## 1 PROCEEDINGS

2 MS. ALVAREZ: Good afternoon,  
3 everyone. Thank you so much for joining  
4 us. For those that will be utilizing  
5 interpreters, ASL interpreters, our ASL  
6 interpreters today will be Craig Ridgway  
7 and Beth. And we will send the  
8 information on how to pin videos in the  
9 chat. Thank you so much.

10 CHAIR DAVIE: Good evening and thank  
11 you, Yojaira.

12 Welcome everyone to the Civilian  
13 Complaint Review Board's June board  
14 meeting. My name is Fred Davie and I am  
15 chair of the board.

16 I'm going to ask my fellow board  
17 members to introduce themselves. But  
18 first, I want to introduce our newest  
19 board member, who is going to join us  
20 shortly. As I understand it, he may be  
21 having.

22 (Whereupon there were technical  
23 difficulties.)

24 MR. DARCHE: Okay. Is Fred still --

25 CHAIR DAVIE: Or is he on? Is Dr.

1 Carolina on?

2 (No response)

3 CHAIR DAVIE: All right. We are not  
4 hearing from him. I'm going to ask my  
5 fellow board members if they would  
6 introduce themselves.

7 Can you all hear me?

8 All right.

9 MR. DARCHE: Now we can.

10 CHAIR DAVIE: Okay. How much did  
11 you -- did you lose me for a while.

12 MR. DARCHE: Yes.

13 CHAIR DAVIE: Where did I --

14 MR. DARCHE: You were introducing  
15 Dr. Carolina.

16 CHAIR DAVIE: All right. So all  
17 right. I'm sorry about that. It is a  
18 difficulty of trying to communicate  
19 across the internet. So -- so  
20 Dr. Carolina is joining us as a mayoral  
21 designee, and I believe we were first  
22 introduced to Dr. Carolina at hour  
23 Staten Island board meeting two years  
24 ago.

25 We'd like to have him speak to us,

1 but I don't think he's on yet; is that  
2 correct?

3 MR. DARCHE: That is correct.

4 CHAIR DAVIE: Is that correct?

5 MS. ALVAREZ: We're upgrading them  
6 shortly so you can proceed with the  
7 other board members.

8 CHAIR DAVIE: Okay. So I'll ask my  
9 fellow board members to introduce  
10 themselves, and I will start with  
11 Ms. Bond.

12 MS. BOND: Good afternoon. My name  
13 is Erica Bond, and I'm a mayoral  
14 designee, born and raised in Brooklyn.

15 CHAIR DAVIE: Mr. Dwyer.

16 MR. DWYER: Good afternoon. I'm  
17 Frank Dwyer. I'm a Police Commissioner  
18 designee. I was also born and raised in  
19 Brooklyn.

20 CHAIR DAVIE: Mr. Siegal.

21 MR. Siegal, I think --

22 MS. BOND: You're on mute, John.

23 MR. SIEGAL: Good afternoon. I'm  
24 John Siegal, I'm appointed by Mayor De  
25 Blasio; not born and raised in Brooklyn.

1 I reside in the Bronx and practice law  
2 in Manhattan.

3 CHAIR DAVIE: Mr. Joseph.

4 MR. JOSEPH: Good afternoon,  
5 everyone. I'm a City Council designee,  
6 and I live in Staten Island.

7 CHAIR DAVIE: Mr. Rivadeneyra.

8 MR. RIVADENEYRA: Good afternoon,  
9 everyone, Michael Rivadeneyra. I am a  
10 City Council designee, and I reside in  
11 the Bronx.

12 CHAIR DAVIE: Mr. Puma.

13 MR. PUMA: Good afternoon, everyone.  
14 My name is Joseph Puma. I'm a City  
15 Council designee to the board from the  
16 Borough of Manhattan where I was born  
17 and raised and still live.

