
Establishing a Continuous Floor Barrier – Superstorm Sandy Inundation






New Park Pavilion Design Principles: Resiliency


- More resilient barrier to protect upland areas

- DFE (Design Flood Elevation) 100 year flood elevation: El+16.5' NAVD per Lower Manhattan Coastal Resiliency Plan









- Rehabilitate iconic structure phase-II
- Improve live load capacity of arch blocks to match super structure.
- Strengthen foundations and substructures at ramps
- Strengthen masonry towers
- Preserve historic fabric as per SHPO / LPC / NPS
- Minimize removals and maximize reuse of materials
- Balance constructability with preservation strategies
- Minimize impact to commuters and communities






Tourist volumes




Tourism building blocks

Challenging Security Infrastructure


- Temporary security measures installed immediately after 9/11
- Existing black fencing around NYSE installed in 2003
- ~2003 City released plan for new security infrastructure and streetscape enhancements
- Existing security infrastructure installation complete by 2008





Challenges: Fortress Lower Manhattan


- Key elements of existing security infrastructure have failed to function properly
- "Temporary" security apparatus is off-putting and unsightly.
- Streetscape is cluttered, street furniture is mismatched with limited seating, eurocobble poorly maintained
- Public spaces ill-defined, poorly maintained with no landscaping or greenery
- Little historical interpretation







Stock Exchange District: Study Area





Long-Term Alliance Planning Study

- In 2016, the Alliance released an RFP for an urban design/planning consultant to study the area and develop promote the transformation of the Stock Exchange District into a vibrant and secure public space that is welcoming for New Yorkers and visitors alike.
- In March, we selected a design team lead by WXY architecture + urban design.









- WXY is an award winning Lower Manhattan based urban design firm
- Claire Weisz is leading the project for WXY
- Claire is a Lower Manhattan resident with extensive experience in the neighborhood, including:
 - SeaGlass Carousel
 - East River Blueway
 - Battery Bosque



Scope & Study Goals

Enhance the public realm

- Create a flexible and attractive public space that may be applicable to a variety of uses, including programming, such as arts and culture and passive uses.
- Maximize the impact of historic view corridors, such as the view of Trinity Church from Wall Street

Highlight the historic and cultural assets and opportunities in the area

- Enhance the accessibility and interpretative value of the historic assets in the area and encourage urban design that responds to the deep and unique history of the Stock Exchange District, including Federal Hall, the House of Morgan, the remains of the original Wall Street palisade.
- Identify programming opportunities that respond to the unique conditions and history of the Study Area.

Improve access and mobility

- Improve mobility and circulation throughout the Study Area and enhance building access for pedestrians, deliveries and sanitation.
- Identify solutions for more efficiently and effectively handling solid waste disposal in the area.
