Proposal to Community Board 1 to Renovate Asphalt Green's Culinary Center

Proposal to Renovate Asphalt Green Culinary Center

Asphalt Green has asked the Battery Park City Authority for approval to renovate the Culinary Center on site, converting the space into a multipurpose activity room.

Several areas of potential interest could be served by this renovation, based on feedback from the community board, program users, and Asphalt Green members.

Senior Fitness

- Additional activity space could allow for a regular schedule of free or reduced cost specialized fitness classes for Seniors that live in Battery Park City
- Successful programs we have offered at the uptown campus include a 14-week fitness program,
 a detailed assessment, and reduced cost access to the fitness center upon completion
- Walkthrough and demonstration scheduled for 2/17/16 at 6pm with committee members of CB1 to discuss details and community needs – please join us!

Youth and Adult Martial Arts

- Youth Martial Arts has been the fastest growing program at Asphalt Green since debuting in September 2015
- Additional activity space could increase the number of students served, and allow for expansion to serve Adults with interest in martial arts, boxing, and mixed martial arts

Safety Training Classes

- Safety Training has been one of the most requested programs by the community particularly new and expecting parents
- Additional activity space could allow for a regular schedule of American Red Cross certifications in CPR, AED, First Aid and Lifeguard Training
- Possibility of hosting external safety trainings and programs through NYPD, FEMA, CERT

Partner Programming

Dear Chairperson Hughes,

I write in response to the recent resolution passed by Manhattan Community Board One calling for increased security and surveillance near the Battery Park City ball fields. As the resolution is directly in line with the Authority's initiative for enhanced public safety, I would like to illustrate how the Authority has already been working to address these critical matters.

Over the past several months, the Authority has been identifying appropriate locations to expand its security camera footprint. As of today, four cameras have been installed in Teardrop Park and we are in the process of evaluating vendors for video surveillance at the ballfields. Our goal is to have some type of electronic surveillance installed before the end of 2016.

Please also be aware that the Battery Park City Ambassadors have had a fixed post at the ballfields 24 hours a day, 7 days a week since they started working in Battery Park City. This fixed post is augmented by the foot and bicycle patrols of the Ambassadors whose patrol areas include the ballfields and terrace. Additionally, the Ambassadors have an office in the ground floor of the Verdesian, directly across the street from the ballfield terrace on North End Avenue. This ensures that there are multiple security personnel who are in the vicinity at all times.

The safety of all Battery Park City residents, and in particular the youth who both live and visit here to enjoy our parks, is paramount. We embrace and share the Community Board's commitment to public safety. The Authority looks forward to continuing our dialogue and welcomes feedback on potential further enhancements.





HUD Awards \$1 Billion Through National Disaster Resilience Competition

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Secretary Julián Castro and the Rockefeller Foundation announced the winners of the \$1 billion National Disaster Resilience Competition (NDRC). Secretary Castro traveled to Norfolk, Virginia where he joined Governor Terry McAuliffe in announcing the winners of the competition. Through NDRC, HUD will provide funding for resilient housing and infrastructure projects to states and communities that were impacted by major disasters between 2011 and 2013.