18 CHAIR DAVIE: Right. And I is Mr.  
19 Carcaterra on the phone.

20 MS. ALVAREZ: No.

21 MR. DARCHE: I don't think Mr.  
22 Carcaterra's joining us today.

23 CHAIR.

24 CHAIR DAVIE: Okay. And -- think  
25 our newest board member, Dr. Carolina's

1 on the -- on the phone. Dr. Carolina,  
2 if you'd like to introduce yourself to  
3 us.

4 MR. CAROLINA: Hello. Everyone can  
5 hear me?

6 CHAIR DAVIE: Yes, we can.  
7 Please -- please go ahead.

8 MR. CAROLINA: Wonderful.  
9 Demetrius Carolina; a mayoral  
10 appointee, and I'm in Staten Island.

11 CHAIR DAVIE: Excellent. And  
12 welcome. We're really pleased that  
13 you've joined us, and we hope to be  
14 in-person in the fall. But we'll look  
15 forward to continuing to be in touch and  
16 have conversations well before we are  
17 gathered again in person.

18 But welcome to the Civilian Review  
19 Complaint Board.

20 MR. CAROLINA: And thank you so  
21 much. Pleasure to be here.

22 CHAIR DAVIE: Before I get into my  
23 remarks, we have just, as always, a  
24 housekeeping detail to attend to and  
25 that is to approve the minutes of the



1 last meeting is there a motion?

2 MR. RIVADENEYRA: Motion.

3 CHAIR DAVIE: Is there a second?

4 MR. DWYER: Second.

5 MR. JOSEPH: Second.

6 MS. BOND: Second.

7 CHAIR DAVIE: Are there any  
8 corrections or additions, revisions?

9 (No response)

10 CHAIR DAVIE: All those in favor of  
11 approving the minutes, please say aye.

12 MS. BOND: Aye.

13 MR. PUMA: Aye.

14 MR. RIVADENEYRA: Aye.

15 MR. SIEGAL: Aye.

16 MR. DWYER: Aye.

17 MR. JOSEPH: Aye.

18 CHAIR DAVIE: All those opposed, no.

19 (No response)

20 CHAIR DAVIE: All right. The  
21 minutes are approved.

22 Do we have Mr. Freeman here?

23 MR. FREEMAN: I'm here.

24 CHAIR DAVIE: Mr. Freeman, would you  
25 like to introduce yourself?

1           MR. FREEMAN: Willie Freeman; I'm a  
2           Police Commissioner designee. I reside  
3           in Brooklyn.

4           CHAIR DAVIE: Great, welcome.

5           All right. So I'm excited for the  
6           most part that New York City will be  
7           able to get somewhat closer to normal  
8           this month, Pride Month, following a  
9           tumultuous year and a half we've had  
10          with COVID-19, the pandemic and the  
11          protests that we had last summer.

12          This being Pride Month, the city's  
13          LGBTQ+ community has had to overcome  
14          tremendous adversity over the decades  
15          and is still confronting challenges that  
16          face the black, brown and transgender  
17          people within our community.

18          This year, and really the past five  
19          years, have made it clear that this  
20          adversity is still very real and very  
21          present. That's why I find this year's  
22          pride theme, "the fight continues,"  
23          extraordinarily fitting to me, in  
24          addition to the work we have to do to  
25          make New York City a better and more

1           accepting the place for the LGBT  
2           community.

3           The fight continues as a call to  
4           keep pushing for common sense reforms to  
5           the way this city and our country  
6           addresses police accountability. We can  
7           all agree on some fundamental  
8           principles, I believe: independent  
9           oversight of police is essential to  
10          earning community trust; police officers  
11          who commit misconduct should be held  
12          accountable. And policing in the U.S.  
13          today and across the decades is  
14          racialized, and this racialized policing  
15          should be confronted and rooted out.

16          The administration has taken some  
17          really positive steps to address these  
18          principles. By introducing his David  
19          Dinkins Plan, Mayor De Blasio has made a  
20          commitment to strengthening this agency  
21          because he recognizes the importance or  
22          the important role of a strong CCRB and  
23          the role it can play in improving  
24          community relations.

