Thank you for providing me with an opportunity to comment on the redistricting maps proposed by the Redistricting Commission on July 15, 2002.

Attached is the link to maps (<a href="https://districtr.org/plan/137797">https://districtr.org/plan/137797</a>) which reflect how I want our community to be redistricted. As a long-time resident of District 31, the only change that is needed is to include all of JFK Airport in the district because of the following.

- First, JFK was previously a part of District 31 so this change would simply correct an error from the last redistricting cycle.
- Second, the communities of Rosedale, Brookville, Laurelton, Springfield Gardens, Edgemere, Far Rockaway and Arverne which are currently in the district, are directly in the airport flight path. Therefore, consolidating JFK Airport under "one district umbrella" will make it easier to holistically address current and future concerns.
- Additionally, JFK is currently represented by one Congressional, State Senate and Assembly member so there is simply no need for two separate Council Members to retain the airport in their districts.

The rest of District 31 should remain intact because of the historical and common characteristics (e.g., race, political party, geography, and type of home ownership) consistent in each of our communities which should not be tampered with. Below, I cite evidence to support this statement.

Rosedale, Laurelton, Brookville, and our portion of Springfield Gardens are contiguous. 

My area of Richmond Hill is in District 29 which includes Rego Park, Forest Hills, and Kew Gardens. The newly redrawn maps do a better job at having Richmond Hill North and South be together in one district. Our community voice has been split into three districts (28,29,&32) and thus that has diluted the voice of voters and having a Council representative who cares about our community concerns.

The newly redrawn maps are hard to see and the boundary lines aren't very clear. I did use the online mapping system, but I had a hard time making every district at least 172,000. The Nepali Community settled in Woodside, Sunnyside, and Astoria in the 1990s with a large population growth in the early 2000s. As of this year, over 20,000 Nepali members call district 26 our home. Most of us immigrated with DV lotteries, asylum seekers, TPS status seekers and many youth with student visas.

In district 26 the Nepali community gather and organize in nonprofits like Adhikaar, Community Centers, Hyolmo Center, Lo Nyamship Mustang Center, Magar Community Office, and Tamang Association, Nyingma Dharma Spiritual Center – all which are located in Sunnyside and Woodside where we all live. We, the Nepali community, also are active members of the local economy by owning and working at small businesses in Astoria, Sunnyside, and Woodside in the district. After all these efforts, investments, and progress that we made in less than 30 years, we request the Redistricting Commission not to pull us apart and disempower our voice by dividing us into four separate council districts.

If divided into four council districts like the new maps propose, it would disrupt the progress that we made, continuity of services, dividing the resource flow for Nepali Community members. We have the first, Council Office who have served our community in Nepali language, which had its first Nepali intern and it is a huge victory. I am concerned that the current redistricting plan will further aggravate what is a serious problem: the inequality that exists between the new gold coast of the luxury waterfront towers in Hunter's Point and the older Long Island City that is north of the 59th Street Bridge which includes both the Queensbridge and Ravenswood Public Houses within the present District 26. 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My name is Fredrika Wilson. I am a cooperator and resident of Rochdale Village (RV), which is in Council District 28. This is my written testimony in opposition to the current redistricting plan for District 28.

The redistricting proposal for Council District 28 will split RV by placing one half of a Building and the Community Center between two Council Districts. This will fracture our RV community, will not protect programming for our vulnerable seniors, will not provide continuity of resources for this complex and disrupt the operational continuity of this community.

This complex has 20 buildings arranged in five circular groups with 4 buildings per Group. Each building has three sections - "A", "B" and "C". Along Bedell Street there are three Groups - 1, 2 and 3. On the Guy R. Brewer Boulevard there are two Groups - 1 and 5. The proposed redistricting of District 28 would place Groups 1, 2 except one half of building 7, and 5 in District 28, and the other half of building 7 along with Groups 3, 4 and half of RV's Community Center in District 30.

Rochdale Village was designed to be, and function as, a "City within a City", providing continuity of services and programs. RV has its own power plant that generates all the electrical power, heating, air conditioning and domestic hot water services. The power plant provides these services independently with no connection to any outside utility company. RV's Department of Public Safety protects the residents, visitors and the property of the complex. RV has two shopping malls, a community center and its own branch of the Queens Public Library System.

Any funding provided by one council member to his or her half of this complex will certainly disrupt the quality of life and will not provide the continuity of resources for services. For example, in 2021, Council Member Adrienne Adams was able to provide RV funding for the facade work for all 20 buildings. Had this council district been split in two at the time, only half of the complex's buildings would have been fixed. The NORC program and RV's Senior Center will sit in District 30, while the seniors these programs serve will be split in two Districts. Thus, leaving the programming for this vulnerable population unprotected. This proposed Plan will created a nightmare scenario for the managing agent and the management of RV. In fact, this proposal will make the management of funds provided by two council members for their Districts within this complex extremely difficult, confusing to the residents and disruptive to the operational continuity of this community.

But, the residents of the Upper East Side have very different needs and interest than those of the Queens district and, as a small portion of the new district would effectively lose any voice at City Hall. I think any reasonable person would agree that for a hyper-local government unit like a City Council district, it is ludicrous to separate a group of Manhattanites from other Manhattanites for the convenience of some bureaucratic body.

Good evening, to the Chair, Mr. Dennis Walcott, and members of the NYC Districting Commission. My name is Jean Hall, I live in Rochdale Village, and I serve on the Board of Directors for Rochdale Village, which is in District 28, Queens.

I am opposed to the proposed lines for District 28, specifically focusing on the impact to the community of Rochdale Village. The lines as currently proposed would divide this community into several council districts (27, 28 and 31) and in fact splits on of our buildings in half. The proposed lines are not viable because as the second largest Mitchell Lama development in NY State that houses 5,860 units of affordable housing serving over 25,000 residents of New York City the affect be devasting to our community.

Because of the rich history upon which this community was built to serve middle income families by providing them with affordable housing is key. This housing community was created to be a city within a city. Our community currently spans approximately 120 acres and provides our residents with open green spaces within the urban Jamaica area. Therefore, keeping our community within one district and avoiding crossover districts is key.

Because Rochdale Village serves a vibrant community of seniors, and veterans who depend on the vital services within the senior center segregating the community may jeopardize critical funding for the delivery of social services.

Because Rochdale Village features fully equipped playgrounds, satellite daycare centers and is anchored by three schools, PS 354, The Stem Institute of Queens, PS 80 Thurgood Marshall Magnet School and Catherine and Count Basie Junior High School 72 and we have our own branch of the Queens Public Library system drawing lines that shift this dynamic landscape would be counterproductive to keeping neighborhoods and communities intact.

Because Rochdale Village generates its own power with our power plant that is our most critical infrastructure source. The power plant is a 21-megawatt cogeneration facility that provides all of our heating, cooling, domestic hot water, and electricity capabilities. The power plant covers our entire complex including our two shopping malls. I remember when the blackout of 2003 occurred and the city went dark. Rochdale Village was a beacon of light and provided services for not only our residents but the surrounding communities.

Because Rochdale Village offers amenities/facilities which include parks, basketball and handball courts, tennis courts, medical offices, United States Postal facility, fitness room, two shopping centers that provide opportunities for small businesses, women and minority owned businesses keeping our district compact to align with the objectives of this commission is fundamental.

Because the residents of Rochdale Village are civic-minded, motivated, and majority democratic voters; the commission must draw lines that avoid splitting voters of the same political party.

This only serves to dilute our voting power and may severely diminish our effectiveness via representation. Splitting this community into three districts will certainly not provide cohesive and effective representation and I know that was not the intent of this commission.

The new lines proposed by the commission currently splits one of our buildings in half. That will result in confusion for our residents. Based on the current proposal the commission did not avoid creating an oddly shaped district.

The rich history of Rochdale Village dates back to 1963 when this development was opened. It was the largest private housing cooperative in the world. The community continues to grow and serve working class, retirees, youth, seniors, and everyone in-between. We have historically been part of District 28 and want our great community of 20 buildings to remain in District 28, together and not divided.

I urge the Commission to re-evaluate the proposed lines and keep Rochdale Village whole. District 27, 28, and 31 Council Members are working with the Queens Civic Congress on a map that supports and does not fracture the Southeast Queens Community.

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Dear New York City Redistricting Commission,

Thank you for providing me with an opportunity to comment on the redistricting maps proposed by the Redistricting Commission on July 15, 2002.

