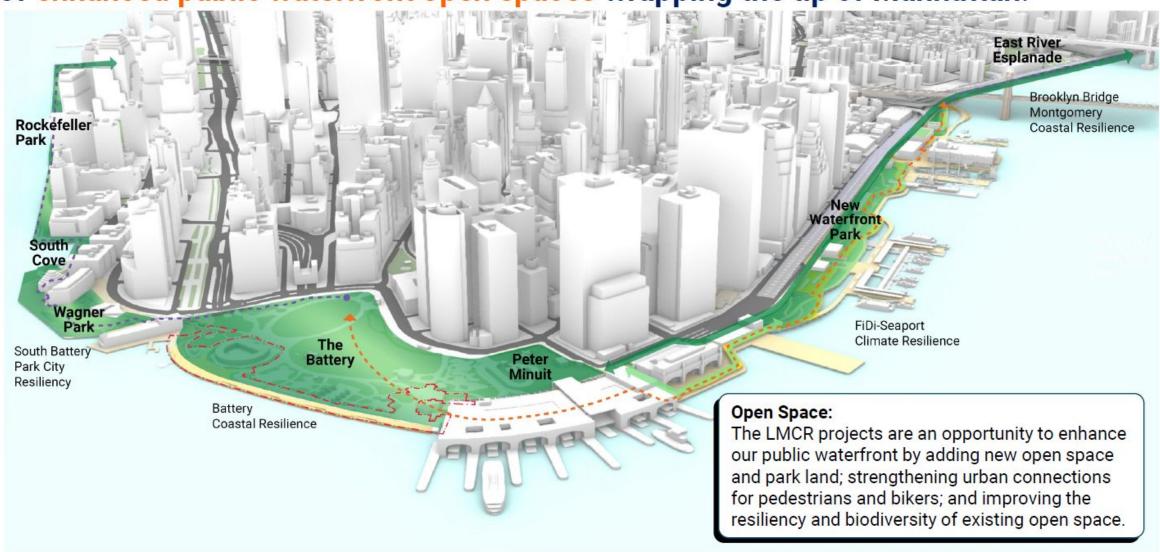
To protect Lower Manhattan, we must create a closed and connected flood protection system. Our flood protection alignment must tie in to high ground at either end of the project.





Without Lower Manhattan Coastal Resiliency (LMCR) projects, the neighborhood faces serious flooding during severe storm events, exacerbated by future sea level rise. Closed and connected LMCR projects protect from storm surge flooding and sea level rise. The FiDi-Seaport project will protect through 2100.

The goal is to integrate a closed flood protection system into a connected sequence of enhanced public waterfront open spaces wrapping the tip of Manhattan.



The tabling events in The Battery included three public sessions within the park in order to reach a broader public audience.



What were the goals of tabling?

- Increase awareness of overall FiDi-Seaport Climate Resilience project with the general public.
- Increase awareness of how three Lower Manhattan Coastal Resiliency projects come together around the Battery.
- Gather input from a broader public audience on what features and uses are most important in the battery today
- Invite the general public to participate in upcoming workshops and outreach events.

When and where did it take place?

The tabling series took place on the afternoon of May 14, the morning of May 28, and the afternoon-evening of May 30, 2025, at The Battery. The tabling station was set up near the Carousel and Playscape.

