At the regular meeting of Brooklyn Community Board No. 1, held the evening of June 12, 2025, the board members received a report from the Cannabis Review Committee. Please be advised that the board members voted unanimously to support sending this letter.

On behalf of Brooklyn Community Board 1 (CB1), I am writing to bring to your attention the growing concern over the proliferation of unlawful cannabis establishments within our district. CB1 represents one of New York City's most populous and vibrant neighborhoods. We are unfortunately witnessing a significant rise in unlicensed and illegal operations, many of which are accompanied by troubling patterns of related illicit activity and serious quality-of-life concerns. Both our Cannabis Review Committee and Public Safety & Human Services Committee have consistently heard community complaints about the need for more aggressive enforcement and prosecution against illegal cannabis vendors in our community. These concerns reflect the widespread impact these unlicensed operations are having on our residents' daily lives and neighborhood safety.

Our community board has taken every opportunity to demonstrate our community's desire for more consistent enforcement action and has actively supported and proposed legislation to the NYC Council and NYS Legislature. We also called for NYC Sheriff Miranda to appear before the community board to address this pressing issue publically.

In order to foster a more effective and collaborative approach to enforcement, we respectfully request that your agency designate a point of contact to serve as a liaison with our board. This will enable us to communicate urgent complaints efficiently, share on-the-ground observations, and maintain an open channel of communication as we work to address this escalating issue together.

Your close attention and assistance in this matter would be of tremendous help and would go a long way in preserving the quality of life, health, and safety of the entire community.

Please advise us of the appropriate individual or office to contact going forward, so that we may begin

working more closely in real-time on this matter.

The Committee met on the evening of June 4, 2025, at 6:00 PM at Swinging Sixties Senior Center, 211 Ainslie St. (Corner of Manhattan Avenue), Brooklyn, NY. 11211

AGENDA:

1. <u>535 MORGAN AVENUE REZONING APPLICATION- 2024K0263, CEQR 25DCP027K, C250090ZMK:</u> In the matter of an application submitted by Hemmer 2 LLC and Me & Morgan LLC pursuant to Sections 197-c and 201 of the New York City Charter for an amendment of the Zoning Map, Section No. 13a, by changing from an

M1-1 District to a C7-1 District property bounded Brooklyn Queens Expressway - Kosciuszko Bridge, Morgan Avenue, Lombardy Street, and Kingsland Avenue. Presenter, Adam W. Rothkrug, Esq., Rothkrug Rothkrug & Spector, LLP

This proposed rezoning application seeks to permit development of a new Aldi supermarket in the retail space currently occupied by Staples in the shopping center at the above location. The applicant presented informally at a prior committee meeting. At that time the committee recommended that they make sure to provide bike parking, to consider how trucks will approach for deliveries, to look into installing solar panels on the roof and providing landscaping.

The applicant seeks a zoning change from M1-1 to the new zoning tool of C7-1. This will allow them to be free of M1-1parking. requirements and restrictions against a large supermarket. They stated that they would still have to provide parking to accommodate the business needs of a supermarket and the other stores on the lot. Those other stores have current long-term leases and will continue doing business.

The presenter assured us that there will be plenty of bike parking and continued car parking for the customers of the stores in the mall. The presenter stated that the roof is probably too small to warrant solar panels, but the applicant is looking into providing EV chargers in the parking lot. The applicant will comply with the city regulations for landscaping, such as planting street trees. The presenter told us that since Aldi's products are proprietary, there will be less trucks and more ability to control the truck delivery schedules than with other supermarkets.

Recommendation:

The committee voted unanimously to approve the application without conditions, but with requests to look into providing a pedestrian entrance on Morgan Avenue, enhanced landscaping on the property, solar paneling on the roof or a green roof, and permeable surfacing on the sidewalks and in the parking lot.

2. 74 BOGART STREET REZONING APPLICATION - C250064ZMK, CEQR 25DCP029K: In the matter of an application submitted by 74 Bogart, LLC pursuant to Sections 197-c and 201 of the New York City Charter for an amendment of the Zoning Map, Section No. 13b, by changing from an M1-2 District to an M1-4A District property bounded by Ingraham Street, Morgan Avenue, Harrison Place, and Bogart Street. Presenter, Andrew Ehinger, Vice President, Acquisitions & Leasing.

UOVO is an art storage and logistics company. Clients include collectors, artists, fashion designers, galleries, and museums. The company, headquartered in Long Island City, owns similar climate-controlled storage facilities in 12 locations across the country, including one in Long Island City and one at 105 Evergreen Avenue in Brooklyn. The facilities offer concierge open storage, private (individual room) storage, and fashion storage. It works with the Brooklyn Museum, PS74 in Bushwick, local artists, and the Brooklyn Arts Council providing art studies.

In 2018 the company bought the property, which is not in the IBZ and is zoned M1-2. They opened a 160,000 sq.ft. self-storage facility on the site in 2021. Under the current zoning it cannot build further on the site. The presenters stated that they met with City Planning and Evergreen who do not want residential development on the site but would like art storage. Evergreen has submitted a letter of support.

In order to build the proposed 200,000 sq. foot facility, UOVO seeks a rezoning from M1-2 to M 1-4a, a new zoning tool that allows for more loft-style storage buildings. Currently half of the subject lot is covered by the self-storage facility; the other half is used for Fed Ex truck parking. The applicant proposes building a seven-story art storage building on the part of the lot used for truck parking. The external siding will be done in aluminum ribbons on which will appear large graffiti-like artwork. The applicant responded to our earlier requests for outside lighting by showing that lighting is part of the plan.

UOVO has another facility in LIC. At this time it employs 130 workers who receive career training in the various technical aspects of art and fashion preservation/storage.

The facility will have three types of storage options: a managed warehouse where artwork from different owners is stored; individual storage rooms; and fashion storage. The company works with various cultural organizations and major museums.

UOVO offers a yearly \$25,000 grant to an artist, who also gets an exhibit at the Brooklyn Museum and a 50'x50' public art installation.

In support of their proposal, the presenters told us that an art storage facility is significantly different from a self-storage facility, which employs minimally skilled staff, with individual customers coming and going on their own. An art storage facility, on the other hand, provides a variety of arts and commercial jobs. The company has expert training programs for its employees. When asked if it would be willing to add a school in our district to their list of schools that it works with, the presenters stated they "would be delighted ". A representative from the Williamsburg H.S. of Art and Design attended the meeting and stated his school is interested in working with the applicant

The committee suggested that the applicant use local artists for the outside decoration on the metal siding. We also strongly recommended that the applicant provide financial support for badly needed improvement of the nearby Gilbert Ramirez Park. The presenter indicated a willingness to do so.

The company expects to employ approximately 30 people at this facility. It is currently at capacity in its other buildings, and there is a big demand for local space at the proposed site. The presenter felt the truck traffic would be less than the current FedEx traffic. There will be provisions for EV charging and bike parking. The roof will be green, but solar panels might not be possible, because of the fire danger. Energy efficiency is important to the business because of the need to maintain a consistent climate.

