Public Design Commission of the City of New York

The Public Design Commission (PDC) is an advocate for innovative, sustainable, and equitable design of the public realm. As New York City's design review agency, the PDC reviews hundreds of proposals each year, including permanent buildings, parks, open spaces, and art on City-owned property. The PDC comprises 11 members who serve pro bono and meet monthly to review and vote on projects that are submitted by City agencies. Members include an architect, landscape architect, painter, sculptor, and three lay members, as well as representatives from the Brooklyn Museum, Metropolitan Museum of Art, The New York Public Library, and the Mayor. When reviewing designs, the PDC considers an array of design parameters such as the unique history and context of the site, public realm impact, durability and resiliency of materials, and how to successfully achieve the desired function and programs so that the built project can best serve New Yorkers.

Annual Awards for Excellence in Design

Since 1983, the Public Design Commission has recognized well-designed public projects with its Annual Awards for Excellence in Design. The winning projects are selected from the submissions reviewed by the Commission the previous year and exemplify best practices in public design. These projects range in size from large scale mixed-use developments to prototypical bioswales, and incorporate green infrastructure, waterfront resiliency, accessibility, innovative materials, creative planning, and sustainability.

New York City Hall

New York's City Hall is one of the oldest continuously used City Halls in the nation that still houses its original governmental functions. Designed by Joseph François Mangin and John McComb Jr. and completed in 1812, it is one of the finest architectural achievements of its period. The Landmarks Preservation Commission designated City Hall an individual landmark in 1966 and its central rotunda an interior landmark in 1976. In 1993, the African Burial Ground and the Commons, which includes City Hall and the surrounding park, was designated a Historic District. The building's rich history, art, and antique collections are documented in the Public Design Commission's Archive, in the Landmarks Preservation Commission's reports, and at the New-York Historical Society.

Alice in Wonderland Visiting New York Mural Series

Slender Bus Shelters



79th Street Boat Basin

Riverside Park and the Hudson River between 80th Street and 73rd Street, Manhattan

A project of the Economic Development Corporation and NYC Parks

Located on the Hudson River beside Manhattan's Riverside Park, this new public structure replaces an existing marine and dock house, which was extensively damaged by Superstorm Sandy. The dock house anchors the fifteen-acre renewal and expansion of the 79th Street Boat Basin, the most heavily subscribed public marina in New York City.

After years of close collaboration with project stakeholders, the new climate-resilient, LEED-rated, ADA-accessible 3,800 square-foot building will provide support facilities for the New York City Department of Parks and Recreation's 24/7 operation of the longstanding marina. From boaters to participants in its robust educational and community programming, the marina has enabled safe public access of the waterfront for thousands of people annually since 1937.

A beacon on the river, the new building announces its civic identity while thoughtfully responding to its 360-degree exposure. The dockhouse's civic identity bridges architecture and infrastructure, referencing the maritime character of the site through its articulation and materials. The design references the structural trusses of bridges and gangways in the harbor, as well as the triangular forms of boat rigging, masts, and sails. Diagonal structural steel columns along the façade provide lateral bracing and enable the chamfered corners that minimize the building's mass.





Annadale Green Park

Jefferson Boulevard and Annadale Road, Staten Island

Annadale Green is located within the South Shore Business District of Staten Island and is a stone's throw from the Annadale train station and neighborhood shops and restaurants. The park hosts community events including an annual tree lighting ceremony of the mature white pine located at the center of the park. It is also home to the Annadale Memorial, honoring the residents of Annadale who gave their lives during World War II and the Korean War. This design embraces the lush existing tree canopy and meaningful traditions that are the fabric of this park.

The design transforms the southern portion of the park into a central plaza for community events and outdoor dining, framed by existing trees. The memorial and flagpole are relocated along the plaza's primary axis to accentuate their importance. The running bond pavement surrounds the central plaza and responds to the curves of the planting beds and tree pits. The open entrance welcomes park visitors from the adjacent bus stop and train station to the south. The lawn oval showcases the mature white pine, defines the curves of the surrounding planting beds, and provides an opportunity for a quieter park experience in the nestled seating that surrounds it.



Briarwood Community Library

85-12 Main Street, Briarwood, Queens

The Briarwood Library project includes the complete interior and exterior renovation of the existing building, with the goal of helping this key neighborhood anchor better serve the whole community. The design creates an inclusive environment that feels connected to its neighborhood with carefully calibrated visual openness and improved physical accessibility both inside and out. The design creates an enhanced sensory experience of the interior, a more flexible and functional interior flow, and a more welcoming landscape, including a renovated exterior plaza with evening illumination. The project will also contribute to New York City's sustainability goals, achieving LEED Gold, and will use renewable energy created onsite through a new photovoltaic panel system.

