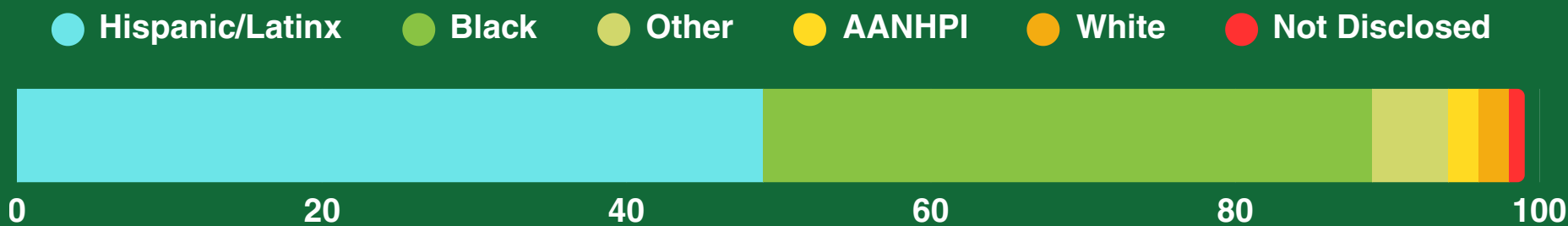

School Food

During the 2024-25 school year (SY):

- 1,662 students taste-tested new recipes
- 41 new plant-based recipes were developed

As of December 2025:

- 1,162 schools featured salad bars
- 782 schools featured water jets in cafeterias

During the 2024-25 SY, New York City Public Schools served **142.5 million meals**

-  220,000 breakfast meals daily
-  550,000 lunch meals daily

256 total schools with Cafeteria Enhancement Experience renovations

More than 30 CEE renovations scheduled for the 2025-26 SY

Food Education in Schools

Food Education Grant Program

202 schools received **\$6,000 each** to partner with **50+ nonprofit organizations** during the 2025-26 SY



Nutrition Collaborative Program

The City is investing **\$3M annually** to expand food education

274 schools received **\$10,000 each** in funding for the 2025-26 SY

400 meetings were held with **7,800 students, staff, and family members** from January-November 2025



Institutionalizing Food Education

During the 2024-25 SY

3500+ educators participated in food education professional learning sessions

50+ NYCPS teachers and administrators helped develop citywide Food Education Standards



School Gardens

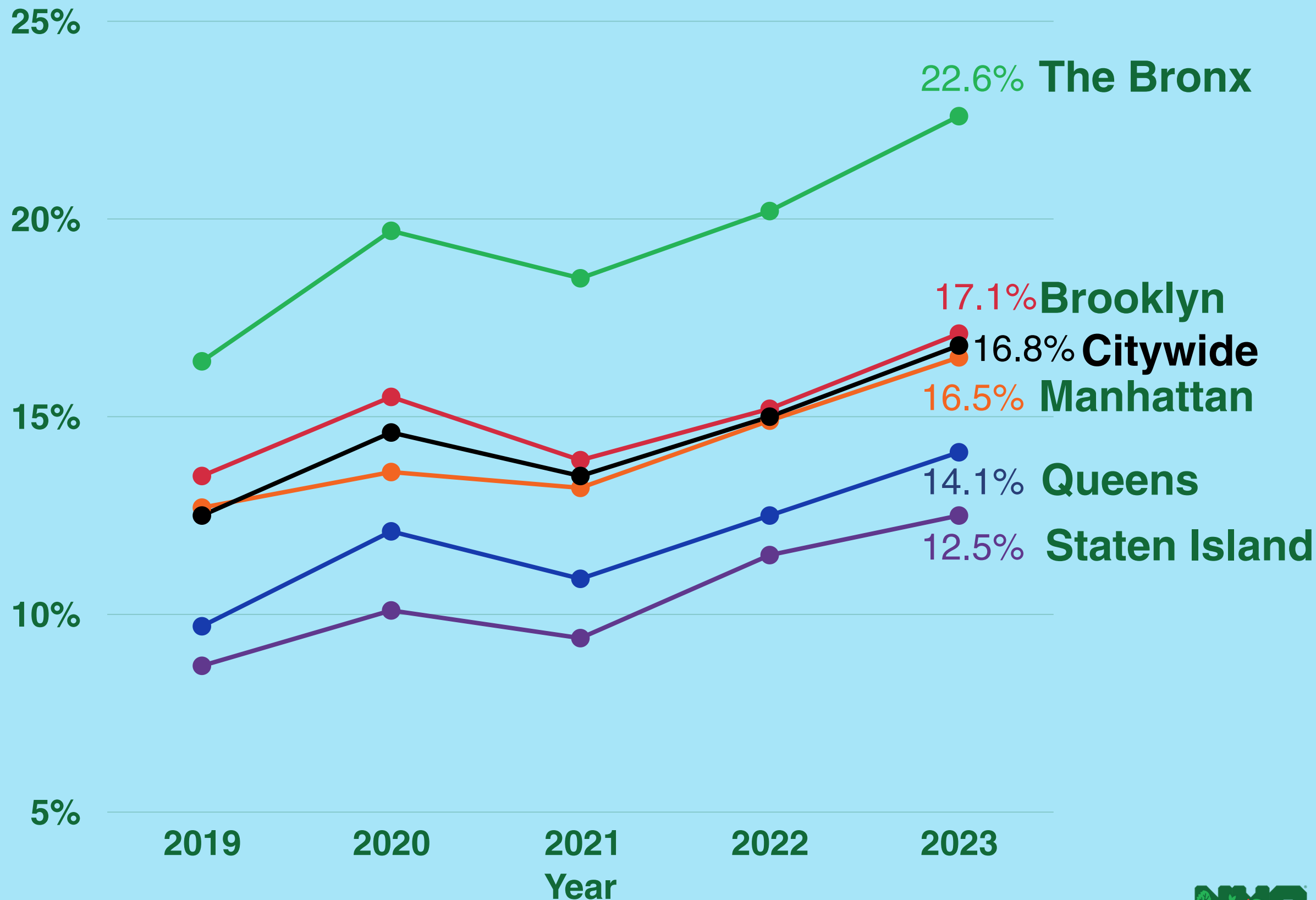
As of December 2025, there were **580 registered school gardens**

