


Frequently Asked Questions

Why is HPD promoting community solar?

To help residents -- especially those who pay for electric heating -- lower their electricity costs, increase access to renewable energy, and be environmentally friendly.

How does community solar save me money?

Each month the community solar project generates electricity that is converted into a monetary credit. A portion of that credit is directly applied to your Con Edison bill, lowering your bill to save you money.



How many bills will I receive?

You will only receive one bill, your Con Edison bill. The community solar credit will show up there as an adjustment.

What happens if I move?

If you move within the Con Edison territory (NYC and Westchester County), you can still be enrolled in the community solar project you signed up for. Unfortunately, if you move outside of the Con Edison territory, you will no longer be subscribed to the project.

What if I want to cancel?

You can cancel at any time and there are no cancellation fees. Usually, you just need to give 30 days' notice.

What else should I know before I sign up?

To enroll in a community solar project, you will need to share a copy of your Con Edison bill and sign a contract with a vetted community solar developer to complete your enrollment. It's a quick process and the Solar One team can answer any other questions you have.

What's the difference between community solar and Energy Supply Companies (ESCOs)?

Community solar is not an ESCO. Community solar enables individual households to share one large, offsite, local solar energy system and reduce their entire electric Con Edison bill through guaranteed solar credits. ESCOs, on the other hand, charge a variable rate of electricity through renewable energy projects that are typically located outside of NYC and don't guarantee money savings.
