








PARKING UNDER THE FDR DRIVE PECK SLIP & SOUTH STREET











1ST PRECINCT - NEW SECTORS



Neighborhood Coordination Officers (NCO's)

- Each sector has two designated NCO's
- NCO's are charged with meeting residents, building managers, area workers & business owners
- Work to become familiar with faces and problems in their sector
- Address sector problems by informing their superiors and coordinating NYPD resources to address those problems; including officers assigned to that sector 24 hrs/day, 7 days/week
- Work with the special units that address reported crimes.
- NCO's do NOT replace calling 911










GHG IMPACT OF 2020 CLIMATE ACTIONS