Food Insecurity

Overall food insecurity is on the rise across all boroughs of New York City, though rates vary significantly.

In 2023, **22.6%** of Bronx residents were considered food insecure, compared to **12.5%** of those living in Staten Island.

Food Insecurity Rate by Borough, (2019-2023)

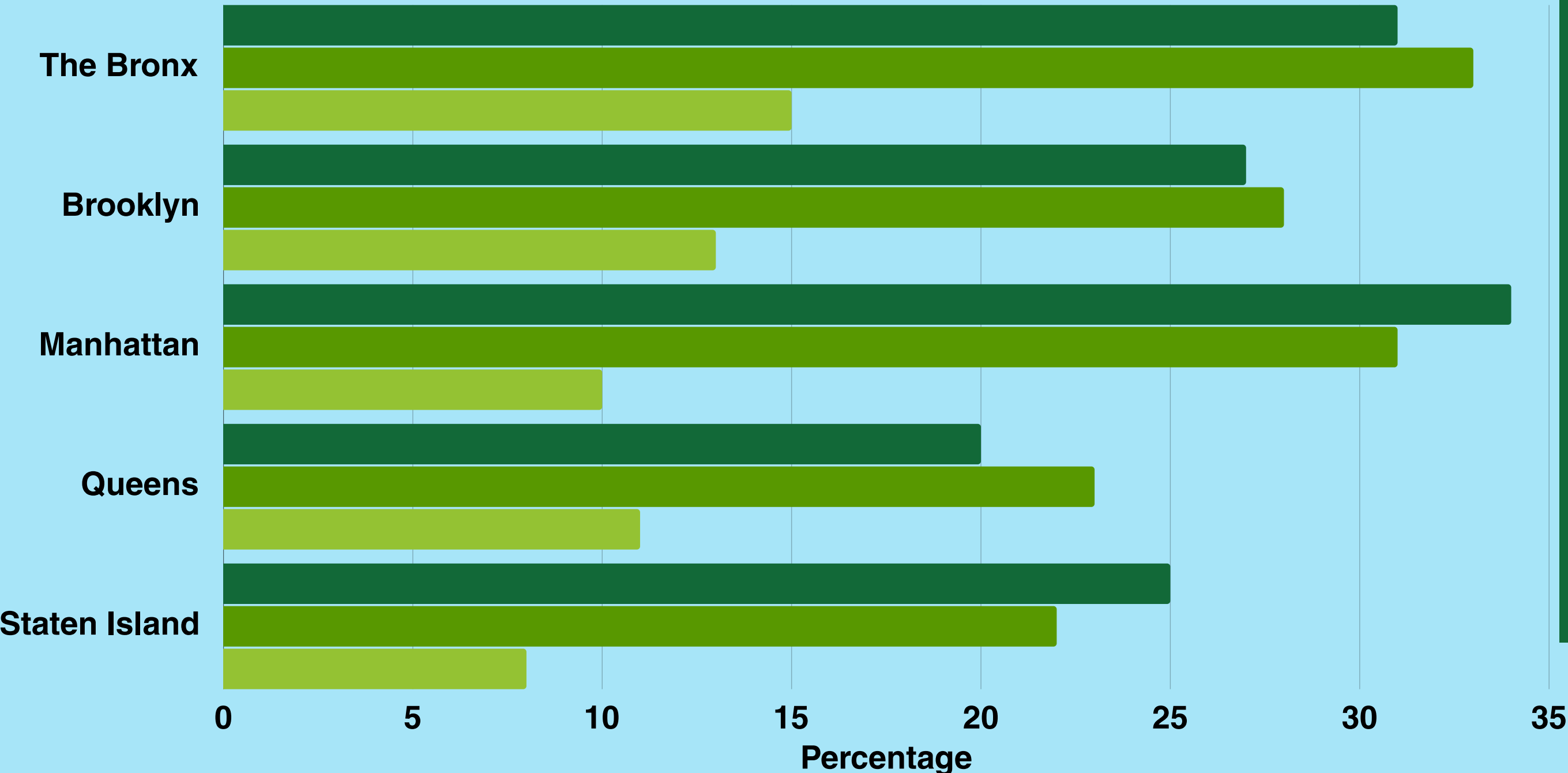

● Black/African American ● Hispanic/Latino ● White, non-Hispanic



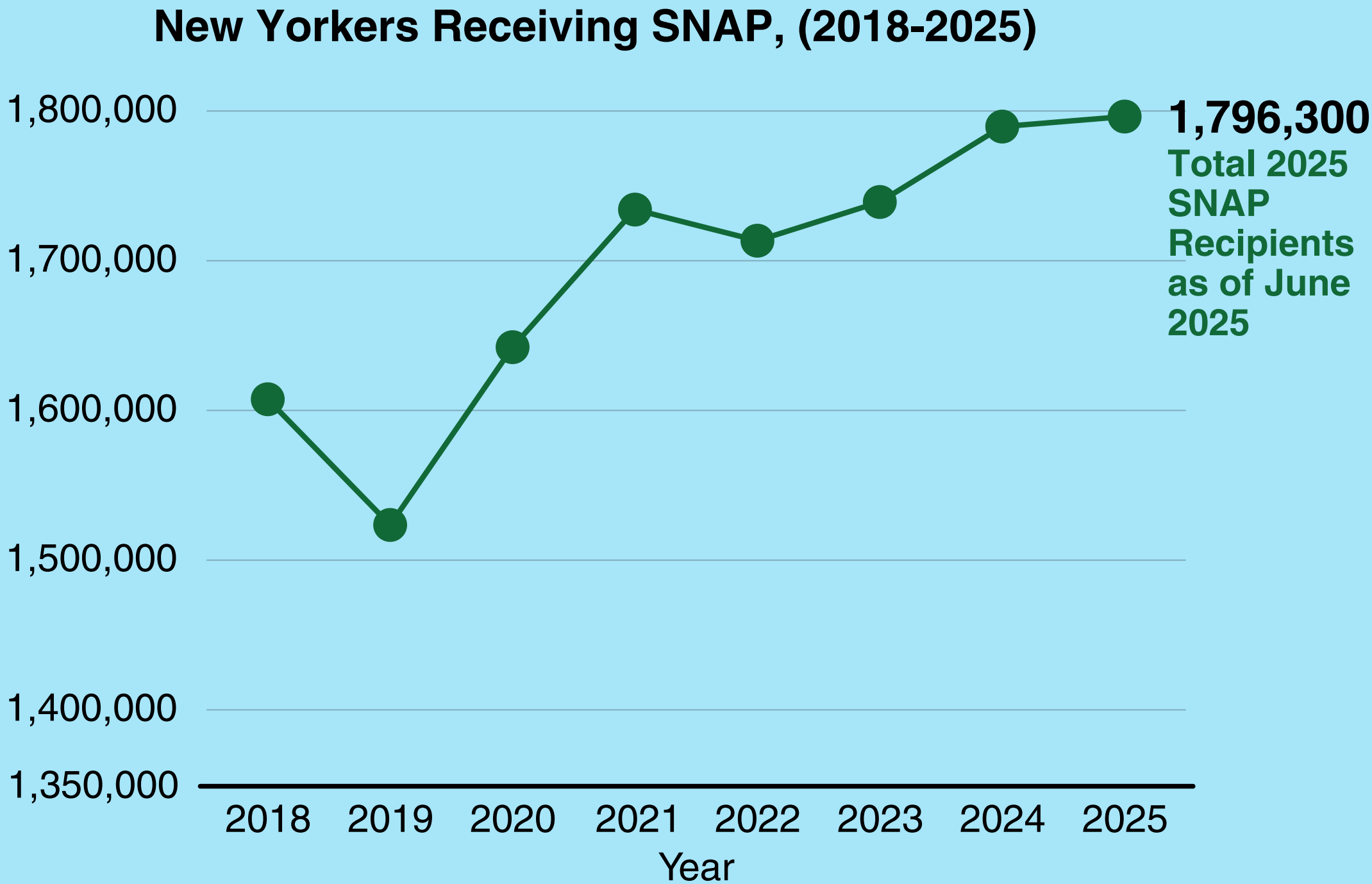

The impacts of systemic inequalities, which disproportionately burden the health outcomes of New Yorkers who are Black and Latino/a, and low-income, persist today.