Attached is the link to maps (https://districtr.org/plan/137797) which reflect how I want our community to be redistricted. As a long-time resident of District 31, the only change that is needed is to include all of JFK Airport in the district because of the following.

- First, JFK was previously a part of District 31 so this change would simply correct an error from the last redistricting cycle.
- Second, the communities of Rosedale, Brookville, Laurelton, Springfield Gardens, Edgemere, Far Rockaway and Arverne which are currently in the district, are directly in the airport flight path. Therefore, consolidating JFK Airport under "one district umbrella" will make it easier to holistically address current and future concerns.
- Additionally, JFK is currently represented by one Congressional, State Senate and Assembly member so there is simply no need for two separate Council Members to retain the airport in their districts.

The rest of District 31 should remain intact because of the historical and common characteristics (e.g., race, political party, geography, and type of home ownership) consistent in each of our communities which should not be tampered with. Below, I cite evidence to support this statement.

Rosedale, Laurelton, Brookville, and our portion of Springfield Gardens are contiguous. Their communities are Black registered Democratic voters, and the residents are primarily one-and two-family homeowners. The issues we face are consistent whether it is improving education, ensuring access to health services, protecting the environment, tackling airport noise, dealing with flooding, creating jobs, or providing adequate public safety for our residents and families. For decades, this district's civic associations (e.g., Eastern Queens Alliance, Inc., Rosedale Civic Association, Inc., Federated Blocks of Laurelton, Concerned Citizens of Laurelton, Springfield/Rosedale Community Action Association, Inc., Spring-Gar Civic Association, Inc., and Springfield Gardens Taxpayers and Citizens Association) have worked closely together at all levels of government to address these issues and drive needed change. We have also launched special task forces (e.g., 116th Precinct Community Task Force, Southeastern Queens Zoning Preservation Task Force, and the Queens Community Task Force Against Illegal Truck Parking) to fight for the new precinct and to focus on the most important "quality of life" issues in our community.

The Rockaways and Arverne by the Sea communities should also remain intact within the 31st District because they share similar characteristics to the district's "mainland" communities. For example, the Rockaways' portion of the

district is made up of primarily Black Democrat who are one- or two-family homeowners. Any changes would split the Democratic vote, disrupt the political dynamics, and negatively impact the interests and desires of its residents. To preserve and to continually advance the common interests and concerns in District 31, I petition the Commission to keep our district intact with the only exception being to include JFK Airport in its entirety in the district to restore the continuity that existed before.

My name is Khom Thapa from Nepali Community and live in Woodside region of the district 26.

My time was set for 6 PM in person testimony but did not come my turn till 7:15 pm and had to leave to pick my son. That's why I am sending email as testimony.

The Nepali Community settled in Woodside, Sunnyside, and Astoria in the 1990s with a large population growth in the early 2000s. As of this year, over 20,000 Nepali members call district 26 our home. Most of us immigrated with DV lotteries, asylum seekers, TPS status seekers and many youth with student visas.

In district 26 the Nepali community gather and organize in nonprofits like Adhikaar, Community Centers, Hyolmo Center, Lo Nyamship Mustang Center, Magar Community Office, and Tamang Association, Nyingma Dharma Spiritual Center – all which are located in Sunnyside and Woodside where we all live. We, the Nepali community, also are active members of the local economy by owning and working at small businesses in Astoria, Sunnyside, and Woodside in the district. After all these efforts, investments, and progress that we made in less than 30 years, we request the Redistricting Commission not to pull us apart and disempower our voice by dividing us into four separate council districts.

If divided into four council districts like the new maps propose, it would disrupt the progress that we made, continuity of services, dividing the resource flow for Nepali Community members. We have the first, Council Office who have served our community in Nepali language, which had its first Nepali intern and it is a huge victory. We also want to stay together with the other Himalyan an Asian American community of district 26 where the overall AAPI population grew by 33% according to the last census for district 26. ### Dear NYC Districting Commission:

District 26 is my home. And I am proud to be part of a diverse community where people of color and immigrants make up the majority — according to the 2020 census, 66% of the respondents of District 26 identified as Latin American, Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI), and Black — the very communities of interest protected by the Voting Rights Act. District 26 is currently the home to Little Manila for our Filipino neighbors, Little Bangladesh for our Bangladeshi neighbors, Tibet Way for our Tibetan Neighbors, and is currently assembling a little Taiwan in Long Island City.

Our local YMCA has the only Japanese Immersion program in NYC for our Japanese neighbors in Sunnyside and Long Island City. When you walk down Skillman Avenue in Sunnyside, you'll see Korean letters on the awnings of Korean hair salons, laundromats, and restaurants. On Queens Blvd, Northern Blvd, and Roosevelt Ave of Sunnyside and Woodside there are multiple Korean Churches where Korean Americans gather to worship. It is no surprise that we elected our first immigrant and Asian American council member to this district, reflecting the 33% growth of the AAPI population in the latest census. The preliminary map of District 26 from the redistricting commission would divide Woodside into four council districts fracturing the AAPI community of District 26 from where they reside, worship, work, and gather. The fracturing in representation would negatively impact the AAPI community's ability to effectuate public policy for public interest.

In addition to the AAPI community, District 26 is also the home to the Colombian community, Ecuadorian community, Peruvian community, Mexican community, and so many other Latin American immigrants who make up 29% of our district. From Long Island City, Astoria, Sunnyside, to Woodside, there is not a corner of our district that does not have Spanish-speaking Catholic churches, Mexican taquerias/delis, Colombian bakeries, Peruvian chicken joints, Spanish-speaking arts organizations like Thalia Spanish Theater and Manhatitlan Mexican Folkloric Dance club, and non profits like NICE, which serve our new immigrant neighbors. District 26 is also the home to the Ecuadorian Consulate of NYC. The preliminary map from the redistricting commission would divide Woodside into four council districts fracturing the Latin American communities from where they reside, worship, work, and gather. The fracturing in representation would negatively impact the Latin American community's ability to effectuate public policy for public interest.

When speaking of people of color that make up our district, we cannot forget the residents of Queensbridge Houses, Ravenswood Houses, and Woodside Houses. Queensbridge Houses, the largest public houses in the country, has been a part of this district since the 1940s. These three NYCHAs have been together in the district for over 20 years and provide consistency and continuation in receiving public resources such as capital investments and benefits. Many of the students from our NYCHAs attend school in District 26 — predominantly in Long Island City — and the current school district is in the midst of a rezoning to integrate our Black and brown schools with predominantly white schools. Cutting them out of the district they traditionally have been a part of will disrupt their education accessibility, capital funding projects, and their ability to receive services when there are two separate council members for their school district.

The proposed map would remove six schools from our district in Community Education Council 24 and Community Education Council 30: PS 111, Voice Charter, PS 76, PS 152, The Woodside Community School, and PS 12.

To summarize, preliminary maps proposed by the NYC Districting Commission would break up our immigrant communities and Black communities into FOUR different City Council districts, severely limiting their political power. The new district would shift from majority people of color protected by the Voting Rights Act to predominantly white - violating the NY City Charter:

- White population increases from 29% to 44%
- Hispanic population decreases from 29% to 22%
- Asian population decreases from 31% to 25%
- Black population decreases from 6% to 4%

The preliminary map fails to comply with the City Charter's requirements of fair and effective representation; keeping neighborhoods and communities intact; keeping districts compact; limiting crossover districts; and avoiding oddly shaped districts. In the borough of Queens, we already have two crossover districts — District 22 and District 34. If the preliminary lines were to stay for District 26, we would add a third cross over district to Queens. The preliminary map is also not contiguous; in order for a District 26 resident to travel to Roosevelt Island, they would have to leave District 26 and cross over to District 22 to take the only land bridge to Roosevelt island in the neighboring district.

In addition to the illegal shift of our population from majority people of color to majority white — our average income level would double in the preliminary map from an average of \$70-80k to \$140-150k. In essence, the redistricting commission has dissolved a working class, predominantly people of color district to create a wealthy, white district, violating the requirement to keep neighborhoods and communities of interests intact as well as the requirement of fair and effective representation of those protected by the VRA.