Recommendation:

The committee voted to approve the application with the following conditions:

- 1-The applicant will work with local schools to promote art education and career development to the extent that is satisfactory to the board and CB1 Education committee. The applicant will provide ongoing communication with the community board and the committee regarding its plans and progress in this endeavor.
- 2- The applicant will work with the Parks Department and will make a significant contribution, in an amount and of a kind acceptable to the Parks Department and the CB! Parks committee, towards ongoing maintenance and capital improvement of Gilbert Ramirez Park. The applicant will provide ongoing communication with the community board and the CB1 Parks committee regarding its plans and progress in this endeavor.
- 3- The applicant will use local artists for the outside artwork.

4- The applicant will explore the possibility of utilizing 100% electric power sources.

3. PRESENTATION DOMINO SITE B LAND USE APPLICATION CEOR

07DCP094K 264-350 KENT AVENUE: IN THE MATTER OF an application submitted by Domino A Partners LLC and Domino B Partners LLC pursuant to Sections 197-c and 201 of the New York City Charter for the grant of special permits pursuant to the following sections of the Zoning Resolution: 1. Section 74-743(a)(2) - to modify the location of buildings without regard for the height and Setback regulations of Section 62-34 (Height and Setback Regulations on Waterfront Blocks) and the requirements of Section 23-62 (Balconies); and 2. Section 74-743(a)(14)* - to apply the provisions of Section 23-23 to allow floor area exemptions in buildings existing on December 5, 2024 within the large-scale general development for use in a proposed new building (Building B) within the same large-scale general development; in connection with a proposed mixed use development on property generally bounded by Grand Street and its northwesterly prolongation, Kent Avenue, South 3rd Street, a line 100 feet northwesterly of Wythe Avenue, South 4th Street, Kent Avenue, South 5th Street and its northwesterly prolongation, and the U.S. Pierhead line (Block 2414, Lots 1, 3, 26, 1001-1007, 1102-1200, 1300-1365, and 1201-1202; and Block 2428, Lots 1101 - 1105), in R6/C2-4, R8/C2-4 and C6-2 Districts, within a large-scale general development. *Note: A zoning text amendment is proposed to create a new Section 74-943(a)(14) under a concurrent related application (N 250275 ZRK)

IN THE MATTER OF an application submitted by Domino A Partners LLC and Domino B Partners LLC pursuant to Sections 197-c and 201 of the New York City Charter for the grant of a special permit pursuant to Section 74-745(b) of the Zoning Resolution to waive the requirements for loading berth for retail or service uses, and where no single establishment exceeds 8,500 square feet for a zoning lot (Zoning Lot 1, Block 2414, Lots 1, 3, 26, 1001-1007, 1102-1200, and 1300-1365), in connection with a proposed mixed use development on property generally bounded by Grand Street and its northwesterly prolongation, Kent Avenue, South 3rd Street, a line 100 feet northwesterly of Wythe Avenue, South 4th Street, Kent Avenue, South 5th Street and its northwesterly prolongation, and the U.S. Pierhead line (Block 2414, Lots 1, 3, 26, 1001-1007, 1102-1200,1300-1365, and 1201-1202; and Block 2428, Lots 1101 - 1105), in R6/C2-4, R8/C2-4 and C6-2 Districts, within a large-scale general development. Plans for this proposal are on file with the City Planning Commission and may be seen on the Zoning Application Portal at https://zap.planning.nyc.gov/projects/2024K0344, or the Department of City Planning, 120 Broadway, 31st Floor, New York, NY, 10271-0001. Presenter, David Lombino, Representative Domino A Partners LLC and Domino B Partners LLC. 20 Minutes.

Note: This was presented to the committee as an informal presentation because the application was not certified in time to have a public hearing prior to our June 10th full board meeting. It can be voted on at our June 4, 2025, full board meeting.

If the board members do not feel we have enough information for a vote on June 4th, we could vote to change the September board meeting from September 9 to September 8. Our response is due September 8, 2025.

These actions to facilitate the alteration and expansion of the Domino LSGD for Site B, to expand the overall footprint, to remove previously approved skybridge, to add balconies, remove a setback, and reduce loading berths to facilitate a new building containing 1,173,500 sf, including 1,161,270 sf of residential uses (1,262 units), 12,230 sf of commercial space, is being sought by Domino A Partners LLC and Domino B Partners LLC at 264-350 Kent Avenue, Community District 1, Brooklyn. CEQR 07DCP094K. Bonnie Campbell presented.

The presenter informed us that these two buildings are the last buildings that will need to be presented in this project. The board has already reviewed and approved the existing plans. The applicant is not asking for new floor area. The two main objectives are: 1- to improve the design; and 2- to use the City of Yes framework to provide more housing, 20% Of which will be affordable at 60% AMI.

Part of the original plan called for space for a school. However, the School Construction Authority (SCA) informed the applicant that due to its stats on the community needs, the SCA is not interested in approving the addition of a school at the site. The presenter informed us that the applicant is willing to work with our board to lobby for adding a school to its River Ring Development.

The presenter informed us that the applicant has hired a new architect to utilize that additional space and the new City of Yes rules to make some design changes that will provide more outdoor space for apartments at all income levels and to improve the streetscape / public realm design. Under the new design the bridge that connected the buildings will be removed, decreasing the bulky appearance, and balconies will be wound around the entire facades for all income level apartments. The public realm will be improved by moving back the roof bulkheads and widening the sidewalks to 23-26 feet with the double tree lines being changed to single lines. There is one more story which will be used for additional residential space, but the appearance of additional height will be minimized by the set back of the bulkheads.

<u>Committee discussion</u>- The committee members agreed none of us would object to approval based on the informal presentation. However, we will make an official recommendation after the applicant presents at the June 10, 2025 full board public hearing.

4. <u>215 MOORE STREET BUNGALOW PROJECTS RED HOOK STUDIOS BULK</u> AUTHORIZATION REQUEST – informal presentation by Susi Yu.

This is not a full ULURP application. DCP will invite us to make a comment within 45 days after the application is referred to us by DCP. We can ask for a 15 day extension to the 45-day period. The item has not yet been referred to us by DCP.

We are trying to get confirmation from DCP about the date DCP will complete its evaluation and refer the matter to us, so that we can be confident that we will fall within the allocated time period, if we hold off voting until the full board and the community can receive a presentation at our September board meeting.

This is an application to build a 135,000 square foot film production facility. The building's height would span from 85 feet to 115 feet at the mechanical tower. The roof would be covered with solar panels. The sites are currently designated M1-1 and M1-2. The applicant seeks to build the facility under the new C7 designation, which will allow increased ceiling heights, and higher outside walls pre-setback. These allowances would permit more freedom to build tall internal film production sets. The applicant did not provide contemporary pictures of the site; however, she

stated they contain one story brick warehouses. Evergreen submitted a letter of support, stating this facility is compatible with the industrial community.

