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2	CHAIR RICE: Good afternoon,
3	everyone. And welcome. My name is
4	Arva Rice, serving as interim chair of
5	the Civilian Complaint Review Board.
6	And I would like to call the
7	March 2022 CCRB meeting to order.
8	Would the rest of the board
9	please introduce yourselves. And can
10	we start to my left with Herman.
11	MR. MERRITT: Good afternoon.
12	My name is Herman Merritt. I am the
13	Brooklyn representative of the City
14	Council.
15	MR. DWYER: Good afternoon. My
16	name is Frank Dwyer. I'm a police
17	Commissioner designee.
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19	MS. IRISH, ESQ.: Corrine Irish.
20	I am a mayoral appointee from Harlem.
21	MR. DARCHE: Jonathan Darche.
22	I'm the executive director of the
23	agency.
24	MR. CARCATERRA: Hello,
25	everyone. I'm Sal Carcaterra. And I

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2	am a police commissioner designee.
3	MS. SIMMONS, ESQ.: Good
4	afternoon, everyone. I'm Esmeralda
5	Simmons from Brooklyn, New York. And
6	I am Jumaane Williams' the public
7	advocate's representative.
8	MR. PUMA: I live on the
9	Lower East Side.
10	CHAIR RICE: And can we have the
11	board members who are joining us on
12	Webex to also introduce themselves,
13	starting with Michael.
14	MR. RIVADENEYRA, ESQ.: Good
15	evening, everyone. Apologies for not
16	being there in person today. My name
17	is Michael Rivadeneyra. And I am the
18	Bronx City Council designee to the
19	board.
20	CHAIR RICE: Seeing as we do not
21	have a quorum, we will push the
22	approval of the February minutes to
23	next month.
24	I am particularly excited to
25	welcome my fellow board members and
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the public to our first in-person
meeting in two years. In March 2020,
CCRB staff worked tirelessly to ensure
that we could continue our services
and public meetings. Outreach
presentations, civilian and officer
interviews and our board meetings all
became remote to ensure everyone's
safety. But it required great agility
and resourcefulness from CCRB staff to
make it possible.

While we continue to be cautious, today is a landmark day for our agency in restarting in-person events. From March 2020 to today, the outreach team was still able to conduct 1,090 presentations to youth groups, congregations, advocacy groups, schools and more. The outreach team also began several new initiatives to reach community members, including Block to Block, CCRB Cares, and Barber Shop and Courtside outreach.

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As COVID restrictions began to ease, the outreach team is ready to ramp up their presence in all five boroughs, educating New Yorkers on their rights when interacting with police officers, and the resources available to them if they have encountered police misconduct.

While our outreach team is doing an excellent job increasing awareness of the CCRB, I would also like to thank the City Council for their generous funding they provided for public education last year. Many New Yorkers are unaware of the resources available to them after they have suffered or witnessed misconduct. to the public education funding, we were able to place advertisements on a variety of outlets and reach communities throughout the City. We will continue these efforts for greater agency awareness throughout 2022.

We will enforce our youth outreach with two programs this year. We are currently finalizing our 2022 class of the CCRB Youth Advisory Council, or YAC, who are between the ages of 12 to 18 years old, and come from a wide variety of communities hailing from all five boroughs. The YAC will help the CCRB stay attuned to young New Yorkers' experience with the NYPD, and ensure their generation's voices are included as we advocate for new policies and practices.

We are also thrilled to announce we will, once again, be participating in the Summer Youth Employment

Program, SYEP. The revitalized SYEP will offer summer jobs to 90,000 young

New Yorkers across a variety of agencies, and provides young people with paid opportunities to explore potential career interests and help develop their professional, social, civic and leadership skills. Research

