CHAIR KHALID: Good afternoon, everyone.

My name is Dr. Mohammad Khalid, and I am the interim chair of the Civilian Complaint Review Board. I'd like to call the CCRB, January 2025 public board meeting to order. Thank you for joining us.

Will the Board, please, introduce themselves now, from the right.

MR. SIEGAL: Yes, good afternoon, John Siegal. I was appointed by a mayor.

Welcome Dr. Khalid. Nice to meet you.

I just want to note for the record, maybe it's obvious, this meeting marks the beginning of the fourth year in which this Board has been without a duly-appointed chair.

CHAIR KHALID: Thank you, sir.

MR. DWYER: Good afternoon, I'm Frank Dwyer, I'm a police commissioner Designee.

I'd like to begin by saying that it is a great honor for me to serve as the interim chair, and I am truly grateful to Mayor Eric Adams for his trust in me for giving me this responsibility.

Civilian oversight law enforcement plays a key role in public safety, and I look forward to representing this agency as we begin the new year.

Now, I'd like to ask the Executive

Director Jonathan Darche to give us all the agency's updates. Jon.

MR. DARCHE: Thank you, Dr. Khalid.

Congratulations on your appointment of interim chair.

Dr. Khalid already boasts ten years of dedicated service to the CCRB, and I'm confident in Dr. Khalid's leadership of this

agency as we go into 2025.

As we look ahead to the new year, I want to take a moment to reflect on some of the many accomplishments of the Agency in 2024. The Agency received 5,709 complaints in 2024. That is three percent higher than in 2023 and 55 percent higher than in 2022. That's the highest number of complaints from, in the last 12 years. This trend underscores the increasing demand for effective and impartial civilian oversight.

The Agency fully investigated 2,551 complaints in 2024, but also closed 1,734 complaints without any investigation at all. It remains crucial that the Agency receive necessary -- support necessary to fulfill our charter mandate and continue serving New Yorkers.

The Administrative Prosecution Unit closed 358 cases in 2024, including 32 findings of guilt after trial by the police commissioner and 128 guilty pleas. All together, 228 members of the NYPD were disciplined because of APU action, which is slightly more than double the number of members of service disciplined in

2023 as a result of APU action.

Also, in December, the first Racial Profiling and Bias Based Policing case was tried, a milestone of collaboration between the APU and the new Racial Profiling and Bias Based Policing Unit.

The Outreach Unit conducted over 1,000 presentations, workshops, and events, reaching more than 40,000 New Yorkers. The CCRB's Youth Advisory Council's Speak Up, Speak Out Youth Summit was the huge success, and the cohort also produced two radio ad campaigns on iHeart radio and the Spanish broadcast systems of New York. These ad campaigns reached an impressive 175,000 listeners.

I'm confident that the Agency will build on the successes of 2024 and continue to make meaningful strides in 2025.

Our office is open for walk-in complaints, but it is also possible to file complaints online at nyc.gov/ccrbcomplaint, by telephone at 1-800-341-2272, by dialing 311 or by tagging the Agency on Twitter, Facebook, and Instagram.

For those wishing to speak during today's public comment session of today's meeting, we

ask that you keep your questions and comments to four minutes.

If anyone wishes to file a complaint now, we have two investigators on hand, ready to take any new complaints. The investigators on call this afternoon are Emma Stydahar and Will Jacobson, Yvonne Torres is also here from our Civilian Assistance Unit.

I turn it back to you, Dr. Khalid. CHAIR KHALID: Thank you, Jon.

I'd like to thank all of your, my Board members, that they have sent me good wishes when I became the interim chair. I'm very happy that we have a great board, a great staff, a great director, and I'm looking forward to making sure that we work in an impartial way and make sure that the public is fully protected, and, at the same time, everything is in a fair way.

So, at this time, if anybody has any questions, any Board member has any question on Jon?

MR. SMITH: Chair, if I may ask a question of the executive director.

CHAIR KHALID: Yes.