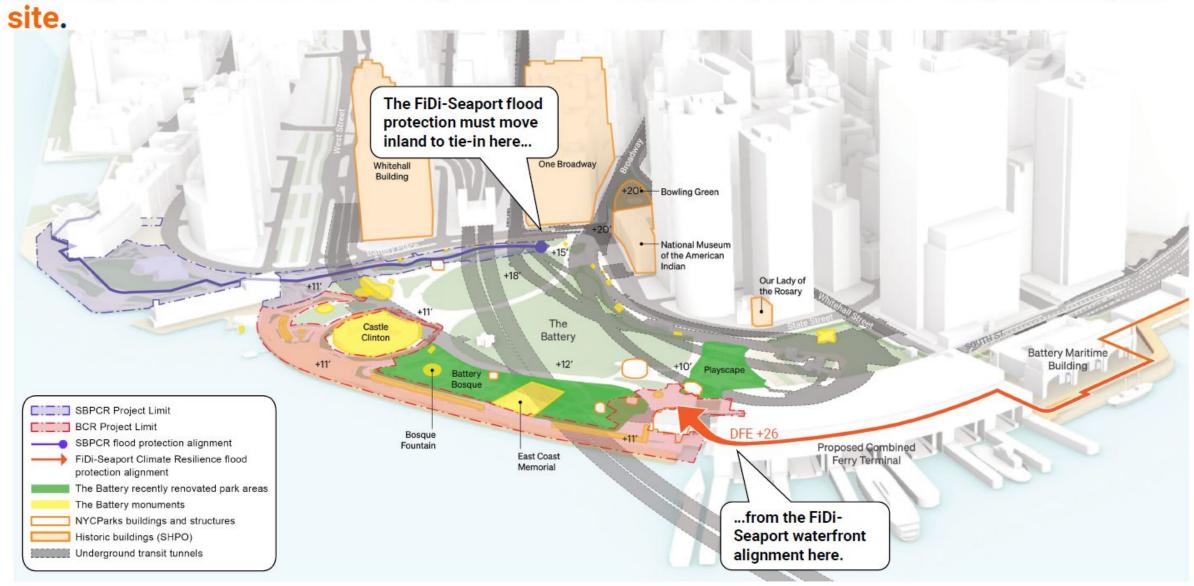

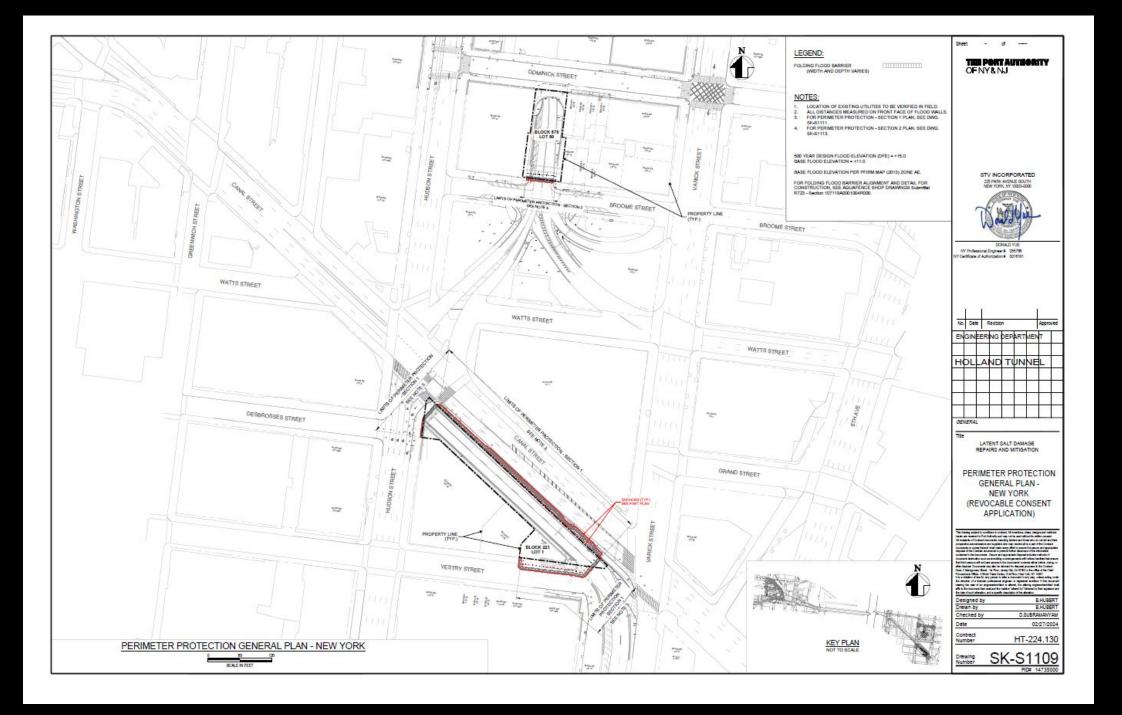

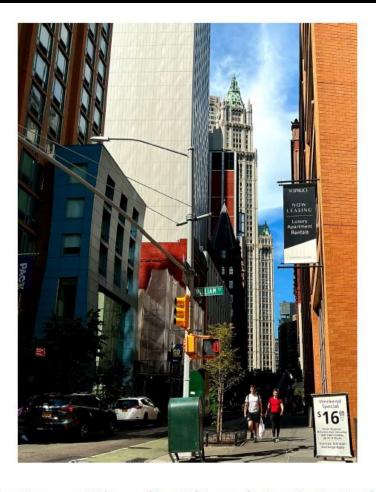

Comments on the 8 proposed towers in Community Board 1

ALL LOCATIONS WERE OPPOSED BY CB1 AT THE SEPTEMBER 2024 FULL BAORD MEETING

8 Spruce Street



Location of proposed 8 Spruce Street 5G tower site from the East looking West on 09-24-24.

PRESERVATION NOTE: The proposed tower at the 8 Spruce Street location will block primary views of The Woolworth Building's (233 Broadway) primary façade from the base to the top of the tower. The Woolworth Building (06101.001790) is an individual US National Historic Landmark and listed on the National Register of Historic Places located less than 1,000 feet from the proposed 5G tower site.

The proposed 5G tower will obstruct views of City Hall Park (06101.000408) from the East by blocking all trees on the southern part of the property.



Location of proposed 8 Spruce Street 5G tower site from the east looking west on 09-24-24.

PRESERVATION NOTE: The proposed 5G tower will obstruct views of the Fulton Nassau Historic District (05NR05456) by impeding views of the corners of 3-9 Beekman Street (Temple Court) & 145 Nassau Street (Potter Building). Both buildings are highly contributing buildings to the US National Historic District. The Fulton Nassau Historic District is less than 300 feet away from the proposed 5G tower site.



Simulation of the proposed 8 Spruce Street 5G tower from the east looking west.

110 William Street



Location of proposed 110 William Street 5G tower site from the south looking north on 09-24-24.