25          By advancing the NYPD's disciplinary

1 matrix and urging the police department  
2 to commit to abiding by it through a  
3 signed MOU that Commissioner Shea and I  
4 signed, the city has done everything --  
5 it has done a lot to empower the CCRB's  
6 disciplinary recommendations.

7 And by providing the CCRB with the  
8 legal mandate to investigate racial  
9 profiling, we can really start to  
10 address in an independent, impartial  
11 manner, the racialized policing that  
12 does, indeed, happen in the city. But  
13 this isn't -- this isn't the end of the  
14 road. The fight continues.

15 If we want civilian oversight, it  
16 does -- that does the work to resolve  
17 differences between community and the  
18 police, we need empowered civilian  
19 oversight with the ability to access  
20 evidence in a direct, unfettered manner.

21 If we want to hold police officers  
22 accountable more efficiently and  
23 independently, it is critical the CCRB  
24 have final disciplinary authority in its  
25 investigations.

1           If we want to address the racialized  
2           policing that takes place in the city,  
3           by empowering the CCRB to investigate  
4           it, then the agency needs access to  
5           sealed information that we cannot obtain  
6           under state law.

7           As many of you know, we talk about  
8           final authority and access to police  
9           documentation. So I especially want to  
10          linger on that last point. Our legal  
11          mandate to investigate racial profiling.

12          New Yorkers deserve serious  
13          comprehensive, independent  
14          investigations into racial profiling,  
15          and the CCRB is the appropriate agency  
16          to investigate these allegations. I  
17          have full confidence and in our staff's  
18          ability to grow the team and address  
19          these allegations.

20          I know we are the right agency to  
21          conduct both the individual conduct  
22          investigations and the pattern and  
23          practice investigations that will be  
24          necessary to make determinations of fact  
25          when addressing allegations of racial

1           profiling.

2           But in order to fully be able to  
3           achieve this new legal mandate, it is  
4           tremendously important that the state  
5           legislation exempt the CCRB from state  
6           sealing statutes. The legislature has  
7           one day left in session.

8           If serious racial profiling  
9           investigations are to be successful in  
10          New York City, no matter the conclusions  
11          they draw, we need this change before  
12          the assembly session ends this week.

13          I am grateful for assembly member,  
14          Catalina Cruz; Senator Jamaal Bailey;  
15          and Senator Brian Benjamin's efforts to  
16          address the sealing statute issue and  
17          the challenges it creates for the CCRB.

18  
19          I'm also grateful for assembly  
20          member Cruz and Senator Baily's efforts  
21          to provide the CCRB with final  
22          disciplinary authority. It is my hope  
23          that Albany were pursue these reforms  
24          that will significantly improve police  
25          oversight in New York City as we all

1 know the fight continues.

2 I'd now like to turn the mic over to  
3 Jonathan Darche, our executive director.

4 Mr. Darche.

5 MR. DARCHE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.  
6 Staff has been hard at work, preparing  
7 the agency to move into Phase 2 of  
8 sexual misconduct investigations. For  
9 those not aware, CCRB broke sexual  
10 misconduct investigations into two  
11 phases.

12 Our staff have experience  
13 investigating things like discourtesy  
14 and offensive language. So Phase 1  
15 sexual misconduct, things like verbal  
16 harassment were a smoother transition  
17 for our investigators. And we began  
18 investigating those types of cases as  
19 soon as the rules went into effect.

20 Phase 2 sexual misconduct covers  
21 things of a physical nature. We wanted  
22 staff to have training to be become  
23 certified in administering, forensic,  
24 experiential trauma interviews.

25 We deemed it important to treat --

1 to treat these investigations and the  
2 survivors of sexual misconduct with  
3 sensitivity and respect. And this  
4 training is an important part of that.

5 We also want to build capacity in  
6 our civilian assistance and  
7 administrative prosecution units to  
8 handle these cases and the survivors'  
9 needs appropriately.

10 I'm proud to announce on June 1st,  
11 CCRB began investigate Phase 2 types of  
12 misconduct. This type of misconduct is  
13 reprehensible. New Yorkers need the  
14 CCRB to conduct independent  
15 investigations into sexual misconduct,  
16 perpetrated by uniformed members of the  
17 NYPD.

