To respond to human services Requests for Proposals (RFPs), in accordance with Section 3-16 of the Procurement Policy Board Rules of the City of New York (“PPB Rules”), vendors must first complete and submit an electronic HHS Accelerator Prequalification Application using the City’s PASSPort system. The PASSPort system is a web-based system maintained by the City of New York for use by its Mayoral Agencies to manage procurement. Important business information collected in the Prequalification Application is required every three years. Documents related to annual corporate filings must be submitted on an annual basis to remain eligible to compete. Prequalification applications will be reviewed to validate compliance with corporate filings and organizational capacity. Approved organizations will be eligible to compete and would submit electronic proposals through the PASSPort system. Be Mindful of Lithium-ion Batteries in Your Home!

Lithium-ion batteries are rechargeable batteries. They are found in electric bikes and scooters, cars, laptops, tablets, phones, and common household devices.

Lithium-ion battery fires have caused deaths, serious injuries and devastating damage to property in New York City. Most fires start when people use uncertified, damaged, or illegally modified batteries for devices such as e-bikes and e-scooters. But even certified batteries can quickly turn dangerous if they are not used or charged the right way.

When should you call 911 about a lithium-ion battery?

- Dial 911 if you observe any odors, changes in shape or color, leaking, or odd noises.
- Dial 911 if your battery is visibly damaged or has been repaired by an unqualified person.

What else can you do in an emergency?

- Stop using the battery right away.
- If it is safe to do so, take the battery outside or move the battery away from anything that can catch fire.

Don't risk fire in your home.



- Do not buy uncertified, illegal, or after-market lithium-ion batteries.
- Do not attempt to build, tamper with, or repair lithium-ion batteries.
- Do not charge a lithium-ion battery with an extension cord or power strip.
- Do not keep damaged or end-of-life batteries in your apartment.
- Do not charge your lithium-ion battery next to an apartment door or window because a fire may block your escape.
- Do not charge a device or battery on or near your bed or couch, or close to drapes, papers or anything else that burns easily.
- Do not charge your battery overnight or unattended.

Be proactive about lithium-ion battery safety!



- Buy e-bikes, e-scooters, and batteries from trusted sources. Make sure they are CERTIFIED. Look for UL labels (UL 2849, 2272, or 2271).
- Follow manufacturers' guidelines for products. Use the original battery, power adapter and power cord supplied with the device, or replacement parts recommended by the manufacturer.
- Charge your e-bike, e-scooter, and batteries in a safe charging area designated by your building, if possible. Ask your building or employer if they can provide a safe charging and storage facility. Otherwise, charge and store micromobility devices and batteries outside, if possible. If you must charge your battery in your apartment, be alert.
- Look for safe disposal options for batteries at the end of their useful life.

If you are replacing an old battery, take it out of your home right away, even if it is not damaged. Protect yourself and others by NEVER putting lithium-ion batteries in your garbage or building trash. It's dangerous! Go to the NYC Department of Sanitation website to see how and where to safely drop off old batteries and devices.

For any fire in your apartment, always CLOSE THE DOOR on your way out!

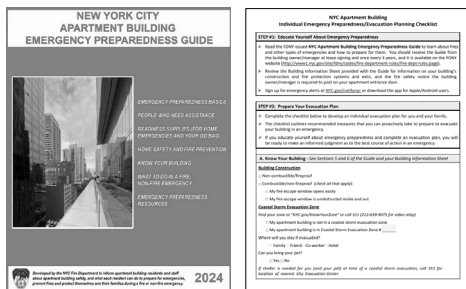
- Closing the door behind you as you evacuate your apartment in a fire is crucial. Why? Closed apartment and stairwell doors help contain smoke and fire in the apartment and keep the public hallways clear of flames, heat and smoke long enough to allow others to get out and firefighters to get in.
- Apartment and stairwell doors should always be kept closed, just in case.
- Your apartment building should have posted "Close the Door Notices" on the hallway corridor side of all stairwell doors in your building.



If "Close the Door Notices" are not posted, contact your building owner or manager, or notify the FDNY by emailing FDNY.BusinessSupport@fdny.nyc.gov or by calling 311 (ask for the Fire Department's Customer Service Center).

