Fire Drills:

Why They Matter in Your Office

What is a Fire Drill?

A fire drill is an exercise that helps you become familiar with fire safety procedures, without leaving the building.

During a Fire Drill:

- · The fire alarm is activated.
- · Floor Wardens quickly check in with the Fire & Life Safety Director (FLS Director).
- Floor Searchers search the floor and direct tenants toward the exit stairwells
- · The drill is conducted via two-way public address announcements by the FLS Director.
- Everyone practices their steps, without exiting, so they know what to do in a real emergency.

Why We Do Fire Drills

- Get comfortable with stairwells and exits. Buildings must do drills frequently.
 - New buildings: every 3 months for the first 2 years.
 - o After that: every 6 months.
- Practice roles: Floor Wardens learn to call the FLS Director fast and lead safely.
- **Build confidence: Quick** communication through the PA system helps everyone prepare.

How the Drill Works, Step by Step

- 1. Alarm rings.
- 2. Searchers clear the floor.
- 3. Floor Wardens report "allclear" to FLS Director.
- 4. FLS Director gives live instructions via PA system.
- 5. Staff practice what they'd do, using stairwell familiarity, moving safely, and listening closely.

What the FDNY Requires in New York City Offices

- Trained staff: Must have certified Fire Safety Director. or Drill Conductor with a Certificate of Fitness.
- · Live instruction: Drills run floor by floor, with clear audio and visuals as needed.
- · Safety for all: People who need help must be included and plans made for them.

How You Can Help

- Treat drills seriously!
- · Listen and follow the Floor Warden or FLS Director.
- Help observe stairwell safety and note any hazards.
- · Ask questions if you're unsure, better to be informed now.

Did You Know?

- · A fire drill is not just "practice," it's a legal requirement under the NYC Fire Code.
- · Over time, drills make everyone faster, smarter, and safer.