The presenter stated the operation would eliminate the need for food and dressing-room trucks on the streets, because dining and changing rooms would be contained within the facility. The presenter also stated the applicant is willing to work with the nearby local school to discuss providing opportunities for trade training.

1. UPDATE ON BOX STREET PARK

The Cannabis Review Committee met on Thursday, June 5, 2025, at the District Office

435 Graham Avenue, Brooklyn, NY 11211 at 6:00 PM.

ATTENDANCE

Four members constitute a quorum for this committee, a quorum was achieved.

Committee reviewed the following submitted Cannabis Retail Applications:

Recommendations are as follows:

• Donna Gallub, DBA Highsential LLC, 103 Broadway, (Retail Dispensary), The applicat failed to attend the scheduled 6/5/2025 Cannabis Review Committee meeting. The Committee advises OCM to reject their application for failure to attend our scheduled 6/5/2025 meeting.

Vote was unanimous

• Ilios Guma DBA, Everhealth Chemists LLC 110 Broadway. (Retail Dispensary) The applicant provided the committee the requested documents, The Committee recommends OCM to process the application. After the Committee voted and closed the meeting, concerned neighbors brought to our attention Information

Vote was unanimous

Information regarding Everhealth Chemists at 110 Broadway being within 200Ft from Yeveim Orthodox Chapel at 93 Broadway, was provided to the committee after we voted and closed the meeting. I forwarded the concern to OCM and we are waiting for their response. Please review OCM's email response.

"So currently under OCMRETL-2023-001109 (EVERHEALTH CHEMISTS LLC) they are pending application at 110 Broadway Brooklyn, NY 11249. Location was submitted back on 4/7/2025 in which our Office deemed the location viable."

"On 5/2/2025 licensee OCM-RETL-25-000322 submitted an amendment and following challenge regarding their non-viable location at 362 Bedford Ave, Brooklyn, NY 11249. They provided the same documentation the CB provided. At this time our Office is reviewing the claims brought to our awareness. A key issue our Office noticed in the arguments was the affidavit from the Church is not notarized and that is something that is absolutely required in an affidavit, also noting the church appears to be mixed use." It's status stays approved. The OCM's email is a legal document and a hardcopy will be inside the applicant's file.

• Pablo Velez, DBA Better States LLC, 539 Metropolitan Ave., (Retail Dispensary) The applicant provided the committee the requested documents. The Committee recommends OCM to process the application.

Vote was unanimous

• Ryan Fingerhut, DBA The Upscale Smoker LLC, 362 Bedford Ave., (Retail Dispensary) The applicant was advised to email the district office additional signatures for the petition form. Client has to 6/6/2025, 4pm to email the district office the requested signatures. The Committee granted applicant conditional approval. The Committee reviewed the additional signatures and the applicant meets the requirement. The Committee recommends OCM to process the application.

• Ryan Fingerhut, DBA The Upscale Smoker LLC, 123 South 4th St., (Retail Dispensary). The applicant emailed the district office a request to withdraw their application. The Committee granted the applicant their withdrawal request.

Vote was unanimous

In addition to the above application reviews the Cannabis Review Committee voted to bring forth five concerns and recommendations to submit to CB1 for approval and action. The purpose of these recommendations are to support our community to engage in the decision process as well as determine the appropriateness of cannabis shops in our neighborhoods. We ask that CB1 request our NYS representatives, Assemblymembers Emily Gallagher and Maritza Davala, and NYS Senators Julia Salazar and Kristen Gonzalez to address the following with OCM:

- 1) There does not appear to be oversight or enforcement to the existing OCM law which states a business can only own three retail cannabis dispensary licenses. When doing due diligence the Cannabis Review Committee is finding possible abuse of this law, which is creating confusion about the overall approval process.
- 2) The Cannabis Review Committee is recommending that Cannabis retail dispensary licenses should not be transferred from one municipality to another, such as, from Syracuse to Brooklyn.

- 3) The Cannabis Review Committee is recommending to increase the distance between legal cannabis dispensaries from 1000 ft to 2000 ft. Currently OCM appears to be granting waivers allowing dispensaries to operate 200 ft apart from each other, creating an over saturation of cannabis businesses in commercial and non-commercial areas. The question remains as to why OCM is granting these waivers without community approval and oversight.
- 4) The Cannabis Review Committee is recommending OCM to pause forwarding dispensary applications to the NYC Community Boards in July and August as NYC Community Boards do not have any meetings during summer breaks. By default applications will not be reviewed prior to OCM deadlines and possibly approved without community input and oversight. In September the Community Boards resume applications can be forwarded, investigated and reviewed in a timely manner.
- 5) The Cannabis Review Committee has composed a letter for CB1 to email to local enforcement agencies regarding the proliferation of unlawful cannabis establishments.

Dear [insert head of law enforcement agency],

On behalf of Brooklyn Community Board 1 (CB1), I am writing to bring to your attention the growing concern over the proliferation of unlawful cannabis establishments within our district. CB1 represents one of New York City's most populous and vibrant neighborhoods. We are unfortunately witnessing a significant rise in unlicensed and illegal operations, many of which are accompanied by troubling patterns of related illicit activity and serious quality-of-life concerns. Both our Cannabis Review Committee and Public Safety & Human Services Committee have consistently heard community complaints about the need for more aggressive enforcement and prosecution against illegal cannabis vendors in our community. These concerns reflect the widespread impact these unlicensed operations are having on our residents' daily lives and neighborhood safety.

Our community board has taken every opportunity to demonstrate our community's desire for more consistent enforcement action, and has actively supported and proposed legislation to the NYC Council and NYS Legislature. We also called for NYC Sheriff Miranda to appear before the community board to address this pressing issue publically.

In order to foster a more effective and collaborative approach to enforcement, we respectfully request that your agency designate a point of contact to serve as a liaison with our board. This will enable us to communicate urgent complaints efficiently, share on-the-ground observations, and maintain an open channel of communication as we work to address this escalating issue together. Your close attention and assistance in this matter would be of tremendous help and would go a long way in preserving the quality of life, health, and safety of the entire community.

Please advise us of the appropriate individual or office to contact going forward, so that we may begin working more closely in real-time on this matter.

At the regular meeting of Brooklyn Community Board No. 1, held the evening of June 12, 2025, the board members received a report from the Cannabis Review Committee. Please be advised that the board members voted unanimously to support sending this letter.

We are respectfully requesting our NYS Representatives to address the following recommendations with OCM. The purpose of these recommendations is to support our community to engage in the decision process as well as determine the appropriateness of cannabis shops in our neighborhoods.

- 1. There does not appear to be oversight or enforcement to the existing OCM law which states a business can only own three retail cannabis dispensary licenses. When doing due diligence, the Cannabis Review Committee is finding possible abuse of this law, which is creating confusion about the overall approval process.
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- 3. The Cannabis Review Committee is recommending increasing the distance between legal cannabis dispensaries from 1000 ft to 2000 ft. Currently OCM appears to be granting waivers allowing dispensaries to operate 200 ft apart from each other, creating an over

saturation of cannabis businesses in commercial and non-commercial areas. The question remains as to why OCM is granting these waivers without community approval and oversight.