18 Just some quick updates on agency  
19 operations. The CCRB continues to  
20 review protest cases from 2020. We  
21 expect to have a protest report up this  
22 year. CCRB staff have made a return to  
23 the office, with staff operating on a  
24 flexible schedule of mixed, in-person,  
25 and remote work.



1           If you need to file a complaint in  
2 person, we are welcoming walk-in  
3 complainants. However, we still  
4 recommend complainants to file online or  
5 over the phone if possible. In public  
6 session, please use the raise hand  
7 feature to make a comment.

8           If you have the participant tab  
9 open, the raise the hand button is on  
10 the button right of your screen.

11           And I want to thank staff for your  
12 hard work during this past year and a  
13 half of struggle. And thank you again  
14 to the members of the public for  
15 participating in this hearing.

16           CHAIR DAVIE: Thank you, Mr. Darche.

17           Now, I think board member Simmons  
18 has joined us since we started.

19           You want to introduce yourself?

20           And I think you're on mute still.

21           MS. SIMMONS: Good afternoon, all.  
22 Glad to be here. I'm traveling, but  
23 nothing stops CCRB board members. So  
24 here I am. I am appointed by the Public  
25 Advocate's Office, citywide. I'm glad

1 to be here.

2 CHAIR DAVIE: Thank you and thanks  
3 for making the extra effort to attend  
4 the meeting.

5 We're now going to have a  
6 presentation.

7 (Whereupon there were technical  
8 difficulties.)

9 MR. DARCHE: Fred, you're muted.

10 CHAIR DAVIE: Now I'm muted, yeah.

11 So we're now going to have a  
12 presentation by our Deputy Director For  
13 Outreach and Intergovernmental Affairs,  
14 Jahi Rose. Jahi.

15 MR. ROSE: Thank you very much,  
16 Chair Davie.

17 I'm just going to share my screen.

18 (Whereupon, Mr. Rose shared an  
19 presentation on the screen.)

20 MR. ROSE: Okay. Can everyone see  
21 my screen?

22 MS. BOND: Yes.

23 CHAIR DAVIE: Yes.

24 MR. ROSE: As you all may know, the  
25 Civilian Complaint Review Board is the

1 largest civilian oversight over the  
2 largest police force in the country.

3 The CCRB investigates, mediates and  
4 prosecutes allegations and complaints of  
5 police misconduct against members of the  
6 NYPD. You've met a few of our board  
7 members. Our agency is governed by a  
8 15-member board: Five seats are  
9 appointed by the mayor; five are  
10 appointed about the New York City  
11 Council; three designated by the Police  
12 Commissioner; one appointed by the  
13 Public Advocate. And the Chair, as  
14 you've met, Davie, is jointly appointed  
15 by the mayor and the City Council.

16 The CCRB investigates allegations of  
17 police misconduct. However, we are --  
18 our jurisdiction falls in the categories  
19 of FADO. The helpful acronym, FADO.  
20 FADO stands for force, abuse of  
21 authority, discourtesy and offensive  
22 language. That's the jurisdiction that  
23 the agency is allowed to investigate.

24 I wanted to give you some brief  
25 information regarding The Right To Know

1 Act. The Right To Know Act is a law  
2 that changes -- changes police  
3 interactions as of October 19, 2018.  
4 This pertains to certain stop and frisk,  
5 sobriety checks, and certain police  
6 encounters.

7 Under certain circumstances, police  
8 officers should identify themselves,  
9 providing their name, badge number and  
10 other information, such as rank and  
11 command. And with some exceptions, they  
12 should explain the purpose of the  
13 interaction.

14 They should inform an individual of  
15 their right to say no when asking for  
16 your consent to search your person,  
17 property, vehicle or home. And in  
18 certain circumstances, offer a business  
19 card when -- with an officer's  
20 information which explains how to  
21 comment and/or complain about the  
22 interactions with the New York City  
23 police officer. Civilians may request a  
24 business card in all encounters.

