1. Introduction

The City of New York, through the applicants, the New York City Department of Correction (DOC) and the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice (MOCJ), and the co-applicant, the New York City Department of Citywide Administrative Services (DCAS), is proposing to develop a system of borough-based jails in keeping with its continued commitment to create a modern, humane, and safe justice system and facilitate the closure of the jails on Rikers Island and replacement of existing borough detention facilities. The Proposed Project will develop four new detention facilities to house individuals who are in the City's correctional custody with one detention facility located in each borough for The Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens (addresses and block and lots are listed above). The proposed facilities will be completed and in operation by 2027.

To help facilitate the proposed borough-based jail system, DOC and MOCJ are proposing a series of land use actions through the Uniform Land Use Review Procedure (ULURP). These include two system-wide land use actions as part of this application:

- * A public facility-site selection that will approve the siting of the four borough-based jails. In the case of the Bronx site, this will be a new facility that will replace and expand the capacity of an existing facility located elsewhere in the borough. In the case of Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens, these will be new facilities replacing existing facilities and expanding the on-site capacity. The borough-based jail system will have a capacity of 5,748 beds and will include supportive space, related functions, and parking. This proposal requires a Fair Share analysis which is provided as part of this application. DCAS is a co-applicant for this action.
- * A zoning text amendment to Article VII, Chapter 4 of the Zoning Resolution (ZR) creating a new special permit ("Borough-based Jail System Special Permit") for borough-based jails that will allow the City Planning Commission (CPC) to modify zoning regulations related to ground floor use; bulk, including an increase in floor area ratio (FAR) related to courthouse and prison use; and accessory and public parking and loading.

Related to these, DOC is also proposing other, borough-specific land use actions which are the subject of separate but related applications that are being certified concurrently with this system-wide application. These other land use actions include:

* Borough-based Jail Special Permit for the Bronx borough-based jail site to be located at 745 E. 141st Street (Block 2574, part of Lot 1), which will have 1,437 beds, approximately 1,100,00 zsf

of housing for people in detention, and support services space, approximately 10,000 zsf of court and court related space, and up to approximately 40,000 zsf of storefront retail and/or community facility space, along with approximately 575 secure accessory parking spaces.

- * Borough-based Jail Special Permit for the Brooklyn borough-based jail site to be located at 275 Atlantic Avenue (Block 175, Lot 1), which will have 1,437 beds, approximately 1,045,000 zsf of housing for people in detention and support services space, and 30,000 zsf of storefront retail or community facility space, along with 292 secure accessory parking spaces.
- * Borough-based Jail Special Permit for the Manhattan borough-based jail site to be located at 124 and 125 White Street (Block 198, Lot 1; Block 167, part of Lot 1), which will have 1,437 beds, approximately 1,125,000 zsf of housing for people in detention and support services space, plus approximately 20,000 zsf of community facility and/or retail space, along with approximately 125 secure accessory parking spaces.
- * Borough-based Jail Special Permit for the Queens borough-based jail site to be located at 126-02 82nd Avenue and 80-25 126th Street (Block 9653, part of Lot 1; 9657, Lot 1), which will have 1,437 beds, approximately 1,110,000 zsf of housing for people in detention, support services space, and centralized care services, and 25,000 zsf of community facility space, along with approximately 605 accessory parking and 676 public parking spaces.
- * City Map Change application to demap above- and below-grade volumes on State Street in order to allow bridge(s) and or tunnel(s) connecting the Brooklyn borough-based jail with the Brooklyn Central Courts Building and may also include extensions of cellar levels within the proposed demapping volume beneath State Street. That action is the subject of land use application no. 190116 MMK, which was filed on October 24, 2018 and is being certified concurrently with this application.
- * City Map Change application to demap above- and below-grade volumes on White Street and also narrow and realign the right-of-way to facilitate the conversion of the at-grade street to a pedestrian corridor and allow the Manhattan borough-based jail to occupy space above and below the street. That action is the subject of land use application no. 190252 MMM, which was filed on February 1, 2019 and is being certified concurrently with this application.
- * City Map Change application to demap 82nd Avenue so that it can be incorporated into the Queens proposed project area. That action is the subject of land use application no. 190117 MMQ, which was filed on October 24, 2018 and is being certified concurrently with this application.
- * An acquisition by the NYC Department of Citywide Administrative Services (DCAS) of the leasehold interest of retail space in the Manhattan Detention Center North Tower (MDC North) held by Walker Street-Chung Pak Local Development Corporation (LDC), an area of approximately 6,300 sf. This area is located on part of Lot 1 on Block 198. DCAS is the applicant for this action.

In addition, The Bronx borough-based jail application also includes a series of actions to facilitate a proposed mixed-use development with up to approximately 235 affordable housing dwelling units (DUs), up to approximately 31,000 zsf of local retail and/or community facility space at 320 Concord Avenue (Block 2574, part of Lot 1), located immediately west of the proposed Bronx jail. These actions include:

- * A zoning map amendment rezoning the mixed-use development site from M1-3 to M1-4/R7X.
- * A zoning text amendment designating the mixed-use development site a Mandatory Inclusionary Housing (MIH) area and designating the mixed-use development site a special mixed-use district.
- * Designation of the mixed-use development site as an Urban Development Action Area (UDAA) and an Urban Development Action Area Project (UDAAP) for the mixed-use development, and approval of future disposition of the mixed-use development site. The New York City Department of Housing Preservation and Development (HPD) is the applicant for this action.

The borough-specific actions summarized above are contingent upon the adoption of the zoning text amendment and public facility-site selection actions that are the subject of this application for system-wide actions.

2. Background

Historical Changes in the Criminal Justice System

In the last four years, New York City has experienced an acceleration in the trends that defined the City's public safety landscape over the last three decades. While jail and prison populations around the country have increased, New York City's jail population has fallen by half since 1990, and declined by 30 percent since Mayor de Blasio took office. Indeed, in the last four years, the City experienced the steepest four-year decline in the jail population since 1998. This decline in jail use has occurred alongside record-low crime. Major crime has fallen by 78 percent in the last 25 years (since 1993) and by 14 percent in the last five years (since 2013). 2018 was the safest year in CompStat history. New York City's historic and durable decline in crime rates are continued and unique proof that we can increase safety while shrinking the jail population.

Smaller, Safer, Fairer, the City's roadmap to closing the jails on Rikers Island, was released by MOCJ in June 2017 and includes 18 strategies to ultimately reduce the jail population to 5,000, allow for the closure of the jails on Rikers Island, and the transition to the proposed borough-based jail system. Progress on these strategies is underway with the partnership of New Yorkers, the courts, district attorneys, the defense bar, mayoral agencies, service providers, the City Council, and others within the justice system. When New York City released its roadmap in June 2017, the City's jails held an average of 9,400 people on any given day. In December 2018, the population has dropped to 8,000, a 15 percent.

A number of factors have contributed to the decline in jail population, including:

- **Reduced crime and arrest rates.** Major crime decreased by 14 percent in the City in the last five years. While not every person arrested spends time in jail, every 1 percent drop in crime results in 60 fewer people in jail on any given day.
- **Fewer people enter jail.** Among other system dynamics, interventions aimed at reducing the number of low- and medium-risk people entering jail contributed to about 35 percent of the total reduction of people in jail to date. These include major investments in diversion (preventing over 11,000 people from entering jail); alternatives to jail sentences; making it easier to pay bail through funding bail expediters; expanding the charitable bail fund citywide and implementing online bail payment; and targeted initiatives focused on the unique needs of specific groups such as women, adolescents, and those with mental/behavioral health issues.

• **Cases resolved faster.** Reductions in unnecessary case delays have resulted in fewer defendants' cases extending beyond one year. For example, since the start of Justice Reboot¹ in April 2015, the number of Supreme Court cases pending for more than one year has declined 22 percent (746 cases as of January 5, 2019).

Facilities at Rikers Island

Currently, the majority of the people held in the City's jail system are held at Rikers Island, which is a 413acre City-owned property located in the East River and is part of The Bronx, although it is accessed from Queens. It has a capacity for approximately 11,300 people in detention in eight active jail facilities.² Most facilities on Rikers Island were built more than 40 years ago and create serious challenges to the safe and humane treatment of those in detention. In addition, Rikers Island's isolation limits accessibility to both staff and visitors, as described in the report, *A More Just New York City*, issued by the Independent Commission on New York City Criminal Justice and Incarceration Reform (the Lippman Commission).

While the City now offers free, express shuttle bus service to and from Rikers Island designed to facilitate visits for family and friends of people in custody, Rikers Island is still geographically isolated from the rest of New York City. It is accessed by a small, narrow bridge that connects it with Queens. This isolation makes it difficult for DOC staff, family members, defense attorneys, social service providers, and other service providers and visitors to access their jobs, loved ones, and clients. As noted in A More Just New York City, visiting a person in detention on Rikers Island can take an entire day, forcing people to miss work and make costly arrangements for child care.

Additionally, the location of Rikers Island results in inefficient transportation and an increase in related costs to the City, as DOC must expend substantial time and resources transporting people in detention off the Island for court appearances and appointments. MOCJ continuously works with DOC and the State Office of Court Administration (OCA) to find ways to further improve on-time court production and reduce case delays associated with late production. All defendants, regardless of incarcerated status, are required to be present at court at 9:30 am. DOC must transport more than 1,000 people on and off the Island each day for court appearances, and this inevitably causes some to miss court appearances and off-site treatment dates. If defendants are produced late, it may result in their appearance being rescheduled for a later date (or 'delayed'), which can contribute to delayed resolution and longer length of stay in DOC custody. Missed court appearances can further draw out case timelines and cause other disruptions to court schedules, and missing appointments can result in potentially adverse consequences for people who are detained.

Finally, the transformative vision contemplated under the City's proposal cannot be achieved through renovations of the current facilities on Rikers Island since these buildings have an average age of more than 40 years, with even the newest facility dating back to 1991.

¹ Justice Reboot is the City's initiative aimed at reducing unnecessary case delays. The City created a centralized coordinating body, run through the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice, that conducts deep analytical dives into borough-specific case processing problems and provides targeted solutions.

² "People in detention" refers to all those in the custody of the New York City Department of Correction, regardless of legal status, including but not limited to pretrial detainees, city sentenced individuals and people held on State parole violations.

Other City Jail Facilities

DOC currently operates four other detention facilities not located on Rikers Island. These facilities are the Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens (currently decommissioned) Detention Complexes, and the Vernon C. Bain Center, located in the East River near the Hunts Point neighborhood of The Bronx. These facilities can accommodate a total of about 2,500 people in detention. The Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens Detention Complexes are located on sites that are proposed for redevelopment with modern detention facilities under the Proposed Project. The Vernon C. Bain Center is a five-story barge that provides medium to maximum security detention facilities and serves as the Bronx detention facility for admissions.

These existing buildings cannot be renovated to meet the needs of the contemporary facilities envisioned. The existing facilities are limited with regard to capacity and inefficient in design; many of them date back to the 1950s, 1960s, 1970s, and 1980s and have not been renovated since the early 1990s. Facility layouts are outdated and do not provide for the quality of life sought in more modern detention facilities, with regard to space needs, daylight, and social spaces.

Projected Reductions in the Number of People in the City's Jails

The number of people who enter and the length of time they stay determine the size of the population in the City's jails. The City is in the process of implementing the strategies laid out in *Smaller, Safer, Fairer*, which are expected to reduce the average daily jail population to approximately 7,000 people over the next three years, with the goal of achieving a total average population of 5,000 by 2027.³ 18 months after the release of Smaller, Safer, Fairer, the City's jail population fell to below 8,000 for the first time in almost 40 years, a decrease of almost 15 percent that puts the City ahead of schedule in its efforts to reduce the population.

The Proposed Borough-Based Jail System

Under the borough-based jail proposal, the system will provide approximately 5,748 beds to accommodate an average daily population of 5,000 people, while allowing space for population-specific housing requirements, such as those related to safety, security, physical and mental health, among other factors, and fluctuations in the jail population.

A guiding urban design principle for the Proposed Project is neighborhood integration. This includes promoting safety and security, designing dignified environments, leveraging community assets, and providing added value and benefits to the surrounding neighborhoods. The new facilities will be designed with the needs of the communities in mind. They will be designed to encourage positive community engagement and serve as civic assets in the neighborhoods. The new buildings will be integrated into the neighborhoods, providing connections to courts and service providers and also offering community benefits. The Proposed Project is intended to strengthen connections between people who are detained to families and communities through allowing people to remain closer to their loved ones, which allows better engagement of incarcerated individuals with attorneys, social service providers, and community supports so that they will do better upon leaving and be less likely to return to jail.

Each facility will be designed to minimize the effect on the surrounding neighborhood urban design while also achieving efficient and viable floorplans that optimize access to program space, outdoor space, and

natural light. The borough facilities will be designed to be self-sufficient buildings, with housing units (i.e., a standardized module consisting of a certain number of cells with a common dayroom, support spaces, and recreation yard) that facilitate better officer supervision as a result of the improved floorplans. The Proposed Project contemplates providing sufficient space for effective and tailored programming, appropriate housing for those with medical, behavioral health and mental health needs. Additionally, the facilities will provide a normalized environment of operations that supports the safety and well-being of both staff and the people who are detained in the City's custody.

The Proposed Project will ensure that each borough facility has ample support space for quality educational programming, recreation, therapeutic services, publicly accessible community space, and staff parking. The support space will also include a public-service-oriented lobby, visitation space, space for robust medical screening for new admissions, medical and behavior health exams, health/mental health care services, therapeutic units, and administrative space. The community space is intended to provide useful community amenities, such as community facility programming or street-level retail space.

The proposed facilities will be completed and in operation by 2027.

Project Area History and Past Land Use Actions

For each of the four proposed borough-based jail sites, a brief summary of project area history and notable past land use actions is provided herein. Please refer to the separate special permit applications for each of the proposed borough-based jails sites for additional information.

The Bronx

Lincoln Hospital was located on the site from 1898 to 1976. Formerly, the proposed project area consisted of two blocks, separated by Wales Avenue. Wales Avenue between E. 141st and E. 142nd streets was eliminated, discontinued and closed pursuant to a city map change in the 1940s (Application Nos. CP-2804 and CP-2805). The purpose of the demapping, according to the CPC report, was to consolidate the street area with the City-owned Lincoln Hospital, which was located immediately to the west.

In the 1961 Zoning Resolution, the proposed project area was zoned M1-1. In 1964 the proposed project area was rezoned to M1-3 and that designation remains in place.

The property is City-owned and has been used by NYPD for a Tow Pound since approximately 1993.

Brooklyn

The proposed project area contains the Brooklyn Detention Complex on a full-block site. The City authorized acquisition of this block in 1948 (Application No. CP-5427) as a site for a new city prison and remand shelter. Also in 1948, as a separate action the City approved the widening of Boerum Place along the east side of the street adjacent to the proposed project area. This city map change increased the mapped width from 60 feet to 130 feet (Application No. CP-5570), which shortened the block by 70 feet.

The Brooklyn Detention Complex was completed in 1956. The building subsequently received a western addition for a visitor's center built ca. 1967 to 1972, which was then replaced after 1996 by a one- and two-

story ground-floor addition. An existing tunnel below State Street connects the proposed project area to the Brooklyn Central Courts Building at 120 Schermerhorn Street.

Manhattan

On the southern portion of the proposed project area, the existing Manhattan Criminal Court Building at 100 Centre Street and MDC South at 125 White Street were designed and constructed as a combined complex and opened in 1941. On the northern portion of the proposed action area, MDC North was completed in 1990 and developed pursuant to a public facility-site selection application approved by the City Planning Commission (Application No. C 820687 PSM(A); October 4, 1982, Cal. No. 1). Connecting MDC North and South, there are a bridge above and tunnel below White Street which operate pursuant to Revocable Consents approved by the CPC (Application Nos. C 850058 GFM; January 30, 1985, Cal. No. 38; and C 850059 GFM, January 30, 1985, Cal. No. 39; respectively).

In the 1961 ZR the proposed action area was zoned C6-4 and that designation remains in place.

Queens

In 1952 the CPC approved the selection of Block 9653 (Application No. CP-8887; March 5, 1952, Calendar 48) for a criminal court and city prison. The current alignment of 82nd Avenue within the proposed project area was mapped as part of another street system change adopted in 1955 (Queens Topographic Bureau Map No. 3786). According to the CPC report for this City Map Change (Application No. CP-11569; May 18, 1955, Calendar No. 24), these modifications were "designed to provide an adequate site for a Criminal Courts Building and Prison within the public place and public place addition bounded by 132nd Street, Hoover Avenue, Queens Boulevard and 82nd Avenue as now proposed to be relocated."

In 1959 the CPC approved the construction of a public parking garage by the Department of Traffic on Block 9657 (Application No. CP-14708; April 22, 1959, Calendar No. 34) and two related actions involving the transfer of the land from the Queens Borough President to the Department of Traffic (now Department of Transportation). At the time of approval, the block was being used as a surface parking lot. According to the CPC report for the garage approval, the garage "will supply adequate parking space for the needs of Queens Borough Hall and the new Criminal Courts Building now under construction." The garage opened in November 1962 with approximately 1,000 spaces and remained in operation until it closed in 2012 and was subsequently demolished. It was replaced by the current 302-space public parking lot which opened in March 2018.

The Queens House of Detention for Men, now known as QDC, and the Queens County Criminal Court building were completed in 1961, with a connecting wing enabling the secure passage of detainees between the judicial and correction facilities. The connecting wing also houses offices for the Queens District Attorney. QDC was closed in 2002 and has been largely vacant except for the ground floor visitor and staff entry, administrative office, and the vehicular sallyport (a secured, controlled entryway for the transport of people in detention) for detainee intake, transfer, and entrance to the connected Queens Criminal Court for staff and visitors. All housing units on upper floors are not holding any detainees today.

Past Land Use Actions in the 600-foot Radius Area

Please refer to the separate special permit applications for descriptions of past last use actions within 600 feet of each of the proposed borough-based jail sites.

3. Description of the Surrounding Area

For each of the four proposed borough-based jail sites, a brief summary of land use and zoning information is provided for the 600-foot radius surrounding area. Please refer to the separate special permit applications for each of the proposed borough-based jails sites for additional information.

Bronx

The defining characteristic of the surrounding area in terms of land use is the diagonal alignment of the Bruckner corridor, which is approximately 170 feet wide adjacent to the proposed project area and consists of Bruckner Boulevard at-grade and the elevated Bruckner Boulevard Expressway (I-278) above it. With its alignment along a northeast-southwest axis, it is located both south and east of the proposed action area. Non-residential uses, including industrial and storage, predominate east of the Bruckner corridor and on properties immediately fronting onto it along the west. One to two blocks west of the Bruckner corridor the area transitions to an urban residential character. Within the industrial area to the east, there are railroad tracks used by freight and passenger trains following an alignment generally parallel to the expressway. Also, the abandoned Port Morris Branch train tracks extend through the surrounding area in an open cut to the north and east of the proposed project area, but given that surface streets bridge the cut and it is relatively narrow, it does not physically and visually separate the area in a manner comparable to the Bruckner corridor.

