- Operates 10 bus routes, including the B38, B47, B57, B60, B62, and Q59
- 1,032 buses pulling in and out of the depot every weekday, including over 80 movements during the busiest hour
- Significant operational difficulties for pull-in and pull-out due to truck traffic and congestion from Grand St Bridge, resulting in longer wait times and less reliable service for riders
- Improvements along Grand Avenue that prioritize bus service and depot access will result in more reliable, faster buses in an area lacking direct subway service



- Buses speeds are as low as 4 MPH in some sections










Existing Conditions: Street Width

- Street width is around 50 feet for the length of the corridor
- Between Metropolitan Av and the Long Island Expressway, each direction has a 25-foot combined moving and parking lane
- Painted bike lanes between 74th Street and Queens Boulevard
 - No bike facilities or sharrows in other sections









DOT Projects

- Queens Boulevard Capital Project
 - Pedestrian, bike, and bus improvements
 - Starting construction in Fall 2026
- Grand St, Metropolitan Av, Morgan Av Street Improvement Project
 - Improvements to address blocked bike lanes, bus stops, and sidewalks; poor visibility for pedestrians, cyclists, and drivers; and slow bus speeds
- Grand St Bridge Reconstruction
 - Formal environmental review process expected to begin in 2025

1. ONE-WAY CONVERSION OF NORTH 6TH STREET/NORTH 6TH PLACE.

At the request of Councilmember Lincoln Restler.

Ms. Kelly McCabe, Councilmember Restlers Office.

Ms. Kelly McCabe from CM Restler's office presented a proposal to convert North 6th Street and North 6th Place, west of Kent Avenue, from a two-way to a one-way configuration. Ms. Roseann Needleman appeared on behalf of the Condo Board of Edge and residents of the impacted blocks to advocate for this change. She noted their concerns about safety, double parking, difficult pedestrian crossings, congestion and conflicts between motorists. The committee discussed how a one-way configuration would help calm these blocks and provide additional space for pedestrian circulation, loading zones, a necessary extension of the North 6th Street bike lane and an improved public realm

Ms. Ronda Messer of NYC DOT explained the history of past opposition from the developer to this conversion that date back to the construction period. The committee agreed that the needs and concerns of the residents outweigh any opposition from the developer. However, no representatives of the developer appeared in opposition.

The committee also discussed potential changes to North 7th Street since there seem to be challenges of unmarked ASP rules which has lead to car storage which prevents DSNY from properly cleaning the street. The committee also discussed how these year round issues are amplified during the months that Smorgesburg operates.

Biography of Deacon German Martinez

Deacon German Martinez was born on October 11th, 1937 in Arecibo, Puerto Rico, the eldest son of Angel and Generosa Martinez. Along with three younger siblings, the family lived in a two-room tin-roof home at the base of a hill that collected loose oranges from the surrounding fruit trees. By the age of six, German's parents had contracted tuberculosis and passed away leaving German and his younger siblings to be taken care of by their aunt. Two years later, German, at the age of eight, would sell the oranges he could collect on the side of the road to help support his family, turning what little he had into something of value for those he loved. This would become a throughline of his life.

As a teenager, German worked in rum factories and as a tabaquero in Puerto Rico before migrating to New York City in 1955 along with droves of other Boricuas. He moved into the city with a cousin without speaking a word of English yet. There, he began working at the Fulton Fish Market in Manhattan and began his new life in New York City.

On January 1st, 1960, German accompanied a group of friends to the airport to help pick up their family members flying in from Puerto Rico. What he expected to be an inconsequential trip to the airport became a life changing event for German when off the plane stepped Edith Medina, the soon-to-be love of his life and future mother of his children; his partner for life. Within six months of meeting, the two were married. Over the next 57 years, German and Edith would be inseparable and become integral parts of the Los Sures community in Southside Williamsburg, Brooklyn, first residing at 366 Hewes Street, later moving to 387 S 4th Street before moving to 266 S 2nd Street and then finally to 372 Hooper Street, one of the first HDFC status tenements in the entire city for which German would serve as the President. Throughout these years, German also worked as a handyman with Southside United Housing – Los Sures for the community, providing an essential service to his community while building relationships throughout the neighborhood.

On June 14, 1974, German was ordained as a Deacon, becoming the first Hispanic Deacon in history of the Brooklyn Diocese. German would serve the parish of Transfiguration Church in Williamsburg. It was not until 1977 that the first class of a Latino diaconate was formed in the diocese by then-Bishop of Brooklyn Francis Mugavero. German would serve his entire service of over 40 years as a Deacon with Transfiguration Church.

As Deacon German Martinez, he would go on to baptize over 3,000 children in the community over his career and married hundreds of couples in the Church as well. German administered the last rites to those who were sick and dying for years as well. However, his charity did not end there either. German worked at Casa Betsaida, where he cared for homeless individuals living with HIV/AIDS, providing a stable, peaceful, and spiritual environment for those suffering and cast away by the rest of the country during the AIDS crisis. He served his community over the years all alongside his wife Edith who also served the community as part of the Sagrado Corazon de Jesus Cristo at Transfiguration Church. In addition to all of this, German was heavily involved with the youth of the community, counseling those at risk of joining gangs by being someone they could go to for advice and help. German regularly fed the homeless and never hesitated to give to the poor, even at one point welcoming the homeless into his own home for a Thanksgiving dinner. Even after retiring and moving to Woodhaven, Queens with his daughter and her

family, German was still a regular fixture of Southside Williamsburg, still continuing his charitable work alongside his wife and friends in the parish.

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German and Edith had two children, German Jr. and their daughter Edith. German Jr. would tragically pass away in 1981, a wound both German and Edith would mend for years to come. Their daughter Edith would go on to take care of them in their retirement and old age, being the sole caregiver for both her mother Edith who passed away in 2017 and subsequently German in 2024. German, like his wife, passed away peacefully at home surrounded by the family they had built.

Deacon German Martinez passed away on April 23rd, 2024. He's survived by his daughter Edith, grandchildren Victor, Jason, Hailey, and Robert, and his great-grandchildren John, Sophia, Brandon, and Charlotte.

German Martinez loved his community and served it with pride, thus was his mission in life.



She was a graduate of the National Congress of Neighborhood Women's college program where she used her voice to empower other women in her community to lean into their passion for social justice to fight for others, like organizing to demand youth services in Williamsburg. She volunteered her time serving on the NYCHA's Citywide Council of Presidents and on the 94th Community Council Precinct. Additionally, you know you could find Ms. Jackson fighting along neighbors of GREC demanding improvements to air quality and against the unjust closing of Greenpoint Hospital.

Her husband, daughter, sons, family and Cooper Park family have requested this co-naming in her honor. I believe co-naming streets for those exceptional and generous spirits is what helps communities mourn, heal, and remind us all of the shoulders in which we stand on. I look forward to celebrating her legacy with the larger community and thank you for your consideration.



The Transportation Committee met Wednesday 30, 2024 (CALLED TO ORDER: 6:41 PM; ADJOURNED: 8:50 PM) at Swinging Sixties Senior Center, 211 Ainslie Street.

A quorum was met.

AGENDA

1. ONE-WAY CONVERSION OF NORTH 6TH STREET/NORTH 6TH PLACE.

At the request of Councilmember Lincoln Restler.

Ms. Kelly McCabe, Councilmember Restlers Office.

