I write to you in reference to my address in District 5 being proposed to join District 26. I live at 425 E 63rd Street and I have lived within a few blocks of my current address since 2007.

I understand the proposed redistricting is to address the growth in NYC during the last decade, and I appreciate how difficult this task must be.

My request is that our neighborhood within the UES remain in a Manhattan District. While I believe all boroughs have good representation, I do think each borough and each neighborhood faces unique issues. I feel that moving us to a Queens District will minimize the impact of our voices, as the majority of District 26 would have priorities that may differ from the UES of Manhattan.

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Good Afternoon

My name is David Lieberman, and I am a representative of Paramount Group, in Times Square. I respectfully submit this testimony to urge the New York City Districting Commission to modify the redistricting map by extending the boundary lines for Council Districts 3 and 4 from Broadway and 42nd Street to Columbus Circle. This will create a more equitable representation for our commercial and cultural district.

The Times Square district, the area from 40th Street to 53rd Street between 6th and 8th Avenues, and Restaurant Row on 46th Street between 8th and 9th Avenues, comprise one of the City's most vital economic engines. The eastern portion of the district is largely characterized by office use and hotels and serves as a transition point between the Midtown East commercial core and the entertainment district west of Broadway, which includes the Theater District and more residential uses.

Times Square's western portion has been culturally and politically aligned with the Hell's Kitchen community for decades. However, in the current draft of the redistricting map, Times Square loses critical representation with constituencies west of Broadway. We believe a more equitable solution can be achieved by continuing the boundary lines along Broadway from 42nd Street to Columbus Circle.

This will ensure the Times Square area can continue to work in partnership with and would establish an alignment of interests between residents, businesses, and the theater community, and be more representative of the diversity of these constituencies at the City Council, which has been vital to the success of Times Square for nearly a decade.

The partnership between Times Square and its surrounding communities has led to the successful passage of legislation that has eased pedestrian congestion, expanded public plazas, and improved the quality of life for people who live, work, and visit the Times Square area.

It is critical that the City Council boundary lines be redrawn in a way that includes the diversity of commercial and residential interests that have helped make Times Square the economic engine it is today. It will also help ensure a more equitable recovery for the area in the years ahead.



While other Districts have physical boundaries in more than one borough, they are directly adjacent to one another. They do not have a river separating them as in this proposed plan. The issues in CD26 are not the same as in CD5. There are several well-established neighborhood associations whose membership would be torn asunder.

The issues that involve City Agencies such as Transportation, Sanitation, Parks etc. are different in the two council districts. Then there are two other major issues that would tear our community apart. The **first** is the hospital corridor with their buildings for the major institutions many of which would be in CD26 under the new plan. But many of their offices and allied buildings and staff and doctors would be located in/or live in CD5 making it difficult for discussing issues constantly arising. The **second** is Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 51 Districts for the least amount of park space in the city. This plan would remove: 24 Sycamores Park; ¾ of Honey Locust Park—with ¼ remaining in D5; most of our East River Esplanade and Andrew Haswell Green Park Phase 1 & 2A—2B is under construction at this time. Phase 3 has not yet started and will likely cost \$25 Million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the voters in her/his District? Most of the funding will probably be spent in the Queens part of the district. **This would result in CD 5 having the least amount of Park space in NYC.**

We strongly recommend that you study and implement Community Board 8's resolution and plan, as it takes into account the number of residents in all the adjourning districts.

Our Neighborhood Association depends greatly on our Council Member and her office staff, which is easy to reach by a short bus ride. I strongly urge the New York City Districting Commission to reconsider this ill-conceived plan and not divide an indivisible and cohesive neighborhood.

I respectfully submit this testimony to urge the New York City Districting Commission to modify the redistricting map by extending the boundary lines for Council Districts 3 and 4 from Broadway and 42nd Street to Columbus Circle. This will create a more equitable representation for our commercial and cultural district.

The Times Square district, the area from 40th Street to 53rd Street between 6th and 8th Avenues, and Restaurant Row on 46th Street between 8th and 9th Avenues, comprise one of the City's most vital economic engines. The eastern portion of the district is largely characterized by office use and hotels and serves as a transition point between the Midtown East commercial core and the entertainment district west of Broadway, which includes the Theater District and more residential uses.

Times Square's western portion has been culturally and politically aligned with the Hell's Kitchen community for decades. However, in the current draft of the redistricting map, Times Square loses critical representation with constituencies west of Broadway. We believe a more equitable solution can be achieved by continuing the boundary lines along Broadway from 42nd Street to Columbus Circle.



The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.


The plan presented for 54 blocks of the Upper East Side and Roosevelt Island is not acceptable to the residents of the East Sixties. We believe it violates the charter requirements of keeping neighborhoods compact and intact. This plan would make CD26 an oddly shaped district with practical difficulties: they are - would the Council Member have a district office in Manhattan as well as on Roosevelt Island; would the Council Member cover Community Board meetings in Board 8 & 6 and have full membership on both Borough Boards, and finally we believe this part of Community District 8 would have a diminution of representation. While other Districts have physical boundaries in more than one borough, they are directly adjacent to one another. They do not have a river separating them as in this proposed plan. The issues in CD26 are not the same as in CD5. And there are several well-established neighborhood associations whose membership would be torn asunder.

The issues that involve City Agencies such as Transportation, Sanitation, Parks etc. are different in the two council districts. Then there are two other major issues that would tear our community apart. The first is the hospital corridor with their buildings for the major institutions many of which would be in CD26 under the new plan. But many of their offices and allied buildings and staff and doctors would be located in/or live in CD5 making it difficult for discussing issues constantly arising. Not to mention the effect on "bench to bed" translational medicine research. The second is Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 59 Districts for the least amount of park space in the city. This plan would remove: from CD 5 24 Sycamores Park; 1/4 of Honey Locust Park-with 1/4 remaining in D5; most of our East River Esplanade and Andrew Haswell Green Park Phase 1 & 2A-2B is under construction at this time. Phase 3 has not yet started and will likely cost \$25 Million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the voters in her/his District? Most of the funding will probably be spent in the Queens part of the district.

We strongly recommend that you study and implement Community Board 8's resolution and plan, as it takes into account the number of residents in all the adjourning districts.

Our Neighborhood Association depends greatly on our Council Member and her office staff, which is easy to reach by a short bus ride. I strongly urge the New York City Districting Commission to reconsider this ill-conceived plan and not divide an indivisible and cohesive neighborhood.

The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.



Dear Mr. Walcott,

We are writing to comment on the redistricting plan proposed, as required by the City Charter, by the commission you chair. We currently reside in a part of District 5 on the Upper East Side that, under the new map, would be severed from the rest of Manhattan and joined to Queens (in District 26). We understand the difficulty of the commission's task, including the need to rebalance populations throughout New York, but we believe the current plan to be unsuitable.

We urge the commission to rethink and adjust the proposed map because it seems to violate some basic objectives of the redistricting process and because it would likely have negative effects both to the people and neighborhoods moved from Manhattan into District 26 and to those in Queens required to incorporate the Manhattan residents in question.

The commission's mandate was to give each district a roughly equivalent population. But the process was supposed to keep existing communities and neighborhoods intact. To quote the City Charter: "District lines shall keep intact neighborhoods and communities with established ties of common interest and association, whether historical, racial, economic, ethnic, religious or other."

The commission was also instructed to avoid diluting the voting power of racial and linguistic minorities. We are not concerned about potential dilution for ourselves. But the proposed map seems to undermine this goal for District 26, where new constituents from the Upper East Side could weaken the voting power of the racial and linguistic minorities currently living in Queens. We can imagine the residents of Yorkville (where we live) successfully lobbying for increased services here, for example, perhaps at the expense of residents of Queens with different concerns and perhaps more pressing needs for basic services, maintenance, and improvements.

Many of our neighbors are worried that the social and economic needs in Queens would be a burden or a distraction to Upper East Siders. We worry, instead, about the potential ways in which the needs of Queens' residents might be subsumed by the impact of vocal, (mostly) wealthier fellow New Yorkers living outside of Queens, here across the river.

In addition, the current map severs our neighborhood—about 50,000 people and their environs, about 50 blocks—from its natural and long-term community on the Upper East Side. We share joint interests with others who would remain in District 5, embrace mutual commitments to local parks (John Jay Park, for example, and the East River Esplanade) and local schools (PS 158, for example), and imbibe a common history. Our historic and natural place is with our neighbors in District 5.

The proposed redistricting plan degrades both District 5 and 26. The new configuration does not keep communities of interest together; it produces an oddly shaped and distended District 26, not a compact district as mandated in the Charter; and it is likely not to serve the interests of constituents on either side of the East River.

We therefore respectfully request that the Commission set aside the proposed redistricting plan and redraw the map in a way that better realizes the goals of the City Charter. Thanks for your consideration.

The 2020 Census revealed that NYC's population had grown to 8,804,190, meaning that the ideal district size is now 172,882; and WHEREAS, districts should be roughly equal in population pursuant to the one person one vote doctrine of representation; and WHEREAS, districts cannot vary from the ideal district size by more than 5%, or roughly 8,644; and WHEREAS, the draft map identifies three districts in Staten Island, with no crossover into other boroughs; and WHEREAS, the three proposed Staten Island districts would represent between 165,470 and 165,491 individuals, or all approximately 7,400 below the ideal district size; and WHEREAS, the proposed map vastly overrepresents Staten Island compared to the 48 other districts and does not ensure fair representation of residents across the five boroughs, violating the one-person one-vote doctrine; and WHEREAS, the NYC Charter identifies five ranked districting requirements: 1. Keep neighborhoods and communities intact.

- 2. Keep districts compact.
- 3. Limit crossover districts.

4. Avoid splitting voters of the same political party for purposes of diminishing effective representation of such voters 5. Avoid oddly shaped districts WHEREAS, the proposed Queens-based Council District 26 ("D26") would divide the Upper East Side neighborhood and the communities of interest in Community District 8 Manhattan; WHEREAS, the proposed D26 would establish a new crossover district between Queens and Manhattan for the first time since the Council was expanded to 51 members; and WHEREAS, the Commission's proposal to add a portion of Manhattan and all of Roosevelt Island to a Queens-based Council District, District 26, violates the City Charter Districting requirement in the following ways: (1) it fails to keep neighborhoods and communities intact; (2) fails to keep the district compact; (3) it creates an oddly shaped crossover district; and WHEREAS, the Commission proposes that 36,000 Manhattan Island residents and 12,000 Roosevelt Island residents – which equates to 48,000 of the 173,000 people in the proposed D26, or 27.7% – be moved to D26, where these residents will not receive the representation, attention, and discretionary funding to which they are entitled due to their small percentage of the total D26 population; and WHEREAS, the eastern portion of the Upper East Side and Roosevelt Island have major differences with D26 such that the proposed combination may result in a significant diminution of municipal services to, amongst others, senior citizens and people with disabilities which populate a large share of those areas; and WHEREAS, the practical difficulties of having a two Borough Queens-Manhattan district cannot be ignored; and WHEREAS, the proposed lines would separate the representation of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses from the neighborhood in which they reside and where most neighboring residents live; and WHEREAS, the areas being proposed to be moved to the D26 district contain numerous parks and green acres including, amongst others, John Jay Park, portions of the East River Esplanade and Andrew Haswell Green Park, which are critical open spaces for the neighborhood and which would be separated from most of the neighborhood residents who use them; and WHEREAS, numerous public schools including P.S. 183, P.S. 158, P.S. 217 and M177 are located in the area being proposed to be placed in D26 and would be adversely affected by being separated from the rest of the neighborhood; and WHEREAS, Hunter College, a major educational institution, would have its main campus at 68th Street and Lexington Avenue separated into two council districts, with a skybridge connecting two buildings in two separate council districts; and WHEREAS, the Upper East Side contains numerous historic districts and zoning features that are common to it and distinct from the Queens portions of the proposed D26; and WHEREAS, by separating part of the Upper East Side and placing it in D26, the Commission has

divided a neighborhood and communities of interest in direct violation of the Charter Mandate; BE IT KNOWN I DISAPPROVE of the Commission's proposed Preliminary Plan #1 redistricting map which moves approximately 54 blocks of the easterly side of the Upper East Side and Roosevelt Island to a Queens-based City Council District and strongly urge that these areas remain in a Manhattan-based City Council District.


The plan presented for 54 blocks of the Upper East Side and Roosevelt Island is not acceptable to the residents of the East Sixties. We believe it violates the charter requirements of keeping neighborhoods compact and intact. This plan would make CD26 an oddly shaped district with practical difficulties; they are - would the Council Member have a district office in Manhattan as well as on Roosevelt Island; would the Council Member cover Community Board meetings in Board 8 & 6 and have full membership on both Borough Boards, and finally we believe this part of Community District 8 would have a diminution of representation. While other Districts have physical boundaries in more than one borough, they are directly adjacent to one another. They do not have a river separating them as in this proposed plan. The issues in CD26 are not the same as in CD5. And there are several well-established neighborhood associations whose membership would be torm asunder.

The issues that involve City Agencies such as Transportation, Sanitation, Parks etc. are different in the two council districts. Then there are two other major issues that would tear our community apart. The first is the hospital corridor with their buildings for the major institutions many of which would be in CD26 under the new plan. But many of their offices and allied buildings and staff and doctors would be located in/or live in CD5 making it difficult for discussing issues constantly arising. Not to mention the effect on "bench to bed" translational medicine research. The second is Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 59 Districts for the least amount of park space in the city. This plan would remove: from CD 5 24 Sycamores Park; ¼ of Honey Locust Park—with ¼ remaining in D5; most of our East River Esplanade and Andrew Haswell Green Park Phase 1 & 2A—2B is under construction at this time. Phase 3 has not yet started and will likely cost \$25 Million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the voters in her/his District? Most of the funding will probably be spent in the Queens part of the district.

We strongly recommend that you study and implement Community Board 8's resolution and plan, as it takes into account the number of residents in all the adjourning districts.

Our Neighborhood Association depends greatly on our Council Member and her office staff, which is easy to reach by a short bus ride. I strongly urge the New York City Districting Commission to reconsider this ill-conceived plan and not divide an indivisible and cohesive neighborhood.

I write to ask that the district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5, which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side and all of Roosevelt Island, not be adopted for the following reasons.

The draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in:

- Division between districts of neighborhoods and communities of established shared interests and backgrounds
- The proposed district 26 is not compact
- The proposed district 26 results in an extreme crossover district across boroughs
- The proposed district 26 is oddly shaped and arguably not contiguous

The proposed redistricting would significantly change the ethnicity demographics of District 26: it would go from 31% Asian, 29% non-Hispanic white, 29% Hispanic, and 6% Black to 44% non-Hispanic white, 25% Asian, 22% Hispanic, and 4% Black (2020 census data tabulated by the website Redistricting & You). The proposed District 26 lines split up communities of color in Long Island City and Woodside, while at the same time adding predominately white neighborhoods in Manhattan to the district. While I acknowledge that some changes to the shape of District 26 are inevitable due to population growth, the draft proposal results in the loss of a plurality minority district, and if this draft proposal passes, the NYC Districting Commission is failing to meet its mandate to keep communities of interest together.

The proposed districts will also create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. Notably, will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts 6 & 8? Will a Queens Council Member send representation to two additional Manhattan Community Boards? Will a Queens Council Member hold full membership on two Borough Boards? What is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting? Manhattan and Queens residents may hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy including, but not limited to, congestion pricing.

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with large, densely populated campuses. Among those institutions directly impacted by the proposed new lines are: Hospital for Special Surgery, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York Presbyterian/Weill Cornell, Animal Medical Center, Rockefeller University, and Cornell Tech. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Finally, this oddly-shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents. Some friends and colleagues I've

spoken to about the proposed district lines were confused and thought that the proposed district lines would mean that our neighborhood (near Rockefeller University) would now be a part of the borough of Queens (if it would mean we vote for Queens borough president, what it means practically for people living here, etc.). While I explained that's not technically the case, it does show how confusing, odd, and inappropriate the proposed districts are. From talking to my friends in my neighborhood, reading articles and statements from city Council Members, and even seeing signs posted on Roosevelt Island, it's clear that no one affected by the proposed changes to districts 26 and 5 are remotely satisfied with the draft proposal.

I urge the Commission in the strongest possible terms to reject the proposed districts referenced above and instead develop a plan that does not violate the City Charter. Thank you!

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

Under the new draft lines, my Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun synagogue community and my Ramaz School community will be more unified in District 5 than it was in the original district map from 2021. I write in support of these draft maps as they enhance representation for my community and bring together communities of interest that were severed.

In the current 4th Council District, less than 40% of the residents are part of Community Board 8. The Council District is one of the least compact in the entire city as it goes as far west as Columbus Circle (8th Avenue) and as far east as Avenue D yet it is quite narrow in most parts. The District also stretches over 4 miles north-south, longer than any other Manhattan Council District. We are Dan and June Walden, residents at Sutton Place, New York, NY. In 2016 we moved back to Manhattan after 25 years in Westchester, first renting on the 500 block of East 72nd Street and then purchasing our apartment on Sutton Place. We are retired, and our intention is to live in Manhattan, and hopefully in our apartment in the Sutton Place neighborhood, for the balance of our lives. We are particularly happy to have access to the world-leading hospitals and iconic parks within easy walking distance from our home.

While acknowledging the difficult task facing the NYC Districting Commission in establishing new City Council districts following the 2020 census, we do not believe that the Sutton Place neighborhood, often referred to as a unique Manhattan residential enclave, should be stuffed into a District primarily made up of very different communities across the East River in Queens.

The proposal to move Sutton Place, along with the eastern blocks of the upper east side and Roosevelt Island from District 5 into Queens based District 26 raises a number of concerns including:

- The likelihood that a predominantly Queens based population physically separated from our neighborhood and our issues would elect the Council Member responsible for representing the far east side.
- The likelihood that the Council member would have a primary office in Queens, distant from the significant population of aging folk like us on Sutton Place. At best the Council member would have a second district office on the Manhattan side and be there sporadically.

- The affected area includes some beautiful and unique parks and open spaces, including the Esplanade which is part of the Manhattan Waterfront Greenway planned to circumnavigate the island of Manhattan. We worry that our Council member's attention would be focused on the needs of the population in Queens and not maintaining these parks and finishing the Esplanade.
- The annual participating budgeting allocated to each Council Member and determined by constituent vote likely would end up in Queens.
- Whether based in Queens or Manhattan, the Council member would be representing two distinct areas that each face significant community issues, such as zoning protection for neighborhoods, building height and density, bike lanes, congestion and congestion pricing, location of services. But these issues have different implications in Manhattan and Queens, and will be addressed in different Community Boards, City agencies and community. The single Council member will have great difficulty attending all the critical City meetings required, much less the community forums. At best they will need to double their staff and they will almost certainly have to argue opposite sides of many issues.

The new District 26 proposed by the Commission does not meet many of the criteria for districts set forth in the City Charter. The proposed District:

- Splits neighborhoods and communities of interest
- Is not compact
- Is an extreme crossover between boroughs
- Is so oddly shaped that our first assumption was that it represented gerrymandering

Manhattan Community Board Six has adopted a resolution entitled *Opposing proposed City Council district boundaries redrawn by the New York City Districting Commission* that lists many additional concerns. We endorse that resolution and the proposed alternative redistricting boundary lines keeping Sutton Place, the far East Side and Roosevelt Island in Manhattan based City Council Districts.

- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Second, the proposed districts will create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. Notably, will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts 6 & 8? Will a Queens Council Member send representation to two additional Manhattan Community Boards? Will a Queens Council Member hold full membership on two Borough Boards? What is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting? Manhattan and Queens residents may hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy including, but not limited to, congestion pricing. Which position will a Queens Council Member adopt?

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Third and finally, this oddly-shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents.

In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and not adopt the proposed districts referenced above. I thank you in advance for your consideration,

The plan presented for 54 blocks of the Upper East Side and Roosevelt Island is not acceptable to the residents of the East

they are - would the Council Member have a district office

in Manhattan as well as on Roosevelt Island; would the Council Member cover Community Board meetings in Board 8 &

6 and have full membership on both Borough Boards, and finally we believe this part of Community District 8 would

have a diminution of representation.

While other Districts have physical boundaries in more than one borough, they are directly adjacent to one another. They do not have a river separating them as in this proposed plan. The issues in CD26 are not the same as in CD5. There are several well-established neighborhood associations whose membership would be torn

The issues that involve City Agencies such as Transportation, Sanitation, Parks etc. are different in the two council

Dear Chair Walcott and Commission Members:

I strongly object to the proposed city council redistricting plan, specifically as it relates to the section of the Upper East Side that would become part of District 26 in Queens. This section is a vital part of the Upper East Side neighborhood. It makes no logical sense to separate it from the rest of the Upper East Side, and even less sense to combine it with a district in a different borough. As you are aware, this section includes several schools, parks, hospitals, a library, and the East River Esplanade, all of which are essential components of the Upper East Side community. These institutions could be significantly disadvantaged by a lack of funding and advocacy if the proposal is approved.