The new exterior façade will feature glazed terracotta in a range of earthy tones that harmonize with the brick that characterizes the surrounding neighborhood. The library has dedicated adult, teen, and children's spaces. Each of the spaces is zoned so that visitors feel ownership and a sense of place, with distinctive graphic murals depicting local plants in each area. A special large-scale window with a new sill bench gives the teens a corner perch, and round windows are scaled to children's views. The new landscape features sensory elements that appeal to smell and touch, as well as sight.





Devoe Avenue Streetscape Improvements

East 177th Street from Devoe Avenue to Bronx Park Avenue, East Tremont Avenue from Devoe Avenue to Boston Road, and Devoe Avenue from East 177th Street to East Tremont Avenue, Bronx

This project will reconstruct Devoe Avenue, including the water main and combined sewer, from East Tremont Avenue to East 177th Street in the West Farms neighborhood of the Bronx. The project will also serve to connect sections of the Bronx River Greenway between the newly constructed Starlight Park to the south and Bronx Street to the north. The project includes realigning the roadway geometry to improve safety, new landscaping, and providing a continuous dedicated pedestrian and bike path along the west side of Devoe Avenue, where no existing access is currently provided.





Gwen Ifill Park

129th Avenue and 176th Street, Queens

Gwen Ifill Park (formerly Railroad Park) is a 17 acre, NYC Parks Forever Wild site located in Jamaica, Queens. Formerly a rail yard for the Long Island Railroad, the City of New York acquired the land in 1962, and named the park in honor of Gwen Ifill, a leading journalist, television broadcaster, and author. Ms. Ifill was born in Jamaica, Queens and was the first Black woman to anchor a nationally televised public affairs show, Washington Week. This new park will provide public access to the existing natural habitat along with new opportunities for recreation.

Gwen Ifill Park is designed with a wide range of amenities for the community, integrating programming into the existing natural environment and disturbing the least amount of natural habitat as possible. The active recreation area, located on the north edge of the park along 129th Ave, carefully weaves around existing mature trees, and will include lush native plantings to maintain the natural character of the site. The majority of the park will remain a large contiguous natural area, with formalized nature trails providing access throughout the natural forest. The edges of the park will be formalized with curbs and sidewalks along the perimeter.





Hudson-Houston Plaza

West Houston and Hudson Street, Manhattan

The design of Hudson-Houston Plaza fulfills a longstanding commitment to the Hudson Square community to activate the ground plane atop Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) infrastructure. Developed in partnership with the Hudson Square Business Improvement District and guided by neighborhood workshops, the project exemplifies careful planning to expand the public realm while allowing DEP to continue to meet its mission to protect public health and the environment.

Set against the vibrant backdrop of the Kobra mural, *Ellis*, on the adjacent school building, the plaza design features a flexible multipurpose space, paved with high-albedo permeable pavers and populated with brightly colored furnishings that can be configured to support different programming. On the eastern side, a bosque of trees and umbrellas form a lush, intimate green space with shaded seating. Vine-covered trellises extend up from the perimeter fence to cast shade over the plaza's interactive Daydreamer benches. These unique seating elements rotate with integrated and responsive audio and light features, providing a playful sensory experience for visitors of all ages.





I AM PROTECTED by Jazmine Hayes

Brownsville Multi-Service and Community Empowerment Center 444 Thomas S. Boyland Street, Brownsville, Brooklyn

I AM PROTECTED consists of four site-specific artworks installed throughout the Brownsville Multi-Service and Community Empowerment Center. These intergenerational, gender-expansive installations reflect the culture, history, and spirit of Brownsville's youth and community.

In my mothers' garden, which will be installed on an outdoor community garden wall, is a patinated copper sculpture that portrays a reciprocal relationship between a young gardener and a deity, nurturing a sanctuary of care, abundance, and healing.


I am divinely guided is a suspended spiral sculpture composed of 444 resin cowrie shells that will be located in the Human Resource Administration lobby. Once used as currency among Black and Brown communities, cowries honor ancestral value systems. One hundred and eleven of the shells encase recycled plastic, speaking to the interconnection between environmental and racial justice.

Like the seeds in my cornrows, which will be installed on a wall in the Youth Empowerment Lobby, speaks through the language of braiding and pattern. Featuring stained Baltic birch panels shaped like New York City Housing Authority aerial maps, the work transforms imposed structures into visual affirmations of belonging and memory.