Ms. Kelly McCabe from CM Restler's office presented a proposal to convert North 6th Street and North 6th Place, west of Kent Avenue, from a two-way to a one-way configuration. Ms. Roseann Needleman appeared on behalf of the Condo Board of Edge and residents of the impacted blocks to advocate for this change. She noted their concerns about safety, double parking, difficult pedestrian crossings, congestion and conflicts between motorists. The committee discussed how a one-way configuration would help calm these blocks and provide additional space for pedestrian circulation, loading zones, a necessary extension of the North 6th Street bike lane and an improved public realm

Ms. Ronda Messer of NYC DOT explained the history of past opposition from the developer to this conversion that date back to the construction period. The committee agreed that the needs and concerns of the residents outweigh any opposition from the developer. However, no representatives of the developer appeared in opposition.

The committee also discussed potential changes to North 7th Street since there seem to be challenges of unmarked ASP rules which has lead to car storage which prevents DSNY from properly cleaning the street. The committee also discussed how these year round issues are amplified during the months that Smorgesburg operates.

Brooklyn Community Board 1 supports the community request to convert North 6th Street and North 6th Place to ONE-WAY TRAVEL Westbound & Northbound respectively. NYC DOT should include in its analysis additional measures for access and safety including but not limited to commercial and neighborhood loading zones, curb bulb outs and extension of the North 6th bike lane. In addition, NYC DOT should consider a ONE-WAY Eastbound conversion of North 7th Street EAST OF NORTH 6TH PLACE. Mr. Costa SECOND: Mr. Vega.

The committee heard a presentation from BK01 Alum Mr. Esteban Duran and the grandson of Deacon German Martinez, a deacon at the Transfiguration Church. He described his grandfather's life story, his dedication to the church, and remarkable years of service to the community. A petition garnered more than 200 signatures in support of the co-naming of the NE corner of Hooper and South 3rd.

The committee heard a presentation from BK01 Alum Ms. Karen Leader and Mr. Elijah Fye members of the Cooper Park Resident Council, about the contributions of Ms. Dianne Jackson to her community. The committee was in agreement that a co-naming of the corner of Jackson and Debevoise would appropriately recognize her remarkable life story and significant dedication to improving the Cooper Park neighborhood.

Mr. Bruzaitis noted that it was his honor to support this co-naming as Ms. Jackson, having worked and fought with her on issues around the former Greenpoint Hospital campus.

Mr. Vega also noted his personal relationship with Ms. Jackson in working with the community. She truly is a legend.

4. <u>DISCUSSION: SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS PROPOSED FOR THE AREA AROUND</u> <u>KENT AVENUE & PENN STREET.</u>

Presented by CB1 Member Bella Sabel

The presenter, Ms. Bella Sabel, was not in attendance. The committee generally discussed the safety challenges of the streets in the vicinity of Kent Avenue and Penn Place, in particular the dangerous pedestrian crossing at the Citgo gas station. Since the DOT performed a pedestrian count of this intersection within the past 3 years, Mr. Weiser offered to gather additional data about student intersection crossings which might influence whether the DOT will be willing to conduct a new study before the required 3 year wait.

The committee will take up the issue at a future meeting.

5. Old Business

Mr. Bruzaitis requested that members of the board submit suggestions for intersections that could be made safer through daylighting. Mr. Pferd agreed to create a map to help organize all of the submissions.

Ms. Breitner asked for an update on the plan for Metropolitan/Morgan/Grand. Ms. Messer from the NYCDOT informed the committee that a plan would likely be ready for a presentation in the first half of 2025.

Ms. Breitner asked for an update on the capital funding for Commercial Street. Ms Messer had no new information to share.

Ms. Breitner asked for an update on the installation of a much-needed crosswalk on Bedford, which cuts through McCarren Park between North 12th and Lorimer. A crosswalk is needed to improve safety and visibility for pedestrians traversing between the softball fields and the tennis bubble. A discussion ensued about different kinds of crosswalks, daylighting, unsignalized crosswalks but there was no clear resolution.

6. New Business

CB1 member Mr. Lloyd Feng informed the group that the Public Safety committee will be discussing ideas at the November 6th meeting for street safety as it relates to ebikes, mopeds, and other new micromobility vehicles.

Mr. Jason Gers, a parent of an MS50 student, made suggestions for improving street safety for students walking to and from school. The specific intersections include South 5th

and Havemeyer, where fast-moving car traffic exits the Williamsburg Bridge, and the Roebling Street entrance to the Williamsburg Bridge, which bisects a popular park with playground. The committee recommended that Mr. Gerz gather signatures from other parents, teachers, and students at MS 50 to help make the case that additional street safety measures are needed. Mr. Kelterborn noted that a request for a study of the Roebling entrance to the bridge was included in the most recent District Needs Report, but was removed at the request of the Capital Budget Committee.

Mr. Bruzaitis stated that the committee will take up the item at a future meeting.

Committee members discussed adding Sammy's Law and Red Light Cameras to the November meeting agenda. Mr. Bruzaitis noted that he would check to see if there is a deadline for submitting requests to DOT for reduced speed limits, per the new Sammy's Law legislation which allows the city more discretion to set speed limits.

Meeting was adjourned at 8:50 PM.

VII. DECLARATION OF VACANCY AND ATTENDANCE COMMITTEE

A. SINCE A QUORUM IS NECESSARY TO DO BUSINESS, DILIGENT ATTENDANCE AT MEETINGS IS A PREREQUISITE TO CONTINUED MEMBERSHIP ON THE BOARD. SINCE THE CITY CHARTER PERMITS THE BOARD TO REMOVE MEMBERS, THE FOLLOWING PROCEDURES FOR REMOVAL DUE TO EXCESSIVE ABSENCES SHALL BE FOLLOWED.

1. WHEN A MEMBER FAILS TO ATTEND 5 OF THE COMBINED REGULAR/PUBLIC HEARINGS REQUIRED BY THESE BY-LAWS DURING THE COURSE OF THE CALENDAR YEAR, THEY SHALL BE SUBJECT TO REMOVAL PROCEDINGS.

2. THERE SHALL BE AN ELECTED ATTENDANCE COMMITTEE OF THREE MEMBERS.

3. THE ATTENDANCE COMMITTEE SHALL KEEP A RECORD OF THE ATTENDANCE OF EACH MEMBER OF THE BOARD AT ALL REGULAR AND PUBLIC HEARING MEETINGS. IN ORDER TO ASSIST THIS EFFORT, ALL ATTENDING MEMBERS SHALL BE REQUIRED TO SIGN A SIGN-IN SHEET AT EACH MEETING IN ORDER TO DOCUMENT THEIR PRESENCE.

ABSENCES DUE TO DEATH, ILLNESS, A FAMILY EMERGENCY, OR FOR SOME OTHER REASONABLE TYPE OF EXPLANATION ARE EXCUSABLE IF APPROVED BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OR, IN THE CASE OF COMMITTEE MEETINGS, BY A MAJORITY OF THE BOARD MEMBERS PRESENT AT THE MEETING. THE ATTENDANCE COMMITTEE SHALL MONITOR SUCH ABSENCES. MEMBER MUST NOTIFY THE BOARD'S OFFICE PRIOR TO THE MEETING.

5. THE ATTENDANCE COMMITTEE SHALL NOTIFY A BOARD MEMBER, WHO HAS BEEN ABSENT FROM FOUR MEETINGS IN WRITING, BY PHONE OR IN PERSON WITHIN FIVE DAYS OF THE LAST ABSENCE. AT THAT MEETING THE MEMBER SHALL BE INFORMED OF THEIR ATTENDANCE RECORD AND BE PROVIDED WITH AN OPPORTUNITY TO PROVIDE ANY JUSTIFICATIONS AND/OR EXCUSES FOR SAID ABSENCES. AFTER HAVING HEARD THE MEMBER'S RESPONSE, THE COMMITTEE WILL THEN VOTE ON WHETHER OR NOT TO RECOMMEND THE MEMBER'S REMOVAL. SHOULD THE COMMITTEE RECOMMEND THE MEMBER'S REMOVAL, THE ATTENDANCE COMMITTEE SHALL REPORT SAID RECOMMENDATION TO THE BOARD AT IT'S NEXT MEETING, AT WHICH THE BOARD SHALL DETERMINE BY MAJORITY VOTE WHETHER OR NOT TO ACCEPT THE RECOMMENDATION TO REMOVE THE MEMBER. 7. NOTICE OF DECLARATION OF VACANCY, ALONG WITH COPIES OF ALL RELATED MATERIALS, SHALL BE SENT TO THE BOROUGH PRESIDENT AND THE MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL REPRESENTING THE AREA.

