

Descendant Community Research Update

Overview

- Historical Perspectives, Inc. (HPI) has been supporting the ongoing archaeological and descendant community research for this stage of the project since December 2020.
- Their research has focused on answering the following questions:
 - What was the history of the Flatbush African Burial Ground, where exactly was it located, and what dates was it in use by the local community?
 - Who were the people buried in the Flatbush African Burial Ground and can they be identified in historical records or by family members?
 - Who are the descendants of the people buried in the Flatbush African Burial Ground and how can they be identified and contacted? Which populations constitute the Descendant Community in Flatbush?
 - Based on the results of the current work, what are the avenues for future research and outreach?
- HPI presented their research at Task Force Meetings 1 and 2, and the first Community Workshop.
 The City team hosted site history breakout rooms at Community Workshops 2 and 3.



Descendant Community Research Update

Status Update

- HPI has not uncovered new information about the Flatbush African Burial Ground since the last Task Force meeting.
 - Two definitive names have been found to date of people who were buried at the Flatbush
 African Burial Ground: Phyllis Jacobs and Eve.
 - Lineal descendants of these women or others buried at the Flatbush African Burial Ground have not been identified. There is a public notice on Ancestry.com that will remain active in order to help identify lineal descendants in the future.
 - This phase of Historical Perspectives' research is wrapping up in the coming weeks with the release of their research report.

Descendant Community Research Update

Research Report

- HPI's research report will include detailed information about their research questions, methodology, research results, and conclusions and recommendations.
 - It also will include appendixes that are even more in-depth, including resources reviewed and consulted, maps and figures, and records.
- The report will be made public on LPC's website and fabgtaskforce.nyc in the coming weeks (August). The Task Force will be notified when it is available.
 - The report will recommend that research continue about the Flatbush African Burial Ground and the people buried there.
- The archaeological research into the Flatbush African Burial Ground is ongoing and evolving, and primary and secondary source documents may become accessible over time.


Guidelines for Productive Conversation




The Role of the Task Force

Engagement


- Introduce and amplify additional community voices that can inform project

Public engagement

- Support discussions around new opportunities for community input as they arise (e.g workforce development, design charettes, etc.)

The Role of the Descendant Community

Research efforts have yet to identify the lineal descendants of those buried at the Flatbush African Burial Ground.

The FABGRR Task Force, as a group, are currently representing the Descendant Community; However, should additional descendants be identified in the future (either through research or self-identification), they too should be consulted on any actions that may impact the burial ground.

WHAT IS THE DESCENDANT COMMUNITY?

The Descendant Community may comprise of lineal descendants of those people buried at the burial ground and may also include people who self-identify as descendants, such as people whose ancestors were part of the African diaspora.



The Role of the Descendant Community

Looking forward to the next phase of this project (and beyond), the Descendant Community have a <u>shared leadership</u> role with the City and Developer for the following aspects of the project:

- Supporting ongoing historical research
- Establishing a preferred course of action for the respectful treatment,
 examination and reburial of human remains if found
- Establishing goals for the future memorialization
- Supporting the design, location and implementation of the memorial

The Role of the Descendant Community

The FABGRR Task Force, as a group, are currently representing the "Descendant Community"

 Moving forward should this still be the role of the Task Force? Looking forward to the next phase of this project (and beyond), the Descendant Community will have a shared leadership role with the City and Developer for the following aspects of the project:

- Supporting ongoing historical research
- Establishing a preferred course of action for the respectful treatment, examination and reburial of human remains if found
- Establishing goals for the future memorialization
- Supporting the design, location and implementation of the memorial
