PROCEEDINGS

MS. LIGUORI: Hi everyone. I think we are going to get started.

Good morning and welcome. My name is Madelynn Liguori. I am Associate Counsel in the Bureau of Legal Affairs for the Department of Sanitation. Thank you for attending this public hearing this morning.

DSNY is conducting this remote hearing in accordance with the requirements of the Citywide Administrative Procedure Act. The purpose of this hearing is to receive comments from the public on two proposed rules. The first rule governs the requirements for waste containerization systems in certain buildings.

DSNY, in conjunction with the Department of Housing Preservation and Development, HPD, and the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, DOHMH, initially published this proposed rule in The City Record on March 12, 2020, with a scheduled joint hearing date of

1 April 16, 2020.

2 Due to COVID-19, this initial  
3 hearing was postponed. This rule was  
4 then republished in The City Record on  
5 April 27, 2020, with a scheduled joint  
6 hearing date of today, May 28, 2020.

7 Additionally, all three agencies  
8 emailed copies of the rule to all New  
9 York City local elected officials, the  
10 City's 59 Community Boards, media and  
11 interested parties, and published the  
12 proposed rule on their respective  
13 website.

14 While existing regulations require  
15 large new buildings to incorporate  
16 minimum requirements for the storage of  
17 its refuse and recycling, there is  
18 currently no requirement that buildings  
19 contemplate what happens when the  
20 substantial amount of refuse and  
21 recyclables generated by its residents  
22 is placed curbside.

23 Curbside placement of piled bags of  
24 refuse generated at such buildings for  
25 collection by DSNY, given their large

1 size, results in mountains of black bags  
2 placed along the curb on the sidewalks,  
3 not only obstructing pedestrian flow,  
4 but also impacting the quality of life  
5 of the surrounding area, especially in  
6 the summer months and after delayed  
7 collection during the winter months due  
8 to snow. These bags are also a huge  
9 food source for rats.

10 This proposed rule would require  
11 owners and/or managing agents of certain  
12 new residential multiple dwellings to  
13 install a waste containerization system  
14 for the management of waste generated,  
15 unless DSNY determines that collection  
16 service through this system is not  
17 feasible.

18 Pursuant to Local Law 56 for the  
19 year 1967, Local Law 11 for the year  
20 1971, and Chapter 907 of the Laws of the  
21 State of New York of 1985, DSNY, DOHMH  
22 and HPD must jointly approve via rule,  
23 the Tripartite General Orders, any new  
24 specifications for waste management  
25 systems in dwellings.

1           This jointly drafted proposed rule  
2 would amend the existing Tripartite  
3 General Orders by requiring owners  
4 and/or managing agents of certain new  
5 residential multiple dwellings,  
6 including commercial buildings that are  
7 turned into residential buildings, to  
8 install a waste containerization system  
9 to manage waste generated at such  
10 buildings unless DSNY determines that  
11 collection service through this system  
12 is not feasible.

13           Specifically, this proposed rule  
14 would require the installation of a  
15 waste containerization system in:

16           Any new multiple dwelling building  
17 that contains 300 or more dwelling  
18 units, or any commercial building that  
19 is altered, enlarged or otherwise  
20 modified from its original physical  
21 design in order to be newly classified  
22 by the New York City Department of  
23 Buildings, DOB, as a multiple dwelling  
24 building that contains 300 or more  
25 dwelling units, or any commercial

1 building having 50 percent or more of  
2 its floor area renovated in order to be  
3 classified by DOB as a multiple dwelling  
4 building that contains 300 or more  
5 dwelling units.

6 DSNY also reserves the right to  
7 waive this mandatory requirement if it  
8 determines such waste containerization  
9 system is not operationally feasible and  
10 may deny or suspend collection service  
11 to any building required by the proposed  
12 rule to have a waste containerization  
13 system if all provisions have not been  
14 met.

15 The second rule would require the  
16 submission of a waste management plan by  
17 certain buildings. This rule was  
18 initially published by DSNY in The City  
19 Record on March 12, 2020, with a  
20 scheduled hearing date of April 16,  
21 2020.

22 Due to COVID-19, this initial  
23 hearing was postponed. This rule was  
24 then republished in The City Record on  
25 April 27, 2020, with a scheduled hearing

1 date of today, May 28, 2020.

2 Additionally, DSNY emailed copies of  
3 the rule to all New York City local  
4 elected officials, the City's 59  
5 Community Boards, media and interested  
6 parties, and published the proposed rule  
7 on its website.