MR. SMITH: Jon, in 2023, I think you reported 5,500 complaints or thereabouts.

MR. DARCHE: Correct.

MR. SMITH: And of those 5,500, now it's a year later, how many of those have resulted in a finding of substantiated?

MR. DARCHE: So, I'll have to pull that number for you for next month, Mr. Smith, because the math on that is a little difficult.

MR. SMITH: Alright, thank you.

CHAIR KHALID: Anybody else have any questions, any Board member?

(No response.)

If none, we will proceed with the presentation from the Director of Outreach, Jahi Rose.

MR. ROSE: Good afternoon, everyone. As mentioned, my name is Jahi Rose. I am the director of outreach for the Civilian Complaint Review Board. I go by he/him pronouns.

Congratulations on your appointment as interim chair.

The New York City Civilian Complaint

Review Board is the nation's largest

independent oversight entity for the largest

police force in the country.

The CCRB investigates, mediates, and in some cases, administratively prosecutes allegations of misconduct alleged against members of the New York City Police Department.

The Agency is formed of 15 Board members, some of which you have met tonight. There are five members that are appointed by the New York City Mayor, five that are appointed by the New York City Council, three designated by the police commissioner, one appointed by the public advocate, and the chair is jointly appointed by the Mayor and City Council.

The Agency can investigate various types of complaints, those include force, abuse of authority, discourtesy, and offensive language, a helpful acronym is FADO.

If you would like to report police misconduct, as previously mentioned, you can file a complaint with our Agency's website nyc.gov/ccrb complaints, call the Agency phone number 1-800-341-CCRB or 1-800-341-2272.

Remember, if you see footage of misconduct on social media or in news media, you can feel free to file a complaint, even if you weren't

there. You can tag the CCRB in our typical handle, which is ccrb underscore nyc.

Other ways to file a complaint at our Agency include calling 311. You can also come to the Agency's headquarters at 100 Church Street in lower Manhattan on the tenth floor. You can also direct message the Agency on our social media platforms, which is Facebook, Instagram, Twitter or X. You can also send a letter to the agency at 100 Church Street, New York, New York, zip code 10007.

You can also file a complaint at a local police precinct. It does not have to be the precinct in the confines where the incident may have taken place, or the encounter took place. The police officers at the precinct are required to take complaints from -- despite where the complaint may have come from, from any member of the public. You can also just request an application or a form and a self-addressed envelope and you can send that by mail straight to the Agency.

If you would like to request a CCRB presentation, you can feel free to contact the Outreach unit at outreach@ccrb.nyc.gov. Also

follow us on our social media platforms, as mentioned, Instagram, Twitter or X, and Facebook.

CHAIR KHALID: Any Board member has any questions regarding the --

MR. SMITH: To clarify, we investigate alleged misconduct, people report alleged misconduct, we investigate alleged. If we sustain it, then it is misconduct.

Thank you.

CHAIR KHALID: Thank you.

Anybody else has any questions?

(No response.)

Well, I -- my discussion with the executive director, sometime in 2025 we will be outreaching in every borough when it permits us to do that, when the staff and the budget allows us, we will be going to all the five boroughs and have the outreach meeting there. When will that happen? We'll let you know on that.

Now we have public comments. I would like to begin by saying -- let's see here, anybody who wants to -- we'll start with the virtual

meeting, people who are calling us who, we want them to make a comment, please use the raise-your-hand feature. Please keep your comment to four minutes on virtually calling us.

MS. ALVAREZ: Thank you, Chair.

First we'll be hearing from Andrew Case, joining us virtually.

MR. DARCHE: Mr. Case, are you there?

MR. CASE: I'm here. It just took a

minute to get to me. Thank you.

I come bringing good news, I am Andrew
Case, I am supervising attorney at Latino
Justice PRLDEF. I have been following your
work for a long time, as you know, Dr. Khalid.
It is so great to see you again. Jonathan said
you had been there for ten years. You were
there when I left in 2007, and you had been
there for a couple years at the time, so it's
much more than ten years. You have great
experience, and I wish you the very best and
have the greatest hopes for you.

