window framing, had been approved by the committee.

At the preview presentation before the subcommittee on October 16, 2025, members expressed concerns that the new design did not reflect the architectural character of the surrounding

historic district. They pointed specifically to the Italianate and other traditional architectural styles along Greenpoint Avenue. The subcommittee recommended that the applicant and architect incorporate the prominent use of arched lintels and window forms found on the block into the redesign for 144 Greenpoint Avenue. Members also suggested adding further window detailing, referencing the earlier commercial design that the subcommittee had previously regarded favorably.

Project architect John Field subsequently presented notable revisions to the design. These updates included the addition of arched, stepped brick window surrounds and an alternating arrangement of venting windows and fixed glass panels. Subcommittee members expressed near-unanimous support for these changes. Mr. Field also indicated that further refinements to the parapet and roof could be made, and he discussed proposed adjustments to the cornice and the inclusion of diamond-shaped metallic tiles near the top of the building.

Although not directly related to the landmarks review, Mr. Field had been asked at the October full board meeting about the project's affordable housing component. At the subcommittee meeting, he clarified that, under the 485-x housing program, 20 percent of the building's units will be designated as affordable.

The vote was as follows: 36 "YES"; 0 "NO"; 0 "ABSTENTIONS"; 0 "RECUSAL"

#### **AGENDA:**

#### 1. Metropolitan Pool Closure:

Committee members discussed the Metropolitan Pool's closure and the need for 10 hours of women-only swim time. The Parks and Recreation Department approved \$3 million for pool repairs but lacks a schedule. The community board sent a letter seeking details on the pool's closure and reopening.

#### 2. North Brooklyn Sexual Assault Task Force:

The meeting focused on community activism and discussion on the formation of the North Brooklyn Sexual Assault Task Force. Senator Kristen Gonzalez highlighted her legislative achievements, such as bills on ovarian cancer screenings, menstrual product safety, and hospital closures. She emphasized the importance of data-driven approaches to address healthcare deserts and reproductive rights. The meeting also touched on the need for better data on gender demographics and the role of not-for-profits in community support. The members shared their concerns about the use of data and the need for better privacy protections. The group proposed legislation for a statewide program providing free transportation for sexual assault victims and amending the Safeway Home Act. It was also discussed the need for a joint meeting with privatized public housing groups to address common issues and the implementation and evaluation of a proclamation, with a focus on the need for monitoring and task force involvement. The next meeting of the North Brooklyn Sexual Assault Task Force is scheduled for January 8, 2026.

The community board discussed affordable housing and mobility issues affecting women. The conversation touched on the challenges of navigating the city and the need for better transportation options. Members shared their personal experiences and the impact of these issues on their daily lives. The discussion emphasized the importance of addressing these challenges to improve the quality of life for women.

Members discussed the healthcare crisis and the impact on women's health. The conversation covered the importance of access to reproductive health services and the challenges faced by hospitals. Senator Gonzalez shared her legislative efforts to protect

reproductive health and access to information. The members expressed their concerns and the need for better data and policies to address these issues. Members discussed the importance of data privacy and the impact of technology on women's lives. Senator Gonzalez discussed her efforts to protect private health data and the challenges posed by data brokers.

Dear Council Member Restler,

At its regular meeting on December 11, 2025, Brooklyn Community Board No. 1 voted to send this letter, based on a recommendation from its Joint Women's Issues and Public Safety & Human Services Committees.

Brooklyn Community Board 1 respectfully requests your support, along with that of other elected officials, in formally asking NYC Parks Commissioner Martin Maher or Chief of Recreation Eileen M. Dalton to attend a meeting with the Board. The purpose of this meeting is to address the continued closure of the Metropolitan Pool, located at 261 Bedford Avenue, and to provide a clear, definitive, and publicly stated timeline for its reopening.

The Board wishes to note that it has made multiple attempts to invite Metropolitan Recreation Center leadership to attend a meeting to discuss these concerns. Those requests have been declined, and the Board was instead directed to rely on a previously released statement issued by Commissioner Martin Maher regarding the Metropolitan Pool closure. This response has left the Board and the community without meaningful engagement, direct communication, or transparency.

Given the significant community impact of this prolonged closure, the Board strongly believes that NYC Parks should engage in person with the community, provide clear and updated information, and respond directly to residents' concerns. Our community deserves the opportunity for open dialogue and accountability, rather than being referred solely to written statements.

The continued closure of the Metropolitan Pool has had a substantial impact on residents, particularly seniors, families, and women who rely on this facility for recreation, health, and wellness.

Given the Board's unsuccessful efforts to engage local Parks leadership, the Board believes that the direct involvement of the Parks Commissioner Martin Maher and the Chief of Recreation Eileen M. Dalton, with the support of you and other elected officials, is now necessary to ensure transparency, accountability, and meaningful progress on this long-standing issue.

Thank you for your continued advocacy and support of the Williamsburg and Greenpoint communities.



### Three arms of the VA

## Veterans Health Administration (VHA)

Focuses on providing healthcare services to veterans, including medical, surgical, and mental health care, as well as rehabilitative and preventative services.

## Benefits Administration (VBA)

Responsible for administering a wide range of benefits to eligible veterans, including disability compensation, pensions, education assistance (like the GI Bill), home loan guarantees, and life insurance.

## National Cemetery Administration (NCA)

Administers the VA's national cemeteries, providing burial benefits and maintaining burial spaces for veterans and eligible family members.

# **Disability Compensation**

- In Service event
- A chronic, current diagnosed condition
- Link between in service event and the current condition

"Your current disabling condition was at least as likely as not caused or worsened by your military service."

# **Disability Compensation**

- Presumptive Claim (Agent Orange, Gulf War, ALS, etc.)
- Direct Service connection (Injury occurred and documented on Active Duty)
- Secondary Conditions (Service-connected condition causes something else)
- Aggravation Claim (Aggravated beyond natural progression)
- 1151 (medical malpractice by VA; NOT a Tort)

## **VA Pension NSC Pension**

- Wartime Service + Low Income and Net Worth (MAPR/Assets)
- You're at least 65 years old, or
- You have a permanent and total disability, or
- You're a patient in a nursing home for long-term care because of a disability, or
- You're getting Social Security Disability Insurance or Supplemental Security Income

## **NY State Benefits**

- The New York State Restoration of Honor Act
- Blind annuity
- Veterans Emergency Housing Program



## The New York State Restoration of Honor Act

- Authorizes NYS DVS to restore State Veterans Benefits to Veterans who have an other-than-honorable (OTH), a General (Under Honorable Conditions) (GUH), or Uncharacterized (UC) character of service due to Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), Military Sexual Trauma (MST), Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity or Gender Expression.
- Does not change a Veteran's official federally issued character of discharge.
- Considers only the Veteran's time in service, not conduct after service.



# **Blind Annuity**

- For legally blind (20/200 vision in the better eye with best correction, or has 20- degree limitation of field of vision) wartime Veterans, or surviving un-remarried spouses of legally blind wartime Veterans, who live in New York State.
- Blindness need not be a service-connected disability.
- 90 days active duty for other than training purposes or is service connected

# Veterans Emergency Housing Program

- Up to \$2,000 annually
- Assists New York State's Veterans who are confronting emergency housing needs and lacking the funds to cover these immediate costs.
- Must be a Veteran living in New York State and facing an immediate housing hardship.
- Must also have a personal net worth equal to or below the net worth limit established by the VA to assess eligibility for a NSC pension.

#### **AGENDA**

1. NYC DOT: New Revocable Consent to construct, maintain and use an accessible ramp with steps at 370 Marcy Ave, Block 2236, Lot 9, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Presentation by Mr. Dean Hartofilis, NYC DOT

Ms. Sabine Van Riel from NYC SCA, Mr. David Riedel and Mr. Ivan Himanen from AECOM provided information about a project to construct ADA accessible ramps for the school bordered by Lee, Marcy, Middleton, and Lynch. (Presentation attached).

Chair Bruzaitis noted the absence of Mr. Dean Hartofilis of NYC DOT and expressed his disappointment that no representative from DOT was present for the discussion.

The ramp on Lynch will encroach onto the sidewalk right of way, however the wide sidewalk at this location should not impede pedestrian flow.

Committee members discussed the width of the sidewalk, the timeline, and the budget for the project, as well as the possible impacts on the bus queuing area. The committee noted that the existence of an empty tree pit should be removed to ensure that there are no obstructions or hazards during heavy pedestrian volume both during drop off and dismissal.

MOTION (Mr. Pferd): Approve the installation of an ADA ramp and stairs at 370 Marcy as presented, with the recommendation that consult NYC DOT with the NYC Parks Department to relocate or remove the tree pit which narrows the sidewalk near the proposed ramp.

SECOND: Ms. LaBorde.

MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITHOUT ABSTENTIONS WITH TWO NON-BOARD MEMBERS VOTING AYE.

2. Newtown Creek Street Ends – Discussion of how to improve 4 street-end areas along Newtown Creek in CB1: Apollo Street End, Meeker Avenue Street End, Maspeth Avenue Street End, Metropolitan Avenue Bridge (near Varick Ave). NCA seeks to use existing DOT tools to improve accessibility, increase safety, and environmentally enhance public shoreline sites.

Presentation by Mr. Willis Elkins of Newtown Creek Alliance

Willis Elkins, ED of the Newtown Creek Alliance presented proposed redesigns for the street ends at Apollo, Meeker, Metropolitan, and Maspeth where they meet the Newtown Creek. These interventions would provide public space, safety enhancements, and waterfront access points to the Newtown Creek. (Presentation attached).

Committee engaged in a broad discussion of the need for improvements at these locations for both safety reasons and to expand the public's access to the waterfront as NCA continues to work on improvements to the Newtown Creek.

There is support from other Community Boards which borders the creek, and NCA seeks formal support from BK01.

Former BK01 Transportation Cmte Chair Ms. Karen Nieves voiced her strong support for the proposal and thanked Mr. Elkins and his team for all their hard work and dedication.