The surrounding 600-foot radius area includes the following zoning districts: M1-2, M1-3, M3-1, R6, and R7-1.

Brooklyn

The surrounding area is characterized by the medium density residential neighborhoods of Cobble Hill and Boerum Hill to the south, along with the higher-density commercial neighborhood of Downtown Brooklyn to the north. Atlantic Avenue serves as the primary arterial road in the area, providing access to the proposed project area while also serving as a buffer from the residential neighborhoods to the south. Local retail uses dot the area, primarily along Atlantic Avenue, Court Street, Smith Street, and Fulton Street. Public institution uses are also predominately located north of the proposed project area, and include the Brooklyn Central Courts Building at the northwest corner of State and Smith streets, and the New York City Housing Court at the corner of Smith and Livingston streets. Several schools are located within the area, including Brooklyn Law School, at the corner of Joralemon and Adams streets, and Packer Collegiate Institute, on Joralemon Street. Two houses of worship include the Brooklyn Tabernacle, located on Smith Street between Fulton and Livingston streets, and the Brooklyn Friends Meeting House, located at the southeast corner of Schermerhorn Street and Boerum Place.

The surrounding 600-foot radius area includes the following zoning districts: C5-4, C6-1, C6-2A, C6-4, R6A, R6B, and R7A. There is a C2-4 commercial overlay mapped on some of the residential districts. Part of this area is also located within the Special Downtown Brooklyn District.

Manhattan

The 600-foot radius area that surrounds the proposed project area encompasses much of the Manhattan Civic Center but also includes adjoining areas of Chinatown to the east and north and Tribeca to the west. Small portions of SoHo and Little Italy also lie within the northern edge of the 600-foot radius area. The Manhattan Civic Center broadly defined is a multi-block area bound by Centre Street, Broadway, and

Lafayette Street to the west, Walker Street to the north, Baxter Street and Pearl Street to the east and Park Row and the Brooklyn Bridge approach to the south. It is home to numerous high-rise, large footprint federal, state, and city public facilities. Besides MDC North and South and the Manhattan Criminal Court Building, it also includes the Lefkowitz State Office Building (immediately south of the proposed project area), Manhattan Civil Courthouse (immediately west of the proposed project area), New York County Supreme Court, the Health Building, Thurgood Marshall US Courthouse, US Court of International Trade, and the Metropolitan Correctional Center. As such, public institutional uses predominate in the central and southern portions of the 600-foot radius surrounding area.

The surrounding 600-foot radius area includes the following zoning districts: C6-1, C6-1G, C6-2G, C6-4, C6-4A, M1-5, M1-5B, and R7-2. There are also special purpose zoning districts mapped over the underlying zoning in some parts of the 600-foot radius area, including a Special Transit Land Use District at the southeast edge of the area covering Chatham Square and vicinity and the Special Little Italy covering the eponymous enclave north of Canal Street and east of Baxter Street.

Queens

The proposed project area is located in the Queens Civic Center; the latter is a roughly triangle-shaped area, with one corner truncated, formed by man-made boundaries including Union Turnpike/Jackie Robinson Parkway/Kew Gardens Interchange to the north, 132nd Street/Van Wyck Expressway to the east, Hoover Avenue to the southeast, and Queens Boulevard to the west. As such, the 600-foot radius area surrounding the proposed project area is characterized by institutional and commercial uses and highways, with residential and open space uses farther to the south and east.

The surrounding 600-foot radius area includes the following zoning districts: C4-4, R3-2, R5, and R6A.

4. Description of the Proposed Project Area

The Bronx

The proposed Bronx borough-based jail facility will be located at 745 E. 141st Street (Block 2574, part of Lot 1) in the Mott Haven neighborhood in Community District 1, on part of the City-owned block bound by E. 142nd Street, Southern Boulevard, Bruckner Boulevard, E. 141st Street, and Concord Avenue (referred to hereafter the "proposed jail site"). The proposed jail site is a 148,400-square-foot (sf) site and will exclude the western portion of the block within 100 feet of Concord Avenue.

It is irregular-shaped, resembling a rectangle on three sides (north, south, and west) with one side (east) having a partly curved perimeter. The block's approximate street frontage dimensions include 350 feet on Concord Avenue, 424 feet on E. 142nd Street, 340 feet on E. 141st Street, and 377 feet on Southern/Bruckner Boulevards (the two rights-of-way merge adjacent to the site).

It is entirely occupied by the NYPD Bronx Tow Pound, which is a vehicle storage use. The site contains a small office trailer structure, storage sheds, and space for vehicle storage. It is surrounded by a fence and trees and is elevated above the grade of the surrounding streetscape. Vehicle entry/exits are located on E. 141st Street. According to City records, it has a 0.0 built FAR. It is zoned M1-3. The site has two existing curb cuts on E. 141st Street, including one at the location of the former roadbed of Wales Avenue and another approximately 20 feet east of Concord Avenue. Both of the site's E. 141st Street curb cuts provide two-way access to the Tow Pound. On E. 142nd Street, there is not a curb constructed in the former roadbed of Wales Avenue, but it is not used as a curb cut as there is fencing along the site. There are no curb cuts

on Concord Avenue, Southern Boulevard, and Bruckner Boulevard. In addition, the curb is in deteriorated condition along portions of the site's frontages.

As noted above, the westernmost portion of the block, located within 100 feet of Concord Avenue, will not be part of the proposed jail. The City, acting through NYC Department of Housing Preservation and Development (HPD), is proposing a series of actions to facilitate a new mixed-use affordable housing development on that site.

Brooklyn

As noted above, the Brooklyn proposed project area is City-owned and is a full-block site bound by State Street, Smith Street, Atlantic Avenue, and Boerum Place (Block 175, Lot 1) and also includes adjoining volumes of space above and below State Street. The block has an area of 59,900 sf. The area of the State Street volumes, which are the subject of a separate but related city map change application, is 19,365.2 sf. The block, which is roughly rectangular-shaped, is entirely occupied by the Brooklyn Detention Complex, which is a DOC operated institutional use. It is an 11-story, approximately 161,765-zsf (225,000-gsf) building with 815 beds for those undergoing the intake process or awaiting trial in Brooklyn or Staten Island courts. There is an existing tunnel beneath State Street connecting the site to the Brooklyn Central Courts Building, allowing for the secure conveyance of people in detention between the two facilities. There is no on-site parking. The site has a vehicular curb cut on Smith Street near State Street for the sallyport. The block has a built FAR of approximately 2.7. The proposed project area is located within a C6-2A zoning district in the overlying Special Downtown Brooklyn District.

Manhattan

The Manhattan proposed project area is City-owned, zoned C6-4, and has a total area of approximately 157,184 sf. Based on existing conditions, the proposed project area consists of four distinct panels. These include the Manhattan Criminal Court Building, MDC South, White Street, and MDC North.

This one-and-a-half block proposed project area is bound by Baxter Street on the east, Hogan Place on the south, Centre Street on the west, and Walker Street the north. The 17-story Manhattan Criminal Court Building, which is attached to MDC South, was completed in 1941. It has interconnected wings that house courtrooms, offices and related court functions. Overall, this building has approximately 815,011 zsf that will remain with the construction of the proposed borough-based jail. The building's main lobby and pedestrian entrance is accessed from Centre Street and there are secondary entrances on Baxter Street and Hogan Place, the latter designated for the District Attorney office, and a service entrance on Baxter Street. The building does not contain any parking. Immediately north of the Manhattan Criminal Court Building, MDC South at 125 White Street is a 13-story building bound by White Street on the north, Baxter Street on the east, the Manhattan Criminal Court Building on the south, and Centre Street on the west. On the southern edge of the property, immediately adjoining the Manhattan Criminal Court Building, there is a sallyport (a secured, controlled entryway for the transport of people in detention) with vehicle entry via a curb cut on Baxter Street which aligns with Bayard Street and vehicle exit via a curb cut on Centre Street. Secure pedestrian access to MDC South is provided via connections to the neighboring buildings on the south and north, Manhattan Criminal Court Building and MDC North, respectively.. MDC North, a 14story detention facility that includes ground floor retail along Centre and Baxter streets on a property bound by Baxter Street on the east, White Street on the south, Centre Street on the west, and the mixed-use building at 96 Baxter Street/125 Walker on the north, completed in 1990. There are pedestrian building entrances at the corner of White and Centre streets and on White Street midblock between Centre and Baxter streets. The building does not contain any parking. The ground floor retail, consisting of approximately 6,300 sf,

includes separate storefront spaces facing onto Centre Street and Baxter Street that are occupied by retail businesses. Collectively, MDC North and MDC South house approximately 387,800 gsf of court and detention center uses and approximately 898 beds for men in detention, most of them undergoing the intake process or facing trial in Manhattan. The block long section of White Street between Centre and Baxter streets is presently mapped at a width of 50 feet and currently operates one-way westbound and includes approximately 56 perpendicular parking spaces for authorized vehicles

Queens

The Queens proposed project area is City-owned, zoned C4-4, and has a total area of approximately 378,145 sf⁴. Based on existing conditions, the proposed project area consists of four distinct parcels. These include the Queens Criminal Court complex/Queens Family Justice Center site, QDC, 82nd Avenue, and the Queens Borough Hall Parking Field.

The ten-story Queens County Criminal Court complex, the one-story Queens Family Justice Center of New York City, and adjoining land, including accessory parking lots and landscaped areas occupies an approximately 203,018-sf irregularly-shaped site. It is bound by 132nd Street on the east, Hoover Avenue on the southeast, Queens Boulevard on the southwest, 82nd Avenue on the west, and QDC on the north. It forms part of the Queens Civic Center. The court building, which is attached to the QDC, was completed in 1961. It has a series of interconnected wings housing various local institutional functions including courts and Queens District Attorney. Overall, this area contains approximately 439,006 zsf that will remain with the construction of the proposed borough-based jail. The Court building's lobby and principal pedestrian entrance face Queens Boulevard and the complex has vehicular curb cuts on 82nd Avenue for two accessory parking driveways and on 132nd Street for accessory parking and loading driveways. Immediately north of the Queens Criminal Court complex/Queens Family Justice Center site is QDC, at 126-02 82nd Avenue (Block 9653, parts of Lots 1 and 100), which is an eight-story building with a cellar. It is bound by 82nd Avenue on the west and north, 132nd Street on the east, and the Queens Criminal Court complex/Queens Family Justice Center site on the south. It has approximately 151,000 zsf and a total area of approximately 209,000 gsf. It is connected to the Queens County Criminal Court Building. ODC is no longer used as a detention facility, i.e., no detainees are held there overnight. However, QDC is used for court operations. Detainees with court appearances are transported to the courts via QDC's sallyport and placed in holding cells there when not in court. ODC has a pedestrian entrance on 82nd Avenue. Adjoining QDC on the northwest is the 82nd Avenue demapping area, a 25,029.5-sf one-block segment of 82nd Avenue between 126th Street and 132nd Street. This street area currently operates as a one-way eastbound roadway flanked by public sidewalks. Along the north and south curbs, the roadway includes approximately 77 perpendicular parking spaces reserved for authorized vehicles. Overall, Block 9653, i.e., the Queens Criminal Court complex/Queens Family Justice Center and QDC, has a total lot area of approximately 226,526 sf, approximately 590,000 zsf of floor area and a built FAR of approximately 2.5. Northwest of the 82nd Avenue demapping area is 80-25 126th Street, which is a full block property bound by 126th Street on the southwest, 82nd Avenue on the southeast, 132nd Street on the northeast, and Union Turnpike on the northwest (Block 9657, Lot 1). This 126,590-sf area is occupied by the 302-space Queens Borough Hall Parking Field, a City-owned public parking lot with curb cuts on 82nd Avenue. It has a built FAR of 0.0.

⁴ The 378,145-sf proposed project area includes all of Block 9657, 126,589.9 sf; all of the 25,029.5 sf demapping area; and all of Block 9653, 226,525.6 sf.

5. Description of the Proposed Development

As discussed above in Section 2, the proposed borough-based jail system, with a total of 5,748 beds to house people in detention.

The Bronx

In The Bronx, the proposed actions will facilitate a new jail with 1,437 beds. It will have a total of approximately 1,150,000 zsf of above-grade space, including approximately 1,100,000 zsf of housing for people in detention, and support services space, approximately 10,000 zsf of court and court related space, and up to approximately 40,000 zsf of storefront retail and/or community facility space, along with approximately 575 secure accessory parking spaces located below-grade. The parking garage will operate as a self-park facility accessed via a ramp from E. 141st Street with two inbound lanes and one outbound and a gate system located on the ramp and it will be limited to DOC employees and other authorized individuals. There will be three below-grade levels housing parking spaces and other accessory uses.

Based on a preliminary illustrative design, the building footprint will cover the jail site, as such the building will provide streetwalls along all street frontages. The preliminary illustrative design includes a three-story building base "podium" with setbacks above it of various depths and an overall building height of approximately 245 feet. However, to provide flexibility in final design, this application is seeking a proposed maximum permitted building envelope that will extend vertically above the average curb level of each street frontage of the proposed development site to heights ranging from 243.91 feet to 253.47 feet for the roof of habitable space and from 283.91 feet to 293.47 feet for rooftop mechanical bulkheads, parapets, and rooftop horticultural and related space. The varying heights of the maximum permitted building envelope are due to the slightly sloped character of the site's topography and reflect a flat (horizontal plane) maximum height. This maximum permitted building envelope will cover the entire site, excluding a 30-foot wide enclosed driveway corridor at the western edge of the site where the building envelope will be limited to a height of 23 feet. The western, 23-foot tall proposed envelope will ensure that the proposed facility will comply with rear yard/rear yard equivalent requirements and that a structure enclosing the driveway corridor can be provided to a maximum height of 23 feet.

There will be a visitors' entrance for the jail on E. 142nd Street near Southern Boulevard, a public entrance for the court space on E. 141st Street near Bruckner Boulevard, and an entrance for the retail and/or community facility uses on E. 141st Street. The special permit plans identify the location of ground floor community facility/retail spaces, which are required to occupy area behind at least 75 percent of the length of walls to a depth of at least 20 feet from the building face within designated frontage zones, and also identify the location of building pedestrian entrances, which are required to face the indicated frontage. The 575-space accessory parking garage will operate as a self-park facility accessed via a two-way ramp from E. 141st Street with two inbound and one outbound lanes and a gate system located on the ramp and it will be limited to DOC employees and other authorized individuals. The accessory parking curb cut will be 32 feet wide (35 feet wide including splays) and will be located entirely within a curb cut zone on E. 141st Street spanning from a point on the west offset 100 feet from the intersection of E. 141st Street and Concord Avenue to a point on the east offset 230 feet from the intersection of E. 141st Street and Concord Avenue. There will be a 21-foot wide (24-foot wide with splays) curb cut for the entry to the one-way northbound private driveway at the western edge of the site that will provide access to loading berths and to the sallyport (a secured, controlled entryway for the transport of people in detention). There also will be one 21-foot wide (24-foot wide) curb cut on E. 142nd Street providing an exit for the private driveway. These curb cuts for the private driveway will be located 1.5 to 6 feet east of the western side lot line. There will be no curb cuts on the site's eastern frontages along Southern and Bruckner boulevards.

Along with the other borough-based jails, this facility will replace the existing Vernon C. Bain Center detention facility located on the Hunts Point waterfront. The Vernon C. Bain Center will be closed at a time to be determined, as a result of the completion of the Bronx Borough Based Jail. Any reuse of Vernon C. Bain Center would also be subject to a separate process that would be determined at that time.

Brooklyn

In Brooklyn, the proposed actions will facilitate a new jail with 1,437 beds. It will have a total of approximately 1,075,000 zsf of above-grade space, including approximately 1,045,000 zsf of housing for people in detention and support services space, and 30,000 zsf of storefront retail or community facility space, along with 292 secure accessory parking spaces located below grade.

Under the preliminary illustrative design for the Brooklyn borough-based jail, the building footprint will fully cover the site, providing streetwalls along all four frontages. The preliminary illustrative design for the Proposed Project consists of an approximately 80-foot tall base that fully covers the site and above the base it will have an E-shaped configuration with three wings extending south from an east-west "spine" extending along the Smith Street (north) side of the block toward Atlantic Avenue, with setbacks along Boerum Place, Atlantic Avenue, and Smith Street. As such, facing State Street the streetwall will rise without a setback to the approximately 395-foot tall roof. Facing Boerum Place and Smith Street, the streetwall will rise to a height of approximately 80 feet with a setback of varying depth before rising to the full building height. Facing Atlantic Avenue, the building will have alternating setbacks, with some portions of the streetwall setting back at approximately 80 feet and other portions, the aforementioned three wings, setting back at approximately 225 feet. However, to provide flexibility in final design, this application is seeking a proposed maximum permitted building envelope that will extend vertically to a height of 399.45 feet above the base plane for the roof of habitable space and to 439.45 feet above base plane for rooftop mechanical bulkheads, parapets, and rooftop horticultural and related space. This maximum permitted building envelope will cover the entire proposed project area.

There will be a staff pedestrian entrance on State Street, a visitors' entrance on Boerum Place, and entrances for the retail and/or community facility uses along the Atlantic Avenue frontage. The special permit plans identify the location of ground floor community facility/retail spaces, which are required to occupy area behind at least 75 percent of the length of walls to a depth of at least 20 feet from the building face within designated frontage zones, and also identify the location of building pedestrian entrances, which are required to face the indicated frontage. There will be three below-grade levels, occupied by accessory parking and other accessory functions. The parking garage will operate as a self-park facility accessed via a two-way ramp from Smith Street with two inbound and one outbound lanes and a gate system located on the ramp and it will be limited to DOC employees and other authorized individuals. The accessory parking curb cut will be 32 feet wide (35 feet wide including splays) and will be located entirely within a curb cut zone on Smith Street spanning from a point on the north offset 50 feet from the intersection of Smith Street and State Street to a point on the south offset 50 feet from the intersection of Smith Street and Atlantic Avenue. There will be a 21-foot wide (24-foot wide with splays) curb cut for the sallyport exit on Smith Street, also located within the aforementioned Smith Street curb cut zone, and a 21-foot wide (24-foot wide with splays) curb cut for the sallyport entry on State Street. There also will be a separate 21-foot wide (24foot wide with splays) curb cut for the off-street loading berths area on State Street. The State Street curb cuts will be located within a curb cut zone spanning from a point on the east offset 50 feet from the intersection of State and Smith streets to a point on the west offset 50 feet from the intersection of Boerum Place and State Street. There will be no new vehicular curb cuts on Atlantic Avenue and Boerum Place.