8 This proposed rule would require  
9 owners and/or managing agents of certain  
10 new residential multiple dwellings to  
11 submit a building waste management plan  
12 for approval by DSNY. Such waste  
13 management plan will allow such owners  
14 and/or managing agents to take a more  
15 holistic approach to managing their  
16 waste and is important for the City to  
17 achieve its zero waste and recycling  
18 goals.

19 Specifically, this proposed rule  
20 would require the submission of a waste  
21 management plan to DSNY. Such waste  
22 management plan would be required for  
23 the following classes of buildings:

24 Any new multiple dwelling building  
25 that contains 150 or more dwelling

1 units, or any commercial building that  
2 is altered, enlarged or otherwise  
3 modified from its original physical  
4 design in order to be classified by DOB  
5 as a multiple dwelling building that  
6 contains 150 or more dwelling units, or  
7 any commercial building with 50 percent  
8 or more of its floor area renovated in  
9 order to be classified by DOB as a  
10 multiple dwelling building that contains  
11 150 or more dwelling units.

12 Such waste management plan must be  
13 submitted to DSNY in a form prescribed  
14 and made available on its website.

15 A building must submit the waste  
16 management plan to DSNY when plans that  
17 include design drawings are submitted to  
18 DOB. Additionally, DSNY reserves the  
19 right to deny collection to any building  
20 for the failure to submit a waste  
21 management report or for those buildings  
22 required to have a waste  
23 containerization system for failing to  
24 submit a waste containerization plan or  
25 for submitting an inadequate plan.

1           A court reporter is present today  
2           and will record the hearing. You may  
3           present an oral statement or submit  
4           written comments concerning either or  
5           both of the proposed rules.

6           We have been accepting written  
7           comments on the proposed rules since  
8           their publication. Today is the  
9           deadline for submission of written  
10          comments. Such comments may be emailed  
11          directly to [nycrules@dsny.nyc.gov](mailto:nycrules@dsny.nyc.gov) by 5  
12          p.m. today.

13          DSNY will make available a copy of  
14          all written comments received through  
15          today, together with the hearing  
16          transcript, for viewing on its website  
17          within the next few weeks.

18          DSNY will carefully consider all the  
19          comments it receives today at the  
20          hearing and all written comments it  
21          receives.

22          I will begin calling those of you  
23          who wish to speak this morning in the  
24          order in which you have signed up to  
25          testify. While the notices requested

1 that persons wishing to testify sign up  
2 in advance of this hearing, anyone  
3 wishing to testify at this time may do  
4 so by indicating in the chat area that  
5 you wish to testify by indicating your  
6 name and affiliation, if any.

7 When you speak, please state your  
8 name and affiliation and speak slowly  
9 and clearly so that the court reporter  
10 can understand and accurately record  
11 your statement. We also ask that you  
12 limit your statement to five minutes.

13 I will begin by calling our first  
14 person signed up to testify, and that  
15 will be Claire Miflin for the Center for  
16 Zero Waste Design.

17 Claire, whenever you're ready.

18 MS. MIFLIN: Okay. Can you hear me?

19 MS. LIGUORI: Yes.

20 MS. MIFLIN: My name is Claire  
21 Miflin from the Center for Zero Waste  
22 Design.

23 I would like to strongly support the  
24 waste management plan rule, although I  
25 think it needs to add precise details

1 about how architects should calculate  
2 waste volumes in areas and how they  
3 should determine if there is sufficient  
4 space on the sidewalk.

5 I think it might be better if it was  
6 tied into the standard Department of  
7 Buildings process for architects and  
8 require a sign-off, otherwise I'm not  
9 sure how architects would be aware of  
10 it.

11 Secondly, I'd like to comment on the  
12 waste containerization system rule. I  
13 strongly believe that waste should be  
14 containerized, especially organic waste  
15 and trash.

16 This plan is only for trash, but I  
17 think it should be planned for a zero  
18 waste future where there's much less  
19 trash and more recycling and organics.  
20 The waste stream is after all about a  
21 third organics, a third recycling and  
22 only 26 percent trash.

23 The rule is written that it could  
24 allow large 30 cubic yard roll-off  
25 containers or smaller 1 to 8 cubic (sic)

1 containers called "easy packs" by the  
2 Department of the Sanitation, but the  
3 Department of Sanitation only collects  
4 "easy packs" from grandfathered  
5 buildings. So an architect of a new  
6 building would have to design it for  
7 incorporation of the large 30 cubic yard  
8 roll-off containers.

