DEED ESTABLISHES DEVELOPMENT TO FUND PUBLIC ACCESS



2.6. Application of Income. (a) From and after the date hereof and during the thirty (30) year period commencing on the Master Plan Effective Date, all income derived from the operation and use of the Island Property or any part thereof or any improvements thereon, including net sale proceeds (including from sale of development rights), net insurance proceeds, net loan proceeds, user fees, lease rents, contractual payments, license, concession fees and royalties, but excluding charitable donations and gifts, (collectively "Governors Island Income") by GIPEC or its successors and assigns or the Island Property Owner, the Governors Island Operator, shall be applied solely and exclusively to pay for all costs and expenses incurred by GIPEC or its successors and assigns in connection with its operation, maintenance, remediation, development and improvement of Governors Island or on behalf of the operations of any entity for any of its Public Benefit Uses, Additional Public Benefit Uses, Additional Permitted Uses, if any, of Governors Island.

- (b) Additional Permitted Uses: From and after the date hereof and for a period of thirty (30) years from the Master Plan Effective Date (the "Additional Permitted Uses Restriction Term"), permitted uses on the Island Property shall include any combination of the following uses set forth in this subparagraph 2.3(b) that shall be compatible with the historic and civic character of Governors Island (collectively, the "Additional Permitted Uses").
 - Entertainment facilities;
 - (ii) Housing for caretakers or managers of Governors Island and police and fire personnel and facilities thereat;
 - (iii) Short-term or extended-stay accommodations;
 - (iv) Cultural and arts facilities;
 - (v) Hospitality uses, including hotels and conference/banquet facilities;
 - (vi) Commercial office space;
 - (vii) Retail, service and dining facilities;
 - (viii) Public works;
 - (ix) Health facilities; and
 - (x) Other public, commercial and mixed-use purposes.

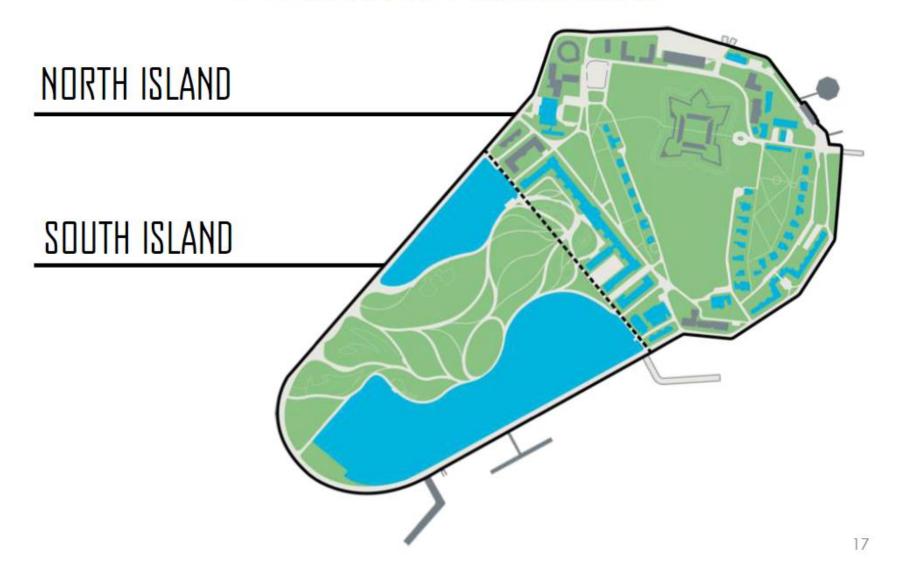

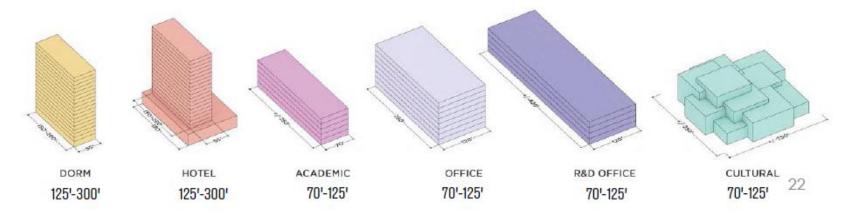
WHY IS A SOUTH ISLAND REZONING NEEDED?