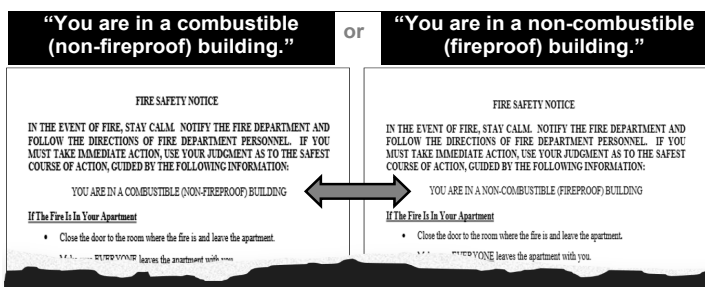
Did You Receive Your Apartment Building Emergency Preparedness Guide and Evacuation Planning Checklist?

The 2024 New York City Apartment Building Emergency Preparedness Guide contains information about your building and what to do during a fire, storm, explosion or other emergency. You'll also find a helpful Emergency Preparedness/Evacuation Planning Checklist.



Do You Have a Fire Safety Notice on Your Apartment Door?

Your New York City apartment must have one of these Fire Safety Notices on the inside of the main entrance door. The notice contains potentially life-saving guidance about what to do in the event of a fire, depending upon the type of building construction and the location of the fire.



Your building owner or manager must provide the Preparedness Guide and the correct Fire Safety Notice. If you do not have the Fire Safety Notice on the inside of your apartment door, contact your building owner/manager or the FDNY (FDNY.BusinessSupport@fdny.nyc.gov or dial 311).

Active Shooter Emergencies

If you are near an active shooter or violent attacker, the New York City Police Department (NYPD) recommends that civilians use an "avoid, barricade, confront" strategy. Dial 911 when safe to do so. Stay alert and be ready to protect yourself while following the safety steps below.

Avoid

- Leave the building right away if you can do so safely.
- Do not carry any personal belongings with you.
- Avoid elevators and escalators if possible. Use the stairs.
- When using the stairs, stay close to the wall so responders can move past you quickly.



Barricade

- If you cannot safely leave the area, go into an apartment or other room and close the door and lock it if possible.
- Block the door with large, heavy objects to make it hard for an attacker to enter. You can use sofas, tables, chairs, dressers, etc.
- Hide behind a large, solid item if possible, and try to stay below waist level to avoid any shots fired.
- Stay still and quiet. Turn off lights and any source of noise. Put your phone and other devices on silent, not vibrate.
- Look for items you can use as improvised weapons (such as scissors, coat rack, leg of a table or chair, etc.).



Confront

- As a last resort, defend yourself if your life is in immediate danger and you cannot escape or hide.
- Take direct action against the attacker.
- Attempt to overpower the attacker with surprise, speed, and force in the most violent manner possible. If available, use improvised weapons.
- If you are with other people, try to work together to overcome the attacker.



If you encounter law enforcement personnel during the incident, remember that responding officers will be focused on your hands. Keep your hands out, open, above your head, and most importantly, empty.

December 4, 2025

WHEREAS, on September 2, 2021, the federal monitor in the *Nunez* use-of-force class action stated that steps must be taken immediately to address the conditions in the New York City jails; and

WHEREAS, on June 14, 2022, the federal court in *Nunez* approved the *Nunez* Action Plan, which "represents a way to move forward with concrete measures now to address the ongoing crisis at Rikers Island"; and

WHEREAS, although there has been improvement in excessive staff absenteeism, extraordinarily high rates of attrition due to staff retirements and other departures continue to seriously affect the Department of Correction's (DOC's) staffing levels and create a serious risk to DOC's ability to carry out the safety and security measures required for the maintenance of sanitary conditions; and access to basic services, including showers, meals, visitation, religious services, commissary, and recreation; and

WHEREAS, this Order is given to prioritize compliance with the *Nunez* Action Plan and to address the effects of DOC's staffing levels, the conditions at DOC facilities, and health operations; and

WHEREAS, additional reasons for requiring the measures continued in this Order are set forth in Emergency Executive Order No. 140 of 2022, Emergency Executive Order No. 579 of 2024, and Emergency Executive Order 623 of 2024; and

WHEREAS, the state of emergency existing within DOC facilities, first declared in Emergency Executive Order No. 241, dated September 15, 2021, and extended by subsequent orders, remains in effect;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the powers vested in me by the laws of the State of New York and the City of New York, including but not limited to the New York Executive Law, the New York City Charter and the Administrative Code of the City of New York, and the common law authority to protect the public in the event of an emergency:

Section 1. I hereby direct that section 1 of Emergency Executive Order No. 889, dated November 29, 2025, is extended for five (5) days.

