Department of Correction Local Law 122 Report, CY 2016

The NYC Department of Correction (DOC) is committed to managing its incarceration population in a way that addresses individual needs, the foremost of these being personal safety. Program offerings play a critical role in the Department's violence reduction initiative. Reducing idle time creates safer and more secure spaces for everyone living and working within our facilities. DOC offers a wide variety of program options that promote the acquisition of life skills, vocational skills, assist with successful reentry, and promote internal growth and wellbeing. The Department utilities a number of approaches and programs for those in our care including but not limited to: the designation of program staff focused on group facilitation, individualized reentry planning, and life skills and workforce development. These are a subsection of the overall offering of the Department, but play a critical role in violence reduction as well as better prepare those in our care for success upon reentering the community.

Enclosed in this report is a menu of programs that speak to the requirements of Local Law 122, which went into effect October 18, 2016. The data contained herein covers the time period between October 1, 2016 and December 31, 2016. Through the programs offered within this time period, individuals in our custody had the opportunity to participate in hard skill training, reentry based services and life skill development. Programs and services were greatly expanded in 2017 due to an increase in Departmental funding and the implementation of a decentralized service model.