8. THE MEMBER IN QUESTION MAY APPEAL TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE FOR REVIEW OF THE RECORDS OF ATTENDANCE.

9. THE ATTENDANCE COMMITTEE SHALL ISSUE A WRITTEN QUARTERLY REPORT IN APRIL, JULY, OCTOBER, AND JANUARY LISTING THE NUMBER OF MEETINGS HELD, MEETING DATES, AND THE ATTENDANCE RECORD OF EACH MEMBER. THE JANUARY REPORT SHALL PROVIDE THE FINAL ATTENDANCE RECORDS OF ALL BOARD MEMBERS FROM THE PREVIOUS CALENDAR YEAR, AND SHALL BE FORWARDED TO THE BOROUGH PRESIDENT AND THE LOCAL COUNCIL MEMBERS. COMMITTEE ATTENDANCE OF BOARD MEMBERS SHALL BE ISSUED QUARTERLY. COMMITTEE MINUTES SHALL SHOW THE BOARD MEMBERS PRESENT AND ABSENT FROM THE COMMITTEE MEETING.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

A. PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THESE BY-LAWS SHALL BE SUBMITTED IN WRITING TO THE CHAIR AND REFERRED TO THE BY-LAWS COMMITTEE.

B. THE BY-LAWS COMMITTEE SHALL REPORT TO THE BOARD AT THE NEXT REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD.

C. THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT SHALL BE MAILED TO EACH MEMBER OF THE BOARD WITH THE MEETING NOTICE FOR THE NEXT MEETING.

D. AMENDMENTS MUST BE APPROVED BY A TWO-THIRDS MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS PRESENT AND VOTING.

IX. ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER

ROBERT'S RULE OF ORDER SHALL GOVERN THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD IN ALL CASES EXCEPT WHERE OTHER RULES HAVE BEEN ESTABLISHED BY THE CITY CHARTER APPLICABLE CITY AND STATE LAW OR REGULATION, THESE BY-LAWS, OR OTHER RULING ESTABLISHED BY THE MAJORITY VOTE OF THE BOARD.

X. VOTING

A. ALL MEMBERS WHO ARE PRESENT FOR PURPOSE OF ATTENDANCE PER ARTICLE VIII MUST VOTE ON ALL MOTIONS, INCLUDING QUESTIONS OF ORDER. VOTES SHALL BE CAST AND RECORDED ONLY AS AFFIRMATIVE, NEGATIVE, ABSTENTION OR ABSTENTION FOR CAUSE. Decisions Made and Next Steps:

- Motion: for CB1 to send a letter to FDNY in support of a new firehouse in North Brooklyn, requesting a study/needs assessment. *This motion will need to be approved at the next full board meeting on 11/12/24*.
- Motion: for CB1 to send a letter to FDNY requesting data related to CB1's emergency vehicle transport response times, staffing, and demand. *This motion will need to be approved at the next full board meeting on 11/12/24.*
- Motion: for CB1 to send a letter to the NYC Sheriff's Office requesting information from the Sheriff's Office regarding the status of inspections of illegal shops in CB1 as well as the procedures and requirements that they must follow. *This motion will need to be approved at the next full board meeting on 11/12/24.*
- Captain Navarette of the 94th Precinct committed to providing data over the last year related to crimes committed involving a moped.

District Needs:

The meeting began with committee member Gina Barros, in her role as CB1 Capital Budget Committee chair, providing an overview of the district needs of CB1, specifically related to public safety and human services. Barros announced that beginning with the development of CB1's FY27 district needs statement, she and Committee Chair Lloyd Feng who also serves as co-chair for the Capital Budget Committee, will require each CB1 committee to discuss and finalize their committee's district needs by May/June 2025 in order for CB1, Capital Budget Committee, and the community to have greater transparency into what specific needs will be included in the final district needs statement. Barros is encouraging all committees to include district needs as a regular agenda item in all committee meetings for the year.

Chair Feng and Barros shared that the Public Safety & Human Services Committee's FY26 district needs were similar to the previous years' distinct needs since the committee did not have enough time to thoroughly discuss whether to remove, keep, or edit the district needs for FY26. The FY26 district needs statement seeks more funding to hire police officers for the 90th and 94th Precincts, to build a new firehouse to serve North Brooklyn, and to build a medical facility to replace Greenpoint Hospital. Committee members expressed interest in exploring restoring a firehouse and medical facilities to North Brooklyn, considering the rapid increase in population and housing stock over the last decade as well as what looks to be continued population growth for CB1.

Chair Feng proposed a motion for CB1 to send a letter to FDNY in support of reopening the firehouse given the rapid population growth and to propose a study or needs assessment. Included in the letter will be a request for information as to what the process is for an additional firehouse to be built, staffed, and resourced in a community. Co-chair Rosemary Espinal seconded the motion and all committee members in attendance voted in favor of it. *This motion will need to be approved at the next full board meeting on 11/12/24*.

Committee member John Rozmus raised the issue of emergency vehicle transport, specifically whether FDNY has experienced any operational issues, longer response times, or greater demand for response services in recent years. Committee member Rozmus made a motion for CB1 to send a letter to FDNY requesting data related to CB1's emergency vehicle transport response times, staffing, and demand. Chair Feng seconded the motion and the committee members voted unanimously to support it. *This motion will need to be approved at the next full board meeting on 11/12/24*.

NYPD:

Commanding Officer of the 94th Precinct Captain Jonathan Navarrete provided an update to the community and field questions on a number of public safety issues. We very much appreciate Captain Navarrete's time and patience in meeting with our committee and community members. Captain Navarrete shared that the precinct continues to respond to grand larceny (retail establishments, vehicle theft, package theft, and pickpocketing) and felony assault crimes, including fights in bars. The precinct has made several arrests in regard to these crimes.

The 90th Precinct was not in attendance at the meeting.

Cannabis (legal and illegal):

A community member expressed strong concerns about the cannabis retail applicant at 807 Manhattan Avenue or the former Williamsburg Savings Bank due to the lack of clarity over the applicant's safety plan for the site. The site of the cannabis retailer is connected to an adjoining residential building whereby any attempted robberies of the retailer could pose significant dangers for residents. For instance, if perpetrators rob the shop, they may very well attempt to leave through the passage that connects the cannabis shop to the residential building, thereby placing the individuals and families living there at risk. CB1 board member and chair of the Cannabis Review Committee William Vega shared that this safety concern was raised at the previous Cannabis Review Committee meeting, and was clearly expressed as a top priority for the applicant to address with community members in the coming weeks.

Vega asked Captain Navarrete whether the 94th Precinct continues to close illegal cannabis shops in Greenpoint and Williamsburg. Capt. Navarrete clarified that illegal cannabis store closures and raids are under the jurisdiction of the NYC Sheriff's Office and that NYPD officers merely assist them in certain operations. Any goods or money confiscated in the NYC Sheriff's illegal cannabis search and seizure operations are under the Sheriff's oversight. Capt. Navarrete stated that some illegal shops are able to reopen after being closed as a result of legal rulings and orders by judges. He stated that 19 illegal shops have been closed in the confines of the 94th Precinct.

