



Allegation J – Abuse of Authority: Police Officer Robert Gallagher searched the vehicle in
which § 87(2)(b) and § 87(2)(b) were occupants.
testified that he and \$37(2)(b) were seated in \$37(2)(b) s parked Cadillac SUV for approximately one and a half hours before the officers approached. The car was not running, and neither \$37(2)(b) had marijuana on them or inside of the vehicle. PO Gallagher approached the vehicle, told \$37(2)(b) that he smelled marijuana, and ordered \$37(2)(b) and \$37(2)(b) out of the vehicle. PO Gallagher patted down \$37(2)(b) saw over the vehicle that PO Hawk and Det. Yardan patted down \$37(2)(b) however, \$37(2)(b) could not see specifically where \$37(2)(b) was touched as he was on the passenger side of the vehicle. The officers then brought \$37(2)(b) and \$37(2)(b) to the back of the vehicle and PO Gallagher searched the vehicle (Board Review 07).
provided a brief phone statement in which he made no mention of being frisked, but he was otherwise uncooperative with the investigation (Board Review 18 ; see IAs for contact attempts).
PO Gallagher testified that he observed \$87(2)(b) s vehicle idling for five minutes, which was the violation for which he stopped \$87(2)(b) and \$87(2)(b) PO Gallagher knew the car was idling because, due to the cold weather, he saw smoke emitting from the vehicle's exhaust. PO Gallagher did not recognize \$87(2)(b) s vehicle.
PO Hawk and Det. Yardan were generally consistent in their testimonies that vehicle, which was known to them as being involved in prior narcotics transactions, was parked in the parking lot of Seaview Plaza which was known to the officers as a drug-prone location which is a precinct condition that had been discussed during roll calls, and all three officers have been involved in narcotics arrests at the location. The officers approached the parked vehicle to see what the occupants were up to. They did not intend to stop \$87(2)(6) and \$87(2)(6) at this point.
PO Gallagher, PO Hawk, and Det. Yardan were consistent in their statements that upon approaching the vehicle, prior to speaking with the occupants, each officer smelled an odor of marijuana emitting from the vehicle. PO Gallagher ordered \$87(2)(6) out of the vehicle and frisked his entire body. PO Hawk testified that he frisked \$87(2)(6) and Det. Yardan recalled frisking someone, but he did not recall if he frisked \$87(2)(6) or \$87(2)(6) Each officer testified that both occupants' entire bodies were frisked for weapons even though they did not observe any discernible bulges that they were concerned about, and each officer testified that they routinely frisk occupants of vehicles in this manner every time an occupant is removed from a vehicle. PO Gallagher searched the entire vehicle, excluding the trunk, for marijuana and found approximately one gram of marijuana in the driver's door of the vehicle (Board Review 08, 09, 10).
PO Gallagher's BWC footage captures him finding a small ziplock bag of marijuana in the driver's door of the vehicle (beginning at the 01:00 timestamp of the video player, visible at the bottom of the screen) (Board Review 03). At 01:57, \$37(2)(5) s keys are seen in the ignition of the vehicle, and the vehicle engine is visibly turned on (Board Review 11).

The approach of a parked but running vehicle must be justified by an objective, credible reason, not necessarily indicative of criminality. The intrusion must be predicated on more than a hunch, whim, caprice, or idle curiosity. People v. Grady, 272 A.D.2d 952 (2000) (Board Review 17). No person shall cause or permit the engine of a motor vehicle to idle for longer than three minutes. New York City Administrative Code, Title 24, Section 24-163 (Board Review 12). The smell of marijuana is sufficient to provide officers with probable cause to search a vehicle and its occupants. People v. Chestnut, 43 A.D.2d 260 (1974) (Board Review 13).

Allegation K – Abuse of Authority: Police Officer Michael Hawk interfered with \$87(2)(6)
s use of a recording device. **ST(2)(b) testified that he took out his cellphone and began recording the officers, at which point PO Hawk shined his flashlight into the camera to block his face. PO Hawk then grabbed **ST(2)(b) s cellphone and put it into PO Hawk's own pocket. PO Hawk returned s cellphone when the officers left the location (Board Review 07).
s cellphone video begins with \$87(2)(b) speaking directly to the camera, complaining about the officers harassing him. At the 00:10 mark on the video player, visible at the bottom of the screen, the cellphone video turns white and overexposed while PO Hawk shines his flashlight at the camera. \$87(2)(b) moves his cellphone and PO Hawk follows the cellphone with his flashlight. \$87(2)(b) tells PO Hawk, "Don't try to block to block the uhh from your face bro" while moving the camera. PO Hawk grabs the phone and the video ends (Board Review 01).
PO Hawk's BWC footage captures \$87(2)(6) filming PO Hawk as PO Hawk shines his flashlight into the phone [beginning at the 00:09 timestamp of the video player, visible at the bottom of the screen]. The flash of \$87(2)(6) s phone is turned on. \$87(2)(6)

After PO Hawk reviewed BWC footage during his CCRB interview, he acknowledged that screen was further away from him than a few inches, but he maintained that it still posed a safety issue due to the phone potentially being or containing a weapon (Board Review 09).
PO Gallagher did not recall \$87(2)(b) putting his cellphone in PO Hawk's face and he did not remember PO Hawk taking \$87(2)(b) s cellphone from \$87(2)(b) (Board Review 08).
Individuals have a right to lawfully observe and record police activity in public places. This right can be limited for reasons such as safety of officers or other members of the public, or when a violation of law is committed by the individual who is observing and recording. NYPD Patrol Guide , Procedure 203-29 (Board Review 14).

NYC Administrative Code, Section 14-174 states that officers are required to provide members of the public with business cards after law enforcement encounters, including stops, frisks, and vehicle searches, in which no summons is issued or arrest is made (Board Review 22).

shield number to \$87(2)(b) and Det. Yardan were consistent in their statements that while PO Gallagher was searching \$87(2)(b) as vehicle, \$87(2)(b) asked Det. Yardan for his name and shield number, and Det. Yardan verbally provided the requested information to \$87(2)(b) However, \$87(2)(b) alleged that as PO Gallagher, PO Hawk, and Det. Yardan were leaving and walking to their car, he called out to them, "I need your guys' names and badge numbers," and the officers did not respond before leaving the location.
provided a brief phone statement, in which he made no mention of these allegations, but he was otherwise uncooperative with the investigation (Board Review 18 ; see IAs for contact attempts).
Det. Yardan testified that \$87(2)(6) requested PO Gallagher's and PO Hawk's names and shield numbers, and that each officer verbally provided their own information. PO Hawk denied Page 7

requested any officers' name or shield number. PO Gallagher testified that did not recall if did not request his name and shield number, and that he did not recall if requested the names and shield numbers of the other officers. PO Gallagher did not recall PO Hawk or Det. Yardan providing their names and shield numbers (Board Review 08, 09, 10).
PO Gallagher's, Det. Yardan's and PO Hawk's BWC footage does not show requesting the officers' names or shield numbers. However, the video ends prior to the point in time where the officers say they exited their vehicle and reapproached the civilians to offer them their business cards (Board Review 03, 04, 05, 06).
