Executive Summary

The Civilian Complaint Review Board ("CCRB") is an independent municipal Agency that investigates complaints of NYPD misconduct. Every month, the CCRB prepares an Executive Director report for its public meeting. Data for September 2022 included the following highlights:

- 1) Of the cases in the CCRB active investigations docket, 43% have been open for 4 months or fewer, and 58% have been open for 7 months or fewer (page 10). In September, the CCRB opened 336 new cases (page 4), and currently has a total open docket of 3,330 cases (page 11).
- 2) The CCRB substantiated allegations in 42% of its fully investigated cases (page 17).
- 3) The CCRB fully investigated 88% of the cases it closed in September (page 14) and resolved (fully investigated, mediated or attempted mediation) 88% of the cases it closed (page 18). The Agency closed 8% of the cases as unable to investigate/withdrawn (page 14).
- 4) For September, investigations using video evidence resulted in substantiated allegations in 44% of cases compared to 18% of cases in which video was not available (page 22-23).
- 5) The Monthly Report includes a breakdown of complaints and substantiations by NYPD precinct and borough of occurrence (pages 5-6, 26-30).
- 6) In September the Police Commissioner finalized 8 decision(s) against police officers in Administrative Prosecution Unit (APU) cases (page 36). The CCRB's APU prosecutes the most serious allegations of misconduct. The APU conducted 15 trials against members of the NYPD year-to-date; 1 trial was conducted against respondent officers in September.

The CCRB is committed to producing monthly reports that are valuable to the public, and welcomes feedback on how to make its data more accessible.

Glossary

In this glossary we have included a list of terms that regularly appear in our reports.

Allegation: An allegation is a specific act of misconduct. The same "complaint" can have multiple allegations – excessive force and discourteous language, for example. Each allegation is reviewed separately during an investigation.

APU: The Administrative Prosecution Unit is the division of the CCRB that has prosecuted "charges" cases since April 2013, after the signing of a 2012 Memorandum of Understanding between the CCRB and NYPD.

Board Panel: The "Board" of the CCRB has 15 members. Following a completed investigation by the CCRB staff, three Board members, sitting as a Board Panel, will make a finding on whether misconduct occurred and will make a recommendation on what level of penalty should follow.

Case/Complaint: For the purposes of CCRB data, a "case" or "complaint" is defined as any incident within the Agency's jurisdiction, brought to resolution by the CCRB.

Disposition: The Board's finding as to the outcome of a case (i.e. if misconduct occurred).

FADO: Under the City Charter, the CCRB has jurisdiction to investigate the following categories of police misconduct: Force, Abuse of Authority, Discourtesy, and Offensive Language, collectively known as "FADO".

Intake: CCRB's intake team initially handles complaints from the public. Intake takes complaints that come via live phone calls, voicemails, an online complaint form, or in-person.

Investigation: CCRB investigators gather evidence and interview witnesses to prepare reports on misconduct allegations. An investigation ends when a closing report is prepared detailing the evidence and legal analysis, and the case is given to the Board for disposition.

Mediation: A complainant may mediate his or her case with the subject officer, in lieu of an investigation, with the CCRB providing a neutral, third-party mediator.

Unable to Investigate / Withdrawn: When the CCRB is unable to obtain a sworn statement from the complainant/alleged victim, the case is closed as unable to investigate. When the complainant/alleged victim asks that their complaint be withdrawn, the case is closed as withdrawn.

Closed Pending Litigation: Sometimes when a complainant is involved in criminal or civil litigation, their attorney advises against making sworn statements until the conclusion of the court case. When a complainant declines to cooperate with an investigation on the advice of their attorney, the complaint disposition is "Closed Pending Litigation."

Complaints Received




Figure 1: Total Intake by Month (January 2021 - September 2022)







Figure 3: New CCRB Complaints by Year (YTD 2010 - YTD 2022)

The CCRB's Intake team processes misconduct complaints from the public and referrals from the NYPD. Under the New York City Charter, the CCRB's jurisdiction is limited to allegations of misconduct related to Force, Abuse of Authority, Discourtesy and Offensive Language. All other complaints are referred to the appropriate agency. Figure 1 refers to all complaints that the CCRB receives and Figures 2 and 3 refer to new cases that remain with the Agency. In September 2022, the CCRB initiated 336 new complaints.

CCRB Cases Received by Borough and Precinct

Of the five boroughs, the largest number of misconduct complaints stemmed from incidents occurring in Brooklyn, followed by Manhattan. The 47th Precinct had the highest number at 16 incidents.




Figure 4: CCRB Complaints Received By Borough of Occurrence (September 2022)






Figure 6: CCRB Complaints Received By Precinct of Occurrence (September 2022)

Allegations Received

As described in the previous section, the CCRB has jurisdiction over four categories of NYPD misconduct. In comparing September 2021 to September 2022, the number of complaints containing an allegation of Force is up, Abuse of Authority complaints are up, Discourtesy are down and Offensive Language are down. Figures for the year-to-date comparison show that in 2022, complaints containing an allegation of Force are up, Abuse of Authority are up, Discourtesy are down and Offensive Language are down.




