

IFPM Goals

- Established: 2016
- Goal: Reduce low-level, high recurrence coastal flood risks while NYC continues to advance longer-term coastal protection needs
- Focus: Protecting critical facilities and low-lying neighborhoods
- IFPM does not:
 - Mitigate against rainfall flooding
 - Protect for severe events like Sandy
 - Fully eliminate flood risks
 - Activate for extratropical storms due to limitations in forecasting timelines and confidence

IFPM is not a life safety program.

It is intended for infrastructure protection so residents can get back to their homes faster. Residents must follow all evacuation orders issued by NYC.

IFPM Measures

- IFPM measures provide up to <u>4 feet</u> of protection above ground elevation.
- ☐ Pre-Deployed & Just-in-Time (JIT)
 - Pre-deployed measures are installed where there is no impact to traffic or daily operations/use of a site.
 - Just-in-Time measures are installed in the 72-12 hours before expected onset of tropical storm force winds.
 - Wherever possible, IFPM "pre-deploys" measures to minimize pre-storm deployment activity and timeline.







Program Sites

- Between 2016 and today, IFPM has provided flood risk reduction to 57 sites:
 - 32 DEP-managed pump stations
 - 21 critical facilities (wastewater treatment, hospitals, sanitation, roadwork, fire, police)
 - 4 neighborhood sites protecting 4,258 residential units
 - ☐ 5 facility sites have achieved permanent mitigation and have graduated from IFPM. 1 additional site will graduate from IFPM by the end of 2024
 - 3 Neighborhood sites are expected to complete permanent mitigation between 2026 and 2028







IFPM Activation Timeline










National Hurricane Center Seasonal Outlook

Introducing Envision

Envision is a blueprint for fundamental change in infrastructure development.

- Enables a thorough examination of the sustainability and resiliency of infrastructure projects
- Provides practical guidance on how to improve project performance
- Drives better project management



Envision

- Sets the standard for what constitutes sustainable infrastructure
- Incentivizes higher performance goals beyond minimum requirements (required codes)
- Gives recognition to projects that make significant contributions to sustainability
- Provides a common language for collaboration and clear communication both internally and externally



LMCR - Battery

Quality of Life – Battery Project exceeded the Envision requirements

Minimized construction impacts – utilize barges to transport materials. Significantly reducing the number of trips needed to transport materials in the dense urban area.

Reduces the total transportation emissions, reduces the impact the construction activity has on local air quality and noise impacts associated with standard trucking





LMCR - Battery

Resource Allocation - Innovation points received

An innovative foamed glass aggregate material reduced transportation impacts, diverts materials from landfills and provided significant reductions in embodied carbon.



The famous Italian artist Jago arrived in New York City in 2018. During his first days in the city, his attention was drawn to the conspicuous presence of homeless people sleeping on the streets. After a few months, however, he realized that he had become numb to their presence, passing by them without noticing them anymore. This realization affected him deeply, making him reflect on the fact that each homeless person had been a child, with a mother and a starting point in life.

Before his return to Italy, Jago began working on a work with strong symbolic value: a large marble sculpture depicting a cowering fetus. His intent was to place this baby sculpture on the ground, evoking our purity and fragility. The work "Look Down" is a poignant reminder to "look down," to reflect on the problems of poverty and discrimination through a new point of view.

After several exhibitions in Italy and the Arab Emirates, Jago is now ready to close the circle and plans to bring the sculpture back to New York, where it was ideally born. The hope is to place it in a place that represents equality and acceptance for all. In this way, Jago hopes to provoke thought and discussion, encouraging people to confront to really address the problems of poverty and discrimination that persist in our society.