In Staten Island, Black individuals are more than **3 times** as likely to experience food insecurity compared to their white counterparts.

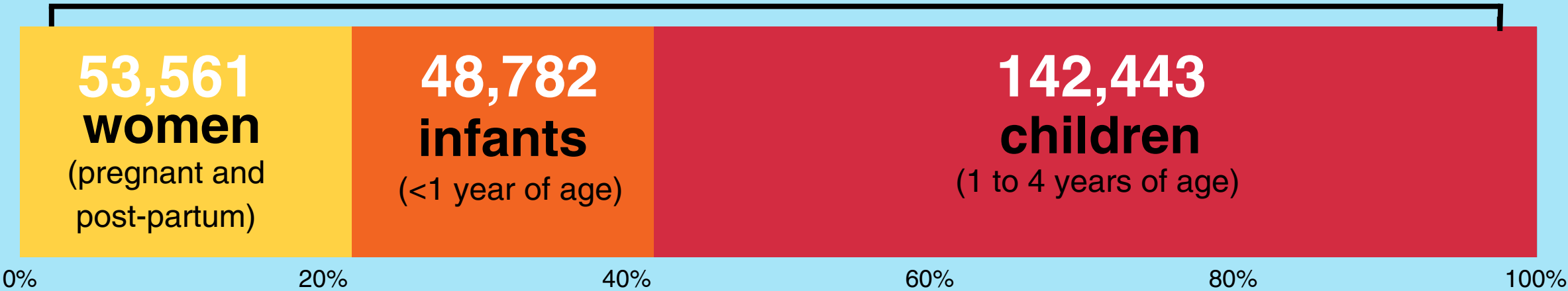

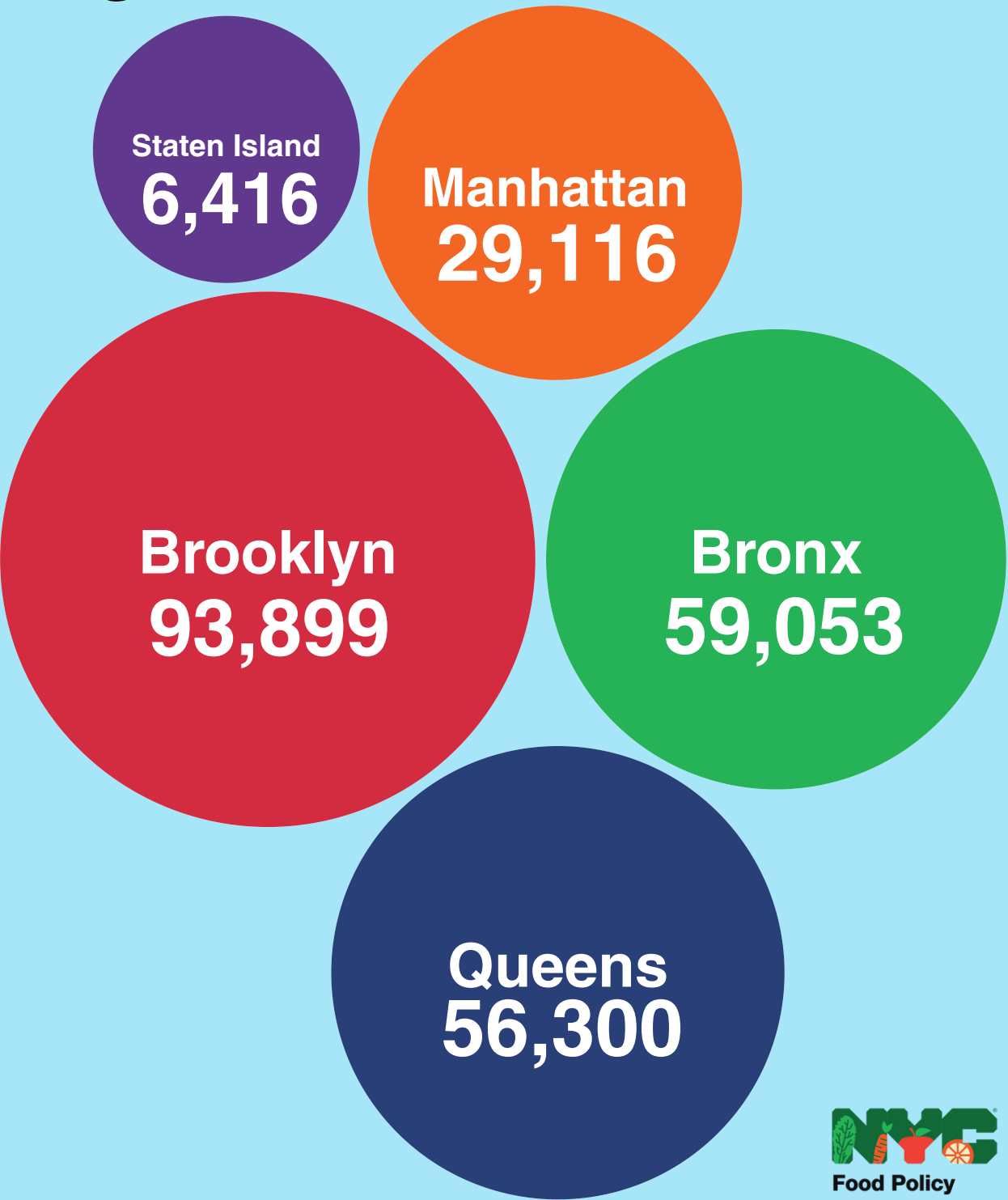
Monthly average participation in NYC during NYS FY25*

