To launch the annual forum, we will have introductory remarks in the main auditorium from, New York City Department of Citywide Administrative Services (DCAS) Commissioner Dawn Pinnock, Together for Safer Roads Executive Director Peter Goldwasser, and New York State DMV Commissioner, Mark J. F. Schroeder.



Dawn M. Pinnock is the Commissioner for the NYC Department of Citywide Administrative Services (DCAS). As a proud native New Yorker, Dawn M. Pinnock is a transformative leader with more than two decades of experience at some of New York City's largest municipal agencies. Prior to serving as Commissioner, Pinnock served as the Executive Deputy Commissioner for People Operations and Risk Management at DCAS, where she led the agency's people-centered functions, including Administration, citywide Equity and Inclusion, citywide Human Capital, and Internal Audit.

In her role, she maintained citywide oversight of services provided to the human resources, equal employment, and diversity and inclusion departments serving at every agency. Commissioner Pinnock has also served as the Deputy Commissioner for Human Capital, overseeing all aspects of civil service administration and human resources operations. During her tenure at DCAS, she led teams that developed both the City's remote work policy and the returnto-work policy, launched mandatory sexual harassment training for over 360,000 City employees, and made the City's civil service process more accessible to current and potential City employees.

Prior to joining DCAS, Commissioner Pinnock served as the Vice President of Human Resources at New York City Transit and as the Director of Human Resources at the New York City Housing Authority (NYCHA). She holds a Master of Science in Urban Policy Analysis and Management from The New School for Social Research and a Bachelor of Business Administration from Baruch College. She is a Certified Human Resource Professional, and a member of both the Association for Talent Development and the Society of Human Resource Management.

Peter Goldwasser has two decades of experience working across the public and private sectors, advising companies, non-profits and individuals on how to make a positive impact on the toughest social issues.

Prior to joining Together for Safer Roads, Peter ran his own consultancy, the PNG Group, providing counsel to executives at leading transportation, entertainment and technology companies on social, political and business affairs, while working with community stakeholders to transform challenging and diverse ideas into concrete strategies and actions.

Peter has also served as Deputy Director at Cities of Service, a national nonprofit of Bloomberg Philanthropies; advised Girl Rising, a global advocacy non-profit dedicated to empowering girls through education; and served as Chief Program Officer in the Office of Policy and Strategic Planning under former NYC Mayor Michael Bloomberg where he directed multi-agency efforts addressing education, immigration and anti sex-trafficking. Before working in city government, Peter was General Counsel and political director at Transportation Alternatives, the nation's premier cycling and pedestrian advocacy organization.

Peter is an avid supporter of public libraries and serves in various leadership positions at the Brooklyn Public Library (BPL). In 2015, he created the library's junior board, which he subsequently chaired for five years, as well as launching BPL's national Literary Prize. From 2018 to 2020, he chaired the NYC Board of the national non-profit Back on My Feet. He holds a J.D. from the Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law and received his BA from New York University. Peter lives in Brooklyn, NY, with his wife and daughter where he can often be found running, biking, attempting to garden and exploring all sorts of hidden parks.

Mark J.F. Schroeder was nominated by former Governor Andrew Cuomo to serve as the Commissioner of DMV in January of 2019. He previously served as the elected comptroller of the City of Buffalo from January 2012 until his appointment to DMV, and has also previously served as a member of the Erie County Legislature and New York State Assembly. Prior to his years of public service, Commissioner Schroeder spent 25 years in the private sector, including serving as vice president of two large corporations.

As a public servant, Mr. Schroeder has earned a reputation as someone his constituents turn to when they have a problem, whether it be minor or major. During his time in the Assembly, Mr. Schroeder authored "Amanda's Law," which requires carbon monoxide detectors in all homes. The law was named after a teen in his district, Amanda Hansen, who died from carbon monoxide poisoning while at a sleepover at a friend's house. He also sponsored legislation banning text messaging while driving and a law safeguarding children from sexual predators. Mr. Schroeder served as the chairman of the Assembly Subcommittee on Autism, and created an inclusive panel of mental health professionals, autism advocates and concerned parents with the mission of providing better care for those afflicted with the disorder.

In his first term as Buffalo Comptroller, the city's chief fiscal officer, Mr. Schroeder refinanced old debt, saving taxpayers more than \$62 million.

Under his fiscal management, Buffalo has received "Straight A" bond ratings from the three major credit rating agencies. He used these ratings in the bond market to borrow funds and refinance debt at the lowest interest rates in the City's history.

A lifelong Buffalo resident, Commissioner Schroeder and his wife, Kate Horan Schroeder, have three children - Michael, Allison and the late Matthew Schroeder. He is the proud grandfather of Lily and Marlee.