The facility will include one or more secure connections to the Brooklyn Central Courts Building on the north side of State Street, which could include the use of the existing tunnel linking the two blocks, and/or new tunnel(s) or new bridge(s). In addition, the proposed facility may also include extensions of cellar levels within the proposed demapping volume beneath State Street. (The street will remain a mapped city street at-grade within a volume bounded by upper and lower limiting planes and will continue to be open to vehicular and pedestrian traffic.)

Along with the other borough-based jails, this facility will replace the existing 815-bed, approximately 170-foot tall, 161,765-zsf (225,000-gsf) BDC.

Manhattan

In Manhattan, the proposed actions will facilitate a new jail with 1,437 beds. It will have a total of approximately 1,145,00 zsf of above-grade space, including approximately 1,125,000 zsf of housing for people in detention and support services space, plus approximately 20,000 zsf of community facility and/or retail space, along with approximately 125 secure accessory parking spaces located below-grade.

Under the preliminary illustrative design for the Manhattan borough-based jail, the building footprint will cover most of area currently covered by MDC South, MDC North, and the volumes of space above and below White Street, providing streetwalls along the Centre and Baxter street frontages. Although the new facility, when viewed in plan, will almost fully cover these areas, including White Street, there will be a 35 to 40-foot wide, 30 to 55-foot tall open pedestrian corridor (also referred to as a public arcade or passageway) at grade extending through the building on an east-west alignment. This pedestrian corridor will be covered by the building above, extending the full width of the block between Center and Baxter streets, and will be unenclosed at the portals and publicly accessible at all times. It will include lighting and other amenities. The preliminary plans include pedestrian corridor is to preserve east-west access through the Manhattan Civic Center, connecting Chinatown on the east and Tribeca on the west. There would be no vehicular access through this pedestrian corridor. It will be centered around the 35-foot wide, 30-foot tall White Street volume.

Apart from the pedestrian corridor, the preliminary illustrative design for the Proposed Project consists of an approximately 125-foot tall base and above that base it will have an E-shaped massing with three wings extending east from a north-south "spine" extending along Centre Street, though slightly set back from the property line. The wings will extend toward Baxter Street. There will also be setbacks from the southern edge of the building base, where the sallyport will lie between the jail and the existing Manhattan Criminal Court Building, in the same general location as the existing sallyport. Above the building base, these three wings and the spine will have a maximum roof height of approximately 450 feet above average curb level and rooftop mechanical bulkheads, parapets, and rooftop horticultural and related space will reach a maximum height of 490 feet above average curb level. There will be two levels below-grade. To provide flexibility in final design, this application is seeking a proposed maximum permitted building envelope that will extend vertically above the average curb level of the site to a height ranging from 449.10 to 453.43 feet for the roof of habitable space and ranging from 489.10 to 493.43 feet for rooftop mechanical bulkheads, parapets, and rooftop horticultural and related space. The varying heights of the maximum permitted building envelope are due to the slightly sloped character of the site's topography and reflect a flat (horizontal plane) maximum height. Coincident with the location of the proposed White Street volume, there will be an excluded volume from the proposed maximum building envelope measuring 35 feet wide

and 30 feet tall. In the court building portion of the zoning lot the special permit will establish a maximum permitted envelope coincident with existing building exteriors.

There will be a visitors' entrance for the jail on Centre Street north of White Street and entrances for the community facility/retail space on White Street and on Baxter Street north of White Street. The special permit plans identify the location of ground floor community facility/retail spaces, which are required to occupy area behind at least 75 percent of the length of walls to a depth of at least 20 feet from the building face within designated frontage zones, and also identify the location of building pedestrian entrances, which are required to face the indicated frontage. The 125-space accessory parking garage will operate as a selfpark facility accessed via a two-way ramp from Baxter Street with one inbound and one outbound lane and a gate system located on the ramp and it will be limited to DOC employees and other authorized individuals. The accessory parking curb cut will be 22 feet wide (25 feet wide including splays) and will be located entirely within a curb cut zone on Baxter Street spanning from the site's northern side lot line to a point on the south offset 100 feet from the northern side lot line. There will be a 50-foot wide (53-foot wide with splays) curb cut for the sallyport entrance on Centre Street, aligned with Bayard Street and there also will be a 50-foot wide (53-foot wide with splays) curb cut for the sallyport exit on Baxter Street. These sallyport curb cuts will be in the same general location as the existing sallyport curb cuts and will also be used to access all loading berths for the facility. There will be no vehicular curb cuts on White Street, which will be a pedestrian only street.

Similar to MDC South, the new Manhattan borough-based jail will include secure connections to the Manhattan Criminal Court Building.

Along with the other borough-based jails, this facility will replace the existing 898-bed, 13- and 14-story, approximately 435,000 gsf MDC North and South.

Queens

The proposed Queens borough-based jail main building will be located on the central portion of the proposed project area, with frontage on 126th Street and 132nd Street. It will cover areas currently occupied by QDC, 82nd Avenue, and the eastern portion of the Queens Borough Hall Parking Field. It will have a total of 1,437 beds and approximately 1,135,000 zsf, including approximately 1,110,000 zsf of housing for people in detention, support services space, and centralized care services, and 25,000 zsf of community facility space. The Queens facility will be the only borough-based jail to house female detainees. The building will also have 605 accessory parking spaces located below-grade. In addition, the proposed project will include 676 public parking spaces encompassing approximately 202,800 zsf in a separate public parking garage above-grade structure, located on the northern portion of the proposed project area with frontage on 126th Street, Union Turnpike, and 132nd Street. Based on a preliminary illustrative design, there will be an approximately 30-foot wide open area between the main jail building and the public parking garage structure.

The preliminary illustrative design for the jail building includes a two-story building base "podium" with a streetwall along 126th and 132nd streets and with setbacks above it of various depths and an overall building height, inclusive of rooftop mechanical, of approximately 270 feet. Also per the preliminary illustrative design, the public parking garage will have a height of approximately 77 feet. However, to provide flexibility in final design, this application is seeking a proposed maximum permitted building envelope that will extend vertically above the average curb level of each street frontage of the proposed development site ranging from heights of 262.95 feet to 292.92 feet for the roof of habitable space and from 302.95 feet to 332.92 feet for rooftop mechanical bulkheads, parapets, and rooftop horticultural and related space. The

varying heights of the maximum permitted building envelope are due to the sloped character of the site's topography and reflect a flat (horizontal plane) maximum height. This maximum permitted building envelope will cover the area to be occupied by the proposed jail and public parking garage. This bulk waiver area will not cover the remainder of the zoning lot, where existing buildings and open areas will remain and the special permit will establish a maximum permitted envelope coincident with existing building exteriors. This will enable existing buildings to remain, avoid non-compliances, and allow minor modifications to facades and roofs but prevent vertical or lateral expansions of building volumes.

There will be a visitors' entrance for the jail on 126th Street near 82nd Avenue, a staff entrance at the intersection of 82nd Avenue and 126th Street, and an entrance for the community facility uses on 126th Street midblock between Union Turnpike and 82nd Avenue. The special permit plans identify the location of ground floor community facility spaces, which are required to occupy area behind at least 75 percent of the length of walls to a depth of at least 20 feet from the building face within designated frontage zones, and also identify the location of building pedestrian entrances, which are required to face the indicated frontage. The jail building will have three below-grade levels, occupied by accessory parking and other accessory functions. The below-grade accessory parking garage in the jail building will operate as a self-park facility accessed from a two-way ramp on 132nd Street with two inbound lanes, one outbound, a pedestrian walkway, and a gate system located on the ramp and it will be limited to DOC employees and other authorized individuals. The accessory parking curb cut will be 32 feet wide (35 feet wide including splays) and will be located on 132nd Street.

The separate above-grade public parking garage will include vehicular access and egress on Union Turnpike and/or 132nd Street. Public parking garage curb cuts will be 32 feet wide (35 feet wide including splays) and will be located at least 50 feet from intersecting streets.

The jail building will also have a 21-foot wide (24-foot wide with splays) curb cut for the sallyport exit on 132nd Street (sallyport entry will be via an existing curb cut on 132nd Street adjacent to the Queens Criminal Court. Access to its loading berths will be via a 21-foot wide (24-foot wide with splays) curb cut on 132nd Street. All loading curb cuts will be located at least 50 feet from intersecting streets and meet other standard requirements. There will be no new vehicular curb cuts on 82nd Avenue, 126th Street, Hoover Avenue, or Queens Boulevard.

6. Actions Necessary to Facilitate the Project

The proposed borough-based jail system with its four sites in The Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens requires Public Facility-Site Selection approval and a zoning text amendment establishing the Borough-based Jails Special Permit. The Public Facility-Site Selection action also requires a Fair Share analysis, which is provided as part of this application. The Public Facility-Site Selection action is subject to ULURP and the zoning text amendment application is subject to public land use review with requirements similar to ULURP.

In addition, as detailed in the Introduction, the individual borough-based jail sites require additional land use approvals.

The following provides a list of all actions related to the borough-based jail system proposal. Except as noted, DOC and MOCJ are the applicants for the actions.

Citywide Actions:

- * A proposed zoning text amendment creating a new section of the ZR, "Borough-Based Jail System special permit," which will allow the City Planning Commission to modify zoning regulations related to use; bulk, including an increase in floor area ratio (FAR) related to courthouse and prison use; and accessory and public parking and loading for new jails subject to the related public facility-site selection action.
- * A public facility-site selection that will approve the siting of the four borough-based jails. This proposal requires a Fair Share analysis which is provided as part of this application. DCAS is a co-applicant for this action.

Bronx Action:

- * A city map change that will demap 82nd Avenue between 126th and 132nd streets. DOC is the applicant for this action.


7. Conclusion

The City's success in reducing crime and lowering the number of people in jail, coupled with grassroots support for closing the jails on Rikers Island, has allowed the City of New York, through DOC, to propose a borough-based jail system as part of the City's continued commitment to creating a modern, humane, and safe justice system that provides appropriate conditions for those who work and are detained there, providing community assets in the neighborhoods, and allowing the City to close the jails on Rikers Island. As discussed above, independent of the Proposed Project the City is implementing strategies to reduce the average daily jail population to 7,000 persons over the next five years, with the ultimate goal to reduce the total number of people in custody to 5,000. Since existing facilities apart from Rikers Island can accommodate only about 2,500 people, the City needs to create sufficient detention capacity at new facilities to facilitate the closure of the jails on Rikers Island as a detention facility.


This proposal is designed to accomplish a number of objectives:

- Strengthening connections to families and communities by enabling people to remain closer to their loved ones and other people, which allows better engagement of incarcerated individuals with attorneys, social service providers, and community supports so that they will do better upon leaving and would be less likely to return;
- Improving access to natural light and space for therapeutic programming, which results in calmer and more productive environments inside the facilities;
- Offering quality recreational, health, education, visitation and housing facilities, which support reengagement once they return to their community;
- Enhancing well-being of uniformed staff and civilian staff alike through improved safety conditions, which allows them to perform at the highest level; and
- Integrating the new facilities into the neighborhoods by offering community benefits and providing connections to courts and service providers.

The Proposed Project will complement existing justice facilities near each site, by reducing travel time delays and transportation costs that often result in delaying disposition of individual cases.




Figure 3a Site Photos




Figure 3c Site Photos


Figure 3d Site Photos






Figure 3f Site Photos


Figure 2a Site Photos






Figure 2c Site Photos


Figure 2d Site Photos






Figure 2f Site Photos








Figure 1b Site Photos


Figure 1i Site Photos




Figure 2a Site Photos

74-83 Public Service Establishments

74-831 Court houses

In all #Commercial Districts#, the City Planning Commission may permit modifications of the applicable #bulk# regulations so as to allow the same #bulk# regulations as would apply for a #community facility building# in the applicable #Commercial District# and may permit modifications of the applicable regulations in Sections 33-26 to 33-30, inclusive, relating to Yard Regulations or Sections 33-41 to 33-45, inclusive, relating to Height and Setback Regulations. The Commission shall find that because of site limitations such modifications are necessary for the proper design and operation of the court house.

The Commission may prescribe appropriate conditions and safeguards to minimize adverse effects on the character of the surrounding area.

<u>74-832</u> Borough-based jail system

For #zoning lots# that are the subject of a site selection for a borough-based jail system pursuant to application [application number], the City Planning Commission may, by special permit, allow modifications to the applicable regulations governing #uses#, #bulk#, including permitted

#floor area ratio#, the permitted capacities of #accessory# off-street parking facilities and #public parking garages#, and off-street loading regulations, to facilitate construction of the proposed facilities. In order to grant such special permit, the Commission shall find that:

- (a) <u>any #use# modifications will support the operation of the facility and will be compatible</u> with the essential character of the surrounding area;
- (b) ground floor #uses# will be located in a manner that is inviting to the public and will integrate the facility within the surrounding community:
- (c) any increase in permitted #floor area ratio# will facilitate the development of the facility;
- (d) <u>any #bulk# modifications will improve the interior layout and functionality of the facility;</u>
- (e) such #bulk# modifications, including any increase in permitted #floor area ratio#, will have minimal adverse effects on access to light and air for buildings and open spaces in the surrounding area;
- (f) any modifications to the provisions of #accessory# off-street parking and loading regulations will not create serious traffic congestion or unduly inhibit vehicular or pedestrian movement and will not impair or adversely affect the development of the surrounding area; and
- (g) any modifications to the permitted capacity of #public parking garages#:
 - (1) will not create serious traffic congestion or unduly inhibit vehicular or pedestrian movement and will not impair or adversely affect the development of the surrounding area; and
 - (2) will provide adequate reservoir space at the vehicular entrances to accommodate automobiles equivalent in number to 20 percent of the total number of spaces up to 50 and five percent of any spaces in excess of 200, but in no event shall such reservoir space be required for more than 50 automobiles.

The Commission may prescribe additional conditions and safeguards to minimize adverse effects on the character of the surrounding area.

The City of New York, through the New York City Department of Correction (DOC), the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice (MOCJ), and the New York City Department of Citywide Administrative Services (DCAS), is proposing to implement a borough-based jail system (the proposed project) as part of the City's continued commitment to create a modern, humane and safe justice system. The proposed project will develop four new detention facilities to house individuals who are in the City's correctional custody, with one located in each of the Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens. The proposed facilities will be completed and in operation by 2027.

The sites under consideration consist of the following:

- Bronx Site—745 East 141st Street (Block 2574, part of Lot 1), Bronx Community District 1
- Brooklyn Site—275 Atlantic Avenue (Block 175, Lot 1), Brooklyn Community District 2
- Manhattan Site—124-125 White Street (Block 198, Lot 1; Block 167, Lot 1), Manhattan Community District 1
- Queens Site—126-02 82nd Avenue and 80-25 126th Street (Block 9653, part of Lot 1; Block 9657, Lot 1), Queens Community District 9

Given the City's success in reducing both crime and the number of people in jail, coupled with the current physical and operational deficiencies at the correctional facilities located on Rikers Island, the City committed to closing the jails on Rikers Island. The 2017 report <u>Smaller, Safer, Fairer: A Roadmap to Closing Rikers</u> <u>Island</u> provides the City's roadmap for creating a smaller, safer, and fairer criminal justice system. Central to this effort is the City's goal to provide a system of modern borough-based detention facilities while reducing the number of people in the City's jails to a total average daily population of 5,000 persons.

Under the proposed project, all individuals in DOC's custody will be housed in the new borough-based detention facilities and the City will close the jails on Rikers Island. One facility will be located in each of the Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens. Individuals will be housed according to their borough of residency to facilitate accessibility among family members, local service providers, and other visitors. Locations for the proposed facilities therefore sought proximity to public transportation to ensure that DOC staff, family members, defense attorneys, social service providers, and other service providers and visitors are able to easily access their jobs, loved ones, and clients.

In contrast to Rikers Island, which presently requires the inefficient transporting of people in detention off the Island for court appearances and appointments, locations for the proposed facilities further sought adjacency to the boroughs' courts to expedite trial times, reduce delays in case processing, and increase operational efficiencies. Where court-adjacent sites could not physically accommodate the necessary population, those in close proximity were selected. DOC will retain the operational flexibility to house individuals according to borough of defense in instances where frequent inter-borough transportation to the courts will be required and/or for those individuals with cases in multiple boroughs. Transporting people in detention between borough-based jail facilities and court sites located in another borough offers efficiencies relative to existing conditions at Rikers Island, whereby DOC must transport more than 1,000 people on and off the Island each day for court appearances and other off-site appointments across the five boroughs.¹

In total, the proposed project will provide approximately 5,748 beds to accommodate an average daily population of 5,000 people in a system of four borough-based jails, while allowing space for fluctuations in the jail population and population-specific housing requirements, such as those related to safety, security,

health, and mental health, among other factors. Each of the proposed facilities will provide approximately 1,437 beds to ensure an equitable distribution of the City's jail population across the four boroughs.

Each facility will be designed to minimize the effect on the surrounding neighborhood urban design while also achieving efficient and viable floorplans that optimize access to program space, outdoor space, and natural light. The borough facilities will be designed to be self-sufficient buildings, with smaller housing units that allow officers to better and more directly supervise as a result of the improved floorplans. The proposed project contemplates providing sufficient space for effective and tailored programming, appropriate housing for those with medical, behavioral health and mental health needs, and the opportunity for a more stable reentry into the community. Additionally, the facilities will provide natural light, neutral colors, and furnishings that convey a "normalized" environment of operations to support the safety and well-being of both staff and those who are detained in the City's correctional custody.²

A guiding urban design principle for the proposed project is neighborhood integration. This includes promoting safety and security, designing dignified environments, leveraging community assets, and providing added value and benefits to the surrounding neighborhoods. The new buildings will be integrated into the respective neighborhoods, providing connections to courts and service providers and also offering community benefits and amenities. The proposed project is intended to strengthen connections between people who are detained and their families and communities through allowing people to remain closer to their loved ones. This also allows for better engagement of incarcerated individuals with attorneys, social service providers, and community supports, helping them maintain relationships with people from the community who can support them upon release and improve outcomes with respect to homelessness, unemployment, mental health, and likelihood of returning to jail.