Vega conveyed the frustration of his committee, from community members, and from legal cannabis establishment applicants over the lack of clarity and constant changing rules, regulations,

procedures, and enforcement from the NYS Office of Cannabis Management (OCM) and the NYC Sheriff's Office. Vega asked the committee to consider a motion to request information from the Sheriff's Office regarding the status of inspections of illegal shops in CB1 as well as the procedures and requirements that they must follow. Chair Feng made the motion, seconded by Co-Chair Espinal, and unanimously supported by committee members. *This motion will need to be approved at the next full board meeting on 11/12/24*.

Another member of the public in attendance expressed her concern of illegal cannabis sales happening near the American Playground located on Franklin Street and Milton Street. Committee members and Vega encouraged her to send an email to BK1 about the specific location and details about the illicit activity.

Transportation safety concerns:

CB1 member Meryl, who was in attendance at the meeting, asked Captain Navarrete about enforcement by the precinct of illegally parked vehicles on bike lanes and further stated that she has made multiple complaints to 311 about a specific personal vehicle that frequently parks on McGuinness Boulevard and that she has taken photos of this vehicle. Meryl gave Capt. Navarrete particular information on location and times when this vehicle engages in illegal parking on bike lanes at the location.

E-Vehicle Safety Alliance presentation and discussion:

The committee dedicated this meeting to address ongoing community concerns about e-vehicle safety, featuring a presentation by Janet Schroeder, Co-founder of the E-Vehicle Safety Alliance NYC (EVSA NYC).

Some important takeaways from the conversation:

- "E-vehicle" can mean a moped used recreationally or as a mode of transportation by delivery workers, electric scooters where the rider stands up to ride, e-bikes by CitiBike, and other e-vehicles with more technical differences. It is important to clarify which specific e-vehicle is being discussed at hand given the complexities of safety and regulatory issues for each kind of e-vehicle.
- There may be some discrepancies/devils in the details about specific city or state legislation. Our conversation waded into them with the help of CB1 member and chair of the By-Laws Committee Austin Pferd (also, a Transportation Committee member) who has professional experience managing micromobility hubs and delivery workers.
- I have included resources at the end of the report about EVSA NYC's proposed legislation along with

EVSA Overview

- Represents over 1,100 members across four boroughs
- Notably includes cyclists and e-bike users in membership
- Focus is on accountability for e-vehicle operators and riders

- Not anti-e-bike, but advocates for safety regulations
- Priorities:
 - Passage of Priscilla's Law
 - E-bike regulation in parks
 - Mandatory CitiBike rider safety education
 - Delivery app regulation

Current Issues

1. Accident statistics are an undercount of e-vehicle collisions and victims

- There's been only 94 documented victims of e-vehicle collisions.
- In 90 out of 94 cases, perpetrators fled the scene.
- 23 out of 30 bike fatalities involved e-bikes
- Most incidents go unreported because the operator/rider of the e-vehicle leaves the scene.
- NYPD officials have publicly confirmed there are frequent hit-and-run incidents involving e-vehicles.

2. <u>Case Study: Priscilla Loke Incident</u>

- Priscilla Loke, 69, died following a collision by a Citi e-bike rider.
- Rider was allegedly traveling at 15 mph.
- Victim had the right of way.
- Perpetrator only received a red-light ticket.
- Took two weeks to identify the responsible party.

3. <u>Legislative Efforts</u>

o Priscilla's Law (Intro 0606-2024)

i.Requires the registration of e-bikes and scooters with DOT

ii.Requires Identifying numbers displayed on vehicles

iii.Current status:

1. 31 council members support the bill, three short of the 34-council member threshold needed for an automatic hearing and vote on a bill. CB1's CM Lincoln Restler and CM Jennifer Gutierrez are not yet in support of the bill.

NYPD Perspective

- 1. Vehicle Identification and Pursuit
 - Police unable to chase suspects on bikes
 - CitiBike lacks real-time GPS tracking
 - Requires subpoenas of CitiBike to identify riders
 - Investigation process through CIS (Collision Investigation Squad) includes:
 - Review of camera footage
 - Investigation of bike docking stations
 - Subpoena process for rider identification
- 2. Vehicle Regulation Issues
 - Proliferation of illegal modifications
 - Shops selling scooters capable of 50+ mph

- Legal placards being placed on illegal bikes
- Difficulty controlling moped sales at source
- Challenge of distinguishing between legal and illegal modifications
- 3. Delivery Service Complications
 - Delivery apps incentivize faster speeds
 - Most delivery workers are contractors, complicating accountability
 - Complex relationship between restaurants, apps, and delivery workers
 - o Limited enforcement of existing delivery worker regulations
- 4. Data Collection Barriers
 - Limited ability to track e-bike related crimes
 - Incomplete accident reporting
 - Difficulty gathering data when perpetrators flee
 - Challenge of building legislative support without comprehensive data

Community Feedback

Supporting views:

1. Victim Experiences

- CB1 Transportation Committee member Dr. Eric Radezsky shared that he previously experienced a head-on collision with a moped in a hit-and-run that resulted in significant damage to his bicycle.
- Committee member Esther Judelson shared her experience of being a victim of a hit-and-run collision with a moped on the Williamsburg Bridge, her medical recovery, and the lack of accountability despite having multiple witness accounts and organizing a petition with numerous signatures from residents.
- Multiple unreported incidents shared.
- Difficulties in obtaining accountability after accidents.
- Concerns about incident documentation and follow-up.

2. <u>Safety Advocates</u>

- Judelson emphasized pedestrian safety concerns.
- There can be support for both infrastructure safety upgrades like bike lanes *and* safety measures by way of regulating e-bikes, e-scooters, and mopeds.
- Interest in better incident reporting mechanisms.
- Highlighted "harrowing" experiences in seeking accountability.

Opposing Views:

1. <u>Transportation Equity Advocates</u>

- Heidi: Lives in transit desert, relies on e-bikes
 - Notes affordability issues in neighborhood
 - E-bikes provide safer alternative to driving
 - Essential for longer-distance travel
 - Physical limitations make regular bikes impractical

2. <u>Delivery Worker Perspectives</u>

- Existing regulations sufficient but poorly enforced
- Infrastructure improvements needed over additional regulation
- o Concerns about impact on working-class delivery workers

3. Economic and Social Justice Concerns

- Warnings about negative impact on undocumented immigrants in delivery worker laborforce
- Concerns about increased CitiBike costs during G train shutdown if increased regulations were to be applied to CitiBike
- Concerns about affordability and accessibility for individuals who live far away from subway stations and who cannot use or afford to drive a car.

4. Infrastructure Advocates

- Emphasis on the distinction between bikes/e-bikes and mopeds
- Insufficient infrastructure for increased demand for biking and e-biking
- Criticism of poorly placed CitiBike docks whereby a rider would need to ride a CitiBike or Citi e-bike on the sidewalk in order to safely ride
- Suggested focus on more safety-oriented infrastructure for cyclists and pedestrians over new laws

NYPD 90th and 94th Precinct Updates:

Captain Luis Peña provided the update for the 94th Precinct. He reported that the precinct has observed an increase in grand larceny auto (GLA) crimes, particularly targeting the following vehicles: Hondas (CRVs, Acuras, and Accords) and Toyotas. Compared to the same 28-day period from 2023, there has been a marked 200% increase in GLAs (21 compared to 7).

The precinct has also received increased reports of shoplifting, particularly from the Lululemon at 129 N 6th Street, the CVS at 27 N 6th Street, and the Nike at 81 N 6th Street. Such instances of shoplifting contributed to the rise in grand larcenies, a slight increase from the number of such crimes for the same 28-day period last year (61 compared to 59). Captain Peña shared that Lululemon has a policy of *not* calling police immediately after a larceny, and only reporting the incident after the fact. Burglaries, on the other hand, have skyrocketed for the same 28-day period (20 as opposed to 6).