Figure 7: CCRB Complaints Received By Type of Allegation (September 2021 vs. September 2022)




Figure 9: CCRB Complaints Received By Type of Allegation (YTD 2021 vs. YTD 2022)

Figure 15: Number of Active Investigations (January 2021 - September 2022)




Figure 16: Open Docket Analysis




Figure 17: Open Docket Analysis with % Change


Body Worn Camera Footage Requests

Since the widespread roll out of body worn cameras in 2018, the collection of footage from these cameras has become an integral part of CCRB investigations.

The timeliness of the response to BWC footage requests has a direct impact on the length of time it takes to complete an investigation. The longer it takes to fulfill BWC requests, the longer CCRB investigations remain on the open docket.

Figure 20: Percentage of Open Investigations Docket with Pending BWC Requests (January 2021 - September 2022)





Figure 21: Fulfilled BWC Requests (January 2021 - September 2022)



Closed Cases

Resolving Cases

In September 2022, the CCRB fully investigated 88% of the cases it closed, and resolved (fully investigated, mediated or mediation attempted) 88% of the cases it closed.




Figure 22: Case Resolutions (January 2021 - September 2022) (%)

Dispositions

Cases fully investigated by the CCRB generally receive one of five outcomes:

- If the alleged misconduct is found to have occurred, based on the preponderance of the evidence, the allegation is closed as **substantiated**.
- If there is not enough evidence to determine whether or not the alleged misconduct occurred, the allegation is closed as **unable to determine**.*
- If the preponderance of the evidence suggests that the event or alleged act did not occur, the allegation is closed as **unfounded**.
- If the event did occur, but was not improper by a preponderance of evidence, the allegation is closed as within NYPD guidelines.**
- If the CCRB was unable to identify any of the officers accused of misconduct, the case is closed as **officer unidentified**.

Additionally, a case might be **mediated**, with the subject officer and complainant discussing the incident in the presence of a neutral third-party moderator, or closed as **mediation attempted**, the designation for a case in which both the officer and the civilian agree to mediate, but the civilian fails to appear twice for the scheduled mediation session or fails to respond to attempts to schedule a mediation session. Finally, a case that cannot be fully investigated because the CCRB was unable to obtain a sworn statement from the complainant/victim is closed as **unable to investigate**.

Case Abstracts

The following case abstracts are taken from complaints closed this month and serve as examples of what the different CCRB dispositions mean in practice:

1. Substantiated

An individual was away from home when the two subject officers entered her home and searched it. The officers had one of her son's phone numbers and called him. Her son drove to the home and when he arrived, he felt compelled to let the officers into his mother's apartment. The individual's son stated that one of the subject officers did not provide him with a business card. The investigation found that the officers did not have a search warrant to enter and search the home and failed to inform the individual's son that he did not have to consent to the search. The subject officer acknowledged that the business card he gave was not in compliance with the Right to Know Act. The Board substantiated the Abuse of Authority allegations.

2. Unable to Determine

An individual was pulled over while driving in her vehicle when she was stopped by the subject officer. The individual attempted to exit her vehicle and the subject officer pushed the driver side door closed on the individual allegedly hitting her ankle. The BWC did not fully capture the incident – it captured the individual telling the subject officer to "stop hitting my leg" and the subject officer's hand on the frame of the car window which had been rolled down. The BWC doesn't pan down below that level so no observation of the individual's leg could be made. The other officer present was on the opposite side of the vehicle and could not see if the car door hit the individual. The subject officer stated that he attempted to close the car door but did not recall if he saw the individual's feet outside of the vehicle. Because both the individual and the subject officer's statements are in conflict, along with the limited BWC footage, the investigation was unable to determine if the individual's leg was still between the car and driver side door at the time the subject officer attempted to close it. The Board closed the Use of Force allegation as Unable to Determine.

3. Unfounded

An individual was arrested, and his vehicle was driven to the stationhouse by the subject officer. The individual alleged that he saw the subject officer drive fast in his vehicle on the snowy roads, through potholes, and into snowbanks, and damaged his vehicle. The incident was captured on BWC. The subject officer drove the individual's vehicle slowly, observed all road signs and did not hit any potholes or snowbanks, and did not get into any accidents. The investigation determined that the subject officer did not operate the individual's vehicle in the manner as described by the individual and did not cause damage to the individual's vehicle. The Board closed the Abuse of Authority allegation as Unfounded.

4. Within NYPD Guidelines

An individual approached a male individual who had an argument with the individual's grandmother earlier in the day. The male individual ran into a nearby health center before the individual got within 50 feet of him. The male individual called 911. The individual stated that he had not threatened the male individual or displayed a weapon. Two subject officers, one of whom has resigned from the NYPD, approached the individual with their guns drawn and told the individual to get on the ground. The incident was captured on BWC. The male individual was captured speaking to subject officers, and he told them that the individual had displayed a gun and had left the area just ten minutes ago. He provided a physical description of the individual to the subject officers and went with the officers in their vehicle. The subject officers canvassed the immediate area and spotted the individual. The male individual was asked to confirm if that was the person that displayed a gun to him. The male individual confirmed that the individual on the street was the same person that displayed the gun to him. The subject officers exited their vehicle with their guns drawn and asked the individual to get down on the ground and he complied. The investigation found that the subject officers were justified in stopping the individual at gun point because they reasonably believed that there was a potential for serious injury as the individual had been identified by a complainant as the person who had threatened him with force and that said individual was in close proximity to the incident location. The Board found the subject officer's conduct to be within the Department's guidelines and closed the Abuse of Authority allegation as being Within NYPD Guidelines.