The proposed project seeks to create four detention facilities of sufficient size to efficiently achieve the goals and objectives described above. Multiple smaller detention facilities would not allow for the criminal justice reform measures that are inherent in the current facility programming. Programming such as access to natural sunlight, access to outdoor recreation space, and in-unit spaces for service providers help reduce recidivism and will increase safety for staff and persons in detention. Smaller detention centers that incorporate these programmatic elements would be costlier and operationally inefficient, as they would need to provide redundant facility programming to serve smaller populations in each location. The proposed project therefore ensures that each borough facility has ample space to support correctional uses as well as other programming specific to the proposed project. Detention and ancillary support spaces will include quality educational programming, recreation uses, therapeutic services, publicly-accessible community space, and staff parking. The proposed detention facilities will also include a public entrance and lobby, as well as visitation space, space for robust medical screening for new admissions, medical and behavioral health exams, health/mental health care services, medical clinics and therapeutic units, and administrative space. The community space is intended to provide useful community amenities, such as community facility programming or street-level retail space.

Each proposed facility location is City-owned property but requires a number of discretionary actions that are subject to the City's Uniform Land Use Review Procedures (ULURP). The following system-wide land use actions are required for all four proposed facilities:

• A public facility-site selection that will approve the siting of the four borough-based jails. In the case of the Bronx, this will be a new facility that will replace and expand the capacity of an existing facility located elsewhere in the borough. In Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens, these will be new facilities replacing existing facilities and expanding the on-site capacity. DOC, MOCJ, and DCAS are co-applicants for this action; and

• A zoning text amendment to create a new special permit ("Borough-Based Jail System special permit") for borough-based jails that will allow the City Planning Commission (CPC) to modify zoning regulations related to use; bulk, including an increase in floor area ratio (FAR) related to courthouse and prison use; and accessory and public parking and loading.

Other actions necessary to develop the proposed facility at each site, including, but not limited to, changes to the City map, are described in greater detail in the sections below.

This Fair Share analysis has been prepared for public review as part of the ULURP process. Consistent with the Fair Share Criteria, this Fair Share analysis assesses the compatibility of each of the below four proposed sites with its surroundings and other nearby City facilities, potential negative impacts on the neighborhoods, and consistency with the needs of the communities.

<u>Bronx</u>

The proposed Bronx facility will be located at 745 East 141st Street (Block 2574, part of Lot 1) in the Mott Haven neighborhood of Bronx Community District 1. The Bronx site is within the block bounded by East 142nd Street, Southern Boulevard, Bruckner Boulevard, East 141st Street, and Concord Avenue, and is currently occupied by the NYPD's Bronx Tow Pound (hereafter the "proposed Bronx jail site"). The proposed Bronx jail site will exclude the western portion of the block within 100 feet of Concord Avenue, which will be rezoned to facilitate future development. DOC and MOCJ are proposing a series of land use actions to facilitate a new jail with 1,437 beds and support services at the proposed Bronx facility, including a zoning special permit pursuant to the proposed borough-based jails zoning text amendment, and site selection for public facilities as described above. The proposed Bronx jail site will have approximately 1,270,000 gross square feet in total, including approximately 1,220,000 gross square feet of housing for people in detention and support services space, 10,000 gross square feet of court and court-related space, including space for a proposed parole violation court, and approximately 40,000 gross square feet of storefront retail and/or community facility space. The site will further accommodate approximately 575 secure accessory parking spaces in a below-grade garage. It will reach a maximum height of 245 feet as measured from the groundfloor base plane.³

<u>Brooklyn</u>

The proposed Brooklyn facility will be located at 275 Atlantic Avenue (Block 175, Lot 1) in the Downtown Brooklyn neighborhood of Brooklyn Community District 2, a full-block site currently occupied by the Brooklyn Detention Complex (hereafter the "proposed Brooklyn jail site"). In addition to the two system-wide land use actions described above, requested approvals to facilitate a new jail with 1,437 beds and support services at the proposed Brooklyn jail site include a zoning special permit pursuant to the proposed borough-based jails zoning text amendment, and a demapping of above- and below-grade volumes of State Street between Boerum Place and Smith Street to facilitate the construction of pedestrian bridges and/or tunnels connecting the proposed detention facility to existing court facilities and allow for the placement of accessory space below the street. The proposed facility will have a total of approximately 1,190,000 gross square feet of housing for people in detention and support services space and 30,000 gross square feet of storefront retail or community facility space, along with 292 secure accessory parking spaces located below grade. It will have a maximum permitted building envelope of 395 feet above the base plane.

<u>Manhattan</u>

The proposed Manhattan facility will be located at 124-125 White Street (Block 198, Lot 1 and Block 167, Lot 1) in the Civic Center neighborhood of Manhattan Community District 1, bounded by Centre Street, Hogan Place, Walker Street, and Baxter Street (hereafter the "proposed Manhattan jail site"). The proposed Manhattan site is presently occupied by the Manhattan Detention Complex (MDC), which includes MDC North, a 9-story detention facility located at 124 White Street, and MDC South, a 14-story building at 125 White Street informally known as "The Tombs". Collectively, MDC North and MDC South presently house approximately 435,000 gross square feet of court and detention center uses and approximately 898 beds for men in detention.

In addition to the two system-wide land use actions described above, requested approvals to facilitate a new jail with 1,437 beds and support services at the proposed Manhattan jail site include a zoning special permit pursuant to the proposed borough-based jails zoning text amendment; the acquisition by the New York City Department of Citywide Administrative Services (DCAS) of the leasehold interest of retail space in the MDC North Tower; and a City Map Change, which is being certified concurrently with this application, to demap above- and below-grade volumes on White Street and narrow and realign the right-of-way to facilitate the conversion of the at-grade street to a pedestrian corridor and allow the Manhattan boroughbased jail to occupy space above and below the street. In addition to the 815,011 square feet of existing court space that is to remain in the Manhattan Criminal Court building on the zoning lot, the proposed Manhattan jail facility will add a total of approximately 1,270,000 gross square feet of above-grade space, including approximately 1,250,000 gross square feet of housing for people in detention and support services space and 20,000 gross square feet of community facility and/or retail space. The site will further accommodate approximately 125 secure accessory parking spaces located below grade. Furthermore, the proposed project will be connected to the Manhattan Criminal Court at 100 Centre Street at the ground level and via upper level pedestrian bridges, while White Street will function as a pedestrian-only street between Baxter Street and Centre Street. It will have a maximum building height of 450 feet above the ground plane.

Queens

The proposed Queens borough-based jail will be located at 126-02 82nd Avenue (Block 9653, part of Lot 1) and 80-25 126th Street (Block 9657, Lot 1) in the Queens Civic Center neighborhood, which is an enclave on the northeastern edge of the Kew Gardens neighborhood in Queens Community District 9 (henceforth referred the "proposed Queens jail site"). The site occupies the northern portion of an irregularly-shaped parcel bounded by 132nd Street, 82nd Avenue, Queens Boulevard, and Hoover Avenue and the entire block bounded by Union Turnpike, 126th Street, 82nd Avenue, and 132nd Street. The site also includes the streetbed of 82nd Avenue between 126th Street and 132nd Street, which will be demapped as part of the proposed project. The site is currently occupied by the Queens Detention Complex (QDC), which is no longer used as a detention facility but rather as support space for court operations, including holding space for detainees brought to the Queens Courthouse for a court appearance. DOC and MOCJ are proposing a zoning special permit pursuant to the proposed borough-based jails zoning text amendment in addition to the aforementioned City Map Change and the two system-wide land use actions to facilitate a new jail with 1,437 beds and support services at the proposed Queens jail site.

In addition to the 439,006 square feet of existing court space to remain in the Queens Criminal Court building, the proposed new detention facility will add approximately 1,258,000 gross square feet to the zoning lot, including approximately 1,233,000 gross square feet of housing for people in detention, support services space, and centralized care services and approximately 25,000 gross square feet of storefront retail or community facility space. The proposed site will also accommodate approximately 605 accessory parking spaces located below grade, along with a 676-space public parking garage intended for visitors to the proposed jail and others currently using on-street parking that will be eliminated as a result of the proposed project. The proposed jail facility will have a maximum permitted building height of 270 feet above the ground-floor base plane.

FAIR SHARE ANALYSIS

Fair Share analyses have been prepared in accordance with the Criteria for the Location of City Facilities and the "Fair Share" Criteria: A Guide for City Agencies.

SECTION 4 | Criteria for Siting or Expanding Facilities

4.1 The sponsoring agency and, for actions subject to the Uniform Land Use Review Procedure (ULURP) or review pursuant to Section 195 of the Charter, the City Planning Commission, shall consider the following criteria:

4.1(a) Compatibility of the facility with existing facilities and programs, both city and non-city, in the immediate vicinity of the site.

Bronx | 745 East 141st Street

The proposed Bronx site is at 745 East 141st Street, currently the location of a surface lot facility (the NYPD Bronx Tow Pound). The proposed Bronx jail will occupy a 148,400-square-foot zoning lot. The site is located between East 142nd Street, East 141st Street, Southern Boulevard, and Concord Avenue, and abuts the Bruckner Expressway to the east.

According to the New York City Department of City Planning Community Board Profile, land use patterns within, or nearly within, 400 feet of the proposed Bronx site are characterized by a mix of predominately light industrial and utility uses to the north, south, and east, and single family, two-family, and multifamily residential uses to the west. The study area is further bisected by the Bruckner Expressway (I-278) along with the abandoned Port Morris train tracks to the east. The Bruckner Expressway acts as a buffer between the project site and additional industrial uses to the east, and most residential uses are located further to the west of the site.

Urban design in the area is characterized primarily by industrial uses, including storage warehouses, light industrial buildings, and institutional buildings. In addition, residential uses are located to the west, including row homes and apartment buildings ranging from two to six stories. The southern, northern, and eastern portions of the 400-foot perimeter are developed with industrial buildings of varying heights and sizes, including one-story warehouses on narrow lots and enclosed parking lots for vehicle storage to the south and taller storage buildings with larger footprints to the north.

A mixed residential and commercial building will occupy the western portion of the proposed Bronx site, containing uses that are consistent with those located within the surrounding 400-foot and quarter-mile radii. It is expected that the proposed project will activate the surrounding streetscape with new ground-floor uses, widen and improve the sidewalks around the project site, and provide additional street furniture and landscaping on the sidewalks that will provide for a more active and pedestrian-friendly environment compared to today, whereupon a parking lot bordered primarily by a tall metal fence currently occupies the site. The proposed Bronx detention center will be located on the eastern portion of the site, thereby placing the tallest portion of the development away from residential uses to the west and nearer to taller buildings and the Bruckner Expressway viaduct, a large piece of transportation infrastructure, to the east. For additional detail on the compatibility of existing transportation infrastructure, please refer to 6.1(d).

The proposed Bronx site is located at a point of transition between a mixed-use residential neighborhood and a homogenous industrial area. The proposed project's design would relate to both areas, with the smaller mixed-use building to the west and the larger detention facility on the east side of the site alongside the elevated Bruckner Boulevard viaduct. According to the New York City Department of City Planning Facilities Database, surrounding facilities include, in addition to the Tow Pound located on the proposed site, four facilities within, or nearly within, 400 feet of the Bronx site (see appendix for a detailed list). Included among such facilities are Care for the Homeless, a social services facility for the homeless; Rockway Fuel Oil Corporation, an oil and home heating company; the South Bronx Mental Health Council, an outpatient substance abuse treatment center; and a vacant City-owned property. These facilities are depicted in a map in the appendix. There are no other justice and corrections facilities in the immediate vicinity of the site.

With the majority of inmate services, such as health, programming, and visitation, provided on-site, the proposed project will minimize direct conflicts to the surrounding neighborhood and facilities owing to the introduction of new detention-related uses, and will furthermore enhance positive trends within the study area by developing new community and retail facilities intended to serve both the existing community as well as new worker-, resident-, and visitor-generated demand introduced by the proposed project. As seen in the neighborhoods surrounding the existing Brooklyn and Manhattan jails, detention facilities have not inhibited economic activity within close proximity to detention facility uses; on the contrary, both existing facilities are surrounded by thriving retail and neighborhood corridors. Based on limited evidence of incompatibility with the first justice and correction facility in the area, along with conformity between existing land use patterns and proposed new public facility, residential, and retail uses, it can be concluded that the proposed Bronx jail is consistent with, and will not present conflicts toward, the existing facilities identified in the immediate vicinity.

Brooklyn | 275 Atlantic Avenue

The proposed Brooklyn site is at 275 Atlantic Avenue, currently the location of the existing Brooklyn Detention Complex, an 11-story, 225,000-gross-square-foot building housing 815 beds for those undergoing the intake process or awaiting trial in Brooklyn or Staten Island. The proposed project would replace the existing Brooklyn Detention Complex with a new detention facility atop the 59,900-square-foot lot located between Boerum Place and Smith Street, and State Street and Atlantic Avenue.

The study area within, or nearly within, 400 feet of the proposed site is characterized by the high-density civic core and commercial neighborhood of Downtown Brooklyn to the north, and the medium-density residential neighborhoods of Cobble Hill and Boerum Hill to the south. Atlantic Avenue serves as the primary arterial road in the study area, providing access to the project site while also serving as a buffer from the residential neighborhoods to the south. Local retail uses dot the study area, primarily along Court Street, Smith Street, and Fulton Street.

According to the New York City Department of City Planning's Facility Database, there are 41 facilities within immediate vicinity of the site (see appendix for a detailed list). In addition to the Brooklyn Detention Complex and Kings County Criminal Court, other justice and corrections facilities in the 400-foot study area include the Appellate Division Second Judicial Department and the Office of Court Administration. The Mental Hygiene Legal Services of the Appellate Division Second Department provides protective legal services and assistance to mentally disabled persons under the care or jurisdiction of State-operated or licensed facilities. The Collapsable Giraffe, Friends of the New York Transit Museum, and the Brooklyn Ballet are cultural institutions located near the site. Health care facilities include St. Vincent's Mental Health Services and the Brooklyn Health Center. One house of worship, the Brooklyn Tabernacle, is located on Smith Street between Fulton and Livingston streets. There is also a NYC Transit facility in addition to seven other transportation facilities. Schools (K-12) in proximity include the Brooklyn Frontiers High School, NYC Restart Brooklyn Youth, and the Sterling School. Other educational institutions include the Brooklyn Law School, at the corner of Joralemon and Adams streets, and the Packer Collegiate Institute, located along the northern edge of the study area on Joralemon Street.

As the site is replacing the existing Brooklyn Detention Complex, the proposed project is compatible with and will greatly benefit from proximity to the justice and public institution facilities in adjacent and nearby lots, in particular the borough's criminal court. This proximity will significantly increase the project's operational efficiencies, leading to a reduction in travel time and fewer City resources required to transport detained individuals with hearings or arraignments to the courthouse, thereby reducing delays in case processing. In addition, other facilities in the nearby vicinity are also compatible with the proposed use. The site's proximity to private parking facilities, for example, offers compatibility with proposed uses, as it will give visitors and staff additional parking options. Each of the proposed jail facilities further incorporates parking as part of the design, which will mitigate the burden of staff parking in the neighborhood. For details on the compatibility of existing transportation infrastructure, please refer to 6.1(d). Finally, while there are residential uses within 400 feet of the proposed site, the project is located at the site of an active detention center which has not demonstrated incompatibility with existing uses.

The new Brooklyn jail facility will furthermore offer opportunities for collaboration with surrounding educational institutions: Students from the Brooklyn Law School, for example, could provide legal assistance to detainees, while faculty from other surrounding educational institutions could offer education and vocational training programming to individuals housed within the new Brooklyn facility. Similar programs currently serve the population on Rikers, including the Justice-in-Education Initiative that provides college-oriented educational programming to those detained on Rikers Island while equipping students and faculty with a deeper understanding of contemporary criminal justice issues. DOC staff could also partner with surrounding K-12 institutions to educate local youths on criminal justice issues, grow support for the movement to end mass incarceration, and help to reduce the fear and stigma surrounding jails by encouraging use of the shared community facilities at the proposed site. Such efforts reinforce the compatibility of the proposed new facility with surrounding institutional uses.

In summary, there are no expected conflicts between the proposed project and existing facilities and programs, as the proposed Brooklyn site is located in a dense, mixed-use area which already includes civic facilities and institutions, and the proposed facility will not introduce any new uses.

Manhattan | 124-125 White Street

The proposed Manhattan borough-based jail site spans four distinct parcels. Existing facilities on the proposed site include the Manhattan Detention Complex (MDC), which houses a 9-story North Tower and a 14-story South Tower, with approximately 435,000 gross square feet of court and detention center uses and 898 beds for people in detention. MDC North and South are to be demolished and replaced by the proposed facility, which is of the same use. The two existing towers operate largely as one facility and are connected by a bridge above and a tunnel below White Street. The MDC South Tower is also connected by two bridges and the cellar level to the Manhattan Criminal Court at 100 Centre Street. The site also includes the portion of White Street between Centre and Baxter Streets that is proposed to be demapped and remapped.

The area promotes a wide range of land uses, with a concentration of public institution uses on the lots surrounding the proposed Manhattan jail site, commercial office buildings to the north and south of the proposed site, and mixed-use residential and commercial buildings to the northwest and northeast. The broader neighborhood contains a wide range of uses, from industrial to commercial, and residential. The proposed project site is sheltered from these wider uses since it is surrounded by similar public institution uses.

The area within, or nearly within, a 400-foot radius surrounding the proposed project area encompasses much of the Manhattan Civic Center but also includes adjoining areas of Chinatown to the north and east and Tribeca to the west. Small portions of SoHo and Little Italy also lie within the northern edge of the 400foot radius area. The Manhattan Civic Center broadly defined is a multi-block area bound by Centre Street, Broadway, and Lafayette Street to the west, Walker Street to the north, Baxter Street and Pearl Street to the east and Park Row and the Brooklyn Bridge approach to the south. It is home to numerous high-rise federal, state, and city public facilities. Public institutional uses predominate in the central and southern portions of the 400-foot radius: Besides MDC North and South and the Manhattan Criminal Court Building, the area also includes the Lefkowitz State Office Building (immediately south of the proposed Manhattan site), Manhattan Civil Courthouse (immediately west of the proposed site), New York County Supreme Court, the Health Building, Thurgood Marshall US Courthouse, US Court of International Trade, and the Metropolitan Correctional Center.

According to the New York City Department of City Planning Facilities Database, there are 55 City and non-City facilities within 400 feet of the Manhattan site (see appendix for a detailed list), including 18 justice and corrections facilities that are mostly housed in 100 Centre Street and 111 Centre Street. Justice and corrections facilities include the New York City Criminal Court, New York County Supreme Court, Office of Court Administration, and other facilities that perform supporting functions to the courts such as the New York County Jury Operations. Parks and plazas in the surrounding area include Collect Pond Park, west of the project site. Human services facilities include the Manhattan Housing Court Office and the Manhattan Forensic Psychiatry Court Clinic. These and additional facilities are depicted in the appendix.

