Mental Health and Policing

This month, while focusing on mental health in the community, the Policy Unit wanted to provide more information about one allegation of police misconduct related to mental health, and individuals experiencing a mental health crisis, that has increased in the last few years.

Forcible Removal to the Hospital

Patrol Guide Procedure 221-13: Mentally III or Emotionally Disturbed Persons:

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PROCEDURE: When a uniformed member of the service reasonably believes that a person who is apparently mentally ill or emotionally disturbed, [and] must be taken into protective custody because the person is conducting himself in a manner likely to result in a serious injury to himself or others.

Investigators look for officers to have a specific, objective reason to believe an individual is conducting themselves in a way that is "likely to result in serious injury to himself or others."

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- Whether information about the C/V's medical background was actually derived from a medical professional
- Whether an alternative police action (such as an arrest or summons) would have been more appropriate given the situation