PRESERVATION NOTE: The proposed 5G tower will block long views of 44 Centre Street which is the Thurgood Marshall United States Courthouse, a US National Historic Landmark (06101.003318). By covering views of the building's tower and pyramidal roof, the proposed 5G tower would diminish the importance of this landmark building within Lower Manhattan's skyline when viewed along this historic corridor from the Wall Street Historic District.



Location of proposed 110 William Street 5G tower site from the northeast looking southwest on 09-24-24.

PRESERVATION NOTE: The proposed tower will block close views of 35 Liberty Street which is the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, a US National Historic Landmark (06101.000034). By covering views of the entire east façade of the property, the building's fortress like presence is diminished because one can no longer view the building as an uninterrupted street wall along the entire block surrounded by William, Liberty, and Nassau streets & Maiden Lane.

Location of proposed 110 William Street 5G tower site from the north looking south on 09-24-24.

PRESERVATION NOTE: The proposed tower will obstruct the view corridor of the Wall Street Historic District (06NR05647) by impeding views of highly contributing buildings such as 28 Liberty Street aka Chase Manhattan Bank Tower (06101.008578), 44 Wall Street (06101.013332) & 52 William Street (06101.015874) – all highly contributing buildings in the US National Historic District lying within the Wall Street Historic District's boundary less than 300 feet away from the proposed 5G tower site.

88 Pine Street

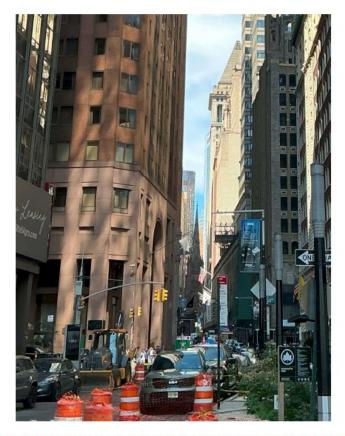


Location of proposed 88 Pine Street 5G tower site from the south looking north on 09-24-24.