The Trust is proposing a rezoning to allow for uses that will complement the Island's existing character and that are allowed within our deed



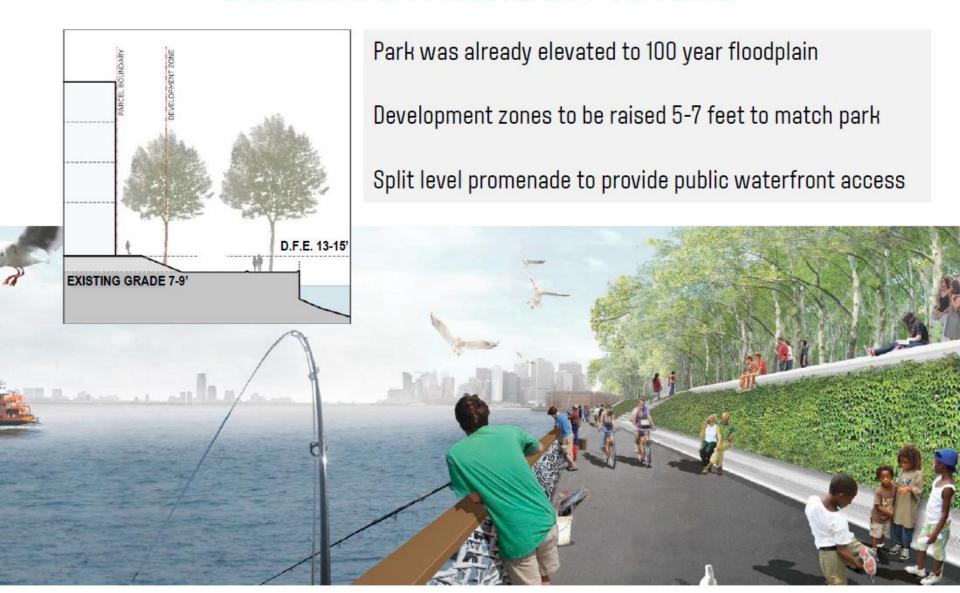

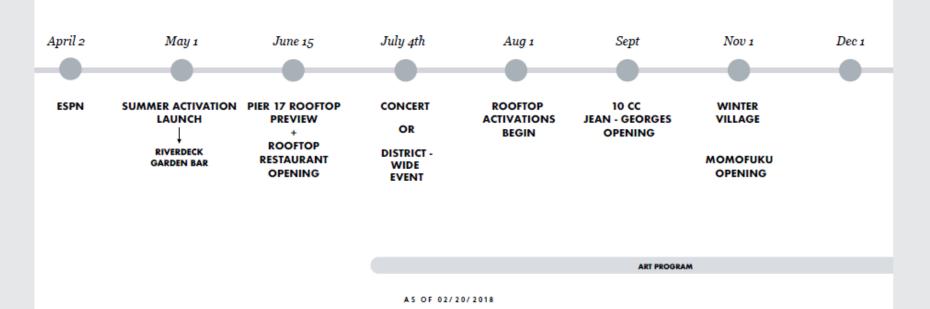

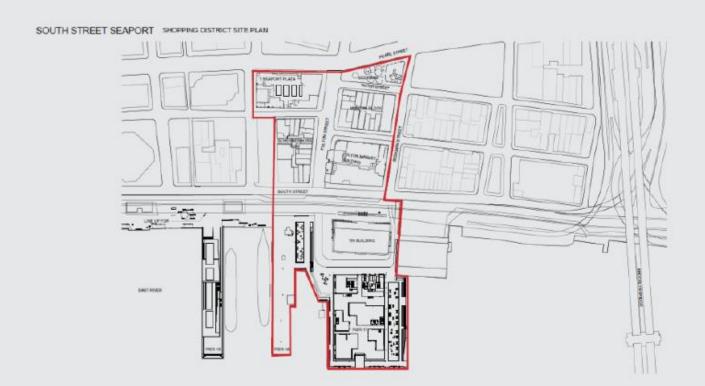


ROOFTOP EVENTS - GENERAL

- Live events will usually begin between 7:00 pm & 7:30 pm
- Doors will open approximately 90 minutes prior, between 5:30 pm & 6:00 pm
- Early-arriving guests will be queued on Pier 17's North deck
- Guests will enter the Pier 17 building from the north, where they will undergo security screening and ticket scanning before proceeding to the rooftop. Other visitors to Pier 17, will use the main entrance on the south side of the building
- Live concerts will end by 10:00 pm as required in NYC (Unless special holidays or events in which case city approval will be obtained)

SEAPORT REAL-TIME SOUND LEVEL MONITORING

SIA has provided real-time sound level monitoring for numerous festivals and performance venues around the country with great success.

- 1. HHC to enforce allowable levels for concerts based on minimizing levels transmitted to surrounding community
- 2. Real time monitoring stations using advanced Sound Pressure Level Meters to constantly regulate sound system volume. These stations will be at the rooftop and various community locations