§ 2. This Emergency Executive Order shall take effect immediately and shall remain in effect for five (5) days unless it is terminated or modified at an earlier date.

WHEREAS, the state of emergency based on the arrival of thousands of individuals and families seeking asylum, first declared in Emergency Executive Order No. 224, dated October 7, 2022, and extended by subsequent orders, remains in effect;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the powers vested in me by the laws of the State of New York and the City of New York, including but not limited to the New York Executive Law, the New York City Charter and the Administrative Code of the City of New York, and the common law authority to protect the public in the event of an emergency:

Section 1. I hereby order that section 1 of Emergency Executive Order No. 890, dated November 29, 2025, is extended for five (5) days.

§ 2. This Emergency Executive Order shall take effect immediately and shall remain in effect for five (5) days unless it is terminated or modified at an earlier date.

EXECUTIVE ORDER No. 60

December 2, 2025

PROCUREMENT AND INVESTMENT DECISIONS RELATING TO ISRAEL AND ISRAELI CITIZENS

WHEREAS, in recent years, there have been calls to boycott, divest from, and sanction the State of Israel, which has strong economic and social ties with the City of New York; and

WHEREAS, the City of New York is home to the largest Jewish community outside of the State of Israel, maintaining deep-seated ties to Israel rooted in decades of economic and social cooperation, and rejects calls to boycott, divest from, and sanction the State of Israel; and

WHEREAS, the City of New York registered over \$32 billion in procurement contracts during the 2024 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, section 1110 of the Charter, entitled “Trusteeship of public property,” provides that all officers and employees of the city are “trustees of the property, funds and effects of the city, so far as such property, funds and effects are or may be committed to their management or control” and are “subject to all the duties and responsibilities imposed by law on trustees”; and

WHEREAS, section 6-129.1 of the Administrative Code provides that it is “unlawful for an agency to deny a contract because of the actual or perceived race, creed, color, national origin, age, gender, disability, sexual orientation or alienage or citizenship status of the owners of the bidder or proposer”; and

WHEREAS, the City of New York maintains five independent pension systems that support over 750,000 City employees, retirees, and beneficiaries, and invest almost \$300 billion in securities in the global marketplace, including over \$300 million invested in Israel bonds and other Israeli assets; and

WHEREAS, the Comptroller, through the Bureau of Asset Management, is the investment advisor to, and custodian of, the five System funds; and

WHEREAS, each pension system has a Board of Trustees (“Board”) responsible for its investment functions, and those Trustees have a fiduciary responsibility to ensure that all investment decisions are made in the best interests of the respective System; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the Comptroller and certain union leaders, the Mayor and/or members of the Administration, including the Police Commissioner, Fire Commissioner, Finance Commissioner, Chancellor and members of the Panel on Educational Policy hold *ex-officio* seats on one or more Boards; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order No. 18, signed May 16, 2022, established the position of Chief Pension Administrator who is tasked with, among other duties, serving “as the central coordinator and advisor to the Administration’s Trustees who sit on the Boards of the Systems and the Plan, on all administrative and eligibility determinations before the Boards;” and

WHEREAS, this Administration recognizes the benefit of maintaining a strong relationship between the City of New York and the State of Israel;

NOW, THEREFORE, by the power vested in me as Mayor of the City of New York, it is hereby ordered:

Section 1. Agency heads, agency chief contracting officers, and any other Mayoral appointees with discretion over contracting are directed to refrain from procurement practices that are inconsistent with their duties as trustees of the City’s property and are intended to carry out any policy that discriminates against the State of Israel, Israeli citizens based on their national origin, or individuals or entities based on their association with Israel. Employees who fail to follow this directive may be subject to disciplinary action by their agency.