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- 5. The Cannabis Review Committee has composed a letter for CB1 to email to local enforcement agencies regarding the proliferation of unlawful cannabis establishments. (See attached)

- 2. The Cannabis Review Committee is recommending that Cannabis retail dispensary licenses should not be transferred from one municipality to another, such as, from Syracuse to Brooklyn.
- 3. The Cannabis Review Committee is recommending increasing the distance between legal cannabis dispensaries from 1000 ft to 2000 ft. Currently OCM appears to be granting waivers allowing dispensaries to operate 200 ft apart from each other, creating an over

saturation of cannabis businesses in commercial and non-commercial areas. The question remains as to why OCM is granting these waivers without community approval and oversight.

- 4. The Cannabis Review Committee is recommending OCM to pause forwarding dispensary applications to the NYC Community Boards in July and August as NYC Community Boards do not have any meetings during summer breaks. By default, applications will not be reviewed prior to OCM deadlines and possibly approved without community input and oversight. In September the Community Boards resume applications can be forwarded, investigated and reviewed in a timely manner.

The Transportation Committee met the Thursday, May 22, 2025 (CALLED TO ORDER: 6:42 PM; ADJOURNED: 9:20 PM) at CB1 District office, 435 Graham Avenue, Brooklyn, NY 11211. A quorum was met.

ATTENDANCE

AGENDA

1. PRESENTATION: PS 110 PARENTS PROPOSED SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS.

PS 110 to update the committee on its efforts to improve safety around PS 110 & McGorlick Park. Presentation by Mr. Chris Roberti

Mr. Roberti was recognized to present his groups presentation. (Presentation attached.) COMMITTEE/BOARD MEMBERS:

Mr. Vega supported the plan as an improvement to the current conditions at this location.

Ms. Espinal stated that the plan was crafted with the best intentions and that overall, it was good. However, she expressed concerns that the plaza as proposed could negatively impact emergency vehicles. She also questioned its need since the school has easy access to McGorlick Park. Ms. Espinal asked for clarification the illegal cut through traffic issue.

Mr. Roberti noted that DOT & FDNY would need to sign off on the plaza before it could be considered. He also explained that the plan attempts to eliminate cut thru traffic from Greenpoint Ave to access Meeker Blvd & the BQE.

Mr. Bruzaitis and Ms. Breitner explained the designated truck routes and the history of the boards frustration with DOT's insistence to allow for a 1 mile re-route for trucks under certain circumstances. In this case it is trucks consistent use to access the BQE from points north of PS110.

Ms. Breitner thanked Mr. Roberti and the group for their hard work and explained the history of the groups work to improve safety around PS 110. She supports the project and expanded on the need to eliminate cut through traffic along Monitor St.

Mr. Talati stated his overall approval of the plan's goals. He noted that this type of plan, specifically adjacent to a busy public school, if implemented correctly could be used as a model for other locations around NYC.

Ms. Drinkwater stated her experience with this location involving several near miss incidents personally and with others. She went on to explain the chaotic conditions during drop off and dismissal. She stated her support for the increased daylighting and plaza. She inquired about the turn radius for the proposed plaza cul du sac.

Mr. Roberti stated that the radius would be 30'. He also stated that there were discussions to move all drop off/pick up to Driggs Ave.

There was some discussion about sanitation vehicles being able to negotiate the turn around.

Mr. Radezky explained former Assemblyman Lentols efforts to install speed bumps and other traffic calming on Monitor St to benefit PS110 and noted that additional speed bumps could be installed closer to the school. He went on to explain that some of the safety measures Asb Lentol got for Saint Stanislaw could be implemented for PS110. He complimented the group for their commitment to improving the safety around PS110. Mr. Radezky stated his concerns to change traffic on Driggs Ave, noting that he has not observed dramatic problems. This lead to a discussion about Driggs.

Mr. Roberti stated that he liked some of Mr. Radezky's suggestions and thanked him for his work during his tenure with Asb Lentol.

Mr. Pferd stated his support for the plan and asked what discussions have been had with the 94th Precinct.

Mr. Roberti stated that the group has had conversations with PO Navarette who suggested additional traffic cameras, but had admitted that that does not necessarily solve the problems at the time of violations. Mr. Roberti also stated that once the crossing guards are gone the conditions can be unsafe for students. As ever, the discussion expanded to the problems of enforcement and need for infrastructure to make violations impossible.

Ms. Deny Horowitz stated her support for the plan and detailed some of the efforts negotiated with the Parks Dept and PS110.

Ms. LaBorde stated her support for the plan. She noted that PS110 regularly uses McGorlick Park and crossing the street can be a challenge for students and staff. Including a plaza at this location would facilitate safer uses. She went on to explain her role as marshal for "bike to school" events and the aggressive interactions with drivers during these events. She renewed her support for closing the Driggs Ave slip at Morgan Ave to eliminate or reduce illegal truck traffic from the BQE.

Ms. Love stated her support for the plan and specifically noted the need for a mid-block crossing as proposed in the plan. There are a large number of students that will cross to the park after dismissal and a mid-block crossing would greatly reduce conflicts with oncoming traffic.

PUBLIC:

Many PS110 parents and neighbors attended the presentation. Due to the large turnout comments were limited and additional comments emailed to the Board office are attached. Many noted their support for the plan and called for additional enforcement by NYPD specifically around trucks; noted additional signage is needed; closure of the Driggs slip; many supported the mid-block crossing and plaza. There were also hopes that if properly realized this plan could be a model for other locations in NYC.

Concerns were raised about the loss of parking, especially if the plaza was installed and traffic was converted to 2-way; emergency & DSNY ability to transit Monitor St.; needs for teacher parking. There was also concern that the plan is similar to the one presented last year and that there has been a lack of engagement with the neighbors living on Monitor St. These neighbors need to be engaged more fully before they can support the plan.

I am offering this letter in support of the PS110/McGolrick Park Safety proposal to implement key street safety features around McGolrick Park in District 33, namely, enhanced crosswalks around the park, daylighting with hardening at all corners, closure of the Driggs Avenue slip lane and raised crosswalks where possible and other safety improvements.

Since the Fall of 2021 a committed group of parents and neighbors have been surveying families, organizations, businesses, and neighbors to identify needs and visions for a safer Eastern Greenpoint for everyone. Again and again, residents raised serious concerns about the high-speed cut through traffic on Monitor. In May of 2023, a neighbor was struck and killed at the intersection of Monitor and Driggs, directly in front of the school. Two years later, we have finally secured daylighting for this dangerous intersection, and traffic studies are underway for stop controls nearby, but there is more work to do.

The proposal prioritizes traffic calming, and creating a space where cars and kids do not mix. After many conversations with neighbors, the plan also prioritizes 24/7 access for local residents. We support this plan and will continue to advocate for urgently-needed street safety interventions across Eastern Greenpoint.