The Manhattan site is located adjacent to residential, commercial, and cultural uses. To reduce potential impacts, circulation for the proposed site has been strategically designed such that all sallyport activity and detainee transfers will take place within the building itself. According to CEQR Technical Manual Guidelines, the project is not expected to adversely affect publicly-accessible open space. While the proposed project will introduce new demand on public open space resources owing to increased volumes of workers and visitors, the passive open space ratio for non-residential users within a 400-foot radius of the proposed site will remain well above the guidelines indicated in the CEQR Technical Manual. Like each of the proposed facilities, the proposed Manhattan jail site also incorporates parking as part of the design, which will mitigate the burden of staff parking in the neighborhood. For details on the compatibility of existing transportation infrastructure, please refer to 6.1(d).

In summary, the proposed Manhattan site is located within a dense civic center that contains numerous justice facilities, including the New York County Criminal Court and New York County District Attorney, interspersed with public spaces and parks. As the proposed facility is replacing an existing facility of the same use, the new facility will be compatible with the existing uses in the study area. Proximity to these uses, in particular the New York County Criminal Court, will greatly increase operational efficiencies for the proposed project, leading to a reduction in the time and resources required to transport detained individuals with hearings or arraignments to the courthouse.

Queens | 126-02 82nd Avenue

The proposed Queens site is at 126-02 82nd Avenue, currently the location of the Queens House of Detention and an adjacent parking lot. The existing facility is attached to the Queens Criminal Court, and within a campus setting that includes the Queens Borough Hall. It is buffered from the surrounding area by arterial commercial corridors and highways including Queen Boulevard to the west, the Grand Central Parkway, Jackie Robinson Parkway, and Union Turnpike to the north, and the Van Wyck to the east.

The study area is characterized by institutional and commercial uses in the area immediately surrounding the proposed site, with residential uses further to the west and to the east. According to the New York City Department of City Planning Facilities Database, there are 23 facilities within, or nearly within, 400 feet of the site, including six justice and corrections facilities. The Queens County Jury office is located in Queens Borough Hall and the remaining sites – which include the Queens Criminal Court, New York City Criminal Court Queens County, Queens County Supreme Court, Queens County Law Library, and Office of Court Administration – are located within the Queens Civic Center. Four transportation facilities include the NYC Department of Transportation's Queens Borough Commissioners' Office and Roadway Repair and Maintenance Administrative Office, Silver Towers Garage, Central Parking System of New York, and the Queens Borough Hall Municipal Parking Garage. There are four parks, plazas, and cultural institutions, including the Latin American Cultural Center of Queens, Manton Playground, Maple Grove Park, and Hoover Sitting Area along Queens Boulevard. These and additional facilities are depicted in the appendix.

The site is the location of a former detention center facility still used for detainee intake and transfer, and the proposed project is compatible with and will greatly benefit from proximity to the justice facilities in adjacent and nearby lots, in particular the borough's criminal court. Currently, individuals with hearings or arraignments at the Queens courthouse must be transported from Rikers Island or facilities in other boroughs. The project's proximity to the courthouse will significantly increase operational efficiencies, leading to a reduction in time and City resources needed to transport detained individuals with hearings or arraignments at the courthouse. There are no expected conflicts between the proposed project and existing facilities and programs, as the project site is located in the civic center of Queens, adjacent to civic facilities, including the courthouse. The proposed project would introduce new non-residents (e.g. workers and visitors) to the site, thereby increasing demand on public open space resources in the immediate area, though not to an extent deemed significant under the *CEQR Technical Manual Guidelines*, which suggests sufficient levels of open space will remain available with the proposed project. While there are residential uses within the 400-foot study area, the site is isolated within the area surrounded by Queens Boulevard, the Grand Central Parkway, and the Van Wyck Expressway, which together create a physical buffer between the existing justice and correction uses and any proximate residential uses.

For details on the compatibility of existing transportation infrastructure, please refer to 6.1(d).

4.1(b) Extent to which neighborhood character would be adversely affected by a concentration of city and/or non-city facilities.

Bronx | 745 East 141st Street

The proposed Bronx site is located in Mott Haven and is within Bronx Community District 1. The surrounding neighborhood includes low-density light industrial and manufacturing uses to the north, south, and east and low-density residential to the west. Further west of the site can be found a mix of uses, predominantly residential and commercial.

The proposed Bronx site is located within an Industrial Business Zone (IBZ). While the administration does not support rezoning IBZs for residential use, an action being sought under the proposed project for the western portion of the site, it is determined that the proposed residential disposition site is appropriate for residential use because it is located on the western edge of the Port Morris IBZ, adjacent to existing residential uses, and is not occupied by an industrial land use. In addition, the proposed residential disposition site was identified as a desirable location for residential use in previous community-led planning processes. The proposed rezoning would only affect this site, and would not alter the City's broader policy regarding residential uses within IBZs

Within a half-mile radius from the proposed Bronx site, there are no other justice or corrections uses. Overall, there are 153 facilities within a half-mile radius, the majority of which are neighborhood-serving facilities (see Figure 1 below).⁴ Among the three most common facility types are 62 Education, Child Welfare, and Youth facilities, 24 Parks, Gardens, and Historical Sites, and 23 Core Infrastructure and Transportation facilities. These facilities are depicted in a map and listed in the appendix.

It is not expected that the new jail facility will contribute to a concentration of facilities that would adversely affect neighborhood character, as there are no additional justice or corrections uses within the half-mile radius, and most existing facilities serve customary neighborhood needs. Therefore, the proposed project will not cause an undue concentration of similar facilities. For details on concentrations of all residential facilities, please refer to section 6.53.

The proposed detention facility and mixed-use building, while introducing new uses and building forms into the study area, will not significantly affect any of the defining features of the neighborhood, and will not contribute to residential or economic displacement (refer to the Draft Environmental Impact Statement for additional detail). The Bronx detention facility will further include on-site programming spaces, minimizing impacts on the surrounding neighborhood. Recent experience further demonstrates that jail sitings do not result in higher crime rates or increased threats to public safety in the surrounding areas: In 2012, the year in which the Brooklyn Detention Complex reopened, the area experienced a steeper reduction in crime than any other precinct in Brooklyn North. The City continues to invest in crime reduction tactics through the Mayor's Action Plan for Neighborhood Safety (MAP) and the Office to Prevent Gun Violence (OPGV), among other initiatives.

Brooklyn | 275 Atlantic Avenue

The proposed Brooklyn site is located in Downtown Brooklyn and is within Brooklyn Community District 2. The surrounding neighborhood contains high-density mixed use residential, commercial, and institutional uses. Further south and west of the site, predominant uses are single- and two-family homes. Further north of the site includes dense civic, commercial, and institutional uses, such as the Kings County Supreme Court and Brooklyn Law School.

The site is located in a dense civic and commercial core of the borough, with a large number of facilities in the area. Within a half-mile radius, there are a total of 413 facilities (see Figure 2 below). The majority of these facilities serve regional needs (versus local neighborhood needs), based on the dense and civic nature of the surrounding neighborhood character and its function as the borough's downtown and central business district. Education, Child Welfare, and Youth facilities, such as schools and daycares, are the most common type of facilities, with a total of 148 facilities in the study area. Health and Human Services account for 78 of the facilities in the area, and 42 are Administration of Government facilities. These facilities are depicted in a map and listed in the appendix.

Facilities in the study area are primarily regional facilities, and 29 of the 241 regional facilities are defined as justice and corrections uses. Most justice uses are to the north of the site, near the Kings County Supreme Court. One of the most common uses is human services, which encompasses a variety of facilities including the Legal Aid Society and the Catholic Migration Downtown Brooklyn Office, along with CASES and the HOPE Program, two social service organizations located approximately three to four blocks north of the site that provide reentry services for formerly incarcerated individuals. While some of the human services uses serve similar populations as the justice and corrections facilities and therefore contribute to a concentration of facilities, it is beneficial to co-locate such facilities in the civic center to increase operational efficiency through proximity to the courthouses and to allow accessibility to major transit lines for families, lawyers, and service providers. And while the proposed Brooklyn facility will be a replacement and significant expansion of the existing jail, due to its location within a high-density civic core, this expansion is not expected to generate significant impacts on the neighborhood character or exacerbate the adverse effects of an existing concentration of public facilities.

In examining the existing facilities and programs (including the current Brooklyn Detention Center) and taking into consideration planned improvements to the facility, it is anticipated that the proposed project will have negligible impacts on overall population and economic activity. The 2004 rezoning of Downtown Brooklyn spurred rapid development in the area, especially of residential units. Over 790 new residential units have been built since 2014 within a quarter-mile radius, and the growth in residential units is expected to continue, with more than 150 units in the pipeline to be delivered across five buildings including at 88 Schermerhorn Street and at 7 Boerum Place, both expected to reach over 250 feet in height. The scale and density of the proposed project will be in keeping with the high concentration of commercial and residential uses throughout the northern portion of the study area and throughout Downtown Brooklyn, where multiple developments in excess of 30 stories are planned or under construction, including the 90-story 9 DeKalb Avenue and 68-story 138 Willoughby Street. An active ground floor-use along Atlantic Avenue will also be consistent with surrounding retail and community facility uses along that avenue. Additionally, based on *CEQR Technical Manual Guidelines*, the proposed project will not have significant impacts on land use or socioeconomic conditions.

While the proposed Brooklyn detention facility will be taller than the existing buildings in the study area, it will remain in-line with the densely-developed Downtown Brooklyn setting and is not expected to negatively impact neighborhood character or urban design. The northern portion of the study area, for example, contains multiple buildings that are over 200 feet in height, including several over 300 feet. In addition, the planned building at 11 Hoyt Street will be approximately 591 feet tall, and thus will stand substantially taller than the proposed project. An activated ground floor, with multiple entries and uses that will include retail or community facilities, will furthermore enliven the pedestrian experience and conform with the busy Atlantic Avenue street corridor. Refer to the Draft Environmental Impact Statement for additional details.

Manhattan | 124-125 White Street

The proposed site is located at the edge of the Civic Center and Chinatown neighborhoods in Lower Manhattan, situated on the border of Manhattan Community Districts 1, 2, and 3. The surrounding neighborhood contains high-density mixed-use residential, commercial, and office buildings, as well as public facilities. To the northwest of the site sits medium-density mixed-used buildings in SoHo and Little Italy. Density increases as does the number of commercial uses as one moves further south from the site.

The site is located in a dense civic and commercial core of the borough, resulting in a high number of facilities in the area. Within a half-mile radius, there are 643 facilities, including a significant number of regional facilities befitting the area's civic nature (see Figure 3 below). There are 142 Education, Child Welfare, and Youth facilities, 79 Libraries and Cultural Programs, and 82 Parks, Gardens, and Historical Sites, making these the most common uses found within the study area. These facilities are depicted in a map and listed in the appendix.

Forty-eight justice and corrections facilities exist within a half-mile of the project site, including two existing detention centers – the City-owned Manhattan Detention Complex at 125 White Street and the federal Metropolitan Correctional Center at 150 Park Row. The proposed facility is intended to replace the existing jail at 125 White and will maintain the same land uses on the project site with an expanded new, modern detention facility and ground-floor retail and/or community facility space. The proposed project would be compatible with and supportive of surrounding institutional, civic, and government uses, particularly those to the southeast of the project site and the Manhattan Criminal Courts Building immediately to the south of the project site. The proposed project would represent a continuation of a detention facility use within the study area, a use that has been present in this area since 1838. Due to the site's location in a highly-dense civic core, an expansion of existing correction uses is not expected to have significant impacts on the neighborhood character or exacerbate the adverse effects of an existing concentration of public facilities.

In addition to the existing detention facility, the ground floor of MDC North includes five commercial retail storefronts occupied by three restaurants, one deli, and one pharmacy. These five businesses will be displaced by construction of the proposed project on the Manhattan site. The City continues to work with the existing merchants to identify relocation options for during and after the construction of the proposed project; however even if these businesses are permanently displaced, their displacement would not result in significant adverse effects on the socioeconomic conditions within the study area as these businesses are not uniquely important to the study area, and all have multiple substitute or similar businesses within the area which customers could alternatively frequent. The proposed project will allow for new retail space to be tenanted by the existing businesses or by new businesses. Furthermore, the proposed project is projected to

introduce new daily workers and visitors to the area who will be expected to patronize study area businesses, adding to the potential customer base for these businesses.

The expansion of the facility is not expected to impact broader use and development trends based on recent development activity in the areas surrounding the active detention complex in Downtown Brooklyn, which has seen significant residential and commercial development in the years following the reopening of the Brooklyn Detention Complex, as well as that surrounding the existing detention complex in Manhattan. Since 2014, more than 80 residential units and 200 hotel rooms have been delivered within a quarter-mile radius of the proposed Manhattan site. Further to the south and west, pipeline and recently-constructed developments, such as 111 Murray Street, 45 Park Place, and 267 Broadway, are all completed or approved at over 400 feet.

The proposed Manhattan facility will be compatible with and supportive of surrounding institutional, civic, and government uses, particularly those in the superblock to the southeast and the Manhattan Criminal Court adjacent to the site, and would be keeping with the current high-density uses in the area, such as the Thurgood Marshall Courthouse (590 feet tall), and the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of New York (410 feet tall). According to CEQR Technical Manual Guidelines, the proposed project will not have a significant adverse impact on the urban design of area, which contains a mixture of building types, styles, and sizes, including stone-clad municipal buildings on Centre Street, three- to four-story buildings in the Little Italy and Chinatown neighborhoods, parking lots and a 26-story hotel building on the streets north of the project site, older cast iron store and loft buildings in the Tribeca East and SoHo neighborhoods, and buildings over 200-feet tall along Broadway and other surrounding locations. Refer to the Draft Environmental Impact Statement for additional details.

Queens | 126-02 82nd Avenue

The proposed Queens site is located in Kew Gardens and is on the border of Queens Community Districts 6, 8, and 9. The surrounding neighborhood contains medium-density commercial and office buildings, and low-to medium-density residential uses. Further east and west of the site include low-rise residential units.

Within a half-mile radius of the proposed Queens site, there are 85 facilities (see Figure 4 below). The three most common facility types include 33 Education, Child Welfare, and Youth facilities, 14 Health and Human Services Facilities, and 12 Core Infrastructure and Transportation facilities. These facilities are depicted in a map and listed in the appendix.

The neighborhood accommodates an approximately equal distribution of neighborhood and regional facilities, with many regional facilities housed at the Queens Borough Hall and Queens Civic Center. There are six facilities that are associated with justice and corrections uses, with no other detention uses. The proposed facility is intended to be located at the site of the existing, though inactive, detention facility and

buffered from surrounding uses via expressways. Therefore, it is not expected to have significant impacts on the neighborhood character or exacerbate the adverse effects of an existing concentration of public facilities.

In examining the existing facilities and programs and taking into consideration planned improvements to the existing facility once rebuilt, it is anticipated that the proposed project will have a negligible impact on overall population and economic activity. The proposed project will be supportive of and compatible with local institutional and civic uses. The scale and heightened density of the proposed facility will be buffered from the surrounding residential neighborhoods by Queens Boulevard to the west, the Van Wyck expressway to the east, the Jackie Robinson Parkway to the north, and Maple Grove Cemetery to the south. While there have been no new major developments in the study area in the past five years, the block south of Queens Boulevard already has a number of taller buildings, including the Silver Towers luxury high-rise building at 125-10 Queens Boulevard. The proposed ground floor use will also be consistent with the commercial ground floor uses along Queens Boulevard. Based on CEQR Technical Manual Guidelines, the proposed project will not have significant impacts on land use or socioeconomic conditions.

The proposed project in Queens will not have a significant adverse impact on urban design. The proposed garage will be consistent with the uses and heights of buildings in the study area and will also be located adjacent to parking lots and busy transportation corridors. The proposed 270-foot-tall detention facility, while considerably taller than the majority of buildings in the study area, will be comparable in height to taller buildings within the half-mile study area. The proposed Queens detention facility will also have a large footprint, but one that is compatible with other nearby buildings such as Queens Borough Hall and the Queens County Criminal Courts building.

The proposed detention facility will be set back from the main pedestrian corridor of Queens Boulevard, reducing its visibility to the existing pedestrian environment on Queens Boulevard. The proposed project will provide a continuation of the active pedestrian environment of Queens Boulevard, with a building that meets the sidewalks, street furniture and tree plantings, and pedestrian entrances for the community facility spaces, for visitors and staff, as well as for the main entry. The wide transportation corridors that transect the study area will serve as buffers between the proposed project and the surrounding residential neighborhoods of Kew Gardens, Regency Park, and Briarwood. The study area contains a mixture of building types and sizes, including the detached single-family houses of the Kew Gardens and Regency Gardens neighborhoods, mixed-use buildings lining Queens Boulevard, and brick apartment towers in the Briarwood neighborhood. The proposed detention facility will contribute to the variety of buildings that compose the urban design character of the study area. Refer to the Draft Environmental Impact Statement for additional details.

4.1(c) Suitability of the site to provide cost-effective delivery of the intended services. Consideration of sites shall include properties not under city ownership, unless the agency provides a written explanation of why it is not reasonable to do so in a particular instance.

Through the <u>Smaller, Safer, Fairer: A Roadmap to Closing Rikers Island</u> published in June 2017, the Mayor expressed his dedication to closing the jails on Rikers Island and the need for the willingness of neighborhoods and elected officials to identify appropriate new sites in the Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, and Queens. The locations for these sites were selected based on the following principles in addition to those identified in the Fair Share criteria:

- 1) Proximity to courthouses to reduce delays in cases and the time people stay in jail.
- 2) Accessibility to public transportation so family members, lawyers, and service providers can easily visit.
- 3) Sufficient size to fit an equitable distribution of the City's jail population across four boroughs, with space to provide a humane, safe, and supportive environment.
- 4) City-owned land that would allow for swift development of the new jail and could accommodate a new facility while enhancing and supporting the existing community.

Chief among these goals is proximity to borough courthouses, which greatly improves operational efficiencies as detained individuals can be easily transported to the courthouses for trials, thereby reducing delays in case processing along with the expenditure of City resources. In addition to the locational criteria, sites must be of sufficient size to support the proposed programming, which includes housing, programming, and health services spaces to support the projected population. Based on best practices for architectural layouts, sites must be at minimum one acre, or 43,560 square feet, with a minimum of 100 feet dimension, and accessible on all sides (with no party walls to surrounding premises). The study of potential sites included examining City-owned sites directly adjacent to each borough courthouse, or if unable or unsuitable for the development of the program, in proximity to the courthouse.