As a resident of District 26, I ask that the redistricting commission uses this proposed map: <a href="https://districtr.org/plan/138001">https://districtr.org/plan/138001</a>, which reaches our ideal population of ~172k residents by removing outer edges of our district without dividing the communities protected by the Voting Rights Act (Black, Latin American, and Asian). We ask that you keep Woodside whole as part of District 26 so that we don't fracture the immigrant community's ability to effectuate public policy for public interest. If divided, our AAPI and Latin American communities will be served by four council members instead of being advocated by one council member with greater community impact. We would also like to highlight that the Tibetan Community, who have been discriminated against in geopolitical issues, must be placed together in District 26 connecting them to Sunnyside, Astoria, Long Island City with Woodside where they reside and organize. The Tibetan community center, which is the home to 15,000 Tibetan Americans, is located in Woodside. We also ask that you allow the NYCHAs to remain in the district as they have been and undivided — Queensbridge, Ravenswood and Woodside Houses together.

We ask that District 26 remains solely in Queens and the district compactness remains virtually the same as the prior map, instead of the "C" shape in the proposed map. If you were to ask District 26 residents to choose between Woodside and Sunnyside for the district — many will say it would be unconscionable to divide the "sides." To us, there is no border where Sunnyside ends and Woodside begins because we are one loving community. NYC Districting Commission, we urge you to allow us to remain intact as one community as we have been for generations to adhere to the NYC charter guidelines for redistricting. Thank you and as a voting member of one of the representative demographics in this district, I look forward to the NYC Districting Commission to heed my community's feedback

The realities of what it means to live on the east side of the Upper East Side have no context with the lives and conditions of those in Long Island City, Astoria, and Sunnyside/Woodside. It is appalling that the preliminary maps proposed by the NYC Districting Commission would break up the mostly-immigrant communities and Black communities into four distinct City Council districts, which will severely limit their political power.

Good Evening,

My name is Mahtab Khan. I am a South Asian activist from Jamaica, Queens. It's my hometown and I've lived here all my life. I am here to speak in opposition of the map draft released by the commission for City Council District 24, this is the district I reside in.

I also wanted to present my map draft for an ideal district, which I will try to upload online later since I'm unable to share my screen.

My map draft, meets the required amount needed for a new district map and even meets the 5% deviation rule with a total of 179,101 people. The east end border of this new map is Lakeville Road and the west end border of this map is the Van Wyck expressway. The north end border of this new map is Grand Central Parkway and the south end border is Jamaica Avenue. My map is very similar to the map draft I had pitched to the other Redistricting Commission for Assembly District 24 in 2021.

I decided to do this because I believe my map draft adheres to the Voting Rights Act of 1965 in preventing new districts from diluting minority communities or denying them a voting bloc. These minority communities are marginalized and immigrant communities, but I will be presenting on behalf of the South Asian community.

Unfortunately, the map draft released by the commission is very similar to the past District 24 map and I believe it violates the Voting Rights Act of 1965 by not acknowledging the South Asian community's growth or contributions, especially from the new Census data.

The South Asian community has a strong presence in District 24 and has been undermined by the redistricting process. This community has been neglected for far too long, despite it being a community that has contributed deeply to society both in the economy and in previous elections as a strong voting bloc. That neglect is erasure and I am surprised the map released by the commission does not acknowledge all this.

My map draft would help address the underfunding, underrepresentation, and undeserving of the South Asian community. These issues are all connected to how a map is drawn and who is the representative holding the seat.

We heard of no taxation without representation, but these marginalized and immigrant communities are still burdened by taxes, yet aren't receiving adequate representation with people who understand their struggle. We do not have actual representation here from city and state legislators here in South East and East Queens of a representative who comes from the South Asian community.

The establishment and those with ties to it will attempt to divide this community and their voting bloc further just as what happened in the past. We could say commission members and even judges aren't political, but realistically everything is influenced by politics.

I know that some commission members might have some ties with the Mayor and current or past City Council Members, but for that reason, I request that the commission use its integrity in recognition of the reason they are serving on the commission today and the responsibility they have on making maps that help address the needs of marginalized and immigrant communities that have been severely underfunded, underrepresented, and underserved. NYC is considered the most diverse place in the world in terms of culture with over 600 languages spoken here.

The lack of immigration resources and language accessibility that we surprisingly have even to this day are issues that deeply impact the South Asian Community here in District 24 and a South Asian-led district with new representation could help address this. We currently have a city council member here who doesn't understand the struggles of marginalized and immigrant communities such as that of the South Asian community.

We also have a huge South Asian Voting bloc here City Council District 24 which extends to City Council District 23. Elected officials both from the past and present know this but have been abusing their power by not allowing this community to be heard and from receiving the proper representation it deserves. Often the South Asian community is tokenized and we only see elected officials meet with us when it's for photo ops, but not necessarily when we need resources to help address our needs. These same city council members decide to prioritize and send more discretionary funds towards privileged affluent white communities rather than marginalized and immigrant communities that are struggling. We need representation from people who truly understand the struggle of folks from marginalized and immigrant communities. Not someone who comes with wealth or privilege. That's how we help solve systemic issues that work against marginalized and immigrant communities.

The seat for District 24 is currently held by City Council Member James Gennaro who found a loophole and went out of his way to run for the same seat again after finding out that folks from the South Asian community who were Progressive were running. Community members believed that he didn't want the South Asian community to move up and decided to gatekeep this seat. During the 2021 election cycle, he also neglected the South Asian community by ignoring South Asian-led organizations and not attending their forum or debate events, and by not filling out their questionnaires. This would have been for a healthy and fair democratic process where we could hold politicians accountable which Gennaro obviously did not care for. He also does not take our voting bloc seriously even though we have a lot of potential as one of the biggest communities to come out to vote.

We have to be mindful and take into consideration how one of the biggest population increases here in NYC according to the 2020 census data was that of the Asian community which went up by 345,000 people. This includes the South Asian Community but the census data had limitations on breaking down demographic data further. I'm hoping that in 2030 we could bring reform to the census data collection process to address what didn't work out in 2020.

Since the city council has a budget of \$10 billion dollars, we have to make sure we have the right kind of representation. That means elected officials who understand the struggles of marginalized and immigrant communities such as the South Asian community and who will prioritize help address their needs. It also wouldn't hurt to have this representative be someone who is relatable to these communities and who actually knows the everyday struggles of working-class people as a tenant and as someone who actually takes public transportation regularly. We all know that representation matters in all levels of government and how much difference it could make.

We do not need any more status quo politicians. We must also reflect on the mistakes made in the past, especially with the 2021 redistricting commission, and learn from it so that we may improve the redistricting process for City Council Districts. Please take these suggestions into consideration and go back to the drawing board in making equitable inclusive and fair districts that adhere to the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Thank you.

The Nepali Community settled in Woodside, Sunnyside, and Astoria in the 1990s with a large population growth in the early 2000s. As of this year, over 20,000 Nepali members call district 26 our home. Most of us immigrated with DV lotteries, asylum seekers, TPS status seekers and many youth with student visas.

In district 26 the Nepali community gather and organize in nonprofits like Adhikaar, Community Centers, Hyolmo Center, Lo Nyamship Mustang Center, Magar Community Office, and Tamang Association, Nyingma Dharma Spiritual Center – all which are located in Sunnyside and Woodside where we all live. We, the Nepali community, also are active members of the local economy by owning and working at small businesses in Astoria, Sunnyside, and Woodside in the district. After all these efforts, investments, and progress that we made in less than 30 years, we request the Redistricting Commission not to pull us apart and disempower our voice by dividing us into four separate council districts.

If divided into four council districts like the new maps propose, it would disrupt the progress that we made, continuity of services, dividing the resource flow for Nepali Community members. We have the first, Council Office who have served our community in Nepali language, which had its first Nepali intern and it is a huge victory. We also want to stay together

with the other Himalyan an Asian American community of district 26 where the overall AAPI population grew by 33% according to the last census for district 26. 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The Woodside community that is fully contained in the 11377 zip code is a rich, diverse, vibrant working-class community that is united in interest with a long history and tradition. Woodside is nationally known for its status as the zip code that had more residents give their lives during the Vietnam War than any other zip code in the USA.

In 1992, hundreds of Woodside residents attended that year's redistricting commission to demand to be represented by the same member of the City Council. They demanded this to ensure that the interests of each section of the neighborhood would have the equal clout and they won. That redistricting commission rendered a district in which 95% of the 11377 zip code was contained in the same Council District.

Woodside is a community of large housing developments that provided affordable housing for tens of thousands of working-class residents that include the Boulevard Gardens, Woodside Houses, the Big Six cooperative, Berkeley Towers and the Sky View to name a few. These complexes, all built through government programs between 1935-1965 form the living core of Woodside's longstanding solid neighborhoods of mostly immigrant families. Surrounding these complexes are surrounded by small low scale single family home communities that were built by developers such as Cord-Meyer and the Matthews Brothers. All of these complexes maintain a very strong identity as Woodside residents whether they are recently settled immigrants or second and third generation families.