The proposed plan, as it impacts this area, will be confusing and frustrating for residents who deserve to have local representation from a city council member in their own community. Currently, when safety issues have arisen at our local playground in John Jay Park, I have reached out to our District 5 Council Member and her staff to request that they coordinate with their Parks Department or other city agency liaisons to address the issue. Their familiarity with the immediate neighborhood, as well as their connections to the individuals responsible for maintaining the safety of this park, is crucial to effectively addressing potential issues. Despite their good intentions, I do not believe that the District 26 council member or her staff would be able to address these on-the-ground issues in this section of the Upper East Side nearly as effectively or with the necessary responsiveness.

The plan will also be disruptive to ongoing major infrastructure projects in the area, including much-needed construction along the East River Esplanade. The Esplanade has historically been under-resourced and under-funded and is literally falling apart in sections. To provide local residents with safe access to the waterfront, it is crucial that advocacy groups and local elected officials who have in depth knowledge of the area be able to continue to effectively collaborate to ensure that these projects are properly funded and completed.

Lastly, I am concerned about the impact the redistricting would have on participatory budget funding, which is voted on by community members in a district. Given that the segment of the Upper East Side that would be combined into the Queens district would represent only about twenty percent of the combined district, it seems unlikely that any funding projects in this area of the Upper East Side would be approved. In the past, several schools, libraries, and parks in this area have received participatory budget funds from District 5.

I stand with my neighbors, Community Board 8, and elected officials in opposing the plan and respectfully request that the proposed district lines not be adopted. I am hopeful that the Districting Commission will take the community's concerns into account and create an effective and logical proposal that better addresses the needs of the community and the city as a whole.



Dear Chair Dennis Walcott,

I write to ask that the district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side, and all of Roosevelt Island not be adopted for the following reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where:

- neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- the proposed district is not compact,
- the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Second, the proposed districts will create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. Notably, will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts 6 & 8? Will a Queens Council Member send representation to two additional Manhattan Community Boards? Will a Queens Council Member hold full membership on two Borough Boards? What is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting? Manhattan and Queens residents may hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy including, but not limited to, congestion pricing. Which position will a Queens Council Member adopt?

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Third and finally, this oddly-shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents.

In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and not adopt the proposed districts referenced above. I thank you in advance for your consideration,

I am submitting this testimony to the NYC Redistricting Commission in response to the draft lines released last month. My name is Raymond Chalme and I live on 3rd avenue on the upper east side.

Under the new draft lines, my Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun synagogue community and my Ramaz School community will be more unified in District 5 than it was in the original district map from 2021.

I write in support of these draft maps as they enhance representation for my community and bring together communities of interest that were severed.

In the current 4th Council District, less than 40% of the residents are part of Community Board 8. The Council District is one of the least compact in the entire city as it goes as far west as Columbus Circle (8th Avenue) and as far east as Avenue D yet it is quite narrow in most parts. The District also stretches over 4 miles north-south, longer than any other Manhattan Council District. In this, the voices of Community Board 8 are diluted and the Council Member must allocate funding and support across a wide range of neighborhoods. I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

I am writing because I am very concerned with the proposal to split Hell's Kitchen (Clinton) into three council districts.

I have lived in Hell's Kitchen since 1986. My street is near the borderline of the proposed redistricting map.

I am concerned that this attempt to split Hell's Kitchen into three different council districts may be a guise to pretend that current and future Homeless Shelters are in "other council districts", when they are in fact, just across street in the same neighborhood.

While I understand every neighborhood must do it's part for the Homeless in our city, Hell's Kitchen has always had more than our fair share of Homeless Shelters, and since the pandemic we have been disproportionately inundated with even more Homeless in this community. During the time that the Skyline Hotel at 50th and 10th was converted to a men's shelter, the Police were continually responding to reports of violence there, nearly four times per day, according to the New York Post on 4/24/21. Obviously, the safety of Hell's Kitchen residents was compromised. It would be unfair and detrimental to Hell's Kitchen, which is already trying to cope with far more than it's share of displaced persons, to just blur the borderlines on the map to hide a concentration of Homeless Shelters. It doesn't matter if it is suddenly called "Lower Lincoln Center" and "Midtown North-West"; if the area of Clinton where they meet is glutted with Homeless Shelters, then Hell's Kitchen has a problem.

Greetings, Chairman Dennis Walcott and Esteemed Commissioners, fellow Roosevelt Islanders and concerned guests.

I am Carolina Tanjutco, a resident of Roosevelt Island since 2010, I had the opportunity to invest and bought my 2-bedroom apartment from the Island House after a long search for a Manhattan property. I came to know of this beautiful island when my daughter was entering Middle School, and P.S.217 was listed among the Manhattan schools back in 2005. You can imagine my delight when I discovered what the island has to offer in terms of a scenic view, safety, public transportation accessibility, mixed demographics and welcoming neighborhood. PS 217 itself offered a variety of afterschool services similar to NYC public schools downtown. The funding of this school relied heavily on Manhattan taxpayers like myself.

Like many baby boomers, one of my biggest investment in my portfolio is my own home. The valuation depends on the location and upkeep of the property, and neighboring community concerns. With this redistricting proposal that puts our situation in conflict between Manhattan and Queens borough councils. It will certainly affect the current marketability of our homes should we decide to sell, or leave the property to our next of kin when there are jurisdictional and political issues affecting our quality of life.

On every person's mind is, "So what's next?" Are we going to be transferred to Queen's County? Is there going to be a Charter change?

Like all American citizens, I have a Constitutional right to protect my property and investment, against erosion of its value, against unwanted meddling of another political power that can deteriorate the quality of life that we currently enjoy under Manhattan District 5.

That quality of living includes the NY Public Library, sports facilities, Manhattan funded senior center, and most importantly, our access to NYPD. We are funding our own Public Safety Offcers stationed on the island, hence we have one of the best places to live in New York with least incidents of crime, Now, what happens should we be tossed to Queens Council 26, where we then have to compete with the allocation of NYPD vis-à-vis the higher crime rate in our neighboring Astoria?

We have the right to be secured in our homes and property like all other districts. That cannot be taken away from us because of some technicality that our neighbor requires more assistance than our Roosevelt Island community, and there are not so many police officers available to serve the entire District Council 26 at any given time. The day that we lose that security of having the NYPD at a short notice, that will start the proliferation of crimes in our backyard.

It is also not fair to Astoria because by including Roosevelt Island taxpayers in the calculation of average income, this will push up the level of income required for those seeking housing at District 26. Roosevelt Island has an average income level of \$135-160K. By factoring this ,on the Queens average income calculation, how will that affect the grant of public housing?

Let's talk about demographics and 2020 census. Each district is required to have approx. 172K but by including Roosevelt Island, with approximately 12,000 residents, now the population is up to 184K. Presently, without any change, Roosevelt Island has 29% white non-Hispanic, 31% Asian, 29% Hispanic and 6% Black. With redistricting, it will be off-balanced to 44% white non-Hispanic, 25% Asian, 22% Hispanic and 4% black. Clearly this is not in accord with the intention of redistricting.

A plain sight of the redistricting map shows a **direct violation of City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2)**, an extreme cross-over that results to an oddly shaped map, not compact, while joining neighborhoods with very distinct community interests. Roosevelt island is mainly residential and we work effectively with our Manhattan Council members for quick delivery of services. This redistricting proposal will result to change neither Roosevelt Islanders nor Astoria residents would like to have. My name is David Lawson and I am an elected representative of the Roosevelt Island community writing to you in my capacity as Roosevelt Island Resident Association (RIRA) governing Council, representing the Westview district, some 1000 residents. I am also former elected President by the Roosevelt Island community of this association and believe this letter represent the view of our entire Roosevelt Island community.

I am writing to share with you that the continuously growing 12,500+ Roosevelt Island resident community has been profoundly shocked by the redistricting lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5, which includes Roosevelt Island. As a result, the community has mobilized against it and oppose it vehemently for the following reason(s):

It is RIRA's views and the general Roosevelt Islanders' shared view that the proposed change is legally a direct violation of City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2), resulting in:

- 1. Neighborhoods and communities of interest not being kept intact
- 2. The proposed district is not compact as instructed
- 3. The proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, crossing a borough boundary

Furthermore, from a cultural viewpoint of view, the philosophy of the founders of Roosevelt Island was for it to be an integral part of Manhattan, which it has always been. Good evening. My name is John Keller. I'm a member of Manhattan Community Board Six, by nomination of Council Members Garodnick and Powers and by appointment of Borough President Brewer, honored now to serve under the leadership of Borough President Levine and Board Chair Kyle Athayde. I'm a member of the Executive Board of CB6 and Chair of the Board's Youth and Education Committee.

I want to thank Districting Commission Chair Wolcott and the Commission members for inviting us to speak tonight.

I'm here to strongly support the Resolution passed by Manhattan Community Board Six, for which I voted, and the concurrent Resolution passed by Community Board Eight, both in opposition to the proposed redistricting and supporting the presented alternative. I also echo the sentiments of my friends and neighbors in Midtown Manhattan about being "relocated" to another Borough.

I am here specifically to discuss the potential impact of the proposed Redistricting on five public, elementary and middle schools currently in CD5 and very ably represented by Council Member Julie Menen.

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Hello. My name is June Martin and I live at West 56th Street between 8th & 9th Avenues. I have lived here for over 30 years.

I am asking the Commission to keep Hell's Kitchen intact in a single Council District. On July 15, 2022, the New York City Districting Commission released it's proposed new district maps as a result of the 2020 Census. This proposal breaks the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood apart into 3 different Council Districts.

Hell's Kitchen is widely recognized as running from 8th Avenue to the Hudson River from 34th Street to 59th Street. It has a long colorful history and has been home to a long line of notables from Mickey Spillane to Mickey Rourke. It has served as a backdrop and inspiration for countless films like Taxi Driver and often turns up in Pop Culture books, comics, television, music and even video games.

Hell's Kitchen is known worldwide as a distinct neighborhood full of diversity - diversity of ethnicity, diversity of age, diversity of religion, diversity of race, diversity of economic status. The multitude of local restaurants from Peruvian to Ethiopian, the artists that live and work here and the many small businesses that support this community draw visitors from all corners of the globe. Hell's Kitchen is a unique gem and needs to stay that way.

One of the most unique characteristics of Hell's Kitchen is it's low rise residential aspect. This is a result of the Clinton Special District Zoning of which Hell's Kitchen is a part. The purpose of the Special District is to preserve the residential character of the community and promote public health, safety and general welfare. To accomplish this, construction in the area is required to keep in character with the existing scale of the community. This has allowed the preservation of lower rise buildings and the maintenance of open sky.

The diversity of Hell's Kitchen along with it's livability thanks to the Clinton Special District Zoning fosters a strong camaraderie within our community.

The City Council District lines proposed by the Districting Commission on July 15, 2022 will dilute the diversity of Hell's Kitchen as well as dilute the power of the community to retain it's Special District character by splitting the community into three parts. As a long time resident, I do not want unfettered development of high rise development and loss of the small businesses that make Hell's Kitchen what it is.

There is a better map that preserves our diversity and maintains the character of our neighborhood.

The Unity Map was released on July 18 by a coalition of the leading legal voting rights advocacy organizations. It reflects the fact that the white population of City Council District 3 generally and Hell's Kitchen in particular has decreased in percentage terms since the 2010 census. Additionally, the Latinx, Black and Asian populations in City Council District 3 has increased.

Combining Hell's Kitchen into one City Council District instead of dividing the neighborhood into three parts will bring minority representation into better balance across the entirety of City Council District 3.

Thus, I ask you to adopt the Unity Map for City Council District 3 to keep Hell's Kitchen whole and preserve our diversity and community cohesion. I've attached a copy of the map with my written testimony.

I am writing to you in your capacity as the Chair NYC Districting Commission/

The plan presented for 54 blocks of the Upper East Side and Roosevelt Island is not acceptable to the residents of the East Sixties. We believe it violates the charter requirements of keeping neighborhoods compact and in tack This plan would make CD26 an oddly shaped district with practical difficulties: they are - would the Council Member have a district office in Manhattan as well as on Roosevelt Island; would the Council Member cover Community Board meetings in Board 8 & 6 and have full membership on both Borough Boards, and finally we believe this part of Community District 8 would have a diminution of representation. While other Districts have physical boundaries in more than one borough, they are directly adjacent to one another. They do not have a river separating them as in this proposed plan. The issues in CD26 are not the same as in CD5. There are several well-established neighborhood associations whose membership would be torn asunder.

The issues that involve City Agencies such as Transportation, Sanitation, Parks etc. are different in the two council districts. Then there are two other major issues that would tear our community apart. The **first** is the hospital corridor with their buildings for the major institutions many of which would be in CD26 under the new plan. But many of their offices and allied buildings and staff and doctors would be located in/or live in CD5 making it difficult for discussing issues constantly arising. The **second** is Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 51 Districts for the least amount of park space in the city. This plan would remove: 24 Sycamores Park; ¾ of Honey Locust Park—with ¼ remaining in D5; most of our East River Esplanade and Andrew Haswell Green Park Phase 1 & 2A—2B is under construction at this time. Phase 3 has not yet started and will likely cost \$25 Million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the voters in her/his District? Most of the funding will probably be spent in the Queens part of the district. **This would result in CD 5 having the least amount of Park space in NYC.**

We strongly recommend that you study and implement Community Board 8's resolution and plan, as it takes into account the number of residents in all the adjourning districts.

Our Neighborhood Association depends greatly on our Council Member and her office staff, which is easy to reach by a short bus ride. I strongly urge the New York City Districting Commission to reconsider this ill-conceived plan and not divide an indivisible and cohesive neighborhood.

My name is Kathy Jolowicz. I am president of a 50-year-old Block Association, the East 83/84th Street Block Association, spanning 16 blocks, from 2nd to 5th Avenues. For decades this organization has been split between the City Council Districts 4 and 5 at Lexington Avenue. Thus, many residents do not know who their representatives really are, and are confused as to whom they should go about addressing an issue.

The newly proposed 4th District stretches from Peter Cooper Village and Stuyvesant Town, Waterside Plaza, Murray Hill, Garment District, Tudor City, Turtle Bay, Times Square, Koreatown, Midtown East, Midtown West, Sutton Place, to Central Park South, where it then resembles a "hallway" through the Upper East Side all the way up through Carnegie Hill.

District 5's newly proposed boundaries covers, parts of Sutton Place and Lenox Hill; Yorkville and parts of the Upper East Side and Carnegie Hill, extending across the East River to another borough, of Queens.

#Combining communities that share common issues would be more productively represented under one council person's umbrella, rather than using statistics alone. Yorkville/Upper East Side share a common interest for example, the vibrant and sometimes explosive east west 86th Street Corridor from River to Park. This concern also extends north and south of the subway stop, and busy shopping street as well.

Extending the 5th Council District's boundaries westward to 5th Avenue from Lexington, with the east boundaries reaching the East River including Roosevelt Island, and starting from Central Park South up through UES/Yorkville to all of Carnegie Hill, instead of expanding eastward into the borough of Queens, with which the community of this section of Manhattan, has nothing in common, looks unintelligent.

This would leave the 4th District to begin at Central Park South to stretch southward instead if northward. The Councilmember would then not be spread so thin, which makes it difficult, in some cases, to juggle different community issues simultaneously, deeming that person unable to concentrate, and give the intense focus necessary for each issue. The same would apply to the 5th Council District leader who would have to engage in Queens's community issues, also being forced to be spread thin.

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. I would like to express my opinion on the proposal to redistrict Roosevelt Island (zip code 10044). It does not make sense to me.

I am a resident of Roosevelt Island since 1979. We are a diverse neighborhood with a population of almost 12,000 (per Census 2020). Roosevelt Island has developed and grown over the years I have lived here. That did not come easy, but with much intense representation from our Council person, other officials, and community representation to ensure the community needs were considered. Our Council person often set up an office on the island and knew our community and the needs well. Other elected officials also went to bat for us over the years.

We are a community with a wide breadth of people and needs -- upper, middle and low-income populations including seniors, disabled, single parents, youth as well as a large United Nations representation. We are also a community run by a complex leadership structure that includes local leadership, city, and state entities. Trusting relationships need to be built and sustained in order to see movement forward on any project here on the island. Often, community concerns have to championed. Our past representation has spent the time, energy and resources to do this.

I am not in favor of this redistricting change for several reasons:

- I am concerned that we will lose the continuity and the history of 47 years of representation that we
 have had in the past to address the concerns of this community. For example, It took great effort upon
 officials and community alike to ensure that community concerns and ideas were considered during
 the first phase of building Cornell's campus. I hear Cornell is going to build a second phase in the near
 future. Attention will be needed again to ensure the community concerns are responded to in this
 next phase, too.
- It appears the plan splits up the East Side of Manhattan. In addition to other neighborhoods subject to change, our Tram is planted firmly in Manhattan. That is not changing. Our representatives fought for monies that enabled us to buy a new Tram when our 30 year-old tram was in need of replacement. More recently, a new working elevator has been completed and the plaza around it replaced. What will the tram be considered -- Queens or Manhattan? Where will monies come from for needs in the future? Currently, we are fighting to have OMNY at the Tram turnstiles.

- There are many programs on the island that impact seniors and youth that I believe are paid for out of funding that comes from discretionary funds of our representatives. Will those programs continue or will we lose that funding due to District 26 discretionary funding already committed to other priorities.
- Roosevelt Island is a subway stop on the MTA system -- will that be Queens or Manhattan jurisdiction? Who will oversee the issues related to this station?
- The flow and activity of the island's population is more connected to Manhattan than Queens. Trains are almost empty going to Queens and most of our people traffic is toward Manhattan during rush hour. Most are employed in Manhattan.
- How can part of Queens exist on Manhattan as the medical community and Sutton Place are also included in this redistricting? I thought that a borough could not be split that way according to the City Charter? So does that mean a proposed change in the City Charter is also being considered?
- What about our school on the island and the projects they need funding for? Where will that come from?

These are just a few concerns that I think warrant consideration. I am concerned that the quality of life for all Roosevelt Islanders could decline if some programs and systems are not supported due to lack of funding. This will take away from the vibrancy of this community. If this happens, we might no longer be an option people choose to live in. Worse, people could leave.

Queens is a great borough with a vast richness of cultures, which I love. My concern is that we may become the new kid on the block that could easily get overlooked given already established district 26 priorities and lack of relationship with the powers that be related to Roosevelt Island.

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

I have lived at the Parc Vendôme (333/353 West 56 and 340/350 West 57) since 1985. I have served on my Condominium's Board of Managers for 22 years. I understand the importance of community service and giving back. 10 years ago I began attending Community Board meetings and met Hell's Kitchen neighbors who feel as I do. I've met our elected representatives and have tried to assist those that I work with. I have learned that a property is enhanced by what happens outside of our walls. 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Everyone who lives in Hell's Kitchen knows that our community runs west of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River between West 34th Street and West 59th Street.

The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multiracial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

That is why we support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole.

As a 13-year resident of the historic village of Harlem in Upper Manhattan, I write to urge you to maintain the integrity of the Council District and its representation in the legislative body. For decades, Black Manhattanites have been marginalized and forced out of their homes. It is well documented that the thriving Black neighborhoods of Seneca Village and San Juan Hill were obliterated for the sake of undermining and erasing the political power and economic progress of Black society in New York's most popular and recognized borough. This year's decennial review must not, in any way, threaten the only true opportunity to have Black representation in the Council's Manhattan delegation. Thus, I request that Harlem's current Council district lines not be disturbed in any way that would hinder or weaken Black representation in New York City. Specifically:

While relieved that the NYC Council Districts Preliminary Maps do not exclude the Polo Grounds, Ralph J. Rangel Houses, and Holcombe Rucker Playground we are now faced with deep concern for the southern tip of Harlem. The preliminary plan calls for the removal of The Heritage at Schomburg Plaza, Clinton Houses, Lehman Houses and Lakeview Apartments – all a part and unique to historic Harlem. These sites signify history, honor leaders, and are the fabric of cultural education and community and should not be excluded.

- ► Schomburg Plaza, an apartment complex at the northeast corner of Central Park with two octagon-shaped 35-story towers on Fifth Avenue and one 11-story rectangular slab on Madison Avenue, was named after writer and activist Arthur Schomburg, a Black Puerto Rican, who settled in Harlem and developed a famous book collection as well as other materials about blacks. The housing development had world-famous tragedies but was also known for hard-working residents, producing outstanding public leaders like Bill Perkins and William Allen-two of only three Black men to serve as a county elections chief for Manhattan.
- Clinton Houses and Lehman Houses, owned and operated by the New York City Housing Authority, are culturally connected to historic Harlem in community interests and marginalization. In 2014, Clinton tenants sued NYCHA for negligence resulting in disrepair and public health hazards. Lehman Houses had similar challenges.
- ▶ At the most southern end of the four developments that serve as historic Harlem front doors is Lakeview Apartments. Lakeview was saved from losing its Mitchell-Lama status. For all four housing developments, Duke Ellington Circle, named in 1995 after the great jazz artist who lived in Harlem and The Africa Center, just opening, are at their doorsteps and serve as a grand entrance into historic Harlem.