Get the Good Stuff



\$1 for \$1 match on SNAP purchases of eligible fruits, vegetables, and beans at participating supermarkets

Almost \$2M worth of fruits, vegetables, and beans were redeemed by New Yorkers at **25 participating supermarkets** in the Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens in FY25

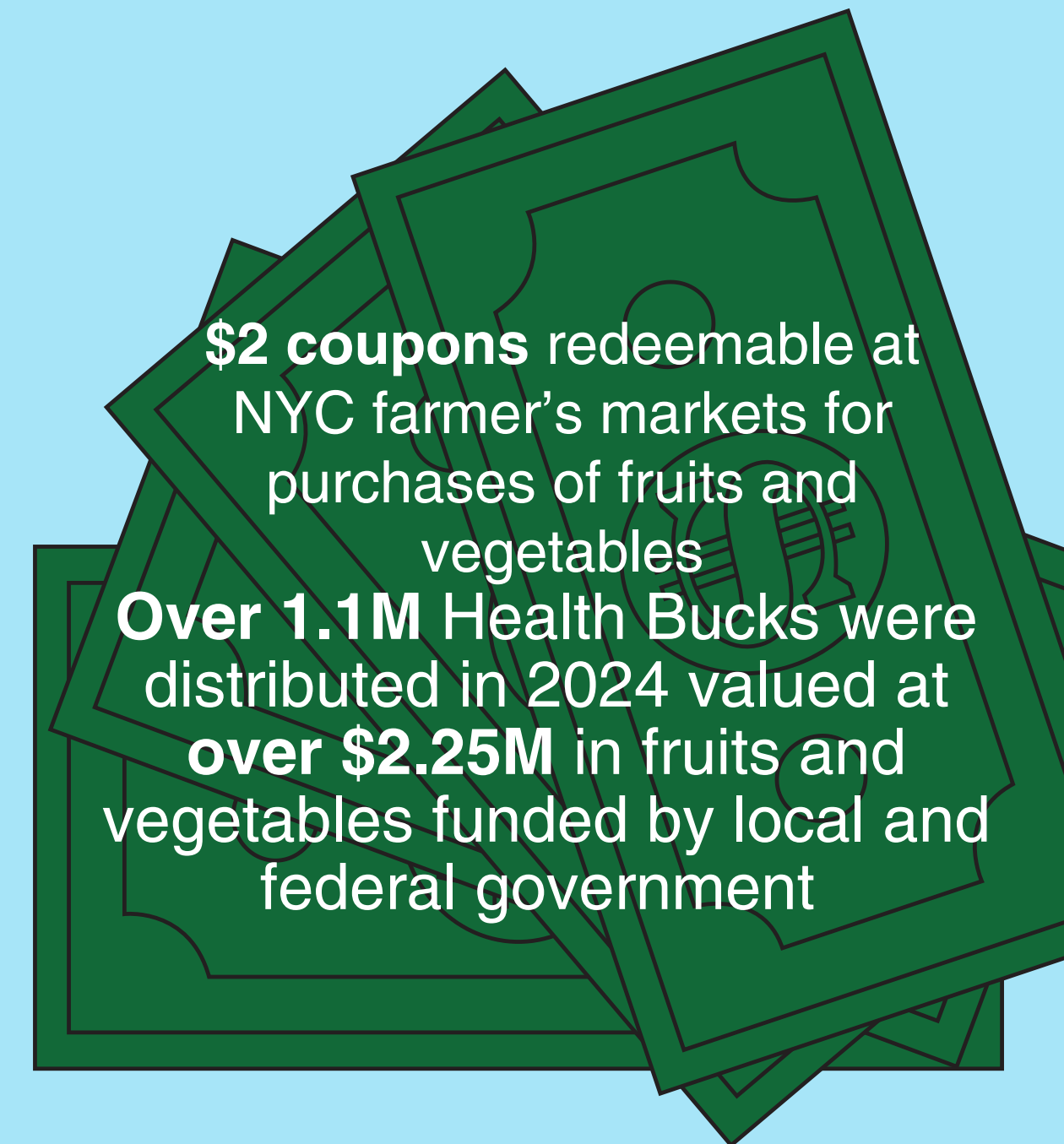
Groceries to Go