25 This is an example of what the

1 business cards looks like, front and  
2 back. Now, there are a few ways to  
3 report police misconduct. Just to name  
4 a few, you can file a complaint using  
5 the CCRB's website, as previously  
6 mentioned by John Darche, at  
7 [nyc.gov/ccrbcomplaint](http://nyc.gov/ccrbcomplaint). You could also  
8 call the CCRB's hotline, at  
9 1-800-341-CCRB.

10 Remember, if you see footage of  
11 misconduct on social media or in the  
12 news, you can file a complaint even if  
13 you weren't there in person.

14 The other ways to file a complaint  
15 to the CCRB regarding misconduct include  
16 calling 3-1-1. You could visit our  
17 office at 100 Church Street on the 10th  
18 floor in lower Manhattan. You could  
19 send a letter to the CCRB at 100 Church  
20 Street on the 10th floor, New York, New  
21 York, zip code 10007.

22 You could also file a complaint at a  
23 local police precinct, any police  
24 precinct in the City of New York.

25 So here's some information regarding

1 the investigative unit, their roles and  
2 response and their experiences. Our  
3 team is comprised of some of the best  
4 and brightest undergraduate and graduate  
5 students with a variety of educational  
6 and institutions nationwide.

7 And a few ways to apply for the  
8 investigative position include the NYC  
9 careers portal, [nyc.gov](http://nyc.gov) -- on [nyc.gov](http://nyc.gov)  
10 also [www.idealists.org](http://www.idealists.org) and  
11 [www.joinhandshake.com](http://www.joinhandshake.com).

12 If you have any questions regarding  
13 applying you can it feel free to submit  
14 a cover letter and resume to  
15 [career@ccrb.nyc.gov](mailto:career@ccrb.nyc.gov) for any future  
16 interest.

17 The CCRB will be having its first  
18 CCRB virtual lounge on June 25th from  
19 4:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Feel free to  
20 join us as we discuss other -- the CCRB  
21 will be providing information. And  
22 we're excited to hear your questions and  
23 concerns regarding police oversight.

9           Thank you very much, Chair.

10          CHAIR DAVIE: Thank you, Jahi.

11          Do any of the board members have  
12          questions for Jahi?

13          (No response)

14          CHAIR DAVIE: All right. Thanks  
15          again for that presentation.

16          We're now going to go to public  
17          comment. I will remind the public again  
18          that if you have a comment, please use  
19          the raise hand feature, raise the hand  
20          feature on your controls.

21          We're also going to remind the  
22          public that you have two minutes for  
23          your comments. So we're going to ask  
24          you to keep that in mind because there  
25          are -- we want to make sure that

1           everybody that has come to speak has an  
2           opportunity to do that.

3           So I'm going ask, Yojaira, if you  
4           would please call on the first person  
5           whose signed up to speak. Thank you.

6           MS ALVAREZ: Thank you, Chair.

7           Before we get to our first speaker,  
8           who will be joining us via phone, I want  
9           to acknowledge and thank representatives  
10          from the following offices for attending  
11          today's meeting: representatives from  
12          the office of Assemblyman Tannousis and  
13          public advocate Jumaane Williams,  
14          Council member Adrienne Adams,  
15          Councilwoman Carolina Rivera, Senator  
16          Lanza and Community Board 1. And  
17          special acknowledgement to the Seattle  
18          community police commission for joining  
19          us as well.

20          Greg, and with the phone number

25          MS. ORTIZ: Hi. Good afternoon.



1 This is Melissa Ortiz. I'm actually  
2 representing the office of Congress  
3 member, Nydia Velazquez. Unfortunately,  
4 the link in my email is not working.  
5 But I want -- I did want to make an  
6 inquiry to the board with respect to the  
7 membership as it applies to specifically  
8 to NYCHA residents, to know that -- or  
9 to know if there's any participation  
10 from NYCHA residents as a subcommittee  
11 or part of the committee already, as  
12 well as the youth committee.