2. Animal Welfare: Invited Speakers and Discussion New York Animal Care Centers (ACC) Speaker: Jack Kennon, Volunteer Manager

Key Points:

- Most recently opened facility is located in the southwest corner of Ridgewood.
- Services include care for cats, dogs, and wildlife.
- Important legal note: Cats and dogs are legally considered people's property.
- Reporting Concerns: Call 911 to report animal welfare concerns.
- **Missing Dogs:** Bring dogs to precinct or call precinct directly (NYC does not have a stray dog population, so any dog sighting represents a missing pet with an owner).
- Wildlife Issues: Contact NYS Department of Environmental Conservation
 - 718-482-4922 (for reports of deceased animals)
 - 844-332-3267 (live wildlife)

Field Operations:

- ACC handles alleged instances of animal abuse through mobile units (field department and animal rescue specialists)
- Important Limitation: ACC cannot enter private property without permission
- ACC documents information that can serve as evidence in potential legal cases filed by prosecutor's office
- NYPD now handles the enforcement component of animal control

Committee Discussion:

- Committee Co-Chair Espinal inquired about the scope of the field unit.
- **Rozmus** raised questions about incarceration penalties for animal abuse.

Greenpoint Cats

Speaker: Becky Wisdom

Organization Focus:

- Volunteer-based animal rescue organization focused on cats in Greenpoint and surrounding zip codes, including South Brooklyn and Long Island City.
- Primary mission: Reduce outdoor cat population through Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) and spay/neuter programs.
- Services include care for bodega and shop cats.
- Estimated stray cat population in NYC: 500,000 1 million

TNR Program Details:

- Uses private traps and ASPCA traps.
- Public education available through neighborhoodcats.org (classes cost \$10).
- Identification: Ear-tipped cats have already been TNRed.
- Goal: Managed, TNRed cat population to reduce noise and fighting between cats.
- Security Note: Cannot publicize specific colony locations due to potential harm from bad actors.

Funding Challenges:

- Cat shelters in NYC are overcrowded.
- Private donations support rescue organizations; no city funding currently provided.
- **Upcoming Opportunity:** DOHMH public hearing scheduled for Friday at 2:00 PM regarding \$1.5 million for TNR services and \$1 million for pet food pantry.

Committee Discussion:

- **Aguilar** expressed how the presentation opened her mind about TNR work in East Williamsburg, asking about outreach to Spanish-speaking communities. Response indicated bilingual volunteers are available and translation volunteers are welcomed. She suggested Moore Street and Humboldt as potential session locations.
- **Judelson** asked about stray cat population trends over the past decade. Response noted population explosion during COVID due to suspended TNR services and pet abandonment, compounded by skyrocketing veterinary costs.
- Committee Co-Chair Espinal inquired about funding sources for such organizations.

Brooklyn Bridge Animal Welfare Coalition (BK Cat Cafe)

Focus: Ending cat homelessness since 2007

Speaker: Sonja Chai

Key Initiatives:

- Entered multi-year contract with NYCHA for TNR services in 2024.
- Addressing overburdened shelter network.
- Community volunteer engagement essential due to scale of homeless cat issue.
- Shelter animal population statistics demonstrate ongoing crisis.

Committee Discussion:

• Committee Chair Feng sought clarification based on the data presented in the slides about what may be contributing to the lower population of shelter cats since the 2020 pandemic.

- O Anne explained the complexity of population dynamics, noting that 40-50% of cat population is female with approximately 3 kittens per litter, which means that there could easily be exponential population booms. The shelter populations without a doubt will be a mere fraction of the total population of stray cats in NYC.
- **Barros** asked about adoption programs.
 - Becky Wisdom emphasized that "we cannot adopt our way out of the population crisis"
- **Judelson** inquired about models from other countries/cities addressing similar issues.
 - Anne noted NYC's particularly high costs, with average spay/neuter procedures costing upwards of \$1,000.

State Senator Kristen Gonzalez Office

Speaker: Ruben Flores

Legislative Perspective:

- The office organized six adoption events in the district with another scheduled for June 1
- Advocacy opportunities exist for existing funding
- Highlighted cost barriers: expensive pet insurance and pet food

Community Outreach:

- Encourages coordination between animal welfare groups for tabling and resource sharing
- Mobile office hours available
- Expansion needed to Ridgewood, Bushwick, and Astoria
- Noted lack of pro bono veterinary services offering quality care

Personal Experience:

• Shared story from tenant organizing days involving dog breeding case discovered through building odors.

NYPD 94th Precinct

Speaker: Mr. Geyer

Police Response Protocols:

- Officers encounter animals in two primary scenarios:
 - 1. **911 Jobs:** When owner is arrested, dies, or is evicted animals are cared for and transferred to ACC.
 - 2. **311 System:** Alleged animal abuse reports.
- Emergency Protocol Example: Animals locked in cars with sealed windows result in immediate window breaking to rescue animals.

3. Motions and Committee Actions

Motion 1: Legislative Advocacy

Proposed by: Committee Co-Chair Espinal **Motion:** Recommend state elected officials pass legislation that strengthens penalties against individuals who commit crimes against animals, supports TNR efforts, protects animals, and provides additional funding for animal welfare efforts.

Discussion:

- Aprile questioned current punishment levels for animal crimes.
- **Rozmus** seconded the motion.
- Vote: Unanimous approval

Motion 2: Incentive Program (Tabled)

Proposed by: Committee Co-Chair Espinal

Motion: Establish incentive program to reward reporting of crimes against animals

Discussion:

- **Judelson** shared that our committee still needs more information before determining whether an incentive program is the best approach to address this problem.
- Jack Kennon from the ACC suggested that the policy focus should prioritize prosecution and police incentives for action against instances of violence against animals.
- Committee Chair Feng moved to table the motion.
- Motion Status: Tabled for future consideration

Motion 3: Budget Support Letter

Proposed by: Meryl LaBorde

Motion: Send letter to NYC Council supporting \$1.5 million and \$1 million budget requests

Discussion:

- **Karina** emphasized funding as the most critical issue.
- Espinal seconded the motion.
- Vote: Unanimous approval

4. Non-Animal Welfare Issues

Quality of Life Concerns - 10 Hope Street (Tabu)

Presented by: Max Rosen

- Collaborated with NYC elected officials, SLA Committee, SLA, NYPD, and ONL
- Progress made working with NYPD
- Seeking expansion of NYPD Quality of Life units to 90th Precinct

Committee Action:

- Decision made for CB1 to email 90th Precinct requesting information about Q team
- Committee Co-Chair Espinal noted Patrol Borough Brooklyn North Command manages O team.
- **Bamonte** emphasized deteriorating quality of life as community transitions from family-based community with strong community-based institutions to tourist destination of strangers.

Tabu Restaurant Issues Status Update:

- NYPD facilitated meeting between Tabu owners, managers, and neighbors in October 2024. Problems gradually decreased following that meeting.
- Concerns over potential for more noise now that summer season is approaching.
- Rosen and his neighbors are attempting to secure NYS State Liquor Authority (SLA) to hold a disciplinary hearing due to crossed-out stipulations with BK CB1 in 10 Hope's original application submitted to NYS SLA.