Monthly credits to eligible H+H NYC Care members to purchase SNAP-eligible groceries for delivery or pickup. Participants get **50% discount** on purchases of fresh produce made with credits.

Over \$7.4M spent on SNAP-eligible foods
\$500,000 saved on fresh produce

Health Bucks

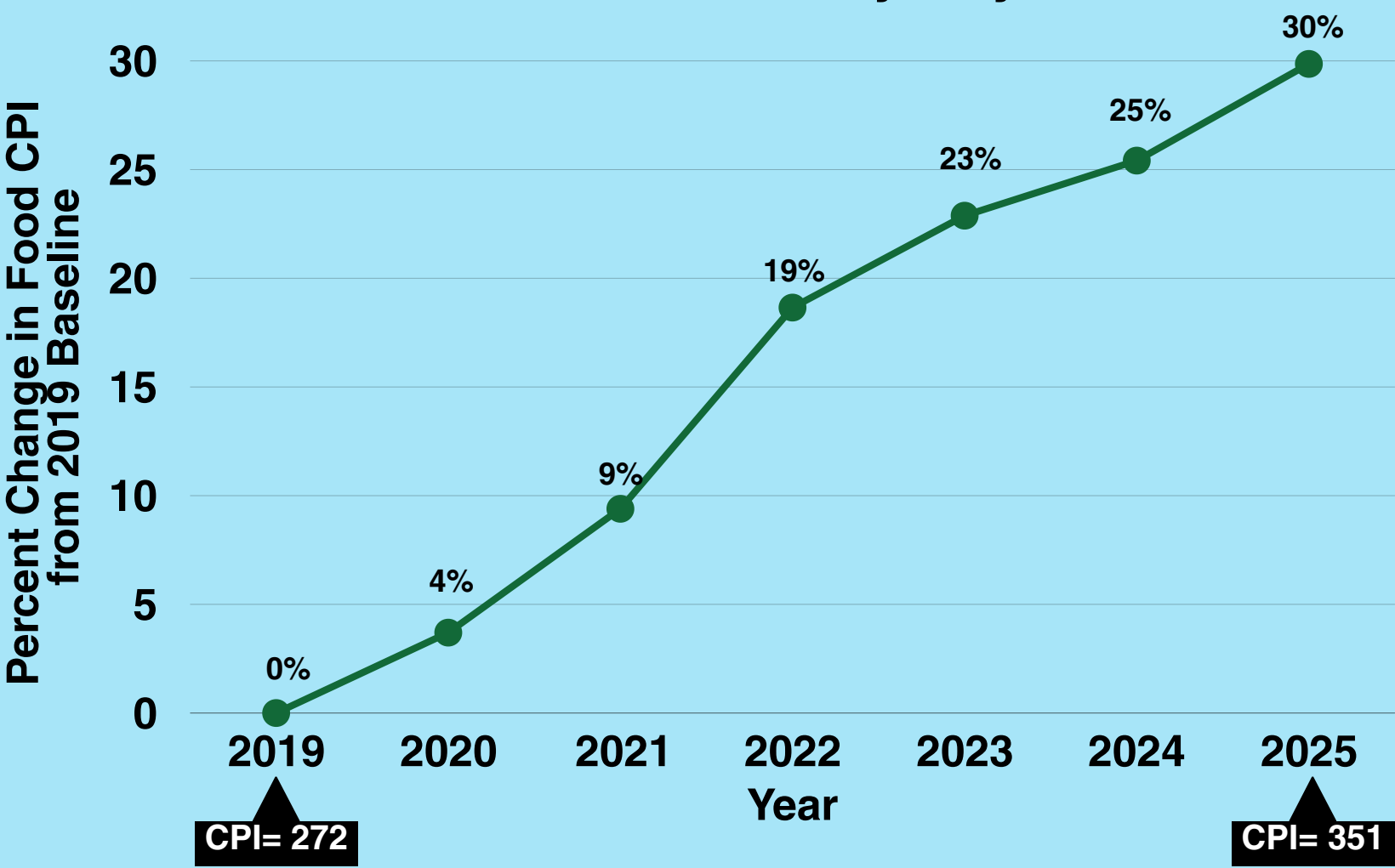


\$2 coupons redeemable at NYC farmer's markets for purchases of fruits and vegetables