13 CHAIR DAVIE: So I don't know  
14 whether any of our board members are  
15 NYCHA residents or not

16 MR. DARCHE: Mr. Puma.

17 I believe he is.

18 MR. PUMA: Yes. I've been a  
19 lifelong NYCHA resident and was a former  
20 constituent of congresswoman Velazquez  
21 until redistricting a few years ago.

22 CHAIR DAVIE: Great. Great.

23 MS. ORTIZ: Great.

24 MR. DARCHE: Yojaira, according to  
25 the youth committee, do we have any

1 NYCHA residents on the group this year.

2 MS. ALVAREZ: That's a great  
3 question. Thank you so much.

4 We did active outreach to different  
5 community groups and community centers  
6 and NYCHA residents. We didn't ask the  
7 youth members about that specifically.  
8 But in our event that will be happening  
9 in fall in regards to youth and police  
10 relations, we will make sure to include  
11 a NYCHA youth residents, and wanting to  
12 know their input and advice on improving  
13 relations. Thank you for that.

14 CHAIR DAVIE: And I can also --

15 MS. ORTIZ: Can you all still hear  
16 me?

17 CHAIR DAVIE: Yes.

18 MS. ORTIZ: Can you hear me?

19 MR. LANTER: Yes.

20 MS. ORTIZ: I'm sorry. Finish. Go  
21 ahead. Finish. No, no, no, no. You  
22 finish.

23 CHAIR DAVIE: I was just going to  
24 say we tend to hold most of our  
25 community meetings in NYCHA community

1           centers so that we can actually hear in-  
2           person -- when we were doing that, and  
3           when we get back to it, hopefully this  
4           fall -- from NYCHA residents about the  
5           particular ways in which they engage  
6           around police-community relations.

7           MS. ORTIZ: Well, that's great. And  
8           thank you for giving me the mic just for  
9           these last few moments to say that we  
10          definitely want to make sure to invite  
11          the CCRB to come on to southwest  
12          Brooklyn at either Wyckoff, Gowanus, Red  
13          Hook or Warren Houses so that we can  
14          engage our constituents in being more  
15          actively involved. There have been  
16          quite -- quite a bit of shootings and  
17          incidents just prior to COVID and at the  
18          end of last year, and they were very --  
19          you know, residents are left very  
20          distraught and feeling, you know,  
21          like -- like everybody does. So thank  
22          you so much for the time.

23          CHAIR DAVIE: You're very welcome,  
24          thank you.

25                 And before we go to the next

1 speaker, we have another board member  
2 who's joined us, Ms. Stahly-Butts.  
3 Marbre.

4 MS. STAHLY-BUTTS: Hi. I'm so sorry  
5 for being late. My name is Marbre. I  
6 use she and her pronouns, and I'm a City  
7 Council appointee from Brooklyn.

8 CHAIR DAVIE: Thank you.

9 Now, Yojaira, to our next speaker.

10 MS. ALVAREZ: Thank you, Chair. I  
11 just wanted to echo that we will  
12 absolutely be out in those communities  
13 right now as we're slowly returning to  
14 in-person presentations. We've been  
15 working closely with the cure violence  
16 programs, as well as different  
17 communities in Brownsville. But we'll  
18 be absolutely -- make sure to follow up  
19 and make sure that we're in those  
20 communities as well. So thank you so  
21 much for that.

22 Next, we'll be hearing from John  
23 Sanda (phonetic).

24 CHAIR DAVIE: Mr. Sanda.

25 MR. SANDA: Yes, hi. I have a

1 couple of questions and possibly some  
2 follow-up questions. Executive Director  
3 Darche, has the CCRB completed the  
4 process of changing the disposition  
5 letters to inform complainants and  
6 victims of the reopening process in the  
7 disposition letter?

8 CHAIR DAVIE: John?

9 MR. DARCHE: I'm sorry. No, no, we  
10 have not completed the process yet.

11 MR. SANDA: Complainants have not  
12 been informed to send a reopen request  
13 to the director of the case management  
14 unit in the disposition letters,  
15 correct?