1 2 shows that summer jobs save lives, cut 3 crime and strengthen communities. And the CCRB applauds Mayor Adams' 4 5 commitment to this program, and is excited to participate in it. 6 7 We have partnered with the Manhattan Transition and College 8 Access Center, who will assign us 15 9 students to join our ranks this 10 summer. Aside from working with these 11 12 15 students, we will also offer 13 workshops for their parents and be 14 part of training program staff. 15 If you know any young New Yorker between the ages of 14 to 24, please 16 17 direct them to NYC.gov/SYEP to apply 18 for the program. We will now hear from CCRB 19 20 Executive Director, Jonathan Darche. 21 MR. DARCHE: Thank you, Chair 2.2 My name is Jon Darche, and I 23 use he and him pronouns. As Chair 2.4 Rice mentioned, the agency is focused 25 on increasing awareness of the agency

1 2 and transparency. I'm going to be talking a little bit today about the 3 4 work the agency is doing to increase 5 transparency for the public to understand what we do here. 6 7 Since the repeal of Civil Rights 8 Law 50-A, the agency released 9 documents in response to 443 FOIL 10 requests. And there are more pending. 11 We have actually hired staff to 12 expedite the response for FOIL requests. In addition, we are posting 13 14 deviation letters from the police 15 department on our website. In the

coming year, we plan to expand upon the information that we proactively post on our website so that we aren't waiting for people to make FOIL

requests, but instead are putting the information out there for the public

to have access to.

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While the CCRB is trying to make our operations more visible to the public, we are oftentimes hampered by

1 2 state sealing statutes. This is even 3 more of a problem because while the CCRB used to be confined to 4 5 investigating cases where we had a complaint, last year, the City Council 6 7 changed the City Charter so that we can now self-initiate complaints. 8 9 While this is a major step for 10 our agency, our ability to investigate all cases of misconduct is often 11 12 hindered by sealing statutes, and that 13 will be more so in cases where we are 14 self-initiating complaints or in 15 profiling cases, which are also now in our jurisdiction because of Council 16 17 changes to the Charter made last year. 18 Sealed arrest records often include 19 alleged incidents of police misconduct. In order to truly act as 20 21 oversight over the NYPD, the CCRB 22 needs to be exempt from the sealing 23 statutes. State Senator Cleare 2.4 25 reintroduced a key piece of

legislation in Albany that would
exempt the CCRB from current statutes.
We hope for support from the

legislature and the governor in

passing this bill.

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The CCRB is continuing to review protest cases. We expect to have the protest report done in coming months, and we hope to have an updated snapshot before the end of this month. If you need to file a complaint in person, you can do that. Our office is now open for civilians to walk in. If you would prefer to file your complaint online or over the phone, that is also available.

Some ground rules for this afternoon. If you are here in person and you would like to make a comment, please make a member of the staff aware of that. Also, if you are joining us online and you would like to make a comment, please use the raise your hand feature. And finally,

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2	please, I would ask individuals to
3	keep their comments to four minutes in

6	thank members of the public for
7	participating in today's meeting.
8	CHAIR RICE: Thank you.
9	Do any members of the board have
10	any questions of our executive
11	director?
12	(No response.)
13	CHAIR RICE: Any questions?
14	(No response.)
15	CHAIR RICE: Any questions? Any
16	questions?
17	(No response.)
18	CHAIR RICE: All right. Seeing
19	none, we will proceed to the
20	presentation from the director of
21	outreach, Jahi Rose.
22	MR. ROSE: Hello, can you hear
23	me? Thank you very much, Chair Rice.
24	My name is Jahi Rose. I go by
25	pronouns he/him. And I'm just waiting

1 2 for my authorization to share my 3 screen. 4 Okay. Can you see my screen? 5 Thank you all very much for 6 joining us. As you may know, the 7 Civilian Complaint Review Board is the 8 nation's largest independent entity 9 over the largest -- over the largest police force in the City -- in the 10 11 country. The CCRB investigates, 12 mediates and prosecutes complaints of 13 misconduct against members of the 14 NYPD. 15 The agency is governed by a 15-member board. You have met many of 16 17 our board members here. Five members 18 are appointed by the New York City 19 Mayor, five are appointed by the New York City Council, three are 20 21 designated by the police commissioner, 2.2 one is appointed by the public 23 advocate, and the Chair is jointly 2.4 appointed by the Mayor and the City Council. 25

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The CCRB's jurisdiction follows force, abuse of authority, discourtesy and offensive language. A helpful reminder for this jurisdiction is the term FADO.