§ 2. The Chief Pension Administrator and those Trustees of the City pension systems who have been appointed by the Mayor are directed, in a manner and to the extent consistent with their fiduciary duties, to oppose divestment from bonds and other assets made for the purpose of discriminating against the State of Israel, Israeli citizens based on their national origin, or individuals or entities based on their association with Israel.

§ 3. This Order shall take effect immediately.

EXECUTIVE ORDER No. 61

December 2, 2025

PROTECTING NEW YORKERS’ RIGHTS TO FREE EXERCISE OF RELIGION, FREEDOM OF SPEECH, AND PEACEFUL ASSEMBLY

WHEREAS, the First Amendment to the United States Constitution protects the right to the free exercise of religion, the right to freedom of speech, and the right to assemble peacefully; and

WHEREAS, the City has a significant interest in keeping public spaces safe and free of congestion;

WHEREAS, the City of New York is home to thousands of houses of worship that represent myriad religions and faiths, and which coexist peaceably and add to the diverse fabric of the City; and

WHEREAS, at times, houses of worship are targets of protests and other actions that can disrupt congregants’ ability to freely exercise their chosen religion and threaten the public safety of worshipers and surrounding neighbors; and

WHEREAS, federal, state, and local laws have been enacted to ensure access to houses of worship to safeguard protected speech and religious exercise while maintaining the right to assemble and protest peaceably; and

WHEREAS, the Freedom of Access to Clinic Entrances Act of 1994, 18 U.S. Code § 248,

prohibits intentionally injuring, intimidating, or interfering with, or attempting to injure, intimidate, or interfere with, by force, threat

of force, or physical obstruction, any person exercising or seeking to exercise the First Amendment right of religious freedom at a place of religious worship; and

WHEREAS, section 240.70 of the New York State Penal Law provides that intentionally injuring, intimidating or interfering with another person because such person exercised, or sought to exercise, their right to engage in religious freedom at a place of religious worship constitutes a misdemeanor; and

WHEREAS, section 240.21 of the New York State Penal Law provides that disrupting or disturbing a religious service constitutes a misdemeanor; and

WHEREAS, many houses of worship host activities that, while not directly connected to worship services, provide a community service and facilitate protected speech and assembly that are vital to communities across the City of New York; and

WHEREAS, houses of worship are sometimes sites of protest, at times leading to worshippers and other community members who avail themselves of services and fellowship offered by houses of worship feeling threatened when exercising their own Constitutional rights of freedom of speech, assembly, and religion; and

WHEREAS, this Administration recognizes the need to protect houses of worship at all times while preserving the rights of New Yorkers who seek to voice their opinions through peaceful protest;

NOW, THEREFORE, by the power vested in me as Mayor of the City of New York, it is hereby ordered:

Section 1. The Police Commissioner, in coordination with the Law Department, is directed to review the New York City Police Department's (NYPD) patrol guide and legal guidance in an effort to ensure that they provide clear guidance for protection of both houses of worship and persons exercising their rights to free assembly and free speech near houses of worship. Such review shall include, but not be limited to:

- Consideration of federal, state, and local laws regulating protests at houses of worship, reproductive health facilities, private residences and other sites; and
- Consideration of existing legal constraints on policing demonstrations and large gatherings, including, but not limited to, peaceful protests; and
- Evaluation of proposals for regulation of protest activity occurring close to houses of worship, including, but not limited to, the following:

i. Establishment of zones where protest activities would be prohibited or regulated within an area of at least 15 feet and up to 60 feet from the entrance to a house of worship, or zones outside of houses of worship where protest activities are allowed;

ii. Establishment of additional restrictions on protest activities that would be applicable during publicly-scheduled religious services;

iii. Establishment of appropriate limitations on protest activities outside of houses of worship during non-religious activities to protect the speech and assembly rights of community members who make use of houses of worship.

§ 2. The review required by this order shall be conducted to ensure compliance with the constitutions of the United States and the State of New York, and federal, state, and local laws.

§ 3. This Order shall take effect immediately.