Another beautiful opening to historic Harlem is the Harlem Meer in Central Park. The lake was transformed from a large, untamed swamp, into the centerpiece of New York's Central Park in 1857. Institutions like Boys & Girls Harbor, a new museum that celebrates the importance of African heritage and a monument of Duke Ellington at his piano, neatly provide a ribbon for the first blocks of historic Harlem as well as it political, racial and cultural composition. The very gate of the northern end of Central Park gives entrance to the Harlem Meer (dedicated last year and named the Exonerated) and honors the five young men who were wrongfully accused and convicted of the heinous rape of the "Central Park Jogger" (which occurred nearby). Three of these five resilient, (now) men lived and still have family in The Heritage at Schomburg Plaza. The tragedy and later exoneration of these men still resonate throughout and for Black families that are raising Black boys into men. The exoneration and the naming of the gate is a recognition of a community struggle to recognize the injustice that have been historic for Blacks in Harlem and in America.

In conclusion, in order to honor and preserve the history, historic leaders, culture, community, and education of Harlem I request that these sites not be excluded.

To The New York City Redistricting Commission:

I have lived on the UES for over 50 years and raised our two daughters here. Over those years I have seen our community and grow and change. The City Council Members who were elected by UES and Roosevelt Island allowed us to concentrate our energy in insuring the needs of our community were met despite efforts by various interest groups to pressure through changes which would dilute our sense of community and affect our quality of life.

I have been involved in the East River Esplanade, the restoration of the John Jay Park, projects which I doubt would have received the same attention for a park's starved UES, if the Council District priorities would have to be worked out with a equal sized Queens community. Both communities have legitimate interests but priorities of each community will differ and dilute our ability to get things done.

Congestion pricing is more of a concern to UES, whose neighborhoods are on the front lines. The push to build higher, and add density in one of the densest neighborhoods with an already stressed public transportation system, is likely to be a more urgent concern in the UES than in the area of Queens that would be included.

The issue of dealing with the new alternative means of transportation is a two edged sword. It allows ease of moving around, but is lightly regulated and presents a threat to pedestrians that is not adequately recognized. Our large senior population and the volume and variety of means of transportation used on the UES makes this an urgent problem here. I doubt the importance and urgency of it would be shared by our Queens neighbors.

Our Queens neighbors and our UES side community both have legitimate concerns. Neither would be well served by having a district where the city council member would have to juggle between the priorities of both communities. Both communities should be kept intact in their existing districts were they have a better chance of having their views heard and concerns addressed.



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The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multiracial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

That is why we support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole.

On a personal note. I have lived in Hell's Kitchen for over 30 years. My son grew up here. Coincidently mother, the daughter of poor immigrants, was born and baptized here. each other here, schools, parks, buildings, shops. To politically separate out this district goes against the grain.

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Among those institutions directly impacted by the proposed new lines are: Hospital for Special Surgery, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York Presbyterian/Weill Cornell, Schwarzman Animal Medical Center, Rockefeller University and Cornell Tech. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 59 Districts with the least amount of public park space. This plan would remove 24 Sycamores Park, most of Honey Locust Park, most of the East River Esplanade, and all of Andrew Haswell Green Park (AHG). AHG Phase 3 of the park will likely cost 25 million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the residents/voters in her/his District? Not to mention that the parks that move to CD#26 Queens will have a different Borough Commissioner from the sections that remain in CD5.

Third and finally, this oddly shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents. We refer you to the resolution passed by Community Board 8 disapproving the redistricting commission's map and refer you to the map proposed by Community Board 8's resolution, which would result in District 4 having a population of 177,446 and District 5 a population of 177,176 etc.

In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and not adopt the proposed districts referenced above.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

That is why we support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole.

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. 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Everyone who lives in Hell's Kitchen knows that our community runs west of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River between West 34th Street and West 59th Street.

The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multiracial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

Notably, will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts 6 & 8 and Roosevelt Island? Will a Queens Council Member send representation to two additional Manhattan Community Boards? Will a Queens Council Member hold full membership on two Borough Boards? What is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting? Manhattan and Queens residents may hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy including, but not limited to, congestion pricing. Which position will a Queens Council Member adopt?

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Among those institutions directly impacted by the proposed new lines are: Hospital for Special Surgery, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York Presbyterian/Weill Cornell, Schwarzman Animal Medical Center, Rockefeller University and Cornell Tech. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 59 Districts with the least amount of public park space. This plan would remove 24 Sycamores Park, most of Honey Locust Park, most of the East River Esplanade, and all of Andrew Haswell Green Park (AHG). AHG Phase 3 of the park will likely cost 25 million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the residents/voters in her/his District? Not to mention that the parks that move to CD#26 Queens will have a different Borough Commissioner from the sections that remain in CD5.

Third and finally, this oddly shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents. We refer you to the resolution passed by Community Board 8 disapproving the redistricting commission's map and refer you to the map proposed by Community Board 8's resolution, which would result in District 4 having a population of 177,446 and District 5 a population of 177,176 etc.

In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and not adopt the proposed districts referenced above.

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Dear NYC Redistricting Commission,

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

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Everyone who lives in Hell's Kitchen knows that our community runs west of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River between West 34th Street and West 59th Street.

The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multiracial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

That is why we support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole.

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Dear NYC Redistricting Commission,

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

- Give CD5 back Roosevelt Island, Sutton Area, and the parts in the East 60's and 70s, with minor modification of the area just south of 79th so the new line would be 78th (Lexington to 3rd) and 77th (3rd-2nd).
- Keep the previous district lines for CD4 and CD5 along Lexington from 79th up to 96th.
- Give Council District 8 all of the area north of 96th Street from CD4 and CD5.

Dear NYC Redistricting Commission,

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

I live in City Council District 5 and I write to urge the Redistricting Commission to reject the proposed reconfiguration of City Council Districts 5 and 26 and to keep the present City Council District 5 intact. At the very least, City Council District 5, however reconfigured, should remain entirely within the geographic boundary lines of the Borough of Manhattan.

The proposed reconfigured Council Districts 5 and 26 would move a portion of an Upper East Side Manhattan neighborhood into a Queens City Council District. The majority of constituents in the reconfigured District 26 reside in Queens.

This defies common sense. The Manhattan neighborhood and the Queens portion of the proposed District 26 are not adjacent; they are separated by a RIVER. To travel from the Manhattan neighborhood to the Queens District one must board a ferry or cross a bridge. Presumably, the City Council member of this proposed District 26 will set up an office in Queens, thus requiring the Manhattan residents to take two subways or some combination of subways and buses to interact with the Council member or staff in person. Creating this burden on the Manhattan constituents is unacceptable.

It is stating the obvious that the concerns of the constituents in Queens will frequently differ from and in fact be at odds with the concerns of those in the Manhattan neighborhood, who will be in the minority. Take, for example, the issue of congestion pricing for vehicles traveling into Manhattan from Queens. Similarly, Manhattan and Queens residents may have different views about the regulation of e-bicycles and e-scooters.

Moreover, the Manhattan neighborhood in question contains a portion of the East River Esplanade, a vital public recreational space for the residents of the Upper East Side and East Harlem. Manhattan City Council members whose districts include the East River Esplanade have consistently devoted themselves in time and money to maintaining and improving this valuable walkway parkland. It is difficult to imagine a City Council member, most of whose constituents reside in Queens, being motivated to continue such devotion.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multiracial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

Dear NYC Redistricting Commission,

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

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Good Evening Members of the New York City Districting Committee.

I am testifying to urge you to "Keep Hell's Kitchen Whole"

I support the Map, presented by the <u>Unity Map Coalition</u>, that would Keep Hell's Kitchen Whole and in Council District 3.

My name is Sandra Nance. I live in Hell's Kitchen at 484 West 43rd Street, New York City.

I have lived in Hell's Kitchen for over 45 years. The City Council District I have lived in all these years is District Council 3, represented by one City Council Member.

I am a member of the Hell's Kitchen Democrats; my Union is Actors Equity Association; and I am a preservation activist. In 1981, I co-founded the Committee to Save the Theatres which was a theatre preservation campaign, to save The Helen Hayes and Morosco Theatres from demolition, and took on the work to save all the free-standing Broadway Theatres under landmarks protection. In this campaign we lost The Helen Hayes and Morosco theatres. But 10 years later we won the war when the City of New York landmarked all the remaining Broadway Theatres.

This kind of effort doesn't happen all by itself. It depended on the hard and persistent work of theatre workers all over the metropolitan area, across the country, and the boots on the ground of theatre workers living in "The Dance Belt". A powerful political voice depends on the synergy of many individuals who care enough to keep doing the work and have an interest in doing the work. And we have that in Hell's Kitchen. The Broadway Theatres are in our District, or right next door. Our Unions are in our District or nearby. Our craftspeople and professional services are in our District or very close by.

¹In **2010** our area became the focus of a Research Study initiated by the RESEARCH CENTER FOR ARTS AND CULTURE at Teachers College Columbia University, to

assess the needs of aging performing artists. The ensuing Survey Study was presented to the Community in 2011 at a meeting in St. Luke's Roosevelt Hospital. I am not going to enter this entire study into the record, but I would like to quote an answer on page 7 to the question, WHY IS THIS RESEARCH IMPORTANT?²

To Quote: "Through intergenerational, interdisciplinary, inter-cultural collaborative efforts with professional aging artists, [...] we can illuminate the experience of those who would make art as professionals, as well as those who are influenced by it."

From page 48, I quote: "In 2011, The Actors Fund, in partnership with Manhattan Plaza and Visiting Nurse Services of New York's Center for Home Care Policy, conducted a needs assessment of seniors in Manhattan Plaza and the surrounding neighborhoods….".³

In anticipation of a Naturally Occurring Retirement Community, the Study did not just assess the future needs of those of us who live in artist's housing like Manhattan Plaza, (where I live), but the Whole of what is Hell's Kitchen and the surrounding neighborhood of District 3.

It would be <u>painful</u> to dilute the kind of political weight we have in Hell's Kitchen. It would be <u>debilitating</u> to lay waste to the naturally occurring community The Study anticipated and which has come to pass.

We love that we have had an impact on the livability of the neighborhood, and the research shows that we have; shows that we don't just speak for ourselves. Our Hell's Kitchen neighbors never had an Actors Fund Coffee Hour until we came. But they've been holding onto Hell's Kitchen a long time before we got here. My neighbors, the Italian ladies now growing older, the Greek and Puerto Rican families I moved into Manhattan Plaza with, are repeated throughout the neighborhood. And it appears we will be welcoming more.

Because look at us: we are a mash-up of colors and ethnicities, backgrounds and professions, ages and genders. We are a neighborhood of pizza parlors and stagehands. By just looking, you won't be able to pick out who is the usher and who is the dry cleaner; who owns the Afghan restaurant down the block and who is starring on Broadway; who is the fat lady who does specialty background work in Woody Allen films, and who is the old lady who has lived here, in the same apartment, on the same block, all her life.

All of this will be maintained best, by keeping our community whole, Whole as a Village. And you, the New York City Districting Committee, can help us do that.

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Among those institutions directly impacted by the proposed new lines are: Hospital for Special Surgery, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York Presbyterian/Weill Cornell, Animal Medical Center, Rockefeller University and Cornell Tech. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Third and finally, this oddly-shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents.

Hell's Kitchen is a diverse and unique and cohesive community. To preserve a Manhattan community that is interesting, cohesive, diverse and caring is particularly important especially since the residential parts of Hell's Kitchen sit near highly commercial areas that are simply not neighborhoods.

We in Hell's Kitchen deserve to be recognized as a community, a neighborhood, a residential section of midtown Manhattan that welcomes people of all backgrounds, ages, and interests. Why would anyone want to dismantle our home? I know the last sentence sounds hyperbolic, but to me, to my neighbors and friends, this neighborhood is home. 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I still support the effort to re-unify the core of Hell's Kitchen into District 3, where our buildings had previously been included. I understand the need to redistribute, but we are not just "census count" pawns — WE ARE ACTIVE MEMBERS OF THE WEST SIDE **COMMUNITY** and do not accept that our few short blocks could not be included in the west side districts of either District 3 or District 6.

Those of us who live at the Coliseum Park apartments, on West 58th and 60th Streets, between Columbus Circle and Ninth Avenue, are questioning the newest re-drawing of the district maps. Somehow, ONLY our few west side blocks were gerrymandered into a district that goes east. I would like those in charge to consider a more cohesive district. I feel our small area was ignored in favor of several other west side blocks.

In discussions with neighbors south of 57th Street, I was told that Council District 6 wanted to include a housing development on the west side — and therefore, moved the District 6 line down to 53rd Street, creating a "carve out" extension of District 6.

A more equitable plan would have made the dividing line across all streets between Columbus Circle and the river --- either drawn at 60th Street, for us to remain in District 3 or perhaps drawn at 56th or 57th Street. This grouping of streets would be a more cohesive line, which would then include **us** in West Side District 6.

I object to being "gerrymandered" into District 4.

Please make every effort to keep us in either District 3 or District 6, keeping us on the West Side of Manhattan, where we have ALWAYS been. Our area should not be just a narrow strip that was ignored in the newest fixes that keep District 3 cohesive. There is possibly a plan that will keep us on the West side -- we should not be a weirdly drawn extension of the east side of Manhattan.

- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 59 Districts with the least amount of public park space. This plan would remove 24 Sycamores Park, most of Honey Locust Park, most of the East River Esplanade, and all of Andrew Haswell Green Park (AHG). AHG Phase 3 of the park will likely cost 25 million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the residents/voters in her/his District? Not to mention that the parks that move to CD#26 Queens will have a different Borough Commissioner from the sections that remain in CD5.

Third and finally, this oddly shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents. We refer you to the resolution passed by Community Board 8 disapproving the redistricting commission's map and refer you to the map proposed by Community Board 8's resolution, which would result in District 4 having a population of 177,446 and District 5 a population of 177,176 etc.

I respectfully request that my opinion regarding Roosevelt Island redistricting should be considered at the hearing on August 22, 2022. <u>I strongly oppose</u> the proposed redistricting lines for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5, which includes Roosevelt Island.

Roosevelt Island is a unique residential community with close ties to educational and healthcare institutions in Manhattan. For example, Cornell University, Weill-Cornell Medical College, New York Presbyterian Hospital, Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, Marymount College, and Rockefeller University have all invested in the development of Roosevelt Island over at least two decades and have arranged for their students, trainees and employees and their families to live on Roosevelt Island in support of their important educational and healthcare activities in Manhattan.

Many of these institutions, along with the active civic and community organizations of Roosevelt Island, strongly supported the development of the fabulous Cornell Tech campus, which is still only about one-third complete. The development of Cornell Tech was agreed to in light of protections guaranteed for the Roosevelt Island community, which need to be maintained by the same vital City Council oversight moving forward.

Roosevelt Island has very little in common with Western Queens. The governance, public services, grounds maintenance, transportation, safety, security, environmental concerns and funding models for Roosevelt Island are unique, and the current situation has proven very effective in service of the community. The status quo should be maintained.

In addition, I believe that the proposed change is a direct violation of City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2).

The proposed redistricting would create unprecedented administrative and governance challenges that should be avoided. For example, the Queens member would need to send representatives to two Manhattan Community Boards and hold membership in two Borough Boards. Also, Queens and Manhattan residents are likely to differ on public policy issues. Manhattan residents in the Queens district would be at a disadvantage in participatory budgeting. Importantly, the loss of representation in District 5, where the Tramway is rooted, puts operation of this vital transportation link in jeopardy.

Roosevelt Island residents frequently call on Manhattan City Council Representatives for constituent services, such as for help in landlord/tenant matters, which are adjudicated in Manhattan landlord/tenant court. A Queens City Council Member will be unable to provide the level of effective aid needed in housing matters.

In summary, redistricting would serve neither the residents of Roosevelt Island, nor the residents of Queens. Considering all of the aforementioned, I stand in strong opposition to the redistricting proposal.

Everyone who lives in Hell's Kitchen knows that our community runs west of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River between West 34th Street and West 59th Street.

The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multiracial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Dear Chair Dennis Walcott,

I write to ask that the district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side, and all of Roosevelt Island not be adopted for the following reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where:

- neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- the proposed district is not compact,
- the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Second, the proposed districts will create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. Notably, will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts 6 & 8? Will a Queens Council Member send representation to two additional Manhattan Community Boards? Will a Queens Council Member hold full membership on two Borough Boards? What is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting? Manhattan and Queens residents may hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy including, but not limited to, congestion pricing. Which position will a Queens Council Member adopt?

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Third and finally, this oddly-shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents.

In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and not adopt the proposed districts referenced above. I thank you in advance for your consideration,


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



Because of the unique geographical location of the Clinton community, situated between the waterfront on the west and a growing central business district on the east, it is necessary to provide specific programs and regulations which will assure realization of community and citywide goals."

Chief among these goals, as stated in <a>City Zoning laws:

a) "to preserve and strengthen the residential character of the community"

- b) "to permit rehabilitation and new construction within the area in character with the existing scale of the community and at rental levels which will not substantially alter the mixture of income groups currently residing in the area"
- c) " to preserve the small-scale character and variety of existing stores and activities and to control new commercial uses in conformity with the existing character of the area"

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Regarding the proposed Redistricting Plan for present Manhattan District #5]:

The Plan threatens serious negatives.

- 1) It essentially transplants District 5 residents across the River—where we do not live. We eat, we shop, we socialize—here. Many of us have lived here for decades. We chose to live here. Not in Queens. We do not raise our children there. We have different parks and public schools. We have problems specific to our neighborhoods. In short, we are two very different areas, with different issues and needs.
- 2) As dissenting Commissioner Michael Schnall remarked on July 15 when the Commission approved the initial redistricting, "It is important that communities of interest should and must stay together." He also said, "It is equally important not to put together communities with competing interests."

 But this last would be the fate of the tear-off from District #5 when artificially joined to District #26.
- 3) The redistricting proposal disproportionately favors Queens.

 The ratio of Queens District 26 residents to transplanted Manhattan District 5 residents favors Queens and thus virtually assures that our interests are in great danger of being bypassed.
- **4)** If we are joined with District 26, the questions will be: To which side of the River should money go? Who is more needy? What is more vital?

Keep Hell's Kitchen Whole: Testimony to NYC Districting Commission, 22 August 2022

My name is Barbara Knecht. I live in Hell's Kitchen, Council District 3, at West 55th Street, at the corner of 9th Ave. I have lived here since 1988. I represent the West 55th St Block Association (created in 1978) on the Hell's Kitchen Neighborhood Coalition, and I am a member of the HK Dems. By profession, I am an architect and urban planner. I worked for the City of NY in the 1980's-90's, developing housing and social services programs for people experiencing homelessness. My ongoing work as a practitioner, educator and writer has been immersion in the analysis, development and livability of urban neighborhoods and cities.

I am here to speak in support of Keeping Hell's Kitchen Whole, and (therefore) in opposition to the preliminary redistricting map which splits the northern end of Hell's Kitchen among three council districts: the current District 3, the upper west side Council District 6, and the midtown business district/Upper East Side Council District 4.

I will make three brief points that speak to the requirements that guide redistricting.

First: Redistricting should keep neighborhoods and "Communities of Interest" intact. "Communities of Interest" self define and self identify; neighborhoods often have externally designed boundaries. In the case of Hell's Kitchen, the physical boundaries of the neighborhood are coincident with the Community of Interest. Hell's Kitchen is bounded by 8th Ave and the Hudson River, 34th St and the 57-59th St corridor. 9th Ave is its "main street" and 10th Ave its "working street." These commonly acknowledged boundaries of Hell's Kitchen are reinforced by every result in a Google search, as well as by the Special Clinton District established by the NYC Department of City Planning in 1973 to preserve the character and scale of the neighborhood.

9th Ave is characterized by its local businesses and restaurants. This food-centered and cohesive history of 9th Ave is exemplified by the Ninth Avenue International Food Festival founded in 1973 by the 9th Ave Association, the oldest and largest festival of its kind in NYC. A recent example of the strong Community of Interest is how dozens of neighborhood block associations, businesses, BIDs, alliances, individuals and institutions came together, in a matter of weeks, in

the Fall of 2020 to form the Hell's Kitchen Neighborhood Coalition to address pandemic related public safety.