I come bearing with me --

CHAIR KHALID: Thank you.

MR. CASE: -- Franklin Stone, who was the

chair, Dr. Khalid, you will remember, when you were first named to the Board, and Philip Eure, the former inspector general for the NYPD, and Nicholas Mitchell, who was an investigator with me and is now the monitor for the LA County jails.

As you all might know, in September, the New York City monitor for the police department issued a discipline report criticizing the NYPD's disciplinary actions, particularly in response to investigations that you have so thoroughly investigated and substantiated, and sought public comments.

Chair Stone, Philip Eure, and Nick
Mitchell submitted a joint comment, which I
will be happy to send along to you all, if any
of you want it, suggesting two significant
modifications to the operations of the CCRB.

First they recommend that, because of the structure of the Board and the fact that you are no longer investigating or overseeing police investigations where they need to have police bias taken away, you have a full investigative staff and lawyers reviewing the cases, that the Board should no longer vote in

PROCEEDINGS

panels on cases. You should allow the Agency -- you should, as the charter says that you have to hear, make findings on cases, delegate hearing cases to the Agency, you should delegate making findings to the Agency. This will save you tons of time, tons of work. Board members are overworked, having to read stacks of cases, only to approve the investigations that are far more thorough than they were 40 years ago when Board review began.

The other thing that Phil and Franklin and Nick recommend is that you restart the process of trying cases before oath, cases used to be tried before oath, instead of in the NYPD trial room and that was ended in 2001, based on a decision from the First Department that has come under substantial criticism, including from the monitor's report and which is almost certainly no longer good law.

So, I -- and Michael Gerber at the NYPD is a very reasonable man and a great attorney, and I suggest that the CCRB reach out to find a way to send at least some of the cases -- it used to be that police officer cases were tried at oath and high-ranking officers were tried in

the trial room. You can do that again.

I will send the letter on to everybody. These are recommendations from people who I respect a great deal, and I hope that you respect a great deal as well.

Thank you all for your work. Dr. Khalid, congratulations. I look forward to hearing great things from you.

CHAIR KHALID: Thank you very much. I appreciate that, and everything you said is noted.

Anything you want to add, Jon, to it?

MR. DARCHE: Yes. Mr. Case if you -- you have my e-mail, you can send me the letter, and I'll make sure it gets forwarded to the Board members.

MR. CASE: Thank you so much, Jon.

CHAIR KHALID: Yes.

MS. SIMMONS: Thank you, Mr. Case, for relaying those recommendations. I find both of them to be very interesting. Could you -- I would like to see the letter, but also, at this point, since you're right here, I'd like to ask you to embellish upon having the staff make findings. I think that would require a change

in the charter.

MR. CASE: Sorry, I had muted myself already.

I think that it would require a change in your rules, but not a change in the charter, and it's explained why in the letter, but I will scroll to it.

Okay, the language of Section 440 says that "the Board shall consist of 15 members and they may establish panels." So there is no requirement to have Board panels. "The Board has the power to receive, investigate, hear, and make findings and recommend actions on complaints by members of the public." The Board has delegated the power to receive, it has delegated the power to investigate, it has delegated the power to hear the complaint. The only thing that it currently does is make findings and recommend actions.

There is nothing in that sentence that suggests any portion of those elements are different from the others and must be and cannot be subject to delegation, and there's lots of law on agencies' ability to delegate authority to staff, which is maybe too much to

get into verbally.

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I admit that it would be -- some people would challenge it or question it, but I think that it's a sound policy, particularly given the fact, as you guys all know, the Board originally, in the Lindsay administration was simply a group of some police officials, some civilians who reviewed investigations from the police department. The civilian portion was simply to add civilian views to police investigations. We now have fully civilianized investigations, we have -- you have attorneys. The attorneys that are gonna bring the cases in the trial room or under oath are the ones that (technical interruption). And ultimately, the police commissioner is going to be making a decision on discipline anyway.