MOTION (Ms. Espinal): Community Board 1 to draft a letter to NYC DOT and NYC EDC in support of the Newtown Creek Alliance's proposal to improve safety and public access at the following street-end boarders of the Newtown Creek: Apollo Street; Meeker Avenue; Maspeth Avenue; Metropolitan Avenue Bridge (near Varick Avenue).

SECOND: Mr. Weiser.

MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITHOUT ABSTENTIONS WITH TWO NON-BOARD MEMBERS VOTING AYE.

3. <u>Discussion: Greenpoint Avenue Safety Improvements Report on Transportation Committee Walkthrough.</u> A recap of the October 30th Transportation Committee presentation on Greenpoint Avenue Safety Concerns.

Ms. LaBorde provided a recap of the committee walkthrough of Greenpoint Avenue following the October 30<sup>th</sup> Transportation Cmte meeting. (Presentation attached).

The committee discussed conditions of concern, many long standing issues that should be addressed by NYC DOT to improve both safety and clear pathfinding for all road users.

MOTION (Mr. Kelterborn): Community Board 1 to draft a letter to NYC DOT requesting a comprehensive safety redesign of Greenpoint Avenue from Transmitter Park to the Greenpoint Avenue Bridge.

SECOND: Mr. Vega.

District Manager Pulgarin confirmed that no complaints have been received for this business.

MOTION (Ms. Espinal): Community Board 1 to draft a letter of no objection to NYC TLC for the BASE License Renewal #B01492, Mobile #1 Car Service, 361 Union Avenue, Brooklyn, NY 11211.

SECOND: Mr. Weiser.

MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITHOUT ABSTENTIONS WITH TWO NON-BOARD MEMBERS VOTING AYE.

#### 5. <u>Discussion: MTA Bus Reroute from Wallabout Street to Flushing Avenue.</u> Mr. Anthony Drummond, MTA/NYCTA

Mr. Anthony Drummond from MTA/NYCTA explained why the B48 rerouting has been delayed due to the ongoing redesign of the Brooklyn Bus Map. He noted that the new draft plan is expected to be released in March 2026. Following the release will be outreach, two years of public comment, issuance of a revised plan, and finally implementation in 2029. Mr. Drummond agreed to organize a walkthrough with interested members of the committee to review and discuss issues with the bus routes.

Committee members discussed Mr. Weiser's proposal to move the B48 from Wallabout to Flushing Avenue due to congestion on Wallabout. There were questions about how such an alteration might impact the existing bus routes on Flushing Avenue. Many committee members felt that a walkthrough should be completed before making any decision, along with a better understanding of how the larger bus network might be impacted.

MOTION (Mr. Weiser): Community Board 1 to draft a letter to MTA and NYC DOT requesting that the B48 Bus be rerouted from Wallabout Street to Flushing Avenue as approved in 2015 by MTA, regardless of it condition that Wallabout be converted to one-way traffic.

SECOND: Ms. Espinal.

AYE: Mr. Bruzaitis; Ms. Espinal; Mr. Weiser; Mr. Radezky\*.

NAY: Mr. Kelterborn; Ms. Drinkwater; Ms. LaBorde; Mr. Pferd; Mr. Vega; Ms. Breitner\*.

#### 6. Old Business

Bushwick Place Safety Measures: Chair Bruzaitis informed the committee that the DOT will be evaluating this intersection.

Chair Bruzaitis informed the committee that a traffic signal was approved for Kent Avenue and North 4th Street. Chair Bruzaitis commended the efforts of Mr. Keith Barger who had lobbied tirelessly for this stop control for years and expressed his support for DOT's decision.

Ms. Breitner proposed sending a letter to the DOT to ask for metrics about how safety has been impacted by the McGuinness redesign which has been in effect for a full year. Committee will revisit this item at the January meeting, anticipating a new DOT Commissioner.

DOT Representation at the CB1 Transportation Committee Meetings: The committee expressed alarm about the lack of DOT representation at committee meetings and new roadblocks being put up which could impact the Committee's ability to have an active communication channel with the DOT.

MOTION (Mr. Vega): Community Board 1 to draft a letter to Brooklyn Borough Commissioner Bray requesting the new BK01 DOT Representative Maria Cruz or a substitute attend Transportation Committee regularly, and for any presentations involving DOT oversight.

SECOND: Ms. LaBorde.

MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY WITHOUT ABSTENTIONS WITH TWO NON-BOARD MEMBERS VOTING AYE.

Ms. LaBorde requested an update from DOT on Morgan Avenue, as it has been recently identified as the least safe corridor in NYC.

Member of the public Mr. John Rozmus requested that plaza spaces like Bedford Slip get extra attention from NYC Sanitation to keep them clean and cared for. He also wished the committee and attendees Happy Holidays.

#### 7. New Business

Ms. Laborde and Mr. Pferd alerted the committee to traffic fatalities that occurred at North 3rd Street and Union Avenue on March 24, 2025, and Union Ave near Grand on July 12<sup>th</sup>.

Member of the public Mr. Kevin LaCherra raised the possibility of redesigning Calyer Triangle. This topic will be discussed further at a future date.


### Why Street-Ends?

Of the 11 miles of shoreline along Newtown Creek, less than 8% are official waterfront access points or open space areas.

Numerous city-owned streets that dead-end along the Creek present the best opportunities to further **reconnect the communities to the waterway**, while also addressing long standing issues of illegal dumping and private occupation of public space.

Investing in Newtown Creek Street-Ends has been identified as a priority in various planning efforts:

Newtown Creek Brownfield Opportunity Area, 2012 Newtown Creek Vision Plan, NCA & Riverkeeper 2017 NYC Comprehensive Waterfront Plan, NYC Planning 2021 Activating New York City-Owned Waterfront Sites for Recreation and Access, Waterfront Alliance 2022



The Waterfront Public Access Study (2021) shows significant areas of 'No Public Access' for the vast majority of Newtown Creek.

### Community Demographics

Street End improvements benefit a diverse makeup of local stakeholders, including workers, residents, and students.

The total workforce in the surrounding Industrial Business Zones (IBZ) is as follows:

- Long Island City IBZ: **28,500 workers**
- Maspeth IBZ: **16,000 workers**
- North Brooklyn IBZ: **19,500 workers**

There are **8 neighborhoods** that border the Creek: Greenpoint, East Williamsburg, Bushwick, Ridgewood, Maspeth, Blissville, Sunnyside, Long Island City. The total population within a one-mile radius of Newtown Creek is estimated to be approximately **380,000**.

Within 1 mile of the Creek there are **103 K-12 schools** (64 public, 39 private) and one public university (LaGuardia Community College). **In total, over 65,000 students.** 





#### NCA Stewardship

Since 2013, Newtown Creek Alliance (NCA) has stewarded a number of key street-ends, working to transform them from areas of neglect and illegal dumping to valuable open spaces and community amenities.

At street-end sites over the past 9 years (2017 to 2025) NCA has:

- Hosted **49 public cleanup events**
- Engaged **1,014 volunteers**
- Removed over **58,300 lbs of trash**

In 2019, we entered into an MOU with NYC DOT, allowing us to conduct cleanups, light landscaping, and install DOT approved planters at pre approved locations (Greenpoint Avenue, pictured right).







### Apollo Street (Greenpoint): Background

Site is located 2 blocks from residential Greenpoint.

Persistent issues of illegal dumping (onto the street and into the Creek directly).

Significant stormwater runoff from Norman Ave washes pollution directly into the Creek.

Unregulated parking at street-end has led to long-term parking, RV use, and abandoned cars - all of which prohibit access to the waterway, and make maintenance/cleanup challenging.

NCA has been actively cleaning the space since 2017 and worked closely with DSNY on multiple large cleanup events.



The effort was initiated by councilmember Lincoln Restler, with the installation supported by North Brooklyn Parks Alliance.






#### **Apollo Street End Planning**

The proposed redesign explores the possibility of providing creek side access for all. The bulkhead is collapsing and access is limited and hazardous. NCA is hoping to test opportunities that allow for safe gathering, educational experiences and viewshed enhancement.

### Meeker Avenue (Greenpoint): Background

The former abutment of the Penny Bridge, the area has significant open space and tree canopy with an elevated overlook of the Creek.

Significant stormwater runoff from Meeker washes pollution directly into the Creek.

Parking in front of ExxonMobil shed is unregulated and inhibits easy access to the waterfront.

NCA has been actively cleaning the space since 2017 and worked closely with DSNY on multiple large cleanup events.









### Meeker Avenue (Greenpoint): Non-Capital Vision



- Use planters/stones to create plaza space near the waterfront.
- Create safer pedestrian crossings at Meeker and Gardner.
- Maintain egress for Island Transportation and Empire Merchants.

### Meeker Avenue (Greenpoint): Fall 2025 Work

In October ExxonMobil completed a full removal of their shed, relocating groundwater utilities underground.

This has created significant new open space on the road bed, an immediate safety concern to prevent a car crash into Newtown Creek, and opportunity for planters and public amenities.





### Maspeth Ave (E Williamsburg): Background

Closest waterway access to Cooper Park/Cooper Park houses.

End of very long industrial block, with very wide roadbed, but lack of sidewalk towards the Creek.

The street end offers a small but protected overlook of the waterway.


Significant storage of private vehicles (concrete trucks) and materials (i-beams) on the roadbed currently prevents access to the shoreline area.



I am offering this letter in support of the <u>Newtown Creek Alliance (NCA) proposal</u> to transform key public street ends along Newtown Creek in District 33, specifically the ends of Apollo Street and Meeker Avenue in Greenpoint.

NCA has been stewarding these two public sites for nearly a decade, removing literal tons of dumped debris and working on a consistent basis to transform them from overgrown, uninviting areas to inviting, safe and ecologically productive public spaces. These sites face severe, chronic dumping; during a recent community cleanup, I helped remove a water heater, several pallets, a bicycle, and half a dozen bags of litter from Apollo Street. Issues persist at both locations relating to pedestrian safety, unregulated parking, long-term storage of vehicles (including RVs), and pollution going directly into the waterway.