9 So my comments combine those two  
10 requirements and note that a large  
11 amount of space would be required for  
12 this one -- one stream trash that we're  
13 trying to get rid of.

14 We think the roll-off container  
15 requirements should be clearer. It's  
16 not totally clear to us if a truck has  
17 to enter the building and have 25 foot  
18 (sic) head room. If they do, that  
19 actually requires 840 square foot (sic)  
20 of a three-story. So almost  
21 two-and-a-half thousand square foot  
22 (sic) of floor area, which is a vast  
23 expense.

24 We've done diagrams in our testimony  
25 to illustrate this.

1           We also think that if a building  
2           reduces its waste slightly from average,  
3           say 90 percent, and captures 80 percent  
4           of all recycling streams -- we use  
5           online waste calculator from the Zero  
6           Waste Design guidelines -- and that  
7           would mean that a roll-off would only be  
8           emptied every 12 days for trash and you  
9           could replace it with five two cubic  
10          yard containers.

11           So we think the limit of 300 units  
12          is too -- is too low. We're not quite  
13          sure what it should be, but we've given  
14          details of numbers in our testimony.

15           And we also wonder if zoning should  
16          be amended so roll-off containers could  
17          be shared between different lots like  
18          they are in Battery Park City.

19           Thank you so much.

20           MS. LIGUORI: Thank you, Claire,  
21          very much for your testimony.

22           The next person we have that signed  
23          up is Bob Frustaci, the President of  
24          Premier Facility Management and Premier  
25          Compaction Systems.

1 Bob, whenever you're ready.

2 (No response.)

3 MS. LIGUORI: I am not sure if Bob  
4 is on yet. I will reach out to him to  
5 see if he is on.

6 If anyone else wishes to testify in  
7 the interim, if you can please indicate  
8 your name and affiliation, if any, in  
9 the chat area and I will call you.

10 (No response.)

11 MS. LIGUORI: Hi Bob, can you try  
12 talking now?

13 (No response.)

14 MS. LIGUORI: Bob, we still can't  
15 hear you.

16 (No response.)

17 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Hello.

18 MS. LIGUORI: Hi. Is this Bob?

19 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Hi. Can you hear  
20 us?

21 (No response.)

22 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Hello.

23 MS. LIGUORI: Yes, is this Bob?

24 MR. FRUSTACI: Yes, this is Bob.

25 Can you hear me now?

1 MS. LIGUORI: We can hear you now,  
2 yes. Thank you. Sorry for the  
3 technical difficulties.

4 MR. FRUSTACI: No problem. You can  
5 hear me now, right?

6 MS. LIGUORI: Yes.

7 MR. FRUSTACI: Okay. Great.

8 First of all, I'd like to commend  
9 the New York City Department of  
10 Sanitation. I'd like to commend all  
11 affiliated agencies on this direction.  
12 I think it's long overdue.

13 New York City is in need of this  
14 program to complete containerization of  
15 their waste and to get the sidewalk  
16 appearance back into a sustainable  
17 direction.

18 This has been the Premier program  
19 from day one, and to expand, I believe,  
20 in individual locations that have  
21 particular restrictions, as Claire  
22 mentioned, I think that the waste  
23 management plan must include, not only  
24 the proper plan for collection, but also  
25 the inclusion -- to include rodent

1 protection -- minimization -- and the  
2 collection by the New York City  
3 Department of Sanitation workers and the  
4 commercial haulers, that is done  
5 efficiently and with less labor, and  
6 include when you have your snow days to  
7 make sure that the program works inside  
8 the building when you don't have the  
9 ability to put your recycling and your  
10 trash outside because of the snow  
11 situation.

12 We have multiple programs already in  
13 place in the City that work and we're  
14 willing -- we'd like to illustrate it in  
15 writing on some examples that we've  
16 already completed and that's it.

17 We'd also like to be involved in any  
18 way and any shape or form. The Premier  
19 Source Separation Program and the  
20 Premier Compaction Systems have, you  
21 know, successfully worked with the  
22 Department of Sanitation in getting some  
23 of these installed and approved.

24 One in particular is Rochdale  
25 Village in Jamaica, Queens -- is a very

1 good example of this program and --  
2 among others that we're working on as  
3 well.