So, the idea that you need to have more roadblocks in the way, particularly, I know there have been staffing issues with the Board that has slowed down cases in the past couple years with the more complaints you're getting. You're having cases age so that NYPD is calling short statute of limitations on some cases, even when there is time left in the statute of

limitations. All of this will help move cases along, allow for effective resolution of cases substantiated and unfounded exonerated cases so that police officers and civilians would have quicker resolution to their complaints.

But I'll send the letter.

CHAIR KHALID: Thank you, we'll be looking forward to your letter. Thank you.

Anybody else?

MR. SMITH: We have discussed, there are 11 members on this Board right now, when it is -- because the mayor has failed to make two appointments and the City Council speaker has failed to make an appointment, and the two of them jointly have failed to name a chair. So if you can send recommendations to those two elected officials to do their duty and get us up to a full 15-member strength, that would give us five three-member panels hearing cases, rather than three three-member panels hearing cases.

MR. CASE: I think that would be great. I will write to them all.

MR. SMITH: Thank you, appreciate that.

CHAIR KHALID: Anyone else on the -- yes.

MS. ALVAREZ: Next, we'll be hearing from Doyin Adeeko Abowaba.

MR. ABOWABA: Yeah. Good afternoon, sirs.

CHAIR KHALID: Good afternoon.

MR. ABOWABA: I have my CCRB number 20247306. The complaint, I came in person to complain about the implication of the police to the scene of harassment and stalking. So they did not show up, but when I came, I received this complaint number, and I was asked to call the AIB (sic) number, 212741848401 (sic). I have called the number. One time they asked me to go to Police Plaza to collect the reports. I went there, they said I should do it online again, I did all they asked me to do. Since then I have not collect the police report yet.

MR. DARCHE: Mr. Abowaba, did you -- are you trying to get the result of an NYPD investigation or a CCRB investigation?

MR. ABOWABA: I came to CCRB to report, to complain about calling 911 police, and they said they were coming, I did not see them.

They received my call, they did not come around.

So, I now went there to see -- since they

PROCEEDINGS

did not come, this is what has happened. So I came to CCRB to complain, and I received a complaint number from CCRB that I should call AIB, you know, to collect the report. So this is almost four months ago, about three months ago, I've not, you know, be able to receive any.

MR. DARCHE: Mr. Abowaba, what I'm gonna ask is that one of our investigators, Will, your -- if you can hold on, Will, will get in touch with your right now, and we will try and get you the information you need, whether it's tonight or tomorrow, we'll get it to you, sir.

MR. ABOWABA: Okay, sir. Thank you.

CHAIR KHALID: Anybody else? Anybody next online?

MS. ALVAREZ: Just really quickly. Mr. Abowaba, we will send you a text in the chat, directly requesting your contact information.

Chair, that concludes the virtual portion of the public session.

CHAIR KHALID: Thank you.

For those joining in person and are interested making a public comment, please line up behind the podium, and, again, please keep

your comment to four minutes.

MS. MOSS: Hello, I am (technical issue),
I am the mother of Clarissa (technical issue)
Taskforce to End Gender-Based and Domestic
Violence, I serve on the community action board that gives federal funding to non-profits and after-school programs and happy New Year to all of CCRB.

I'm happy to hear of the accomplishments that we saw and achieved last year with the CCRB. I want to stress that, moving forward in 2025, we need to take special attention to domestic violence situations and ensure that our police have the sensitivities in dealing with those matters.

Some people have New Year's resolutions, I have New Year's wishes. My wishes are to see more proactivity about the budget that Arva Rice did as an interim chair was phenomenal, so we don't want to lose any of the progress that she achieved as the interim chair. Those are great shoes to fill, Dr. Khalid, I'm sure you are phenomenal, but she was so exceptional, so I just want to point that out.

I also would love to see government

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efficiency to minimize trauma and to make sure that when people are submitting reports, that they are done in an efficient time span, so that it doesn't go on and take a long time to resolve and that there is no violation of the people that the NYPD are supposed to protect.

