Administrative Prosecution Unit on the success of
it's recent Continuing Legal Education Seminar.

The CCRB's APU is a model for administrative
prosecution, not only here in New York but across
the nation.

It is a point of pride for this agency, and I'm always glad whenever our APU can serve as a guide for others as it did on Monday.

I also want to acknowledge the wonderful celebration of the Puerto Rican Day Heritage that took place in the City on Sunday. The theme of this year's Puerto Rican Day Parade 'One Nation Many Voices,' captured how much people of Puerto Rican descent have influenced this City and this country.

The day also served as a reminder that we must continue to stand with our fellow

Americans in Puerto Rico, as they continue to face the harrowing reality that is the aftermath of Hurricane Maria. Our thoughts and prayers always will remain with them.

And last but not least of all, June is pride month. And I am pleased to join -- I was

pleased to join members of the CCRB at the Brooklyn Pride Parade on Saturday. We actually had a good time.

Pride month is a time not only for parades and celebrating the progress we've made when it comes to LGBT rights, it is also for a time for thinking about how we can move forward together as a City. The CCRB takes this mandate very seriously and has taken steps to create a New York that is safer and fair for the LGBTQ community.

Among these steps are, conducting affirming outreach to the LGBTQ advocates; updating our complaint database to include gender neutral honorifics and additional fields for complaints preferred name and gender identity; and a 2016 report that included recommendations that help combat a discrimination that too many LGBTQ people, particularly transwoman of color and homeless youth continue to face.

And with the full implementation of the body-worn camera program coming at the end of this year, we're confident that we'll be better able to ascertain what took place during

police/civilian interactions. While this is always important, it takes on a particular significance when we consider the fact that audio footage very often is the only way to determine if, for example, an officer used a homophobic or transphobic slur when engaging with a civilian.

All of these elements are important parts of a larger effort, one that started right here in New York at Stonewall almost 50 years ago. It's an effort to uphold the civil rights of LGBTQ people, not only here in the City but everywhere. And not only during pride month but every month.

I want to say one more thing and then
I will proceed with the agenda. That is, our
Executive Director John Darche is not with us.
He's actually taking some well-deserved vacation.
He was due to have that vacation last week, but
his grandmother passed away and so he had to
delay the -- his vacation so that he could be
with his family.