Second: The currently proposed boundaries violate the Voting Rights Act of 1965 which this commission is bound to, by law, and by City Charter. According to the data collected by the NYC Office of City Planning and the NYC Districting Commission, the preliminary map will increase the White non-Hispanic population of our district and reduce the percentage of Hispanic, reduce the percentage of Black, and reduce the percentage of Asian, residents in our district. The net result would be to increase the overall population of White non-Hispanic voters. This clearly violates Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 which prohibits "minority vote dilution." This requirement is reiterated in the NYC Charter which calls for "the fair and effective representation of racial and minority groups in NYC which are protected by the United States voting rights act." NYC Charter 52(1)(b).

Third: The Special Clinton District, which shares north, west and east boundaries with Hell's Kitchen, was created in 1973 to preserve the character and scale of the neighborhood. The current redistricting proposal would severely compromise the ability to maintain that purpose. By siphoning off parts of the district to other council districts, it will adversely affect our ability to realize the goals of the special district to "protect the mixture of income groups currently residing in the area," "and promote and protect public health, safety, general welfare and amenity." As an example, it will split the local businesses – a hallmark of our neighborhood - on 9th and 10th Avenues among three council districts, thereby diluting their currently cohesive voice.

We understand that the population changes necessitate changing the boundaries of the council district, but it does not benefit anyone to break up an historically coherent neighborhood with robust associations and coalitions. The Unity Map represents the consensus of a coalition of legal voting rights advocacy organizations representing Hispanic, Black and Asian citizens and keeps our Hell's Kitchen and our Community of Interest intact. Adopting the Unity Map will allow Hell's Kitchen to coordinate with city agencies and our representatives as the unified entity it is.

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Thank you, commissioners, for giving me the opportunity to submit my testimony. My name is Ben Rosenfield, and I am a resident of District 7.

I am speaking primarily to applaud the commission's preliminary map. District 7 grows south by necessity, and the manner proposed makes sense. I would recommend only a slight change - that the district's southern border stop at 96th street, which is a large intersection and transit hub and makes sense as a natural border. The preliminary map marks the southern border at 95th street.

I will share some concerns about the amount of District 7's northern border that is lost to District 10. I am very concerned about the potential loss of Latino population in District 7. I believe this shift would have two major consequences: First, it would dilute the Latino vote and Latino representation in local government. Second, it would stretch our city's already limited resources by increasing the poverty in District 10 and increasing the wealth in District 7. None of us want to see either of these outcomes.

The Save the 160's map (https://districtr.org/plan/138688), which I support, resolves these issues while keeping both District 7 and District 10 within acceptable population margins. I urge the commission to adjust District 7's northern border accordingly. Specifically: District 7's northern border should extend to 165th Street, West of Fort Washington Avenue and to 163rd Street, West of Broadway.

I'll end by thanking the commission for other choices in the preliminary maps that maintain the integrity of District 7, including keeping Manhattan Valley part of District 7 and keeping Manhattanville Houses and Grant Houses part of District 7.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City

Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

That is why we support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole.

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Dear Commission Members,

I write to ask that the district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side and all of Roosevelt Island not be adopted for the following reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where:

- neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- the proposed district is not compact,
- the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Second, the proposed districts will create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. Notably, will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts 6 & 8? Will a Queens Council Member send representation to two additional Manhattan Community Boards? Will a Queens Council Member hold full membership on two Borough Boards? What is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting? Manhattan and Queens residents may hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy including, but not limited to, congestion pricing. Which position will a Queens Council Member adopt?

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Among those institutions directly impacted by the proposed new lines are: Hospital for Special Surgery, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York Presbyterian/Weill Cornell, Animal Medical Center, Rockefeller University and Cornell Tech. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Third and finally, this oddly-shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents.

In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and not adopt the proposed districts referenced above. Thank you for your hard work on this important project. My name is Catie Savage and I am a Hell's Kitchen resident who does not want to see my community split up into three different council districts.

I moved to the city for college in 2004 and have lived in Hell's Kitchen for the past 18 years after falling in love with this vibrant community on Manhattan's west side. Anyone who lives here knows our natural boundaries are from 34th to 59th streets from 8th Ave to the Hudson River.

As of the 2020 census, Hell's Kitchen is 18.8% Hispanic, 21.3% Asian, 7.8% Black and 4.7% Native American/non-white identifying. This makes up a 52.6% minority population in Hell's Kitchen. As my neighbors have mentioned, the draft map dilutes the vote of our majority minority neighborhood by making districts 3, 4 & 6 whiter than they currently are.

In a more practical sense, the draft map will have a detrimental impact on the cleanliness of our neighborhood. Currently, 9th avenue from 43rd to 57th streets and 10th avenue from 44th to 55th streets have supplemental cleaning services paid for with City Council discretionary funding under the NYC Cleanup Initiative.

If the proposed district lines hold, our community will have to get 3 council members to work together to allocate this funding to small portions or their larger districts. For example, both sides of 10th avenue from 44th to the south side of 49th street would be part of council district 3, the west side of 10th avenue from 49th to 55th would be in council district 6 and the east side of 10th ave from 49th to 55th would be in council district 4.

Cleanliness isn't the only issue at this critical corner of 49th St & 10th Ave. The Skyline Hotel, which is currently housing asylum seekers from Texas, would be in CD6 while PS111, the school many of the children are going to be enrolled in just 4 blocks away and across 10th ave would be in CD4. Those who get enrolled in PS51, 5 blocks south, will be in CD3.

It is hard enough to get one elected official to advocate for our community, but to expect three council members to work together to solve issues that criss-cross district lines all over our community is an unnecessary burden to residents who have already dealt with so much upheaval in the past 2 years due to the pandemic.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

Dear NYC Redistricting Commission,

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.



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I support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole!

Everyone who lives in Hell's Kitchen knows that our community runs west of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River between West 34th Street and West 59th Street.

The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multiracial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

That is why we support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole.

As a resident of the Upper East Side I am writing in opposition to the proposed redistricting plan which would divide the Upper East Side and draw a part of the Upper East Side and Roosevelt Island currently part of Council District 5 into Queens-based Council District 26. This proposed new districts would be a disservice to the residents of Manhattan, Roosevelt Island and Queens.

The draft proposal would violate the City Charter Districting Requirement by failing to keep neighborhoods and communities of interest intact, is not compact, would result in an extreme crossover district and is very oddly shaped. In fact, the prospered district would create a new crossover district between Queens and Manhattan for the first time since the Council was expanded to 51 members.

The proposed lines would separate many medical and research facilities from their current Manhattan location and place them in District 26 in Queens. This would make it seem as though the residents of Queens were well-served by large hospitals, even though the reality may be different.

A number of Parks including John Jay Park, Andrew Haswell Green Park and portions of the East River Esplanade would be separated from most of the residents who use them. These parks would become part of Queens District 26, while not being easily accessible to District 26 residents. This could impact critical investments in the repair and rehabilitation of these parks.

Three Upper East Side public elementary schools, P.S. 158, 183 and 217 would be negatively impacted by being placed in a majority Queens Council district, while still being attended by residents of the Upper East Side and remaining part of Manhattan School District 2..

Hunter College's main campus at 68th Street and Lexington Avenue, would be split into two separate districts. Indeed the Hunter College Skybridge connecting two buildings would be located in 2 different Council Districts under the current proposal.

The proposal would separate communities of interest in Queens and would dramatically change the demographics of the new District 26, changing a very diverse district into one that would have a plurality that would be approximately 40% white.

The current district 5 shares common interests and community concerns. The proposed redistricting plan would separate a single community of interest, of which Roosevelt Island is an integral part of Manhattan.

The proposed redistricting plan for District 5 and District 26 would do a disservice to the residents of Manhattan, Roosevelt Island and Queens and should be thrown out and a new plan proposed. For these reasons, I strongly oppose the proposed redistricting plan.

I write to ask that the district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side, and all of Roosevelt Island not be adopted for the following reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where:

- neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- the proposed district is not compact,
- the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Dear Redistricting Commissioners:

Since the start of the Pandemic Hell's Kitchen has been under siege, mainly because the City of New York has decided we are a "sacrifice zone," which is a euphemism for a dumping ground. The decision to place over 4000 homeless people, many of whom have serious substance abuse and mental health issues, in underused hotels has been a disaster for this area and for the Garment and Theater Districts. Apparently the City refuses to learn the obvious lessons from this experience since it continues to place new homeless shelters and concentrate social service facilities in an area that already has far more than its fair share.

Why did this happen? Why here? Why not share the pain? The answer, very simply, is that we lack the political power we need to defend our neighborhood. The Commission's proposed map will make the problem even worse: the largest part of Hell's Kitchen will have vastly reduced influence within the Third Council District, while the smaller portions will become minor appendages to districts that are much wealthier and less diverse than Hell's Kitchen as a whole. The proposed map may even violate the Voting Rights Act of 1965 by diminishing minority voting power.

Fortunately there is an immediate solution at hand: the Commission should adopt the Unity Map. The Unity Map preserves the great majority of Hell's Kitchen as part of the Third District, and maintains minority voting power. Ideally I'd prefer a line a few blocks to the North but the Unity Map is a good compromise that gives Hell's Kitchen a fighting chance.

I have lived in Hell's Kitchen for almost 45 years. I love this area, much of professional life has been centered here and most of my life savings are invested here, but I remember the Bad Old Days, and have no wish to see them return. Through my time here and my work with The West 44th Street Better Block Association and, more recently, the Hell's Kitchen Neighborhood Coalition I've learned that politicians only respond to voters who are part of a determined, unified group. The Commission has the opportunity to help us make our politicians do their jobs. Please don't make it easier for politicians to ignore us by slicing and dicing our neighborhood. Help us save Hell's Kitchen by adopting the Unity Map.

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The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multiracial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

I believe if you remove THE 160'S from district 7, it would have the effect of removing a molar from an existing healthy set of teeth, in my experience it would be a 40 year set back, and the consequences for us would be the onset of decay to the bridge and political infrastructure we have built in our community.

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Dear NYC Redistricting Commission,

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

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Everyone who lives in Hell's Kitchen knows that our community runs west of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River between West 34th Street and West 59th Street.

The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multiracial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

That is why we support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole.

Testimony to the New York City Redistricting Commission August 22, 2022

I am Jessica Lappin, an East Midtown resident and former City Council Member for the 5th District in Manhattan. I had the honor of representing Midtown East, Sutton Place, Turtle Bay, Lenox Hill, Yorkville, and Roosevelt Island from 2006-2014. Prior to that, I spent 8 years working as an aide and District Chief of Staff to NYC Council Speaker Gifford Miller, who represented the same district from 1996-2005.

As someone who has been actively engaged in the community for over 25 years, as both an elected official and a civic leader, I strongly oppose the version of the draft map for Council District #5. The proposed district map moves Roosevelt Island and a portion of the east side from East 79th Street to East 54th Street, east of First Avenue, from a Manhattan member to a Queens representative.

This doesn't make any sense. The Upper East Side is a community that shares common local interests and should be kept together, for purposes of local representation. First of all, as a former elected official, I know first hand the importance of offering accessible constituent services. My district office staff and I were helping residents on a daily basis with a myriad of issues relating to housing, sanitation, education, quality of life, transportation, and senior services. Having a local office where people could come in person for assistance, guidance, and support was crucial. Under this proposal, constituents who live on the Manhattan side of the new district would have to travel to Queens for help. This is neither fair nor practical.

Second, the East Side of the current district contains some of our city's most renowned hospitals and is often referred to as Bedpan Alley. Many of these institutions, like Memorial Sloan Kettering and New York-Cornell, have facilities and offices on both the east and west sides of First Avenue. And regardless of their addresses, hospitals and research facilities like the NY Blood Center, Rockefeller University, and the Hospital for Special Surgery work in concert on a variety of policy, staffing, and funding issues and should retain a singular representative.

Third, when it comes to our precious parks and open spaces, like the East River Esplanade, John Jay Park, the Queensboro Oval, 24 Sycamores, and the pocket parks along the river, they serve all Upper East siders. The Councilmember who represents the park users should also be the one to represent the parks themselves.

Fourth, when it comes to mass transit issues like M15 bus service and the Second Avenue Subway, the East Side is unified and unique. It makes no sense to lump East Siders in with residents in Queens who face different transit needs.



Fifth, I don't understand how three public elementary schools that serve East Side children and one on Roosevelt Island, could best be represented by a Queens Councilmember, when they are located within District 2 - like the other East Side public schools.

Sixth, there are nearly constant land use issues that arise along the East Side and past zoning and rezonings have taken the character of the entire area into account. Land Use is one of the most important roles of the City Council and when applications and issues arise, the same one Council Member should be talking to constituents, negotiating, and leading.

Lastly, while Roosevelt Island sits in the middle of the East River, it has always been considered part of Manhattan and part of Community Board 8. It is linked to Manhattan by the tram and the MTA's F train. Under this plan, both sides of the tram and the respective subway stations would be represented by different Council Members.

In summation, I strongly reject the proposed redistricting map for Council District #5. It will needlessly cut a community of interest in half and, as a result, disenfranchise the most eastern portion of the Upper East Side. I implore the Redistricting Commission to reconsider this proposal in order to keep the district whole, and represented by a Manhattan Councilmember who can better serve and advocate for their local community.

How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 59 Districts with the least amount of public park space. This plan would remove 24 Sycamores Park, most of Honey Locust Park, most of the East River Esplanade, and all of Andrew Haswell Green Park (AHG). AHG Phase 3 of the park will likely cost 25 million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the residents/voters in her/his District? Not to mention that the parks that move to CD#26 Queens will have a different Borough Commissioner from the sections that remain in CD5.

Third and finally, this oddly shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents. We refer you to the resolution passed by Community Board 8 disapproving the redistricting commission's map and refer you to the map proposed by Community Board 8's resolution, which would result in District 4 having a population of 177,446 and District 5 a population of 177,176 etc.

In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and not adopt the proposed districts referenced above.

My name is Joseph Benincasa. I am President and CEO of the Entertainment Community Fund headquartered in Times Square and serve on the Board of Directors of the Times Square Alliance where I chair the Budget & Finance Committee. I respectfully submit this testimony to urge the New York City Districting Commission to modify the redistricting map by extending the boundary lines for Council Districts 3 and 4 from Broadway and 42nd Street to Columbus Circle. This will create a more equitable representation for our commercial and cultural district.

The Times Square district, the area from 40th Street to 53rd Street between 6th and 8th Avenues, and Restaurant Row on 46th Street between 8th and 9th Avenues, comprise one of the City's most vital economic engines. The eastern portion of the district is largely characterized by office use and hotels and serves as a transition point between the Midtown East commercial core and the entertainment district west of Broadway, which includes the Theater District and more residential uses.

Times Square's western portion has been culturally and politically aligned with the Hell's Kitchen community for decades. However, in the current draft of the redistricting map, Times Square loses critical representation with constituencies west of Broadway. We believe a more equitable

solution can be achieved by continuing the boundary lines along Broadway from 42nd Street to Columbus Circle.

This will ensure the Times Square area can continue to work in partnership with and would establish an alignment of interests between residents, businesses, and the theater community, and be more representative of the diversity of these constituencies at the City Council, which has been vital to the success of Times Square for nearly a decade.

The partnership between Times Square and its surrounding communities has led to the successful passage of legislation that has eased pedestrian congestion, expanded public plazas, and improved the quality of life for people who live, work and visit the Times Square area.

It is critical that the City Council boundary lines be redrawn in a way that includes the diversity of commercial and residential interests that have helped make Times Square the economic engine it is today. It will also help ensure a more equitable recovery for the area in the years ahead.

I write to ask that the district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side, and all of Roosevelt Island not be adopted for the following reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where:

- neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- the proposed district is not compact,
- the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Second, the proposed districts will create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. Notably, will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts 6 & 8? My name is Kasey Spickard and I have been a resident of Hell's Kitchen for almost a decade living on 47th Street and 9th Avenue for the entirety of my life here.



I am a resident of District 7, and I am requesting that the redistricting commission SAVE THE 160's. Saving the 160's means that the lower 160's remain part of District 7 and do not become part of District 10. District 7's northern border should, at least, extend to 165th Street, West of Fort Washington Avenue and to 163rd Street, West of Broadway.

I am advocating for the map linked here: https://districtr.org/plan/138688.

I write to ask that the district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side, and all of Roosevelt Island not be adopted for the following reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where:

- neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- the proposed district is not compact,
- the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Second, the proposed districts will create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. Notably, will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts 6 & 8? Will a Queens Council Member send representation to two additional Manhattan Community Boards? Will a Queens Council Member hold full membership on two Borough Boards? What is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting? Manhattan and Queens residents may hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy including, but not limited to, congestion pricing. Which position will a Queens Council Member adopt?

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Third and finally, this oddly-shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents.

Here's a little bit about my personal story and why I feel so strongly that Hell's Kitchen is one, very cohesive community that should not be broken up.

I first moved to New York City in 2011 and lived in Washington Heights for five years. Then Park Slope for two and a half years. It was not until I moved to Hell's Kitchen in late 2019, just three years ago, that I felt I was living in a true COMMUNITY. I immediately felt it as soon as I moved here, and throughout the pandemic. Neighbors started talking to

me on the street, and I've gotten close with business owners as well. I became aware of our many local community organizations, and am now an active member on the board of Hell's Kitchen Democrats, a political organization, and we have many more very active community betterment organizations, for example Hell's Kitchen Litter Legion, helping to keep our streets clean, and Hell's Kitchen Free Store for neighbors helping neighbors, and many traditions such as the 9th Avenue Food Festival. I talked to a family this year who travels in from New Jersey every year with their kids to attend this food festival. We even have several Facebook groups for the community, including Hell's Kitchen Neighbors and The Real Dogs of Hell's Kitchen for local dog owners.

I have also become close with local businesses. They had unique needs during the pandemic. For example, the owners of a Hell's Kitchen Thai restaurant with two locations in Hell's Kitchen told me they had to close one because they were no longer getting business from theater goers, sending some employees back to Thailand.

Hell's Kitchen also faced some serious concerns when a disproportionate number of homeless were relocated to very concentrated areas in our district compared to other districts, which created a poor situation for Hell's Kitchen residents and shelter residents alike. Residents banded together and were able to push back and work to expedite the return of residents back to shelters where they can get better medical and social services than the temporary solution offered by hotels (this complex issue discussed well in this article

I know you will hear from people who have been in Hell's Kitchen 20-30 years, so I wanted to offer this unique perspective of someone who was recently an outsider, and now as a resident has been fully embraced by this neighborhood and its amazing community. I was shocked at the level of community engagement and involvement this neighborhood has. This was completely unexpected and has changed me from someone who did not actively engage in my local neighborhood, to someone who is eager to be involved, talk to neighbors, and support local businesses.

Hell's Kitchen acts as one, and I strongly believe our vibrant and cohesive community needs to be represented within one district.

My name is Christine Gorman. I live at West 55th Street between Eighth and Ninth Avenues. I have lived in Hell's Kitchen for more than 30 years. I am the president of Hell's Kitchen Democrats, president of the West 55th Street Block Association and a founding member of the Hell's Kitchen Neighborhood Coalition.

There are a lot of people who couldn't get a speaking time tonight either in person or on Zoom and who are here in the room with me at the Schomburg Center and I want to take a moment to recognize them.

I would also like to acknowledge our City Council Member, Erik Bottcher, who is standing in solidarity with us tonight.

You will hear many reasons tonight why Hell's Kitchen is a special place that deserves to be kept whole. You will also hear that ALL of us support the Unity Map for City Council District 3 as a way to preserve our diversity and keep Hell's Kitchen whole.

Hell's Kitchen is a historic district, dating from the 1880s. An attempt in 1959 to rename the neighborhood "Clinton" after a New York State governor never really took off.

Hell's Kitchen runs west of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River between West 34th Street and West 59th Street. Community Board 4 uses these boundaries, tourism guidebooks recognize these boundaries, the NYTimes, NY Daily News, NY Post and our own West 42nd Street Magazine all use these same boundaries.

I love how diverse my neighborhood is: in race and ethnicity, age and economic status, sexual orientation and gender identity.

We have come together tonight as a community to keep Hell's Kitchen whole. Just like we did back in the 1970s when we worked to create the Special Clinton district, which to this day preserves the low-rise residential character of Hell's Kitchen and allows our small businesses to thrive.

The 2013 City Council map placed most of Hell's Kitchen in one district – CD-3. The Commission's preliminary map, however, slices Hell's Kitchen into three major chunks.

This would be like taking a giant wrecking ball to our community. The Special Clinton District won't be the main focus of any single City Council member, making it easier for developers to pick it apart.

The Unity map for CD-3 runs from West 57th in the north with a couple, small southward jogs to the Hudson River, along Broadway and parts of Fifth and Sixth Avenues to the East and Clarkson Street in the South.

It would include most of Hell's Kitchen as well as the Special Clinton district.