PRESERVATION NOTE: The proposed tower will block immediate views of the South Street Seaport Historic District (90NR00884). The South Street Seaport Historic District contains highly contributing buildings that will be blocked by the proposed 5G tower including 161 Front Street (06101.021156) and 201-202 Front Street (Bogardus Building) and 181-195 Front Street (06101.003311). The proposed 5G tower site will also prohibit pedestrian understanding of the historic slip-like open space on John Street between Front and South streets – The southern boundary of the district that still evokes feelings of ship slips from the 18th and 19th centuries with its wide street and 75 foot street walls all-around.



Simulation of proposed 88 Pine Street tower site from the south looking north.

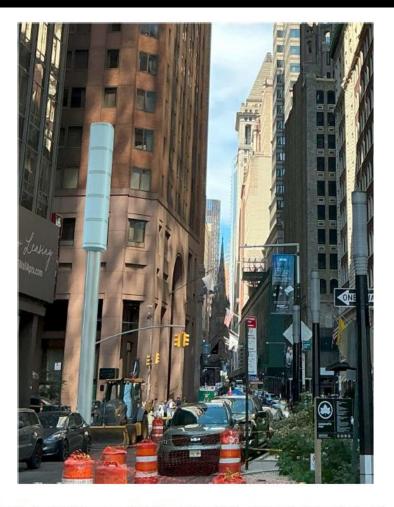


Location of proposed 95 Wall Street 5G tower site from the east looking west on 09-24-24.

PRESERVATION NOTE: The proposed tower will compete with the street level views of the historic corridor to and of the historical landmark Trinity Church. The design of the church spire was intended to be visible miles away from the east, so it is especially disruptive to propose a contemporary 5G tower that will compete with the immediate views of the church's spire or tower from the east. Trinity Church is a US National Historic Landmark (06101.001779).

Located no more than 50 feet away from the eastern and northern boundaries of the Wall Street Historic District (06NR05647), the proposed tower will obstruct the view corridor of the historic district along the Wall Street spine and impede multiple vantage points of highly contributing buildings in the historic district, such as 80 Wall Street (06101.015872), 82 Wall Street (06101.015873), 67 Wall Street (06101.008588), 72 Wall Street (06101.015871), 55 Wall Street (06101.000012), 48 Wall Street (06101.008192).

95 Wall Street



Simulation of proposed 95 Wall Street 5G tower site from the east looking west.



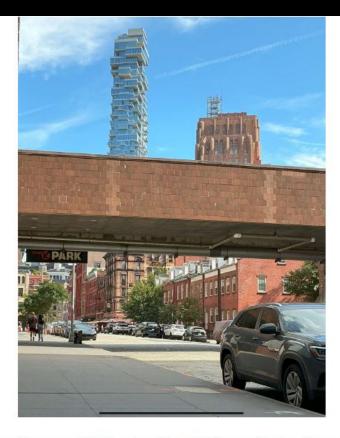
Location of proposed 75 South Street 5G tower site taken from the west looking east on 09-24-24.

PRESERVATION NOTE: The proposed 5G tower will compete with the street level views of the most historically contributing area and objects of the South Street Seaport Historic District (90NR00884). The tower's location is inappropriate due to its proximity to the historic district's southern and eastern boundaries – being sited less than 50 feet away from the district boundary. The proposed location will block views of the historic ship masts above the FDR drive and the piers underneath and beyond to the East River.

75 South Street



Simulation of proposed 75 South Street 5G tower. Photo taken of the proposed tower site from the west looking east.



Location of proposed 66 Harrison Street 5G tower site from the west looking east on 09-24-24.

PRESERVATION NOTE: The proposed 5G tower at the 66 Harrison Street location will block views of the NYC landmark and US National Historic landmark eligible building – The Western Union Building.

The proposed 5G tower at the 66 Harrison Street location will impede views of the Tribeca Historic District's western boundary and corridor into the district from the west of the proposed site looking east.