Over 1.1M Health Bucks were distributed in 2024 valued at **over \$2.25M** in fruits and vegetables funded by local and federal government

New York-Newark-Jersey City Metro Area

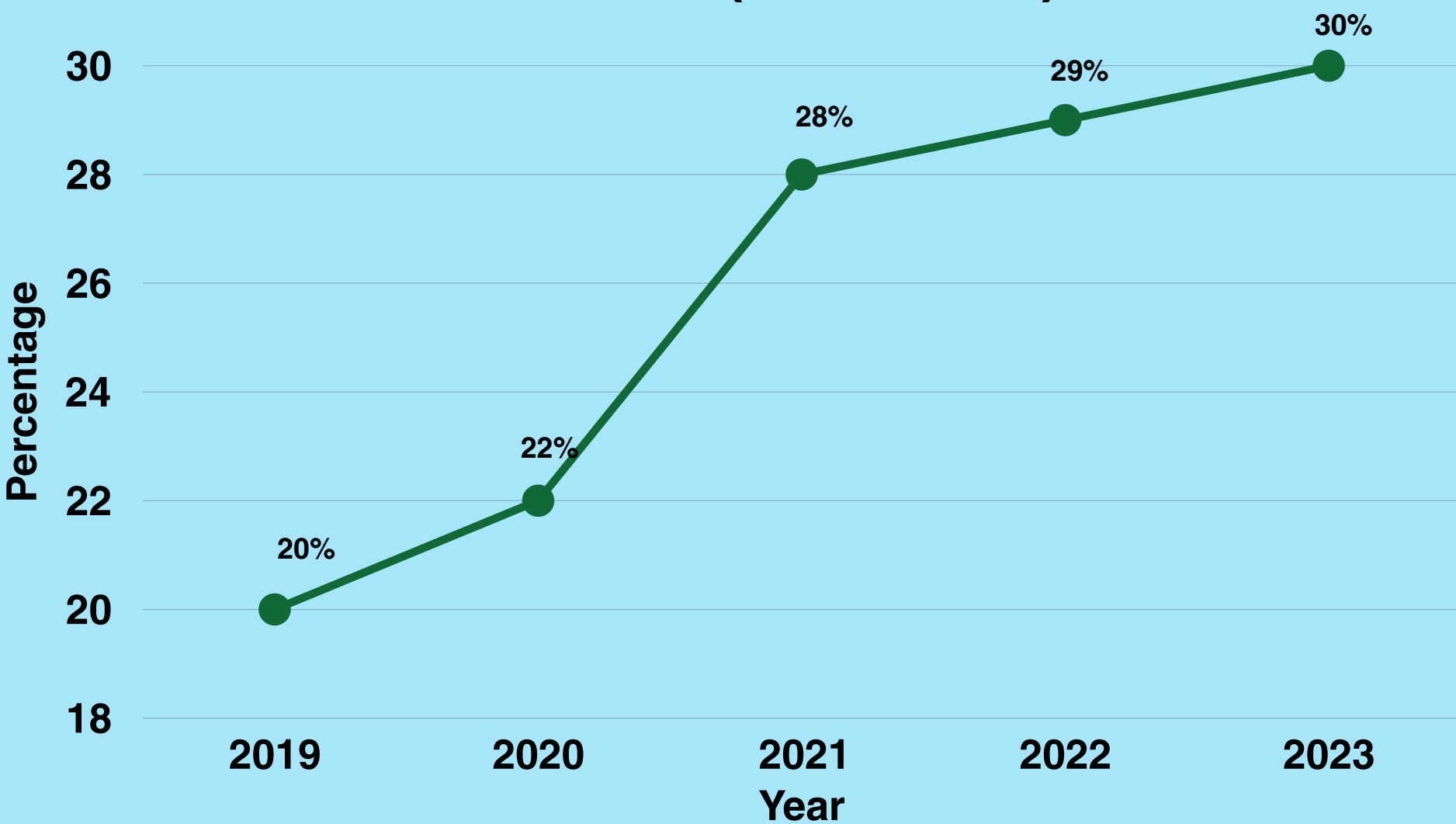

Food prices in the New York metro area have **risen 30%** since 2019.

That means what cost \$100 in 2019 now costs approximately \$130 in 2025, assuming prices tracked with inflation.

With rising food prices, more New Yorkers are struggling to put food on the table. Moreover, in 2023, an estimated **30% of food-insecure households** earned too much to qualify for SNAP.