In the 1970's Woodside residents created the community-based organization Woodside On The Move which has served the community providing job training, housing assistance and after school programs in PS 11, PS 151 and PS 152. Woodside on the Move's support from the Council could be jeopardized by being divided up into multiple Council districts.

Woodside's distinct community continues to be documented for its being an affordable alternative to Astoria and Long Island City. (https://www.nytimes.com/2014/06/01/realestate/woodside-queens-an-affordable-convenient-triangle.html).

Because of the needs of its working-class families that continue to raise their families in Woodside it is imperative that our community not be carved up into other Council Districts where the needs of our residents will be subordinate to the needs of the residents of other neighborhoods such as Astoria or Sunnyside. Please revise the draft maps to include all of the 11377 zip code in the same district to ensure that our residents receive the best representation in the City Council.

In this census, the Special Master has already carved up 11377 into three separate Assembly Districts and three separate Congressional Districts and our neighborhood continues to be diminished with this new proposed Council alignment. It is imperative that our Woodside zip code 11377 have consolidated political representation to support our community and its future.

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My name is Tyler Herald and I am reaching out as a concerned citizen about the latest city council redistricting maps. I have been a resident of Woodside for the past four years. In those four years I have lived in two different areas of Woodside. I have organized, I have canvassed, I have gone to restaurants and small businesses, I have went to get groceries, and I have walked the sidewalks of much of the current District 26. As someone who has lived here for a good length of time, I have become familiar with my community and I am concerned to see our neighborhoods split up. I can speak the most of Sunnyside and Woodside since I live in the area. Splitting up Sunnyside and Woodside doesn't make sense to me. These neighborhoods are so closely tied to me—it's something I talk about often with my neighbors. I've had many conversations with folks in this community where we joke that it's hard to say where Sunnyside and Woodside begin and end. The lines are blurred. Our communities have many joint celebrations throughout the year. We are often paired together for events but also in conversation. Sunnyside and Woodside are together in the minds of many who live here.

Looking at the proposed District 26 maps compared to the current/existing District 26 maps, I notice many startling differences. Our current district is 29% white non-Hispanic, 29% Hispanic, 31% Asian, and 6% Black. We are majority renters and working class people. Our incomes average at 40-50K, perhaps teetering slightly at 70K in LIC where overdevelopment and luxury housing is common.

The redrafted district is 44% white non-Hispanic, 22% Hispanic, 25% Asian, and 4% Black. That means that the redrafted district has taken a community that has a strong BIPOC population and reduced it significantly. We see this with the communities that are cut out in Woodside and also in the northern parts near Dutch Kills and Astoria. By picking up Roosevelt Island and parts of the Upper East Side, this makes our average district income 150K—that's easily over double the current income levels. By cutting out lower income and communities of color while picking up wealthier, whiter communities, I am extremely concerned about unaffordable development in this redrafted district and also how these completely different income levels would affect our district.

Looking at the City Charter guidelines and protections by the Voting Rights Act, I'm concerned that several rules appear to be broken.

- Keep neighborhoods and communities intact, Keep district continuous: as already established, this is not the case by cutting out Woodside and our other communities of color.
- Keep districts compact and avoid oddly shaped districts: It's not hard to see that looking at the comparison of the
  existing and redrafted district that the redrafted district is very spread out and extremely oddly shaped.
- Limit crossover districts: As seen by in the inclusion of Roosevelt Island and the Upper East Side. As was pointed out at the redistricting info session recently held in our neighborhood, there's no way to prevent crossing borough lines in order to access the redrafted district.
- Prevent partisan gerrymandering: As established this is clearly seen in the racial and economic disparities of the redrafted district as compared to the current district.

Going forward, I would like to see the redistricting commission maintain the existing communities that we have now. As I've articulated, from someone who walks these sidewalks and this district, the redrafted lines make no sense on the ground, the completely change the makeup of the community, and they break several rules/guidelines established by the City Charter and Voting Rights Act. It is for these reasons that the existing district lines must be maintained and preserved.

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Dear NYC Districting Commission,

I am a resident of Long Island City, Queens in District 26. I am Black Mother originally from rural Georgia, who is a wife to a Black Husband originally from South America, raising two Black sons, in what I thought was in the most diverse boroughs in the world.

I am heavily invested in the community that we call home as I attend church at The Community Church of Astoria, bring weekly donations of food to the Ravenswood Community Fridge, serve on our District's Community Education Council, and since 2020 have hosted a community Juneteenth Event in Gantry State Park.

District 26 is our home. This is a diverse community where people of color and immigrants make up the majority — according to the 2020 census, 66% of the respondents of District 26 identified as Latin American, Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI), and Black — the very communities of interest protected by the Voting Rights Act.

Furthermore, when speaking of people of color that make up our district, we cannot forget the residents of Queensbridge Houses, Ravenswood Houses, and Woodside Houses. Queensbridge Houses, the largest public housing development in the country, has been a part of this district since the 1940s. These three NYCHA developments have been together in the district for over 20 years and provide consistency and continuation in receiving public resources such as capital investments and benefits. Many of the students from these developments attend school in District 26 — predominantly in Long Island City — and the current school district where I serve on the Community Education Council is in the midst of a rezoning to ensure that the affected schools are more integrated and provide equitable educational opportunities for all. Cutting our NYCHA population out of the district they traditionally have been a part of will disrupt their education accessibility, capital funding projects, and their ability to receive services when there are two separate council members with competing priorities representing them within their school district.

The preliminary maps proposed by the NYC Districting Commission would break up our immigrant communities and Black communities into **FOUR** different City Council districts, severely limiting their political power. The new district would shift from majority people of color protected by the Voting Rights Act to predominantly white violating the NY City Charter:

- White population increases from 29% to 44%
- Hispanic population decreases from 29% to 22%
- Asian population decreases from 31% to 25%
- Black population decreases from 6% to 4%

The current preliminary maps should not move forward as is. This appears to be a tool to weaken and silence the collective voices of communities of color artificially create a district of a majority white people in the world's borough.

In addition to the illegal shift of our population from majority people of color to majority white — our average income level would double in the preliminary map from an average of \$70-80k to \$140-150k. In essence, the redistricting commission has dissolved a working class, predominantly people of color district to create an uber gentrified district, completely devoid of the rich culture and history of the area, violating the requirement to keep neighborhoods and communities of interests intact as well as the requirement of fair and effective representation of those protected by the VRA.

My family didn't survive the horrors of the Jim Crow South for me to move to the most diverse borough to have to fight to have representation and a voice. The racism of my hometown might have been more loud and confrontational, but it prepared me to fight the racism that is applied here with such surgical precision. Therefore, NYC Districting Commission, I am urging you to allow us to remain intact as one community as we have been for generations to adhere to the NYC charter guidelines for redistricting.

Stop Rochdale Village from being "Drawn and Quartered" by the NYC Districting Commission.

I am Ivan D Mossop Jr, NYS 32nd Republican Male Assembly District Leader. I reside in the 5th Congressional District, 10th Senatorial District and 32nd Assembly District. I share these districts with all my fellow residents of Rochdale Village Inc (RV). Though the maps for these districts have recently changed they have not been redrawn to divide our community.

The entirety of Rochdale Village is and has for decades been in the 28th City Council District (CCD), currently represented by City Council Speaker Adriennne Adams.

According to "Redistricting and You" a mapping resource created by the Center for Urban Research at The Graduate Center of the City University of New York, the NYC Council Preliminary Plan would divide our community into the 28th and 27th CC districts. Specifically, 8 buildings (buildings 9-16) comprising 2 circles on Bedell Street and 1/3 of building #7 would be in district 27.

According to the 7/6/22 article of City and State NY, Annie McDonough, "Redistricting Partners, a California-based firm that has also worked with the state Independent Redistricting Commission, is working with the city's commission to actually draw the maps."

One might wonder if the decision to draw a district line through building #7 along with redistricting 8 other buildings was made either by a person possibly from California or a computer algorithm.

Rochdale Village Inc., incorporated in 1960 and completed in 1965, is the 2nd largest cooperative village in the world. It is a Micthell-Lama Cooperative development with oversight and regulation from the NYS Dept of Housing and Community Renewal intended to be affordable housing for moderate and middle-income residents.