The proposed 5G tower at the 66 Harrison Street location will disrupt views from the west cobblestone streets leading into the historic district in the background and interrupt the continuity of the highly contributing five pitched roof row houses on the south side of Harrison Street.

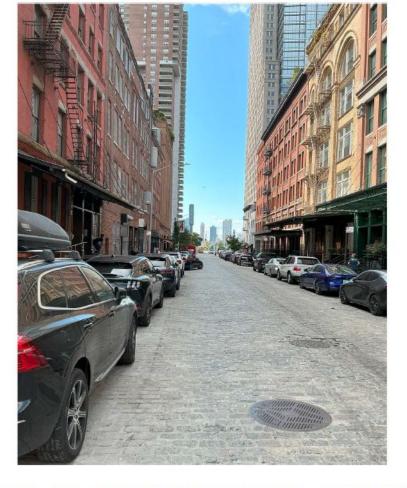

PRESERVATION NOTE: The proposed 5G tower at the 100 N. Moore location will impede views of the scenic Hudson River waterfront from the east looking west.

The proposed 5g tower at this location will block views of the Tribeca Historic District's western boundary and corridor into the district from the west of the proposed site looking east.

The proposed 5G tower at the 100 N. Moore location will disrupt views from the east on the historic district's cobblestone streets of the west facing view corridor by interrupting the 75-foot-tall street walls lining both sides of the cobblestone streets and blue stone sidewalks and curbs.

