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Executive Director's Monthly Report March 2021 (Statistics for February 2021)

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Executive Summary

The Civilian Complaint Review Board ("CCRB") is an independent municipal Agency that investigates complaints of NYPD misconduct. Every month, the CCRB prepares an Executive Director report for its public meeting. Data for February 2021 included the following highlights:

- 1) Of the cases in the CCRB active investigations docket, 44% have been open for 4 months or fewer, and 56% have been open for 7 months or fewer (page 10). In February, the CCRB opened 292 new cases (page 4), and currently has a total open docket of 3,116 cases (page 11).
- 2) The CCRB substantiated allegations in 75% of its fully investigated cases (page 16).
- 3) The CCRB fully investigated 7% of the cases it closed in February (page 13) and resolved (fully investigated, mediated or attempted mediation) 20% of the cases it closed (page 17). The Agency's truncation rate was 72% (page 13). This is primarily driven by uncooperative complainants/alleged victims, or witnesses.
- 4) For February, investigations using video evidence resulted in substantiated allegations in 67% of cases compared to 100% of cases in which video was not available (page 21-22).
- 5) The Monthly Report includes a breakdown of complaints and substantiations by NYPD precinct and borough of occurrence (pages 5-6,26).
- 6) In February the Police Commissioner finalized 5 decision(s) against police officers in Administrative Prosecution Unit (APU) cases; 4 were guilty verdicts won by the APU (page 32). The CCRB's APU prosecutes the most serious allegations of misconduct. The APU conducted 3 trials against members of the NYPD year-to-date; 2 trials were conducted against respondent officers in February.

Finally, the Monthly Report contains a Table of Contents, Glossary, and Appendix, all meant to assist readers in navigating this report. The CCRB is committed to producing monthly reports that are valuable to the public, and welcomes feedback on how to make its data more accessible.

Glossary

In this glossary we have included a list of terms that regularly appear in our reports.

Allegation: An allegation is a specific act of misconduct. The same "complaint" can have multiple allegations – excessive force and discourteous language, for example. Each allegation is reviewed separately during an investigation.

APU: The Administrative Prosecution Unit is the division of the CCRB that has prosecuted "charges" cases since April 2013, after the signing of a 2012 Memorandum of Understanding between the CCRB and NYPD.

Board Panel: The "Board" of the CCRB has 13 members. Of the 13 members, five are chosen by the Mayor, five are chosen by the City Council, and three are chosen by the Police Commissioner. Following a completed investigation by the CCRB staff, three Board members, sitting as a Board Panel, will make a finding on whether misconduct occurred and will make a recommendation on what level of penalty should follow.

Case/Complaint: For the purposes of CCRB data, a "case" or "complaint" is defined as any incident within the Agency's jurisdiction, brought to resolution by the CCRB. Cases/Complaints thus include truncations, fully investigated or ongoing cases, mediations, and completed investigations pending Board Panel review.

Disposition: The Board's finding as to the outcome of a case (i.e. if misconduct occurred).

FADO: Under the City Charter, the CCRB has jurisdiction to investigate the following categories of police misconduct: Force, Abuse of Authority, Discourtesy, and Offensive Language, collectively known as "FADO".

Intake: CCRB's intake team initially handles complaints from the public. Intake takes complaints that come via live phone calls, voicemails, an online complaint form, or in-person.

Investigation: CCRB investigators gather evidence and interview witnesses to prepare reports on misconduct allegations. An investigation ends when a closing report is prepared detailing the evidence and legal analysis, and the case is given to the Board for disposition.

Mediation: A complainant may mediate his or her case with the subject officer, in lieu of an investigation, with the CCRB providing a neutral, third-party mediator.

Truncation: When a complaint is withdrawn or there is no complainant/alleged victim available for an interview, the investigation is "truncated."

Closed Pending Litigation: Sometimes when a complainant is involved in criminal or civil litigation, their attorney advises against making sworn statements until the conclusion of the court case. When a complainant declines to cooperate with an investigation on the advice of their attorney, the complaint disposition is "Closed Pending Litigation." Prior to January 2021, "Closed Pending Litigation" complaints were counted as truncations in CCRB reporting. In January 2021 the CCRB Board decided that "Closed Pending Litigation" complaints should no longer be counted as truncations.