In regards to crime related to migrants, Captain Peña reports that the 94th Precinct continues to encounter migrant perpetrators of crime committing crime using mopeds as their method of transportation like a getaway vehicle. The crimes committed are generally cellphone snatches of unassuming pedestrians and a very small number of robberies at high-end restaurants. Captain Peña explained that one observed strategy of these thefts is for two or more perpetrators to work together to target a single victim; one person is tasked with identifying a person to target who then calls another accomplice on the phone to alert him/her if the target has an expensive watch or piece of jewelry. The second person traveling by moped then approaches the target and forcibly removes the phone or jewelry or coerces the target to surrender the piece of jewelry. Once the phone or jewelry is obtained, the perpetrator escapes via moped.

Captain Peña clarified that NYPD officers are not authorized to ask questions related to a person's status directly. However, when officers apprehend a suspected criminal or perpetrator, it is natural practice for officers to request the person to provide identification to which the suspect will identify himself/herself as having arrived in the country only recently, enabling officers to ascertain with confidence whether the perpetrator is a migrant or resident.

The 90th Precinct did not attend the meeting so our committee and public were not able to receive any update from the 90th Precinct.

NYC Department of Social Services (DSS)/Human Resources Administration (HRA):

Jamar Hooks, DSS Deputy Commissioner of Intergovernmental and Legislative Affairs, stated that the U.S. Congress passed legislation (the program was set to expire in September 2024, but the U.S. Congress passed a continuing resolution that will keep the program funded through December 2024; another piece of legislation is needed in order to fund the program further and disburse funds to victims) to approve a reimbursement program for victims of "skimming," a crime in which perpetrators steal vital information from a person's electronic benefit transfer (EBT) card in order to access the funds in the card. Deputy Commissioner Hooks reported that there have been over 100,000 people victims of this skimming in New York City alone. DSS has been alerting the public through posts on social media, and informational fliers in local bodegas. Hooks

shared that although DSS does not have enforcement authority to target the scammers, the NYS Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance (OTDA) and the NYC Department of Investigation (DOI) do; DOI is investigating such crimes already and efforts are underway to locate devices used to copy EBT card information. In terms of compensation to victims of skimming, \$35 million has been provided to victims so far. Chair Feng requested that Deputy Commissioner Hooks provide data where possible on the number of identified victims of skimming in CB1 so far, average amount skimmed from victims, and the total amount skimmed from victims in CB1.

Hooks also explained that EBT cards are particularly vulnerable to being cloned since they do not currently use the more modernized and higher-security card chips that credit card companies generally use. He shared that there is **active legislation in the NYS legislature that would require EBT card companies to institute security chips on EBT cards** in order to protect EBT cardholders from predatory skimming scams. Committee members asked Hooks to send information about the legislation and for DSS literature to provide CB1 residents about ways of protecting themselves from skimming and resources for people who suspect they may be victims of skimming.

Committee member Rozmus motioned to write a letter to CB1's elected representatives, to request that they urge New York State to implement more secure chips on electronic benefits cards and support NYS legislation that would require such security upgrades to protect New Yorkers. The motion was seconded by Committee Chair Feng and approved unanimously by committee members present. *This motion will need to be approved at the next full board meeting on 11/12/24*.

Migrant Situation:

For this portion of the meeting, DSS/HRA was joined by the NYC Office of Asylum Seeker Operations (OASO) to provide updates and answer questions from committee members and members of the public. Daniel Henry, Deputy Commissioner DSS/Director of External Affairs, and Martin Fatooh, Senior Advisor and Intergovernmental Affairs Manager, represented OASO.

Henry explained that OASO is the agency coordinating NYC's overall response to the migrant situation, working in conjunction with DHS, the Office of Emergency Management, and Health+Hospitals (H+H). DHS and H+H operate shelters. DSS provides services to eligible individuals. Hooks committed to providing data on such services provided and received.

According to DSS and OASO, since the beginning of 2024, there has been a decrease in migrants arriving in NYC. Since spring 2022, NYC has received approximately 218,000 migrants. Most of the migrants are categorized as "asylum seekers" and as such, are "paroled here legally," and are thus not considered individuals in the country "illegally." He emphasized that "people are here because we are a sanctuary state." Earlier on, there were over 4,000 individuals entering the city and seeking services each week, but the rate of new arrivals to NYC has dropped, attributable to a decrease in other states bussing migrants to the city.

Deputy Commissioner Henry shared that approximately 60,000 of the 218,000 migrants have since left NYC to other parts of the country. NYC operates a "re-ticketing center" whereby it assists migrants who wish to leave NYC. NYC ultimately purchases a plane, train, or bus ticket to enable the migrants to travel on to another part of the country or even internationally, but does not keep any data as to which destinations migrants leave NYC for despite spending resources to not only help identify where migrants intend to depart NYC for, but also spending resources for the actual cost of the journey. Chair Feng asked for information as to where migrants head next after NYC and the cost of re-ticketing services for migrants, but Henry was not able to provide any "because of the nature of who we are as a city." He, however, did share that NYC has spent approximately \$5 billion to address the migrant situation since 2022, which has previously been reported in the media.

Committee members questions/comments:

Committee member Drinkwater asked for an update as to how DSS/HRA is assisting migrants in securing work authorizations, including specific numbers. Hook responded that there have been 76,000 work authorization applications from asylum seekers.

Hooks explained that when DHS identifies a site for a shelter or transitional housing facility, DHS engages in a public notice process. For a non-migrant-serving site, DHS abides by a requirement that it provide at least 30-day public notice to the community that would include the shelter facility. For a migrant-serving site, DHS informs the community board as soon as a site is identified instead of offering a public notice period given the urgent nature of providing housing for migrant populations. Developers can also approach DHS and OASO with potentially suitable sites to house migrants. Henry shared that NYC is currently operating 213 shelter sites across NYC between congregate settings, individual units that are usually for families, and hotels and motels.

The agency representatives stated that the limit for staying at a city-run shelter is 30 days for a single adult or a couple without any children and 60 days for a family with children. The stay does not renew automatically so individuals and families must reapply in order to continue receiving shelter services. Committee member Rozmus asked what happens after the 30-day or 60-day limit. The agency responded that in some extenuating circumstances, the person or family may be given an extension past the 30-day or 60-day limit, respectively, but such extensions are still only temporary. Committee member Drinkwater asked how the shelter stay limit policies have impacted children and minors' education; have students been more forced to relocate schools due to their shelter status or address changing? Hooks responded that he would obtain the information from NYC Public Schools and share back with the committee. He did note that where a family has multiple school-aged children, the city's policy is to prioritize school placement and continuity of education for the youngest child.

Committee co-chair Rosemary Espinal asked for information about the security measures at shelters due to reports of gangs infiltrating the shelter system. The agency stated that there are

metal detectors installed at shelters, and that in addition to security guards present, NYPD personnel are on hand at the sites to provide security, especially in larger facilities.

Committee Chair Feng asked whether there was any systematic demographic information collection on migrants in NYC, including information about migrants' original country of origin, migration journey, age, language spoken, sex, etc. given that the issue has been top of mind for the public since early 2022, but barely any reliable data has been available to the public. Henry responded that they can only say that migrants are coming from Venezuela, Ecuador, and Asia, specifically South, East, and West Asia. Martin Fatooh, Senior Advisor and Intergovernmental Affairs Manager at OASO, also noted that the city's shelters have recorded Ukrainians and West Africans, but could not provide any information over how many or to what proportion. Chair Feng reiterated the need for public access to such agency data that can allay concerns that members of the public currently have amid the persistent lack of such demographic information on migrant populations by numbers or percentages. Henry and Fatooh committed to double-checking which pieces of information OASO can share publicly and to providing the committee with such information.