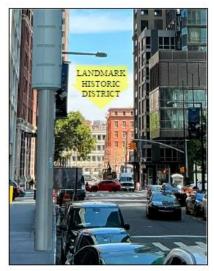

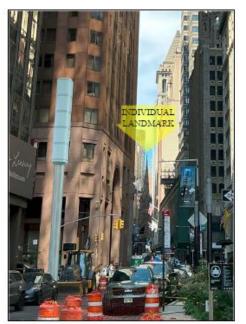

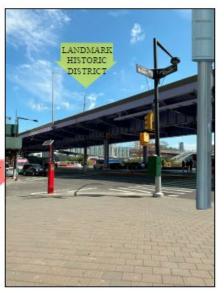


PROPOSED VIEW WEST WITH LANDMARK TRINITY CHURCH AND THE SCENIC STREET STREETSCAPE



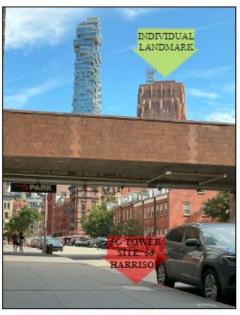


75 SOUTH STREET LOOKING NORTHEAST TOWARDS THE PROPOSED TOWER SITE ON SEPTEMBER 21, 2024

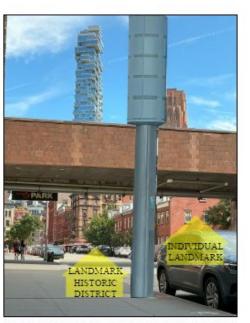

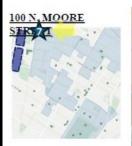