- Continue to refine digital steering configurations that further attenuate sound outside audience area
- 4. SIA will have a staff member at concerts who can adjust the system directivity further attenuating levels

SEAPORT DISTRICT COMMUNITY NOTIFICATION GUIDELINES

The Howard Hughes Corporation's commitment to addressing neighborhood concerns is paramount. We have internal processes in place to provide the neighborhood and all relevant community leaders with advance notification of significant events

Four weeks prior to an outdoor event such as a concert, a festival or other form of public entertainment, a member of the HHC team will send an email notification with details of the event to the Community Board leadership. HHC will send another follow-up email to the Community Board leadership 48 hours prior to the event, emailing additional distribution groups as directed

If such music events are scheduled inside the four week advance notification window, a member of the HHC team will notify the Community Board with details of the event

A calendar of all upcoming events will be located online at seaportdistrict.nyc

HHC has strict procedures to evaluate all events for their impact on the community, particularly with regard to sound and traffic flow

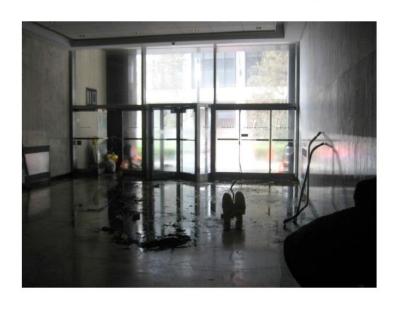

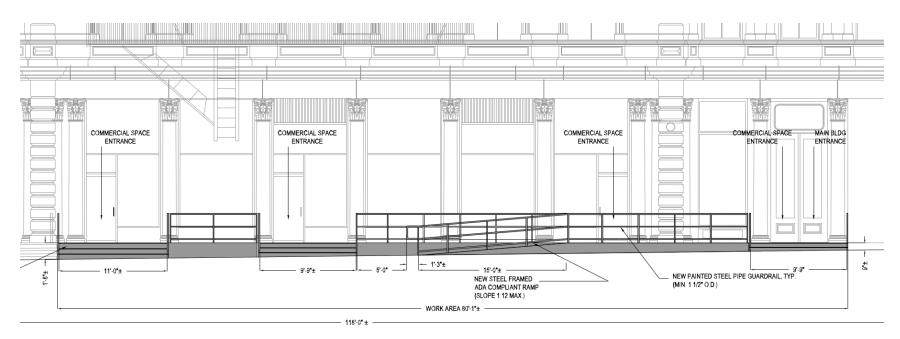