16 MR. DARCHE: That is correct.

17 MR. SANDA: So does the CCRB intend  
18 to contact any prior complainants who  
19 were not provided the proper information  
20 to make an a reopening request? And if  
21 yes; how far back are you considering?

22 MR. DARCHE: We hadn't considered  
23 that yet.

24 MR. SANDA: Okay. Can you kindly  
25 describe the process of how the Goldman

1 School of the University of California  
2 Berkeley was chosen by the CCRB to  
3 examine all external communications with  
4 civilians.

5 MR. DARCHE: So I believe they had  
6 reached out to us to offer to help.  
7 They're a prominent institution of  
8 higher learning that engages with many  
9 public groups around the country. And  
10 we worked with them to try and find a  
11 way that they could bring their  
12 expertise to bear in a way that would  
13 help the agency. And it's something  
14 that we -- we acknowledged that we need  
15 to do better at, is communicating with  
16 the people who we're here to serve.

17 And so that's why when they offered  
18 to help, we jumped at the chance to work  
19 with them.

20 MR. SANDA: And basically, since --  
21 at the November board meeting, you  
22 mentioned that information concerning  
23 the reopening process should be included  
24 in the disposition letters and that  
25 you're rectifying the situation. But so

1           you can that there was an error of  
2           omission, but you have not corrected  
3           that error as of yet.

4           CHAIR DAVIE: So Mr. Sanda, I think  
5           Mr. Darche answered that question. And  
6           unfortunately, your time has expired.  
7           If you want to communicate privately  
8           with Mr. Darche through email, you can  
9           do that. You can CC me on it so that we  
10          make sure the board stays abreast of  
11          your questions. Thank you.

12          Yojaira, a next speaker, please.

13          MS. ALVAREZ: Thank you.

14          Next, we'll be hearing from Latoya  
15          LeGrand from Senator Comrie's office

16          CHAIR DAVIE: So the speaker can go  
17          ahead.

18          MS. LEGRAND: Can you hear me?

19          CHAIR DAVIE: Yes. Please --

20          MS. LEGRAND: Hi. Can you hear me?

21          CHAIR DAVIE: Yes.

22          MS. LEGRAND: Okay. Great. Okay.  
23          Great. I just wanted to say the other  
24          caller, she asked about NYCHA and the,  
25          you know, the relationship between,

1 NYCHA and CCRB. I just wanted to let  
2 you guys know that I do know of someone  
3 who is part of your YAC program.

4 They reside in NYCHA. And Jahi Rose  
5 has been doing a lot of work, especially  
6 in Queens to let the programs know that  
7 they're out here. And this south  
8 Jamaica, Queens. He's been partnering  
9 with everyone, and I've been trying to  
10 assist him with getting that out there.  
11 So there are -- just for the record,  
12 there are youth that are part of the  
13 CCRB and the YAC Program.

14 I just wanted to let that be known.

15 CHAIR DAVIE: Thank you.

16 MR. DARCHE: I just wanted to say  
17 that Jahi's really been doing excellent  
18 work. And the whole outreach team when  
19 confronted with the pandemic and, you  
20 know -- there are so few people here  
21 whose job it is to make sure that people  
22 know the agency's here.

23 And then having most of their tools  
24 that they relied upon taken away and  
25 having to adapt and overcome, they



1 really -- the whole outreach team  
2 deserves our thanks for the work they  
3 did over the past 15 months.

4 CHAIR DAVIE: Well, on behalf of the  
5 Board, I thank you.

6 And it's good to see the continued  
7 presence of CCRB in communities, in  
8 spite of the pandemic and the obstacles  
9 that we face.

10 All right. Do we have another  
11 speaker, Yojaira?

12 MS. ALVAREZ: Yes.

13 And again, thank you so much Latoya  
14 for that, and John.

15 Next, you'll be hearing from Javier  
16 --

17 (Whereupon, there was an  
18 interruption.)