Last year, I experienced police brutality from the 24 Precinct. I was zapped by some kind of electrical device on my right side when I was chained to a bench, and I was shackled at the ankles like, as reminiscent of the slaves, enslaved people who were brought over in chains. So I would like to ensure that all of -- when people are submitting complaints, that the CCRB, you all know that your role and your responsibility is so great to ensure that when police are not -- the word "chastised" come to mind, but when they're not held accountable for the things that they do that are against the needs of the community or taking certain sensitivities, that those things cause greater detriment and it allows more police officers to do greater harms and damages, so it's very important that we are making the right decisions and setting a

standard for the police, and that is the responsibility of this Board, thank you.

CHAIR KHALID: Thank you very much. You have been a great advocate. Thank you. And I promise you that, I don't know Arva Rice, but I'm sure she was a great chair and I'll try to do the best I can. Thank you.

Mr. Meyers.

MR. MEYERS: I'm Michael Meyers. I'm the president, New York Civil Rights Coalition.

I will keep my comments within four minutes, which is gonna be impossible to do, but I will do that, per your new rules about the -- and your concerns about disruptions.

John Siegal, thanks for reminding us that it's been four, you didn't say "damn years," I will say it, four damn years we're waiting for the mayor of the city to appoint somebody who is a permanent chair, in quotes, permanent chair of the CCRB.

What is going on? Nobody here on the Board has written and protested the mayor. I urge you to do that. I don't have a copy of the letter. I don't have a copy of telegrams, e-mails, nothing. Have you done it? Why don't

PROCEEDINGS

you mail the mayor the appointment of a permanent chair of this panel. This is an insult. You sit there and you take the insult month after month, year after year. His term as mayor will run out before you have a permanent chair because he, apparently, will not appoint one. It's impossible that, to accept this nonsense now.

I hope his term runs out sooner than later, maybe without a pardon from president -- President Trump, his term will end sooner than we think.

With respect to the interim chair, thank you for getting into the hot seat and being so respectful and civil, more respectful and civil than I could ever be.

CHAIR KHALID: Thank you.

MR. MEYERS: You used the word "trust." I don't use the word "trust." There used to be a phrase, trust but verify. You got to verify, and that's Commission's role. Verify, to check, to investigate, to chastise, and punish when punishment seems indicated.

Based on previous reports of the executive director and the other chair, the police

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commissioners are not interested, willing to punish the police officers who have been adjudicated, to have been found responsible for misdeeds and misconduct towards the public.

You have to ask what kind of police commissioner do we have that will not enforce the law, the law, meaning the public policy that created this damn commission in the first She disrespects you, she disrespects place. the public, and I don't care what their name is, he or she, they is disrespecting the public and we're so hopeful because I'm a quote unquote fan of the Tisch's, you know. I was so hopeful, this current, present police commissioner would come here, talk to the public, talk to the commission and tell -- and advise you that it's gonna be a new day, I'm gonna listen to you all, I'm going to follow your advice and your guidance, and when I don't (unintelligible) and specify why I can't do it, but I will not violate the law, or the spirit of the law. Haven't heard a word from her I haven't seen her on the subways, about that. I haven't seen her on the streets, I haven't seen her on TV, I haven't seen anything, other

than running her mouth in terms of making information, public relations. I'm serious, I really am. We don't have a police commissioner who has the decency and the respect for this body to come here to talk to you as a board at public session so we can hear it, we want to see it, we want to hear what she's got to say.

So finally, I was hopeful for this police commissioner, I really was, but I'm not anymore, and the reason why I'm not anymore and it has not been a month, but I read a column from my former intern, he was a young guy, I hired him as an intern at the New York Civil Rights Coalition, his name is Harry Siegal. is now a columnist for the New York Daily News. I suggest you read, or reread Harry Siegal's column about this police commissioner. trying to find the title, but it was a pun on the name of Chell. Yeah, a shell game, Chell meaning the new guy in charge of NYPD. It was an interesting column, but I don't have time to go over it now, but it was shocking that Harry documented the current police commissioner's insensitivity, irresponsibility. It's her idiocy with respect to police, civilians,

review processes. She just taps people on the hand, just like the other police commissioners did. She ain't no different than anyone else.