In addition, the City set a timeline to close the jails on Rikers within ten years, beginning in 2017. As well, New York State dictated that construction on the new facilities must begin promptly through its issuance of design-build allowances granted through the *Fiscal Year 2019 Executive Budget*. Legislative approval for the allowance mandated that Requests for Qualifications for design-build teams must be released within two years. Given these considerations, acquisition or condemnation of privately-owned sites would have rendered the timelines unachievable. *Smaller, Safer, Fairer: A Roadmap to Closing Rikers Island* also outlined strategies for improving the conditions of jails to include better physical spaces for housing, improved programming, and visitation. To accommodate the operations and improved conditions of the facilities, a large footprint is required for each of the facilities, which can be costly if privately-owned sites were to be acquired or condemned.

Bronx | 745 East 141st Street

While the proposed facility will not be directly adjacent to the Bronx's civic center, the site is easily accessible to the Bronx Hall of Justice and Criminal Court. For those who will be transported, the site is approximately 2 miles from the Bronx Criminal Court and is easily accessible by the Bruckner Expressway and Major Deegan Expressway. Compared with the distances between the courthouse and Rikers Island and the Vernon C. Bain Center (approximately 9 miles and 3 miles, respectively), travel times will be shortened and will result in fewer resources required for transportation.

Within a three-block radius, the Bronx site is accessible via two subway stations served by the 6 subway line. These include the Cypress Avenue station and the East 143rd Street – St. Mary's Street station. In addition to subways, there are two MTA public bus routes (Bx17 and Bx33) with stops within or near a quarter mile radius of the Bronx site.

In addition, the site is of sufficient size at 148,400 square feet and of adequate shape to provide the capacity to accommodate an efficient footprint for the necessary program and support services. The proposed project will redevelop the eastern portion of the site with a new detention facility containing approximately 1.27 million gross square feet, including approximately 1,437 beds for people in detention; support space; community facility space; court-related facilities; and approximately 575 accessory parking spaces. Finally, the site is currently owned by the City, eliminating the need to carry acquisition costs and thereby increasing cost-effectiveness.

The construction of a new facility at 265 East 161 Street, directly east of the Bronx Criminal Court, was assessed as an alternate site. While the site's proximity to the courthouse was ideal, the site's footprint rendered it too small and irregularly shaped (even when taking into consideration adjacent parcels) to accommodate the capacity that is required without significant operational inefficiencies. The DOC parking lot on Sherman Avenue located directly north of the Bronx County Hall of Justice was also considered as an alternate site (both alternative sites constitute parts of Block 2444, Lot 1). The site's adjacency to the courthouse allowed for convenient access; however, the small lot size would not accommodate the capacity and footprint needed for the detention center.

Brooklyn | 275 Atlantic Avenue

The proposed Brooklyn site is optimal to provide cost-effective services for the proposed project. The site's adjacency to the Kings County Criminal Court significantly improves the project's operational efficiencies. By connecting the detention facility to the courthouse, detained individuals can be transported easily for trials and arraignments, significantly reducing personnel and transportation costs associated with traveling long distances, as required currently when transporting individuals detained on Rikers Island. In addition, proximity to the courthouse will reduce delays in case processing due to missed trials, and thus may reduce the time an individual is detained along with the costs associated.

The proposed site is also well-connected via transit and will enable ease of visitation by staff, family members, lawyers, and service providers. Within a quarter-mile radius, the site is accessible via eight subway stations. These include: Bergen Street station, served by the F and G lines; Hoyt—Schermerhorn station, served by the A, C, and G lines; Hoyt Street-Fulton Mall station, served by the 2 and 3 lines; the two stations that make up the Jay Street—MetroTech station complex, served by the A, C, F, and R lines; and the three stations comprising the Borough Hall/Court Street station complex, served by the 2, 3, 4, 5, and R lines. In addition to subways, there are 13 MTA public bus routes (B25, B26, B38, B41, B45, B52, B57, B61, B62, B63, B65, B67, and B103) with stops within or near a quarter mile radius of the Brooklyn site.

In addition, the site is of sufficient size at 59,900 square feet and of regular shape to provide the capacity to accommodate the necessary program and support services. The proposed project will replace the existing 225,000-gross-square-foot Brooklyn Detention Complex containing 815 beds with a new detention facility containing approximately 1.2 million gross square feet, including approximately 1,437 beds for people in detention; support space; community facility and/or retail space; and approximately 292 accessory parking spaces. The site's relatively large footprint prevents the need to build a taller, less efficient jail on a site with a smaller footprint. Fewer floors and a shorter elevator will have substantial impact in reducing construction costs as compared to sites of a smaller footprint. Finally, the site is currently owned by the City, eliminating the need to carry acquisition costs and thereby increasing cost-effectiveness.

No alternate sites were analyzed due to lack of additional viable sites adjacent to the courts and the fact that the current location meets all the siting criteria.

Manhattan | 124-125 White Street

The proposed Manhattan site is optimal to provide cost-effective services for the proposed project. The site's adjacency to the Manhattan Criminal Court significantly improves the project's operational efficiencies. By locating the detention facility adjacent to the courthouse, detained individuals can be transported easily for trials and arraignments, significantly reducing personnel and transportation costs associated with traveling long distances, as happens currently when transporting individuals detained on Rikers Island. In addition, proximity to the courthouse will reduce delays in case processing due to missed trials, and thus may reduce the time an individual is detained and the costs associated.

A total of six NYCT local bus routes operate within ¹/₄-mile of the Manhattan Site. These include the M9, M15, M22, M55 and M103 routes and the M15 Select Bus Service (SBS) route. In addition, approximately ten NYCT express bus routes serve stops within ¹/₄-mile of the site, including the SIM1, SIM1c, SIM2, SIM3c, SIM4/4x, SIM4c, SIM32 and SIM34 Staten Island services and the X27 and X28 Brooklyn services. NJ Transit route 120 buses also stop along Broadway in the vicinity of the site.

In addition, the site has sufficient size – at 149,427 square feet at-grade – and is of regular shape to provide the capacity to accommodate the necessary program and support services. The proposed project will replace the existing Manhattan Detention Complex North and South Towers containing approximately 898 beds with a new detention facility containing approximately 1.27 million gross square feet, including approximately 1,437 beds for people in detention; support space; community facility and/or retail space; and approximately 125 accessory parking spaces. The site's relatively large footprint prevents the need to build a taller, less efficient jail on a site with a smaller footprint. Fewer floors and a shorter elevator will have substantial impact in reducing construction costs, as compared to sites of a smaller footprint. Finally, the

site is currently owned by the City, eliminating the need to carry acquisition costs and thereby increasing cost-effectiveness.

The site at 124-125 White Street was identified as the Manhattan site early in the project planning process but was subsequently moved to the Louis J. Lefkowitz State Office Building at 80 Centre Street (Block 166, Lot 27) as project planning advanced. The ability to construct a cellar level for 80 Centre Street would have provided additional space to accommodate parking facilities that will not be available at 125 White Street. In addition, 80 Centre Street is surrounded on four sides by streets, allowing for flexibility of options for access. Having its own property lines on all four sides, as opposed to shared property lines, would have allowed for an unobstructed envelope, allowing for fewer floors and a shorter elevator that has substantial impact in reducing construction costs and would increase operational efficiency as there would have been less frequent need to move up and down within the building. The 80 Centre Street site was removed from consideration in response to community opposition expressed through the CEQR public scoping process and the City's community engagement efforts, as well as due to challenges associated with relocating various existing offices at 80 Centre Street that would have made siting a jail there far more complicated and costly than had been originally anticipated. As currently proposed, 80 Centre Street is not part of the proposed project. The existing uses in 80 Centre Street, including the Manhattan District Attorney's office, will remain in place with the proposed project.

Queens | 126-02 82nd Avenue

The proposed Queens site is optimal to provide cost-effective services for the proposed project. The site's adjacency to the Queens County Criminal Court significantly improves the project's operational efficiencies. By locating the detention facility connecting to the courthouse, detained individuals can be transported easily for trials and arraignments, reducing personnel and transportation costs associated with traveling long distances, as required currently to transport individuals detained on Rikers Island. In addition, proximity to the courthouse will reduce delays in case processing due to missed trials, and thus may reduce the time an individual is detained, and the costs associated.

The proposed Queens site is also well-connected via transit to enable ease of visitation by staff, family members, lawyers, and service providers. Within a quarter-mile radius, the Queens site is accessible via the Union Turnpike/Kew Gardens Station, which is served by the E and F routes at all times. In addition to subways, there are 9 different MTA public bus routes (Q10, Q37, Q46, Q60, QM18, QM21, X63, X64, and X68) with stops within or near a quarter mile radius of the Queens site.

In addition, the site has sufficient size – at 378,145 square feet – and is of adequate shape to provide the capacity to accommodate the necessary program and support services. The proposed project will redevelop the existing Queens Detention Complex and adjacent parking lot with a new detention facility containing approximately 1.3 million gross square feet, including approximately 1,437 beds for people in detention plus support services space; a centralized care facility; community facility space; approximately 605 accessory parking spaces within the detention facility; and an adjacent above-ground parking structure providing approximately 676 public spaces. These parking spaces, at 1,281 in total, will replace and more than double the number of existing spaces currently available on-site at the municipal surface lot as well as spaces lost due to demapping along 82nd Avenue and street traffic changes and curb cuts along 132nd and 126th Street. Finally, the site is currently owned by the City, eliminating the need to carry acquisition costs and thereby increasing cost-effectiveness.

No alternate sites were analyzed due to the fact that the current location meets all the siting criteria.

4.1(d) Consistency with the locational and other specific criteria for the facility identified in the Statement of Needs or, if the facility is not listed in the Statement, in a subsequent submission to the Borough President.

The expansion of borough-based jails to support the closing of Rikers Island is listed in the FY 2020/FY 2021 Citywide Statement of Needs, published in November 2018 (see relevant excerpts in Appendix G-1). Within 90 days of receipt, Borough Presidents and Community Boards may submit comments on the Statement of Needs to the NYC Department of City Planning (DCP). At the end of the 90-day commenting period, responses were recorded from Brooklyn Community Board 2, the Brooklyn Borough President, and the Bronx Borough President (see relevant excerpts from all comments in Appendix G-2).

In its response, Brooklyn Community Board 2 stated that it would schedule a public hearing on the applications and render its determination within the allotted timeframe established by the Uniform Land Use Review Procedure (ULURP). In his response, the Brooklyn Borough President acknowledged the objectives of the borough-based jails plan and indicated that he will comment upon the requested siting after Community Board 2 has had the opportunity to state its position and following his public hearing set to occur as part of ULURP. The Bronx Borough President agreed with the closure of the jails on Rikers Island in his comments on the Statement but opposed the siting and size of the proposed facility, suggesting instead that alternative locations near the Bronx Hall of Justice be considered. The Bronx Borough President further indicated support for the relocation of the NYPD Tow Pound from the proposed Bronx site, provided that any use of the vacated property be developed exclusively for residential use.

Additional comments from the Queens Borough President were received after the Fair Share Analysis was submitted to the City Planning Commission for certification into ULURP on March 25, 2019. Section 4.1(d) below and Appendix G-2 have been updated to reflect the Queens Borough President's comments, and revised Fair Share materials will continue to be filed to reflect any additional comments received on the Statement of Needs related to the proposed siting of the borough jails.

The Queens Borough President expressed her commitment to criminal justice reform in comments on the Statement of Needs, though indicated concerns with the planning and implementation process for the closure of the jails on Rikers Island and the siting of the new facility in Queens. The Queens Borough President attached as reference a letter sent to the Mayor on January 15, 2019, which echoed concerns over the lack of meaningful local engagement on the borough-based jails plan to-date. She concluded her comments by requesting that the process be restarted to allow for greater engagement of affected stakeholders. For further detail on the City's community engagement process to-date, please refer to Section 4.2(a)-Manhattan and Section 4.2(b) below.

4.1(e) Consistency with any plan adopted pursuant to Section 197-a of the Charter.

There are no adopted 197-a plans for the Community Districts where the proposed sites are located.

SECTION 4.2 | Procedures for Consultation

4.2(a) Consider the Mayor's and Borough President's strategic policy statements, the Community Board's Statement of District Needs and Budget Priorities, and any published Department of City Planning land use plan for the area.

While not formally included in the Mayor's Strategic Policy Statements, the Mayor has called for the closure of the jails on Rikers Island within ten years. The Mayor has supported the replacement of the jails on Rikers with a network of smaller jails built proximate to borough courthouses, as highlighted in the <u>Smaller, Safer, Fairer: The City's Roadmap to Closing Rikers Island</u> report. The borough-based jails put forth as part of this project are crucial to advancing the Mayor's mandate.

Bronx | 745 East 141st Street

The proposed borough-based jail facility was not an explicit part of the Borough President's Strategic Policy Statements, Community District Needs, and land use plans. Bronx Community Board 1's FY 2019 Community District Needs Statement expressed the need for affordable housing, job opportunities, and increased access to health care. While there is no expected significant impact to access to health care or job opportunities, a portion of the site to the west is planned to be used for development of affordable housing, furthering the goals of the Statement of Needs. A recent Strategic Policy Statement from the Borough President was not available.

Brooklyn | 275 Atlantic Avenue

The proposed borough-based jail facility in Brooklyn was not an explicit part of the Borough President's Strategic Policy Statements, Brooklyn Community District Needs Statements, or any published Department of City Planning land use plans. In the Brooklyn Borough President's 2014 Strategic Policy Statement, "Reforming the Criminal Justice System" was listed as one of the Borough President's priority issues. The document outlined the goals of addressing disparities in the criminal justice system and expanding mediation programs designed to keep youth and those who commit lesser crimes out of the system. Though it does not explicitly decrease the number of people in the criminal justice system, the proposed facility supports the Brooklyn Borough President's larger interests in criminal justice reform. In particular, Brooklyn detainees that would otherwise have been relocated to Rikers Island will be able to remain closer to the courthouses, reducing delays in case processing and providing greater ease of visitation by families, lawyers, and service providers.

In commenting on the Draft Scope of Work, the Brooklyn Borough President recommended that construction include one of more levels beneath the State Street roadbed to allow as much programming as possible to be placed below-grade in order to reduce the height of the proposed new detention facility. The Final Scope of Work has been revised to include the demapping of volumes above and below State Street as a proposed action for the Brooklyn site, which will facilitate future potential development beneath the roadbed, provide for more efficient operations for persons in detention and more seamless and secure connections with adjacent justice services including the Brooklyn Central Courts building.

To facilitate further reductions in height, the Brooklyn Borough President also suggested that detainees with significant mental health deficiencies would be better-served by a detention facility in direct proximity to psychiatric support services, and recommended short- and long-term residential treatment facilities as alternatives to traditional incarceration. The proposed project contemplates that each facility would provide medical and mental health services, including therapeutic housing units, as well as treatment for substance use disorders. The City is also in the process of studying whether certain medical or mental health needs of persons in detention could be more appropriately treated in off-site medical settings. Several key criminal justice initiatives aimed at serving New Yorkers with severe mental health needs that come into contact with the justice system also include: Behavioral Health Task Force, Crisis Intervention Training for officers, and Justice Involved Supportive Housing (JISH).

Manhattan | 124-125 White Street

The proposed borough-based jail facility in Manhattan was not an explicit part of the Borough President's Strategic Policy Statements, Community District Needs, and land use plans.

Community Boards 1, 2, and 3's FY 2019 Community District Needs Statements highlight affordability, social services, and overcrowding as common priorities and concerns. Affordability of the neighborhood, social services (for the elderly population), and overcrowding is not expected to be significantly impacted by the proposed facility. A recent Strategic Policy Statement from the Borough President was not available publicly.

In commenting on the Draft Scope of Work, the Manhattan Borough President suggested that a more robust public planning process is required in order for community members to engage over the most appropriate uses for the site, and further recommended that the pedestrian and vehicular experience should be taken

into consideration as part of the project. The City has complied with all mandated procedures in providing for public review during the environmental review process for the proposed project, holding four public meetings to receive comments on the Draft Scope of Work and extending the public comment period, and is committed to working with local communities to identify community needs at each of the proposed sites.

Separate and apart from the CEQR process, the City has also actively engaged the potentially-affected communities through Neighborhood Advisory Committees (NACs) established in all four boroughs. The NACs were formed to provide community members with concrete opportunities to voice concerns, receive updates, provide feedback and to help shape the new facilities. The NACs are comprised of community leaders and are making a list of recommendations ("Guidelines and Principles") regarding community investments/needs; ways to improve how these facilities will be integrated into the surrounding neighborhood, including a memorialization of top community concerns; and how to use the community-related facility space within each borough jail. The NAC recommendations will be a public document available on the Close Rikers project webpage and shared with all parties involved in the ULURP review process—Community Boards, Borough Presidents, City Planning Commission, and City Council—as an advisory document and incorporated as a chapter in the master plan. The City is also continuing to meet with community-based organizations, elected officials, and Community Boards to discuss criminal justice reform and conduct robust public engagement for all proposed sites so that potentially-affected communities can weigh in and have their voices heard. A detailed list of outreach efforts can be found in the appendix.

The Manhattan Borough President also expressed concerns over indirect business displacement at the proposed alternative site at 80 Centre Street, stating that uncertainty surrounding the future location of the Marriage Bureau and other offices currently housed at 80 Centre Street could harm workers, clients, and businesses. She recommended that all environmental analysis include 125 White Street as an alternative site. The proposed Manhattan site has since been changed from 80 Centre Street to 124-125 White Street, and the potential for direct and indirect business displacement will be evaluated as part of the environmental review process.

Queens | 126-02 82nd Avenue

The proposed borough-based jail facility in Queens was not an explicit part of the Borough President's Strategic Policy Statements, Community District Needs, or land use plans. The FY 2019 Community District Needs Statements from Queens Community Boards 6, 8, and 9 emphasized the expansion of affordable housing, senior services, accessible transit, parks, and schools. The re-introduction of the jail to the site is not expected to have any significant impacts on any of the needs stated above. The Queens 2014 Strategic Policy Statement included strategic goals and policies, such as increasing police presence and surveillance, to improve public safety. However, there were no goals outlined for criminal justice reform.

4.2(b) Meetings, consultation or communications with the Community Board and/or Borough President.

The City has engaged representatives of the respective Community Boards through its Neighborhood Advisory Councils, one in each of the four boroughs. The Neighborhood Advisory Councils convened with the City on a monthly or near-monthly basis between October 2018 and March 2019. In addition to these meetings, the City has presented plans to other elected officials and local stakeholders in each of the boroughs. Consultations with Community Boards and Borough Presidents are highlighted below, with a more comprehensive list of engagement and outreach efforts provided in Appendix F.

Bronx | 745 East 141st Street

The City presented at a public hearing hosted by the local Councilmember in mid-September 2018. As part of the environmental review process, the City hosted a public scoping meeting on October 3, 2018 at the Bronx County Courthouse.