Diversity. We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multi-racial communities now make up the majority of the population. But the preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting our political voice in direct violation of the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map **keeps ALL of Chelsea** in CD-3 but **splits up Hell's Kitchen** into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted, as the following tables show.

Small Business. Ninth and Tenth Avenues from the West 30s to the West 50s are the main commercial thoroughfares of Hell's Kitchen. A variety of


small businesses thrive along these two broad avenues, including restaurants, bars, hardware stores and lots of mom-and-pop shops.

The preliminary map would decimate the ability of our small businesses to work together with City Council.




Special Clinton District. Splitting Hell's Kitchen into three parts will make it easier for real estate developers to chip away at the Special Clinton District, which was created in 1973 and


- a) "to preserve and strengthen the residential character of the community"



Hello, my name is MARGO CATES. I reside in the Hudsonview Apartment at 747 10th Ave.

I have been a Hell's Kitchen resident for 36 years, and for a dozen of them I was also a CB4 member.

I am committed to having one strong unified district that in spite of the renovation and gentrification of this area, will continue to reflect any diversity in the neighborhood.

I believe this land should be kept whole (as seen in the UNITY MAP), and doing so is my request of the Commission.

I recall with affection just how diverse this neighborhood used to be -- a chunky mix of industrial, retail, service, and residential buildings, often side by side.

Although the 'hood has gotten sleeker over the years, the grit of some of its long time residents is stuck between the stones and bricks of the older buildings.

This area has the small off-off Broadway theaters where you as just an ordinary person might see the development of the most worthwhile audience-connected theater.

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Dear Commissioner Walcott,

I write to ask that the district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side and all of Roosevelt Island not be adopted for the following reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where:

- neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- the proposed district is not compact,
- the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Second, the proposed districts will create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. Notably, will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts 6 & 8? Will a Queens Council Member send representation to two additional Manhattan Community Boards? Will a Queens Council Member hold full membership on two Borough Boards? What is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting? Manhattan and Queens residents may hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy including, but not limited to, congestion pricing. Which position will a Queens Council Member adopt?

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Among those institutions directly impacted by the proposed new lines are: Hospital for Special Surgery, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York Presbyterian/Weill Cornell, Animal Medical Center, Rockefeller University and Cornell Tech. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Third and finally, this oddly-shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents.

In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and not adopt the proposed districts referenced above. My fellow residents and I stand ready to meet with Commission staff to address these matters and to propose alternatives. I thank you in advance for your consideration.

Testimony of Meryl Brodsky, District Leader

73rd Assembly District, Part A, to the New York City Council Districting Commission, to Amend the Proposed City Council District Lines to include at least East 60th to East 63rd Streets, from Lexington to Third Avenues in the 4th Council District, August 22, 2022, 5:30-9:00 p.m.

I. I am Meryl Brodsky, district leader in the 73rd Assembly District, Part A, that extends from East 63rd Street to East 32nd Street and comprises both Council Districts (CD) 4 and 5. The proposed lines, however, take me and parts of my district in the East 60s out of the 4th and into the 5th CD, which extends only to East 59th-60th Streets. This creates a cul-de-sac limiting access to Community Board (CB) 6 for those residing in CB 8 and limits access to CB 8 for those residing in CB 6. Historically, both council districts have shared open space, joint task forces and mutual concerns, including the overdevelopment of a tower at East 58th Street, the tramway, Manhattanhenge, expansion




of the FDR highway, pocket parks and the East 50s-60s esplanade. My district includes an intriguing mélange, unique commercial and residential venues, an array of UN emissaries consulates and embassies from 193 member states, restaurants of every ethnicity, taste or fancy, and Grand Central Station. I happily serve on the

boards of the Turtle Bay Association (TBA) and Friends of Dag Hammarskjold Plaza ("Friends") for more than 20 years. We share outdoor park events, block fairs and regularly testify before committees and subcommittees of the Council as well as CB 6 and 8. We work alongside the East Midtown Partnership (BID), and groups including the Sutton Place Community (SAC), and Murray Hill.

I request, at least, that my current election district, ED 36 (1,104 pop.) (12th Cong. Dist., 73rd AD, 4th CD), as well as many other EDs, remain in the 4th CD. Any ED lower than East 59th Street could be switched. For example, the 28th ED (1,275 pop.), encompassing Sutton Place, could be switched to the 5th, in exchange for the 36th ED in the 4th, thus extending the district to East 57th Street which covers community board 6 as well as 8. Here, the example adds 171 persons to district 5, with fewer persons, to meet the criteria of equal numbers.

MAP 1 There follows the reasons for my request for ED¹ changes. They are based on the



City Districting Commission's criteria in the New York City Charter, Chapter 2-A, Sections 50, 51, 52, or guidelines for evaluating "one person, one vote." Such parameters require equal numbers per district (172,882, 5% margin of error); racial equity; proportional partisan representation, etc. Further, each district must be (i) reasonably compact; and (ii) not oddly shaped, a red flag for gerrymandering. Due east, running south from 59th Street

along the East River to 14th Street, we have an "oddly-shaped" trapezoid including Peter Cooper Village and Stuyvesant Town, home to the current councilmember, which lacks "compactness." The western portion, extending from Central Park South to West 50s or loosely, Hell's kitchen, if taken together with the long extension running roughly from the Apple store at 5th Avenue and 59th Street to East 95th near the Central Park entrance, resembles a firearm, with cylinder, barrel and grip. If changes cannot be made, the whole configuration could be shot down.

I attend meetings of the CB#8 Voting Reform Task Force which deserves credit for putting redistricting on the front burner and a great resolution, keeping much of districts 4 and 5 intact. A similar resolution was approved by the CB#6 Budget & Governmental Affairs Committee. As an East Sixties Neighborhood Association member, I am pleased to hear advocacy for the East 60s as well as that of Chris Collins for the Sutton Place Conservancy in the East 50s. Note without the amazing assistance of Dan Kaminsky, Citizens Union Policy Manager, we would not have state-of-the-art instruction or interactive maps. Many thanks to everyone whose testimony we hope will have auspicious results.



Good day Chair Walcott,

The plan presented for 54 blocks of the Upper East Side and Roosevelt Island is not acceptable to the residents of the East Sixties. We believe it violates the charter requirements of keeping neighborhoods compact and in tack This plan would make CD26 an oddly shaped district with practical difficulties: they are - would the Council Member have a district office in Manhattan as well as on Roosevelt Island; would the Council Member cover Community Board meetings in Board 8 & 6 and have full membership on both Borough Boards, and finally we believe this part of Community District 8 would have a diminution of representation. While other Districts have physical boundaries in more than one borough, they are directly adjacent to one another. They do not have a river separating them as in this proposed plan. The issues in CD26 are not the same as in CD5. There are several well-established neighborhood associations whose membership would be torn as under.

The issues that involve City Agencies such as Transportation, Sanitation, Parks etc. are different in the two council districts. Then there are two other major issues that would tear our community apart. The **first** is the hospital corridor with their buildings for the major institutions many of which would be in CD26 under the new plan. But many of their offices and allied buildings and staff and doctors would be located in/or live in CD5 making it difficult for discussing issues constantly arising. The **second** is Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 51 Districts for the least amount of park space in the city. This plan would remove: 24 Sycamores Park; ¾ of Honey Locust Park—with ¼ remaining in D5; most of our East River Esplanade and Andrew Haswell Green Park Phase 1 & 2A—2B is under construction at this time. Phase 3 has not yet started and will likely cost \$25 Million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the voters in her/his District? Most of the funding will probably be spent in the Queens part of the district. **This would result in CD 5 having the least amount of Park space in NYC.**

We strongly recommend that you study and implement Community Board 8's resolution and plan, as it takes into account the number of residents in all the adjourning districts.

Our Neighborhood Association depends greatly on our Council Member and her office staff, which is easy to reach by a short bus ride. I strongly urge the New York City Districting Commission to reconsider this ill-conceived plan and not divide an indivisible and cohesive neighborhood.

Dear Chair Dennis Walcott,

I write to ask that the district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side, and all of Roosevelt Island not be adopted for the following reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where:

- neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- the proposed district is not compact,
- the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Second, the proposed districts will create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. Notably, will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts 6 & 8? Will a Queens Council Member send representation to two additional Manhattan Community Boards? Will a Queens Council Member hold full membership on two Borough Boards? What is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting? Manhattan and Queens residents may hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy including, but not limited to, congestion pricing. Which position will a Queens Council Member adopt?

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Third and finally, this oddly-shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents.

In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and not adopt the proposed districts referenced above. I thank you in advance for your consideration,

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The preliminary plan for City Council districts denies residents of Hell's Kitchen that representation, splitting the neighborhood across three districts (3, 4, and 6).

This proposal violates the New York City Charter. Chapter 2-A, Section 52(c) requires that the NYC Districting Commission "keep intact neighborhoods and communities with established ties of common interest and association, whether historical, racial, economic, ethnic, religious or other." Hell's Kitchen is undeniably a neighborhood with established ties of common interest for its residents and business community.

There is no justifiable reason that the NYC Districting Commission has to split Hell's Kitchen. The NYC Charter ranks the importance of the districting requirements and only two are more important than the requirement that neighborhoods be kept together: population equality and fair and effective representation of minorities. Population equality does not require the splitting of Hell's Kitchen—there are a multitude of district configurations that would leave Hell's Kitchen intact while ensuring population equality. And far from ensuring fair and effective representation of racial and language minorities, the splitting of Hell's Kitchen's minority community into three whiter districts where they have less of an opportunity to influence elections *undermines* their representation.

The NYC Districting Commission must reverse course and make Hell's Kitchen whole in order to comply with the NYC Charter and allow the people of Hell's Kitchen to have a representative who will look out for the interests of this community.

When I moved onto W. 45th Street in 1991 at the age of 35 I was well accustomed to adapting to new environments, I'd lived in13 different towns or cities, plus Manhattan in two other locations. In Hell's Kitchen I found a community for the first time in my life. And miraculously the community is diverse in terms of age, race, ethnicity, and economic levels. This is a rare and wonderful phenomenon! An urban planner's dream, and mine, too, coincidentally. I have no illusions that this vibrancy happened by accident, it is the direct result of the Clinton special zoning district. The fact that Hell's Kitchen buildings have remained at relatively low density and as largely affordable housing stock is undeniably a consequence of zoning restrictions against high rise development that would have displaced longtime residents and driven up housing prices to astronomical heights years ago.

It is crucial to keep the Clinton special zoning district in a single city council district, District 3, to protect and nurture it. And I would hope the city council cares about New York City's theater industry: prime tourist attraction, moneymaker, point of pride. Don't underestimate how important it is for there to be a place close to Broadway where people in all aspects of the theater can afford to live and work and corroborate. There's a symbiotic relationship here that merits consideration.

Fortunately we don't have to start the redistricting process over from scratch - the Unity Map already shows city council districts designed to preserve our neighborhood diversity and the Clinton special zoning district, and also fits into a jigsaw puzzle of surrounding districts that accomplish similar aims. I strongly encourage adoption of the Unity Map plan instead of the preliminary redistricting proposal before the city council.

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Everyone who lives in Hell's Kitchen knows that our community runs west of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River between West 34th Street and West 59th Street.

The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multi-racial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

That is why we support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole.

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To whom it may concern,

Our names are Rebecca Weintraub and Ben Wetzler. We are the Democratic Party District Leaders for the 76th Assembly District, Part A, which covers the southern portion of the Assembly District, including the Lenox Hill and Roosevelt Island neighborhoods. We are writing to express frustration and opposition to the draft map released by the New York City Districting Commission, which would divide our neighborhood between two council districts, compromising our constituents' ability to participate fully in the democratic process and potentially harming the quality of the public services they enjoy.

For the last ten years, and as long as either of us can remember, the 76th Assembly District has been almost entirely contained within the 5th Council District and Community Board 8. This continuity has worked well for the neighborhood, allowing both political party officials such as ourselves and State-level elected officials to build close working relationships with City-level officials. These relationships have translated into highly responsive representation at all levels of government.

The new proposed district boundaries for Council Districts 5 and 26 undermine those relationships, placing Roosevelt Island and a significant portion of Midtown East and Lenox Hill within the predominantly Queens-based District 26. The resulting lines are a mishmash of overlapping divisions: Council District 5 contains substantial portions of Assembly Districts 73, 76, and 68; Senate Districts 28 and 29; and Manhattan Community Boards 8, 5, and 11, while Council District 26 contains part of Assembly Districts 73, 76, 36, and 37; Senate Districts 28 and 59; Congressional Districts 12 and 7; Manhattan Community Boards 8 and 6; and Queens Community Boards 1 and 2. While we understand it is impossible for districts to always line up in their entirety, this level of incongruity will confuse voters and compromise elected officials' ability to build partnerships at different levels of government.

Less importantly, but still significant for us as party officials, this new arrangement will make it difficult for candidates for office to petition onto the ballot and campaign as a slate, therefore significantly increasing the demands on voters, volunteers, campaign staff, and the Board of Elections. This burden will be felt most by the least well-funded campaigns, who already struggle to reach voters and will not have the option to build economies of scale by partnering with other candidates.

Most importantly, these new boundaries will compromise public services by creating ambiguity as to which elected official is responsible for addressing resident's complaints along the new border. Many neighborhood schools will have catchment areas that cross district boundaries, and may end up deprioritized relative to schools serving only a single district when the Council allocates discretionary funds. Bus stops, bicycle safety improvements, and other transportation infrastructure that has been a high priority for neighborhood advocates will be split between the two districts, as the proposed boundary moves between York, 1st, and 2nd Avenues. The three stops on the F train closest to Roosevelt Island will each be located in a different Council District - as will the two stops on the Roosevelt Island Tramway - adding to the current struggle to get the City and State to address the Island's unique transportation needs.

Actions taken by the City that go through the Uniform Land Use Review Procedure (ULURP) will be unnecessarily confusing, leading to arbitrary and uncoordinated planning decisions. Because the boundaries do not line up with the very neat and ordered street grid of the Upper East Side, it is likely that planning actions undertaken by the City will cross multiple Council Districts and leave community members without a single representative as point of contact on the Council. Similarly, Council Members may find themselves receiving duplicative, incomplete, or potentially contradictory input from multiple groups of community stakeholders.

We believe that the boundaries need to be reassessed, with Lenox Hill and Roosevelt Island placed squarely in one or the other of the two districts - ideally the 5th, where we have been for decades and which most closely aligns with the neighborhood's representation at other levels of government. I am a professional stage manager, a vice-president of the West 44th St Better Block Association, and a past -president of the West 45th Street Block Association.

Hell's Kitchen is undeniably a cohesive, unique, and vibrant community. We are identified from 41st to 59th as the Special Clinton District Zone, and from 40th to 35th at the Paddy's Market Historic District. Dear Commissioner

I write to ask that the district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side and all of Roosevelt Island not be adopted for the following reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where:

- neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- the proposed district is not compact,
- the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Second, the proposed districts will create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. Notably, will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan

Community Districts 6 & 8? Will a Queens Council Member send representation to two additional Manhattan Community Boards? Will a Queens Council Member hold full membership on two Borough Boards? What is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting? Manhattan and Queens residents may hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy including, but not limited to, congestion pricing. Which position will a Queens Council Member adopt?

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Among those institutions directly impacted by the proposed new lines are: Hospital for Special Surgery, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York Presbyterian/Weill Cornell, Animal Medical Center, Rockefeller University and Cornell Tech. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Third and finally, this oddly-shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents.

In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and not adopt the proposed districts referenced above. Good morning.

My name is Robert Bianco and I live at 312 West 49th Street. I have worked in Hell's Kitchen for over 14 years. Since I moved to the neighborhood 3 years ago, my daily routine consists of walking 5 blocks to my Architectural design office located in the historic Film Center Building, grabbing lunch or a coffee at one of so many wonderful small business along 9th Avenue, and picking up fresh groceries on my way home at the Amish Market between West 49th and 50th streets. If the Commission's proposed map is adopted, this daily routine (which all takes place within a 5 block radius) would be split between THREE separate council districts!

My experience is not unique. Our neighborhood is full of artists who live within walking distance of their jobs. My neighbors are actors, musicians, stage managers, designers, and technicians who work at one of the many arts organizations in the area like Ars Nova, Ensemble Studio Theatre, or on Broadway, just steps away from Hell's Kitchen. What happens in the surrounding arts districts directly impacts our community and we should be included in the same Council District.

The city has recognized our community as unique in the past for its small scale character and for its close proximity to the theatre district. The **Special Clinton Zoning District** was established in 1973 with the following goals quoted from the city's Zoning text:

- to preserve and strengthen the residential character of the community;
- to permit rehabilitation and new construction within the area in character with the existing scale of the community at rental levels which will not substantially alter the mixture of income groups currently residing in the area;
- to preserve the <u>small-scale character</u> and variety of existing stores and activities and to <u>control new commercial</u> <u>uses</u> in conformity with the existing character of the area;

This Zoning text has worked. Each day, I look out from my office windows on the 12th floor of the Film Center Building to unobstructed sky and the collection of low-rise residential buildings where my friends, neighbors, and favorite local businesses reside. 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Everyone who lives in Hell's Kitchen knows that our community runs west of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River between West 34th Street and West 59th Street.

The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multiracial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

That is why we support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole.

I am a resident of District 7, and I am requesting that the redistricting commission SAVE THE 160's. Saving the 160's means that the lower 160's remain part of District 7 and do not become part of District 10. District 7's northern border should, at least, extend to 165th Street, West of Fort Washington Avenue and to 163rd Street, West of Broadway.

I am advocating for the map linked here: https://districtr.org/plan/138688.

Washington Heights has always been at the heart of District 7. Those of us who live in the lower 160's have formed our own small community—and together, we have a strong voice. United, we have been able to elect representatives who recognize our collective power and focus their attention on our needs. Divided, our community will be overshadowed by the communities just north of us.

In the last election, voters in the 160's cast their vote for our current council member, Shaun Abreu. Because our community makes up a meaningful percentage of the vote, we have been able to ask our council member for meaningful investments in our community. These investments include:

- \$1.2 million dollars to upgrade and revitalize Lily Brown Playground, located between 162nd and 163rd and Riverside Drive.

Testimony for the New York City Council Re-districting Commission

Sheila O'Connor 9th Avenue, 3RS New York, NY 10036

Good evening, my name is Sheila O'Connor and I live at 9th Avenue, between 45th and 46th Streets in Hell's Kitchen. I have lived in Hell's Kitchen for 15 years.

I am asking the Commission to keep Hell's Kitchen whole. What I love most about Hell's Kitchen is that we are neighborhood in which neighbors support each other, and work together to benefit our neighborhood. The traditional boundaries of Hell's Kitchen are 8th Avenue to the Hudson River from 34th to 59th Streets. The current City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member while the Commission's preliminary map divides our neighborhood into three major chunks so that we would be represented by three different City Council members.

This would be a disaster for our neighborhood.

Fifteen years ago, I was drawn to Hell's Kitchen because it is a diverse community with affordable rents. It is my home. Over that time, I have gotten to know the neighborhood by getting involved in many ways. Examples include volunteering to organize compost collection at Matthews Palmer Park, providing regular maintenance to the Hell's Kitchen Free Store on 45th and 9th, joining the Hell's Kitchen Litter Legion, picking up trash throughout our neighborhood and supporting events organized by our block associations.

This is a vibrant community that would be adversely impacted by the proposed City Council lines. In fact, these lines would dilute the racial/ethnic diversity for which this neighborhood is known by splitting us into three districts. There is a better map that preserves our diversity and keeps our neighborhood together.

I support the Unity Map was released on July 18 by a coalition of the leading legal voting rights advocacy organizations representing people of color in New York City. The Unity Map reflects the fact that the White population of City Council District 3 overall, and Hell's Kitchen in particular, has decreased in percentage

terms compared to the 2010 Census. Meanwhile, the Lantinx, Black and Asian populations in City Council District 3 have grown, not declined.

The preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of our diverse community in direct violation of the Voting Rights Act of 1965.



In addition, splitting Hell's Kitchen into three parts will make it easier for real estate developers to chip away at the Special Clinton District, which was created in 1973 and "designed to promote and protect public health, safety, general welfare and amenity. Because of the unique geographical location of the Clinton community, situated between the waterfront on the west and a growing central business district on the east, it is necessary to provide specific programs and regulations which will assure realization of community and citywide goals."

Chief among these goals, as stated in <a>City Zoning laws (resolution chapter 6):

- a) "to preserve and strengthen the residential character of the community"
- b) "to permit rehabilitation and new construction within the area in character with the existing scale of the community and at rental levels which will not substantially alter the mixture of income groups currently residing in the area"


c) " to preserve the small-scale character and variety of existing stores and activities and to control new commercial uses in conformity with the existing character of the area"



Combining Hell's Kitchen into one City Council District rather than dividing the neighborhood into three parts, will address all of these issues.

