Undergraduate Certificate in Correctional Leadership

The *Undergraduate Certificate in Correctional Leadership* is a 2-year, 4 semester, 12-credit program tailored for outstanding Correction Officers seeking to advance their leadership skills. Through coursework, workshops, and cohort-based projects, the program develops leadership, ethical decision-making, and conflict resolution skills to meet the complex challenges of corrections work.

By selecting some of the best uniformed officers in the Department and providing them with leadership development opportunities, the NYC Department of Correction seeks to create a cadre of skilled officers to assist with change efforts within the Agency.

Qualifications

Applicants to *the Undergraduate Certificate in Correctional Leadership* program should be Correction Officers that have completed their probationary period and are in good standing with the Department with a clean disciplinary record.

Curriculum

The curriculum will be taught over four semesters (15 weeks per semester) and will consist of the following four undergraduate level courses (12 credits):

XXX 277: Humanities in Action

Focuses on the connections between justice issues and the humanities, providing students with professional frameworks to address real-world challenges. Participants collaborate with faculty to explore and apply scholarly frameworks for trends and issues in corrections and create educational portfolios to showcase their skills and experiences (Optional Prior Learning Assessment).

CSL 220: Leadership Skills

Covers effective leadership techniques, including conflict resolution, meeting facilitation, and addressing racial, ethnic, and gender dynamics in leadership roles. Students develop interpersonal skills through experiential learning activities and video-based self-assessments.

SOC 206: The Sociology of Conflict and Dispute Resolution

Examines the causes of disputes and explores peaceful resolution methods such as mediation and arbitration, with a focus on corrections settings.

PAD 318: Decisions in Crises

Uses case studies to explore decision-making in crises, emphasizing ethical considerations and the role of strategic leadership in addressing complex challenges.
