NEW YORK — New York City Department of Youth and Community Development (DYCD) Commissioner Keith Howard today cut the ribbon on a new, 21,000-square-foot community space behind Queens Borough Hall in Kew Gardens. The space will serve as a one-stop shop to provide or connect visitors to services, with additional opportunities for programming and community events—a symbol of the administration's investment in community development, accessibility, and support for residents of Kew Gardens and Queens. DYCD has selected Commonpoint to manage the space and oversee programming.

Additionally, there will be opportunities for providers to host local meetings and potentially relocate their services to the new space in conjunction with other DYCD programming. Community events and gatherings such as public meetings can also be held.

During this fiscal year, DYCD will be activating the space in phases to establish connections between community members and city services. Phase one was the ribbon cutting today. The second phase will implement basic programs by December 1.

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