Chair Feng also asked if the city has information on the total number of migrants across NYC, including migrant populations it directly or indirectly services through shelter operations and any social services it offers, but also migrant populations outside of those, esp. given that many migrants bypass the shelter system entirely and tap into informal networks to seek other forms of housing, employment, and support. Chair Feng asked what percentage of total migrants in NYC are in the shelter system, and Fatooh responded that approximately 60 percent of migrants are in city's care, but emphasized that the city only has reliable data on migrants who are in the city's care.

Committee member Drinkwater asked what efforts are made to connect migrants to services. Henry shared that the Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs (MOIA) assists in identifying services for migrants and connecting them to community-based organizations (CBOs) for support based on the migrant's country of origin and language spoken. In terms of connecting migrants with employment-related support, Henry noted it is easier to help out some migrants depending on their country of origin and that there is a dedicated OASO workforce development team focused on this issue.

Chair Feng asked for information about how many migrant and non-migrant shelters are located in Community Board 1 and what their locations are. Multiple committee members chimed in about locations that they have observed to be shelter facilities, but it was clear that our communities are not clear where DHS facilities are located. Hooks responded that owing to the Department of Homeless Services policy, he cannot provide information on the locations of shelters serving migrants, but could provide a list of DHS-operated shelters serving non-migrant homeless populations.

Committee member Rozmus asked about the specific intake process to take in migrants at the shelters. Committee Co-chair Espinal also asked what identification information is obtained from

persons who enter the shelter system. Fatooh and Henry shared that as part of the migrant intake process into the shelter system migrants receive a medical screening that enables the city to then connect them to the health services as appropriate. Chair Feng asked how the shelter assesses, how they screen individuals for mental health issues and how they receive the help they need. Fatooh shared that ss part of this intake process, migrants are provided access to language translation and interpretation services. In addition to a physical health checkup, migrants also receive mental health checkup and have access to mental health resources. Henry committed to securing more answers for committee members about the specifics of the health screening process along with what specific kinds of health (physical and mental) services are provided to migrants.

Committee member Rozmus asked if migrants' criminal background is checked at all at any point during the intake process. Henry reiterated that due to NYC's sanctuary city status, no agency interfacing with migrant populations asks or collects information related to a migrant's record with the law. Captain Peña also shared that the 94th Precinct does not receive information from or share intelligence with any other law enforcement agencies related to a person's immigration status.

Public session:

Two members of the public attended the committee meeting and spoke to committee members regarding the safe haven transitional housing facility at 83 Apollo Street, operated by Breaking Ground. She stated that residents around the facility do not feel safe due to concerning behaviors of individuals who either live or seek services from the facility. In 2024, there have been cases of adult individuals following children in the area, approaching children with offers of candy, flashing children, throwing feces at school children, and even running into P.S. 110. Other residents have reported package theft. Neighbors have formed a concerned citizens' group that is active on Facebook called '83 Apollo Street Homeless Shelter.' The speakers shared that they've already raised these safety issues with CM Lincoln Restler and AM Emily Gallagher and would like to see more action.

Committee member Drinkwater emphasized the importance of balancing the safety concerns of local residents with the need to ensure that these individuals experiencing mental health issues receive the care they need in order to be healthy enough to transition out of such housing. She reminded attendees that such low-barrier facilities exist to address the needs of individuals who have "fallen through every other crack in society," and would otherwise be even worse off living on the streets of our community or elsewhere, exposed to far greater risks and exposing others to even more safety risks. Drinkwater shared that Breaking Ground has a community advisory board (CAB) that meets regularly and shares updates on its work with residents. She shared information about the upcoming virtual CAB meetings that was circulated to committee members following the meeting. Committee members and members of the public were in agreement with the need to address this issue with compassion and care.

Hooks shared that 83 Apollo Street being a safe haven is a low-barrier shelter and houses 145 single male and female adults. There is no curfew instituted so residents of 83 Apollo Street are free to enter and exit as they wish. He was concerned about these alarming stories of safety issues

for residents and committed to communicating them with Breaking Ground and would revert with an update. He also reiterated that residents should continue flagging these concerns to 311.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER

District Manager, Ms. Johana P. Pulgarin called the District Service Cabinet Meeting to order and noted the agenda which included a round robin session.

ROUND ROBIN SESSION

NEW YORK CITY DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS (DOB): Ms. Milcah Ann Holmes-Thomas, Community Liaison from the DOB's Office of Community Engagement & Programming, introduce herself as the new liaison for Brooklyn Community Board 1.

Ms. Holmes-Thomas gave an update about the Local Law 97 and the parapets. Parapets inspections must be done yearly on the roofs. The roofs must be inspected, the walls. A lot of the people are going crazy because there are people giving quotes of \$1,200 and \$1,500. Ms. Holmes-Thomas said that the work can be done by any licensed contractor. It can be done by a handyman with a license. After the work is done it does not have to be reported to DOB. The report must be kept by the property owner for 6 years. This is why is a bit confusing many people ask so, if I am keeping it for six years why I am doing it? Things change from time to time. Even though it looks good now with the weather things could change. This is why is being done annually. If the walls fall it would be falling within the property and it would not be a public hazard. People are quoting ridicules prices DOB cannot do anything about this, but Ms. Holmes-Thomas advise that people should go with their gut feeling and use the DOB BIS system to be verified if the contractor is licensed.

Ms. Holmes-Thomas related that there are many contractors giving different quotes to people, but it can be due to the size of the building. She said that the important step to do is to check the DOB website and use the BIS system that allows you to put in the contractor's information and verified that the contractor is licenses.

Ms. Pulgarin said that the community board gets calls from property owners asking to recommend contractors. Ms. Pulgarin said that community boards are not allowed to recommend any contractors. Ms. Pulgarin asked if DOB has a list that the property owners can access.

Ms. Homes-Thomas stated that DOB does not have a list, and they cannot recommend. The best way is using the BIS system to ensure that the contractor is licensed. Ms. Holmes-Thomas offer Ms. Pulgarin to do an over the phone training to teach the staff on how to use the system.

Local Law 97, gas piping inspection started in 2020 and because of COVID DOB extended the inspections to 2021. The extension was giving to community board 1, 3 and cross the borough. DOB is trying to get back on tract and homeowners are asking why are the inspections starting if this was every four years? Ms. Homes stated that because of extension given during Covid the owners has to the inspections.

Ms. Holmes-Thomas said that another thing is that many people turn their garages into living spaces. Ms. Holmes suggested that homeowners hire a licensed master plumber to rule out that there is no gas pipe. Once the inspection is done the name of the owner will be taken of the DOB list for Local Law 97.

Ms. Pulgarin asked how are the owners being contacted regarding the Local Law 97 if by mail? Ms. Holmes-Thomas replied that they are getting a letter.

Ms. Pulgarin asked that if in the letter there is a number to call DOB if the Owner has questions. Ms. Holmes said she was not sure but if they have questions, they can contact the community board and then we can send her the questions.

District Manager Johana Pulgarin, stated that community board gets a lot of complaints regarding homeowners asking about the regulations for the height on property fences. The Constituents are upset that they are being fined by DOB. Ms. Pulgarin asked Ms. Holmes-Thomas to Clarified what is the legal size the fences are supposed to be.

Ms. Holmes-Thomas believes that the size of the fence should be in the front 4 feet and under and 6 feet on the sides of the fence. She was not sure about the DOB specification of the rules for fences but that she will investigate it and get back to us.