19 CHAIR DAVIE: Sorry. Speaker needs  
20 to mute.

21 All right. Go ahead, Yojaira.

22 MS. ALVAREZ: Next, we'll be hearing  
23 from Javier Seida (phonetic).

24 MR. SEIDA: Hello, hi. Can everyone  
25 hear me?

1 CHAIR DAVIE: Yes. Please go ahead.

2 MR. SEIDA: Hi. This is Javier  
3 Seida. I'm the (inaudible).

4 MR. DARCHE: Mr. Seida, you're  
5 breaking up.

6 MR. SEIDA: I'm so sorry about. I  
7 wonder if it's the bandwidth. I was  
8 having some issues with the bandwidth.

9 Can you hear me now?

10 CHAIR DAVIE: Yes.

11 MR. SEIDA: Okay. I was just saying  
12 that it is my first time to hear exactly  
13 what's being done here. This is my  
14 first experience with the review board,  
15 and I wanted to know how (inaudible)  
16 help in approaching (inaudible).

17 CHAIR DAVIE: Can you ask that  
18 question again, please.

19 MR. SEIDA: I'm so sorry. I wanted  
20 to know how (inaudible) here in the  
21 Bronx help with the conversations and  
22 facilitations between the community and  
23 the police when disputes arise.

24 CHAIR DAVIE: Do Yojaira or Jon, do  
25 you want to answer.

1 Jon, you're muted.

2 MR. DARCHE: I couldn't hear his  
3 question even with --

4 CHAIR DAVIE: He wants to know how  
5 his community organization can help  
6 improving the conversations between the  
7 police and THE community where he's  
8 located in the Bronx.

9 MR. SEIDA: Difficult conversations  
10 are our first (inaudible), so I just  
11 figured this would be a perfect place to  
12 start.

13 MR. DARCHE: So what is your  
14 organization, sir?

15 MR. SEIDA: (Inaudible)  
16 organization for mediation and conflict  
17 resolution (inaudible).

18 MR. DARCHE: So Mr. Seida, I'm going  
19 to ask that you give Jahi your  
20 information, and we have a mediation  
21 unit, which I'm going to try to put you  
22 in touch with, which will help -- I  
23 think, your organization could help us.  
24 We're always looking for new mediators  
25 for our mediation program.

1           But I think the question about how  
2           you can help improve the relationship  
3           between people on the street is also an  
4           interesting one. And it's something  
5           that I'll get back to the department and  
6           let them know you're interested in that  
7           and see if there is a spot for you in  
8           that kind of work that they're doing.

9           MR. SEIDA: Perfect.

10          CHAIR DAVIE: All right. Thank you.  
11          Next speaker, Yojaira.

12          MS. ALVAREZ: Thank you, Chair.  
13          That concludes our public portion of the  
14          meeting.

15          CHAIR DAVIE: Excellent.

16          So I think we're at the point of  
17          seeing if there's any old business to  
18          come before us.

19          (No response)

20          CHAIR DAVIE: Is there any new  
21          business to come before us.

22          (No response)

23          CHAIR DAVIE: All right. So we're  
24          going to, once a motion is made and  
25          approved, we're going to adjourn to

1 executive session. I'm going to ask the  
2 board members not to sign off just yet,  
3 but to stay on. And then we'll have  
4 some instructions once we're executive  
5 session.

6 So is there a motion to adjourn to  
7 executive session from the board.

8 MR. PUMA: So moved.

9 CHAIR DAVIE: Is there a second?

10 MR. DWYER: Second.

11 CHAIR DAVIE: All those in favor of  
12 adjourning the executive session, please  
13 say aye.

14 MR. PUMA: Aye.

15 MS. BOND: Aye.

16 MR. JOSEPH: Aye.

17 MR. DWYER: Aye.

18 MR. FREEMAN: Aye.

19 MR. RIVADENEYRA: Aye.

20 MR. SIEGAL: Aye.

21 MS. SIMMONS: Aye.

22 CHAIR DAVIE: All opposed say no.

23 (No comment)

24 CHAIRMAN DAVIE: All right. The  
25 ayes have it. The motion is approved.

1           We'll adjourn to executive session.  
2           Board members, stay put. And we're  
3           going to ask the public and others if  
4           they will exit. Thank you.
