Rearrange furniture and equipment to access a nearby outlet.	 Never use long extension cords with power strips, as this increases heat and electrical

 Regularly check the condition of your cords and power strips for wear and tear.

- Ensure power strips have built-in fuses for extra protection.

- Do not use extension cords as permanent solutions; they should be replaced every 90 days.

Prevention and Safety: Best Practices

- Only use cords and power strips according to their rated capacity.
- Install additional outlets if necessary to avoid daisy chaining.
- Make sure cords are never covered or placed in high-traffic areas to prevent accidents.

How to Use a Fire Extinguisher: The PASS Technique

- Pull the pin from the handle to break the tamper seal.
- Aim the nozzle at the base of the fire, not the flames.
- Squeeze the handle to release the extinguishing agent.
- Sweep the nozzle from side to side, covering the area of the fire.