Safe and inviting public access is essential not just for the value of connecting our communities to their local waterways, but also as an opportunity to create green features that can protect our communities from increasing extreme heat and re-introduce native features into the harsh built environments within the Industrial Business Zones. Enhancing the public domain is a crucial element for improving the safety and lives of those who work in, commute through, and live nearby these areas.

- + Management/ownership transfer to NYC parks similar to the Manhattan Avenue Street End Park (pictured right).









# Why the Accessible Ramp on Lynch Street Is Necessary

- The ramp will benefit the community by providing students with disabilities access to the school through an ADA-compliant ramp.
- The school building predates ADA requirements;
   no feasible ADA-compliant entrance can be created within the existing footprint.
- To meet ADA slope requirements a wider ramp occupying a portion of the DOT sidewalk property in front of the school is necessary.
- This ramp provides equal access to the main entrance and ensures compliance with federal (ANSI 117.1) and NYC (Building Code Chapter 11) accessibility requirements.
- The Lynch Street exit needs to be accessible in order to satisfy life safety travel distance requirements in the NYC Building Code (Section 1009).




# **Existing Entrance**





# **Planned New Entrance**









 26CVCP002K - NYC Office of Environmental Remediation will discuss the School Construction Authority's (SCA) Phase II Environmental Site Investigation (ESI) Report results and their proposed Remedial Action Work Plan for the site that will address groundwater, soil and soil vapor contamination. SCA plans to construct a 6-story 450-seat elementary school on this property. It is located adjacent to the former

NuHart Plastic Factory Superfund site whose remediation was closed out in July of this year.

In attendance were Tamar Smith, Manager, External Affairs, SCA; Michael Sherwood, Industrial & Environmental Hygiene Division, HazMat Unit, SCA; Zach Schreiber, Assistant Director at New York City Department of Environmental Remediation; Christopher Rooney, Project Manager, OER. Michael Sherwood made the presentation (file attached).

The meeting discussed the progress of the new school construction for District 14, focusing on the cleanup and remediation efforts. The project, which began with community meetings last year, is currently under a 45-day public comment period until December 17. The site, which includes a hydraulic barrier installed along its northeastern perimeter to prevent former NuHart phthalates plume migration, has seen no new samples collected from monitoring wells next to the school site since the last update. The remediation plan involves excavating 5,700 tons of soil and installing a vapor barrier and sub-slab depressurization system. The school is expected to open in September 2030, with groundbreaking anticipated in spring 2027. Though the baseline requirement for this property is an e-designation cleanup program, SCA has entered into the more robust Volunteer Cleanup Program.

The NuHart Superfund site has been remediated, and product recovery is ongoing on the east side of Franklin and the north side of DuPont. The use of high vacuum extraction trucks for monthly or quarterly pumping of contaminated wells located in the sidewalk adjacent to the school site.

The site's soil and groundwater samples were analyzed, showing no exceedances of VOCs, metals, or PCBs, except for a small amount of PFAs. PFAs do not volatilize. Its only pathway is through ingestion of groundwater which would be impossible here. There is historic fill material on the site which is a main source of contamination, and will be excavated during construction. An underground storage tank identified on the fire insurance maps is confirmed to be present, and it will be dealt with during construction. The remedial action work plan includes a minimum of a four-foot excavation across the site, with deeper excavations in hot spots.

There was an inquiry about the building's footprint and the potential impact on the site's design in relation to the contamination. The building design is still a work in progress. However, no portion of the building will be constructed below grade except for elevator pits.

A vapor barrier and sub-slab depressurization system (SSDS) to mitigate any vapors will be installed. This system includes fans that pull vapors from the subsurface and discharge them to ambient air, with an alarm indication station in the custodian's office.

The committee reiterated their concern expressed in their comments last year to SCA, about flooding from storm surges, increasingly intense rain events and swelling groundwater, all increasing factors as a result of worsening climate change.

Concerns we raised about the impact of construction on Greenpoint Playground located across the street from the school site and new residents in the area. SCA made assurances that dust suppression using water and onsite truck washing will be implemented to minimize environmental impact. It was also noted that severe ponding occurs frequently at the playground. A concern expressed was that water used on the construction site would mix with the playground water. Also, the issue of the large volume of trucks that will be needed, which SCA acknowledged, for excavating the fill and hauling new back fill. Confirmation was stated by SCA that the truck routes for staging, and approaching and leaving the site enroute to the land fill site detailed in the Remedial Action Work Plan will be followed. Additionally, trucks will be hosed off onsite on top of a gravel layer that will absorb water. Part of the remediation is a Community Air Monitoring Plan (CAMP). If odors are noticed onsite or dust is seen moving offsite, either item will trigger work stoppage and the immediate implementation of mitigating measures.

The committee asked OER and SCA about the potential for the mitigation system to be disabled and staff training on managing it. This question came fresh off the situation at 83 Apollo whereby vapor was detected indoors after staff there disabled the system there. Both Mr. Schieber and Mr. Sherwood gave assurances that this would not occur at the school site. SCA has extensive experience managing mitigation systems at about 100 sites, and have spare parts and machinery in the event there is a failure.

The community expresses appreciation for the detailed information and assurances provided by the School Construction Authority and OER.

Committee members suggested submitting a comment to OER, including concerns about dust mitigation and water control, truck routes and staging, and the impact on the playground.

A motion was made to recommend the board submit a comment to SCA and OER regarding the Volunteer Cleanup Program Remedial Action Work Plan for 257 Franklin Street urging SCA perform due diligence and beyond regarding dust mitigation, water control, adherence to stated truck routes and safe staging requirements, and monitoring the impact on Greenpoint Playground.

#### 2. 287 Maspeth Ave National Grid Greenpoint Energy Center Updates –

 Remediation status (as it relates to Newtown Creek and Meeker Ave Plume Superfund sites) 2. Saltwater pump house replacement (as it relates to Newtown Creek Superfund site)

Committee Chair Steve Chesler, who is a member of both the Newtown Creek and Meeker Avenue Plume Superfund CAGs, provided a summary of the presentations (files attached) given at a recent meeting of the Newtown Creek Superfund CAG by EPA and National Grid (NG) regarding NG's new saltwater pumphouse. It will be constructed on top of a platform over Newtown Creek. Testing results show elevated levels of contaminants of concern, PCBs in the water below. Additional testing is needed to determine contamination in more detail and to what extent the remedial action requires dredging and capping. At this meeting and at meetings of the Meeker Avenue Plume Superfund Site CAG, the state of upland contamination and the yearslong investigation (since 2004) as to the chemical state of the NG campus, so the effects on these sites as far as being a potential contamination source (especially for the creek which it is known to impact greatly) can be determined.

Chesler also provided a letter submitted to DEC from our federal, state and city elected representatives, sent in July of 2025, expressing the same concerns as well as the lack of transparency regarding the investigation and its progress in spite of the severity of the site's conditions including radioactivity discovered on an adjacent site of which NG is responsible for. In DEC's response, which was shown, they offered to distribute fact sheets about the remediation process and work with NG to create a dedicated website, but no mention of public hearing(s) to address this site condition and investigation findings. He also reported the continued frustration expressed at Newtown Creek CAG meetings and similarly at Meeker Avenue CAG meetings regarding this site's true state and the corresponding lack of knowledge made available to the public.

The committee agreed that with the convergence of both superfund site CAGs expressing their discontent regarding the contamination and remediation process at 287 Maspeth Ave, that the board should write to DEC and NG about this matter.

A motion was made to recommend the board submit a letter to DEC and National Grid expressing frustration and deep concern regarding the lack of information and communication being made available to the public regarding the contamination investigation and its remediation of Nation Grid's Greenpoint Energy Center campus at 287 Maspeth Ave.

#### 3. Old Business:

#### 1. Williamsburg Houses

WH Resident Association President Lucas Greer was in attendance. A recap was given by Steve Chesler and Lucas noted receipt of letters recently sent by the board to Wavecrest, MDG, NYCHA and HUD about the recent boiler inspections that produced problems and violations that could be contributing to the illnesses of residents and to brown and foamy/bubbling water coming through apartment outlets. Lucas noted that contractors have continued to be onsite working on the boilers, presumably to resolve the violations. Additionally, a letter sent to DEC and OER regarding the state of the soil onsite, whether remediation actually occurred. Lucas noted sink water tested positive for copper in one apartment out of four tested.

Chair Steve Chesler along with District Manager Pulgarin will follow up with DEC and DOB regarding violation status, with OAG Housing Protection division about the status of their investigation and with El Puente regarding humidity readings from their air monitors that were installed at Williamsburg Houses. Lucas will provide Steve with a recent surge of 311 complaints filed by residents at WH.

# 2. <u>1036 Manhattan Avenue - No further remedial action proposal and vapor intrusion status on Freeman Street - summary of DEC's hearing presentation to the full board on November 18, 2025</u>

DEC region chief, Jane O'Connell confirmed that the contamination remediation at 1036 Manhattan Avenue was successful and needs no further action. The site was formerly a dry-cleaning operation and contained high levels of TCE, a toxic volatile organic compound (VOC). She also confirmed that none of this contamination migrated off site down Freeman Street. And, that no VOCs were detected at the source of complaints in prior years on Freeman Street between Manhattan Ave and McGuinness Boulevard. DEP flushed the sewers on the block and beyond. The odor and contamination source was never determined.

A woman who had severe problems with vapor intrusion into her building on Freeman Street, which led her to move upstate. Another woman had issues in early 2024 with severe petroleum odor in her sink drain, and the DEP acknowledged a spill nearby that needed cleaning. Nearby sewers were flushed. No complaints have been filed since.

Laura Hofmann suggested that the problem might be linked to the demolition of an aviation chemical plant where a subsequent residential building was constructed. She also mentioned the woman who lived on the south side of Freeman Street and her dog both suffered from a rare form of myelin cancer of the nerves.

Chair Steve Chesler urged himself, committee members and folks who live nearby to diligently monitor the catch basins for odors.