I want to tell you that it's shocking, I'm so disaffected and disappointed. Every time I look for hope, every time I think we're going to have progress, something else happens.

We have another police commissioner who doesn't respect you, another police commissioner doesn't respect the public, another police commissioner that doesn't respect civil rights, another police commissioner that doesn't understand what civil liberties are, another one. And her term may end prior to the mayor's or the mayor's term may end prior to her term ending. I can only say, read the column of Harry Siegal, and I'm not gonna read it here on the record, I only have less than four minutes, it is time for them both to go, Mayor Eric Adams, get the hell out. Police commissioner, you have already failed to be responsible as a public servant. When you pat the hand of people on the police force, as opposed to enforcing the law and making sure the police department is held

responsible and accountable to the people, you have already failed. Why do we have to wait three more months, much less three more years?

Thank you.

CHAIR KHALID: Thank you, Mr. Meyers.

Next is the Board's business. Do we have any old business to come before the Board.

MR. DARCHE: You should come up.

CHAIR KHALID: I'm sorry.

MS. ABDALLA: Good afternoon, everyone. My name is Asmaa, and I was here before, I think 2024, and I have so many cases with the CCRB, but in same time, they close all (unintelligible) NYPD, so nothing happen up until this month. They keep doing harassment us, abusing us, assaulting us, and when we told (unintelligible) area until this moment. (Unintelligible) before even I finish the call with 911, I see in front of my door whatever, every single time I feel not safe, the neighbor is (unintelligible) me and I know they are behind everything (unintelligible), and I already told them so many times if you have something against us, it's okay, you already -have already my apartment, you have already my

address, you have everything you

(unintelligible) what I have done to

(unintelligible) treating us like that, abusing

us, so you don't have to hit our reputation by

saying I'm a criminal or I am just, like,

psycho. So they are doctor, that is fine, if

they are doctor, they can just examine us, that

is fine for me, but they don't have something

to (unintelligible) us like that.

Just a few days ago, like, two days ago, I called them and the reason they give to me they don't want to come, even to call 911, they keep refuse to answer me over the phone, and I already got, already, like, got abusing by the people, (unintelligible) like it's natural, (unintelligible) with me, they already (unintelligible) me so many times and they already told me, threaten me, they said, we're not gonna leave you (unintelligible) to leave this country, but I'm not going to listen to anyone because I need to know what I have done. And the same time, I keep continuing, I told to Mr. John, please let me just know what is going on, he said to me before, okay, I will handle your case by myself, and if you didn't feel

satisfied with the results, I'm gonna discuss with you and that is last September, and nothing happened. I tried to reach him, he didn't respond. I tried to reach anyone from his office, never respond. So I don't know what is going on. And I was victim so much since I saw him, I see it's like myself (unintelligible) something is big, something for me that is (unintelligible) but actually that has not happen because I was feeling that he was going to do something for me, even told me it is your case, it's not gonna be something (unintelligible) allegation, I will (unintelligible) different department, you know, or whatever who can just hand you like Human Rights or something, no one do something with me until this month, six years later, they keep continuing surrounded, they keep doing, bother me, they involved all the people in my area, my neighborhood, they call me psycho (unintelligible) anything you can say, they say to me, and if I did something to (unintelligible) I have the right to see, if I (unintelligible), that's fine, just show it to me, even a criminal is supposed to be just

