Full Building Evacuation Drill Procedures

What to Do During a Full Building Evacuation Drill

Fire drills and full building evacuations are essential for ensuring the safety of all employees in NYC office buildings.

Before the Drill:

- Know Your Exits: Familiarize yourself with the nearest emergency exits and alternate escape routes.
- Locate Emergency Equipment: Be aware of fire alarm pull stations, AEDs, and fire extinguishers in your area.
- Assembly Areas: Identify your building's designated assembly point outside the building.

During the Evacuation:

- Listen for Instructions:
 - Follow all announcements and directions from Fire and Life Safety Director (FLSD) and emergency personnel
 - o Evacuate immediately when instructed—never assume it is a false alarm.
- Exit Safely: Walk calmly and do not run.
 - Use stairwells—do not use elevators;
 - o Keep to the right side of stairwells to allow emergency responders to pass
- · Report to the Assembly Area:
 - Proceed directly to your designated assembly area and check in with your supervisor or safety team.
 - Stay in the area until the "All Clear" is given by authorized personnel.

Employees Requiring Assistance During an Evacuation:

- Identify Your Evacuation Plan: Speak with your Fire and Life Safety Director (FLSD) or building management about designated evacuation procedures.
- Some buildings have designated areas, such as "Areas of Refuge" or "Assisted Evacuation Points", where you can wait safely for assistance.
- Assign a Buddy: If possible, arrange for a co-worker or Fire and Life Safety volunteer to assist you in an emergency.

After the Drill:

- Accountability: Supervisors or designated safety personnel (floor warden) will account for all employees at the assembly area.
- Provide Feedback: Report any issues or obstacles encountered during the drill to your FLSD.

Why Drills Matter:

Regular evacuation drills ensure that all employees know what to do in case of a real emergency. Practicing safe evacuation procedures **reduces confusion**, **increases response time**, **and can save lives**.