#### 3. Newtown Creek Superfund Site - Update

The Potential Responsible Parties (PRPs) are still performing the remedial design investigation which will inform the design of the remedy for the East Branch Early Action, and DEC is investigating upland properties along the branch for potential seepage into the waterway.







#### **SCA Phase II Environmental Site Investigation - September 2023**

#### **Key Findings Consistent with 2008 Investigation**

#### <u>Soil</u>

- > Typical of historic fill material found throughout NYC.
- An underground storage tank was confirmed. The UST was initially identified in 2008.
- No NuHart contaminants of concern were detected above regulatory comparison criteria in soil.

#### **Anticipated Action**

- Properly characterize all proposed excavated material for offsite disposal (SCA standard)
- Backfill with environmentally clean fill meeting NYSDEC General Fill Criteria (SCA standard)
- > Implement a Community Air Monitoring Plan (CAMP) and dust suppression during all ground-intrusive work (OER standard)
- Register UST with the NYSDEC, clean, remove, and dispose of all waste at off-site facility
- Exterior areas of the Site will be covered with 2 feet of environmentally clean fill or paved surfaces (asphalt, concrete, etc.; SCA standard)



# **SCA Phase II Environmental Site Investigation - September 2023**

**Key Findings Consistent with 2008 Investigation** 

#### Groundwater (detected 12' to 14' below ground surface)

- > Similar organic compounds and metals as found in soil were detected in groundwater and attributed to presence of historic fill material.
- No separate phase product detected and no dissolved-phase contaminants of concern (phthalates & TCE) from NuHart were detected above regulatory comparison criteria in groundwater.

#### **Anticipated Remedy**

- > Based on depth to groundwater, the proposed school would be built slab-on-grade (no basement) and dewatering would be prohibited.
- Groundwater is not a source of drinking water in Brooklyn.
- > Thanks to the community's advocacy, the hydraulic barrier was installed in March 2023 and will be monitored & maintained by NuHart in perpetuity.

#### Soil Vapor

One solvent (PCE) and petroleum-related constituents were detected. Similar results at adjacent OER sites and unrelated to NuHart.

#### **Anticipated Remedy**


As a standard SCA practice under these conditions, the new building will have two permanent engineering controls, gas vapor barrier and SSDS, to provide a "belt and suspenders" approach to preventing vapor intrusion.

# **Anticipated Actions**




Typical site with regard to subsurface conditions, which have not significantly changed over the past 15 years despite on-going cleanup operations at the NuHart site.

- Subsurface environmental conditions are similar to other properties SCA has encountered throughout New York City and within Greenpoint.
- Anticipated actions would be implemented as an SCA standard regardless of the Site's E-Designation. SCA goes above and beyond to implement robust engineering controls at new school sites that are not part of regulatory programs, including, but not limited to:
  - Clean cover systems
  - Vapor mitigation (e.g., GVB & SSDS)
  - Dust/sediment control
  - In addition, the SCA will enter this site into the City's Voluntary Clean Up Program as an additional measure.

# **Next Steps: Voluntary Cleanup Program**

- The Site will be enrolled in the NYC OER Voluntary Cleanup Program (VCP).
- > Components of the VCP are shown to the right. RAWP is under public review until 12/17/25.
- A public/community participation component is an additional feature of the VCP. NYSDEC will review the Remedial Action Plan developed for the school site.





## **National Grid Saltwater Pump House**

- Regarding the high concentrations of PCBs found:
  - EPA notified National Grid that all sediments >50 mg/kg must be dredged and removed as they constitute an EPA Toxic Substance Control Act (TSCA) waste according to 40 CFR 761
  - Sediments will be disposed at a TSCA or RCRA Subtitle C (hazardous waste) permitted facility
    - Proposed landfill is located in Roachdale, Indiana
  - EPA regional staff will determine if the proposed facility has been recently audited and is in compliance with the CERCLA Off-Site Rule
- Remaining contaminated sediment will be evaluated as part of the ongoing OU1 RI/FS and the design of the remedy once it is selected.



## Saltwater Pump House Project - Overview


- The saltwater pump house (SWPH) is a fire protection system required by the FDNY. Permitting agencies: Army Corp of Engineers, NYCDOB, FDNY. Additional overseeing agencies: EPA, NYSDEC.
- The purpose of this project is to replace the existing SWPH with a more resilient, structurally and electrically storm hardened structure.
- The existing SWPH needs to be replaced due to decades of saltwater exposure and recent storms.
- The system uses saltwater from Newtown Creek because the public water mains in the area cannot support the water demand in the event of an emergency.
- A turbidity curtain, oil boom, vibration monitors, and turbidity monitoring buoys are all utilized as environmental safeguards throughout piling and marine work. The turbidity curtain is extended to the bottom of the creek.



#### October

As our crews continue to construct the upgraded saltwater pump house, installation of land side piles remains on track to begin this November, with completion expected in December 2025. Waterside piling work within Newtown Creek is now expected to begin in December 2025, and take approximately one month to complete.

National Grid crews will utilize turbidity curtains during water side pile installation, which sit underwater and limit the movement of sediment and prevent turbulent waters. This turbidity curtain is scheduled to be installed this month (October 2025).

Dear Commissioner Lefton,

We are writing today to request an update on the remediation of Greenpoint Energy Center, which is located at 287 Maspeth Avenue, Brooklyn, NY 11211 and owned and controlled by National Grid (formerly by Brooklyn Union Gas and Keyspan Energy (Site code: 224052). While there are numerous environmental threats that this facility poses to our community, we would like to specifically inquire as to the current status of the State-led Superfund remediation of the site, and express our concern about community impacts and lack of public engagement.

The site has been under investigation by NYS DEC since 2004 and, despite the size of the facility (117 acres), the severity of the contamination (a state Superfund and former Manufactured Gas Plant that is bordered by two federal Superfund sites), the proximity to Environmental Justice communities (including NYCHA's Cooper Park Houses), and potential human exposure that has occurred at the site (home to the Greenpoint Little League baseball fields), there has been no coordinated community outreach about the remediation process or easy way to find up to date information and status of the investigation/cleanup.

Additionally, we are concerned about the status of 287 Maspeth Avenue given the numerous highly toxic sites that surround the facility, of which National Grid has various levels of responsibility. This includes:

1. Newtown Creek: We understand that the levels of contamination in the Creek are most severe near the National Grid facility, and that there has not been a proper assessment to determine potential migration along the entire 287 Maspeth Ave shoreline into the waterway.

- 2. Meeker Avenue Plume: We understand that EPA has begun sampling at 287 Maspeth in relation to the plume which is currently mapped as bordering their property line.
- 3. EquityWorks: The <u>recent discovery of radioactive material</u> at the EquityWorks remediation site and litigation against National Grid for their responsibility.

We have no record of any public meetings dedicated solely to potential hazards and/or remediation of this site since NYS DEC began its investigation over 20 years ago. It is our understanding that an <u>interim Remedial Investigation</u> (RI) was submitted to NYS DEC in November 2016 — but it has never been presented to the community, nor have we received an update to the status of finalizing the RI and creating a Record of Decision. The DEC Info Locator site has links to <u>a number of technical documents</u> covering this time period, but they are difficult for community members to access, share, and properly evaluate.

Given these ongoing issues, we ask that DEC:

- 1. Present to the community at a public meeting about the current status of remediation at 287 Maspeth Ave;
- 2. Commit to regular community updates about the site moving forward, including publishing quarterly Greenpoint Energy Center Community Update Factsheets;
- 3. Create a dedicated website that contains background information and up-to-date information about the site history, known hazards, and remediation status (similar to the Greenpoint Oil Spill site)<sup>1</sup>

Thank you for your letter regarding the status of the remedial investigation and remediation of the Greenpoint Energy Site (Site No. 224052) located at 287 Maspeth Avenue in Brooklyn, New York.

DEC is currently reviewing the updated Draft Remedial Investigation Report (RIR) prepared by National Grid and will hold a public meeting for the Greenpoint Former MGP site once the RIR is finalized. Several Interim Remedial Measures (IRMs) have been completed at the site while the remedial investigation has been in process, which include the excavation of approximately 17,400 tons of soil in the northeast corner of the Site prior to the construction of the LNG liquefaction facility (between 2005 and 2007) and the excavation of approximately 5,400 tons of soil prior to the construction of the Maspeth Regulator Station in the center of the Site in 2012. In addition to the soil excavation IRMs, two soil vapor mitigation systems have been installed at onsite buildings to address the potential for soil vapor contamination in those buildings.

DEC is committed to keeping the community updated on the status of the Greenpoint Energy site cleanup and will be preparing a community update factsheet outlining the status of the investigation and what next steps will be taken at the site. The fact sheet will also announce the date of the public meeting, during which DEC will provide the community with an update on the site and answer questions the community may have. We are happy to share the fact sheet with your office when it becomes available.

Finally, in addition to DEC's public document repository (<a href="https://dec.ny.gov/maps/interactive-maps/decinfo-locator">https://dec.ny.gov/maps/interactive-maps/decinfo-locator</a>), DEC will work with National Grid to create and maintain a webpage dedicated to the site to provide historical documents, reports, and updates of ongoing work.

On December 9, 2025, Brooklyn Community Board #1 voted unanimously to submit this comment to NYC OER, based on a recommendation from its Environmental Protection Committee:

Brooklyn Community Board #1 is grateful that you both participated in the Environmental Protection Committee meeting held on December 4, 2025, during the presentation by the School Construction Authority (SCA) and discussion relating to 257 Franklin Street (New School Site) Volunteer Cleanup Program Site# 26CVCP002K.

The board acknowledges based on testimony provided at previous committee meetings by SCA and DEC and in documentation submitted to the board from both entities, that the 257 Franklin Street site has not and does not contain detectable amounts of the contaminants of concern that were remediated from the State Superfund site adjacent to it located at 65 Dupont Street. A 25' deep barrier was installed adjacent to 257 Franklin Street as an extra precaution to prevent migration of the phthalates plume in the street onto the future school site. Groundwater is located approximately 12' feet below grade. Monitoring wells located in the sidewalk adjacent to the site will have samples drawn and contaminated groundwater removed on a periodic basis.

