- Anthony Hannigan
 - o No update; it's being reviewed.

Public Hearing (7:00 PM - 7:15 PM)

Topic: Presentation by Marissa Yanni, Community Affairs DSNY - Compost Enforcement

- Compost and enforcement is not paused.
- Enforcement is going to ramp up for 30 units or more
- Smaller buildings will focus on education and communication
- Decals available to inform what can go into the bin
- Prefer you line it or put in plastic bag (opened with machinery)
- Compost giveback location in Staten Island and Queens popup locations to come
 - o Bogardus Plaza May 13th
 - o Tompkins Square Park May 3rd
- Eric: Does DSNY still take organic waster and put it into digesters and other goes to be composted (on SI)
 - o Consider giving some to Parks and Rec
- Jared: Doing it regularly instead of once a season on Give Backs
- Gabby: Are bins available for households for free (some elected officials have given out) - For building? Brown Bin is not given for free.
 - o What exercises to prevent rodents? Enabling making composting mandatory.
- Wendy: Are you going through regular garbage to check for compost? Or just the bin? What are you doing for businesses?
 - o If the black bag has banana peels, you can get a ticket
 - o Not all businesses are mandated to separate their own garbage. It's dependent on size.
- Justine: You pick up compost once a week; same day as recycling? Can it be done more frequently to prevent rat increase?
 - o Not yet.
 - o Property owners are required to have as many bins as necessary
- Alice: Can put a sticker on a different bin. Can't be in a plastic bag.

- Eric: What happens when a bin is frequently stolen? Can sanitation do something? Not fair to have to replace multiple times.
- Betty: Can residents add their address to the bin? o Yes

Business Session

- A) Adoption of March 2025 minutes Motion to adopt was passed unanimously as presented by a roll call of 28 in favor, 0 opposed, 0 abstained and 0 recused
- B) Updates from Elected Officials
 - Senator Brian Kavanagh's office -
 - Sharif from CB2
 - Dan Happy Earth Day
 - May 15th with Public Utility Law project- One stop shop for all things utilities
 - Sharif is organizing an event on May 4th in CB2 Pet adoption event with ACC 12- 4 WSQ Park
 - Still working on budget
 - Chair: Money in State budget for lower Manhattan (\$15 \$50M)
 - John Scott: SCREE DREE raised limit? Progress? A Bill is in play to raise the limit. In the Aging committee in the Senate; consumer pricing tasks increase YoY. Who is the Chair? For stabilization and more.
 - Justine: WHen you evaluate, are you looking at assets? Sen Krueger passed legislation to change the calculation on what we're counting as income. Will give specifics later.
 - Blank BBJ Update: Will reconvene when construction dates are set. Happy to have meetings before. Will email dates.
 - Justine: BPC on condo owners and 100% of AMI? Response from assembly members? I want support. A meeting is coming soon.
 - Jess: What happened last cycle? Didn't pass through the assembly, bogged down in budget. The Senate passed it.
 - Council Member Marte's office -
 - Max: Helicopter tragedy, policies could have prevented this. Elected officials have been pressing regulation. Council just scheduled time to discuss regulation
 - May 1st at noon outside city hall. to protect retirees from being forced off medicare. Panel of experts to discuss.
 - Land Use: Manhattan plan, nothing has been revealed through upzoning of city property. There's nothing on affordability.
 - Budget, participatory voting, almost 2700 votes online. Waiting on paper ballots to be counted. Winners announced in the next couple of weeks.
 - Walkthrough on Triangle with Blank. Parks cleaned up. Working with other agencies to better the Barnaby triangle.
 - Friday the 25th roller skating on Ferry Street. Free activity. 4-5:30 kids; Adult 6-7:30
 - Chair: Resiliency funding in city budget needed.
 - Joel: Helicopter crash; this board was against it; The EDC refused to back off; we've asked for noise and air pollution. I want public officials to back us up.
 - Jared: Frustrated that everything is about profitability.
 - Eric: Would Marte sponsor legislation to have 500 distance from Homeless shelters for under 18 age. How far is too or not far enough.

- Will take back to council members.
- Rosa: As a city council member, what can be done to stop this?
 Nothing because the comptroller signed off.
 - Blank: Thank the council member for the community.
- Marc: Helicopter: they should not take off from Manhattan.
 - Council members agree.
- Assembly Member Deborah Glick office -
 - Tracy in ALbany working n budget
 - Prohibit the use of PFAPS in consumer products
 - reauthorize bill for school zone cameras. Include DOT to investigate ghost plates
 - Get clarity from FDNY on street waivers
 - re: Money for lower Manhattan; earlier in the year, Glick was pushing the state to set aside money for FEMA related expenses with concern on Federal dollars.
 - MBPO proposal for psychiatric beds Not opposed, but concerned about staffing capacity. And also need to account for additional staffing.
 - Jared: Ability to investigate ghost plates; Consider the ability to investigate those with multiple allegations.
 - Co-Sponsoring those with multiple offenses
 - NY Privacy Act, passed the Senate, not assembly. Would give consumers the ability to request data be deleted from data brokers.
 - Will follow-up
 - John Scott: Environmental info on High rises?
 - Rosa: FiDi seaport resiliency Can we get State help since Federal support is not likely (for next storm) Will look into it.
 - Mental Housing beds: yes, need to be able to staff. Spent the past two years meeting with the Governor's office and other partners and all are frustrated that Mt Sinai closed. Working on a letter with a list of specific requests on what to do next.
 - Justine: BPC Bill eligible homeowners and renters; Assembly has not gotten to a vote. Will Glick support it if it makes it to a vote? Sen. 1462 (Charles Fall in Assembly).

 - Alex Frazier: Albany on the budget.
 - Couldn't come because still in Albany
 - Introduced Stop ACT with Krueger, politicians misusing taxpayer funds for legal matter
 - Childcare funding \$1B
 - Governor Gardens with shelter tax being cut funding in half.
 - Advocate for remedy SNAP theft
 - Hoping to attend next month.
 - Justine: Please support BPC Bill
 - Rosa: Need state support for resiliency on the east side.