My name is Stephanie Sullivan Stavrides, I live at 347 West 55th St between 8th and 9th Ave. I have lived here since 1994, 29 years. I'm an active member in the community and our block association. My husband and I moved to Hell's Kitchen because of its diversity and sense of inclusion and community that we fear is at risk by the proposed changes. We stand is strong support of the Unity Map

Everyone who lives in Hell's Kitchen knows that our community runs west of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River between West 34th Street and West 59th Street.

The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multi-racial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

That is why I support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole.

Good evening. My name is Taylor Pullinger. I live on West 53rd St between 8th & 9th Avenue and previously lived at West 44th St. I am a Ph.D. candidate at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai and have lived with my boyfriend in Hell's Kitchen since 2019.

I attended the NYCDC's public hearing on the evening of Monday August 22nd, but the meeting concluded at 10PM before I had been asked to give my oral testimony. I'm submitting this written testimony in its place.

Hell's Kitchen is a cohesive neighborhood, with a distinct character and many long-term residents and businesses. To retain this character, it needs to remain whole.

Residents of Hell's Kitchen and visitors alike can feel the shift in atmosphere that defines the neighborhood beginning west of 8th Avenue through to the Hudson River and from West 34th Street in the south up to West 59th Street in the north.

Until now almost all of Hell's Kitchen was enclosed in City Council District 3, and so was represented by a single City Council member. This created a unified block for making decisions that would affect the community.

The Commission's preliminary map divides our neighborhood into three parts, particularly affecting the northern and eastern parts of the neighborhood, where I live. We would be represented by 3 different City Council members each with only a small interest in Hell's Kitchen.

Our neighborhood would undoubtedly suffer as a result. Convincing these three Council members to work together on neighborhood-wide decisions would be almost impossible, and the voices of all residents would be diminished as tiny fractions of their new districts.

One of my favorite things about living in Hell's Kitchen is the thriving small business community packed down 9th & 10th Avenues and dotted along many of the cross-streets. This neighborhood home to abundant unique restaurants and bars, many serving cuisines from cultures that are quite rare to find in the city. We also have a variety of independent shops such as hardware stores, laundry services, pharmacies and grocers, which make daily life in Hell's Kitchen quite self-sufficient.

One thing that allows these small businesses to succeed is their ability to unite their voices when bringing their concerns to City Council. The preliminary district boundaries cut our business throughfares into shreds, repeatedly separating small businesses that share the same concerns.

Dividing up the district will also make it more difficult to coordinate the neighborhood-wide events that make life in Hell's Kitchen fun and bring its residents together, such as the annual 9th Avenue International Food Festival.

For such a tight-knit and co-operative community, Hell's Kitchen residents are remarkably diverse. According to the 2020 Census, the majority of our population is comprised of Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multi-racial residents. We also have greater socioeconomic diversity compared to the more expensive neighborhoods that surround us. Hell's Kitchen is notably home to many LGBTQ residents, and to many of the events and venues that serve this community. I believe it is important that these diverse voices remain united rather than being diluted by being divided into multiple less diverse districts.

I moved to Hell's Kitchen 9 months before the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. During this time I've seen the neighborhood pull together and become stronger and more cohesive than before. Without tourists drifting in from the theater district, the bond between local businesses and local residents became critical for day-to-day life. I got to know the people running the small businesses I frequented every day, since they supplied me with everything I needed—we supported each other. Now that tourism is gradually returning to the city, Hell's Kitchen has retained the enhanced cohesion we developed over the past few years. I feel a strong allegiance to Hell's Kitchen, and to have my interests lumped in with Council District 4, a part of the city I have no ties to and seldom visit, would be extremely disheartening.

I'm speaking today to implore the Commission to adopt the City Council District 3 boundaries proposed in the Unity Map—an alternative put together by a coalition of leading legal voting rights advocacy organizations representing Hispanic, Black and Asian communities. A copy of the Unity Map's proposal for District 3 is appended to this written testimony. This map will keep Hell's Kitchen intact and preserve our diverse yet cohesive neighborhood.

Dear Chair Dennis Walcott,

I write to ask that the district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side, and all of Roosevelt Island not be adopted for the following reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where:

- neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- the proposed district is not compact,
- the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Second, the proposed districts will create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. Notably, will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts 6 & 8? Will a Queens Council Member send representation to two additional Manhattan Community Boards? Will a Queens Council Member hold full membership on two Borough Boards? What is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting? Manhattan and Queens residents may hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy including, but not limited to, congestion pricing. Which position will a Queens Council Member adopt?

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Third and finally, this oddly-shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents.

In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and not adopt the proposed districts referenced above. I thank you in advance for your consideration,

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

Re: Testimony – Proposed Redistricting of Hell's Kitchen

My name is Trina Semorile. I live on 46th Street, between Ninth and Tenth Avenues, in Hell's Kitchen, and have done so for 31+ years. I care a great deal about this neighborhood and its value not only historically, but as a diverse and interesting community, and ensuring that it remains intact; cutting it into three pieces represents the intent to dismantle both place and people—and is a form of politically-based environmental destruction of an ecosystem, which has been under attack for years.

Hell's Kitchen is an historic district, and its boundaries are from 34th Street to 59th Street and the West side of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River. Any redistricting which occurs should require and ensure that Hell's Kitchen is kept intact and strengthened, not subdivided like political spoils, to further weaken, then destroy it altogether.

The "Unity Map" should be adopted to ensure fair representation and equity, and to prevent diluting our right to be represented by one person who also cares about Hell's Kitchen, rather than seeing it as an "add on adjunct" to their "real" district and protects the integrity of an important historic district.

Created in 1973, the Special District was "designed to promote and protect public health, safety, general welfare and amenity. Because of the unique geographical location of the Clinton community, situated between the waterfront on the west and a growing central business district on the east, it is necessary to provide specific programs and regulations which will assure realization of community and citywide goals."

Our "public health, safety, general welfare and amenity..." have been severely compromised, with malice aforethought, and this plan seeks to be the denoument.

Chief among these goals, as stated in the City Zoning Laws:

- a) "to preserve and strengthen the residential character of the community"
- b) "to permit rehabilitation and new construction within the area in character with the existing scale of the community and at rental levels which will not substantially alter the mixture of income groups currently residing in the area"
- c) "to preserve the small-scale character and variety of existing stores and activities and to control new commercial uses in conformity with the existing character of the area"

I also question the timing of these hearings—when people are least likely to be available, and with a single hearing for Manhattan on 135th Street. At the very least, two hearings or, better, three for Manhattan, providing hearings throughout the borough, to ensure attendance, and with better notice, to promote the ability to participate and include everyone.

I believe that part of the goal of redistricting is to create a "gated community" at the southern end of the neighborhood, to encompass not just Hudson Yards, but to facilitate destruction of the area around Penn

Station with the proposed over-sized mammoth buildings, which will provide extreme short-term profits to developers, but do great harm to the area. This would also create a "personal" council member to this area, with no interest or concern about the rest of Hell's Kitchen. Politicians and media have already waged a PR campaign of calling the area "Hudson Yards"—ugly architecture which has also created untenable wind tunnels, as have other over tall structures along Tenth Avenue and the West end of 42nd Street, freezing in the winter, and strong enough to knock some people to the ground. The Penn development is equally ugly, too tall, and will create the same problems, in additon to destroying the neighborhood.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's **Kitchen** into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to majority-white City Council districts.

That the proposed redistricting leaves Chelsea intact is not accidental; I believe they are perceived as better able to fight back, and have less in the way of "spoils" to be divided, politically, and in favor of developers.

Hell's Kitchen should not be subdivided into three parts, fracturing the neighborhood (and, I believe, the intended goal), which will directly—and indirectly—harm the people who live and have businesses here. Most disturbing is that it is a form of very local gerrymandering, in pursuit of denying residents of Hell's Kitchen the value of our votes and is calculated to undermine our voting, political rights, voice, and is an assault on the integrity of our historic neighborhood. There is a history of this neighborhood receiving voting machines that do not work; of disregard for residents' needs, of ignoring Hell's Kitchen, when not abusing it. We should not be forced to try to persuade three different council members to protect our interests, and those of preservation which, given the proposed triad, would be nearly impossible—as intended.

Creating three majority white districts also perpetuates racism through structural means, by disenfranchising voters and diluting their ability to address concerns related to discrimination—an ongoing problem. And it smacks of the tactics of Robert Moses—a man who was never elected to any office, yet wielded, and abused, enormous power.

In this aspect, it also mirrors and seems to be "inspired by" the practices of Southern states, North/South Carolina, Georgia, etc., and Texas, which is an amalgam of Southern/Southwestern, in seeking to dilute votes to ensure white control of any interests. As such, it follows a shared and deeply racist history (and political/economic relationship) with the South; sexism is also a favored practice here. New York City retains one of the most segregated school systems in the country; the City simply ignored Brown v. Board of Education ruling of 1954, and uses segregated housing to continue this ugly legacy.

I have seen a great many changes in Hell's Kitchen, not least the efforts, by the real estate industry to change our name (to "Clinton"), then again by Bloomberg, when mayor (to "Midtown West")—the former in pursuit of profiteering through gentrification; the latter to further his goal of wholly destroying Hell's Kitchen and building high rise office towers to the Hudson River for his "dream" of a central business district. Both were efforts to destroy Hell's Kitchen and displace residents and small businesses, in favor of high rises and national chain retailing (turning New York into a strip mall), both piecemeal and as a sweep. Bloomberg spent a great deal of time and public money personally, and through his mouthpiece, Dan Doctorow (unsurprisingly, privately hired later by Bloomberg) claiming Hell's Kitchen should be "redeveloped" (code for clearance); that no one lives or works here. That failing, he tried to shoehorn a stadium onto the north end of Javits Center (which he intended to hand over, gratis, to the owner of the Jets, while billing New Yorkers for the costs, initial and ongoing). In

retaliation for losing that gambit, he "punished" Hell's Kitchen by canceling a needed subway stop and extension for the 7 line. Then allowed hotels to be located here, rather than desperately needed affordable housing, which continues to create quality of life problems for residents. There seems to be some confusion as to whether we should become "Times Square West" or another pocket of the privileged wealthy.

The last four, and now fifth (Mayor Adams) mayoral administrations have ignored the requirement that new buildings conform to the character of the neighborhood, and height limits are also being ignored. The buildings most often resemble the worst of neo-1960s or unpainted/unsurfaced grey poured concrete boxes.

Equally problematic during the Giuliani/Bloomberg administrations (and ongoing during De Blasio's) was permitting the creation of bar corridors—including illegal permissions, with multiple bars literally next door to each other. This has resulted in the loss of local service businesses (bodegas, dry cleaners, laundromats, etc.) and encouraged people to travel to the neighborhood with the sole purpose of getting as drunk as possible, bar hopping, and subjecting residents to drunken screamers at all hours, and men urinating on buildings. Building owners have contributed to this problem in warehousing retail spaces and preferring bars to other retail. This has destroyed any ability to sleep through the night, and many other "quality of life" problems.

Both Bloomberg and Giuliani before him, invited vehicle traffic into this neighborhood, and sought to make us a "parking lot", resulting in uncontrolled traffic and some of the worst air pollution in New York City. They did this by changing parking regulations and ignoring enforcement of all vehicle regulations: double parking, illegal parking; blocking bus stops, and idling. Giuliani told the NYPD that they were "not to interfere with commerce"—which means that the NYPD ignores parking/idling regulations and charter/tour buses and trucks (including 18-wheel semis) routinely using residential side streets illegally as shortcuts, and use city bus stops for "layovers"; this continues to date. Bloomberg continued and worsened this practice, and De Blasio allowed it to continue by ignoring conditions. I have repeatedly had police flatly refuse to tell bus and truck drivers to turn their engines off or to move from city bus stops. The nightmare of bar/restaurant sheds run amok has worsened the traffic situation, further eroding conditions in Hell's Kitchen.

I don't have standard dust on my windowsills/apt; I have black soot from the excessive traffic and incessant, uncontrolled idling. We have chronic problems of gridlock and blocked intersections; it's unsafe to cross the street with the light, due to careless drivers and bicyclists. Mayor Adams keeps trying to claim that the pandemic is over, yet Ninth Avenue "bus only" lanes continue to be blocked by bar/restaurant sheds, worsening already severe traffic problems. I was one of the initial members of the Hell's Kitchen Traffic Task Force, which sought cooperation between residents, police and politicians to address traffic problems; that effort was abandoned by Christine Quinn when her ambitions were to be Council Speaker, then Mayor with, she hoped Bloomberg's backing.

In consequence, we have some of the worst air quality in New York City, after the Bronx. This pollution, most of it generated by vehicles, takes three to five years off the lives of every New Yorker, causes and worsens asthma, lung cancer, emphysema, other respiratory diseases, heart attacks and other health problems.

The goal of the Koch, Giuliani, and Bloomberg administrations was to empty Manhattan of all but the very wealthy, following a European model of turning suburbs into slums and forcing workers to travel long distances, while the rich are able to walk everywhere conveniently, and use public transport when

wanted. I will note here that Giuliani's housing abuses were legion; Bloomberg tripled homelessness, and engaged in unconstitutional abuses toward the homeless, while forcing up rents. Mayor Adams has gone a step further, and violated the rights of homeless people by using the NYPD (then DHS!) to force disperse them, and while destroying personal belongings—notably tents for shelter from weather. Not only overreach and abuse, but contempt in treating homeless as less than residents (and citizens) and violating their constitutional rights. His attack on renters will create more homeless people. If the mayor doesn't want homeless people living the streets, he needs to ensure that they have safe, healthy, and adequate housing.

Bloomberg manipulated "affordable housing" by making it available to people with six-figure salaries, and providing nothing for those earning \$30,000 or less. Most listings I see for "affordable" housing require income floors of mid-\$70k and up—another tactic for removing the unwanted. This creates secondary discrimination against women in housing. The poverty rate for women in New York City is five times higher than the national average. And I remind you that women, and women with children continue to face housing discrimination, along with people of color; for women of color, there is a double jeopardy.

Hell's Kitchen has been alternately, sometimes simultaneously, treated as a dumping ground and a land grab "bonanza".

When I first moved to Hell's Kitchen, a police officer was stationed at all times, on the northwest corner of 46th Street—apparently to prevent any hapless tourist(s) from "accidentally" wandering into our neighborhood; he (it was always he) never looked anywhere but east, down 46th street, toward Restaurant Row, and occasionally south.

I lived here during the "drug and prostitution wars"; my building was one of the last two on the block with severe drug dealing and prostitution—one of the drug dealer/pimps was the then building super, left in place by the building owners to help "clear" the building for gentrification. My life was threatened regularly. Many tenants, as hoped for by the owners, moved in fear of their lives—both rent controlled and stabilized. I was active in efforts to address these problems, both in my building and neighborhoodwide.

When I moved here, almost all my neighbors worked in theatre, and could walk to work; they can no longer afford to rent the apartments which have been destabilized. For most of my tenure here, I knew everyone in the building, then people were moving in and out so fast that I had no idea who was actually living here. Several tenants told me they were moving as the rent had become prohibitive.

Market rate tenants in my building are, at present, facing eviction, at the behest of predatory equity. I became a tenant advocate/activist from living in my current building—and know more about tenant/landlord law than I ever wanted to, consequent on dealing with building conditions.

I provide this history as a reminder that we have been battling to protect and maintain our tenancies and the integrity of our historic neighborhood for years, and this proposal seeks to undermine not only those efforts, but to finally create a context in which Hell's Kitchen may be destroyed with impunity, in a tactic of divide and conquer.

Hell's Kitchen is best served by designating the entire area of the special district as part of a single political district as well, with a single council member accountable to us and with whom we are able to

work without being hobbled by the conditions which would result from being split into three districts, two appended to other districts.

The Redistricting Commission needs to do what is right, just and ethical, and keep Hell's Kitchen intact and protected.

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My name is Tulian. Me & Robert

Minority business owner and we decline the propose map that divide Hell's Kitchen map into 3 council districts. We have 8 years we chose hells Kitchen for its diversity.

We believe that unity map best perceivers that diversity & character of our community.

Everyone who lives in Hell's Kitchen knows that our community runs west of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River between West 34th Street and West 59th Street.

The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multiracial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

That is why we support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole.

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As live speaking slots were unavailable due to public demand, I would like to offer written testimony in opposition to the proposal to break Hells Kitchen up into three council districts.

My name is William Strzempek. I have lived in Hells Kitchen for several decades, first on West 46th Street and currently for more than 30 years at 301 West 45th Street. I have always devoted a lot of time and energy to this neighborhood. I served a term on Manhattan Community Board 4. I spearhead the tenants association of my building which has over 170 units. I am a member of two Hells Kitchen block associations. I even joined other neighbors to sue in New York State Supreme Court (in *Fisher v. Giuliani*) to stop the redistricting of Hells Kitchen to permit theatre owners to rezone our neighborhood for their financial gain. That suit took years of hard work and tons of fundraising in order to keep Hells Kitchen Hells Kitchen, as it deserves to be.

I have learned from these experiences how hard it is for Hells Kitchen residents to preserve the quality of life of our neighborhood against the constant onslaught of commercial and luxury real estate, tourism and political forces who want to usurp our residential neighborhood for their commercial gain. I have also seen how complicated it is to "fight city hall". Because of my experience over the decades living here, I am strongly opposed to the proposed redistricting which would break up Hells Kitchen into three council districts. Members of our tenants association of 130 members (the 301 West 45th Street Tenants Association) are also adamantly opposed to this redistricting, and some of them will be offering in person testimony.

Cleaving Hells Kitchen into pieces will make it even more arduous for residents of this district to have their voices heard in order to protect the character, quality of life and diversity of our community. Instead of having to meet with one council member to press any cause, we will have to coordinate three council members. Hells Kitchen needs to speak with one voice, and needs to be preserved as one district.

This is not a new idea.

As way back as late 1960s, New York City's Planning Commission realized that Hells Kitchen was such a unique New York neighborhood that they decided it must have extra protection to preserve the character, low scale housing, locally owned businsses and the residential mix of middle and lower class and multi-ethnic and multi-cultural families that make Hells Kitchen a special place. The City, rightly, realized Hells Kitchen was ripe for the encroachment of big developers and commercial interests in Midtown that abut Hells Kitchen to the east of Eighth Avenue. In 1974 New York City codified The Clinton Special District as the area west of 8th Avenue to the Hudson between West 41st and West 59th and created stringent stipulations for what can and cannot be done in this area. The special district the city deemed worthy of extra protection is being undermined by the proposed redistricting. And the commercial forces of Midtown, Times Square, Hudson Yards and the proposed reimagining of Penn Station are only going to make preserving the totality of Hells Kitchen - and the

Clinton Special District - much harder to do. We need to remain one unified district in order to have a chance at preservation.

It is a common war time strategy for enemies to attempt to cut a major force into smaller groups in order to make it difficult for the force to act as one unit, and to make it therefore easier to dispense with the smaller groups. This proposed redistricting will do the same thing to the political force that Hells Kitchen residents currenly have as one large group.

I urge the Redistricting Committee to keep Hells Kitchen whole when redrawing the council map -- and to please honor the spirit of the Clinton Special District so that we who live here will continue to have a unified and potent voice in government via our dialogue with one council member.

As a resident of 16 Sutton Place, I write to ask that you DO NOT ADOPT the preliminary district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side and all of Roosevelt Island for the following reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where:

- · neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- · the proposed district is not compact,
- · the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Second, the proposed districts will create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods, notably splitting the Sutton Place community of interest between multiple districts and combining representation for a portion of our Manhattan community with Queens. Will a Queens Council Member have a district office in Manhattan to represent and serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts 6 & 8? Will a Queens Council Member send representation to two or more additional Manhattan Community Boards or hold full membership on multiple Borough Boards? What is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting, creating significant disparities among neighbors who share the parks and access to the new Greenway from Sutton Place? Manhattan and Queens residents may hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy including, but not limited to, congestion pricing. Will the interests of Manhattan residents be served by a Council Member who serves a majority of constituents in Queens?

A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Among those institutions directly impacted by the proposed new lines are: Hospital for Special Surgery, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York Presbyterian/Weill Cornell, Rockefeller University and Cornell Tech. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Third and finally, this oddly shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents.

In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and not adopt the proposed districts referenced above. Keep the Sutton Area neighborhood intact and with representation in Manhattan! Subject: [EXTERNAL] Testimony: Frank Farance (Roosevelt Island), maps violate a dozen redistricting criteria

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To the Commission:

I am Frank Farance, I have lived on Roosevelt Island for 42 years, I'm a community leader, and I write in opposition of the CD 5 boundaries in the proposed plan. I request that Roosevelt Island, along with the East Side hospitals and parks return to CD 5. There should be no CD 26 (Woodside-Sunnyside) on Roosevelt Island nor the East Side.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: There are almost a dozen violations of the District Plan Criteria, which could easily be fixed by moving Roosevelt Island back into CD 5.,

Here are my concerns, all citations refer to the City Charter, Chapter 2-A, Section 52.