Update on NYC's Safe Fleet Transition and Special Announcements

Keith T. Kerman, DCAS Deputy Commissioner and NYC Chief Fleet Officer, will give an update on the city's efforts to improve safety in the largest municipal fleet in the country.



Keith T. Kerman, Deputy Commissioner at the Department of Citywide Administrative Services (DCAS)

Keith T. Kerman is a Deputy Commissioner at the Department of Citywide Administrative Services (DCAS) and NYC's first Chief Fleet Officer, serving 50 agencies including NYPD, FDNY and DSNY. NYC's fleet is 28,500 units, \$1+ billion in annual expenditure, and 1,800 staff. NYC Fleet is a national leader in EV adoption, charging, telematics, biofuels, Vision Zero, and shared services.

Keith is a permanent civil servant in his 30th year including 17 with NYC Parks managing Citywide Operations. Keith has now served in

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senior roles under four NYC Mayors. Deputy Commissioner Kerman is an original member of the Citywide Vision Zero task force and under his leadership the city's fleet has reduced serious collisions and injuries through a comprehensive Safe Fleet Transition Plan (SFTP) developed in partnership with the US DOT Volpe Center. As NYC DOT focuses on the re-design of roadways for safety, DCAS is focusing on the re-design of cars and trucks for safety. Deputy Commissioner Kerman has made DCAS the national leader in truck safety side-guards, intelligent speed assistance (ISA), and live telematics tracking with over 28,000 vehicles monitored through the DCAS Fleet Office of Real Time Tracking (FORT). Through the SFTP, the city has implemented more than 83,000 safety enhancements including truck surround cameras, back up cameras, automatic braking, pedestrian avoidance systems, and V2V technology. Under his oversight since 2012, over 90,000 city fleet operators have taken a full day defensive driving class that reviews Vision Zero and best practices for driver safety. Among many steps, DCAS has barred hands-free phone operation by City fleet operators.

In 2019 Keith received the Sloan Public Service Award, often referred to as the Nobel Prize for NY public service. In 2021, Keith received a national Climate Leadership Award from the Climate Registry, C2ES, and Bloomberg Philanthropies. In 2022, Keith received a Legendary Lifetime Achievement Award through a vote of his peers nation-wide and presented by Government Fleet Magazine. Keith has been named to City & State's NY Transportation 100 list in both 2022 and 2023.

Keith is from Massachusetts and Harvard College as his wife Denise, a lawyer who works for Bloomberg LP. Keith and Denise have two children, Todd and Keith and are dual residents of Manhattan and Pelham NY.

Keynote Speaker and Recipient of the 2023 Global Vision Zero Leadership Award

We are honored to have Natalie Draisin, Director of the North American Office & UN Representative for FIA Foundation join us as our first keynote speaker of this year's forum and recipient of the 2023 Global Vision Zero Leadership Award.



Natalie Draisin, Director, North America Office & United Nations Representative, FIA Foundation

Natalie leads global efforts to advance evidence-based solutions that improve public health through safe, sustainable mobility. At the FIA Foundation, she creates initiatives to fill gaps in the field.

Leading road safety advocacy at the United Nations, she has engaged with over one hundred Missions and secured safe mobility as part of the Sustainable Development Goals. She supported the creation of the first United Nations internal road safety strategy. To encourage the World Bank to require stronger safety measures in

heir five billion USD of road safety funding, she garnered support from over 40 bipartisan US representatives. Highlights of the \$8M of grants she has guided include founding Vision Zero for Youth with the National Center for Safe Routes to School, recognized as a USDOT first mover and implemented globally through the Institute for Transport and Development Policy. With Johns Hopkins University, she founded the New Mobility Initiative and the Global Road Safety Committee. She created the Child Health Initiative toolkit, a global repository of best practices, with The George Institute.

After recommending a focus on safe systems in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and National Roadway Safety Strategy by supporting a consortium led by Johns Hopkins University and the Institute of Transportation Engineers, Natalie is providing technical assistance to two communities receiving USDOT SS4A (Safe Streets and Roads for All) funding.

With CDC and CDC Foundation, she published a Traffic Conflict Technique Toolkit to identify high crash areas around schools before injuries and deaths occur. The toolkit resulted in a 70% decrease in conflicts (near misses) among the largest school district in Mexico, and led to updated transit operations and new mobility infrastructure guidelines. The Government of Costa Rica has translated, adapted, and implemented the guide. (continued on next page) As a consultant for the Automotive Coalition for Traffic Safety, Natalie is the deployment strategist for DADSS (Driver Alcohol Detection System for Safety). She has also worked with the NTSB, World Health Organization, Pew Charitable Trusts, and Accenture.

