The New York City Department of Correction's (DOC or "the Department") Division of Programs and Community Partnerships ("the Division") mission is to support a safe and humane jail environment through targeted services and programs, and to foster successful reintegration for individuals who are released from Departmental custody to the community. Research has demonstrated that evidence-based programming designed to support behavioral change is an effective way to reduce recidivism. The Department aims to strengthen positive outcomes by not solely investing in evidence-based correctional best practices but by affording a wide range of holistic programs and services to individuals in its custodial care. Accordingly, the Division provides programs and services in the following categories: 1) activities, 2) enrichment, 3) evidence-based, 4) reintegration, 5) clinical services, and 6) religious services.

Throughout CY2024, the **Counseling Services Unit** provided access to social services, targeted individual engagement, and group counseling. The Counseling Services Unit is comprised of the following teams:

- Social Services: This branch provides access to policy-driven social services, individual counseling, and therapeutic group sessions utilizing an evidence-based curriculum. In CY2024, the Department continued insourcing and relied on the Social Services unit to provide services to individuals in custody to address criminogenic factors. Counselors facilitate daily evidence-based groups on topics such as anger management, cognitive behavioral therapy, dialectical behavior therapy, stress reduction, trauma-informed care, relapse prevention, classes on job readiness, anger management, financial literacy, vocational training, and other topics.
- Program Counseling: This branch provides evidence-based group programming and individual counseling, with a focus on promoting interpersonal relationships as a tool for behavioral change. In 2024, Program Counselors afforded services at the Robert N. Davoren Center (RNDC) and at Rose M. Singer Enhanced Supervision Housing (RESH).
- Interventions to Make Profound and Continuous Transformations (IMPACT): This is the Department's internal, non-uniformed team of Intervention Specialists and Social Workers that support people in immediate crisis as well as people experiencing acute challenges while adjusting to the correctional environment. The foundation of this team's work is rooted in restorative justice practices. This group provides specific, enhanced services including, but not limited to:
 - 1. Wellness checks
 - 2. Family interventions
 - 3. Preventative and responsive care, which includes one-on-one sessions and wellness checks with people demonstrating self-injurious behaviors
 - 4. Crisis intervention and behavioral interventions
 - 5. Grief counseling
 - 6. Restorative justice circles and other practices based in restorative justice.

7. Violence reduction, which includes one-on-one sessions with high needs individuals or those just generally in need of support.

In 2024, the responsibility for the New Admission Orientation continued to be provided by the Counseling Unit's IMPACT team. While initially implemented in the Eric M. Taylor Center (EMTC) for men, it has since been extended to include the Rose M. Singer Center (RMSC), which houses women and gender-expansive individuals. The goal, though, has remained consistent: To equip all individuals with comprehensive information and resources during their initial days within our facilities.

Throughout CY2024, the **Enhanced Recreation Unit** continued its active engagement of people in several specific housing area types, especially those housed in RESH. The unit organized several events, including basketball, chess, and ping pong tournaments, as well as hosted congregate events like poetry jams, talent shows, open mics, and even a Double-Dutch contest. The unit runs a well-loved island-wide basketball league and maintains their partnership with the Twinning Project, a soccer initiative that originated in the United Kingdom.

Throughout the year, the **Law Library Unit** continued to afford in-person law library services, providing assistance with legal research, notary services, and access to typewriters, copy machines and word processors. In 2024, the unit also resumed conducting Legal Research classes and continued to offer individuals who are eligible for tablets with access to Lexis Nexis.

The Division's **Chaplaincy Services Unit** is comprised of four faiths: Catholic, Jewish, Muslim, and Protestant. The unit offers religious programming and services that include worship sessions, religious education, study groups, congregational events, and community engagement. Chaplains also provide individualized religious mentoring, which includes counseling, moments of prayer, daily readings, and pastoral guidance. They also offer guidance and spiritual support to Department staff and are responsible for making notifications to next of kin. Throughout 2024, Chaplains assigned to the unit worked closely with Department facilities to host major religious celebrations that welcomed family members and volunteers to the island.

In CY2024, the **Educational Services Unit** supported the New York City Department of Education with expanding educational services for emergent adults, most notably increasing the number of housing areas at RNDC with access to school from 10 to 20, while maintaining access levels at other sites. The unit also continued to support evening instruction, such as general adult education, at three sites, as well as credit bearing post-secondary educational courses provided through partnerships with Columbia University and LaGuardia Community College.

The **Fine and Performing Arts Unit** delivered a range of programs and services within housing areas and congregate program settings, organizing both weekly activities and large-scale events. The unit is led by a Deputy Director and includes several Arts Project Coordinators, with support from numerous contracted and volunteer arts providers who help put on a diverse array of programs. During CY24, the unit also established new community partnerships, further enhancing creative offerings throughout the island.

The **Tablet Operations Program Unit** continued to provide tablets to people in custody and facilitate the delivery of programming content through these devices throughout 2024. Staff continually engage with the population to ensure that individuals that have completed the new admissions process and been in custody for at least 30 days are issued a tablet, which they may keep for the duration of their time in custody. These tablets offer extensive functionality and accessibility, including free phone call capabilities, which has greatly expanded opportunities for people in custody to connect with their loved ones. During CY24, the Tablet Operations team onboarded a Program Coordinator and continues to grow. Additionally, tablet-based programming continues to expand with the inclusion of interactive tablet-based programs, as well as the inclusion of content from various programmatic partners. The Department continues to invest in the success of the population by purchasing and adding applications that can support a wide range of needs.

In 2024, The Department worked closely with the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice (MOCJ) and its contracted partners to afford discharge planning and post-release services, including placement into temporary housing. This effort allowed the Department to use its authority under Article 6-A of New York State Correction Law to release 44 city-sentenced individuals to a work release program, connecting each with a community-based provider and housing assistance for those who needed it. The Department also continued to support providers with putting on achievement ceremonies and community engagement days to recognize the accomplishments of people in custody. The Department also implemented several new initiatives to help incarcerated parents stay connected with their children, including creating child-friendly spaces in visit areas, facilitating visits to the Children's Museum of Manhattan (CMOM), and collaborating with the Osborne Association and Hour Children on the Visiting and Family Assistance Program (VAFA).

Finally, in 2024, the Department engaged in a challenge-based procurement process to partner with nonprofit organizations in an effort to enhance programing initiatives for people in custody. These new services will focus on four areas: Supplemental education, trauma-informed programming, substance misuse programming, and transition planning and transportation.

After a halt and review of the Memorandums of Understanding (MOU) with organizations holding small contracts with the Department, those services offered through these partners continued

to be afforded in 2024. These niche programs enable the Department to afford targeted services to specific populations and, more generally, supplement the many aforementioned programs. These programs also reflect feedback that was obtained through focus groups conducted in 2022 and 2023, which included staff and persons in custody.