Brooklyn | 275 Atlantic Avenue

The City met with Brooklyn Borough President Eric Adams on August 10, 2018 to discuss plans for the facility. As part of the environmental review process, the City hosted a public scoping meeting on September 10, 2018 at PS 133 William A. Butler School, during which time representatives of the Borough President were present.

Manhattan | 124-125 White Street

The City informed the Borough President of plans for the proposed project at 80 Centre Street in July 2018, and met again with her office on August 1, 2018. The City presented information on the plan to representatives from the local and adjacent Community Boards in August 2018. Following, the City presented information regarding the project and site at a Community Board meeting for Community Boards 3 and 6 on September 6, 2018. In addition, the City presented the proposed project at 80 Centre Street during a public hearing hosted by the local Councilmember, in which the Borough President made remarks, in early September 2018. As part of the environmental review process, the City hosted a public scoping meeting for the site at 80 Centre Street on September 27, 2018 at the Manhattan Municipal Building, during which time the Borough President made remarks. The Mayor also met with local stakeholders and community leaders on December 18, 2018 following the change in location of the jail site to 124-125 White Street.

Queens | 126-02 82nd Avenue

The City informed the Borough President of plans for the project and project site in July 2018. As part of the environmental review process, the City hosted a public scoping meeting on September 26, 2018 at the Queens Borough Hall.

SECTION 6 | Criteria for Siting or Expanding Regional/Citywide Facilities

6.1 The sponsoring agency and, for actions subject to ULURP or review pursuant to Section 195 of the Charter, the City Planning Commission, shall consider the following criteria:

6.1(a) Need for the facility and expansion. Need shall be established in a citywide or borough-wide service plan or, as applicable, by inclusion in the city's ten-year capital strategy, four-year capital program, or other analyses of service needs.

The FY 2018 Executive Ten-Year Capital Strategy provided \$1.1 billion in allocation to the Department of Corrections for the design and construction of new jail facilities. Recognizing the need to replace the facilities on Rikers Island, most of which were built more than 40 years ago and create serious challenges to the safe and humane treatment of those in detention, and the limitations that the physical isolation of Rikers placed on the transformative vision contemplated under the City's proposal, citywide policy has focused on identifying sites for new facilities elsewhere in the boroughs. In addition, the State of New York granted the City design-build abilities explicitly for the construction of new facilities in replacement of the jails on Rikers Island, as stated in the Fiscal Year 2019 Executive Budget.

<u>Smaller, Safer, Fairer: A Roadmap to Closing Rikers Island</u>, was released in June 2017 and is part of the City's continued commitment to create a modern, humane and safe justice system. Most facilities on Rikers Island were built decades ago and the Island is geographically isolated from the rest of the city and can only be accessed by a small, narrow bridge connecting it with Queens. The isolation makes it difficult for DOC staff, family members, defense attorneys, social service providers, and other service providers and visitors to access their jobs, loved ones, and clients. Additionally, the location of Rikers Island is inefficiently located from the borough courthouses, which results in an increase in related costs to the City while transporting more than 1,000 people on and off the island each day for court appearances. Given the age and current conditions of facilities on Rikers Island, it is evident that new or expanded facilities are necessary to transition into safer, more just, and conveniently-located jail facilities. With the Mayor's support, the report includes 18 strategies to ultimately reduce the jail population to 5,000, allowing for the closure of the jails on Rikers Island and transition to the proposed borough-based jail system.

6.1(b) Distribution of similar facilities in the city. To promote the fair geographic distribution of facilities, the sponsoring agency should examine the distribution among the boroughs of existing and proposed facilities, both city and non-city, that provide similar services, in addition to the availability of appropriately zoned sites.

Outside of Rikers Island, there are currently over a dozen detention center facilities in New York City, which includes City-, State-, and federally-controlled facilities. Of these facilities, approximately half are City-controlled and half are non-City controlled facilities. Overall, there are four in Brooklyn, three in Queens (not including facilities on Rikers Island), four in Manhattan, and two in the Bronx. There are nine facilities on Rikers Island, eight of which are actively used. The facilities are listed in Figure 5 below.

While the number of detention facilities in Manhattan, Queens, and Brooklyn are similarly distributed, the capacity of beds in these facilities is vastly unequal. Detention centers are disproportionately sited in Queens, which hosts approximately 75% of total capacity throughout the boroughs. This is due to the large capacity on Rikers Island, which currently contains about 11,300 beds.⁵ While the population on Rikers Island has been steadily declining, a majority of the city's 8,000 jailed population are still detained on the Island.

The proposed project will allow for a more equal distribution of beds amongst the boroughs, locating those who are detained in closer proximity of their families, communities, lawyers, and other necessary services. Proximity to each borough's courthouse will increase operational efficiencies when transporting those in detention and will subsequently reduce case processing times. Because of limitations in terms of size and proximity to the courthouses which guided site selection criteria, many of the proposed sites are on the same or in close proximity to parcels that currently house detention facilities. Within 400 feet and half-mile of each proposed site, only Manhattan will have a second detention facility, the federal Metropolitan Correctional Center, in close proximity (the current Manhattan Detention Complex will be shuttered).

In addition to traditional detention center facilities, there are six City-controlled in-use Close to Home facilities in the Bronx, four of which are non-secure detention (NSD) facilities, which offer less restrictive settings for low-risk juvenile delinquents with court cases pending in Family Court, with the remainder classified as limited-secure placement (LSP) facilities, which house youths who typically present higher risks compared to those placed in an NSD setting.⁶ Three in-use Close to Home facilities – all of them NSDs – are located in Brooklyn. There are three NSDs located in Queens, along with one LSP. Full details on in-use Close to Home facilities by borough can be found in Maps E1-E4 and Table E2 in the Appendix.

6.1(c) Size of the Facility.

Following the policy changes outlined in <u>Smaller, Safer, Fairer: A Roadmap to Closing Rikers Island</u>, the overall population of those who are detained is expected to decrease to 5,000 in order to viably close the jails Rikers Island. To account for fluctuations in the population and varying housing needs of specific persons who are detained, the required number of total beds is approximately 5,748. To distribute the population across the four boroughs, each site must hold approximately 1,437 beds each, which will increase economies of scale for on-site support, such as health, programming, visitation, and other spaces, and achieve an efficient and cost-effective delivery of services.

6.1(d) Adequacy of the streets and transit to handle the volume and frequency of traffic generated by the facility.

Bronx | 745 East 141st Street

The proposed Bronx site is accessible by motor vehicle, public transportation, walking, and bicycle. While the proposed project will potentially result in significant adverse impacts to vehicular traffic, the proposed Bronx site is optimally situated close to major arterial roadways, public transit, and suitable pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure that together will be able to accommodate the volume and frequency of movements generated by the proposed project while also achieving the core objectives of the borough-based jails plan.

Transit Access

Within a quarter-mile radius, the Bronx site is accessible via two subway stations served by the 6 subway line. These include the Cypress Avenue station and the East 143rd Street – St. Mary's Street station. In addition to subways, there are two MTA public bus routes (Bx17 and Bx33) with stops within or near a quarter mile radius of the Bronx site.

Vehicular Access

Under future conditions with the proposed action, there will be increases in traffic volumes, particularly during peak hours associated with major employee shift changes, including during weekdays 6:30 AM to 7:30 AM and 2:45 PM to 3:45 PM and on Saturdays 2:45 PM to 3:45 PM. The traffic volumes generated by the proposed action will result in the potential for significant adverse impacts at multiple intersections during one or more of these peak periods, pursuant to *CEQR Technical Manual Guidelines*. Implementation of signal timing changes are being proposed and would provide mitigation for some of the potential traffic impacts, subject to review and approval by the New York City Department of Transit (DOT). The remainder of the affected intersections and lane groups have the potential for unmitigated significant adverse impacts.

The Bronx site is in close proximity to the Bruckner Expressway, which is a principal arterial expressway and a designated through truck route. The expressway starts from just south of the Bronx and Pelham Parkway intersection in Pelham Bay Park where it changes from New England Thruway and continues south to the

⁶ Per the NYC Administration for Children's Services, Close to Home allows people to receive therapeutic services at small group homes in or near the five boroughs where they are close to resources that can support their treatment and transition back into their communities.

Robert F. Kennedy (RFK) Bridge, formerly the Triborough Bridge. In the vicinity of the Bronx site, it exists as an elevated highway above the at-grade Bruckner Boulevard.

The Bronx site is accessible from Bruckner Expressway in the southbound direction via the E. 138th Street exit (Exit 48) ramp which connects to Bruckner Boulevard just north of E. 142nd Street. In the northbound direction, the site is accessible via the E. 138th Street exit (Exit 48) ramp off the approach to RFK Bridge.

Within the larger vicinity of the Bronx site there are two other major limited access facilities (Major Deegan Expressway and RFK Bridge).

Located approximately half-mile southwest of the Bronx site is the Major Deegan Expressway (Interstate 87) which serves the western part of the Bronx and provides access to Manhattan via several bridges spanning the Harlem River and access to New Jersey via the George Washington Bridge. This principal arterial expressway, which runs along the east shore of the Harlem River begins at the northern border of the Bronx in Van Cortlandt Park, and travels south where it meets the Bruckner Expressway and the RFK Bridge. North of the Bronx, this interstate highway continues as the New York State Thruway. From the Bronx site, this highway can be accessed via an entrance on E. 135th Street, just west of Cypress Avenue. Vehicles inbound to the area near the Bronx site (coming from the west) utilize the Brook Avenue exit (Exit 1) which connects to E. 134th Street, near Brook Avenue.

The RFK Bridge is a principal arterial expressway that provides a vehicular connection from both Queens and Manhattan to the Bronx, and direct access to the Brooklyn-Queens Expressway (Interstate-278) (BQE). From the Bronx site, this bridge is accessible via Bruckner Boulevard.

The Bronx site is located on a portion of the block (Block 2574) bounded by E. 142nd Street to the north, E. 141st Street to the south, Southern Boulevard to the east, Bruckner Boulevard to the southeast, and Concord Avenue to the west. Wales Avenue, which formerly divided this property into two blocks, extends north and south from the center portion of the block.

E. 142nd Street is a westbound local street with termini located at Southern Boulevard to the east, and Powers Avenue to the west. The intersection of E. 142nd Street and Concord Avenue is all-way stopcontrolled with pedestrian crossings marked by high visibility crosswalks. The intersections of E. 142nd Street at Wales Avenue and Southern Boulevard are stop-controlled on the minor street approaches with high visibility crosswalks.

E. 141st Street is an eastbound and westbound local street with termini located at Locust Avenue to the east, and Third Avenue to the west. The intersection of E. 141st Street and Bruckner Boulevard is signalized and the intersection of E. 141ss Street and Concord Avenue is stop-controlled on the minor street approach, with high visibility crosswalks at both locations. The intersection of E. 141st Street and Wales Avenue is not controlled as Wales Avenue extends one-way southbound from the intersection.

Southern Boulevard is a minor arterial northbound and southbound street with termini located at Bruckner Boulevard to the south, and Bronx Park East to the north (where it turns into Allerton Avenue). The intersection of Southern Boulevard and Bruckner Boulevard is signalized with high visibility crosswalk across Southern Boulevard (due Bruckner Boulevard median this is a T-intersection with no pedestrian access across Bruckner Boulevard).

Bruckner Boulevard is a principal arterial eastbound and westbound street with termini located at Third Avenue to the southwest, and Westchester Avenue to the northeast (where it merges into the Bronx and Pelham Parkway and departs from Bruckner Expressway). The roadway primarily runs below the elevated Bruckner Expressway and is a designated truck route.

Concord Avenue is a southbound local street with termini located at E. 141st Street to the south, and E. 152nd Street to the north. See above for descriptions of its intersections bounding the Bronx site.

Pedestrian and Bike Access

Pedestrian infrastructure includes public sidewalks and crosswalks in the immediate vicinity of the site. See the 'Vehicular Access' section above for locations of signalized, high-visibility crosswalks. Based on CEQR Technical Manual criteria, none of the pedestrian elements analyzed would be significantly adversely impacted by the proposed project.

Bicycle routes in proximity to the Bronx site include conventional bicycle lanes along East 138th Street, shared bicycle lanes along Jackson Avenue and a signed bicycle route along Southern Boulevard.

Brooklyn | 275 Atlantic Avenue

The proposed Brooklyn site is accessible by motor vehicle, public transportation, walking, and bicycle. While the proposed project will potentially result in significant adverse impacts to vehicular traffic, the site's immediate proximity to the courthouses and its unparalleled accessibility via public transportation suggest it will be able to adequately accommodate the volume and frequency of movements generated by the proposed project.

Transit Access

Eight MTA New York City Transit (NYCT) subway stations are located in within ¹/₄ mile of the Brooklyn site. These include the Bergen Street station served by F and G trains operating on the Culver Line; the three stations that comprise the Borough Hall/Court Street station complex which is served by R trains operating on the Fourth Avenue Line and the Nos. 2, 3, 4 and 5 trains operating on the Eastern Parkway Line; the Hoyt Street-Fulton Mall station served by Nos. 2 and 3 trains operating on the Eastern Parkway Line; The Hoyt-Schermerhorn Street station served by A and C trains operating on the Eighth Avenue Line and G trains operating on the Culver Line; and the two stations that comprise the Jay Street-MetroTech station which is served by A and C trains operating on the Eighth Avenue Line and R trains operating on the Fourth Avenue Line.

A total of 13 NYCT local bus routes and one MTA Bus limited-stop route operate within ¹/₄-mile of the Brooklyn Site. These include the B25, B26, B38, B41, B45, B52, B57, B61, B62, B63, B65 and B67 routes operated by NYCT and the B103 limited-stop service operated by MTA Bus. Both local and limited-stop service are provided on the B38 and B41 routes.

Vehicular Access

Under future conditions with the proposed action, there will be increases in traffic volumes, particularly during peak hours associated with major employee shift changes, including during weekdays 6:30 AM to 7:30 AM and 2:45 PM to 3:45 PM and on Saturdays 2:45 PM to 3:45 PM. The traffic volumes generated by the proposed action will result in the potential for significant adverse impacts at multiple intersections during one or more of these peak periods, pursuant to *CEQR Technical Manual Guidelines*. Implementation of signal timing changes are being proposed and would provide mitigation for some of the potential traffic impacts, subject to review and approval by the New York City Department of Transit (DOT). The remainder of the affected intersections and lane groups have the potential for unmitigated significant adverse impacts.

The Brooklyn site is in close proximity to the Brooklyn-Queens Expressway (Interstate 278). The Brooklyn-Queens Expressway, or the "BQE", is a portion of I-278 extending from the Brooklyn-Battery Tunnel to the Grand Central Parkway in Queens. This principal arterial interstate expressway is designated as a through truck route.

The section of the BQE west of the Brooklyn site is accessible via Atlantic Avenue and the section north of the Brooklyn site is accessible via Tillary Street.

Within the larger vicinity of the Brooklyn site there are two major bridges (the Manhattan Bridge and Brooklyn Bridge). The Manhattan Bridge and Brooklyn Bridge span over the East River and connect Manhattan and Brooklyn. The Manhattan Bridge is a principal arterial that provides a vehicular connection

between Lower Manhattan and Downtown Brooklyn via Flatbush Avenue Extension in Brooklyn. Connections to the Brooklyn site are available via local streets including Atlantic Avenue.

The Brooklyn Bridge is a principal arterial expressway that also provides a vehicular connection between Lower Manhattan and Downtown Brooklyn and provides access to the Brooklyn-Queens Expressway. The Brooklyn Bridge is accessible to and from the site's neighborhood via Brooklyn Bridge Boulevard/Adams Street, which continues south of Fulton Street/Joralemon Street as Boerum Place.

The Brooklyn site encompasses the entirety of the block (Block 175) bounded by State Street to the north, Atlantic Avenue to the south, Boerum Place to the west, and Smith Street to the east in Downtown Brooklyn.

Atlantic Avenue is a two-way (eastbound and westbound) principal arterial with termini located at Bridge Park Drive to the west and the Van Wyck Expressway to the east (where it turns into 94th Avenue). Atlantic Avenue serves as a major east-west local roadway throughout Brooklyn and Queens, and is the sole eastwest through truck route across Brooklyn. The intersections of Atlantic Avenue and Boerum Place, and Atlantic Avenue and Smith Street are both signalized intersections. Pedestrians are allowed to safely cross Atlantic Avenue at both intersections via a high visibility crosswalk. These crossings are controlled by pedestrian signals.

Boerum Place is a principal arterial roadway. Between Fulton Street to the north and Atlantic Avenue to the south, the roadway carries two-way traffic separated by a planted median in the northbound and southbound directions. North of Fulton Street, the corridor turns into Brooklyn Bridge Boulevard/Adams Street. South of Atlantic Avenue, the southbound portion of the street extends to Bergen Street. Both the intersections of Boerum Place and Atlantic Avenue and Boerum Place and State Street are signalized. Pedestrians are allowed to safely cross Boerum Place at both intersections via a high visibility crosswalk. These crossings are controlled by pedestrian signals.

State Street is an eastbound local roadway with termini located at Columbia Place to the west, and Flatbush Avenue to the east. The intersections of State Street and Boerum Place, and State Street and Smith Street are both signalized intersections. Pedestrians are allowed to safely cross State Street at both intersections and to the Site's north corners via a high visibility crosswalk. These crossings are controlled by pedestrian signals.

Smith Street is a minor arterial northbound roadway with termini located at Halleck Street to the south, and Fulton Street to the north (where it turns into Jay Street). In the vicinity of the Brooklyn site, it includes a bicycle lane and it is designated as a local truck route. Pedestrians are allowed to safely cross Smith Street at the Site's northeast and southeast corners via a high visibility crosswalk. These crossings are controlled by pedestrian signals.

Pedestrian and Bike Access

Pedestrian infrastructure includes public sidewalks and crosswalks in the immediate vicinity of the site. See the 'Vehicular Access' section above for locations of signalized, high-visibility crosswalks. Based on CEQR Technical Manual criteria, none of the pedestrian elements analyzed would be significantly adversely impacted by the proposed project.

Bicycle routes in proximity to the Brooklyn site include bicycle lanes along Boerum Place, Clinton Street, Henry Street, Schermerhorn Street, and Smith Street. Pacific Street, which is one block to the south of, and runs parallel to, Atlantic Avenue, hosts a shared bicycle lane between Smith and Henry Streets.

Crash data from the New York City Department of Transportation (NYCDOT) for intersections within ¹/₄-mile of the proposed Brooklyn site identify five intersections as 'high crash' locations, defined as those with 48 or more total reportable and non-reportable crashes or five or more pedestrian/bicyclist injury crashes occurring in any consecutive 12 months of the most recent three-year period for which data are available. NYCDOT has proposed or recently implemented improvements at four of these five high crash locations.