In 2021 Natalie was globally recognized as a Remarkable Woman in Transportation by TUMI (Transformative Urban Mobility Initiative). She serves on various executive committees, boards, and panels, and has published peer-reviewed papers, op-eds, guidance, and reports on road safety, gun violence, gender equity, and obesity prevention. She has a BA, MPH, and MBA from Johns Hopkins University, where she was recognized as the 2015 Outstanding Recent Graduate of the Johns Hopkins University Bloomberg School of Public Health. Once upon a time, she cycled across the US to raise money for cancer research, giving her an up-close perspective on cyclist safety. A French-American raised in Closter, New Jersey, she lives in Reston, Virginia with her husband and two boys, who inspire her to keep fighting for safe, healthy journeys to school for all.

Dr. Alexander Epstein joined the US Department of Transportation Volpe Center, or Volpe, in 2011, where he leads transportation sustainability and vulnerable road user safety initiatives spanning local, state, and federal transportation agencies. Dr. Epstein oversees research, analysis, and demonstration partnerships with fleets, industry, and nonprofits to assess the safety and sustainability benefits of improved vehicle designs and technologies, and he leads or supports coordinated research in support of multiple DOT operating administrations, linking local deployment with federal stakeholders and best practices. Dr. Epstein directly supports several cities' Vision Zero initiatives to eliminate traffic fatalities.

Previously, Commissioner Do served as the Director of the Washington, D.C. Department of For-Hire Vehicles (DFHV), where he oversaw the city's fast-moving and competitive forhire vehicle industry. In this role, Commissioner Do improved the driver and passenger experience by leveraging technology and data analysis to drive decision-making, enhance efficiency, and improve administrative processing. Under his leadership, DFHV created a

centralized dispatch platform through which residents can summon a wheelchair-accessible taxi and successfully launched DC Micro transit, an on-demand shuttle service to meet travel needs for residents living in hard-to-reach areas.

Richard Simon was appointed Regional Administrator for National Highway Traffic Safety Administration Region 2 in October 2019. He leads a professional team of program managers in the development and delivery of programs designed to implement agency priorities within Connecticut, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands; and to oversee a combined \$110M in Federal highway safety grant funds. Previously, Richard was Director of Community Education for the NYCDOT Safety Education Unit, where he administered the city's traffic safety grant program.



Julie Huntington, Member and Policy Advocate, Families for Safe Streets

Julie Huntington is a Queens-based educator and activist who enjoys walking, running, and cycling around New York City. She became a member of Families for Safe Streets (FSS) in 2019 after her father Kim (forever 65) was senselessly killed in a crash. He was mortally wounded by falling debris after a man driving an illegally overheight commercial truck sheared off the underdressing of a bridge construction project. Julie puts her pain to purpose as a member of FSS in loving memory of her dad and in the hopes that the day will come when no one will suffer the pain and devastation of losing a loved one to traffic violence.

Mike McGinn, Executive Director, America Walks

Mike got his start in local politics as a neighborhood activist pushing for walkability. From there he founded a non-profit focused on sustainable and equitable growth, and then became mayor of Seattle. Just before joining America Walks, Mike worked to help Feet First, Washington State's walking advocacy organization, expand their sphere of influence across Washington state. He has worked on numerous public education, legislative, ballot measure and election campaigns – which has given him an abiding faith in the power of organizing and volunteers to create change.



Jessica Cicchino, Ph.D., Vice President of Research, Insurance Institute for Highway Safety

Jessica Cicchino is Vice President of Research at the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety in Arlington, VA, where she oversees research on speed, transportation engineering, vulnerable road users, and vehicle technology. Prior to joining the Institute in 2012, she was a research psychologist with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Dr. Cicchino holds a PhD in psychology from Carnegie Mellon University.



Maxime Brault, Director of Road Safety Research, SAAQ

Mr. Maxime Brault is the Director of the Road Safety Research Department within the automobile public insurance Society (SAAQ) of the province of Quebec since 2017. The Research Department is responsible, for disseminating, analyzing and interpreting the road safety record for Québec, as well as for acquiring knowledge and monitoring road safety. Graduated from Laval University with a master's degree in epidemiology, he has been working in road safety for over 30 years. He worked at SAAQ as an expert advisor and researcher in road safety from 1993 to 2008 on the topics of speeding and drugs and driving. He was also at the Ministry of Transportation between 2008 and 2013 for the implementation and evaluation of the photo radars and red-light cameras in the province of Quebec.