Just wanted to provide you with a little bit of information regarding the Right to Know Act. The Right to Know Act is a law that went into effect in October 19th of 2018. law impacts such interactions with police officers, such as stop and frisk, sobriety checks and other encounters. The rules include officers identifying themselves by providing their name and other information, such as rank, command and shield number. With some exemptions explaining the purpose of the encounter or the interaction, informing you of your right to say no when asking for a consent to search your person, property, vehicle or home. And offering a business card

1 2 with an officer's information, such 3 as -- which explains how to file a comment, how to make a comment or 4 5 complaint about the encounter with the police officer. Civilians can request 6 7 this information, this business card in all encounters. 8 9 This is what a copy of the business card looks like. 10 11 Now, there are various ways to 12 file a complaint about police 13 misconduct. The easiest way is to 14 file a complaint online, as mentioned 15 by Jonathan Darche. That's going on our website, at NYC.gov/ccrbcomplaint. 16 17 You can also call the CCRB at 1800-341-CCRB, or 1800-341-2272. 18 19 Remember, if you see footage of misconduct on social media or in the 20 21 news, you can file a complaint. 2.2 if you were not there in person. 23 free to tag the CCRB in the complaint and you will receive a response. 2.4 25 Additional ways to file a

1 2 complaint to the CCRB include calling 3-1-1. You can visit our office in 3 lower Manhattan at 100 Church Street 4 5 on the 10th Floor. You can also DM us or direct message us on social media, 6 7 on Facebook, Instagram and Twitter. You can also send a letter to the 8 CCRB's office at 100 Church Street, 9 10 10th Floor, New York, New York, Zip 11 code 10007. And you can also file a 12 complaint at a local police precinct. 13 It does not have to be the precinct 14 where the encounter may have taken 15 place. If you would like to request an 16 17 outreach presentation to have your 18 neighbors or members of your community know more about the CCRB, feel free to 19 contact the outreach unit at 20 21 outreach@CCRB.NYC.gov. Also feel free 2.2 to follow us on Instagram, Twitter 23 and/or Facebook. 2.4 Thank you, Chair. 25 CHAIR RICE: Thank you.

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2	Do any members of the board have
3	any questions from our director of
4	outreach, Mr. Rose?
5	(No response.)
6	CHAIR RICE: Any questions from
7	our board?
8	(No response.)
9	CHAIR RICE: Okay. Seeing none,
10	we will progress to the public
11	comment. We will now enter the public
12	comment portion of the meeting. If
13	you are interested in making a public
14	comment, please, you may line up
15	behind the podium or use the raise
16	your hand feature. And we will go in
17	order of which you all indicate so.
18	Please keep your comments to
19	four minutes.
20	Yojaira, will you please call on
21	the first person?
22	MS. ALVAREZ: Thank you, Chair.
23	We will first be hearing from
24	Shawn Randall Thomas. And as we
25	upgrade them, I just want to give

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2	thanks to Council member Espaillat's
3	office for attending, as well as
4	Council member Shekar Krishnan. The
5	office of Assembly member and speaker
6	Carl Heastie, the Queens DA's office,
7	as well as members from the NYPD.
8	Shawn?
9	MR. THOMAS: Hello. Can you
10	hear me? Hello. Can you hear me?
11	CHAIR RICE: Yes, we can.
12	MR. THOMAS: Okay. I have five
13	questions. I'll ask them and wait for
14	your answers. My first question is to
15	the backlog. I understand there's a
16	backlog. Can you explain what that
17	looks like, the time frame?
18	My next question, second
19	question is, do the CCRB investigators
20	and the board members all have sworn
21	signed oaths on file?
22	And my next question would be,
23	the third question is, from the time
24	of investigation, through the
25	conclusion of the investigation to the