Food Retail

The Food Retail Expansion to Support Health (FRESH) Program

as of November 2025

FRESH provides zoning and/or discretionary tax benefits to property owners who build full-service food markets in communities with a high need for fresh food access.

There are **984 grocery stores** in NYC as of Nov 2025, amounting to **over 15 million square feet** of food retail space.

Shop Healthy NYC! works with food retailers, suppliers, distributors, community residents and organizations to increase access to healthy foods in neighborhoods with high rates of nutrition-related diseases.

Food Workforce

NYC Public Schools

During SY24-25, **534 schools** completed culinary training through Chefs in the Schools, impacting **1078 OFNS staff**.

From February-June 2025, **140 hours** of individualized support was completed through the Cook Ambassadors program.

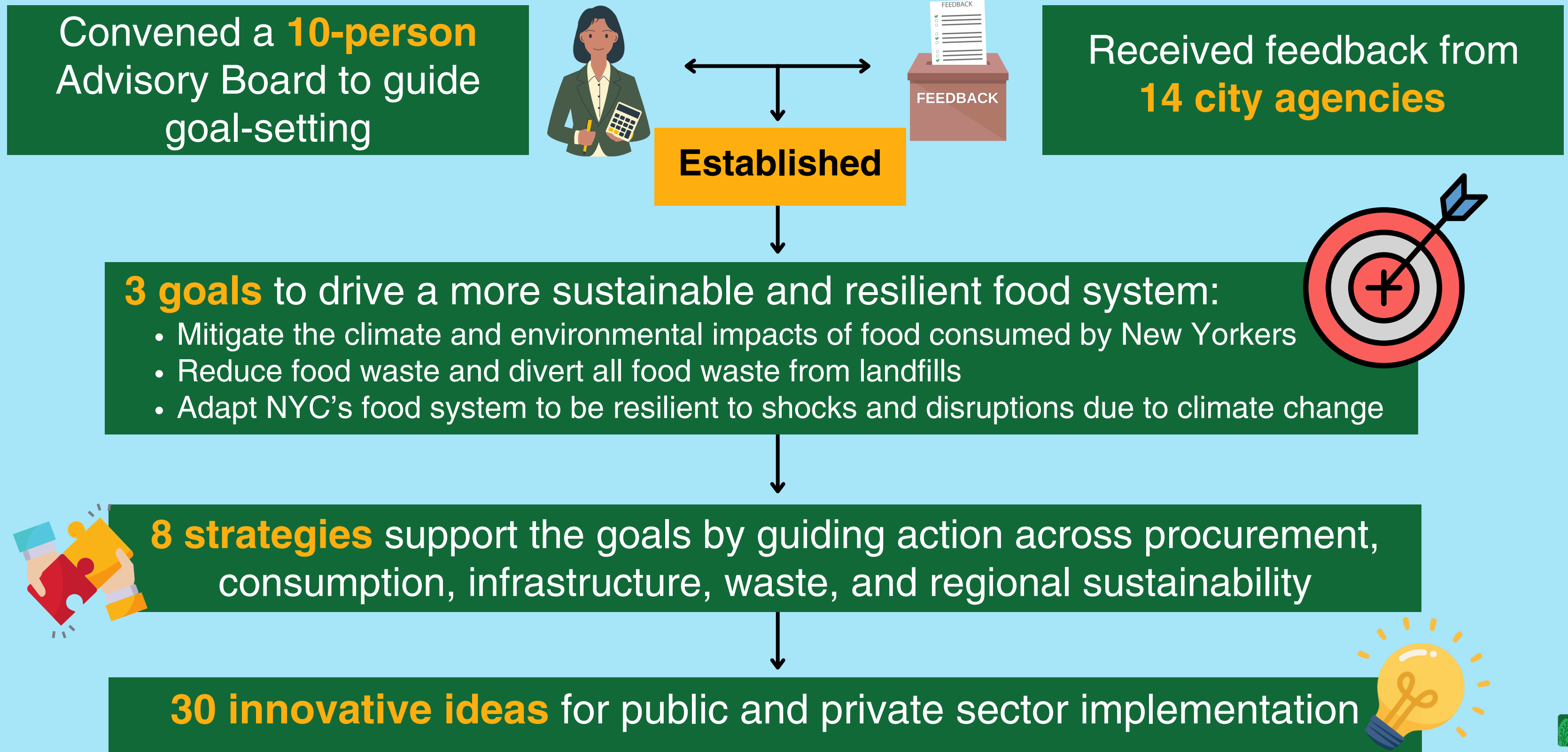

Results



- Over 90,000 tons of organic material was diverted from landfills in FY25
- 20 Commercial Waste Zones are planned for implementation, with 2 zones in the Bronx and 1 zone in Queens launched in 2025
- In October 2025, DSNY released a draft of its first Solid Waste Management Plan in two decades