The board further acknowledges though 257 Franklin Street has an E-designation remediation requirement, the SCA has entered in OER's more robust Volunteer Cleanup Program (VCP). SCA's Phase II Environmental Site Investigation (ESI) determined that groundwater, soil (historic fill) and soil vapor contained levels of contamination slightly above or near state limits warranting remedial action. SCA therefore as a part of their site remediation will be removing almost 6,000 tons of soil at a depth of 4', 10' at hot spots, installing a vapor barrier and a sub-slab depressurization system (SSDS).

Based on these baseline facts the board urges the OER and SCA to heed the following concerns and requests:

- Perform due diligence and beyond with regard to:
  - Taking special care and caution with remediation and construction practices with the knowledge that Greenpoint Playground is located across the street from the site.
  - Dust mitigation and control during remediation and construction phases.
  - Onsite water control with awareness that Greenpoint Playground experiences severe ponding during rain events. Assurances should be made to prevent onsite water from mixing with surface rainwater that collects at the playground.
  - o Trucks being washed off onsite.
  - Truck entry and exit routes and staging adhering to the routes and locations noted in project documents.
  - Strict enforcement of CAMP protocols.
  - Planning for future flooding from estimated increasingly severe storm surges, increasingly severe rain events and rising groundwater levels. Brooklyn Community Board #1 continues to be very concerned about this threat as it relates to the design of the school. Different flood maps show various levels of encroachment and non-encroachment of storm surge water onto the school property. Prepare for the worst-case scenario.

Brooklyn Community Board #1 takes the safety and well being of its community members very seriously, especially its children.



On December 9, 2025, Brooklyn Community Board #1 voted unanimously to send this letter, based on a recommendation from its Environmental Protection Committee:

As reported by Environmental Protection Committee Chair, Steve Chesler, who is a member of both the Newtown Creek (Superfund) Community Advisory Group and the Meeker Avenue Plume CAG (Superfund), for years both CAGs have been anxious to know the true state of the contamination existing and the remedial action work plan development at the National Grid Greenpoint Energy Center located at 287 Maspeth Avenue in the Greenpoint section of Brooklyn, which lies within Brooklyn Community District #1.

It is known that this site is an ongoing source of contamination for Newtown Creek, but the detailed extent of this is unknown. Recently EPA and National Grid presented the latter's plans to construct a new saltwater pump house atop a platform over the creek. Some well samples provided a small picture of the contamination in the creek bed underneath the platform, but full details of the entire property remain elusive continuing to trouble CAG members and our board, as it may bog down an already arduous and incredibly time-consuming process for planning the creek's remediation.

Secondly, the current estimated border of the Meeker Avenue Plume Superfund contamination area ends adjacent to 287 Maspeth Avenue. This demarcation is concerning to this CAG's members and the board's Environmental Protection Committee members. Both are anxious to know how contamination at the Nation Grid site might be affecting the plume area, and visa versa. This site borders both business and especially residences. It contains former youth baseball fields that were forced into abandonment due to discovered contamination there. Across the street from 287 Maspeth Avenue at the former site of the Equity Gas Works, radioactivity was discovered within coal tar contamination. This situation raises even more concern about the chemical state of the National Grid campus site. Nearby residents, workers and business owners have a right to know about the state of the 287 Maspeth Avenue property and how it may be affecting their properties and National Grid's plan to clean up the contamination.

Last July a coalition of elected officials submitted a letter to DEC with a similar inquiry. To date the board is not aware of the requests made there being fulfilled. Meanwhile, the site investigation and remediation process has eclipsed a 20-year timeline and counting.

Therefore, Brooklyn Community Board #1 requests that the remedial investigation and subsequent work plan for remediating 287 Maspeth Avenue be expedited immediately. The very slow process so far is inhibiting critical planning for remediating the extensive contamination of the Newtown Creek and Meeker Avenue Superfund sites, and the addressing of the safety of nearby residents and workers. Additionally, the results of the remedial investigation and future plans should be shared by DEC and National Grid directly with our board on a regular basis and what was previously requested by the coalition, creation of a project website. The lack of communication regarding this process breeds distrust.

## DISTRICT SERVICE CABINET MEETING NOVEMBER 20, 2025 435 GRAHAM AVENUE BROOKLYN, NY 11211

#### MEETING CALLED TO ORDER

District Manager, Ms. Johana P. Pulgarin called the District Service Cabinet Meeting to order and noted the agenda which included a round robin session.

#### **ROUND ROBIN SESSION**

#### NYC DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION (DEP):

Brooklyn Coordinator Ms. Denise Hubbard reported that she had nothing new to report.

District Manager Pulgarin asked about flooding during the recent storms and noted at least two complaints, including one in front of the Community Board office and another on Union Avenue. Ms. Hubbard stated that DEP responds quickly to such complaints and that, in the recent storm, most flooding had dissipated by the next day due to debris being cleared from catch basins.

First Vice Chair Simon Weiser asked how often DEP cleans catch basins below ground (not just removing surface debris). Ms. Hubbard stated that catch basins are cleaned approximately once or twice a year on a systemwide schedule but said she would confirm the exact frequency and provide it via email to the District Manager. She also encouraged the community to call 311 whenever they observe clogged basins so DEP can respond promptly. (*Please see attached DEP response.*)



#### NYC DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (DOT):

Ms. Maria Cruz, Community Liaison, Brooklyn Borough Commissioner's Office, reported that she is new in her role, has no formal updates, but is available to respond to questions and is learning internal processes.

District Manager Pulgarin raised the following points:

- A fallen streetlight pole at Skillman Street & Graham Avenue has remained in the roadway for over two weeks, creating a safety hazard and occupying parking space and unsafe for children who are coming out of school.
- Complaints about barricades and equipment left for long periods, including in front of the CB1 office.
- The utility responsible for Skillman and Graham Avenue is National Grid.

First Vice Chair Simon Weiser reiterated ongoing traffic issues at Meeker Avenue and McGuinness Boulevard, where the removal of a travel lane by a utility company is causing vehicles to bottleneck. This issue has been raised for the past two months without resolution.

Ms. Cruz explained that complaints are forwarded to the appropriate internal unit or coordinating utility (e.g., Con Edison, National Grid, Parks, DEP). Removal often depends on which agency owns the asset. She emphasized that she escalates issues when possible and works closely with internal staff to follow up but does not have unilateral authority to dispatch crews.

District Manager Pulgarin stressed that a month-long wait for removal of a fallen pole is unacceptable and that stronger coordination between agencies and utilities is needed. Ms. Cruz agreed to continue pushing internally, review the Skillman/Graham case, and work with the District Manager on faster resolutions where possible.

#### NYC DEPARTMENT OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS (DCWP):

Community Affairs Associate Mr. Jonathan Novella reported:

- Tenants charged a broker's fee have the right to request an itemized breakdown of that fee. Landlords and brokers must disclose what is being charged and cannot hide fees under vague "administrative" charges.
- DCWP is preparing for the NYC Free Tax Prep Campaign, which begins early next year. Mr. Novella offered to present on free tax prep services at a future board meeting.

District Manager Pulgarin noted that the Executive Board has already set the agenda for the next meeting. Mr. Novella was invited to email Chair Dealice Fuller and the Executive Board requesting presentation time for the January 13, 2026, meeting.

#### **NYC DEPARTMENT FOR THE AGING (DFTA):**

Government Affairs Officer Ms. Charise Lawrence reported:

- DFTA recently held the grand finale of its "Timeless" competition; the overall winner was from Manhattan. She thanked District Manager Pulgarin for serving as a regional judge.
- DFTA's Annual Plan Summary Hearing included approximately 15 presenters, including community board managers and leaders of older adult centers, to inform program planning.
- November is National Caregivers Month; DFTA continues its citywide anti-ageism advertising campaign on subways and buses.
- In partnership with the Department of Cultural Affairs, DFTA launched a cultural guide for older adults to connect with arts programming. Ms. Lawrence will share the link with the Board.
- Medicare open enrollment is ongoing. Older adults needing counseling can contact Aging Connect at 212-AGING-NYC (212-244-6469) to access HIICAP assistance.

Ms. Lawrence wished everyone happy holidays.

#### **NEW YORK POLICE DEPARTMENT (90th Precinct):**

Commanding Officer Vincent Seminerio reported:

- Major index crimes are down in the latest 28-day period, except for an increase in grand larcenies, particularly package thefts and thefts from vehicles.
- Residents are encouraged to secure package deliveries in locked mailrooms, secure building rooms, or businesses.
- Theft from parked vehicles has increased; residents should avoid leaving valuables in cars.
- Pickpocketing and nightlife-related crimes have increased, particularly in Williamsburg's industrial sections. Residents are advised to secure wallets and phones and be cautious with strangers requesting contact information.
- Scams include:
  - o Zelle/Venmo scams via phone access
  - o Jewelry swap scams
  - o AI voice scams impersonating family, friends, or employers
- Rodney Park / Strawberry Playground: Bathrooms now close at 6 PM and parks at 9 PM, reducing problematic activity.
- Traffic and bicycle safety: Increased enforcement in bike lanes and education efforts continue. An arrest has been made in the fatal Meserole Street incident; the Board will request updates from the precinct and District Attorney's Office.
- Graffiti: The 90th Precinct has not seen an increase in graffiti complaints. Residents should call 911 for active break-ins and 311 for non-emergency graffiti reports.

#### **NEW YORK POLICE DEPARTMENT:**

Senior Crime Prevention Officer for the  $90^{th}$  and  $94^{th}$  Precinct – Officer Sierra Brach provided additional updates:

• Conducts risk assessments and recommends security improvements for buildings with package theft issues (e.g., 279 South 4th Street, 65 Ainslie Street).

- Warned about EBT card skimming, jewelry swap scams, and AI voice phone scams, especially for older adults.
- Offers lectures and outreach at senior centers in the 90th and 94th Precincts.
- Coordinates holiday turkey giveaways and meal deliveries in partnership with RiseBoro and Meals on Wheels.