Apollo Street Safe Haven Shelter Safety Concerns

Presented by: Two community members

- They shared that they were accosted recently near Nassau and Kingsland by the pizzeria.
- They experienced violent language and threatening behavior from the perpetrator who they believed was likely from the Apollo Street Safe Haven shelter.
- They filed a police report after 311 directed them to 911.
- **District Manager Pulgarin** noted that a hotline was provided by Lincoln Restler's office for direct reporting to the shelter director.
- The two residents shared that they were deeply disturbed by being victimized and assaulted in what has long been a very safe community, a concern that our committee has heard previously from multiple residents at past committee meetings in fall 2024. They recommended greater input from local residents and neighbors of the safe haven facility, esp. when it comes to assessing existing measures by the safe haven to keep their own residents and nearby neighbors safe.

5. District Needs Assessment Considerations

Committee Discussion Topics for Budget Requests:

- Public Safety and Emergency Services
- Health Care and Human Services
- Youth, Education and Child Welfare

Key Issues Identified:

- Committee Co-Chair Espinal and Barros: Police officer shortages noted by Captain Navarette and Captain Wernersbach.
- **Barros:** 311 system and process issues.
- **Aguilar:** 988 mental health and substance hotline with response teams including mental health professionals and police officers.
- **Rozmus:** Requests more information about leases and contracts.
- **Barros:** Drug abuse concerns raised at 90th Community Council meeting with approximately 20 residents participating.
- Bamonte: Concerns about youth vaping drugs and unknown vape contents.
- Aguilar: Need for educational campaigns about vape dangers.
- Traffic Control: Request for DOT representative assistance and NYPD summons enforcement.

6. Old Business

Committee Chair Feng updated the committee on his ongoing conversations with Yeshiva Kehilas Yakov Pupa, Aperion Productions, and CB1 Member Rabbi David Niederman following the letter CB1 sent with regard to safety issues resulting from double parking and illegal parking at Division Avenue and Wilson Street.

BBAWC: A Brief Introduction

- BBAWC has been working since 2007 to end cat homelessness and help suffering animals in NYC.
- In 2016 we opened Brooklyn Cat Cafe, an adoption center and space for the community to gather and learn about cats in NYC.
- In 2021, we launched BBAWC Rescue Clinic to improve access to low-cost spay neuter surgeries and other veterinary care.
- In 2024 we started a multi year contract with NYCHA to Trap Neuter Return (TNR) homeless cats on their properties




What do we mean by an overburdened rescue & shelter system?

- The collective efforts of shelter and rescue organizations in NYC does not reach the scale needed to address the homeless cat issue.
- NOTE: 500K is used for illustrative purposes. Estimates of NYC's homeless cat population size range from 500K-1M.
- Broader community collaboration and commitment to ending the suffering of these animals is the only way to solve a crisis of this magnitude.



What do we mean by an overburdened rescue & shelter system?

Shelters and Rescue organizations in NYC are taking in a smaller percentage of cats. Trends show that intake, in particular stray cat intake, has decreased dramatically even compared to pre-covid levels.

Dear Council Members,

Brooklyn Community Board 1, representing the neighborhoods of Williamsburg and Greenpoint, writes to express our strong support for the proposed \$1.5 million allocation in FY 2026 for the Trap, Neuter, and Release (TNR) Citywide Initiative.

At our May 19, 2025 Public Safety & Human Services Committee meeting focused on animal welfare in our district, we heard compelling testimony from multiple stakeholders that underscored the critical need for expanded TNR services. Representatives from New York Animal Care Centers, Greenpoint Cats, Brooklyn Bridge Animal Welfare Coalition, and other community organizations presented clear evidence of the challenges facing our borough and city regarding stray and homeless animal populations.

The Crisis in Our Community

Our committee learned that New York City currently has an estimated 500,000 to 1 million stray cats, a population that exploded during the COVID-19 pandemic when TNR services were suspended and pet abandonment increased. This overwhelming number directly contributes to the overcrowding crisis at Animal Care Centers of New York (ACC) facilities. In our district alone, we have observed multiple areas where stray cats congregate, creating public health concerns and quality of life issues for residents.

The TNR Solution

The evidence presented to our committee demonstrates that TNR programs represent one of the most effective and humane approaches to reducing stray animal populations. However, the cost of veterinary services has become prohibitively expensive, with average spay and neuter procedures now costing approximately \$1,000. This financial barrier prevents community-based animal rescue organizations from providing TNR services at the scale necessary to meaningfully address the crisis.

The proposed \$1.5 million investment would provide spay and neuter surgeries for over 8,000 animals annually—a significant step toward reducing the homeless animal population that burdens our shelter system and impacts community quality of life.

Community Impact and Support

Our committee heard from volunteers and organizations who work tirelessly to address this issue through private donations and volunteer efforts. These dedicated community members, including representatives from Greenpoint Cats and Brooklyn Bridge Animal Welfare Coalition, emphasized that without adequate funding, the scope of the problem far exceeds what existing groups can handle through volunteer engagement alone.

The testimony we received highlighted several key benefits of robust TNR programming:

- Reduction in stray animal populations through humane intervention
- Decreased burden on overcrowded shelter facilities
- Improved community health and quality of life
- Cost-effective approach compared to repeated animal control responses
- Support for community-based organizations already doing this essential work

Brooklyn Community Board 1's Commitment

Brooklyn Community Board 1 approved a motion to support the \$1.5 million budget request for TNR services. This vote reflects our community's recognition that addressing animal welfare is not only a matter of compassion but also a critical component of public health and community well-being.

We urge the City Council to include this \$1.5 million allocation in the FY 2026 budget to establish a citywide TNR initiative in partnership with non-profit, community-based animal rescue organizations. This investment will provide the resources, support, and assistance necessary to make meaningful progress in addressing New York City's stray animal crisis.

Conclusion

The need for expanded TNR services is urgent and well-documented. With your support, this funding will enable community organizations to scale their life-saving work and create lasting positive change for both animals and residents throughout New York City.

We respectfully request your support for this critical initiative and stand ready to work with you to ensure its successful implementation in our district and citywide.

Re: Brooklyn Community Board 1 Support for Comprehensive Animal Welfare Legislation

Dear State Senators and Assembly Members,

Brooklyn Community Board 1, representing the neighborhoods of Williamsburg and Greenpoint, writes to urge your support for comprehensive legislation that strengthens penalties against individuals who commit crimes against animals, supports Trap, Neuter, and Release (TNR) efforts, enhances animal protection measures, and provides additional funding for animal welfare initiatives.

Community Board Action

At our May 19, 2025 Public Safety & Human Services Committee meeting, Brooklyn Community Board 1 unanimously approved a motion to recommend that state elected officials pass legislation addressing these critical animal welfare issues. This unanimous vote followed extensive testimony from animal welfare organizations, law enforcement, state elected officials, and community stakeholders who provided compelling evidence of the need for stronger state-level intervention.