I shall grow tall to the skies is centered on the moko jumbie, a protective figure rooted in Caribbean traditions who sees and wards off harm. The moko jumbie stands in a celestial setting that celebrates life, play, and imagination.









Pier 6 Waterfront Park

Bush Terminal Industrial Campus (Made in New York), adjacent to Marginal Way between 41st Street and 43rd Street, Brooklyn

The redevelopment of Bush Terminal Pier 6 transforms a deteriorated solid-fill pier on the Sunset Park waterfront into an engaging new open space for neighborhood residents and tenants of the MADE Bush Terminal Campus. The project stabilizes the pier to provide safe waterfront access, celebrates the site's rich industrial and ecological history, and creates a sustainable and resilient waterfront park. The design incorporates managed erosion, industrial historic elements such as collapsed platforms and foundations, and preserves emergent habitat while creating resilient programmed spaces throughout the pier.

The park includes playful pockets that serve as a gathering space, dining area, and outdoor classroom; a tide pool area; three connected lawns; and boardwalks. The design references regional ecosystems, incorporates an intertidal shoreline experience, and prioritizes a native plant palette that preserves and enhances biodiversity. The creative reuse of materials found on the site honor the pier's industrial past and lower the project's carbon footprint. Bush Terminal Pier 6 builds on New York City Economic Development Corporation's investments in its industrial assets by providing a public "front porch" to the MADE Campus open space and waterfront access for the Sunset Park community.








Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument

West 88th Street and Riverside Drive, Riverside Park, Manhattan

This temple-like monument, constructed in 1902, commemorates Union Army soldiers and sailors from New York who served in the Civil War. 370,000 soldiers from New York State fought in the war on behalf of the Union cause, accounting for one out of every five men in the state. The monument has not seen any significant work since a 1960's restoration. This project will completely restore all components of the monument, provide for universal access and install appropriate architectural lighting.





The Feeling is Mutual by Justin Valdes

Arverne Community Library 312 Beach 54th Street, Arverne, Queens

Artist Justin Valdez has surfed the Rockaways for nearly 20 years, through icy winters and hot summers. Though Valdez was born in Queens and loves all of NYC, Rockaway holds his heart. When Hurricane Sandy had a devastating impact on Rockaway, Valdez volunteered to distribute food and clothing, and helped clean out damaged homes. That spirit of service and community continues to guide both his life and art.

Valdez's work is rooted in accessibility and connection. Through drawings that depict daily observations—ranging from environmental issues and tech habits, to surfing and pets—he aims to spark thought and laughter. Humor is often a vehicle, but the deeper goal of his work is to connect ideas across age, ethnicity, and class.

The Feeling is Mutual at Arverne Community Library features Valdez's drawings positioned in various locations to foster discovery in the library space- it is subtle in the main space and louder in areas not immediately visible. The drawings are whimsical and intended to create intimate moments for all ages and backgrounds to enjoy. Drawings will be reproduced in ceramic frit to serve as "distraction dots" (required for safety) on glass walls, etched into a large glass window on the east end of the community gallery, and on ceramic tiles in all four public restrooms.

Valdez believes in our shared responsibility for our future and the power of collective action. Themes like mutual aid, protest, and community have become central to both his activism and creative practice. For the installation at Arverne Community Library, Valdez celebrates that same spirit—community, mutual support, and the joy that comes from helping each other and doing what's right. The work reflects a vision of reshaping the world in compassion and cooperation.





Shirley Chisholm Recreation Center

Nostrand Playground 3002 Foster Avenue, Flatbush, Brooklyn

The new Shirley Chisholm Recreation Center (SCRC) is a landmark community project rising in the heart of East Flatbush, Brooklyn that will serve as a welcoming neighborhood hub for residents and families. Led by the Consigli Construction Co. Inc. and Studio Gang, in coordination with the Department of Design and Construction (DDC) and NYC Parks, the project is part of DDC's Design-Build pilot program, which enables faster and more efficient delivery of public projects.

Set within the Nostrand Playground, the new facility will house publicly accessible amenities and resources, including a gymnasium, basketball court, indoor swimming pool, fitness and weight training rooms, and more. Committed to sustainability and wellness, and supportive of NYC's greenhouse gas emission goals, SCRC is targeting LEED-NC Gold certification and incorporates a high-performance envelope, all-electric heating and cooling, and the use of mass timber. The building will feature a wrap around green roof, and its facade will consist of large arched windows set in brick, bringing in natural light.

With a strong focus on equity, the project is meeting ambitious M/WBE participation goals for both design and construction phases. Once complete, the new recreation center will host programming and opportunities to encourage learning, recreation, community-building, and civic engagement.

