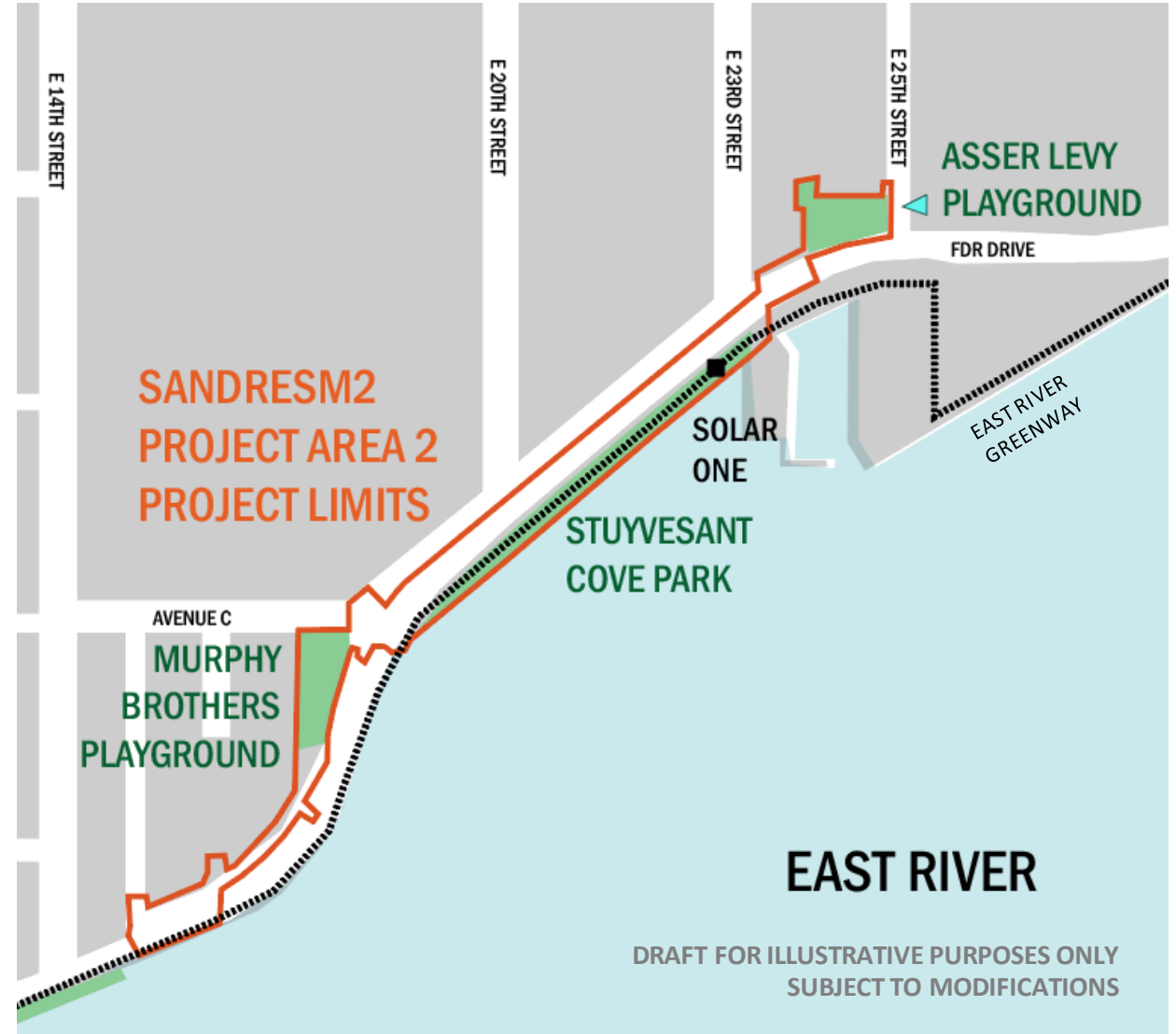

PA2: PEDESTRIAN ACCESS

- Asser Levy Handball and Track access on E 25th Street
- Most work adjacent to Solar One will not inhibit pedestrian circulation along the waterfront
- Pedestrian detours will be communicated in advance of closures
- Pedestrian circulation along the waterfront will be detoured starting Fall 2021 with the start of work at Stuyvesant Cove Park



PA2: GREENWAY DETOUR

- Houston Street to 38th St. via 1st & 2nd Avenue detour in place for Project Area 2
- Working towards a more localized detour due to the work at this phase of the project
- Detour subject to change once Project Area 1 begins and other phases of Project Area 2
- Detour subject to change in coordination with DOT
- Detours will be communicated in advance of closures

WHAT WE'VE HEARD

- **Compost Relocation:** no updates
- **Solar One coordination working in tandem with ESCR Project**

- CCL has contacted NYC Department of Homeless Services (DHS) to discuss homeless population on the site and will continue to, should the population continue to dwell within the project site

 - 24/7/365 street outreach across all 5 boroughs. SOILS & ENVIRONMENTAL

REMINDER: ENVIRONMENTAL MONITORING NYC DDC COMMITMENT

The City has committed to noise and air quality monitoring during construction

- Noise and air quality commitments/mitigation made in FEIS and Record of Decision issued for ESCR
- Contractors will comply with **all** applicable laws and regulations
- Contract documents include requirements and mitigation

Requirements

- Contractor must submit Noise Monitoring Plan and Air Quality Monitoring Plan
- Monitors will move based on location of construction

Enforcement

- Monitoring Plans must be approved by NYC DDC
- Alerts sent automatically if thresholds exceeded
- Oversight of construction activities
 - On-site Inspectors will monitor contractor work
 - Environmental Specialist will oversee compliance

SECTION 3 AND M/WBE

REMINDER: SECTION 3 & M/WBE OUTREACH

1. DDC Office of Diversity and Industry Relations (ODIR) has taken a proactive and strategic approach to M/WBE in 2019
 - via phone calls and email to confirm M/WBE availability
 - outreach to local unions
 - outreach to M/WBE firms with specialty services
 - outreach events connecting General/Prime Contractors to M/WBE subconsultants
2. Compliance to Section 3 and M/WBE goals is recognized by Contractor upon award of project
3. During NTP phase contractor workforce plans are reviewed, and potential hiring opportunities identified
4. Throughout the life of the contract DDC & HNTB-LiRo monitors status of commitment and performs outreach to Section 3 and M/WBE community

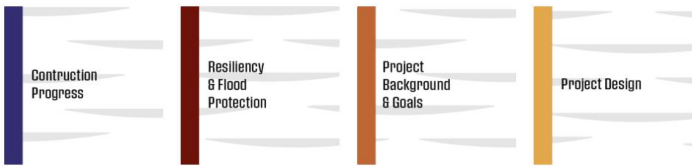

East Side Coastal Resiliency

The East Side Coastal Resiliency (ESCR) Project is a coastal protection initiative, jointly funded by the City of New York and the federal government, aimed at reducing flood risk due to coastal storms and sea level rise on Manhattan's East Side from East 25th Street to Montgomery Street. The boundaries of this project correspond with the natural "pinch-points" in the 100-year floodplain: areas where the land is higher along the coastline, making it easier to close the system off from water entering from the north and south. The project design integrates flood protection into the community fabric, improving waterfront open spaces and access, rather than walling off the neighborhood. Construction on the East Side Coastal Resiliency project will begin in Fall 2020 and continue through 2025.