The boundaries of its 20 residential apartment buildings are Guy R Brewer Blvd, Baisley Blvd, Bedell Street, 134th Road and 137th Avenue.

The utilities of RV 20 buildings are provided by a common Power Plant on Bedell Street.

RV has its own team of Public Safety Officers that patrol the village in addition to being in the confines of the 113th Police Precinct.

RV has a Community Center centrally located that is intended to serve the intergenerational community of all 20 buildings.

RV has a Senior Center and is a Naturally Occurring Retirement Community (NORC) receiving annual city funding from the Department for the Aging. RV is an enclave of people from the African Diaspora and is the only such NORC in Queens.

RV is also part of the Jamaica and Hollis community that the Taskforce on Racial Inclusion and Equity (TRIE) identified as one of 33 communities having accounted for more that 50% of the City's COVID-19 cases.

When I think of RV I think of people like me:
Coming from or with ancestors from SC, GA, other
parts of the south and the Caribbean.
Formerly of other parts of Queens and greater NY
Graduates of HBCUs and CUNY, etc
Graduates of Jamaica High School, etc.

My neighbors include employees and retirees of the MTA, NYPD, FDNY, Civil Servants, etc.

People who speak not only English but Creole, Spanish and various African languages.

It is even the home of Olympic Medalist Dalilah Muhammad.

Elected officials and politicians seeking votes often make stops at Rochdale Village and participate in our community events.

### NYC City Charter Chapter 2-A Section 52 c. states:

c. District lines shall keep intact neighborhoods and communities with established ties of common interest and association, whether historical, racial, economic, ethnic, religious or other.

It is my contention that RV by its very name and its 50+ year history is a neighborhood/community with established ties of common historical, racial, economic, ethnic and religious interest and association.

Any attempt to partition RV into more than one CCD would be against the NYC charter and leave our community dismembered or "Drawn and Quartered".

# Statement to the NYC Districting Commission on August 16, 2022 By James Hong

### **Intro**

Good afternoon, thank you for your service in this redistricting process. My name is James Hong, I'm here as a concerned citizen and I'd like to talk about District 20 and 26. I'm a resident of Flushing and lived in Woodside for close to a decade.

### **District 20**

The draft map unfortunately divides Flushing *through* Murray Hill, which is the center of Flushing's vibrant Korean American community. This is where Korean New Yorkers live, work, eat, shop, and sing karaoke. If you've ever driven (or taken a bus) down Northern Blvd, there's not a block between Flushing and Bayside where you won't see a Korean restaurant, retail business, or church. Northern Blvd is a thoroughfare, and shouldn't be used as a boundary, especially in Murray Hill - but that's what is happening now. Please move the northern boundary for District 20 *further north*, so that the district doesn't divide Flushing and includes <u>all</u> of what's considered Flushing, including Murray Hill. **Please keep Flushing whole by using 20th Ave or Willets Point Blvd, meeting Francis Lewis Blvd, as the northern edge of District 20.** 

Now, the place to shed population in District 20 is the eastern "foot" of the district that juts into Auburndale/Bayside. This makes little sense. If you look at the boundaries of the community boards, the police precincts, and the school districts of NE Queens, none of them join Flushing with Auburndale across Utopia Pkwy.

Those who have grown up their whole lives in NE Queens can intuitively identify that Utopia Pkway is where Flushing ends. **District 20 should also end at Utopia.** 

I believe we should keep the Van Wyck (I-678) and Long Island Expressway(I-495) as the western and southern borders of District 20.

#### District 26

In Western Queens, Woodside belongs with Sunnyside and Long Island City, within District 26. The draft map <u>splits</u> Woodside up, badly, and joins its center with Maspeth, which has dramatically different politics, transportation, and demographics. This, coupled with other big changes in LIC, radically shifts District 26's racial composition. Around 10,000 Asian Americans will lose representation by the first-ever Korean American in city council. And the draft map threatens the ability of Asian Americans remaining in the district to elect a candidate of their choice. Basically, this is a very anti-Asian change to District 26, and I urge you to reject it.

### **Closing**

In closing, I won't recap anything I've said. But I do want to touch on the prioritization of Staten Island. While I respect Staten Islanders' hopes in keeping their 3rd district from having any part of Brooklyn, it shouldn't be done to the detriment of the other 94% of New York City's population. I urge you to reconsider that change, and **consider the solution that is the Unity Map.**

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Dear NYC Redistricting Commission,

I strongly believe it's imperative that the current City Council redistricting rights the wrongs of the last redistricting and establishes a fair and equal balance in population between districts, to ensure that all New Yorkers have equal voting power and equal representation. The last redistricting left some districts like the 1st and 3rd with 10% more residents than other districts in the city and 5% more than the citywide average, leaving residents of these districts with diminished voting power and significantly underrepresented in the City Council over the last 10 years. That inequality has only grown as populations in some districts like the 3rd have soared, so that district now has over 30% more residents than other districts and 17% more than the citywide average, leaving its residents even more underrepresented and with proportionately less voting power.

The currently proposed new City Council district lines largely correct this glaring inequality, creating new districts with roughly equal populations except those on Staten Island, which would continue to have almost 4.5% fewer residents than the citywide average, and thus have disproportionately more representation and their residents disproportionately more voting power.

As the Redistricting Commission considers further changes to the proposed map, it's imperative that they not decrease the relative balance between district populations, and if anything that balance should be increased, and the current proposed inequalities (while significantly less than 10 years ago) should be further reduced or eliminated. Only this way can we ensure equality of representation and voting power between all New Yorkers, and right the wrongs of the last redistricting, which left some New Yorkers woefully underrepresented.

## **Testimony of Nick Gulotta to the NYC Districting Commission**

Dear Chair Walcott and members of the Districting Commission,

My name is Nick Gulotta. I am a resident of Jackson Heights and for many years, District 26 was my home. This testimony is based on over fifteen years of experience working at the New York City Council, the Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs, City Hall, and as a community organizer in Queens.

In my experience, when it comes to the delivery of government services, it is always working class communities of color that live in neighborhoods divided into multiple districts who are ignored the most by our city. I have seen elected officials and government leaders decide that certain communities weren't worthy of resources, weren't central to their base of power, or lacked the numbers needed to be "important." The priorities of these communities are less likely to be taken seriously by our city, constituent service needs are treated with less urgency, and community organizations do not receive funding they deserve.

## The 26th Council District

As with the Filipino, Bangladeshi, and Latinx communities, I want to specifically highlight the Tibetan community as well as the larger Himalayan community that will be negatively impacted if the proposed map of District 26 is adopted. A majority of this community, many of whom are refugees as a result of the occupation of their homeland, presently reside in both the 26th and 25th council districts. By dividing Woodside, the proposed map would siphon many of these community members into the 30th Council District as well. It would also disconnect the community residing in District 26 from the Tibetan community center (57-12 Tibet Way, 32nd Ave, Woodside, NY 11377).

I have worked with this community for many years and while serving at the Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs, we worked closely with leaders from various Himalayan communities to estimate their combined population. Our unofficial estimate was over 50,000 people with the majority residing in Western Queens neighborhoods. Should the proposed map be adopted, over a dozen Tibetan and Himalayan community centers and religious institutions (view on map here) in Woodside would needlessly become siloed in District 30, further marginalizing this community of interest.

Like with other communities, dividing the Tibetan and larger Himalayan community into three council districts will cause harm to their political trajectory and power.

I urge the Commission to keep Woodside whole. I support the map proposed by Council Member Julie Won (https://districtr.org/plan/138001) where the boundaries are 31st Avenue to the north so that the

Tibetan Community Center remains in District 26. I also believe that the Queensbridge, Woodside, and Ravenswood Houses should remain in District 26. I also ask you to keep this a Queens district and I am opposed to the incorporation of Manhattan's East Side and Roosevelt Island as this will dilute the political power of working class residents of color in District 26.

#### **Southeast Queens**

I also want to lend my strong support for the <u>Unity Plan's map</u> that will keep South Asian and Indo-caribbean communities in one council district between Richmond Hill and South Ozone Park. It is vital that politics and lobbying by elected officials do not influence the decision to crack this community of interest into multiple communities that are unable to obtain an electoral majority.

The Unity Plan also importantly keeps Rochdale Village in one Council District, preserving the potential for effective representation for this critically important enclave of working class Black residents in Southeast Queens. I urge you to keep Rochdale Village represented by one Council Member.

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Dear New York City Redistricting Commission,

Thank you for providing me with an opportunity to comment on the redistricting maps proposed by the Redistricting Commission on July 15, 2002.