given the punishment after (unintelligible) I did this one, and after they can (unintelligible) but it's not gonna just play games with me like (unintelligible) like that, whatever they have (unintelligible) so why ain't they dong something like that with me? This I don't understand (unintelligible) I want to understand what I have done. That is not fair for me, every single time I make a lot of complaint, they close it. Even I (unintelligible) some stuff they said that is from his job, his job is talking (unintelligible) they have police cars when I ask them why you (unintelligible) they have no answer (unintelligible) they broke my apartment, I have defend myself, even to push him outside, they said, you hit him. doesn't make sense, if somebody broke your apartment and they're supposed to be help yourself and they took me with no clothes, and when I ask them why, they said, you're under arrest. As of this moment, I have to wait for this one. Everybody, they have (unintelligible) because no one was inside my apartment, only the cops and us and they took

my picture and the people said, oh we sue you, that is all crazy, they took out to police car like crazy person and they showed to all the people in the mosque, until this moment, I have to wait for this one and everything is (unintelligible) they fabricate some stuff, I don't know why they have no (unintelligible) they have no duty to do it, so that's (unintelligible) I just (unintelligible) surround us. Trust me, I didn't want to come today, my husband too, he said, I have already more than enough and I left everything in between God because no one is gonna do anything, and that is true. But the same time they say, because as a woman, I can't bear this one because not every single time -- and I'm not gonna cry, because every single time I have, they said, oh you have (unintelligible) I am a human being. Same time, I just -- I request from them, let me know what I have done, but they send for me the letter that they closed this one because they have something against me, so I want to see right now, front you all, I want to see what I have done. Jon, would you? CHAIR KHALID:

MR. DARCHE: First of all, I want to apologize because I made many efforts to get in touch with the New York City Commission on Human Rights and they also ignored me so -- but on behalf of the City, I apologize that no one got in touch with you.

MS. ABDALLA: It's okay for me. It's okay, just I need to know why, just why, why me, why especially us, why you choose us to play games on us like that, why does he hit our reputation, why everybody, even now back home, they contact somebody and I (unintelligible) they already have my address back home and they keep continue (unintelligible) we know already everything happen to you in America. Just imagine -- just to prove that I am the one, I'm not good person, I am terrible (unintelligible) just imagine, I can't bring my kids, I can't bring anyone from my family because they're gonna do something. This month I am -- between me and (unintelligible) I have a lot of problems, (unintelligible) religion, I ask them, I have to wear my scarf for religion (unintelligible) fuck my religion (unintelligible) that is fine, if they say

something like that, why is he saying something like that. I don't have the right to wear my scarf, I don't have the right to wear something under my (unintelligible) I already was (unintelligible) broke in my door and my, my leg is bleeding and I showed to the people who work in the CCRB and they never do anything and they want to show to you everything and already everything is already clear.

MR. DARCHE: So, one of the problems, ma'am, is we have jurisdiction over the police and when we spoke, there were issues that weren't police related, so they needed to be handled by the Commission on Human Rights, so I will re-double my efforts to get someone from there who can handle your complaints because, not within our jurisdiction, there are no complaints within our jurisdiction that are So I will be in touch after I am in touch with the Commission on Human Rights, and I will talk to my chief of staff, Yojaira Alvarez, about making sure that we get in touch with someone from CHR this week who can take your complaints.

MR. DARCHE: I understand that, but I

MS. ABDALLA: I told you they keep continue surrounding me, even I told them I don't want to even make complaint with you, trust me. That is what -- I need to be alone and in peace, that is what I said to IAB, I said, okay, if the cops don't want to leave because they pay money, somebody pay for them money to hit and let us leave the country, that is fine, here in New York City there is mean dirty cops, but I don't know even why they do something like that.

CHAIR KHALID: Cops hit you?

MS. ABDALLA: Yes, of course, he (unintelligible) everything I have.