Point #1: Roosevelt Island Should Get Same Consideration As Staten Island

According to the current plan, significant variances were agreed upon in Staten Island to remain 3 Council Districts, even though their districts are smaller than the standard size of 172,882 persons per district. In total, the Staten Island districts are 22,000 persons smaller - in theory, giving more weight to each Staten Islander's vote and, in practice, avoiding a Staten Island district being shared with Manhattan, Brooklyn, or Queens.

<u>Roosevelt Island should get a similar variance</u> (allowing our 12,000 residents to be part of Council District 5), but this would have the opposite effect than Staten Island: by making RI part of Council District 5 (CD 5), it will lose voting strength, but that is counterbalanced by the other important criteria for Roosevelt Island remaining in CD 5.

Point #2: Improper Mapping Over Body of Water, Violation of §52(2)

In the current plan violates §52(2), which states:

"Each district shall be contiguous, and whenever a part of a district is separated from the rest of the district by a body of water, there shall be a connection by a bridge, a tunnel, a tramway or by regular ferry service [emphasis added]".

It is abundantly clear that with only ONE Tramway in New York City, and the statute explicitly calling out a "tramway" is a key element of contiguity. That implies Roosevelt Island belongs in CD 5. The Roosevelt Island Bridge does not connect to CD 26 (it connects to CD 22). The Ferry NYC service is limited capacity and not regular service, nor does it provide senior nor other discounted rates nor free transfers necessary for travel.

Point #3: Keeping Roosevelt Island Population Within CD5 Satisfies §52(1)(a)

Roosevelt Island remaining in CD 5 would satisfy the §52(1)(a) criteria:

"The difference in population between the least populous and the most populous districts shall not exceed ten percentum (10%) of the average population for all districts"

By adding Roosevelt Island's 12,000 residents, it would only add 7% above the average, which satisfies this criteria.

Point #4: Additional Rationale Satisfies §52(1)(a)

Restoring Roosevelt Island to CD 5, as explained below, satisfy the remaining §52(1)(a) criteria:

"Any such differences in population must be justified by the other criteria set forth in this section".

Point #5: Breaking Historical Ties Violates §52(1)(c)

Roosevelt Island is a unique community with longstanding close transportation, employment, and housing ties. The §52(1)(c) criteria states

"District lines shall keep intact neighborhoods and communities with established ties of common interest and association, whether historical, racial, economic, ethnic, religious or other"

The present plan violates this criteria. Since the 1970s when Roosevelt Island was created, it has been promoted as "Manhattan's Other Island" and the Island's residents are strongly affiliated with CD 5, including:

- Roosevelt Island residents are part of School District 2, which completely covers CD 5.
- For residents, most culture, school, and employment ties are on the Manhattan side (not the Queens CD 26) as an overwhelming number of residents commute via the Tram, F train, and Ferry take residents to the Manhattan side, not Queens CD 26 (Woodside, Sunnyside, LIC, Astoria Heights) there are few community ties to CD 26, especially with a river in between.
- The NYS agency Roosevelt Island Operating Corporation (RIOC), which has leased Roosevelt Island from the City via a 99-year lease, also has tram operations in CD 5 (the Manhattan side of the tram), and this operation also involves a franchise with the City, which involves negotiations and coordination. It makes no sense to split this into two districts.
- The Master Lease between NYS (RIOC) and NYC involves a General Development Plan (GDP our zoning document), of which changes are negotiated between the State and the Mayor, which relies upon the local council member, which has a 52-year history with CD 5, i.e., the institutional memory is in CD 5, with no knowledge within CD 26 (as proposed). Changing the district with 52 years of history, would harm this important representational aspect for Roosevelt Island residents.
- Manhattan CB8M (along with the GDP) determine zoning issues for Roosevelt Island, but with the new plan CB8M's efforts on the Master Lease (and GDP) efforts would be split across multiple council districts, thus remaining in CD 5 makes more sense.
- Two apartment buildings on Roosevelt Island (475 Main St, 465 Main St) were built purposely for staff and students at Memorial Sloan Kettering (MKS) and Weill Cornell (WC) hospitals across the East River and these residents primarily use the Tram for transportation, which is in CD 5.
- Roosevelt Island has long ties with the United Nations on the Manhattan side, as much of their staff lives on Roosevelt Island, including former Secretary General Kofi Annan who was a resident of Roosevelt Island.

Point #6: Present Map Is Oddly Shaped, Violates §52(1)(d)

The current geometry of the proposed district (2.01 mi / .87 mi = 2.4 ratio) violates the §52(1)(d) criteria

"Each district shall be compact and shall be no more than twice as long as it is wide"

By adding Roosevelt Island, the geometry is 2.35/1.23 = 1.9 ratio, which satisfies the criteria. Furthermore, because Roosevelt Island is now included in CD 26, now CD 26 also violates the $\S52(1)(d)$ criteria. The obvious solution is to move Roosevelt Island back to CD 5.

Point #7: Crosses County Boundaries, Violates §52(1)(e)

The current plan violates the §52(1)(e) criteria for three adjacent districts

"A district shall not cross borough or county boundaries"

In the current plan, Roosevelt Island is in New York County and the rest of CD 26 is in Queens County. Ditto for CD 8 (Manhattan-Bronx) and CD 34 (Queens-Brooklyn), all three are adjacent districts. Roosevelt Island should be returned to CD 5.

Point #8: Sutton Place Is Completely Disconnected from CD 26, Violates §52(1)(c) and §52(2)

The Sutton Place portion of the new plan is in CD 26, which is completely disconnected from the balance of CD 26 in Sunnyside, Woodside, etc.. This violates §52(1)(c) (no historical connection) and violates §52(2)

"Each district shall be contiguous, and whenever a part of a district is separated from the rest of the district by a body of water, there shall be a connection by a bridge, a tunnel, a tramway or by regular ferry service"

There is no such connection as the nearest bridge, Queensboro, is not part of the Sutton Place area in CD 26.

Point #9: Two Boroughs Problem, Possible Violation of §52(3)

The current plan might conflict with §52(3), which states

"If any district includes territory in two boroughs, then no other district may also include territory from the same two boroughs".

In the present plan, CD 26 (Manhattan-Queens), the adjacent CD 8 (Manhattan-Bronx), the adjacent CD 34 (Queens-Brooklyn), all cover two boroughs, it is unclear the status of Marble Hill (Manhattan-Bronx). It is unclear if the two borough criteria §52(1)(e) is violated.

Point #10: Minimizes the Length of Boundaries, violates §52(1)(g)

The current plan violates §52(1)(g), which states

"The districting plan shall be established in a manner that minimizes the sum of the length of the boundaries of all of the districts included in the plan"

By merging Roosevelt Island (and Sutton Place) back into CD 5, the extra length of extending CD 26 to Manhattan would be removed and, thus, would reduce district boundary length. Mathematically provably, just looking at the boundaries of CD 5 and CD 26, this is NOT minimizing lengths as a smaller boundary length is possible. Thus, CD 5 should include Roosevelt Island and Sutton Place.

Point #11: Violates Maximum Extent Practicable, §52(1)

The displacement of Roosevelt Island causes the districting plan to violate most of the statutory criteria, which also violates the first criteria §52(1):

"In the preparation of its plan for dividing the city iton districts for the election of council members, the commission shall apply the criteria set forth in the following paragraphs to the maximum extent practicable".

Clearly, the current plan violates "maximum extent practicable". However, Roosevelt Island remaining in CD 5 causes the districting plan to come into compliance with the districting criteria.

In summary, return Roosevelt Island to CD 5 and avoid these dozen violations of District Plan Criteria.

I am Lori Kupfer, an architect and resident of Sutton Place. I am here to request that the revised district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 **not** be adopted.

I would like to state that the draft proposal violates **four** of the criteria set forth in the City Charter:

- neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- the proposed district is not compact,
- the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

To elaborate on my concerns, the proposed districts located on opposite sides of the East River do not share common urban character based on **zoning or land use**, and therefore do not have common needs or interests. The Sutton Place neighborhood currently in District 5 is primarily zoned for midrise residential as are its adjacent Manhattan neighbors. Its streets are defined by an uninterrupted grid, consistent with the rest of the streets in East Midtown Manhattan, forming a cohesive urban fabric and shared municipal needs. Conversely the Queens District 26 is zoned largely for industrial use with some varied residential use. Each area of the Queens district has its own unique grid of streets of varied residential density and are interrupted by the open rail yards for the Long Island Railroad and Amtrack. The Queens neighborhoods are further divided by throughfares such as Queens Blvd and the Long Island Expressway. Sutton Place shares no urban scale, context, or character with the Queen's areas.

Much of Queens District 26 is **miles** away from the Sutton Place neighborhood, and across a body of water. My name is Catherine Lafferty, and I have lived on W. 48th Street in Hell's Kitchen for 23 years. I'm writing in support of the Unity Map and do not want my Hell's Kitchen neighborhood (which currently is entirely in Councilman Erik Bottcher's District 3) divided among three council districts, as your proposed NYC Council District Map reflects.

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Dear NYC Redistricting Commission,

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.







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Everyone who lives in Hell's Kitchen knows that our community runs west of Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River between West 34th Street and West 59th Street.

The first mention of Hell's Kitchen in print dates back to the 1880s. But even today, tourist guides use these same boundaries to refer to Hell's Kitchen.

The 2013 City Council map included most of the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in City Council District 3, which allowed us to be represented by a single City Council member.

We are an incredibly diverse neighborhood. The 2020 Census shows that the Hispanic, Asian-American, Black and multiracial communities now make up the majority of the population in Hell's Kitchen. But the City's preliminary map would split us up into three different majority white City Council districts, diluting the political voice of Hispanic, Black and Asian communities in Hell's Kitchen.

Hell's Kitchen, with a population of 74,621 people, is the largest neighborhood in the current City Council District-3, followed by Chelsea, with 63,039 individuals. Together, these two neighborhoods make up more than two-thirds of the current CD-3. They are also the most diverse neighborhoods in CD-3.

The Districting Commission's preliminary map keeps ALL of Chelsea in CD-3 but splits up Hell's Kitchen into three large chunks with two of those parts attached to two other majority-white City Council districts.

As a result of splitting up Hell's Kitchen in this way, the representation of Hispanic and Black populations in both Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea and of the larger Asian population in Hell's Kitchen are significantly diluted.

Currently, according to the 2020 Census, Hispanics make up 18.2 % of both Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen, Asians make up 21.4 % of Hell's Kitchen and 13.0 % of Chelsea, Blacks make up 7.5 % of Hell's Kitchen and 6.6 % of Chelsea, whites make up 48.1 % of Hell's Kitchen and 57.5% of Chelsea.

Meanwhile the Commission's preliminary map would DECREASE the representation of Hispanics, Asians and Blacks in the proposed City Council district 3 while INCREASING the proportion of whites in comparison to both the CURRENT City Council generally and Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in particular.

That is why we support the Unity map, which preserves our neighborhood's diversity and keeps Hell's Kitchen whole.

The proposed resdistricting map for Council District 3 would divide our Hell's Kitchen community into three separate council districts. Our community would be relegated to a minor part of three different Council members and we would not receive the attention or work that is required to deal with issues facing Hell's Kitchen.

I am a member of the West 47/48th Street Block Association. My Block Association would be split between two different Council members. Your plan would make it extremely difficult to coordinate Council member response to issues. We have had a continued campaign to try and abate the rat problems in our area. In addition to getting City agencies to react to our problems by enforcement, baiting and changes to garbage pick up, we would now have to coordinate responses with two different Council members, substantially increasing our work and resulting in confusion over who is doing what, resulting in a less effective program to deal with this problem.

Ronald McDonald House New York® is located on East 73rd Street between First and York Avenues and will be directly affected by this proposed re-districting. The House provides temporary housing for children and their families while the child is undergoing treatment for cancer or other diseases at any one of our 11 partner hospitals. We also operate in cooperation with the NYC Health and Hospitals Corporation two Ronald McDonald Family Rooms®, staffed hospitality rooms available to the families of admitted children for rest and reflection, at Kings County and, very shortly, Elmhurst Hospitals. We are proud that these two Family Rooms are the first Ronald McDonald Family Rooms® in the United States to be located in public hospitals. Discussions are underway at a number of other hospitals in all boroughs.

While we extend our services City-wide, our only facility is in Manhattan. I write to ask that the district lines proposed for Queens Council District 26 and Manhattan Council District 5 which include portions of Sutton Place, the Upper East Side, and all of Roosevelt Island not be adopted for the following reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where:

- neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact,
- the proposed district is not compact,
- the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and
- the proposed district is very oddly shaped.

Second, the proposed districts will create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. Good day Chair Walcott,

The plan presented for 54 blocks of the Upper East Side and Roosevelt Island is not acceptable to the residents of the East Sixties. We believe it violates the charter requirements of keeping neighborhoods compact and in tack This plan would make CD26 an oddly shaped district with practical difficulties: they are - would the Council Member have a district office in Manhattan as well as on Roosevelt Island; would the Council Member cover Community Board meetings in Board 8 & 6 and have full membership on both Borough Boards, and finally we believe this part of Community District 8 would have a diminution of representation. While other Districts have physical boundaries in more than one borough, they are directly adjacent to one another. They do not have a river separating them as in this proposed plan. The issues in CD26 are not the same as in CD5. There are several well-established neighborhood associations whose membership would be torn asunder.

The issues that involve City Agencies such as Transportation, Sanitation, Parks etc. are different in the two council districts. Then there are two other major issues that would tear our community apart. The first is the hospital corridor with their buildings for the major institutions many of which would be in CD26 under the new plan. But many of their offices and allied buildings and staff and doctors would be located in/or live in CD5 making it difficult for discussing issues constantly arising. The second is Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 51 Districts for the least amount of park space in the city. This plan would remove: 24 Sycamores Park; 3/4 of Honey Locust Park—with 1/4 remaining in D5; most of our East River Esplanade and Andrew Haswell Green Park Phase 1 & 2A-2B is under construction at this time. Phase 3 has not yet started and will likely cost \$25 Million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the voters in her/his District? Most of the funding will probably be spent in the Queens part of the district. This would result in CD 5 having the least amount of Park space in NYC.

We strongly recommend that you study and implement Community Board 8's resolution and plan, as it takes into account the number of residents in all the adjourning districts.

Our Neighborhood Association depends greatly on our Council Member and her office staff, which is easy to reach by a short bus ride. I strongly urge the New York City Districting Commission to reconsider this ill-conceived plan and not divide an indivisible and cohesive neighborhood.

I write in opposition to the proposed redistricting that would move the narrow area east of First Avenue that is currently in Council District 5 to Queens Council District 26. That area should remain within Council District 5.

The Mount Vernon Hotel Museum & Garden (MVHM&G) is housed in a 1799 building, the 8th oldest historical structure still standing in Manhattan, and offers considerable and vital links to the immediate area's long history as a vibrant part of Manhattan. In addition to being part of the community and building strong relationships with our neighbors, the Museum has also benefitted enormously from close relationships to our past Council District 5 representatives; the discretionary funding at the council representative's disposal has supported cultural institutions in the district, such as the MVHM&G, that are making important cultural contributions to the immediate community as well as to the larger NYC population. Were the Museum to move to Queens Council District 26, this much-needed funding would be in even shorter supply, which would translate to less city-sponsored financial assistance going to institutions that directly support their local communities. In the case of the Mount Vernon Hotel Museum & Garden, that means school visits for children to learn about New York City history, including the long role of immigrants in our city's evolution, members of the public coming for tours and to enjoy public programs about New York City across centuries, and other types of programming for a variety of audiences to help engage them about New York's history in the 1820s and 1830s and the parallels to today.

We share the community's concern regarding such significant portions of the East Side possibly being moved to a Queens-centered district. The impacted neighborhoods comprise a singular

community with the Upper East Side, and are deeply tied to the area through history, geography, and personal and institutional relationships. We are also concerned that the City agencies with which we have regular contact are organized around a Manhattan-centric borough structure, and that it would serve our interests to have a Council member more fully integrated into and deeply knowledgeable of the Borough's operational and regulatory systems.

I strongly urge the Commission not to adopt the proposed redistricting.

Dear NYC Redistricting Commission,

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

TESTIMONY OF FORMER MANHATTAN DISTRICT 2 COUNCILWOMEN MARGARITA LOPEZ & ROSIE MENDEZ TO THE NEW YORK CITY REDISTRICTING COMMISSION August 21, 2022

We are the Former Councilwomen who served Council District (CD) 2 in Manhattan, collectively, for 20 years from January 1, 1998 until December 31, 2017. We are both concerned about the proposed district lines that would remove several blocks south of Delancey Street and place it in the neighboring district of CD1.

During the redistricting of council districts in 2001, we saw CD2 lose Seward Park Housing Cooperatives, and a portion of East River Houses. A change that was championed by then Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver who resided CD2 and preferred to be in CD1. Vladeck Houses has always been located within the CD2 boundaries and, in the future, should continue to be located in CD2. Likewise, additional buildings that comprise East River Houses should be added back to CD2.

CD2 has always been east side district, except for four (4) small and mostly irregular triangular and quadrilateral partial blocks that were added to the CD2 in 2013. Those city blocks are located from West 24th to West 28th Street and from 5th Avenue to Broadway. The current proposal would extend CD2 further into the west side by doubling the blocks located in the west side to a total of eight (8) blocks extending from the current northern boundary of West 28th to West 32nd Streets to capture Koreatown within the CD2 boundaries.

Additionally, the proposed district lines would capture Veterans and Bellevue Hospital, the 30th Street Men's Shelter (commonly referred to as the Bellevue Shelter), and NYU Langone Medical Center. While the men's shelter and the hospitals are important institutions to Manhattan's East Side, it has always been located in CD4. Removing it from CD4 and coupling Koreatown leaves CD2 with a constituent base that is very different than the residents of Vladeck Houses in demographics and income bands.

As the Former Councilwomen who live in and represented this district with much love, sweat and tears, we ask that the Commission keep CD2 located in its current boundaries. Please do not remove Vladeck Houses from the district that it is currently located in and has always been located in.

Councilmember Christopher Marte states that people in the community are confused as to who represents them. This was not a problem we ever encountered. Residents knew if we represented them or whether it was Katherine Freed, Alan Gerson or Margaret Chin. Whenever we encountered a problem in our southern borders, we rolled up our sleeves and worked alongside the CD1 Councilmember. We suggest the CD1 and CD2 Councilmembers do the same for the benefit of the Lower East Side.

We want to thank the commission for your attention to this matter.

The plan presented for 54 blocks of the Upper East Side and Roosevelt Island is not acceptable to the residents of the East Sixties. We believe it violates the charter requirements of keeping neighborhoods compact and intact. This plan would make CD26 an oddly shaped district with practical difficulties: they are - would the Council Member have a district office in Manhattan as well as on Roosevelt Island; would the Council Member cover Community Board meetings in Board 8 & 6 and have full membership on both Borough Boards, and finally we believe this part of Community District 8 would have a diminution of representation. While other Districts have physical boundaries in more than one borough, they are directly adjacent to one another. They do not have a river separating them as in this proposed plan. The issues in CD26 are not the same as in CD5. And there are several well-established neighborhood associations whose membership would be torn asunder.

The issues that involve City Agencies such as Transportation, Sanitation, Parks etc. are different in the two council districts. Then there are two other major issues that would tear our community apart. The first is the hospital corridor with their buildings for the major institutions many of which would be in CD26 under the new plan. But many of their offices and allied buildings and staff and doctors would be located in/or live in CD5 making it difficult for discussing issues constantly arising. Not to mention the effect on "bench to bed" translational medicine research. The second is Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 59 Districts for the least amount of park space in the city. This plan would remove: from CD 5 24 Sycamores Park; ¾ of Honey Locust Park—with ¼ remaining in D5; most of our East River Esplanade and Andrew Haswell Green Park Phase 1 & 2A—2B is under construction at this time. Phase 3 has not yet started and will likely cost \$25 Million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the voters in her/his District? Most of the funding will probably be spent in the Queens part of the district.

We strongly recommend that you study and implement Community Board 8's resolution and plan, as it takes into account the number of residents in all the adjourning districts.

Our Neighborhood Association depends greatly on our Council Member and her office staff, which is easy to reach by a short bus ride. I strongly urge the New York City Districting Commission to reconsider this ill-conceived plan and not divide an indivisible and cohesive neighborhood.