Recognition of Recent Legislative Progress

Brooklyn Community Board 1 commends the New York State Legislature for its proactive efforts this session to strengthen animal cruelty laws. We particularly applaud the introduction of Senate Bill \$703\$ and its Assembly counterpart A2019, which would strengthen penalties for aggravated cruelty to animals by expanding the definition to include cases where individuals intentionally cause any physical injury to companion animals, not just "serious" injury as currently required. This important legislation, sponsored by Senator Krueger and Assembly Member Rosenthal respectively, demonstrates the Legislature's commitment to protecting vulnerable animals and holding perpetrators accountable.

The removal of the "serious" qualifier from the physical injury standard represents meaningful progress in ensuring that all intentional acts of cruelty face appropriate legal consequences. This change acknowledges that any intentional infliction of physical harm on companion animals constitutes a serious offense worthy of enhanced penalties.

The Need for Continued Enhancement of Penalties

While we strongly support S703/A2019, our committee discussion revealed that additional strengthening of animal cruelty penalties remains necessary. During our May 19th meeting, concerns were raised about the adequacy of current punishment levels for the full spectrum of animal crimes. Representatives from the New York Animal Care Centers, other neighborhood-based animal support and advocacy groups, and local law enforcement testified about ongoing challenges they face in addressing animal cruelty cases, emphasizing that existing penalties often do not serve as adequate deterrents or provide appropriate justice for these serious crimes.

Building on the progress represented by S703/A2019, we encourage the Legislature to consider further enhancements that would:

- Strengthen penalties for repeat offenders of animal cruelty
- Expand protections to include additional categories of animals beyond companion animals
- Enhance penalties for organized animal fighting and breeding operations
- Provide mandatory counseling and intervention programs for offenders
- Create stronger enforcement mechanisms and reporting requirements

Support for TNR Programs

Our committee heard extensive testimony about the critical role of Trap, Neuter, and Release programs in addressing New York's stray animal crisis. With an estimated 500,000 to 1 million stray cats in New York City alone, TNR represents one of the most effective and humane approaches to population control. However, community-based organizations struggle to provide these services at necessary scales due to funding limitations and regulatory barriers.

State legislation should:

- Formally recognize and support TNR as a legitimate animal welfare strategy
- Provide funding mechanisms for community-based TNR programs
- Remove regulatory barriers that impede effective TNR implementation
- Establish standards and best practices for TNR operations

Enhanced Animal Protection Measures

Beyond punishment and population control, comprehensive legislation should strengthen protections for animals throughout New York State. Our committee's discussion revealed gaps in current law that leave animals vulnerable and limit the ability of welfare organizations and law enforcement to intervene effectively.

We urge consideration of measures that:

- Expand definitions of animal cruelty to address emerging forms of abuse
- Strengthen reporting requirements and protections for those reporting abuse
- Enhance authority for animal welfare organizations to investigate and respond

• Improve coordination between law enforcement and animal welfare groups

Increased Funding for Animal Welfare and Law Enforcement

The testimony we received consistently highlighted inadequate funding as a primary barrier to effective animal welfare work. Community-based organizations rely heavily on private donations while facing increasing costs for veterinary care, facility operations, and program implementation. State funding would significantly enhance these organizations' capacity to serve animals and communities throughout New York.

Enhanced Law Enforcement Resources for Animal Crimes

Equally critical is the need for increased funding to state and local law enforcement agencies to strengthen their capacity to combat and prosecute violence against animals. During our committee meeting, NYPD representatives from the 94th Precinct outlined their protocols for responding to animal cruelty cases, while also noting resource constraints that limit their ability to fully investigate and pursue these crimes.

Effective enforcement of strengthened animal cruelty laws requires dedicated resources, including:

- Coordination mechanisms between local law enforcement, state agencies, and animal welfare organizations
- Additional personnel in prosecutors' offices specifically assigned to animal cruelty cases, allowing for more thorough investigations and follow-up
- Enhanced forensic capabilities including veterinary expertise and specialized equipment for documenting animal abuse
- **Prosecutor training and resources** to ensure district attorneys' offices have the expertise and capacity to successfully prosecute animal cruelty cases
- **Specialized training programs** for law enforcement officers on animal cruelty investigation techniques, evidence collection, and case development

The investment in law enforcement resources would ensure that stronger penalties are backed by robust investigation and prosecution capabilities, creating a comprehensive approach to deterring animal cruelty throughout New York State.

Local Impact and Statewide Need

While our board represents North Brooklyn neighborhoods, the issues we addressed affect communities throughout New York State. Rural and urban areas alike face their own challenges with stray animal populations, animal cruelty cases, and under-resourced welfare organizations. Comprehensive state legislation would provide consistent standards and support across all regions.

Our Request

Brooklyn Community Board 1 respectfully urges you to:

- 1. **Introduce or support legislation** that significantly strengthens penalties for animal cruelty crimes, ensuring consequences reflect the seriousness of these offenses
- 2. **Champion TNR program support** through dedicated funding and regulatory frameworks that enable community organizations to scale their life-saving work
- Enhance animal protection laws to address gaps in current statutes and improve enforcement capabilities
- Allocate increased state funding for animal welfare initiatives, supporting law enforcement agencies and prosecutors' offices, municipal facilities, and communitybased organizations

Conclusion

The support from our community board reflects the broad consensus that New York State must do more to protect animals and support the organizations working on their behalf. We stand ready to work with you and provide additional information about the specific challenges and opportunities we have identified in our district.

We urge swift action on comprehensive animal welfare legislation that addresses these interconnected issues. The animals in our communities—and the dedicated people who care for them—deserve nothing less than our full commitment to meaningful reform.

Thank you for your leadership on this important issue.

Brooklyn Community Board 1, representing the neighborhoods of Williamsburg and Greenpoint, writes to urge your support for comprehensive legislation that strengthens penalties against individuals who commit crimes against animals, supports Trap, Neuter, and Release (TNR) efforts, enhances animal protection measures, and provides additional funding for animal welfare initiatives.

Community Board Action

At our May 19, 2025 Public Safety & Human Services Committee meeting, Brooklyn Community Board 1 unanimously approved a motion to recommend that state elected officials pass legislation addressing these critical animal welfare issues. This unanimous vote followed extensive testimony from animal welfare organizations, law enforcement, state elected officials, and community stakeholders who provided compelling evidence of the need for stronger state-level intervention.

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Brooklyn Community Board 1 commends the New York State Legislature for its proactive efforts this session to strengthen animal cruelty laws. We particularly applaud the introduction of Senate Bill <u>S703</u> and its Assembly counterpart <u>A2019</u>, which would strengthen penalties for aggravated cruelty to animals by expanding the definition to include cases where individuals intentionally cause any physical injury to companion animals, not just "serious" injury as currently required. This important legislation, sponsored by Senator Krueger and Assembly Member Rosenthal respectively, demonstrates the Legislature's commitment to protecting vulnerable animals and holding perpetrators accountable.

