Mayor's Office of Contract Services (MOCS)

MOCS oversees compliance by Mayoral agencies of laws, regulations and policies governing procurement process - including City Charter, Procurement Policy Board (PPB) Rules, and various other state/local laws, Mayoral Executive Orders and City legislation.

- Implementing procurement policies developed by the PPB
- Reviewing and approving certain procurement actions that support city agencies' policy and programmatic goals.
- Administering VENDEX database and ensuring vendor responsibility
- Providing technical assistance to City agencies & vendors
- Co-administer the City's M/WBE Program

Businesses must register in PIP in order to sell to NYC

 You can access the Payee Information Portal (PIP) by visiting <u>www.nyc.gov/pip</u>

To activate an account, vendors will need the following:

- Taxpayer ID Number -- either Employer Tax ID Number (EIN) or Social Security Number (SSN)
- Legal Business Name or Individual Name
- Addresses for Administrative, Ordering and Payment
- Contact information for each address

- Once registered in PIP a vendor can:
 - Manage their accounts directly
 - Sign up for appropriate commodity codes
 - Add Subcontractors
 - Report payments to subcontractors, once the subcontractor is approved by the agency

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 - Manage their accounts directly

- Internet access is required
- Any vendor who does not have access to an internet-ready computer can go to the Public Access Center at MOCS, Monday through Friday from 9:30 am to 5 pm.
- The office will have computers that will allow anyone to activate in PIP, to register for commodities or to complete any subcontract reporting.

- VENDEX are forms that must be submitted that solicits information about the vendor and the vendor's principle officers.
- Collects information that help agencies make responsibility determinations about vendor.
- The forms require disclosures about:
 - General corporate structure
 - Information regarding violations and investigations by a government office
 - Information regarding open tax liens
- Must be signed under the penalty of perjury

- Vendors are required to complete VENDEX questionnaires if they have contracts or subcontracts:
 - Valued at \$100,000 or more;
 - That are sole source contracts valued at \$10,000; or more and/; or
 - Whose aggregate business with the City in the preceding 12 months totals 100,000 or more.

- VENDEX questionnaires are valid for three years from the date of signature.
- Vendors are required to update their forms with each new award.
- If any of the information has changed since the prior filing, the vendor must submit "changed questionnaires."
- If no information has changed since the prior filing, the vendor must submit a "certificate of no change."

New York City's M/WBE Program

- The City's established its M/WBE Program to address the disparity between contract awards to certain ethnic and gender groups and their representation within the New York City regional market.
- Mayor Bill de Blasio established an aggressive goal to award \$16 billion in awards to M/WBE in the next ten years.
- The City's M/WBE Director, Counsel to the Mayor Maya Wiley leads a team which includes MOCS and the Department of Small Business Services to ensure that this goal will be met.

New York City's M/WBE Program

- Work the de Blasio Administration is doing to meet the \$16 billion goal
 - Seek State Legislative changes that gives City agencies more tools to increase their awards to M/WBES
 - Increase discretionary spending limits from \$20,000 to \$200,000
 - Allow for the creation of M/WBE-related pre-qualified lists in all industries
 - Allow for the establishment of mentorship programs and other capacity building programs


Brooklyn Certified M/WBEs

- 663 M/WBEs currently certified who are based in Brooklyn
- 142 certified vendors from Brooklyn were awarded \$87 million in contracts with the City during Fiscal Year 2014
- Of the 142 certified vendors awarded contracts,
 95 were prime contractors and 54 were subcontractors

Brooklyn Certified M/WBEs

There are currently 663 certified M/WBEs based in Brooklyn

Prime contractors were awarded \$68.9 million and subcontractors were awarded \$18.6 million



For a total of \$87 million in awards to Brooklyn M/WBE vendors

Project Labor Agreements

- Most of NYC's construction work on existing City-owned buildings is subject to a PLA with the Building Construction Trades Council of New York.
- PLAs are pre-hire agreements with one or more labor organizations that establish the terms and conditions of employment for specific construction projects.
- In order to perform work on these jobs, prime and subcontractors must agree to abide by the requirements of the PLA.
- Firms DO NOT NEED TO BE UNION in order to work on PLA projects but must agree to obtain labor from the Union hiring hall and pay benefit fund contributions
- The City negotiated new PLAs and obtained a number of concessions to help support M/WBE firms and foster increased awards:
 - Increase in threshold from \$100,000
 - Increased number of bring-along labor than non-M/WBEs
 - PLA Carve out for work valued under \$1 million if bid to an M/WBE Pre-Qualified List