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2	time that it goes the case goes to
3	the board, does the investigators or
4	the board members look for criminality
5	on the part of anyone within the
6	police department. And if not, why
7	not.
8	And also, the fourth question
9	would be is, does the board
10	member
11	CHAIR RICE: Sir, I'm sorry,
12	sir, my my pen actually ran out a
13	little bit. So if you can just slow
14	down just slightly. And can you tell
15	me the second one? You asked first
16	about the backlog, your second
17	question was about the board and
18	investigators having sworn
19	MR. THOMAS: Oaths.
20	CHAIR RICE: Oaths. Thank you.
21	MR. THOMAS: And then the third
22	question was, do you guys, the
23	investigators or the board, look for
24	criminality on part of the police
25	officers, even if the criminality was

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2	not in the complaint of the
3	complainant. Do you look for that?
4	And if not, why not?
5	And then the next question would
6	be, is, do the board or the
7	investigators recognize an obligation
8	or duty to report criminality to
9	either state or federal officiants?
10	And if not, the fifth question would
11	be, does that implicate misprision or
12	felony?
13	And that's the five questions.
14	MR. DARCHE: Can you repeat your
15	last question, sir?
16	MR. THOMAS: If you the last
17	question, which is related to the
18	fourth question, if you do not
19	recognize the duty or obligation to
20	report criminality to state and
21	especially federal officials, does
22	that implicate the federal crime of
23	misprision or felony?
24	CHAIR RICE: I'll ask our
25	executive director to take on the

1 2 first three as they are somewhat 3 related. And then we can come back to 4 the fourth and the fifth since they're 5 related on the backlog. The sworn oath signed file. And if you are 6 7 looking at the criminality of police officers. 8 9 MR. DARCHE: So at this point, 10 there's approximately a backlog of 800 11 cases. We expect to have cleared up 12 before the end of May. 13 I'm sorry. Was that -- you need 14 me to take off my mask or was this --15 So we have a backlog of approximately 800 cases that we expect 16 17 to be resolved by the end of May. will have to find out about the oath 18 19 question. Because I just don't know. 20 But if someone could get the individual's information so that we 21 2.2 can reach back out to him with an 23 answer. I will also give the board an 2.4 answer in the next board meeting so the individual won't have to wait a 25

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2	month to get an answer to his question
3	about the sworn oaths.
4	MS. SIMMONS, ESQ.: Excuse me, I
5	remember signing a paper when I was
6	fist appointed, saying that I would
7	abide by the constitution, et cetera,
8	et cetera, as part of my intake.
9	MR. DARCHE: Thank you. Thank
10	you, Ms. Simmons. The
11	With regard to looking for
12	criminality, when we get complaints
13	about, which in addition to being
14	misconduct, there could be criminal
15	activity, for example in some cases
16	involving sexual misconduct, we will
17	oftentimes refer matters to the police
18	department, and then state
19	prosecutors.
20	So the not we will refer
21	them to the DA's offices in most
22	cases. So that is that is not a
23	statewide office. But it is a it
24	is not a City official. They're
25	they're the senior law enforcement

1 official of their county. So we do 2 that with sexual misconduct and other 3 times when we have evidence that a 4 crime has been committed. 5 In several of the local 6 7 prosecutors such as New York County, 8 Queens County, and Kings County, we've been working to share information with 9 them to make them aware in cases where 10 there -- in addition to being evidence 11 12 of misconduct, there is an allegation 13 or an appearance that there could be 14 criminal activity. And then I -- I have no -- no 15 16 idea about misprision. I just don't. 17 I can report back to the board. 18 MS. IRISH, ESQ.: I just googled 19 it, and it requires affirmatively 20 taking steps to conceal a crime which 21 would not apply because we don't do 2.2 that. But in any event, we also 23 report it to the authorities. So would also not apply for that on that 2.4 basis. 25