Attached is the link to maps (<a href="https://districtr.org/plan/137797">https://districtr.org/plan/137797</a>) which reflect how I want our community to be redistricted. As a long-time resident of District 31, the only change that is needed is to include all of JFK Airport in the district because of the following.

- First, JFK was previously a part of District 31 so this change would simply correct an error from the last redistricting cycle.
- Second, the communities of Rosedale, Brookville, Laurelton, Springfield Gardens, Edgemere, Far Rockaway and Arverne which are currently in the district, are directly in the airport flight path. Therefore, consolidating JFK Airport under "one district umbrella" will make it easier to holistically address current and future concerns.
- Additionally, JFK is currently represented by one Congressional, State Senate and Assembly member so there is simply no need for two separate Council Members to retain the airport in their districts.

The rest of District 31 should remain intact because of the historical and common characteristics (e.g., race, political party, geography, and type of home ownership) consistent in each of our communities which should not be tampered with. Below, I cite evidence to support this statement.

Rosedale, Laurelton, Brookville, and our portion of Springfield Gardens are contiguous. Their communities are Black registered Democratic voters, and the residents are primarily one-and two-family homeowners. The issues we face are consistent whether it is improving education, ensuring access to health services, protecting the environment, tackling airport noise, dealing with flooding, creating jobs, or providing adequate public safety for our residents and families. For decades, this district's civic associations (e.g., Eastern Queens Alliance, Inc., Rosedale Civic Association, Inc., Federated Blocks of Laurelton, Concerned Citizens of Laurelton, Springfield/Rosedale Community Action Association, Inc., Spring-Gar Civic Association, Inc., and Springfield Gardens Taxpayers and Citizens Association) have worked closely together at all levels of government to address these issues and drive needed change. We have also launched special task forces (e.g., 116th Precinct Community Task Force, Southeastern Queens Zoning Preservation Task Force, and the Queens Community Task Force Against Illegal Truck Parking) to fight for the new precinct and to focus on the most important "quality of life" issues in our community.

The Rockaways and Arverne by the Sea communities should also remain intact within the 31strict because they share similar characteristics to the district's "mainland" communities. For example, the Rockaways' portion of the district is made up of primarily Black and Jewish Democrats who are one- or two-family

homeowners. Any changes would split the Democratic vote, disrupt the political dynamics, and negatively impact the interests and desires of its residents.

To preserve and to continually advance the common interests and concerns in District 31, I petition the Commission to keep our district intact with the only exception being to include JFK Airport in its entirety in the district to restore the continuity that existed before.

# **New York City Council Redistricting Testimony 2022**

Good Afternoon, I am I. Daneek Miller, the Democratic District Leader for the 33rd Council Assembly District and the former New York City Councilmember for the 27th District.

My testimony today prioritizes the 27th Council District's Southeast Queens and as an outlier, impact on the 28th, 31st and 24th Council Districts. I begin with the obvious: a lack of density, because of single-family homeownership, certainly has its impact on this communities' population, but not its political and economic empowerment and cultural influences. All of which is well known and documented locally and nationally. SEQ is home to many political and cultural icons and has its own historic district (Addelsigh Park).

This phenomenon of political empowerment is not by accident; in fact, by all metrics that matter most when it comes to voter participation, are:

- 1. Civic and Faith-Based Engagement
- 2. Union Participation
- 3. Homeownership

While not mutually exclusive, together they help to make up the largest African American and Afro-Caribbean homeownership in the nation; as well as being the most densely populated union community in the most densely populated union state in the country. The social-economic impact on SEQ and its surrounding communities, in particular, (the downtown Jamaica area, which is currently undergoing a major renaissance of housing, transportation, economic development, etc.) is unfortunately, being negatively impacted by the current boundaries of the 27th and 24th Council Lines, which border the North and South sides of Jamaica Avenue:

- 27th... South of Jamaica
- 24th... North of Jamaica

Because of these boundaries, Jamaica lacks continuity, not just in social, cultural and economic development but more importantly because of its delivery of

services. For example, Community Board 12 has the highest numbers of shelter placements in the City of New York. The most densely populated portion of that is on the 24th side of Jamaica Avenue. While there are thousands of newly affordable housing units that have been built and are being built, South of Jamaica Avenue. Conversely we see overwhelmingly market rate new development housing North of Jamaica Avenue, which is not consistent with the economic values of its current residents, which will further lead to gentrification.

Continuity and values are important, just as we have seen in the unification of the Downtown Jamaica BIDS, which was spearheaded in the 27th and 28th Council District. During my time in the Council, while we never acknowledged boundaries, it matters when you create unfair burdens on other Council Districts. Representation should reflect the needs of the masses and exhibit the continuity necessary to maintain upward mobility for these historic communities of color.

These communities deserve representation that share their values and experiences and bring in cultural competency and their voice to City Hall. Furthermore, this attempt to create new opportunities at the expense of the Southeast Queens historic community is unjust and further diminishes the mission of the Voting Rights Act.

In conclusion, Rochdale Village- one of the largest cooperative communities in the nation, deserves such continuity in service and representation. Instead what we see is an attempt to subdivide this enclave of Black resiliency into multiple council districts. This is an inditement of the incompetencies, insensitivity and intensional diminshisment of one of the states, the nations, most powerful voting block, what is S.E.Q.

I would suggest if the goals and objectives of this Commision is to expand the footprint of the 24th, it be done: East/West instead of North/South.



I believe that the only interest group kept together by the proposed District 26 lines is the real estate industry.

The proposed district would not serve residents of Manhattan well; there are 20 outstanding ULURPS within the proposed D26, and 17 of those are in Manhattan — yet Manhattan voters would be a minority in the new district.

More critically, the proposed D26 would not serve the residents of Queens at all. The district would see reductions in the percent of AAPI, Black and Latin residents while becoming plurality white — at a time when the AAPI population in Long Island City is growing rapidly, as The NY Times has reported. We, the Bayside Hills Civic Association, write to urge you to please maintain Bayside Hills under one New York City Council district. Bayside Hills is a small, distinct community located in the southern portion of Bayside, Queens and is currently solely encompassed within Council District 23.

Our civic comprises 1,200 households, mostly residing in single-family homes and characterized by our street malls and abundant public green space, and located between the 211th Street to the west, Springfield Boulevard to the east, north of the Horace Harding Expressway, and south of 48th Avenue. This area has traditionally been represented within the 23rd Council District, however your most recent draft maps propose to divide our community in two and split us between the 23rd and 19th Council Districts.

It is essential to our community that Bayside Hills remain represented by one Council Member. Issues that arise within our small-knit community are often local and the Bayside Hills Civic Association has traditionally played a central role in solving these issues and upholding the quality of life in our area.

Greetings, Members of the Independent Redistricting Commission.

My name is Milly Wong, and I represent Elmhurst United, a group that was formed in 2014 with all its members living in the south side of Queens Boulevard.

It was disappointing that the little Elmhurst Triangle located on the south-side of Queens Boulevard in Elmhurst was not remapped with Maspeth.

This area consists of predominately working class homeowners who live in private two and three family homes. Physical barriers protected this quiet oasis against the more hustle and bustle on the North side. We are asking that you reconsider your decision and allow the area south of Queens Boulevard (aka the Elmhurst Triangle) to be redrawn to be included with Maspeth (Council District 30).

As Queens Boulevard is re-zoned to allow for taller and larger structures, it has changed the landscape and constituency to be more like what we see in Jackson Heights and other larger towns. Developers have overbuilt on Queens Boulevard and are now eyeing the little Elmhurst Triangle area. We're seeing beautifully kept owner-occupied homes bought up by developers and having them converted to multiple family absentee landlord buildings. These new structures destroy the scale and context of the community. Where there were once neatly preserved with similar architectural designed homes, we have newly built ugly eyesores that jut out against the once neat and uniform streets. Long time residents are moving out of the area, allowing developers to infiltrate with little resistance. These changes destabilize a community.

Some of you may remember Eddie Murphy's "Coming to America" movie. It was shot right by where I live in Elmhurst, on Queens Blvd. A few months ago, I was watching it again, and sadly, since that movie was shot, all the one story buildings we saw in the movie around the old Elmhurst Wendy's, including Wendy's, are gone. In its place are huge buildings without any green-space, open-space, or character. Just concrete and steel structures, all built from lot-line to lot-line.