4 We will give our written comments at  
5 the end of the day. And like I said in  
6 the beginning of my testimony, I -- this  
7 is a long time coming for New York City  
8 and I commend the effort one million  
9 percent. Thank you.

10 MS. LIGUORI: Thank you very much,  
11 Mr. Frustaci, for your testimony today.

12 If anyone else would like to testify  
13 and you have not already signed up,  
14 please indicate in the chat area.  
15 Please provide your name and  
16 affiliation, if any.

17 As of right now, we do not have  
18 anyone else that has indicated they wish  
19 to testify, but we will keep this  
20 hearing open until 11 a.m. today.

21 Thank you.

22 (Recess taken.)

23 MS. LIGUORI: If anyone just joined  
24 us and they wish to testify, please  
25 indicate so in the chat area with your

1 name and any affiliation you may have.

2 All written comments may be  
3 submitted to DSNY today by 5 p.m. at  
4 nycrules@dsny.nyc.gov.

5 (Recess taken.)

6 MS. LIGUORI: If anyone else just  
7 joined us and you wish to testify, you  
8 may indicate so in the chat area by  
9 indicating your name and affiliation, if  
10 any. Thank you very much.

11 (Recess taken.)

12 MR. LANNING: Hello. This is Mark  
13 Lanning.

14 MS. LIGUORI: Hi, Mr. -- are you --  
15 would you like to testify today?

16 MR. LANNING: Yes, ma'am, if I  
17 could, please.

18 MS. LIGUORI: Okay.

19 MR. LANNING: My name is Mark  
20 Lanning. I'm President of Orwak North  
21 America and we have -- we do some  
22 business in New York City currently and  
23 we have some container solutions.

24 We are basically a waste and  
25 recycling equipment manufacturer based

1 out of Sweden, but we have businesses  
2 worldwide and having been doing business  
3 here in North America since the early  
4 80s.

5 And in reading through the program  
6 that you're trying to accomplish here,  
7 we have some in-bin solutions that are  
8 used in many cities throughout North  
9 America, as well as throughout the  
10 world, to meet the demands of  
11 residential high-rise, as well as  
12 commercial businesses who are compacting  
13 and containerizing waste.

14 So we have some of those solutions  
15 already in place in New York City and  
16 they've been working very well. So  
17 essentially it takes the bags off the  
18 streets, provides both the residents and  
19 property managers with improved health  
20 and safety, rodent control as well  
21 because you're creating another level of  
22 -- or another layer of bags in between  
23 all types of general waste.

24 We also provide -- I don't want to  
25 call it substandard -- but mini-balers,

1 essentially, that work very well in  
2 large metropolitan areas that handle the  
3 recyclable materials.

4 So we're big believers in source  
5 separation. So separating waste at its  
6 source so you can better sort -- better  
7 recycling rates, higher diversion rates,  
8 and then compact -- compact those to  
9 build value and increase the value of  
10 the stream, and also compact the general  
11 waste. So you have, you know, basically  
12 less pickups is essentially the idea,  
13 but all with the primary cause of  
14 recycling and better waste processes for  
15 both residential and businesses.

16 So that's -- so that fits very well  
17 into what I believe that you're trying  
18 to accomplish through these programs and  
19 we wanted to call in and add our input  
20 even though we do have -- like I said,  
21 we do have customers currently. We  
22 probably have almost 1,000 machines  
23 throughout the five boroughs that are  
24 operating in both public buildings and  
25 -- like I said, both residential

1 buildings and commercial buildings.

2 MS. LIGUORI: Thank you,  
3 Mr. Lanning, for your testimony. Do you  
4 have anything else to add or is that --

5 MR. LANNING: No, I mean, I just --  
6 is that -- the object obviously is to  
7 get the bags off the street and improve  
8 the -- or lower the per ton pickups, I'm  
9 guessing, for sanitation.

10 MS. LIGUORI: Well, thank you very  
11 much for your testimony, Mr. Lanning.  
12 Much appreciated.

13 MR. LANNING: Okay. Thank you.

14 MS. LIGUORI: If anyone else wishes  
15 to testify, you may, of course, indicate  
16 so in the chat mechanism on the side.  
17 Thank you very much. Please let me know  
18 if anyone else wishes to testify.

19 (Recess taken.)

20 MS. LIGUORI: If everyone can please  
21 put themselves on mute. Thank you very  
22 much.

23 (Recess taken.)

24 MS. LIGUORI: If anyone new has just  
25 joined us, you may still provide