CHAIR KHALID: You didn't file a complaint with the --

MS. ABDALLA: I did file but they

(unintelligible) even I brought for the, I have

the video and I showed to them and they

(unintelligible) even they have some people

USB, Amazon, stuff like that, when I

(unintelligible) they see everything, they have

my social security, they have my ID, they have everything. Whatever I'm trying to prove that is (unintelligible) I have some stuff in my hand, already have (unintelligible) in my hand after they (unintelligible) they already know how to do something like that, and they continue to do something different. I already have the MRI prove this one that I got hit from them after this one, and (unintelligible) send they send ambulance, they send somebody from them, refused to give me the right number, they refused to give me anything, they refused to give me they name. How come it is I can't trust even when I was in the ambulance, you have to fuck shut up your mouth, you're a criminal. Just imagine how you gonna just trust the people, if I am inside the ambulance, they told me something like that.

I requested from them give me your plate number, they refused, I said just give me your name, they refused. After that they said, you're a criminal, so I can't just everything (unintelligible) gonna start to (unintelligible) by something, I'm gonna just ask like (unintelligible) something like that

they gonna (unintelligible), everyone, they have my picture (unintelligible) and they show it to everybody, they show it --

MR. DARCHE: She has filed a complaint with the CCRB and the CCRB has investigated them and has also determined that many of the issues that she had with the religious institution or the restaurants in her neighborhood are not issues that the CCRB can handle, or issues with the EMTs, those are things that really are best investigated by the Commission on Human Rights.

So we are not saying that you're not making valid complaints about all of these different people, we respond --

MS. ABDALLA: You have more than four cases and you close it already, even you have the proof, even they stopped me in the street -- I'm sorry, because you don't have time, but I have to finish a little bit something because if I'm --

MR. DARCHE: You're already --

MS. ABDALLA: -- one year, I'm not gonna finish, one minute I'm not gonna finish, not four minutes, four years, ten years, I'm not

gonna finish.

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They stopped me in the street, they took my bags, they put it in the garbage in the street, and after I show it to the people here from the CCRB, they have proof, so what is kind of proof this one, if they stop me in the street and they told me, they spit in the floor, in the street, what's going on, of course I have some medical history and when they smell any drugs, any (unintelligible) I can't feel something like that, I have to take my breath, so what's going on with them? They have nothing to do, this is all because they spit on the people, so they are crazy, not me, because I'm the people in the car, how I'm gonna spit on them if they are in the car. am walking in the street and they are in the car, I can show it to you, the people, they have come from the (unintelligible) they throw it on me when they are in the car. They give me the finger when they are in the car, they trying to provoke me by everything. Because I am walking already in the street, you can show them already, of course, because they have the car, I don't have the car. They abusing me

(unintelligible) and they give me the finger and (unintelligible) all these issues, why they don't want to take care?

CHAIR KHALID: Have you filed with the Human Rights Commission, any report?

MS. ABDALLA: I told them so many times, please, I left them my address, I left them my phone, they never -- I'm saying six years like that surrounded me, I left it so many times with the Human Rights. I go everywhere, with the CCRB, I go everything, even last time just two days ago, they send some people behind me in the store is calling (unintelligible) so for what, I pay money for everything I got, if they have proof, why they do not show it to me, (unintelligible) prove it to me, so if I did something wrong --

CHAIR KHALID: You're over time now, but we'll look into it.

MS. ABDALLA: That is fine. Thank you, but you have to talk this one because I'm not gonna keep my holy days like that and they have Ramadan, they keep from the Masjid, too. You have to understand, I can't just live like that. And the mosque told me, you don't have

to come because you cops always behind you and they troublemaker (unintelligible) I'm not gonna keep my life like that, you have to take care of this one.

CHAIR KHALID: We'll look into it. Thank you.

Anybody else from the public?

(No response.)

CHAIR KHALID: Nobody from the public any more, so we'll go into the old business. Do you have any old business to discuss?

(No response.)

MS. ABDALLA: -- because this one something bigger more than you, I want to know who is the bigger that he already put me in (unintelligible) something like that, so I want to know who is this person. And I have so many proofs that people said something like that. That's why, even all the people in my area, my neighbors, my friends, they get scared because they said they gonna do same like that did we me, so please just try the take care, and I want to understand what's going on, at least let me just know. Okay.

CHAIR KHALID: Thank you.