5. Officer Unidentified


An individual stated that she was home alone when two officers rang her doorbell. One of them asked if her son was home and she told them he did not live with her. The subject officer gave her his name and a business card and told her to have her son contact him and she said he stated "this is some bullshit" two or three times during their conversation. The officers left the apartment. The individual could not narrow down the date of the incident and stated that it happened in a two-month window. She was able to give a physical description of the officer who spoke to her. The investigation found that the name the officer gave to the individual did not belong to any officer currently with the NYPD. Only two officers had similar sounding names and they were not involved with the individual's son. The investigation found I-cards and bench warrants for the individual's son, but they were not active for the two-month window of the incident occurrence. Without additional pertinent information, the investigation could not identify the subject officer. The Board closed the Discourtesy allegation as Officer Unidentified.

^{*} Unable to determine is reported to the Commissioner as Unsubstantiated, meaning that there was insufficient evidence to establish whether or not there was an act of misconduct.

^{**} Within NYPD Guidelines is reported to the Commissioner as Exonerated, meaning there was a preponderance of the evidence that the acts alleged occurred but did not constitute misconduct.



^{*}Administrative closure is a special category that deals with NYPD's Internal Affairs Bureau-referred cases or spin off cases with no complainant/alleged victim, and in which CCRB attempts to locate or identify a complainant/alleged victim has yielded no results.

Dispositions - FADO Allegations

"Allegations" are different than "cases." A case or complaint is based on an incident and may contain one or more allegations of police misconduct. The allegation substantiation rate is 23% for the month of September 2022, and the allegation substantiation rate is 21% year-to-date.

Dispositions - Untruthful Statement Allegations

Following the 2019 passage of Ballot Question #2 and the subsequent City Charter Revision, CCRB's jurisdiction was expanded to include untruthful material statements made by police officers. As a result, CCRB added a new "Untruthful Statement" category of allegations.

There are four specific allegations in the new "Untruthful Statement" category: 1) False official statement, 2) Misleading official statement, 3) Inaccurate official statement and 4) Impeding an investigation.


Figure 30: Disposition of Untruthful Statement Allegations (YTD 2022)

Figure 31: Percentage of Cases Substantiated (January 2021 - September 2022)








Figure 34: Disposition of Substantiated Complaints* (2022)

^{*} A substantiated complaint may contain a number of substantiated allegations with different dispositions. To determine the disposition associated with the complaint as a whole, the CCRB uses the most severe of the substantiated allegation dispositions. The order of severity is: 1) Charges 2) Command Discipline 3) Formalized Training 4) Instructions.

Board Discipline Recommendations for Substantiated Officers

After a CCRB investigative team has completed its investigation, a panel of Board members determines whether to substantiate the allegation(s) and make a disciplinary recommendation against the officer(s).

- "Charges and Specifications" are the most severe form of discipline. A decision to assign
 Charges commences a process that may result in an administrative trial in the NYPD Trial
 Room. An officer may lose vacation days, be suspended, or be terminated if the officer is
 found guilty.
- "Command Discipline B" and "Command Discipline A" are recommended for misconduct that is moderately serious. An officer can lose up to ten vacation days as a result of Command Discipline B and up to five vacation days as a result of Command Discipline A.
- "Formalized Training" and "Instructions*" are the least severe discipline, often recommended for officers who misunderstand a policy. This determination results in training at the Police Academy or NYPD Legal Bureau (Formalized Training) or training at the command level (Instructions*).
- When the Board has recommended Instructions*, Formalized Training or Command
 Discipline, the case is sent to the NYPD Commissioner to impose training and/or other
 penalties. Cases where the Board recommends charges are prosecuted by the CCRB's
 Administrative Prosecution Unit.

Charges 2. Command Discipline B 3. Command Discipline A 4. Formalized Training 5. Instructions.

Following the adoption of the NYPD Disciplinary Matrix on 03/15/2021, the Board Discipline Recommendation for each officer is determined by the sum of the Matrix penalty days associated with the allegation(s) substantiated against the officer as follows: 1. Charges (penalty days >= 11) 2. Command Discipline B (6 <= penalty days <= 10) 3. Command Discipline A (1 <= penalty days <= 5) 4. Formalized Training (0 < penalty days <= 1)

Mediation Unit

Whenever mediation between a complainant/alleged victim and subject officer is suitable, it is offered by CCRB investigators. If the complainant/alleged victim and subject officer both agree to participate, a neutral, third-party mediator facilitates a conversation between the parties. "Mediation Attempted" refers to a situation in which an officer agrees to mediate and the complainant becomes unavailable (after the complainant initially agreed to mediation). The chart below indicates the number of mediations and attempted mediations in September and this year.
