**TOMORROW: CCRB to Hold Special Board Meeting on NYPD’s Proposed  
Disciplinary Matrix**

**New York, NY** – The New York City Civilian Complaint Review Board (CCRB) will hold a special Board meeting to receive public comment on the NYPD's proposed disciplinary matrix tomorrow at 4:00 PM. All participants, including members of the media, [must register for this event through Webex](#).

On August 31, the NYPD released its proposed disciplinary matrix for public comment. The intent of developing the disciplinary matrix is to standardize penalties for substantiated allegations of police misconduct.

During this meeting, the Board will hear from the public, elected officials, and advocates on the proposed disciplinary matrix in order to inform the Board’s evaluation of the NYPD’s proposal. The deadline for public comment on the proposed disciplinary matrix is September 30, 2020. The NYPD’s final disciplinary matrix will be published on or before January 15, 2021.
