

New York City Department of Correction Annual Programs Report Calendar Year 2025

The New York City Department of Correction's ("DOC" or "the Department") Division of Programs and Community Partnerships' ("DPCP") mission is to support a safe and humane jail environment through targeted services and programs, and to foster successful reintegration for individuals who are released from custody to the community. Research has demonstrated that evidence-based programming designed to support behavioral change is an effective way to reduce recidivism. The Department aims to strengthen positive outcomes for incarcerated individuals by affording a wide range of holistic programs and services to them. Accordingly, DPCP provides programs and services in several categories, including: 1) Activities, 2) Enrichment, 3) Evidence-based, 4) Reintegration, 5) Clinical services, and 6) Religious services.

Throughout CY2025, the **Counseling Services Unit** provided access to social services, targeted individual engagement, and group counseling. The Counseling Services Unit is divided into the following teams:

- **Social Services:** Provides access to policy-driven social services, individual counseling, and therapeutic group sessions utilizing an evidence-based curriculum. In CY2025, the Department continued insourcing and relied on this team to provide services to individuals in custody to address criminogenic factors. Counselors facilitated daily evidence-based groups on topics such as anger management, cognitive behavioral therapy, dialectical behavior therapy, stress reduction, trauma-informed care, relapse prevention, classes on job readiness, financial literacy, vocational training, and other topics.
- **Program Counseling:** Provides evidence-based group programming and individual counseling, with a focus on promoting interpersonal relationships as a tool for behavioral change. In 2025, Program Counselors afforded services at the Robert N. Davoren Center (RNDC), Rose M. Singer Enhanced Supervision Housing (RESH), and at the Special Management Unit (SMU) within the Otis Bantum Correctional Center (OBCC).
- **Associate Correctional Counselors:** This team provides assistance with mandated social services such as processing money release requests, property release forms, marriages, and significant family events, and also function as a go-between for attorneys, parole officers, and the NYC Administration for Children's Services (ACS).
- **Interventions to Make Profound and Continuous Transformations (IMPACT):** Internal, non-uniformed team of Intervention Specialists and Social Workers that support people in immediate crisis as well as people experiencing acute challenges while adjusting to the correctional environment. The foundation of this team's work is rooted in restorative justice practices. This group provides specific, enhanced services, including, but not limited to:
 1. Wellness Checks
 2. Family Interventions
 3. Preventative and responsive care

4. Crisis intervention and behavioral interventions
5. Grief counseling
6. Restorative justice circles and other practices based in restorative justice
7. Violence reduction

The IMPACT team also facilitates new admission orientations for individuals newly arriving into custody. This work takes place at EMTC for the male population, and also at RMSC, which houses women and gender-expansive individuals. The goal of these orientations is to equip all individuals with the necessary information and resources during their first few days of incarceration.

The **Enhanced Recreation Unit** continued to actively engage people housed in specific housing areas across Rikers Island. The unit organized several events throughout the year, including basketball, chess, and ping pong tournaments as well as congregate events like poetry jams, talent shows, open mics, and even a “Silver Sneakers” Special Olympics event in partnership with the Department’s Health Affairs Division for people with chronic physical disabilities who are over the age of 55. The unit runs a well-loved island-wide basketball league and maintains their partnership with the Twinning Project, a soccer initiative that originated in the UK.

The **Law Library Unit** continued to provide in-person law library services, providing assistance with legal research and notary services. The unit also offers legal research classes to the incarcerated population. The Department opened a second law library at RNDC in CY2025 to help with scheduling and facilitate broader access to services.

The **Chaplaincy Services Unit** offers religious programming and services for four faiths: Catholicism, Judaism, Islam, and Protestantism. The unit’s offerings include worship sessions, religious education, study groups, congregational events, and community engagement. Chaplains provide individualized mentoring, which includes counseling, moments of prayer, daily readings, and pastoral guidance. They also offer guidance and spiritual support to Department staff and are responsible for making notifications of death to next of kin.

The **Educational Services Unit** supported the Department of Education with expanding educational services for the emergent adult population, most notably providing all young adult housing areas at RNDC with access to. In May 2025, the Department celebrated its largest graduating class in over a decade, which consisted of 68 students. This team continued to support evening instruction at three sites, as well as credit bearing post-secondary educational courses provided through partnerships with Columbia University and LaGuardia Community College.

The **Fine and Performing Arts Unit** delivered a range of programs and services within housing areas and congregate program settings, organizing weekly activities and large-scale events. The unit is led by a Deputy Director and includes several Arts Project Coordinators, with support from numerous contracted and volunteer arts providers who help introduce a diverse array of programs. During CY25, the unit also established new community partnerships, further enhancing creative offerings throughout the island.

The **Tablet Operations Program Unit** continued to provide tablets to people in custody and facilitate the delivery of tablet-based programming throughout 2025. Incarcerated individuals must have completed the new admissions process and been in custody for at least 30 days to be issued a tablet, which they may keep for the duration of their time in custody. Tablets offer extensive functionality, including phone call capabilities, which has greatly expanded opportunities for individuals to connect with their loved ones. Tablet-based programming also continues to expand, with the Department continually adding applications to support a wide range of needs.

DPCP has also leaned on its external partnerships to help facilitate several important, long-standing initiatives. The Department continued to work closely with the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice (MOCJ) and its contracted partners throughout CY2026 to afford discharge planning and post-release services, including placement into temporary housing. The Department released 50 city-sentenced individuals to a work release program under the authority of Article 6-A of New York State Correction Law, connecting each of them with a community-based provider as well as housing assistance for those who needed it. The Department also implemented several new initiatives to help incarcerated parents stay connected with their children, including creating child-friendly spaces in visit areas, facilitating visits to the Children's Museum of Manhattan (CMOM), introducing visits to the Brooklyn Children's Museum, and collaborating with the Osborne Association and Hour Children on the Visiting and Family Assistance Program (VAFA).

Finally, the Department engaged in a challenge-based procurement process to partner with nonprofit organizations in an effort to enhance its programming initiatives. These new services are focused on four areas: Supplemental education, trauma-informed programming, substance misuse programming, and transition planning and transportation. In December 2025, the Department registered contracts with the following nonprofit organizations:

- Supplemental education: The Petey Greene Program is responsible for expanding the cohort of students for the High School Equivalency examination, tasked with improving student performance in academic courses, increasing the number of college credits earned by people in custody, and providing tutoring services.
- Trauma-informed programming: The Osborne Association is responsible for facilitating group programming and providing wraparound services for individuals through a trauma-informed lens.
- Substance misuse programming: The Fortune Society will be tasked with facilitating group programming and providing wraparound services for individuals with substance misuse needs.
- Transition planning and transportation: Fedcap and the Fortune Society will be tasked with facilitating re-entry focused group programming and providing wraparound services. Fedcap is also supporting with transporting individuals post-release to a community-based provider.