Dear Council Members,

On June 10, 2025, Brooklyn Community Board #1, informed by a recommendation from its Public Safety & Human Services Committee, voted unanimously to send the following request for support:

Brooklyn Community Board 1, representing the neighborhoods of Williamsburg and Greenpoint, writes to express our strong support for the proposed \$1.5 million allocation in FY 2026 for the Trap, Neuter, and Release (TNR) Citywide Initiative.

At our May 19, 2025 Public Safety & Human Services Committee meeting focused on animal welfare in our district, we heard compelling testimony from multiple stakeholders that underscored the critical need for expanded TNR services. Representatives from New York Animal Care Centers, Greenpoint Cats, Brooklyn Bridge Animal Welfare Coalition, and other community organizations presented clear evidence of the challenges facing our borough and city regarding stray and homeless animal populations.

The Crisis in Our Community

Our committee learned that New York City currently has an estimated 500,000 to 1 million stray cats, a population that exploded during the COVID-19 pandemic when TNR services were suspended and pet abandonment increased. This overwhelming number directly contributes to the overcrowding crisis at Animal Care Centers of New York (ACC) facilities. In our district alone, we have observed multiple areas where stray cats congregate, creating public health concerns and quality of life issues for residents.

The TNR Solution

The evidence presented to our committee demonstrates that TNR programs represent one of the most effective and humane approaches to reducing stray animal populations. However, the cost of veterinary services has become prohibitively expensive, with average spay and neuter procedures now costing approximately \$1,000. This financial barrier prevents community-based animal rescue organizations from providing TNR services at the scale necessary to meaningfully address the crisis.

The proposed \$1.5 million investment would provide spay and neuter surgeries for over 8,000 animals annually—a significant step toward reducing the homeless animal population that burdens our shelter system and impacts community quality of life.

Community Impact and Support

Our committee heard from volunteers and organizations who work tirelessly to address this issue through private donations and volunteer efforts. These dedicated community members, including representatives from Greenpoint Cats and Brooklyn Bridge Animal Welfare Coalition, emphasized that without adequate funding, the scope of the problem far exceeds what existing groups can handle through volunteer engagement alone.

The testimony we received highlighted several key benefits of robust TNR programming:

- Reduction in stray animal populations through humane intervention
- Decreased burden on overcrowded shelter facilities
- Improved community health and quality of life
- Cost-effective approach compared to repeated animal control responses
- Support for community-based organizations already doing this essential work

Brooklyn Community Board 1's Commitment

Brooklyn Community Board 1 approved a motion to support the \$1.5 million budget request for TNR services. This vote reflects our community's recognition that addressing animal welfare is not only a matter of compassion but also a critical component of public health and community well-being.

We urge the City Council to include this \$1.5 million allocation in the FY 2026 budget to establish a citywide TNR initiative in partnership with non-profit, community-based animal rescue

organizations. This investment will provide the resources, support, and assistance necessary to make meaningful progress in addressing New York City's stray animal crisis.

Conclusion

The need for expanded TNR services is urgent and well-documented. With your support, this funding will enable community organizations to scale their life-saving work and create lasting positive change for both animals and residents throughout New York City.

We respectfully request your support for this critical initiative and stand ready to work with you to ensure its successful implementation in our district and citywide.

Testimony to the NYC Charter Revision Commission

Community Board 1 - Community Impact Review Provision

June 23, 2025

Good evening, Commissioners. My name is Lloyd Feng, representing Brooklyn Community Board 1, serving the Williamsburg and Greenpoint neighborhoods, where I am chair of the Public Safety and Human Services Committee. I am here to urge you to consider adding a Community Impact Review provision to the New York City Charter that would strengthen community boards' role in neighborhood decision-making, specifically related to Dining Out NYC.

The Need for Reform

Community boards serve as the critical link between city agencies and the neighborhoods we represent. Yet too often, programs and policies that directly impact our communities are implemented without meaningful community input or adequate review time. This gap undermines both democratic participation and the quality of city decision-making.

Our board has experienced this firsthand with programs like Dining Out NYC, where applications for roadside dining and sidewalk cafes often proceed without sufficient community board review. We frequently learn about applications with inadequate time for our board to conduct thorough analysis, convene community input, and provide meaningful recommendations. Some applicants and agencies have even used our summer recess period to avoid community engagement entirely.

We regularly receive complaints from residents who are frustrated by what appears to be a lack of transparency and clear opportunity for community input on applications that would significantly impact their families' quality of life. These applications affect noise levels, crowd density, cleanliness, safety concerns, and traffic patterns in residential neighborhoods. When residents feel shut out of processes that directly affect their daily lives, it breeds distrust not only in government agencies but unfortunately in community boards as well, even though we often lack adequate notice ourselves.

This status quo is unnecessary and counterproductive. Community boards exist precisely to serve as conveners of community input on neighborhood-affecting decisions. We need

sufficient time and real opportunity to fulfill this essential function for Dining Out NYC applications.

Our Proposed Solution

Community Board 1 unanimously supports adding the following provision to the NYC Charter:

"Prior to implementation of any program, policy, or infrastructure change related to Dining Out NYC within a community district, the relevant agency shall provide the affected community board with a sixty (60) day review period and opportunity for advisory comment. No such review period may commence between June 30th and September 1st unless the community board specifically votes to waive this restriction. Any submission received during this period shall be deemed submitted on September 16th for purposes of calculating the review period."

The provision includes appropriate emergency exceptions requiring agency head certification and Borough President concurrence, ensuring legitimate urgent matters can still proceed while preventing routine circumvention of community input.

Why This Matters

This provision would provide three critical protections:

First, adequate review time. Sixty business days allows community boards to properly analyze proposals, schedule community meetings, gather resident input, and develop informed recommendations. Rushed reviews serve neither the community nor the agencies that benefit from local knowledge and support.

Second, summer recess protection. Community boards cannot function effectively during July and August when members and residents are away. Agencies should not be able to use this period to avoid community engagement.

Third, Charter-level permanence. Unlike local laws that can be easily modified, Charter provisions provide stable, long-term protection for community participation in city governance.

Broader Benefits

While we focus on Dining Out NYC, this framework could serve as a model for other neighborhood-impacting programs. Community boards across the city face similar challenges with transportation changes, development projects, and policy implementations that proceed without adequate community input.

Our unique role in convening community members to discuss proposals that impact residents should be respected and formalized in city processes. This provision would enable us to fulfill our advisory function with the time and notice necessary to provide meaningful recommendations.

Conclusion

Brooklyn Community Board 1 serves Williamsburg and Greenpoint, neighborhoods experiencing significant growth and change. Our residents deserve advance notice and meaningful opportunity to participate in decisions that affect their daily lives. This Community Impact Review provision would strengthen democratic governance while improving the quality of agency decision-making through better community input.

We urge the Commission to include this provision in any Charter revisions. Thank you for your consideration and for the opportunity to testify tonight.