#### **Turkey Giveaway – 90th Precinct:**

- Scheduled for Tuesday near Starbucks on Union Avenue, 1:00 PM-3:00 PM (tentative).
- Officer Brach and Community Affairs Officer Kenneth Dubois will coordinate with volunteers and Starbucks.
- District Manager Pulgarin requested final details be emailed for community sharing.

#### **Traffic & Safety Concerns – Jackson Street and Graham Avenue:**

- Juan Mayancela, Council Member Gutierrez's Office, reported ongoing calls about accidents and repeated DOT notifications, The Council Member Gutierrez's Office is requesting a streetlight for this intersection.
- District Manager Pulgarin, complemented this information adding that CB1 has received several complaints about this intersection and it has low visibility creating a hazardous environment for pedestrians, District manager Pulgarin also emphasized in the proximity to PS132 and the Settlement House on Jackson St. It was noted that there was a request made to DOT previously.
- Officer Brach will reach out to the 94th Precinct regarding recurring car accidents to pull an intel report and send it to DOT to help to rush the study of this intersection.
- Captain Seminerio offers to pull an intel report from the 90<sup>th</sup> Precinct as well and send it to DOT to help with this issue. And offers to communicate with the 94<sup>th</sup> Precinct to do the same.
- Juan Mayancela, Council Member Gutierrez's Office, spoke about the package theft prevention for Problematic locations include 279 South 3rd Street and 65 Ainslie Street, with ongoing management non-responsiveness. This was reported to Officer Salem.

Officer Brach emphasized preventative measures, future technology preparedness, and collaboration with Financial Crimes Task Force for financial exploitation cases.

#### **Office of the Mayor Community Affairs:**

Brooklyn Borough Director Pierre Gerdeon, Brooklyn

#### • Nation's First Public School Integration with Emergency Technology

- o Mayor Adams announced the first program in the nation to integrate public schools with emergency response technology.
- o Pierre attended the press conference, where a demonstration showed that activating a safety button instantly connects to first responders.
- o The goal is to improve response times and strengthen preventive safety measures, particularly as incidents affecting cities across the country increase.

o Mayor Adams, who comes from the public school system, is proud of implementing this preventive approach to improve safety in schools.

#### • Youth Apprenticeship – New Civil Service Title

- o The administration launched a new **Youth Apprentice civil service title** to help young New Yorkers enter city agencies more easily.
- o Pierre noted that many city agencies, including NYPD, offer substantial benefits that young people may not be aware of.
- o He shared his own experience: he interned at TAU many years ago, participated in a DOE fellowship, and eventually returned to public service.
- The initiative is intended to expand opportunities, encourage youth participation in city government, and make it easier for young people to integrate into different agencies.

#### • \$40 Million Investment in Universal Bus Seating

- o The City is investing \$40 million to install seating at 8,754 bus stops.
- o This investment will help seniors, individuals with back or mobility issues, and others who may need seating while waiting for buses.

#### • Expansion of NYPD Staffing

- o Funding has been allocated to hire 5,000 additional NYPD officers by 2029.
- o New York City's size and activity levels require a strong police presence, and this expansion aims to ensure adequate staffing for safety and community needs.

#### • New NYC 911 Mental Health Crisis Model

- o A new model has been announced to have mental-health-related 911 calls handled by NYC Health + Hospitals.
- o This approach will reduce the burden on FDNY and EMTs and ensure that trained health professionals respond to mental health crises.
- o The goal is to provide more appropriate care and support for individuals experiencing mental health emergencies.

Pierre concluded by opening the floor for questions.

#### **NATIONAL GRID:**

Brooklyn Corporate Affairs Manager Ms. Terry Yarde

Ms. Terry Yarde provided a detailed update on National Grid activities and community support:

#### 1. Skillman Follow-Up

o Ms. Yarde has reached out to her contacts regarding the Skillman Street and Graham Avenue issue. An email update is expected today.

#### 2. Community Engagement – Borough Hall Turkey Giveaway

- o National Grid is sponsoring the annual turkey giveaway at Borough Hall.
- o Ms. Yarde and National Grid volunteers will participate in the event.

#### 3. Holiday Construction Embargo

- o Runs from **November 15 January 2**.
- o No routine construction work will be conducted during this period unless there is an emergency.

#### 4. HEAP (Home Energy Assistance Program) Updates

- o HEAP services were temporarily paused due to the government shutdown.
- o Although the government has reopened, resuming services takes time.
- o In the meantime, National Grid has opened a **Neighborhood Heating Fund** to assist customers who would normally qualify for HEAP.

#### 5. Food Pantry Support

- National Grid released funds to assist NYC food pantries affected by delays in SNAP benefits.
- o Partnering organizations include **TECA** (**The Campaign Against Hunger**) and another local organization in Sunset Park (name to be confirmed).

#### 6. Cooper Houses Computer Lab Donation

- o National Grid is donating computers to open a new lab at **Cooper Houses**, a NYCHA building.
- o Ribbon-cutting and lab opening are planned for **Friday**, **December 12**.
- o Approximately **20 computers**, including laptops, will be provided.

#### 7. Point of Contact for Assistance

o Customers can call **718-643-4050** for assistance with heating-related programs.

#### 8. Additional Notes

- o Ms. Yarde will provide follow-up details and press releases.
- o She will also share information regarding the ribbon-cutting and Cooper Houses computer lab opening for potential attendance.

#### NYC DEPARTMENT OF DESIGN & CONSTRUCTION:

Community Construction Liaison Vladimir Poux reported no major updates. The Project HWS2023 Rehabilitation of Sidewalks at Designated Locations at McCarren Park has been completed.

#### **COUNCILMEMBER JENNIFER GUTIERREZ'S OFFICE:**

Director of Community Organizing, Juan Mayancela provided several updates:

- Due to the government shutdown, many residents are experiencing issues with food stamps and Medicaid. If anyone in the community is having problems, please direct them to the Council Member's office. They are able to reach out to HRA on their behalf.
- We are now in heating season, and many tenants are reporting no heat or insufficient heat in their apartments. Some are resorting to unsafe heating methods, which pose fire hazards. Please notify the office if you hear of these cases they will contact HPD.
- The office will be hosting a Christmas event in Bushwick:
  - o Tree lighting begins at Knickerbocker Plaza on December 8 at 5 PM.
  - o A Christmas parade will proceed to Maria Hernandez Park, where the main tree lighting ceremony will take place.
- A Narcan training will be held on December 13 from 10 AM to 12 PM at Cobra. Narcan is a safe tool for reversing overdoses.

- The office is currently collecting ideas for Participatory Budgeting (PB). Community members are encouraged to submit proposals on how to allocate \$1 million for community projects, including schools, parks, and other public spaces.
- On December 15, there will be an Academy training with the Department of Health via Zoom. This training is intended for homeowners and tenants seeking guidance on addressing housing and health issues. An invitation will be sent out.

The District Manager thanked Mr. Mayancela and the Office of Council Member Gutierrez for continuously assisting with constituent referrals, especially those who need help completing forms. She noted that we truly appreciate their support and are grateful for their ongoing partnership. Juan closed by expressing appreciation for the ongoing collaboration and noted that the office is always available to assist with referrals and agency outreach.

<u>COMMUNITY BOARD NO. 1:</u> District Manager Pulgarin thanked everyone for attending and concluded the meeting. The District Manager advised all attendees that the next District Service Cabinet Meeting will be held on December 11, 2025.

#### How does DEP clean catch basins?

- We use data to drive our inspection schedule of the city's **150,000** catch basins.
- Inspections based on an historical analysis of cleaning and 311 complaints.
- Catch basins in **commercial areas** inspected most frequently.
- DEP also inspects in response to **311 complaints** with a 3-day response on average.
- **Before major storms**, DEP proactively sends crews to inspect catch basins in flood-prone areas to make sure they are clean and working properly.
- **98%** of the more than 87,500 catch basins DEP inspected in FY25 were functional (only 2% non-functional).

The community board has thousands of catch basins that could be cleaned on 1 year, 2 year, or 3 year cleaning schedule based on the above bullets. Does the First Vice Chair have specific catch basins he wants to know about? I cannot provide data on every single of the thousands of catch basins in the community board, because they are each on a different schedule.

Let me know if he has a more specific (smaller) window of catch basins or streets he is interested in.

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

# **Establishment of Temporary Residence Program for Eligible Basement or Cellar Residences**

# **HPD Rules Relating to Right of Return for Basement or Cellar Residences**

Local Law 126 of 2024, which is codified as article 507 of chapter 5 of title 28 of the administrative code, authorizes the Department of Buildings ("DOB") to establish a program to legalize occupancy of existing basement and cellar residences in certain community districts. Owners who are enrolled in the program in accordance with DOB rules may continue to rent illegal basement or cellar residences for up to 10 years if they complete established

benchmarks for legalization during such 10 year period and complete all necessary work by the end of such 10 year period, and a certificate of occupancy or temporary certificate of occupancy has been issued for such basement or cellar residence. LL 126 also provides that a tenant who occupied such a basement or cellar residence on April 20, 2024 and who must vacate such basement or cellar residence in order for the necessary work to be performed safely has the right of first return to such basement or cellar residence after the alteration work is completed. The Department of Housing Preservation and Development ("HPD") is proposing rules to establish standards and procedures to effectuate this right of first return. The proposed rules would require that an owner who is unable to safely complete necessary alteration of a basement or cellar residence with a tenant in residence provide notice to the tenant explaining the authorization for temporary residence, the date the work is expected to commence, the scope of the proposed work, and the tenant's right of first return to the basement or cellar residence following completion of the proposed alteration. The proposed rules also include obligations that the tenant must fulfill in order to preserve their right of first return to the basement or cellar residence, including a requirement that the tenant vacate the basement or cellar residence at the required time and advise the owner at the time that they vacate of their intent to return to the basement or cellar residence.

