


EDCs Pier 6 Heliport RFP Announcement










Identified Initial Concept Area - From New GIF Terminal to Old Slip

 - Ensuring we comply with local regulatory requirements for stormwater runoff on the shoreline extension
 - Opportunities to capture, store, and reuse stormwater on-site
 - Potential to capture additional water from the FDR drive
 - Flexibility of practices across the site
- · Design considerations exploring:
 - Conflicts with existing sewer outfalls
 - Compatibility and connectivity with other drainage improvements, including sewer upgrades and the pump station
 - Future sea level rise impacts







Why Parallel Conveyance?

- Parallel conveyance (PC) is a stormwater management strategy that involves creating parallel pathways for stormwater to flow, reducing the risk of flooding.
- It aims to distribute and manage the flow of stormwater by providing alternative pathways, minimizing the risk of overloading a single drainage route during heavy rainfall events.
- PC enhances the resilience of a neighborhood to extreme weather events, as it provides a more robust sewer system capable of handing varying runoff volumes and intensities



Seaport Coastal Resiliency? (SPCR)

Creating a more resilient Seaport by addressing sea level rise, drainage risks, and improved waterfront access


- To address climate risks in this area, this project proposes raising the shoreline 3-5 feet in the area from the Brooklyn Bridge to Imagination Playground
- As part of the federal grant application process, early project scoping also includes potential esplanade improvements, ecological enhancements, and green infrastructure to address stormwater management
- The design will be determined once we move further along into the design process and have a Design Consultant onboard

Engagement & Next Steps:

- BRIC Award Formally Received from FEMA Review Process In Progress
- Design Team procurement of design team to be completed by Early 2024
- When design work begins, project team to regularly coordinate with and seek input from the CB and continue to share updates via quarterly LMCR briefings

New NYC Ferry Contract with Hornblower Group

What is NYC Ferry

NYC Ferry is a publicly-funded, privately-operated transit system that provides daily, year-round service at 25 landings along 6 routes. It is comprised of a 38-vessel fleet of purpose-built vessels that are stored at homeports (warehouse and maintenance facilities) in the Brooklyn Navy Yard and soon Atlantic Basin, Red Hook as well. The operation includes approximately 450 crew, employed by the Operator and overseen by 15 direct staff employed by NYCEDC. Aside from COVID impacts, NYC Ferry was steadily growing since its launch and has served over 30M riders since its launch.









NYC Ferry Forward

A Plan for a More Equitable, Accessible, and Financially Sustainable System

- At the direction of Mayor Adams, NYCEDC developed a comprehensive strategy to improve NYC Ferry:
 - Improve equity and access to the ferry
 - Enhance the system's financial sustainability & reduce public subsidy
 - Create new revenue streams
 - Release new RFP for ferry operations





Ferry Forward Success to Date

Farebox Revenue Up 45%

 Due to the fare changes and strong ridership, farebox revenue is up by more than \$6M, helping offset costs

Discount Program Growing

 We have successfully processed over 11,000 discount program applications so far and launched a pilot offering half-priced tickets to Harbor School students

Rockaway Reserve and Rocket

 As we continue to innovate, we have new ways to serve riders and generate more revenue. This summer Rockaway Reserve and Rocket together generated 20x more net revenue than last summer's special Rockaway service

Increased Transparency

 New Yorkers have access to NYC Ferry ridership details, financial and subsidy information, and ferry ridership demographic data





RFP Goals

- Ensure a safe, reliable, and accessible transportation system
- Reduce net costs to the City through greater control on operational expenses and ownership of farebox revenues and sponsorship
- Improve the rider experience with better real-time information, ticketing improvements, and outreach for discount programs
- Promote M/WBE and support a maritime career pipeline