Complaints Received




Figure 1: Total Intake by Month (January 2020 - February 2021)







Figure 3: New CCRB Complaints by Year (YTD 2010 - YTD 2021)

The CCRB's Intake team processes misconduct complaints from the public and referrals from the NYPD. Under the New York City Charter, the CCRB's jurisdiction is limited to allegations of misconduct related to Force, Abuse of Authority, Discourtesy and Offensive Language. All other complaints are referred to the appropriate agency. Figure 1 refers to all complaints that the CCRB receives and Figures 2 and 3 refer to new cases that remain with the Agency. In February 2021, the CCRB initiated 292 new complaints.

CCRB Cases Received by Borough and Precinct

Of the five boroughs, the largest number of misconduct complaints stemmed from incidents occurring in Brooklyn, followed by Manhattan. The 23rd Precinct had the highest number at 11 incidents.




Figure 4: CCRB Complaints Received By Borough of Occurrence (February 2021)

Figure 5: CCRB Complaints Received By Borough of Occurrence (YTD 2021)




Figure 6: CCRB Complaints Received By Precinct of Occurrence (February 2021)

Allegations Received

As described in the previous section, the CCRB has jurisdiction over four categories of NYPD misconduct. In comparing February 2020 to February 2021, the number of complaints containing an allegation of Force is down, Abuse of Authority complaints are down, Discourtesy are down and Offensive Language are up. Figures for the year-to-date comparison show that in 2021, complaints containing an allegation of Force are down, Abuse of Authority are down, Discourtesy are down and Offensive Language are up.




Figure 7: CCRB Complaints Received By Type of Allegation (February 2020 vs. February 2021)




Figure 9: CCRB Complaints Received By Type of Allegation (YTD 2020 vs. YTD 2021)

CCRB Docket

As of the end of February 2021, 44% of active CCRB cases are fewer than five months old, and 56% active cases have been open for fewer than eight months.

Figure 15: Number of Active Investigations (January 2020 - February 2021)




Figure 16: Open Docket Analysis




Figure 17: Open Docket Analysis with % Change

Body Worn Camera Footage Requests


Since the widespread roll out of body worn cameras in 2018, the collection of footage from these cameras has become an integral part of CCRB investigations.

The timeliness of the response to BWC footage requests has a direct impact on the length of time it takes to complete an investigation. The longer it takes to fulfill BWC requests, the longer CCRB investigations remain on the open docket.

Closed Cases

Resolving Cases

In February 2021, the CCRB fully investigated 7% of the cases it closed, and resolved (fully investigated, mediated or mediation attempted) 20% of the cases it closed.




Figure 20: Case Resolutions (January 2020 - February 2021) (%)

Dispositions

Cases fully investigated by the CCRB generally receive one of five outcomes:

- If the alleged misconduct is found to have occurred, based on the preponderance of the evidence, the allegation is **substantiated**.
- If there is not enough evidence to determine whether or not the alleged misconduct occurred, the allegation is **unsubstantiated**.
- If the preponderance of the evidence suggests that the event or alleged act did not occur, the allegation is **unfounded**.
- If the event did occur, but was not improper by a preponderance of evidence, the allegation is **exonerated**.
- If the CCRB was unable to identify any of the officers accused of misconduct, the case is closed as **officer unidentified**.

Additionally, a case might be **mediated**, with the subject officer and complainant discussing the incident in the presence of a neutral third-party moderator, or closed as **mediation attempted**, the designation for a case in which both the officer and the civilian agree to mediate, but the civilian fails to appear twice for the scheduled mediation session or fails to respond to attempts to schedule a mediation session Finally, a case that cannot be fully investigated due to complainant/alleged victim unavailability or lack of cooperation is **truncated**.

Case Abstracts

The following case abstracts are taken from complaints closed this month and serve as examples of what the different CCRB dispositions mean in practice:

1. Substantiated

Two individuals filed a complaint on the Agency's website stating that an officer disseminated on his twitter account private information about an individual who was arrested during a protest against police violence. The officer made a twitter post accusing the protestor of being a "rioting anarchist" and attached the individual's arrest report which included her address and date of birth along with a photograph of her. Twitter took down the post because it violated their policies—but screenshots had been taken of the post and disseminated among members of the media. The officer stated that someone else had posted the individual's photo before he posted it on his own twitter account.

NYPD Patrol Guide Procedure 203-02 sates that when accessing information obtained from the department's information system, an officer may only disclose that information as required in the lawful execution of their duty. They are also required to maintain the confidentiality of that information.