# FOR THE THIRD WEEK IN A ROW, New Yorkers broke YET ANOTHER composting record, diverting 6,062,000 pounds of compost from landfill

Week after week after week, residents are turning millions of pounds of food and yard waste into compost and renewable energy

The New York City Department of Sanitation announced today that residents have smashed composting records THREE weeks in a row, separating and setting out 6,062,000 pounds of food and yard waste last week alone, topping the two previous weeks, where residents set out 6 million pounds and 5.9 million pounds. The success of the nation's largest and easiest curbside composting program shows that if you make it easy for New Yorkers to fight rats and help the environment, they will do it week after week.

DSNY picks up ALL leaf and yard waste, food scraps and food-soiled paper from every resident on recycling day. This includes meat, bones, shells, dairy, cooked foods, and even greasy uncoated paper plates and pizza boxes — as well as fall leaves and holiday trees. No sign-up is required, and residents can use any bin 55 gallons or less with a secure lid, with or without a paper, compostable or clear plastic liner.

Material collected in DSNY's curbside composting program is either turned into finished compost for parks and gardens, or into renewable energy to heat local homes and businesses reducing the need for fracked gas. This year alone, DSNY gave away more than 8 million pounds of finished compost to residents through a network of four regular giveback sites and dozens of popup events across the

five boroughs.

Since curbside composting went citywide last October, Staten Islanders have produced the most compostable material per capita – roughly 1 pound per person, per week – while Queens residents have produced the most compostable material overall, more than 61 million pounds total in the first year.

The 6,062,000 pounds of material collected during the week of November 16 to 22 tops the 6,025,480 pounds set out during the week of November 9 to 15, which tops the 5.9 million pounds collected during the week of November 2 to 8. These totals smashed previous records set in the spring:

- During the second week of April, the Department collected nearly 3.6 million pounds of compost, more than three times what was collected at the same time last year and, at the time, the highest level of separated compostable material collected curbside in the City's history.
- That record was broken by the third week, at 4.5 million pounds, a 400% increase over the same time the year before.
- That record was broken by the fourth week, at 5.24 million pounds, a 500% increase over the same time the year before.
- And New Yorkers broke that record during the week of May 18 to 24, when they set out 5.4 million pounds of compostable material.

With leaf season well underway, DSNY reminds New Yorkers that extra leaf and yard waste can be put in a paper lawn and leaf bag or clear plastic bag. Twigs and branches can be bundled with twine and placed next to bins and bags.

# Schedule Change Allows for Round-the-Clock Storm Readiness; Collection Times Could Vary Slightly

The New York City Department of Sanitation announced that it has transitioned its operations to its annual "Winter Schedule" with additional employees working overnight hours to allow for quicker and more effective snow operations work.

When snow is not in the forecast, Sanitation Workers scheduled for the night shift are frequently assigned to cleaning or collection duties, and as a result, residents may notice their trash, compost, and recycling collected at a slightly different time. **To ensure** material is collected, residents are reminded to set material out by midnight on their scheduled day.

This winter staffing is in addition to previously schedule night work - all part of ongoing efforts to decrease the time that material sits on the streets to create a cleaner City with fewer rats. The winter schedule generally lasts at least through mid-April, but the Department will re-evaluate in the weeks and months to come.

The Department of Sanitation has a frontline defense of more than 700 salt spreaders dispatched at the first sign of frozen precipitation. Once two inches of snow has fallen on the City's streets and highways, the Department can deploy it's more than 2,000 plow-equipped trucks to clear snow and ice. The Department is responsible for more than 19,000 lane-miles of roadway in the City. Hi all,

I wanted to reach out about a sewer break in your district and to notify you about some upcoming work, in case you get any questions from community members.

A few days ago, we had sewer break we had on Rutledge street between Marcy and Harrison Avenue and since then we have been manually pumping sewage on the block so that services are not interrupted for the schools that are connected to that stretch of sewer. We need to replace approximately 400' of pipe on Rutledge St between Marcy Ave and Harrison Ave. Due to the fact that there are so many schools on this block, we are going to permanently do that work over the summer (Jun-Aug 2026).

However, we have an immediate need to fix a total collapse at one spot before the sewer gets completely backed up. Our contractor needs to shut down Rutledge St between Marcy Ave and Harrison Ave on Monday, 12/8 from 7AM - 3PM in order to do this now and then we can return when school is out to replace the rest of the sewer (in the summer of 2026). We anticipate this immediate repair to only take one day (Monday, 12/8).

- No sewer services will be interrupted during our work. Everyone on the block can continue using their sewer-related appliances.
- All traffic will be blocked off on Rutledge between Marcy and Harrison. We are putting up no parking signs for Monday today.
- Pedestrians will still be able to walk in the area.

I have been in touch with all of the schools in the area and they were briefed on the situation

this morning. They all have my phone number and email. I would appreciate help from you all fielding questions about this from the local community and please flag for me if there are any other folks I should add to this chain or connect with on this. Thanks for your help.

# NYC Rats Are Fleeing – for an Incredible 12 Straight Months!

December 1, 2025

311 reports of rat sightings have fallen every month since residential containerization requirements went into effect last November

The New York City Department of Sanitation (DSNY) announced today that rats are on the run: In a shocking development, rat sightings reported to 311 have declined for 12 straight months when compared to the same month one year earlier, representing an overall decline of more than 20 percent.

The flight of the rats coincides with the requirement last November that all buildings with 1 to 9 residential units put their trash in sealed bins, removing a significant source of rat food from our streets. This persistent, ongoing decline in rat sightings proves that a cleaner city IS possible.

In addition, all New York City businesses have been required to put their trash in sealed bins for roughly two years. And all food waste – from all businesses and all residences – is required to be in sealed bins. Taken together, these rules mean that more than 70 percent of New York City trash is required to be in containers, a true Trash Revolution.

DSNY is also coming for the remaining 30 percent of trash: Last June, Manhattan Community Board 9 – covering all of West Harlem – became the first neighborhood to fully containerize its trash, with the installation of on-street Empire Bins for trash from high-density residential buildings. Next year, Empire Bins will be in Brooklyn Community Board 2, making it the second district in the city to fully containerize its trash.

From December 2023 to November 2024, New York City residents reported 25,230 rat sightings. For the same period one year later, that number plummeted to 20,025, a 20.6 percent decline. A month-by month breakdown follows:

# **Street Cleaning & Beautification**

The BID continues to run a **daily sidewalk cleaning** program from 9 am to 4 pm with one worker during the week and occasionally two workers on the weekends during the summer, spring and fall and one worker on the weekend in the winter. The service is provided by **Jag Cleaning & Maintenance**, a city-wide provider. The cost of our Sanitation program accounts for nearly three quarters of our yearly budget. The district is swept daily and the sidewalk cans, both the BID receptacles and the corner Sanitation cans, are emptied, relined and the bags are placed at the corners for pickup by Sanitation. The BID works closely with our sanitation crew managed by our subcontractor and NYC Sanitation to maintain the integrity of the retail district.

We continue to remind District businesses that the BID program is supplemental only and does not replace their responsibility to clean in front of their stores/property. The BID provides buildings with residential tenant's information on proper pickup days and times for their tenants, monitor and report illegal dumping, and monitor businesses use of carting companies and non-compliance. We encourage enforcement when warranted and contests tickets that are improperly issued when contacted by business and property owners. The BID has successfully helped businesses through its contact with Small Business Solutions and by writing letters to OATH to challenge violations when requested. Through the help of DSNY Sanitation and the BID's supplemental sanitation program, dumping problems are addressed, and owners notified.









### Graffiti Removal

Graffiti continues to be a persistent problem in the BID, one that is costly to remove and monitor. Graffiti removal is currently done on an as needed/requested basis in coordination with the NYC Graffiti Free program. The BID urges stores and property owners to report problems to the BID so they can be addressed in a timely manner. We maintain a list of graffiti removal requests via our membership database.

Under our **Positive Property Program** the BID encourages property owners to be proactive and avoid fines by posting the garbage pickup times for their tenants including the recycling days and

regulations. Owners are also encouraged to include this information in their tenant leases to avoid future problems. This will also prevent needless and costly violations. Information on the days and times of pickups can be obtained on <a href="www.nyc.gov/sanitation">www.nyc.gov/sanitation</a>. Buildings with residential tenants within the BID district pose the largest challenge to keeping the district clean. Many of the dumping problems result from tenants putting out garbage on the wrong days or times. They also fail to understand the requirements of the city recycling program or the restriction on electronic products being collected.

The BID continues to grow its digital marketing capabilities on behalf of our own marketing supporting our district businesses.

# **Graham Avenue Community Card**

We have over a dozen local businesses participating in our Community Gift Card, which encourages local shopping keeping customers spending local. Cards can only be used at participating merchants and small businesses. This program is free and requires no special technology or administration, with funds automatically paid to merchants via their usual Mastercard processor.

### **Street Banners**

The banners were changed for the holiday season when the holiday lights were installed. Use of the banners is provided through an arrangement with the DOT with reports and insurance information submitted by the BID. The holiday banners and lights have just recently gone up during the week of Thanksgiving and will be in place through mid-January.



The BID once again held its annual **Graham Avenue Fiesta** in May 2025 co-produced with Clearview Festivals and with the financial support of many generous BID businesses and corporate sponsors helping to underwrite the cost of this event. The BID is planning to continue this special community event and fundraiser, which will resume next year in May 2026.





We continue the work on our street activation of **Cook Street Commons**, done during the summer months, which features local entertainment, select food vendors and community resources. This new event brings visibility to our shopping district, while serving the needs of our residents and visitors to our commercial community. We promote this event via advertisement and social media.



# **Holiday Lighting & Banners**

Our holiday lights were again installed by Illuminations by Arnold prior to Thanksgiving week to start shoppers thinking about holiday purchases. The board continues to limit the number of holiday light strands to two per block to reduce rising costs, but to maintain visibility. Holiday banners were also installed to further enhance the festive feel of our corridor.



# **Community Partnerships**

The BID also works with the **Moore Street Market**, one of three public markets managed by the Public Markets programs under the management of the NYC Economic Development Corp. We coordinate a year-long programming calendar which supports community engagement and commerce at the public market.