Wings of Everchange 易之翼 by Jennifer Wen Ma

Everchange I

Stainless steel, glass, LED lights

This stainless steel and hand-blown glass sculpture serves as 70 Mulberry Street Community Center's artistic guardian, embodying transformation and continuity. Thirty-feet-long and suspended in the new atrium of the building, *Everchange I* combines salvaged architectural elements from the original site that survived the 2020 fire, along with memories of its occupants preserved in glass time capsules, and aspirations for the future in the form of wings, to propel this creature to take flight.

Inspired by the ancient teachings of I Ching, the work embraces change as a fundamental force of life. It invites the community to honor the building's history while envisioning a future defined by openness, fluidity, collective growth and renewal.

Everchange II

Ink painting on glass

The energy of the atrium sculpture continues and transitions into a 128-foot-long monumental ink painting on glass panels in the historic stair tower that spirals up five stories toward a skylight. The gestural and vibrant quality of the ink will be combined with figurative depictions of the community and their stories, collected from the building occupants and the larger Chinatown community in connection to the history of the building.





World's Fair Marina Pavilion Structures

Marina Road at Boat Basin Place, Corona, Queens

Three Marina Pavilion Structures were created for the 1964 World's Fair and have remained an iconic visual landmark ever since, despite one structure being removed in 1966. In 2001, a Percent for Art project featuring a decorative pavement by artist Jackie Ferrara reconstructed the landscape and linked the two remaining structures with a seating plaza which helped to reactivate this area along the Flushing Bay Promenade with views of the marinas and waterfront.

This project will faithfully reconstruct the historic pavilion structures and restore the visual connection from Marina Road to the waterfront with lower understory plantings. New ornamental trees will create a more inviting seating area between the structures.

The project establishes two new pedestrian crossings of Marina Road on either side of Boat Basin Place as well as one across Boat Basin Place itself. Protected bump-outs will help calm traffic and make crossings quick and safe. The project also prepares the intersection for signalization by the Department of Transportation, which will further enhance the accessibility of the promenade. With extensive development coming to the neighborhood in the future, having a safe way for pedestrians and cyclists alike to access the promenade will be crucial to the continued enjoyment of the waterfront for all visitors.



Special Recognition Alice in Wonderland Visiting New York Mural Series

A project of the NYC Health + Hospitals Arts in Medicine Program

Foreground Conservation

The "Alice in Wonderland Visiting New York" mural series was created by Abram Champanier between 1936-1940 through the Works Progress Administration. The mural series, which was originally installed in the children's ward of Gouverneur Hospital, depicts characters from "Alice's Adventures in Wonderland" (1865) by Lewis Carroll. Alice and her friends are seen enjoying iconic NYC locations including the New York Public Library, the Empire State Building, the Central Park Zoo, and the Statue of Liberty, and having adventures such as flying over the East River bridges and the Statue of Liberty, parachuting into Coney Island, and squeezing into a subway car.

The hospital's wards were closed in 1961. Weather and time contributed to the destruction of the paintings, and it wasn't until late 1979 – when the building was about to be sold and demolished – that they were discovered by the Landmarks Preservation Commission and rescued by art conservator Alan Farancz. He removed the murals, restored five panels, and held the others for safekeeping for almost 40 years.

John Lippert, a former apprentice to Alan Farancz, and Dawn D' Alusio formed Foreground Conservation and Decorative Arts in 2007 and began working on the "Alice in Wonderland Visiting New York" mural series in 2021. They have since completed the restoration of series full. The project has been shepherded by the NYC Health + Hospitals Arts in Medicine department.







Special Recognition Slender Bus Shelters

JCDecaux Street Furniture New York, LLC has operated the New York City Coordinated Street Furniture Franchise since 2015, upgrading the program and expanding services as directed by its partner, the Department of Transportation. As a member of the JCDecaux Group, founded by Jean-Claude Decaux in 1964 and the world's largest street furniture company, its mission is to provide state-of-the-art bus shelters and other streetscape amenities, maintained in a first-class manner and funded through advertising displayed on the shelter.

Grimshaw architects designed a family of street furniture to accommodate the variety of NYC streetscapes, however, it became apparent that the service could not be installed broadly as some sidewalks, particularly in such historic areas as Greenwich Village, Clinton Hill and Madison Avenue. The sidewalks in these neighborhoods were too narrow to permit the installation of those designs. To expand the installation of the bus shelters to such locations, the Slender and the Short Slender bus shelters were created. These bus shelters fit more comfortably on narrow sidewalks and provide the same dignified services offered to other transit riders around New York City.