When the officer made his post to social media – he disseminated the arrested individual's private information to a wide audience of people who would not have been privy to the confidential information contained in the arrest report. The Board substantiated the Abuse of Authority allegation.

2. Unsubstantiated

An individual was attending protest against police violence when some members of the crowd yelled profane statements at police officers and debris was sporadically thrown toward officers. The individual saw a line of 10 -12 police officers standing in the street and the first subject officer moved with the line of officers and kicked an overturned trash can towards a group of approximate six demonstrators. One of the demonstrators was hit in the leg by the trashcan. The demonstrator stumbled but did not fall. One of the demonstrators kicked the trash can back towards the officers and it did not reach them. Two or three subject officers from the line left the line and arrested the demonstrator who had kicked the trash can back towards the officers as well as some other individuals in the group. The individual approached

the first subject officer approximately ten minutes after the incident and asked why he kicked the trash can. He laughed and rolled his eyes. The individual took photographs of him and the individual only gave a general description of the group of demonstrators that had the trash can kicked towards them. The subject officer stated that during the day of the incident that several people took photographs of him and other officers and he did not specifically recall an individual approaching him and taking his photo nor did he did not recall kicking a trash can at a demonstrator. None of the BWC footage collected from around the time of the incident showed the location that the incident alleged took place – the group of demonstrators could not be located in the available footage. There were no additional independent witness testimony or pertinent video evidence, the investigation was unable to determine which officers alleged used force against at least two unidentified individuals.

The Board unsubstantiated the Abuse of Authority and Use of Force allegations.

3. Unfounded

The CCRB did not close any complaints as "Unfounded" in February 2021

4. Exonerated





Dispositions - FADO Allegations

"Allegations" are different than "cases." A case or complaint is based on an incident and may contain one or more allegations of police misconduct. The allegation substantiation rate is 60% for the month of February 2021, and the allegation substantiation rate is 27% year-to-date.

Dispositions - Untruthful Statement Allegations

Following the 2019 passage of Ballot Question #2 and the subsequent City Charter Revision, CCRB's jurisdiction was expanded to include untruthful material statements made by police officers. As a result, CCRB added a new "Untruthful Statement" category of allegations.

There are four specific allegations in the new "Untruthful Statement" category: 1) False official statement, 2) Misleading official statement, 3) Inaccurate official statement and 4) Impeding an investigation.


Figure 28: Disposition of Untruthful Statement Allegations (YTD 2021)

Figure 30: Substantiation Rates for Full Investigations without Video (Jan 2021 - Feb 2021) (% substantiated shown)





Figure 31: Substantiation Rates for Full Investigations with Video (Jan 2021 - Feb 2021) (% substantiated shown)



Board Discipline Recommendations for Substantiated Complaints

After a CCRB investigative team has completed its investigation and recommended the substantiation of a complaint against an officer, a panel of three Board members determines whether to substantiate the allegation and make a disciplinary recommendation.

- "Charges and Specifications" are the most severe form of discipline. A decision to
 assign Charges commences a process that may result in an administrative trial in the
 NYPD Trial Room. An officer may lose vacation days, be suspended, or be
 terminated from the Department if the officer is found guilty.
- "Instructions" or "Formalized Training" are the least severe discipline, often recommended for officers who misunderstand a policy. This determination results in training at the command level (Instructions) or training at the Police Academy or NYPD Legal Bureau (Formalized Training).
- "Command Discipline" is recommended for misconduct that is moderately serious, but does not rise to the level of that associated with Charges. An officer can lose up to ten vacation days as a result of a Command Discipline.
- When the Board has recommended Instructions, Formalized Training or Command Discipline, the case is sent to the NYPD Commissioner to impose training and/or other penalties. Cases where the Board recommends charges are prosecuted by the CCRB's Administrative Prosecution Unit.




Figure 33: Board Discipline Recommendations For Substantiated Complaints* (2021)

Mediation Unit

Whenever mediation between a complainant/alleged victim and subject officer is suitable, it is offered by CCRB investigators. If the complainant/alleged victim and subject officer both agree to participate, a neutral, third-party mediator facilitates a conversation between the parties. "Mediation Attempted" refers to a situation in which an officer agrees to mediate and the complainant becomes unavailable (after the complainant initially agreed to mediation). The chart below indicates the number of mediations and attempted mediations in February and this year.