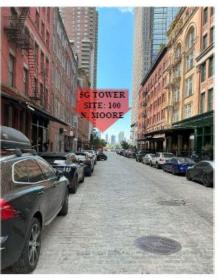


66 HARRISON STREET LOOKING SOUTHEAST TOWARDS PROPOSED TOWER ON SEPTEMBER 21, 2024

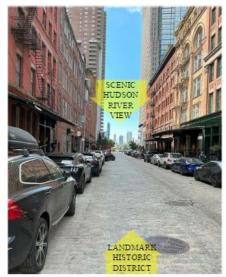

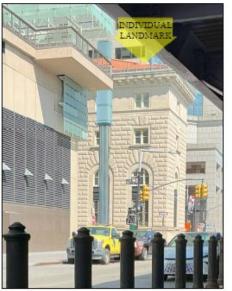

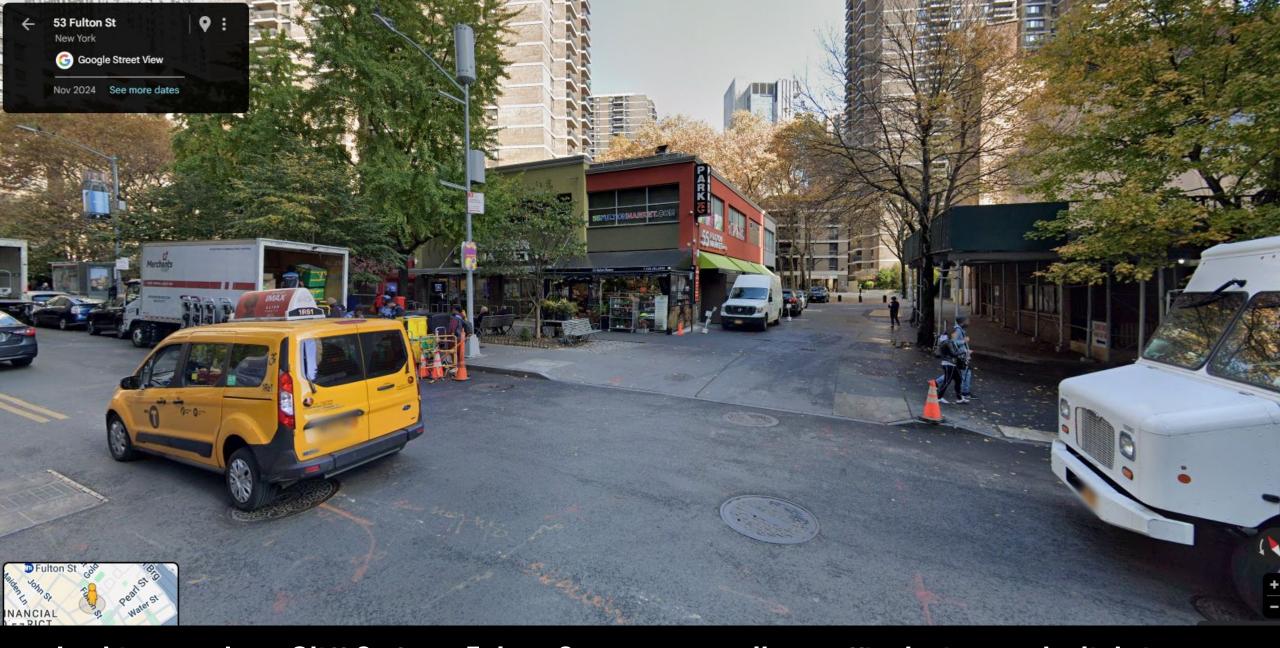

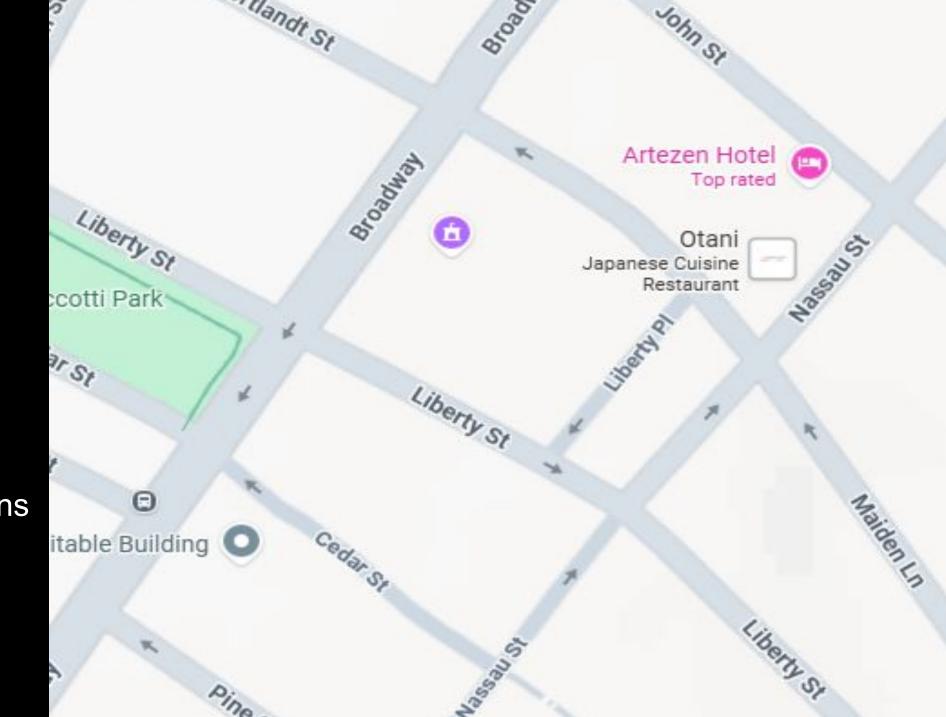

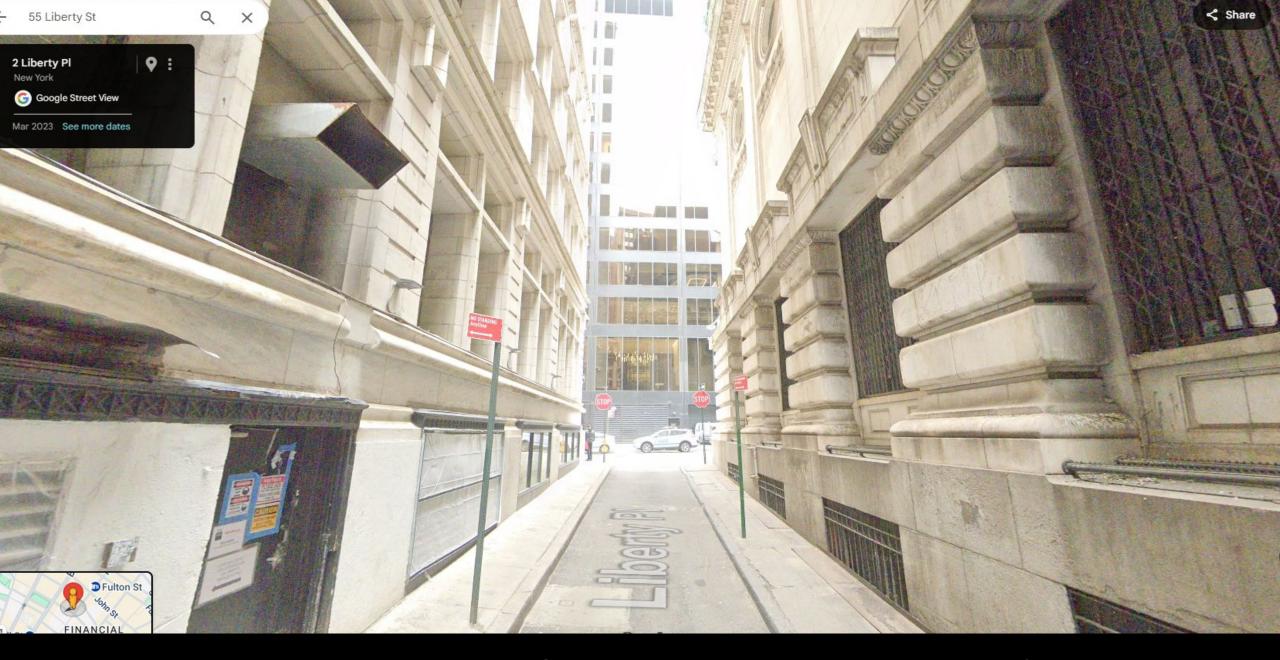

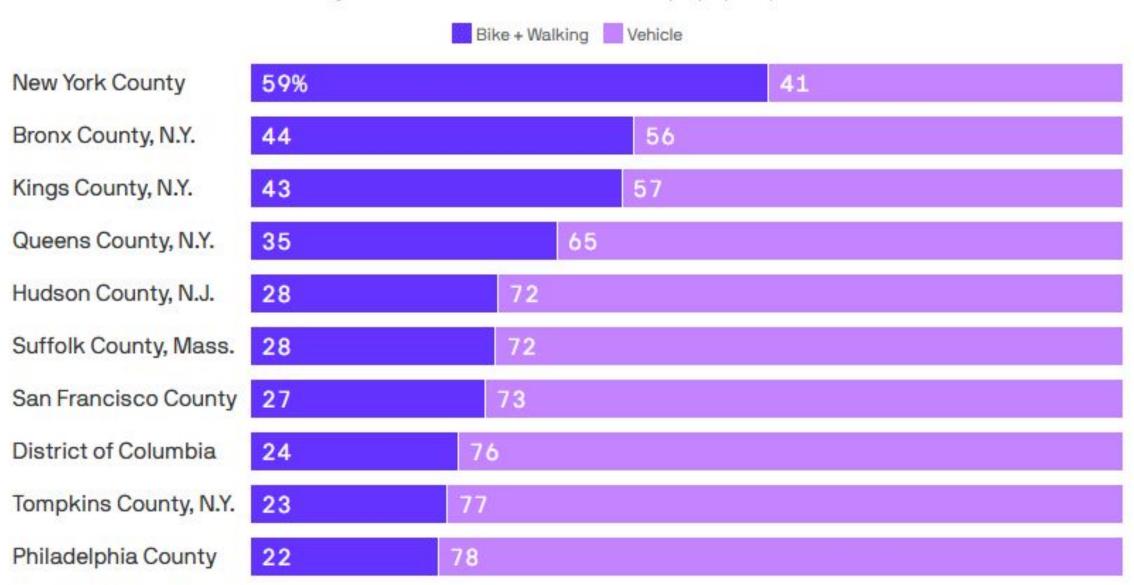