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2	CHAIR RICE: Thank you,
3	Ms. Irish, for that clarification.
4	And thank you, sir, for that
5	list of thoughtful questions.
6	Yojaira, can we ask for the next
7	speaker.
8	MS. ALVAREZ: Thank you, Chair.
9	Next, we'll be hearing from
10	Cristal Calderon.
11	MS. CALDERON: Can you all hear
12	me?
13	CHAIR RICE: Yes.
14	MS. CALDERON: Okay. Great. If
15	you want to put my image up, I'm fine
16	with that, too. But if not, that's
17	okay.
18	So I've spoken to the board
19	before, and I'll speak today about
20	what where I am recently.
21	Sorry. Got a pop-up about
22	muting.
23	My name is Cristal Calderon.
24	That's C-R-I-S-T-A-L, C-A-L-D-E-R-O-N,
25	for anyone that wants to reach out to
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1 2 me after. I hope that my information 3 is shared. So I have -- I've been -- being 4 5 harassed by my landlord, and my landlord's acting agents for coming up 6 7 on six years now. It's been pretty 8 vile harassment, pretty savage 9 harassment. I was sexually assaulted in the hallway of the Kings County 10 Housing Court, I've been called a 11 12 spic, a wetback, a whore. I've been 13 told I was going to be raped. I've 14 been told not to walk around my 15 neighborhood -- which is Greenpoint, Brooklyn -- because I'm not safe. 16 17 a lot of other things, but we don't have time for that. 18 19 I have tried very hard to get 20 help from my local police precinct, 21 which is the 94th precinct, from the 2.2 very beginning of the harassment. And 23 I have been met with apathy, 24 negligence, misconduct, stonewalling 25 and obstruction of justice.

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I have been told by police

officers, many, that it's my fault for

not walking away from these incidents.

And therefore, I -- I am -- it's my

fault for being harassed because I

haven't removed myself from the

situation. I'm inciting the

harassment. It's my fault because I

haven't moved out of my rent regulated

apartment. That's the whole reason

I've been -- I'm being harassed. I

started litigation over my rent

regulated apartment.

I've been told that this is what comes with living in New York, and this is what I should expect. I should leave if I don't like it. I've been victim blamed and told that I shouldn't wear the things that I wear if I don't want to be sexually harassed. And I don't -- I dress pretty conservatively, in my opinion. I've been told that by recording the incidents and opening my door when I

1 do to record these incidents to 2 3 provide proof to the police, that I'm 4 also inciting the harassment by -- by 5 doing so. Captain Fahey of the 94th 6 7 precinct, I met with her at the beginning of her tenure. So that was 8 9 2020. And it was after a really big incident had occurred, and I had video 10 footage, and she told me that if an 11 12 investigation was to be held, that I 13 could be found to be guilty, 14 basically, for everything that I just 15 said before, which is not removing myself from the situation and 16 17 recording these incidents. 18 She told me that it's just 19 harassment. It's not a criminal 20 violation. And that all of this 21 belongs in housing court and it's a 2.2 civil matter. Which is when I introduced a criminal law to her, 23 and --2.4 25 I can't operate the -- oh, I can

1 2 operate the chat now. So in the chat, 3 I'm going to just copy/paste the criminal law that I discovered --4 5 okay. I can't use the chat now. So the criminal law is Chapter 6 7 40, Part Three, Title N -- as in Nancy -- Article 241.02 and 241.05. 8 So this in criminal law, it 9 10 makes it up to a felony to harass any 11 rent regulated tenant in any capacity. 12 The definition for harassment in this 13 law is the disturbance of quiet, piece 14 and repose. The Class A misdemeanor 15 offense is doing this to one tenant, and it's a felony to do it to more 16 17 than one tenant. 18 I -- my neighbor has been going 19 through the same thing. He's a Black, 20 gay man and he's been called a nigger, 21 a fagot and an AIDS patient by the 2.2 landlord, and I have that in an audio 23 recording. I have many witnesses. 24 have other audio, video and 25 photographic pieces of evidence to

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2	prove this harassment and other
3	harassment as well.
4	Like I said, I've been
5	stonewalled, and I only was able to
6	recently speak to Chief Harrison.
7	She's the Brooklyn North NYPD Chief,
8	and I met with her after de Blasio
9	ordered her to meet with me in person.
10	And this was on his way out. This was
11	last November.
12	She met with me. And after
13	seeing a lot of the evidence they had,
14	she told me that I had, in her
15	opinion, more than enough evidence to
16	present to the district attorney for
17	them to move forward with charges and
18	arrests. She said that she would make
19	a phone call herself
20	CHAIR RICE: Ms. Calderon?
21	MS. CALDERON: Yes?
22	CHAIR RICE: I'm recognizing
23	that we are at our time.
24	MS. CALDERON: Okay. That's
25	fine.