I've heard of comments about keeping the Asian community together with the belief that there may be stronger unified political representation. My neighbors and I are not so naïve to vote for someone based on race. We vote based on character, experience, merit and where they stand on issues that are important to us. The decision on how diverse communities are merged or separated should not primarily be based on race, but rather on how a local community may benefit from a local elected representative that share their interests and values.

For many years, our elected representatives focused their attention on constituents on the North side of Queens Boulevard. This constituency is very similar to the constituency of Jackson Heights. The different needs are so great that many interest and needs that affect our lives are in direct conflict with residents living on the North Side. Our concerns are muted against the more populous and louder voices of these communities.

We need representation from our elected officials that are aligned with our interests..We have very different views on policing and public safety, and on what should be prioritized in the City Budget. Splitting the small area of the Elmhurst Triangle from District 25 will not dilute the Asian vote. It would help protect what is left of a community that consists of homeowner occupied private homes. It will also let the needs of our community be heard and support given to preserve this very essential group.

I could go on and on, but in the interest of time, and with consideration to the other speakers, I just want to conclude with – Elmhurst residents on the south side of Queens Boulevard would be better served if it is aligned with Maspeth and Council District 30.

Request: Re-district Elmhurst South in Queens from Council District 25 to Council District 30

My name is Sally Wong and I have lived in Elmhurst South, Queens, for most of my life with deep rooted ties to family, friends and my community. I was disappointed with the preliminary maps released on July 15th and I am here today to respectfully request for the Committee to reconsider districting my area of Elmhurst South from City Council District 25 to 30. The referenced area is the south side of Queens Boulevard from Kneeland Street down to Woodhaven Boulevard.

In 2010, Elmhurst South was redistricted to the 25<sup>th</sup> Council District. The priorities, population and composition of District 25 are vastly different to the Elmhurst South neighborhood, in economic, social, political ideology, zoning and residential configuration. This change had the unintended consequence of abandoning the needs and interest of my community.

City services are designed to fit the needs of communities as a unified Council district. The priorities of District 25 are immigration, high rise apartment development, expanding Open Streets and bike lanes. Whereas, the majority of Elmhurst South residents own their homes and share the same needs and concerns of lowering property taxes, maintaining water rates, increasing senior housing and services and addressing the growing threat of rising flood waters.

Last September, Hurricane Ida devastated many home owners in this area where basements were flooded with over five feet of water causing significant property damage and infrastructure issues. However, little to no attention or outreach was given to this neighborhood. Nearly a year later, we see no mitigation efforts, safeguarding initiatives or infrastructure studies to prevent future flooding disasters. This is just one example of the neglect Elmhurst South residents experience from their representative.

Our neighboring area of Middle Village and Maspeth in Council District 30 more closely aligns with our issues, values and community interest and needs. Elmhurst South would be best served by inclusion into the 30<sup>th</sup> Council District. We would be able to access critical resources, obtain assistance for problems confronting our neighborhood and have a unified voice to address the evolving needs of the community.

We elect officials who best serve the needs and interest of the community. So it is important that voters have a choice of candidates who represent our values and advocates for the municipal services that benefit the district. I have heard past testimony regarding concerns of diluting the Asian vote by redistricting parts of Elmhurst. Redistricting Elmhurst South will not dilute the Asian voting power in District 25. I have included Attachment A in my testimony with data sourced from the 2020 Census which shows the Asian representation in District 25 will decrease from 44.1% to 42.6% if Elmhurst South was redistricted to the 30<sup>th</sup> Council District.

Many of us strive to maintain as well as improve our community's quality of life. It should not be an uphill battle to obtain support and resources from our representatives. Rather, it should be a collaborative relationship which stems from shared priorities and goals. Residents of Elmhurst South would be better served with Council representation in District 30 and we urge the Committee to make this change. I have included Attachment B in my testimony of a map outlining the referenced sector for redistricting.

It was a privilege to be able to speak here today and I thank you all for your time and consideration of my request.



#### **Dear New York City Redistricting Commission,**

Thank you for providing me with an opportunity to comment on the redistricting maps proposed by the Commission on July 15, 2002.

Attached is the link to maps (<a href="https://districtr.org/plan/137797">https://districtr.org/plan/137797</a>) which reflect how I want our community to be redistricted. It also matches the maps submitted by the Queens Civic Congress who are advocating for our identical position while thoughtfully balancing the districts adjacent to ours, throughout the Borough of Queens, and the entire City.

As a long-time resident of District 31, the only change I want is to include all of JFK Airport in the district. My rationale for this is threefold. First, JFK was previously a part of District 31 so this change would simply correct an error from the last redistricting cycle. Second, the communities of Rosedale, Brookville, Laurelton, Springfield Gardens, and Arverne, currently a part of the district, are directly in the airport flight path. Lastly, JFK is currently represented by one Congressional, State Senate and Assembly Member so there is simply no need for two Council Members to retain the airport in their districts. Consolidating JFK under one district umbrella not only makes the most sense, but it will also make it easier to address current and future concerns.

The rest of District 31 should remain intact because of the shared characteristics (e.g., race, political party, geography, and type of home ownership) in each community. See the evidence below to support this statement.

Rosedale, Laurelton, Brookville, and our portion of Springfield Gardens are contiguous. Our communities are Black, and our residents are registered Democrats who are single and two-family homeowners. Our communities are fighting the same battles which include improving education, ensuring access to healthcare, protecting the environment, tackling airport noise, dealing with flooding, creating jobs, and keeping our neighborhoods safe. For decades, the district's civic associations (e.g., Eastern Queens Alliance, Inc., Rosedale Civic Association, Inc., Federated Blocks of Laurelton, Concerned Citizens of Laurelton, Springfield/Rosedale Community Action Association, Inc., Spring-Gar Civic Association, Inc., and Springfield Gardens Taxpayers and Citizens Association) have worked closely together with all levels of government to address these issues and drive the changes needed. We have also launched special task forces (e.g., 116th Precinct Community Task Force, Southeastern Queens Zoning Preservation Task Force, and the Queens Community Task Force Against Illegal Truck Parking) to fight for the new precinct and to focus on the most important "quality of life" issues in our community.

The Rockaways and Arverne by the Sea communities should also remain intact and within District 31 because their demographics are like those in the district's "mainland" communities. For example, the Rockaways' portion of our district is made up of primarily Black Democrats who own single or two-family homes. Any changes here would split the Democratic vote, disrupt the political dynamics, and adversely impact the interests and desires of our residents.

Therefore, to preserve and continually advance the common interests and concerns of the residents in District 31, I petition the Commission to keep our district intact with the only exception being to include all of JFK Airport that will restore the continuity which previously existed.







This testimony concerns district 25 Elmhurst and district 30 Maspeth of Queens.

My name is Linda Lam and I am a homeowner and resident of Seabury Street of Elmhurst, on the south side of Queens Boulevard. I am also a board member of the Newtown Senior Center, Vice President of the Chinese American Citizens Alliance of Greater New York (CACAGNY), and a block captain of the civic organization Citizens of Maspeth and Elmhurst Together (COMET). I've been a resident and homeowner on the same street for 48 years.

The affected area is about 20 plus streets, with Kneeland Street on the West, Queens Blvd on the North, Woodhaven on the east and the Long Island train track on the South. (Please see attached map area marked in blue.) This small area is currently included under city council district 25 Elmhurst. Before 2014 this area was included in district 29, Rego Park.

These 20 plus streets are zoned R4B, made up of mostly 1- 2 family homes and is compatible to the neighborhood of Maspeth. We go shopping, our children go to schools, and we go playing, picnicking and have our little league games at Juniper Valley Park, all on the south side of Queens Boulevard. The north side of Queens Boulevard, which comprised of most of district 25, is made up mostly of apartment buildings and shops, and have seen many large apartment complex being added steadily in the past few years. The needs of what are mostly rental apartment dwellers and small businesses are very different from me and my neighbors on the south side of the Queens Boulevard.

Because of the difference of the zoning characteristics, the focus of constituent services naturally are different for my areas and the residents and the business owners of the north side of Queens Blvd. For me and many of my neighbors, over the years we learned that in order to get the constituents' services that we need, we usually have to go to the neighboring district 30 because our needs are mostly not met by our own district. These include constituent service such as workshops and services to help with property assessment, issues with sidewalk violations, illegal commercial parking on residential areas, flooded basement, stolen catalytic car converter, seniors' transportation and health assessments, and assistance for seniors with snow removals etc. We understand that each district office is only allowed a limited budget and they cannot provide

everything for all the constituents and each office have to pick and choose and spend the budget on what matter most to the majority of its constituents or their most pressing needs.