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Dear NYC Redistricting Commission,

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

Good day Chair Walcott,

The plan presented for 54 blocks of the Upper East Side and Roosevelt Island is not acceptable to the residents of the East Sixties. We believe it violates the charter requirements of keeping neighborhoods compact and intact. This plan would make CD26 an oddly shaped district with practical difficulties: they are - would the Council Member have a district office in Manhattan as well as on Roosevelt Island; would the Council Member cover Community Board meetings in Board 8 & 6 and have full membership on both Borough Boards, and finally we believe this part of Community District 8 would have a diminution of representation. While other Districts have physical boundaries in more than one borough, they are directly adjacent to one another. They do not have a river separating them as in this proposed plan. The issues in CD26 are not the same as in CD5. And there are several well-established neighborhood associations whose membership would be torn asunder.

The issues that involve City Agencies such as Transportation, Sanitation, Parks etc. are different in the two council districts. Then there are two other major issues that would tear our community apart. The **first** is the hospital corridor with their buildings for the major institutions many of which would be in CD26 under the new plan. But many of their offices and allied buildings and staff and doctors would be located in/or live in CD5 making it difficult for discussing issues constantly arising. Not to mention the effect on "bench to bed" translational medicine research. The **second** is Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 59 Districts for the least amount of park space in the city. This plan would remove: from CD 5 24 Sycamores Park; ¾ of Honey Locust Park—with ¼ remaining in D5; most of our East River Esplanade and Andrew Haswell Green Park Phase 1 & 2A—2B is under construction at this time. Phase 3 has not yet started and will likely cost \$25 Million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the voters in her/his District? Most of the funding will probably be spent in the Queens part of the district.

We strongly recommend that you study and implement Community Board 8's resolution and plan, as it takes into account the number of residents in all the adjourning districts.

Our Neighborhood Association depends greatly on our Council Member and her office staff, which is easy to reach by a short bus ride. I strongly urge the New York City Districting Commission to reconsider this ill-conceived plan and not divide an indivisible and cohesive neighborhood.

Hell's Kitchen is a community name that is known throughout New York City and beyond. From 34th Street to 59th Street and from Eighth Avenue to the Hudson River, it is a clearly defined and celebrated neighborhood that deserves united representation in the City Council.

Redistricting should keep communities whole, just as the Redistricting Commission is charged with doing under the rules for creating updated City Council districts. In addition to the protections still afforded by the Voting Rights Act, the City Charter mandated criteria specifically states that the commission must "keep neighborhoods and communities intact."

Given that the proposed map would split one community into three separate Council Districts, the commission has failed to meet its own criteria based on the first round of proposed maps. Beyond dividing an established community through fragmented representation, the map would also significantly undermine zoning and land use matters, and potentially affect consistent city services.

From the local business districts of Ninth and Tenth Avenues to our performing arts industry, both on and off Broadway, Hell's Kitchen is an economic engine for our city attracting both New Yorkers and tourists alike. The Special Clinton District preserves a neighborhood built by nearly every historical wave of immigrants who have come to our city, united in architectural distinction and history. Dividing Hell's Kitchen ignores its history and longstanding cultural and economic contribution to the city. If the map is adopted, it will inhibit its future by gerrymandering its blocks with neighborhoods that have different needs and interests.

The 2020 census provides further arguments for keeping Hell's Kitchen together within a single City Council district. Data has shown that Black, Hispanic, Asian and multi-racial residents now make up the majority of the population. The current proposed maps would dilute these voices into other majority white districts. As the first Assembly Member of Hispanic descent to represent Hell's Kitchen, seeing the political voice of minority populations be split apart goes against the values I believe our city must hold when determining representation.

The Hell's Kitchen community is also home to the core of our country's largest LGBTQ+ population, another minority voice whose voices deserve power in representation. As the first LGBTQ+ person to represent Hell's Kitchen and Chelsea in the New York State Assembly, I support the <u>Unity Map</u>, which would unite these neighborhoods with the West Village in the City Council.

We live in a time where minority voices are under attack. Drawing district lines that dilute representation lessens the power of communities to stand together, not just in defense of their neighborhoods, but in the issues that affect our lives, the economy, and quality of life.

Hell's Kitchen is worthy of full representation and should not be a fringe district for three different City Council districts. I urge the Districting Commission to adopt the lines proposed by the Unity Map, so that the communities of Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen that are united significantly in the New York State Assembly and entirely in the State Senate also have a united voice in the City Council.

We support local restaurants and bars, arts and entertainment venues as part of our daily agenda, but especially during times when they struggle to pay their staff. We attend parades. We vote. We know the value in this city.

The City Commission is mandated to keep communities of interest together. An accurate assessment of the plan reflects that it ultimately fails to achieve that goal. Along with this irreparable shortcoming, the draft proposal is not a viable option and it should be renounced for a few other key reasons.

First, the draft proposal violates four of the criteria set forth in City Charter Section 52 (1) (c) (d) and (e) and Section 52 (2). The violation of those criteria results in districts where: (1) neighborhoods and communities of interest are not kept intact; (2) the proposed district is not compact; (3) the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district, and; (4) the proposed district is very oddly shaped. Maintaining compliance with the City Charter necessitates renunciation of the proposal.

Second, the proposed districts would create significant practical difficulties for the affected neighborhoods. It is without question that a Queens Council Member would not serve the needs of the extraordinarily high percentage of seniors in Manhattan Community Districts. The sheer geographical distance alone creates inequities. Further, it raises important questions that affect the masses: would a Queens Council Member send representation to two additional Manhattan Community Boards, would a Queens Council Member hold full membership on two Borough Boards, and what is the likelihood that the Manhattan portion of the proposed district will ever prevail in a matter of Participatory Budgeting? It may also lead to the adoption of stances on matters of policy that are inconsistent with the residents that the Council Member would be serving. Manhattan and Queens residents hold vastly different positions on important matters of public policy, including but not limited to congestion pricing. Which position will a Queens Council Member adopt, and

more importantly would they be accurately representing the residents in their district? The sheer uncertainty alone is enough to question the entire proposal as unnecessary, a waste of time, and contrary to the interests of the District residents.

Another important matter of public policy on which a Queens Counsel Member will likely differ to the detriment of their residents concerns the hospitals. A defining element of the East Side's neighborhood character is the presence of numerous medical and research facilities with sprawling, densely populated campuses. Manhattan elected officials have years of experience and expertise in addressing the compatibility of these institutions with surrounding residential areas. How effective- and better yet, how aligned- will a Queens Council Member be in this regard?

Third and finally, this oddly-shaped, extreme crossover district will have a significant adverse impact on the provision of municipal services. This not only hinders the interests of the thousands of Manhattan residents it would affect, but it diminishes the political voices of these thousands of residents as well.

It is a fundamental to be represented, and to have a voice in the political system. I am voicing my concerns now before my voice becomes silenced by the proposal. In the strongest terms possible, I urge the Commission to return to the drawing board and find an alternative to the proposed districts referenced above. I would recommend the Commission instead ensure status quo, accurate representation and facilitation of vital services remains intact.

My name is Diana Ayala and I am the Deputy Speaker of the New York City Council. I appreciate the commission's recommendations and attempts to keep the districts whole in comparison to the previously released preliminary maps. We feel there are missed opportunities both in East Harlem and the South Bronx that can be rectified with changes to the current proposed lines.

In East Harlem to ensure no dilution of communities of shared Interest:

- 1) Adding back our East 116th Street district office which was moved outside the borders of our district.
- 2) The current map removes 125th from our district where we have been working progressively over the years on the many challenges including the opioid crisis. We have gradually been able to secure some of the vital resources needed to ensure the most urgent needs are being met. An interruption in service would only be a disservice to this community.
- 3) Removing 125th Street from our district would also remove important capital projects, specific to East Harlem, which my office has been working on for many years, dedicating a lot of time and effort.
- 4) We removed the blocks from 106th to East 115th along 5th Avenue which has been served by district 9 and would dilute the shared interest of the East Harlem community.

In the South Bronx we have proposed minor changes that would better serve the needs of the constituents:

- 1) In District 17 we have proposed keeping the northern section of Longwood with Councilmember Salamanca so that there is consistency of service to his constituents as our involvement has been limited to the northeast of our district.
- 2) Highbridge is a community that has long been disenfranchised. During the pandemic my office and many community members worked tirelessly to address the many challenges caused by COVID-19. We would like to continue working with the Highbridge community as we have deep ties there, a good understanding of the challenges they face and would like to continue to build on the foundation we started.

I want to thank the commission for considering this request and understanding the importance of deep ties in a community and the importance of continuity of service. We have worked tirelessly in East Harlem and the South Bronx to give a voice to a marginalized community that unfortunately, oftentimes suffers greatly from lack of city wide representation. Because of this we strongly urge you to consider our recommendations for the preliminary maps.

MEMBERS OF THE NEW YORK CITY DISTRICTING COMMISSION, members of the public and other stakeholders present. Thank you for the opportunity to address you on the subject of redistricting New York City Council District 5. My name is Cynthia Gardstein. I am a resident of Sutton Place South. I retired as Senior Vice President of Steven Winter Associates, Inc., a nationally renowned architectural/engineering consulting firm. My entire career has been deeply involved in housing and community.

I will not address the numbers although I understand the redistricting process and the guidelines established: the process is mandated every 10 years; boundaries take into account population and demographic changes and the districts should ensure all voices are represented.

I understand the challenge of drawing 51 councils of relatively equal size across all boroughs. I support the proposed redrawn map submitted by Community Board 8 (attached to my statement).



Community Resident, born 1936, NYC; raised and lives in Harlem all of my life.

What does the word community bring to one's mind?

To my mind, it brings the thoughts of persons living in a particular area within the larger society, a particular area composed of people sharing a common history, interests, identity, culture, ethnicity, social, civic, political, economic, educational, recreational activity and thought, managing to live in order and harmony.

Community means people working and celebrating, collaborating, and protecting one another from unsettling and disturbing experiences. People fighting against discrimination and marginalization, harnessing our power, protecting and preserving our culture, noting choices, getting through challenges with love and bravery.

Congressional District 13 is a federally protected district which contains Assembly District 70 and Councilmanic District 9. This congressional seat was created specifically for Harlem. The protected status of this district is to ensure its people the opportunity to elect representation of its choice; to ensure its fundamental right to elect people of its own ethnicity and to make decisions for its own community, and to ensure the vote of community members, and not to be diluted by nefarious, heavy handed Jim Crow counting methods arrived at by adding or deleting areas in and around the district which would impact any election, and the way we interact with each other.

Trying to separate the Rangel Houses and the Polo Grounds Developments from Harlem and push them into Washington Heights is like separating a limb from a body and is an abominable decision. Likewise, pushing the lower end of Councilmanic District 9 further south is like moving another extremity, and is equally abominable. Making these changes do not represent the view of our community and a decision of this importance should be in the hands of Harlem's people. If you had come in good faith, you would have asked the community what we thought about the situation.

You can also go to the west side, an area which has more than enough population. Again, we are opposed to any rezoning of Rangel Houses and Polo Grounds, pushing them to Washington Heights, and opposed to pushing Councilmanic District 9 further south, possibly resulting in the election of and representation by non-ethnic persons.

The Harlem home of Congressional District 13 is the historic capital of African American culture and your actions are tantamount to erasing our culture, displacing our people and are most troubling. I have been a resident of Hell's Kitchen / Times Square for three years, and I am opposed to the redistricting proposal under consideration because it carves my home neighborhood out of District #3 and lumps it into a District (#4) with which it has very little in common and which is itself (as proposed) internally incoherent.

To clarify definitions in this below email, when I say "traditional Hell's Kitchen," I mean the area between W 42nd St and W 57th St (south to north) and 8th Avenue to 12th Avenue (east to west). This neighborhood feels like a coherent community, and although my address falls just outside of it (on the east side of 8th Ave at W 54th St), I feel like a part of this community too.

I live at 260 W 54th Street, specifically, on the east side of 8th Ave between W 53rd and W 54th Sts. The residential area in which I live, which stretches north-northwest of Times Square (west of Broadway but east of 8th Avenue, north of W 45th St) and flows into traditional Hell's Kitchen, is characterized by high tourist and commercial traffic; lively nightlife; and a vibrant arts and cultural scene. Residents of my neighborhood are more diverse and skew younger than the residents of the neighborhoods on the east side of Midtown that compose the existing and proposed District #4.

We (residents in my immediate area) do have a lot in common with residents of "traditional Hell's Kitchen" as defined above. My neighborhood and its benefits (e.g., art, cultural and touristic attractions) as well as its pain points (e.g., truck traffic on the avenues, higher crime and disorderly conduct) align very closely with those of traditional Hells Kitchen. East Midtown, the Upper East Side, and Stuy Town simply do not share these characteristics with my area to nearly the same extent.

Therefore, if my area (the northeast section of existing District #3) is absorbed into District #4 as is proposed, I do not feel that my community's interests will continue to be well represented; we will feel politically disconnected from the rest of District #4 and I fear that our neighborhood's needs will not be prioritized. Please make all efforts to keep my area "intact" in a district that is contiguous with the rest of traditional Hells Kitchen.

I write in opposition to the proposed redistricting that would move the narrow area east of First Avenue that is currently in Council District 5 to Queens Council District 26. That area should remain within Council District 5.

The Mount Vernon Hotel Museum & Garden (MVHM&G) is housed in a 1799 building, the 8th oldest historical structure still standing in Manhattan, and offers considerable and vital links to the immediate area's long history as a vibrant part of Manhattan. In addition to being part of the community and building strong relationships with our neighbors, the Museum has also benefitted enormously from close relationships to our past Council District 5 representatives; the discretionary funding at the council representative's disposal has supported cultural institutions in the district, such as the MVHM&G, that are making important cultural contributions to the immediate community as well as to the larger NYC population. Were the Museum to move to Queens Council District 26, this much-needed funding would be in even shorter supply, which would translate to less city-sponsored financial assistance going to institutions that directly support their local communities. In the case of the Mount Vernon Hotel Museum & Garden, that means school visits for children to learn about New York City history, including the long role of immigrants in our city's evolution, members of the public coming for tours and to enjoy public programs about New York City across centuries, and other types of programming for a variety of audiences to help engage them about New York's history in the 1820s and 1830s and the parallels to today.

We share the community's concern regarding such significant portions of the East Side possibly being moved to a Queens-centered district. The impacted neighborhoods comprise a singular community with the Upper East Side, and are deeply tied to the area through history, geography, and personal and institutional relationships. Community District 8 ranks 47th out of 59 Districts with the least amount of public park space. This plan would remove 24 Sycamores Park, most of Honey Locust Park, most of the East River Esplanade, and all of Andrew Haswell Green Park (AHG). AHG Phase 3 of the park will likely cost 25 million dollars to complete. Will a Council Member in CD26 spend that kind of money for an area that represents only 27% of the residents/voters in her/his District? Not to mention that the parks that move to CD#26 Queens will have a different Borough Commissioner from the sections that remain in CD5.

Third and finally, this oddly shaped, extreme crossover district will significantly and adversely impact the provision of municipal services and diminish the political voices of thousands of Manhattan's residents. We refer you to the resolution passed by Community Board 8 disapproving the redistricting commission's map and refer you to the map proposed by Community Board 8's resolution, which would result in District 4 having a population of 177,446 and District 5 a population of 177,176 etc.

Dear Members of the NYC Redistricting Commission:

I am writing to voice my opposition to the proposed lines that would remove our building, 420 East 72nd Street, from Manhattan and give us representation from Queens. With all due respect this just doesn't make sense.

Although I am actively engaged professionally on the west side, and have worked with some of the members of the Commission I am a life long east side resident having moved here when I graduated from college in 1965. For years prior to getting married I lived at 72nd and First and then when I got married I moved to 92nd Street. Seven years ago my husband, Robert Lemieux and I moved back to 72nd Street directly across from the building that I lived in before. I felt as if I were coming home. I have worked closely for and with city government since 1965 and follow all the activities of CB8 and the 72nd Street Association. This neighborhood is home to many long standing, great institutions many of which we use. They are part of the Manhattan/east side fabric.

I will not repeat the many reasons this just doesn't make sense. Others including CB 8 have enumerated the concerns more eloquently than I can.

We have outstanding representation in the Council and are well served by Councilmember Menin. We share a community of interests with our neighbors on the west side of first avenue, second, and and beyond, and while there is good representation in Queens, our interests and concerns are just not the same. We have many major anchor institutions east of First that are integral parts of Manhattan and that contribute to this neighborhood. These institutions serve the entire city but they are part of the East Side. If we were to be represented by a Queens council person, it would be impossible to properly assess the uniqueness of this stretch of the east side. This would require several district offices, staffers with different skill sets, and leave us with inadequate representation. This part of the UES has a very high concentration of seniors many of who use all these centers of excellence — educational institutions, medical facilities, community centers, etc. While I cannot write on behalf of the major institutions that would be dramatically affected by this proposal, I can say that all of the elected officials that I have worked with over the years have had the critical expertise and knowledge to deal with these issues. Neighborhoods are different — density, different issues, concerns, traffic and transportation issues, service issues and soon even congestion pricing. Queens just doesn't have the same issues.

It appears to me that the draft proposal violates the criteria outlined in the Charter — specifically neighborhoods and communities of interest would not be intact; the proposed district would not be compact; the proposed district results in an extreme crossover district and finally is oddly shaped. As someone who is responsible for a neighborhood that has strange boundaries, and more than one councilmember and community board, I can tell you that it can pose many issues and difficulties. And while many council members try and work collaboratively, when neighborhoods are totally different, it is just more challenging.

I would hope that the Commission in its wisdom would see that this proposed redistricting just doesn't make sense.

Community Resident, born 1936, NYC; raised and lives in Harlem all of my life.

What does the word community bring to one's mind?

To my mind, it brings the thoughts of persons living in a particular area within the larger society, a particular area composed of people sharing a common history, interests, identity, culture, ethnicity, social, civic, political, economic, educational, recreational activity and thought, managing to live in order and harmony.

Community means people working and celebrating, collaborating, and protecting one another from unsettling and disturbing experiences. People fighting against discrimination and marginalization, harnessing our power, protecting and preserving our culture, noting choices, getting through challenges with love and bravery.

Congressional District 13 is a federally protected district which contains Assembly District 70 and Councilmanic District 9. This congressional seat was created specifically for Harlem. The protected status of this district is to ensure its people the opportunity to elect representation of its choice; to ensure its fundamental right to elect people of its own ethnicity and to make decisions for its own community, and to ensure the vote of community members, and not to be diluted by nefarious, heavy handed Jim Crow counting methods arrived at by adding or deleting areas in and around the district which would impact any election, and the way we interact with each other.

Trying to separate the Rangel Houses and the Polo Grounds Developments from Harlem and push them into Washington Heights is like separating a limb from a body and is an abominable decision. Likewise, pushing the lower end of Councilmanic District 9 further south is like moving another extremity, and is equally abominable. Making these changes do not represent the view of our community and a decision of this importance should be in the hands of Harlem's people. If you had come in good faith, you would have asked the community what we thought about the situation.

It was insulting and demeaning to us that you created a Harlem agenda to discuss and hold hearings about a life impacting decision concerning Harlem and its people and to hold these meetings outside of Harlem without input from the people of Harlem. We are outraged but are glad you had a change of mind and came to the Schomburg Center.

If you wish to change the populations of Councilmanic Districts 7 and 10, then rework 7 & 10, and leave Councilmanic District 9 intact. You can also go to the west side, an area which has more than enough population. Again, we are opposed to any rezoning of Rangel Houses and Polo Grounds, pushing them to Washington Heights, and opposed to pushing Councilmanic District 9 further south, possibly resulting in the election of and representation by non-ethnic persons.

The Harlem home of Congressional District 13 is the historic capital of African American culture and your actions are tantamount to erasing our culture, displacing our people and are most troubling. This is an attempted takedown and separation of the very fabric of our community, and if you follow through with your poorly thought out decision, it will be about the perpetuation of your power and not about the wellbeing of our community.

As people of struggle, we are strong and resilient people who have had to survive in this country with all of its difficulties. Take note: we have endured 300 years of slavery, 100 years of segregation and produced a president 50 years after all of that!

We are the magnificent sons and daughters of preachers, teachers, authors, athletes, painters, singers, musicians, physicians, politicians, hairdressers, dressmakers, lawyers, cooks, craftsmen, businessmen, and military strategists. We have both film and story!

I write in opposition to the proposed redistricting that would move the narrow area east of First Avenue that is currently in Council District 5 to Queens Council District 26. That area should remain within Council District 5.

The Mount Vernon Hotel Museum & Garden (MVHM&G) is housed in a 1799 building, the 8th oldest historical structure still standing in Manhattan, and offers considerable and vital links to the immediate area's long history as a vibrant part of Manhattan. In addition to being part of the community and building strong relationships with our neighbors, the Museum has also benefited enormously from close relationships to our past Council District 5 representatives; the discretionary funding at the council representative's disposal has supported cultural institutions in the district, such as the MVHM&G, that are making important cultural contributions to the immediate community as well as to the larger NYC population. Were the Museum to move to Queens Council District 26, this much-needed funding would be in even shorter supply, which would translate to less city-sponsored financial assistance going to institutions that directly support their local communities.
