



Application to Enter the NYS Brownfield Cleanup Program Accepted

A Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP) application for the 250 Water Street site was submitted to the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) by 250 Seaport District, LLC on November 15, 2018. The application was deemed complete on December 21, 2018 and it was then noticed for a 30-day public comment period.

The public comment period for the application by the 250 Seaport District, LLC began on January 2, 2019 and concluded on March 6, 2019 after one 30-day extension. The NYSDEC received over 250 emails and letters from parents of children (and some children) attending either the adjacent Peck Slip public elementary school or the private Blue School, residents in the immediate neighborhood, local organizations, school officials, real-estate firms and elected officials commenting on the BCP application and asking questions about the proposed project.

After careful consideration of all comments received, a responsiveness summary to those comments has been prepared by the NYSDEC in consultation with the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH).



For the following location:

Vestry Street between Hudson Street and Varick Street

The work hours will be:

- 7 am 6 pm Monday through Friday
- 9 am 6 pm Saturdays
- 10 am 6 pm Sundays
- Temporary Parking Restrictions will take place.
- Temporary Road Closure may occur.
- Coordination with the FDNY, NYPD, DSNY and Port Authority NY/NJ will be done at all times.

Community Impacts

- Pedestrian access will be maintained at all times.
- The Resident Engineer (R.E.) will monitor operations and work within DEP Noise Code regulations.
- Temporary street closures and/or limited access may be necessary while work is conducted (Coordination will be arranged on a case by case basis).
- · Parking will be temporarily restricted during construction. Advanced notification will be provided.
- Coordination and collection of garbage and other discarded items, may be necessary (Coordination will be arranged on a case by case basis).
- Flag persons/Traffic Enforcement Agents will be assigned for traffic control.

Community Impacts Continued:

Water Service Interruptions:

There is planned DEP work as part of this project.

• DEP work will consists of the removal and installation of Fire Hydrants. The community will be notified in advance of water service interruptions (72-Hour notice, followed by a 24-Hour confirmation/cancellation notice)

Parking Restrictions:



Noise, Air & Water Pollution

Noise Pollution

Decibels of Common Sounds

- Normal Conversation/Laughter 50 – 65 dB
- Midtown Manhattan
 Traffic Noise
 70 85 dB
- Jackhammer/Power Saw
 110 dB

Chronic Noise Exposure Causes:

- Stress
- Anxiety
- Depression
- High Blood Pressure
- Heart Disease

Loud Speakers

Announcements heard when boat ≤ 300 feet from dock and went on for 5 minutes at 75-80 dB inside apartment with windows closed. Drowns out television in same room.

- Idling of 4 NY Waterway
 Ferries identified as causing vibrations in some apartments. Creates noise similar to having a disco above apartment.
- Many ferries noisy but no vibrations indoors.
- Gunning of engines increases idling noise

Engine Noise



Air & Water Pollution

- Engine exhaust, especially particulate matter is a known to contribute to respiratory problems (e.g., asthma), cardiovascular disease, eye irritation, etc.
- Parks and playgrounds for jogging, picnicking, reading, sports, etc. are next to dock where air pollution is worst.
- There is a dense concentration of residences & businesses near the dock
- Exhaust released into the Hudson River harms local marine life
- BPC residents responsible to fund resiliency projects to protect the area around the dock due to effects of global warming caused by this type of carbon emissions.

Request that NYNJPA:

- Lessen the decibel level of on-board speakers including but not limited to announcements and music so they cannot be heard beyond the ferry dock
- Obtain waiver/ exemption from Coast Guard regarding ferry horn usage (similar to Pier 11)
- Develop a an online portal for Pier/boat complaints (as exists with airports)
- Limit engine idling noise by eliminating the noisier boats as previously agreed by NY Waterways
- Reassign boat captains that repeatedly gun engines at the BPC dock to other routes
- In conjunction with BPCA, hire an outside vendor to monitor and report on air & water emissions (especially particulate matter) for all vessels that use the dock
- In consideration of the Port Authority roadmap for continuing emissions reductions, and achieving the interim target of reducing its emissions 35% by 2025, require all ferry vendors and boats using the Port Authority Piers to have emissions comparable to electric ferries within five years.