The BID also proudly partners with the Woodhull Medical Center to support their outreach and holds a seat on the board of the **Woodhull Hospital Auxiliary**, which undertakes a variety of fundraising activities in support of the hospital's healthcare programs.



We also partner with the leadership and staff of **PS257** on a variety of community projects focused on positively engaging with and supporting the students and the wider community.

# **Quality of Life Initiatives**

The BID corridor is a **zero-visibility zone**, which restricts all street vending (licensed and unlicensed) on Graham Ave, from Broadway to Boerum, except when special permits are obtained by the BID on behalf of its merchants for pre-holiday displays. All other street vendors are restricted from vending within our commercial corridor. Only disabled veterans and artists selling 1st amendment literature are permitted to vend in these areas. In August of 2024 the BID organized a **Petition requesting the stepped up enforcement** of the illegal street vending situation in our district addressed to the community board (BK01), the Mayor's office, and Dept of Sanitation's vendor enforcement unit. The petition also encourages and supports BID members to monitor illegal vending by reporting it to our office and to 311. We have also been working with the NYC BID Association to compel the city agencies to take enforcement activities in a timely fashion.

# Homeless Issues/illegal Peddlers

The BID is working to improve the area despite the continued increase in panhandlers, homeless and vagrants due to a change in city regulations, which now protects their rights to be visible in our retail district. Property owners are encouraged to post no trespassing signs to prevent vagrants from setting up near their buildings. They are also asked to report the problem to 311 and to our BID office for follow up. This helps enforcement and helps the BID help you. The BID reports incidents to the Police and to Breaking Ground, a homeless outreach unit. The BID also suggests that cardboard boxes left outside for pickup either be cut into smaller sizes, watered down, or sprayed with something unpleasant so they are not used for street shelters or bed mats.

### **Public Safety and Security**

The BID continues to work closely with the 90<sup>th</sup> Precinct. The district continues to work closely with the precinct's community affairs staff P.O. Kenneth Dubois as well as the precinct's Q-Team of patrol officers, focused on quality of life initiatives.

# **Inadequate Parking Spaces**

The BID continues to help the Graham Avenue merchants and property owners by offering affordable leases to parking spots and managing the parking lot on Cook St. Parking for shoppers continues to be an issue for our merchants and we continue to work with DOT to enforce parking rules and look for alternative solutions to make more parking available for shoppers.

# **Small BID Support Grant Initiatives underway for FY26**

We will continue our work bringing **Tree Bed beautification** to the district by installing an additional 15 tree guards adding to the 43 custom-designed tree guards installed over the past two years

throughout our commercial district. We continue our work to inventory and document the type of tree and status of each tree and tree bed within our district using the NYC Street Tree Map maintained by the NYC Parks Dept. This year's grant will allow us to maintain our tree bed beautification and horticultural planting to 58 the majority of our district's tree beds.

We continue our street activation initiative at **Cook Street Commons** and **Mckibbons Corner**, as a casual outdoor seating area featuring live music and entertainment along with a chance to learn about small business opportunities, health & wellness, and community resources. We select six Saturdays over the spring and summer to bring a unique public programming to our commercial district.

We will undertake a refresh of our **District Marketing Initiative** by building on our current BID marketing and this year's marketing support initiative, which consisted of three digital marketing workshops for our district businesses, which were well-attended and positively received. We have now developed a Digital Marketing Toolkit for distribution to all our local businesses. The toolkit includes a digital marketing readiness self-assessment, a strategic playbook, and a host of tools & resources that businesses can use to better market their products and services. In this initiative we will make use of our BID Community Corps, who will support the BID and select businesses with digital content creation and social media campaigns.

With our **Retail Attraction Project** we will update the retail market analysis we maintain by updating our inventory of vacant storefronts, and summarize our neighborhood improvements to begin building relationships with property owners, real estate brokers, and community stakeholders to develop a retail attraction strategy which can bring new businesses to our district. We will support our property owners and their brokers to actively recruit businesses to fill current storefront vacancies. This will involve the creation of a retail attraction package and the purchase of a database of target businesses for our outreach and recruitment.

# AvenueNYC Revitatization Program Grant awarded jointly to Graham Avenue and Grant St BIDs (East Williamsburg Collaborative)

This competitive awarded grant is a 3-year program to build organizational capacity, foster partnerships across the community, and develop revitalization projects for our commercial corridors in East Williamsburg. During the first year we collaborate to study and serve the wider neighborhood, focusing on "Main Streets" commercial corridors via a completion of a commercial district needs assessment to assess the physical & built environment and conduct community interviews and surveys as the basis for project implementation in years 2 & 3.





Hi all,

I wanted to reach out about a sewer break in your district and to notify you about some upcoming work, in case you get any questions from community members.

A few days ago, we had sewer break we had on Rutledge street between Marcy and Harrison Avenue and since then we have been manually pumping sewage on the block so that services are not interrupted for the schools that are connected to that stretch of sewer. We need to replace approximately 400' of pipe on Rutledge St between Marcy Ave and Harrison Ave. Due to the fact that there are so many schools on this block, we are going to permanently do that work over the summer (Jun-Aug 2026).

However, we have an immediate need to fix a total collapse at one spot before the sewer gets completely backed up. Our contractor needs to shut down Rutledge St between Marcy Ave and Harrison Ave on Monday, 12/8 from 7AM - 3PM in order to do this now and then we can return when school is out to replace the rest of the sewer (in the summer of 2026). We anticipate this immediate repair to only take one day (Monday, 12/8).

- No sewer services will be interrupted during our work. Everyone on the block can continue using their sewer-related appliances.
- All traffic will be blocked off on Rutledge between Marcy and Harrison. We are putting up no parking signs for Monday today.
- Pedestrians will still be able to walk in the area.

I have been in touch with all of the schools in the area and they were briefed on the situation

this morning. They all have my phone number and email. I would appreciate help from you all fielding questions about this from the local community and please flag for me if there are any other folks I should add to this chain or connect with on this. Thanks for your help.

# 2026 Lifeguard Recruitment

We're excited to announce that Lifeguard Recruitment Season officially began on October 8th, 2025, at Washington Square Park! Lifeguard qualifying tests began October 25th. Being an NYC Parks Lifeguard is more than a summer job. It challenges you, strengthens you, and builds skills that last a lifetime. We're looking for dedicated, mission-driven individuals to join us in summer 2026 to play a critical role in keeping a close watch on our pools and beaches, making summer happen for millions of New Yorkers.

- In 2025, our lifeguard corps grew significantly, including a 23% increase in new recruits.
- It's never been easier or more rewarding to become a lifeguard, as we've worked to make the testing and position more accessible for new quards.
- Parks had 1,082 lifeguards staffing pools and beaches in summer 2025 the highest total since 2019. We had over 225 beach rescues throughout last summer thanks to our resilient team.

## What's New for 2026?

- The city has reached an agreement to permanently raise the wages for seasonal lifeguards to \$22.00 per hour.
- The city has changed the qualification for shallow water pools, making our tests more accessible for new guards.

#### The Process

- You can find out if you meet the requirements to become an NYC Lifeguard and brush up on your swimming skills at one of our upcoming <a href="Swim Prep sessions">Swim Prep sessions</a>.

# Dear Community Board Members,

I'm writing to bring to your attention an ongoing issue that's affecting quality of life for residents near the newly opened Naxos restaurant at 470 Driggs Avenue. Before I describe the problem, I want to acknowledge that Naxos appears to be a great addition to our neighbourhood - the type of establishment that contributes to the vibrancy we all value.

However, their recently started operations are creating significant disruptions that are incompatible with residential life. The issue centers on excessive noise from their speaker system, specifically low-frequency bass that penetrates the surrounding buildings. This isn't occasional - it's a recurring problem that violates NYC Code provisions.

### **NYC Code Issues:**

Heavy bass is plainly audible within residential units and the building stairwell

- Disturbing noise occur during quiet hours (after 10 PM)
- The establishment frequently operates beyond their stated closing time of midnight

There's been a high volume of persistent 311 complaints

Attempts at Direct Resolution: I've made good faith efforts to resolve this directly with the restaurant operator. On opening night, I invited him into my apartment where he personally acknowledged the sound was plainly audible and gave me his phone number. Despite this acknowledgment and multiple follow-up requests - including after 10pm - the volume hasn't been lowered.

Law Enforcement Response: I spoke with Officer Fletesuarez (Shield No. 23171) in the early morning hours of December 7th, 2025. He confirmed there've been persistent 311 complaints and that this is a serious issue. He spoke to the operator who claimed to be keeping the volume down, but once the Officer left around 12:45am, the restaurant immediately turned their music up higher than normal. Based on this volume pattern, we can deduce they know when police are around and intentionally turn down the volume, then turn it back up when police leave.

**Personal Impact:** The thumping bass interferes with my sleep and causes anxiety. For the first time in my adult life, I am experiencing anxiety, irritability and increased sensitivity to noise that's starting to interfere with other parts of my life, including my ability to perform at work and social relationships. This destroys the habitability of my home.

Since this is having such a detrimental impact on my mental health and ability to work, I'll have to vacate soon if this doesn't resolve: likely having to leave the neighbourhood due to the increased cost of new leases.

I initially chose to live here because it's close to my family in Queens and a quick commute to work in Union Square. Over time, I've built the friendships that define my life here and losing my community would be devastating. The noise and ensuing health issues have made my apartment go from a safe haven, to a place that feels callous and uninhabitable. I love living here, but I am being forced to choose between my health and my home.

**Community Impact:** This undermines the habitability of neighboring residences.

**Proposed Resolution**: The Community Board should compel the restaurant to decrease volume significantly within the establishment until they can invest in further soundproofing. It would be in everyone's interest to solve this expeditiously; letting this go on sets a bad precedent for how we treat residential quality of life in our neighborhood.

They've demonstrated they'll randomly turn up the volume and turn it down when

enforcement is present: flagrantly flouting law enforcement is troubling behaviour from a new community member. Given the operator's failure to respect direct requests and their flagrant flouting of law enforcement, I believe Community Board intervention is necessary before this escalates further.
