He stayed until 1974, then returned part-time as a \$100-a-day consultant. Amusingly, he told *The Times* that skyrocketing lawsuits represented the biggest change he'd seen, with 16,000 new yearly filings. "There are so many lawyers these days," he noted, amusingly and presciently. When his son retired to Queens in 1983, so did Marty, as he couldn't get to work anymore. He passed shortly thereafter.
