Description:

The New York City Department of Transportation (DOT) has completed its review of the above referenced Environmental Assessment Statement (EAS) and hereby issues this Negative Declaration.

DOT is proposing to widen and improve Amboy Road between Richmond Avenue and Armstrong Avenue. The proposed project would result in additional travel lanes, new medians, and would reconstruct approximately 2,000 linear feet of Amboy Road (approximately 143,831 square feet of surface area) to current DOT design standards with relocated curbs, sidewalks, and street lighting. To implement the proposed project, the City would acquire private land within the mapped street right-of-way, which comprises portions of front yards, parking areas, and driveways of commercial and auto-related properties. The proposed action is located in the Eltingville neighborhood of Staten Island Community Board 3. The estimated time of construction completion (Build year) is 2017.

Statement of No Significant Effect

Pursuant to Executive Order 91 of 1977, as amended, and the Rules of Procedure for City Environmental Quality Review, found at Title 62, Chapter 5 of the Rules of the City of New York and Part 617 of Title 6 of the New York Codes, Rules and Regulations (6 NYCRR) of the State Environmental Quality Review, DOT assumed the role of lead agency for the environmental review of the proposed project. Based on a review of the project information contained in an EAS dated October 2015, DOT has determined that the proposed action would not have a significant adverse impact on the environment.

Reasons Supporting this Determination

The above determination is based on the EAS dated October 2015 and incorporated by reference herein, which makes the following conclusions regarding the proposed project:

1. Trees

The proposed project would require clearing an estimated 31 street trees. The determination of the final tree clearing, tree replacement and protection plan would be identified during the final design in coordination with the NYC Department of Parks & Recreation (DPR) and in accordance with the requirements of Local Law 3 of 2010. As part of this task, a site visit would be arranged with representatives of DOT, DPR (including its Staten Island Forestry Unit) and DDC along with a certified arborist to survey and catalog the trees to be cleared and where 42 new trees would be planted along Amboy Road. The arborist's report will be shared with DPR Forestry staff ahead of the DDC and DPR on-site meeting to discuss planned removals and plans for tree protection.

2. No other significant effects upon the environment that would require the preparation of a Draft Environmental Impact Statement are foreseeable.

This Negative Declaration has been prepared in accordance with Article 8 of the New York State Environmental Conservation Law (SEQRA).
