What's New

Special Inspections Under the New Codes



Under the New NYC Construction Codes, Special Inspections replace Controlled Inspections for all construction projects filed on or after July 1, 2008. Registration for the Special Inspection Agency program will be rolled out in Spring 2009, allowing agencies to electronically register with the Department. Beginning July 1, 2010, Special Inspection Agencies must be accredited by the International Accreditation Service, Inc. (IAS) or an equivalent accreditation agency accrediting to ASTM E329-07 international standards. At that time, Special Inspections (PDF) may only be performed by Special Inspectors working for a Buildings Department-approved Special Inspection Agency. IAS is now accepting applications for accreditation.

Guidelines for Making Plan Examination Appointments

To make scheduling plan examination appointments easier, the Buildings Department's Plan Exam Notification System (PENS) validates job information before the appointment is scheduled. To assist with PENS, we have created <u>guidelines</u> (PDF) that include information about how to register as well as how to schedule and cancel appointments.

Penalties for Tower Crane Operators Involved in Fatal Accident

Dedicated to Safety

On November 13, Commissioner LiMandri <u>announced</u> that administrative penalties were imposed in a disciplinary case brought against two tower crane operators involved in a construction fatality at 600 West 42nd Street. On September 4, 2008, a worker at the site fell from a platform attached to the tower crane that was being dismantled. Christopher Van Duyne

will be subject to an eight-month suspension of his Class B HMO license, and his brother, James Van Duyne, will be subject to a six-month suspension of his Class B HMO license. Each individual also must pay a total of \$25,000 to the Department and is required to complete a minimum of 30 hours of Department-approved training before the suspension period ends.

Requirements for Refuse Chutes in Hotels

Dedicated to Safety

On November 14, the Department issued <u>Buildings Bulletin - 2008-010</u> (PDF) which clarifies when a refuse chute may be omitted from a hotel. Refuse chutes are required in certain multiple dwellings under the 1968 and 2008 building codes. The bulletin clarifies what conditions a transient hotel with daily cleaning services must meet to be exempt from this requirement. Making it Easier

The new <u>LIC1</u> (Original Licensing Application) and <u>LIC2</u> (Renewal Application) are now online. As of January 1, 2009 this will be the only version accepted by the Department.

The Department has participated in National Elevator-Escalator Safety Awareness Week for the past six years, teaching more than 3,000 students about elevator and escalator safety.

Executive Staff Reorganization

Information You Need To Know

The Department's Executive Staff reorganization became effective November 17. As part of the reorganization, four of the five Borough Commissioners have been reassigned to new boroughs, one has been given a new leadership post within the Department and the Deputy Brooklyn Borough Commissioner has been assigned to fill the open position.

New Boiler Annual Inspection Cycle

On January 1, 2009, a <u>new boiler annual inspection cycle</u> (PDF) will become effective. To accommodate the new cycle, the 2009 inspection cycle will be a shortened inspection year.

With the implementation of the New NYC Construction Codes, the Department has <u>enhanced</u> the inspection and filing requirements for elevators (pdf). These new requirements will become effective January 1, 2009.

If your job was at approved status as of June 30, 2008, the permits for the job must be pulled before January 1, 2009 otherwise the "2008 TR1 Required" item (prior-to-permit) and 2008 Code Special and Progress Inspections will be required. License Term and Fee Changes

Information You Need To Know

All Master and Special Rigger, Master and Special Sign Hanger and Tower Crane Rigger licenses will be extended to three-year terms beginning January 1, 2009. The fees for certain license types have also changed. For more information, view the License Term and Fee Changes fact sheet (PDF).