Jacy Good and Steve Johnson, National Distracted Driving Speakers /Advocates and Founders of Hang Up and Drive

Jacy and Steve met in August 2004 when they both moved into a dorm as freshman at Muhlenberg College in Allentown, PA. In May 2008, Jacy and her parents were struck headon by a tractor trailer. Less than a year after that life-altering tragedy Jacy began to campaign for a cell phone ban in her native Pennsylvania. Since April 2010 Jacy has been

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on The Oprah Winfrey Show, a guest of Secretary-General Ban Ki-Moon at the United Nations, a guest of Secretary-General Ban Ki-Moon at the United Nations, a "Hero Among Us" in People Magazine and been featured in dozens of articles, television news pieces, and press conferences nationwide.

It was early in their amazing journey that Jacy and Steve realized their story could impact and potentially save lives. Since 2011 they have spoken at over 1,200 events across the world to well over 300,000 people, encouraging the public to make safer choices, companies to develop and enforce cell phone policies, and legislators to put in place the necessary laws to protect the public.

Workshop — The Power of Procurement 1:45pm - 3:00pm

This workshop will take a deep dive into the world of procurement and will specifically look at how we might best revise and update procurement policies and procedures so that direct vision trucks can be more easily identified, approved and ultimately purchased. Workshop discussion will include best practices from TSR's new Direct Vision Adoption Guide, a practical tool to help operators transform their fleets for safety.



Alex Johnston, Founder, Cities Reimagined

Alex Johnston is a civic designer and social entrepreneur. In 2014, Alex founded Cities Reimagined, a civic design firm that employs principles of design to solve complex challenges in urban cities. Alex completed her MBA in 2014 and is a graduate of the London School of Economics with a Master's Degree in Cities.

Alex is known as a relentless optimist, someone who gets things done and has the ability to bring even the most divisive groups together around a shared mission. After completing undergraduate and graduate degrees in business, Alex spent years working as a social worker with at-risk mothers and their babies.

Along with her procurement team Masha reviews all vehicle specifications and works with various stakeholders to ensure that the city is procuring vehicles with advanced safety systems such as automatic braking, pedestrian collision warnings, surround cameras, and truck sideguards.



Salvatore Mastriani, Vice President of Risk Management, Interstate Waste Services

Sal is responsible for all aspects of risk and compliance within the operations of IWS. He implements standards and protocols that ensure IWS exceeds industry standards and continuously grows our safety culture. Sal leads IWS's Safety Driven Employee Recognition Program, which encourages an all-encompassing safety culture through online assessments and recognition of top performers. Sal brings a wealth of knowledge in the field as he began his career in the insurance industry in 1989 gaining experience in risk mitigation, claims, compliance, and underwriting.



Kirk Sander, Chief of Staff and Vice President of Safety and Standards

Kirk Sander leads the National Waste & Recycling Association's effort to make the industry safer through engagement with our members and federal agencies, specifically the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration. Kirk comes to NWRA from the National Safety Council, where he was a member of the government affairs team working on workplace safety, road safety and fighting the opioid crisis.

Workshop — Rightsize, Then Electrify 1:45pm - 3:00pm

This workshop will focus on rightsizing fleets and the safety, environmental and community engagement aspects of doing so. The conversation will be led by a leading expert in the field – Director of Seattle's Department of Transportation Greg Spotts, and will include specific examples and best practices so that participants can leave with a better understanding of how they can analyze the "right size" of their own fleet.



Greg Spotts, Director, Seattle Department of Transportation

Greg Spotts joined the Seattle Department of Transportation as Director in September 2022, after a fourteen-year career at the City of Los Angeles. On arriving at SDOT, Greg directed staff to conduct a rigorous review of the Vision Zero program which was published in February 2023, along with five early momentum actions to improve safety on Seattle streets. Greg has articulated a new vision for SDOT's large fleet of vehicles: "right-size, then electrify." A top priority for Greg is invest in underserved communities while implementing the strategies in SDOT's first-of-its-kind Transportation Equity Framework; this equity focus led to SDOT providing 10,000 free transit cards to residents of Seattle Public Housing in early 2023.



Zach Miller, Director of Metro Region, Trucking Association of New York

Zach Miller is the Director of Metro Region Operations for the Trucking Association of New York (TANY). He previously served as the Metro Region Vice-Chair for TANY and represented the Metro-Region on the Board of Directors. He also served as the head of STTTREAM (the dedicated multi-media channel) and Business Development at TruckTractorTrailer.com, as well as the head of media at Green Island EV Co., and co-founded NewYorkTruckStop.com. A recipient of TANY's Outstanding Service Award, Zach completed his BBA in Business Administration from Hofstra University and is a proud graduate of the TANY Leadership program.