Ms. Pulgarin asked if there was an update on scaffold? Ms. Holmes- Thomas said that a lot of property owners kept the scaffolds on because they didn't have the money to do the work that they needed to do. DOB can give the property owners summons if the owners are not keeping up with scaffold, like having poor lighting. The property owners need to make sure to upkeep the scaffold so that it is safe for the public.

NYPD 94th PRECINCT: Sergeant Matthew Dias Fill in for Captain Pena and Captain Navarrete, provided an update.

Sergeant Dias, related that there is an uprise on retail theft and petty larcenies. This time in the year we like to remind people to bring in their packages especially now that is getting darker earlier. There is more package theft during the night.

Sergeant Dias related that in the traffic numbers there is a large increase in car collisions. In regards injuries 15 % versus 7 % from last year that's 114 % increase compared to last year. We just want to remind people to be more cautions when they are traveling due to know that is getting darker earlier. That is where we see the more collisions when people are traveling to work and school.

Sergent Dias related that they are following what DOT recommendation has been given out regarding McGuiness Blvd. But right now, DOT has not given them any word on what is going on just yet.

Sergeant Dias related that Captain Navarrete wanted him to speak about the smoke shops. Recently a Queens Judge ruled that the Sheriffs do not have the authority to shut down these shops because is unconstitutional. The sheriff's office still is the leading agency on this smoke shops. We are just waiting on more information regarding what is going on.

District Manager Johana Pulgarin, mentioned the Cannabis Committee met on October 28, 2025, and the cannabis application for at 807 Manhattan Ave, was postponed being review on November 25, 2024.

Sergeant Dias related that anything in the North Side, Sector Adam is still closed, but we are still waiting on the Cannabis Review Board for what is next step. There is a strong possibility that they will be reopening.

Mr. Weiser, asked about the issues with the mopeds, electric bikes, delivery bikes and regular bikes that are not following the regulations, and ride on the sidewalks and passing the red lights. Mr. Weiser is concern and stated that this is a very dangerous situation.

Sergeant Dias, said that this is noted. Special operations Lieutenant is conducting operations weekly. NYPD seizes around 5 to 10 mopeds per week.

Ms. Pulgarin asked about the Marathon and if the 94th precinct was ready for the marathon. She asked if there was an emergency number to call and if the 94th precinct can provide a contact. Sergeant Dias said that Captain Navarrete would be available if anything arises. **NYPD 90th PRECINCT:** Lieutenant Frank Liquidara from Special Operations Liaison, provided an update. Lt. Liquidara, informed that we are experiencing the lowest crime rate in ten years a 23% reduction and was told that this is a historic decrease in crime.

Sector Adam this month is anticipating the Domino Park opening of an ice-skating ring. Logistically we are still ironing down on how to prevent property crimes, but we will have a strong presence in there.

Sector Boy which is our southwest region there is no major incidents to report.

Sector Charley that is where most of our serious crimes happen but right now, we are on decrease crime overall.

Schools update- Lt. Liquidara related that all the schools today were having their Halloweens parades, and we were there to assist the schools and keep the children safe. All the Principals and parents were pleased that there was a strong NYPD presence.

Ms. Pulgarin, stated that they did a wonderful job keeping the children safe. She saw them at PS. 132 and they did a wonderful job. Lt. Liquidara stated that is a hard job especially with all the traffic.

Sector David, that is where most of the industrial area and night life is. Right now, we are wrapping up what is call major season of events. Crime is down on this area too.

District Manager Johana Pulgarin asked about where Area 53 is located and the road back there. This area has become unwalkable, it is really a challenge for parents and kids to walk this area because all the buses illegally parked.

PO Dubois said that they had a special operation there. The 90th Precinct has been giving summonses, towing buses. He stated that is a hard work because the buses return all the time specially at midnight. PO Dubois said that they need to set up another operation.

District Manager Johana Pulgarin asked about if anything had changed with the scooters going over the bridge from the last meeting.

Lieutenant Liquidara stated that, this year special operations have conducted over 220 operations about a 30 to 70 of them have been scooter related. On Metropolitan and Driggs there is a big corridor they use it as a shoot, they would use the bike lines and sidewalks and sometimes they use that for their scooters. We gone up there and have done a lot of joint operations with the 94th precinct. This operation has been very successful. We do it every two to three weeks. The Williamsburg Bridge is another major area where we do enforcement. We do joint operations with the 7th Precinct. There is a lot of people who us the bike lane and walk lane to avoid using the regular bridge.

District Manager Johana Pulgarin reminded the participants of the 90th and 94th precincts that the next November 12, 2024, at our public hearing Meeting, the Office of nightlife will be presenting.

Lt. Liquidara gave an update about 10 Hope and that they had a meeting with night life, business owners of 10 Hope and constituents. There was about 30 people in the Captains Office. Both sides expressed their positions and opinions. The mayor office of night life recommended that we work on and to give the owners of 10 Hope time to fix it. There will be another meeting the as the constituent were not happy with the outcome of the meeting.

NYC DEPARTMENT OF TRANPSORTATION (DOT): Ms. Ronda Messer, Director of Community Affairs, related that McGuiness Blvd the work southern section Calyer and Meeker started yesterday. Most of the work is markings. The hope is that it will be completed before the weather turns too cold for thermos plaster set down. There are some locations on Meeker that are in need markings too as part of that project for all intents and purposes that completes Meeker project site that was taking place over the last two years.

Ms. Messer that there is Jersey barrier on the Metropolitan Bridge when you are coming towards Brooklyn you turn off the bridge and continue to Metropolitan Avenue there is Jersey barrier that protects the bicyclist and it gotten gradually hit by trucks, so it must be fix.

Ms. Meser said that they will be fixing this in November, but they are waiting for special equipment to get it fix.

Outdoor Dining program they are in the process of removing the non-compliance set ups. Now that we are moving into the permanent program and are being less lenient. The setups are going to be strictly enforced.

<u>COMMUNITY BOARD NO. 1:</u> District Manager Pulgarin thanked everyone for attending and concluded the meeting. The District Manager advised all attendees that the next District Service Cabinet Meeting would be held on November 21, 2024.

AT A GLANCE

This Fact Sheet can be used along with a rent registration history of an apartment to assist in determining if the apartment's registration status and rent are lawful.

DEFINITIONS

Individual Apartment

Improvements (IAIs): When an owner installs a new appliance or makes an improvement to an apartment, the owner may be entitled to an IAI rent increase.

Major Capital Improvements (MCIs): Building-wide

improvements such as boilers, windows and roofs.

Vacancy lease: When a person rents a rent stabilized apartment for the first time, the owner and the tenant sign a vacancy lease.

SUMMARY AND HIGHLIGHTS

Rents can be raised by a number of lawful mechanisms relating to leases and improvements, the latter of which are referred to as IAIs and MCIs.

Options	 Leases: A tenant can choose between a one or two year option and the allowable guideline adjustment is set by the local rent guidelines board. Improvements: Lawful rent increases for IAIs and/or MCIs may be factored into rent increases.
Limitations	 The rent guidelines boards set allowable lease increases on an annual basis. MCI rent increases are capped at 2% per year. IAI rent increases are based on building size and the cost of the improvement.

FACT SHEET #26: IN DETAIL

Introduction

This fact sheet will be updated annually to reflect the new lease guideline rates. It can be reviewed along with a rent registration history of an apartment to assist in determining if the apartment's registration status and the rent being charged are lawful. The apartment rent registration history and a rent overcharge complaint form can be requested online at https://rent.hcr.ny.gov or at a Borough Rent Office. In general, complaints of rent overcharge look back six years.