My neighbors and the seniors in our areas strongly believe that it's only fair that our area be put together with a district with constituents services matching our needs. After all, every 3 year our property taxes are up 15% and we paid our taxes diligently and it is hard to fathom we have to go search for services outside our district. We were extremely disappointed that our request for redistricting in the May hearing was not reflected in the most updated redistricting map.

In the last hearing, I heard people mention that Elmhurst should be kept whole because by making any changes, it might affect the makeup of racial groups and dilute their local representation. Elmhurst's population, as of the last census, is made up of 41.5 % Hispanics, 44% Asians and 10% whites. Our proposal, which aligns with the Queens Civic Congress's proposal of moving these 20 plus streets to district 30 will have a neglectable impact of changing any racial groups distribution, it would be a mere change of +1.4% for the Hispanics and -1.8% for the Asians and will not have any electoral or political impact on these groups.

I urge the commission to consider our request of redistricting these 20 plus streets to district 30 so we will be in the district that has the common interest as ours, same housing stocks, and same emphasis of the type of constituents' services. Our seniors, members, neighbors and my family deserved to receive the much needed constituent services and we will be best served under district 30. We long for the days that we will not have to wait at the end of the line when unclaimed slots are available for non-district residents. When we ask for services, our voice can be louder and we do not have to say "I'm sorry I'm not from your district but I would like to have services from your office!"

My name is Jun Shen and I am the President of Shanghai Association in USA, an organization representing ethnic Shanghainese in New York City and in the United States. We, the members and leadership of Shanghai Association in USA, write to express concern with the draft maps you have proposed, which would divide our members living in Bayside Hills and Oakland Gardens between Council Districts 19 and 23 and dilute the Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI) community's political voice. We instead urge that you maintain the District lines as currently drawn or consider expanding District 23 north to Northern Boulevard, a well-recognized and understood boundary line.

The neighborhoods of Bayside and Bayside Hills have experienced a significant increase in the proportion of Asian American residents over the last decade. Across Queens, the 29% growth of the AAPI community in Queens since 2010 contributed partly to the election of a historic number of AAPI Council Members in 2021. Due to our increased representation locally, District 23, a majority-minority district, elected the first Korean-American, first person of color, and the first woman to represent it last year. However, the proposed Draft Map transfers residents west of 214th Street and north of 53rd Avenue, a population that is 60% AAPI, to District 19, a majority-White district, thereby effectively diluting the political voice of these minority communities.

The goal of redistricting is to keep communities intact and ensure they are adequately represented by their elected officials. Given the increases in the AAPI population in Northeast Queens in recent years, as seen through census data and our increased representation at all levels of government, it is critical that you not divide AAPI communities but rather ensure that our voices are empowered. We ask that you restore District 23 to its current lines and consider expanding District 23 to Northern Boulevard to include neighboring majority-AAPI areas into a plurality-AAPI district.

I would first like to thank all the work this commission has done and will be doing, drawing district maps is hard work and often thankless.


I am respectfully requesting that a small section of Elmhurst to be re-districted from D25 into D30. (hereafter as "the Elmhurst Triangle" see attached map below)



Many years ago this section was included in District 30. The redistricting of this section has diluted our voices on important issues for single and two family owner occupied. In District 25, over the past 15 years there has been large new apt buildings being developed at a frenzy pace and major commercialization of the area. If you look at the movie "Coming to America" which was filmed in the district you can see the dramatic change in the area. I want to maintain this sector as prevailing one- and two-family character of the neighborhood and ensure that new residential development reflects the context and scale of the area's existing housing mix.

There are many examples of this sector not being represented – most telling occurred with Hurricane Ida. This Sector is a low lying area and is prone to flooding during heavy rainstorms. 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#### To the Districting Commission:

My name is Jennifer Chu. I am 45 years old and I have lived in Elmhurst my whole life, initially on the north side of Queens Blvd at Broadway and 82nd St up until 1985, and at my current residence on the south side of Queens Blvd on Manilla St since then.

Currently my area of Elmhurst is in District 25 (Elmhurst, Jackson Heights), but at the southern edge of District 25. My area of Elmhurst borders District 30 (Glendale, Maspeth, Middle Village, Ridgewood, Woodhaven, Woodside). Please see this link - https://districtr.org/plan/139498 - for a delineation of my area of Elmhurst.

My area of Elmhurst, south of Queens Blvd, is very different from the rest of Elmhurst in District 25, north of Queens Blvd, and is more similar to the adjacent neighborhood to the south, Maspeth, in District 30. Therefore, I would like to request that my area of Elmhurst be part of District 30 instead of District 25.

First of all, Queens Blvd is a major roadway, very wide with more than 10 lanes, and with heavy traffic; it forms a natural barrier, separating the neighborhoods on either side of roadway. Crossing Queens Blvd, especially with kids, is a big deal; you don't do it unless you have to. Because of Queens Blvd, my area of Elmhurst is physically and psychologically separated from the rest of District 25. Residents in my area of Elmhurst are physically closer to residents in District 30 and therefore more readily identify with them.

Secondly, the concerns of residents in my area of Elmhurst seem to be different from the concerns of Elmhurst residents on the north side of Queens Blvd. Based on conversations with the Neighborhood Coordination Officers (NCOs) from the 110 Pct, which covers Elmhurst on both sides of Queens Blvd, and from speaking with staff at the District 25 & District 30 offices, Elmhurst residents on the north side of Queens Blvd need to deal with gang activity and prostitution and need immigration and housing services. Meanwhile, Elmhurst residents on the south side of Queens Blvd have problems with noise complaints and commercial vehicles parked in residential areas, and need services related to senior citizens, similar to District 30 residents.

Furthermore, the local civic group Communities of Maspeth and Elmhurst Together (COMET), specifically serves Maspeth and the area of Elmhurst south of Queens Blvd; it does not serve the area of Elmhurst north of Queens Blvd. The area of Elmhurst north of Queens Blvd is served by another civic group, the Newtown Civic Association. Civic groups naturally form and develop around the specific needs and initiatives of local communities. That there are separate civic groups for Elmhurst residents on the north side of Queens Blvd versus the south side of Queens Blvd is a clear indication that the community needs are different for these two neighborhoods.

In closing, the interests of the residents in my area of Elmhurst more closely align with those of the residents in neighboring Maspeth in District 30 than with the interests of the Elmhurst residents on the north side of Queens Blvd in District 25. Therefore, please consider placing my area of Elmhurst in District 30 and not in District 25.

August 29, 2022 Testimony Winnie Jung Request to redistrict the Elmhurst triangle from City Council District 25 to 30

Greetings Members of the Independent Redistricting Commission. In the preliminary maps released in July, it was disheartening that the little Elmhurst triangle (located on the south side of Queens Boulevard) was not re-districted to be alongside with Maspeth. The two sister communities share so much in common. We go to the same schools, churches, civic meetings, stores, etc. We have the same housing stock. Families have lived in the area for generations, and have bought homes in the two areas. I am respectfully requesting the Committee to reconsider this decision and allow the south side of Queens Boulevard (aka the Elmhurst triangle) to be redrawn and included with Maspeth (District 30).

This part of Elmhurst was once in the same district as Maspeth. Our leaders understood and supported the needs of the area. Removing this part of Elmhurst from Maspeth lessened the voices of residents who live in this sector because our needs do not align with the population on the North side of Queens Boulevard and Jackson Heights.

Some examples of this neglect:

- -the FDNY Elmhurst Eagles firehouse is in jeopardy of collapsing because the developer on the adjacent property compromised their foundation. The damage is beyond repair. It will take approximately eight years to build a new firehouse in its place. No one knew about this issue so little attention was paid to it. There continues to be a lack of urgency and communication regarding contingency plans.
- -In September 2022, the area experienced massive flooding from Hurricane Ida and other strong storms. Basements and streets were flooded because the sewers were not maintained. Residents have repeatedly asked for increased infrastructure improvements and routine maintenance, but funding and resources seem to be constantly diverted to other programs that benefit the North side.
- -There has been little attention paid to the graffiti that has proliferated the area. It has been six months, and much of the graffiti still has not been removed.

Please consider my request to redraw the NYC Council maps to have the Elmhurst Triangle included with Maspeth. Residents who live in Elmhurst on the south side of Queens Boulevard would be better served if we were re-districted from City Council District 25 to District 30.
