As executive director of the NYC Mayor's Office of Food Policy, where we provide guidance, oversight and advisement to advance food policy for the City of New York, I was very excited to learn about your initiative to fund Centers of Excellence in Alternative Proteins, and the fact that a team from Cornell University is working towards establishing such a center. This would be an incredible opportunity not only for Cornell and the State of New York but also for the entire country. I believe that the movement towards identifying and helping advance consumer access and adoption of new sources of sustainable food is crucial for the US and the entire planet because this will help us all alleviate some of the pressure on the planetary resources and climate.

I cannot think of a better partner for such a Center than Cornell University. Their researchers have the technical expertise in conducting groundbreaking, impactful work, and the unique ability to convert their work into applications and fuel workforce development.