Effective December 15, 2022, Private Housing Finance Law (PHFL) Section 610 allows owners of affordable housing properties to collect actual rents that are higher than legal rents, if the following two conditions are met: a state or municipal agency or other statutorily designated party must issue specific approval in a regulatory agreement, either new or amended, and a government program provides rental assistance to the apartment. See DHCR Notice RA-LR3 for more details. Often rental assistance may be provided to owners without an overarching state or municipal regulatory agreement for the development. In addition, a regulatory agreement may not specifically authorize these higher rents with respect to all or certain types of rental assistance. Neither of these circumstances establish that an actual rent higher than the legal stabilized rent can be charged. Owners should be aware that for example, FHEPS or individual section 8 housing choice vouchers may not always qualify for an actual higher rent.

Leases

The Housing Stability and Tenant Protection Act (HSTPA) of 2019 eliminated the statutory vacancy rate and does not permit Rent Guidelines Boards to establish a separate vacancy rate. Changes to the rent regulations effective November 8, 2023 further clarify that the Rent Guidelines Board one or two year lease guidelines adjustments shall be applicable to both vacancy and renewal leases. No more than one guideline adjustment can be added to the rent in a calendar year for a vacancy lease. Renewal lease guideline adjustments are subject to the limitation of one guideline adjustment in the same guideline year. A guideline year commences on October 1 and ends the following September 30. Lawful temporary increases for Major Capital Improvements (MCI) and Individual Apartment Improvements (IAI) may also be added to the rent.

A DHCR Rent Stabilization Lease Rider/Addenda is to be attached to the lease and it should contain information on how the rent was calculated and on any related Individual Apartment Improvements.

When a tenant signs a renewal lease, they can choose between a one or two-year option and the allowable guideline adjustment is set by the local rent guidelines board. (See the Recent Lease Guideline Rates chart.)

Effective June 14, 2019 owners who are collecting a preferential rent, upon renewal of the lease, can increase the legal and preferential rents by the lawful guideline adjustments but only collect a guideline adjustment based on the preferential rent. The higher legal regulated rent and related guideline adjustments can only be collected when the apartment is vacated and rented to a subsequent tenant. See Fact Sheet #40 for more details.

Individual Apartment Improvements (IAI)

When an owner installs a new appliance or makes an improvement to an apartment the owner may be entitled to an IAI rent increase.

Effective October 17, 2024 there are two tiers of IAI rent increases. The IAI rent increase is now permanent and to obtain it, owners must file DHCR IAI Notification Form RN-19N electronically along with before and after photos. For additional details on IAI requirements, please see DHCR Operational Bulletin 2024-2.

The first tier establishes a \$30,000 limit. In a building with 35 or fewer apartments, the

rent increase is 1/168th of the total cost of the improvements and the maximum rent increase is \$178.57. If the building has more than 35 apartments the rent increase is 1/180th of the total cost of the improvements and the maximum rent increase is \$166.67. In this tier, if a tenant is in occupancy when the improvement is made, the owner is required to obtain the tenant's written consent on DHCR IAI Tenant's Informed Consent Form RN-19C, which is available for completion in multiple languages.

The second tier establishes a \$50,000 limit and applies only to work done in vacant apartments and the owner must first get certification from DHCR for eligibility. In a building with 35 or fewer apartments, the rent increase is 1/144th of the total cost of the improvements and the maximum rent increase is \$347.22. If the building has more than 35 apartments the rent increase is 1/156th of the total cost of the improvements and the maximum rent increase is \$320.51.

The DHCR Lease Rider included with a vacancy lease must notify the tenant of the right to request from the owner by certified mail Individual Apartment Improvements (IAIs) supporting documentation at the time the lease is offered or within 60 days of the execution of the lease. The owner shall provide such documentation within 30 days of that request in person or by certified mail. A tenant who is not provided with that documentation upon demand may file form RA-90 "Tenant's Complaint of Owner's Failure to Renew Lease and/or Failure to Furnish a copy of a Signed Lease" to receive a DHCR Order that directs the furnishing of the IAI supporting documentation.

Major Capital Improvements (MCI)

An owner is permitted rent increases to recover the costs of building-wide major capital improvements, such as the replacement of a boiler or new plumbing. The owner must file an application with DHCR and DHCR may issue an order denying the increase or granting an increase in part or in whole. After review of an MCI application DHCR will issue an order and serve it on the owner and all tenants in the building. Under HSTPA, there are limitations on future MCI increases, such as: only reasonable costs are recoverable, and MCI rent increases are prohibited in buildings that contain 35% or fewer rent regulated apartments. The rent increase approved by the DHCR order is collectible prospectively, on the first day of the first month 60 days after issuance. There are no retroactive rent increases. The collection of the increase is limited to a 2% cap/yearly phase-in. The 2% cap also applies to MCI rent increases not yet collected that were approved on or after June 14, 2012. The first renewal lease effective after June 14, 2019 must reflect no more than a 2% increase. Upon vacancy, the remaining balance of the increase can be added to the legal rent. In buildings with 35 or fewer units, the cost of the MCI is amortized over a 12-year period. In buildings with more than 35 units, the cost of the MCI is amortized over 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. The building must be free and clear of any outstanding hazardous and immediately hazardous violations. The MCI rent increase is temporary and it must be removed from the rent in 30 years and the legal rent must be adjusted at that time for guideline adjustments that were previously compounded on a rent that included the MCI rent increase. Vacancy lease tenants are to be notified in their lease about pending MCI applications.

RECENT LEASE GUIDELINE RATES

- Prior to the effective date of the Housing Stability and Tenant Protection Act (HSTPA) of 2019, June 14, 2019, these guidelines applied only to lease renewals.
- Effective November 8, 2023, the rent regulation amendments clarify that guideline adjustments apply to vacancy and renewal leases. Prior to this date, the footnote "G" below was used as a notation. In light of this amendment, the use of this footnote in subsequent guideline years is no longer necessary.

Operational Bulletin 2024-2 (October 1, 2024)

INDIVIDUAL APARTMENT IMPROVEMENTS

OVERVIEW

This Operational Bulletin is being issued to reflect changes in the rent laws regarding Individual Apartment Improvements (IAIs).

This Operational Bulletin provides guidance to owners and tenants of apartments subject to rent control and rent stabilization both inside and outside of New York City on how DHCR will review the installation of IAIs when a complaint of rent overcharge has been filed or there is an investigation with respect to IAI installations. An owner may be eligible for a rent increase for an IAI when there has been a substantial increase of dwelling space, an increase in the services provided by the owner, improvements installed in the housing accommodation, or new furniture or furnishings provided by the owner.

I. Notification Forms that Need to be Filed Irrespective of any Overcharge Complaint and/or Investigation

Owners of apartments subject to rent stabilization or rent control must file electronically DHCR Form RN–19N INDIVIDUAL APARTMENT IMPROVEMENT: NOTIFICATION, for IAIs made in vacant and occupied apartments. In addition to the Notification Form, where tenant's consent is required, owners must file electronically DHCR Form RN–19C INDIVIDUAL APARTMENT IMPROVEMENT: TENANT'S INFORMED CONSENT for IAIs made to occupied apartments. If there was a tenant in occupancy of the apartment when the improvements were installed, then no otherwise permissible rent increase due to such improvements will be recoverable without the tenant's written informed consent to the rent increase.

Owners may access these forms by logging into the Owner Rent Regulation Application (ORRA) System online at <u>https://hcr.ny.gov/online-services-owners-and-managers</u> and select the Individual Apartment Improvement Notification application.

The Notification and accompanying documents will be made part of the rent registration record for a rent stabilized apartment and part of the Maximum Base Rent building profile record for a rent controlled apartment. Such Notification for each IAI must include an itemized list of work performed and a description or explanation of the reason or purpose of such work. At any time, DHCR may request any relevant information even if
