### How To Search or Apply for a Certificate of Occupancy or Letter of No Objection

Requests for a new <u>Certificate of Occupancy</u> (CO) must be submitted through the <u>NYC</u> <u>Department of Buildings</u>. To search for an existing CO or a temporary CO, visit the Buildings Information System at <u>a810-bisweb.nyc.gov/bisweb/bsqpm01.jsp</u>.

To request or update a <u>Letter of No Objection</u> (LNO), contact or visit the NYC Department of Buildings borough office (available at <u>nyc.gov/site/buildings/dob/office-locations.page</u>) where the property is located.

## **How To Get an NYC Fire Department Certificate of Fitness**

Certain certificates of fitness are required for operators to conduct camps in NYC. One employee at a camp program must hold a Certificate of Fitness for Fire Alarm Systems and Other Related Systems (also called an S-95) and a Certificate of Fitness for the Fire and Emergency Drill Conductor (also known as an F-07/W-07). The NYC Fire Department (FDNY)

issues certificates of fitness by providing written examinations to applicants. These certificates are valid for three years and must be renewed by the expiration date through payment of the renewal fee to the FDNY.

#### **Scheduling a Fire Safety Inspection**

Before a permit is issued, summer camps must receive a fire safety inspection from the FDNY Public Buildings Unit. Once your CO or LNO is approved, you will be notified to request a fire safety inspection online at <a href="mailto:fires.fdnycloud.org/CitizenAccess/Default.aspx">fires.fdnycloud.org/CitizenAccess/Default.aspx</a>. When prompted, enter your Day Care Identification (DCID) number in the Project Information Box.

### Official New York State Sex Offender Registry

Article 13-B of the New York Public Health Law requires children's summer camp operators to determine whether an employee or volunteer is listed on the Official New York State Sex Offender Registry. Operators must complete checks of the registry prior to the day the employee or volunteer starts work at the camp and every year after. This law applies to all children's summer camps (including day, traveling, and overnight camps) and all prospective employees and volunteers at the camps, regardless of their job title, job responsibilities, or employment status (full-time or part-time).

#### National Sex Offender Registry

New York Public Health Law and General Business Law require children's summer camp operators to check if an employee or volunteer is listed on the National Sex Offender Registry. You are required to complete the search prior to the start date for any employee or volunteer. Documentation of the search must be maintained for review by the NYC Health Department. This can be done by clicking on Print View when the results of the search are displayed. A search may identify records of individuals who share a name with the employee or volunteer. It is the camp operator's responsibility to review any records generated and verify that the employee or volunteer is not any of the individuals identified by the search. If there are multiple pages of records, printing the first page and making a notation that all records were reviewed is considered adequate documentation (the first page should specify the name checked and the date and time of the search).

Operators can perform a search by:

- 1. Going to the U.S. Department of Justice's National Sex Offender Public Website at nsopw.gov.
- 2. Enter the individual's first and last name in the Search by Name field, then click on Name Search.
- 3. After agreeing to the conditions of use and entering the captcha, you will see the results of your search. The results will indicate that a national search including all states and

territories was performed.

### **Food Protection Certificate**

At camps where food is catered and delivered in bulk quantities or prepared on-site, a supervisor of food preparation and service must have a certificate for the 15-hour Food Protection Course. If food is catered and served in individual packaging, or if food is transported to a camp from NYC Public Schools' Summer Meals Program, a supervisor must have a certificate for the four-hour Food Protection Course for Soup Kitchen and Sumer Camp Workers.