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2	CHAIR RICE: And I wanted to,
3	first of all, acknowledge the issues
4	that you've been experiencing. And
5	to, you know, be able to articulate to
6	you that I'm sorry that you're
7	experiencing this at this time. And I
8	wanted to be able to have our
9	executive director to be able to
10	respond to some of the issues that
11	you've raised, that are issues with
12	your landlord but seem to somehow have
13	a connection with issues with the
14	police department. But I wanted him
15	to be able to respond to that.
16	And so my apologies for
17	interrupting you. But I just wanted
18	to be respectful of the time boundary
19	that we'd approached.
20	MS. CALDERON: No problem. Can
21	I have 10 more seconds?
22	CHAIR RICE: Yes.
23	MS. CALDERON: Thank you.
24	After my meeting with Chief
25	Harrison, I met with the detective

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2	from the 94th precinct. She that
3	was because of Chief Harrison. And
4	the detective stonewalled me.
5	Completely ghosted me for two months
6	until I complained to Chief Harrison
7	again. And then the detective wrote
8	me a letter saying she had been trying
9	to reach me. Which is a lie. I have
10	phone records to prove that. And she
11	said that she met with the DA herself,
12	and there's no evidence of harassment.
13	So I'm I'm done, but I'm
14	still being stonewalled. I'm still
15	being harassed every single day, and I
16	can't call the police because they're
17	an additional layer of trauma in this
18	entire situation.
19	MR. DARCHE: Thank you,
20	Ms. Calderon. I share the Chair's
21	sentiment about I'm sorry that you
22	had to experience this.
23	Again, the CCRB is limited in
24	what it can do in your case because we
25	only have jurisdiction over police

1 2 involved with -- that you've been 3 dealing with. And then only in the jurisdiction of excessive force, abuse 4 5 of authority, discourtesy, offensive language and untruthful statements. 6 7 So I believe you did file a complaint with the agency, and we 8 investigated it. And I believe that 9 case is now at our administrative 10 prosecution unit, based on the 11 12 investigation that we conducted. 13 it also sounds like you have issues 14 with -- that are more current that were conducted -- that were not 15 included in the investigation that we 16 17 conducted originally. 18 So if you will hold on, we'll 19 get your information again and I'll 20 have an investigator reach out to you 21 to see what the current issues are and 22 if they fall in your jurisdiction. 23 MS. CALDERON: I actually filed several more complaints for this 2.4 25 current stuff earlier today. So thank

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2	you for that offer. I wanted to speak
3	today because I know there are people
4	outside of CCRB that are on the line
5	representing other offices, and I want
6	to make sure that they hear me, they
7	know my name. And I hope that if they
8	try and get ahold of me through CCRB,
9	that CCRB will share my contact
10	information.
11	CHAIR RICE: Before I ask,
12	Yojaira, to go to the next person on
13	the list, I believe we've been joined
14	by another board member, Mr. Freeman.
15	MR. FREEMAN: Good evening. My
16	name is Willie Freeman. I'm a police
17	Commissioner designee.
18	CHAIR RICE: Thank you.
19	Yojaira, who is next on the
20	list?
21	MS. ALVAREZ: That concludes our
22	public portion today.
23	CHAIR RICE: I'm going to move
24	that we now make our way into the
25	our executive session.

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2	The agenda for the executive
3	session is the the executive
4	session is an update from the
5	executive director and the general
6	council. And the executive director
7	will discuss the following three
8	items. Scheduling issues for panels,
9	full board cases, an update on pending
10	personnel actions. And the general
11	council will discuss the following
12	items and update on current
13	litigation.
14	Can I have a motion to adjourn
15	the meeting?
16	MS. SIMMONS, ESQ.: Move.
17	CHAIR RICE: Do I have a second?
18	MS. IRISH, ESQ.: Second.