Manhattan CB1 urges the NYC Department of Transportation (DOT) to:

- Implement measures to calm traffic and prioritize pedestrians on Liberty St west of Nassau St,
- Repaint crosswalk markings at the Liberty St-Nassau St intersection,
- Improve pedestrian safety crossing Liberty St at Liberty PI, including people using wheelchairs, strollers, delivery carts, etc.

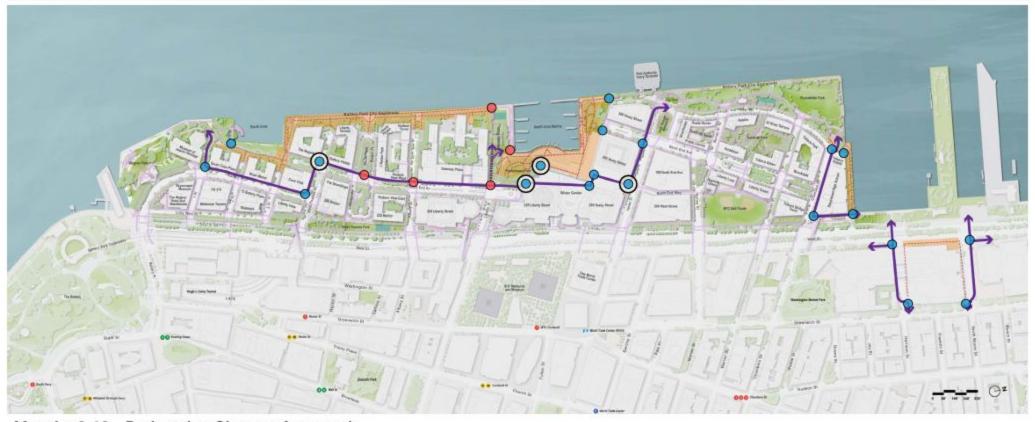

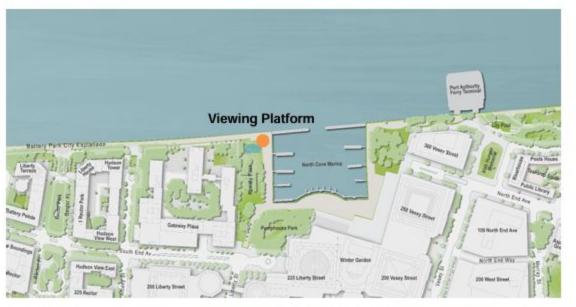