Additional measures that could be employed to increase pedestrian/bicyclist safety include installation of additional high visibility crosswalks where not already present and improved street lighting.

Manhattan | 124-125 White Street

The streets and transit serving the proposed Manhattan site will adequately absorb the volume and frequency of traffic generated by the proposed facility. The proposed project will not result in any unmitigated significant adverse transportation impacts and will benefit from immediate proximity to the courthouse and robust access to public transportation.

Transit Access

Three MTA New York City Transit (NYCT) subway stations are located within ¼-mile of the Manhattan Site. To the north of the site are the three stations that comprise the Canal Street Station complex which is served by N and Q express trains and R and W local trains operating on the Broadway Line; Nos. 4 and 5 express trains and No. 6 local trains operating on the Lexington Avenue Line; and J express trains and Z express trains (which provide peak direction, peak period service) operating on the Nassau Street Line. The three Canal Street stations comprise a complex of connected underground passageways providing free transfers between platforms.

A total of six NYCT local bus routes operate within ¹/₄-mile of the Manhattan Site. These include the M9, M15, M22, M55 and M103 routes and the M15 Select Bus Service (SBS) route. In addition, approximately ten NYCT express bus routes serve stops within ¹/₄-mile of the site, including the SIM1, SIM1c, SIM2, SIM3c, SIM4/4x, SIM4c, SIM32 and SIM34 Staten Island services and the X27 and X28 Brooklyn services. NJ Transit route 120 buses also stop along Broadway in the vicinity of the site.

Vehicular Access

Under future conditions with the proposed action, there will be increases in traffic volumes, particularly during peak hours associated with major employee shift changes, including during weekdays 6:30 AM to 7:30 AM and 2:45 PM to 3:45 PM and on Saturdays 2:45 PM to 3:45 PM. The traffic volumes generated by the proposed action will not result in any unmitigable significant adverse traffic impacts, pursuant to CEQR Technical Manual Guidelines.

The Manhattan site is in close proximity to the Brooklyn and Manhattan Bridges, which are principal arterials that provide vehicular connections between Downtown Brooklyn and Lower Manhattan and access to the Franklin Delano Roosevelt (FDR) Drive. Access to and from the Manhattan site's neighborhood is available via Centre Street for the Brooklyn Bridge and via Canal Street and Bowery for the Manhattan Bridge. The Manhattan Bridge also carries four subway tracks used by the B, D, N, and Q lines.

Within the larger vicinity of the Manhattan site there are two other major limited access facilities, the FDR Drive and State Route 9A. The FDR Drive is a principal arterial expressway on the east side of Manhattan along the East River. The expressway starts from just north of the Battery Park Underpass in Lower Manhattan and continues north to 125th Street / Robert F. Kennedy (RFK) Bridge / Willis Avenue Bridge interchange, where the highway becomes the Harlem River Drive. The site's neighborhood is accessible from the FDR Drive in the southbound direction via the Robert F Wagner Sr. Place exit just north of the Brooklyn Bridge. In the northbound direction along the FDR Drive, the Site is accessible via Brooklyn Bridge/ Manhattan Civic Center exit (Exit 2) which connects to Pearl Street/St. James Place. In the reverse direction, the FDR Drive northbound and southbound is accessible via the St. James Place entrance.

State Route 9A (named West Street in Lower Manhattan) is a principal arterial on the west side of Manhattan along the Hudson River. The roadway begins at the southern tip of the FDR Drive, and travels north to 72nd Street where it continues north as the Henry Hudson Parkway. In the area around the Manhattan site, the corridor is designated as a through truck route. South of 59th Street it operates as an at-grade boulevard from 59th Street to 72nd Street, the roadway attains highway characteristics with service roads and becomes elevated. The Manhattan site is most directly accessible from West Street in both the northbound and

southbound directions via Canal Street. In the reverse direction, West Street southbound is accessible via Murray Street and northbound is accessible via Canal Street.

The Manhattan site encompasses full-block frontage parcels along the north and south sides of White Street between Centre and Baxter streets (Block 198, Lot 1, and Block 167, Lot 1, respectively) and also includes volumes above and below the intersecting street. As part of a related application, White Street will be narrowed, realigned, and its volume will be bounded vertically by upper and lower limiting planes.

White Street, which intersects the proposed project area, is a minor local street in the Lower Manhattan irregular grid. It extends approximately eight blocks as a one-way westbound street through the Manhattan Civic Center and Tribeca from Baxter Street on the east to West Broadway on the west. The block-long section of White Street between Centre and Baxter streets is presently mapped at width of 50 feet but with the proposed City Map Change it will be reestablished as a 35-foot wide street volume with a lower limiting plane at legal grade and an upper limiting plane at 30 feet above legal grade. It includes approximately 56 perpendicular parking spaces for authorized vehicles. The street treatment is a "shared-street" in which the parking spaces occupy the outer portions of the right-of-way, with a center lane with pavers that is used by pedestrians and vehicles. Although the street is open to through traffic, most of the vehicles traveling on it are those parking there. The street separates MDC South and MDC North, though there is a bridge above and a tunnel below the street connecting the buildings (these are pursuant to Revocable Consents).

Baxter Street is a local street primarily used for travel within the Manhattan Civic Center and Chinatown. There is an interruption in the street's alignment at Hogan Place. The Baxter Street segment south of Hogan Place connects to the eastern end of Hogan Place, with the roadway and sidewalks bending at an obtuse angle and vehicular and pedestrian traffic flowing continuously from Baxter Street onto Hogan Place. In contrast, the Baxter Street segment north of Hogan Place intersects Hogan Place at a stop-controlled T-intersection, with a stop sign for the Baxter Street approach and a crosswalk spanning Baxter Street, located approximately 50 feet west of the point where the south segment of Baxter Street and Hogan Place meet. Baxter Street is one-way southbound north of Hogan Place and one-way northbound south of Hogan Place, with termini located at Grand Street to the north (where it turns into Centre Market Place) and Worth Street to the south.

Centre Street is a one-way northbound local street used for travel within the Manhattan Civic Center and Chinatown with termini located at Park Row to the south, and Broome Street to the north. The intersection of Centre Street and Hogan Place/Leonard Street is signal-controlled with high visibility crosswalks on Hogan Place/Leonard Street and standard crosswalks on Centre Street. The intersection of Centre Street and Worth Street is signal-controlled with high visibility crosswalks.

Pedestrian and Bike Access

Pedestrian infrastructure includes public sidewalks and crosswalks in the immediate vicinity of the site. See the 'Vehicular Access' section above for locations of signalized, high-visibility crosswalks. Based on CEQR Technical Manual criteria, none of the pedestrian elements analyzed would be significantly adversely impacted by the proposed project.

Bicycle routes in proximity to the Manhattan site include conventional bicycle lanes along Lafayette Street and along Centre Street from Reade Street to Worth Street. Potential future bicycle lanes are proposed for Centre Street north of Worth Street and Bowery.

Queens | 126-02 82nd Avenue

The proposed Queens site is accessible by motor vehicle, public transportation, walking, and bicycle. While the proposed project will potentially result in significant adverse impacts to vehicular traffic, the proposed Queens site is optimally situated adjacent to the courthouse and close to major arterial roadways, public transit, and planned pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure improvements that will be able to accommodate the volume and frequency of movements generated by the proposed project.

Transit Access

One MTA New York City Transit (NYCT) subway station is located within ¹/₄-mile of the Queens site—the Union Turnpike/Kew Gardens station which is served by E and F trains at all times. In addition to subways, there are 9 different MTA public bus routes within ¹/₄-mile of the Queens site. These include the Q10, Q37 and Q60 local routes and QM18 and QM21 weekday-only express services operated by MTA Bus, and the Q46 local route and the X63, X64 and X68 weekday-only express services operated by NYCT.

Vehicular Access

Under future conditions with the proposed action, there will be increases in traffic volumes, particularly during peak hours associated with major employee shift changes, including during weekdays 6:30 AM to 7:30 AM and 2:45 PM to 3:45 PM and on Saturdays 2:45 PM to 3:45 PM. The traffic volumes generated by the proposed action will result in the potential for significant adverse impacts at multiple intersections during one or more of these peak periods, pursuant to *CEQR Technical Manual Guidelines*. Implementation of signal timing changes are being proposed and would provide mitigation for some of the potential traffic impacts, subject to review and approval by the New York City Department of Transit (DOT). The remainder of the affected intersections and lane groups have the potential for unmitigated significant adverse impacts.

The Queens site is in close proximity to multiple major highways. These include the Van Wyck Expressway (Interstate 678), Grand Central Parkway, Jackie Robinson Parkway, and Union Turnpike. The Van Wyck Expressway (Interstate 678) is a principal arterial interstate that travels north and south through Queens. The highway begins at John F. Kennedy International Airport in Jamaica Bay and ends at Northern Boulevard where it turns into the Whitestone Expressway. The corridor is a designated through truck route that permits 53-foot long trailers. The Queens site is accessible from the Van Wyck Expressway in the northbound direction via the Queens Boulevard exit (Exit 9). To return south, vehicles can access the expressway via the Van Wyck Expressway service road between Queens Boulevard and 87th Avenue. Inbound vehicles traveling southbound along the expressway will use Exit 8 to Union Turnpike West to enter the area around the Queens site. Outbound vehicles heading back north, will enter the expressway via an entrance off the eastbound service road of Union Turnpike.

The Grand Central Parkway is an arterial highway that travels east and west through Queens to Nassau County. It begins at Interstate 278 in the Astoria section of Queens and ends at the Nassau County line in Little Neck, where the parkway continues east as the Northern State Parkway. Inbound vehicles utilizing Grand Central Parkway can access the Queens site in the eastbound direction via Exit 12 to Queens Boulevard and in the westbound direction via Exit 15 onto Union Turnpike and continuing on Queens Boulevard. Outbound vehicles, leaving the Queens site can access Grand Central Parkway in the westbound direction via the Union Turnpike overpass just west of 141st Street and in the eastbound direction via an entrance near 138th Street, right off the eastbound segment of the Union Turnpike.

The Jackie Robinson Parkway (formerly the Interboro Parkway), which is designed New York State Route 908B, is a principal arterial expressway that travels in the east and west directions. The western terminus of the expressway is at Jamaica Avenue in East New York, Brooklyn, and the eastern terminus of the parkway is at the Kew Gardens Interchange in Kew Gardens, Queens. Inbound vehicles on this corridor originating from the west can approach the Queens site via Exit 6 at Metropolitan Avenue and continuing on Union Turnpike. In the reverse direction, these vehicles can access Jackie Robinson Parkway via an entrance off Union Turnpike, also near Metropolitan Avenue.

Union Turnpike is a "principal arterial other" route that travels east and west between Myrtle Avenue in Glendale, Queens and Marcus Avenue in North New Hyde Park, Nassau County. This turnpike is a designated local truck route. Eastbound vehicles along this corridor can access the Queens site via the intersection of 126th Street and the turnpike's eastbound segment. In the reverse direction, heading back west, vehicles leaving the Queens site can utilize Queens Boulevard to connect to the turnpike. Inbound vehicles traveling westbound can utilize an exit ramp on to Queens Boulevard to reach the Site. In reverse, vehicles seeking to access the turnpike from the Queens site and heading east can utilize 132nd Street.

The Queens site is located on a full block (Block 9657) and part of a block (Block 9653) in the Queens Civic Center. It is bounded by Union Turnpike on the north, 132nd Street on the east, Queens Criminal Court complex on the south, and 126th Street on the west. The two blocks are separated by 82nd Avenue, which will be de-mapped and incorporated into the site pursuant to a related city map change application.

Union Turnpike is a principal arterial other roadway. Between 126th Street to the west and 132nd Street to the east, it carries traffic eastbound and westbound, with eastbound and westbound lanes split by the Jackie Robinson Parkway. Neither of the Union Turnpike intersections at 126th Street and at 132nd Street are signalized or painted for pedestrian crossing. The 132nd Street and Union Turnpike intersection does have a stop sign for traffic on 132nd Street.

132nd Street is a local road. Between Union Turnpike to the north and 82nd Avenue to the south, the roadway carries one-way traffic northbound. Between 82nd Avenue to the north and Queens Boulevard to the south, the roadway carries one-way traffic southbound. This section of 132nd Street does not extend north of Union Turnpike or South of Queens Boulevard.

126th Street is a local road. Between Union Turnpike to the north and 82nd Avenue to the south, the roadway carries one-way traffic southbound. This section of 126th Street does not extend north of Union Turnpike or south of 82nd Avenue. Neither intersection of Union Turnpike and 126th Street or 82nd Avenue and 126th Street is signalized. The intersection of Union Turnpike and 126th Street has a high visibility crosswalk and the intersection of 82nd Avenue and 126th Street has a stop sign for 126th Street traffic.

82nd Avenue is a local road within the Queens Civic Center. This section of 82nd Avenue does not extend north of 132nd Street or south of Queens Boulevard, though by name the street continues on a discontinuous, offset alignment south of Queens Boulevard. It operates two-way between Queens Boulevard and 126th Street, with no striping for lane separation, and one-way northbound between 126th Street and 132nd Street. The intersection at Queens Boulevard and 82nd Avenue is signalized with a high visibility crosswalk and pedestrian signals.

The Queens site is located on a block directly abutting Queens Boulevard, a major thoroughfare. This corridor has a "principal arterial major" functional classification, is part of New York State Route 25, and is a designated through truck route. This corridor extends from Queens Plaza in Long Island City to Jamaica Avenue in Jamaica.

Pedestrian and Bike Access

Pedestrian infrastructure includes public sidewalks and crosswalks in the immediate vicinity of the site. Walkonly trips would be well dispersed within the study area as these trips are localized. See the 'Vehicular Access' section above for locations of signalized, high-visibility crosswalks. Based on CEQR Technical Manual criteria, none of the pedestrian elements analyzed would be significantly adversely impacted by the proposed project.

Bicycle routes in proximity to the Queens site include shared bicycle lanes along eastbound and westbound 83rd Avenue/Hoover Avenue. To the west, these shared bicycle lanes provide a connection (via Kew Gardens Road, 80th Road, 82nd Avenue and Park Lane) to a protected bicycle lane along Forest Park Drive in Forest Park. As part of the City's Great Streets initiative, the NYC Department of Transportation (NYCDOT) is undertaking a multi-phase, comprehensive redesign of Queens Boulevard that will include protected bicycle lanes, increased pedestrian space, and specific safety improvements such as new signal timing phasing and lane and crosswalk restriping at nearby intersections.

SECTION 6.5 | Residential Facilities

6.51 Undue concentration or clustering of city and non-city facilities providing similar services or serving a similar population should be avoided in residential areas.

Bronx | 745 East 141st Street

The proposed Bronx facility will be located in a residential and industrial area where there are currently no criminal justice or correction facilities. Therefore, the proposed facility will not add to the concentration of similar uses. For additional information, please refer to Section 4.1 above.

Within a half-mile of the proposed facility, there are eight shelter facilities operated by the Department of Homeless Services (DHS) with a total capacity of 597 beds (see Table C1.2 in the Appendix for details). The proposed facility will not contribute to a concentration of facilities that provide similar services.

Brooklyn | 275 Atlantic Avenue

There is no clustering of residential detention facilities in the area, as the project will replace the only existing detention facility in the vicinity. While there are a number of other civic facilities nearby, because a detention facility already exists at the site and the surrounding area is a high-density mixed-used neighborhood, the project will not result in significant concentration of similar facilities. Additionally, clustering the facility with other criminal justice uses, in particular the courthouse, will be beneficial in increasing the operational efficiency of the project. For additional information, please refer to Section 4.1 above.

Within a half-mile of the facility, there is one DHS shelter facility with a total capacity of 40 beds (see Table C2.2 in the Appendix for details). The facility will not contribute to a concentration of facilities that provide similar services.

Manhattan | 124-125 White Street

While the surrounding area is a high-density civic neighborhood and the federal Metropolitan Correctional Center at 150 Park Row is within a half-mile radius of the proposed Manhattan site, the project will not result in significant concentration of similar facilities because a detention facility already exists at the site. Additionally, clustering the facility with other criminal justice uses, in particular the courthouse, will be beneficial in increasing the operational efficiency of the project. For additional information, please refer to Section 4.1 above.

Within a half-mile of the facility, there are five DHS shelter facilities with a total capacity of 654 beds (see Table C3.2 in the Appendix for details). The facility will not contribute to a concentration of facilities that provide similar services.

Queens | 126-02 82nd Avenue

While there are a number of other civic facilities nearby, because the surrounding area is a civic campus, the project will not result in significant concentration of similar facilities. Additionally, clustering the facility with other criminal justice uses, in particular the courthouse, will be beneficial in increasing the operational efficiency of the project. For additional information, please refer to Section 4.1 above.

Within a half-mile of the facility, there is one DHS shelter facility with a total capacity of 91 beds (refer to Table C4.2 in the Appendix for details). The facility will not contribute to a concentration of facilities that provide similar services.

6.52 Necessary support services for the facility and its residents should be available and provided.

The facilities in Brooklyn, Queens, and Manhattan are adjacent to their respective borough's criminal courthouses, and will accommodate additional support services such as inmate programming, healthcare, and legal services, for those who are detained directly on-site.

The proposed facility in the Bronx, the only proposed site not directly situated adjacent to the courthouse, is located approximately 2 miles from the Bronx Hall of Justice, an approximately 10-minute drive compared to the 30-minute distance between the courthouse and Rikers Island. The proposed site will also accommodate additional programming such as healthcare and parole court uses on site, which may reduce the need to transport individuals to the Bronx County courthouses and other off-site appointments and will further contribute to operational efficiency.

6.53(a) Whether the facility, in combination with other similar city and non-city facilities within a defined area surrounding the site (approximately a half-mile radius, adjusted for significant physical boundaries), would have a significant cumulative impact on neighborhood character.

Bronx | 745 East 141st Street

The proposed site is in Bronx Community District 1. As home to Horizon Juvenile Detention Center, the Community District's 1.4 correctional facility beds/population ratio (per 1,000 population) is ranked as one of the top twenty highest ratios in the city, but does not exceed the citywide ratio of 2.1 according to the 2015 *List* of Selected Facilities and Program Sites in New York City issued by the Department of City Planning. Therefore, the district is not considered to have a high ratio.⁷ For all residential facilities, which also includes Nursing Homes and Residential Health Care Facilities and Small and Large Residential Care Facilities, the Community District ranks 14th. Within a half-mile radius, the area includes six DHS shelters and one cluster facility serving families with children, with a total capacity of 420 units, along with a 177-bed shelter facility for single male adults.

While there is another residential correctional facility at Horizons Juvenile Center with a capacity of 106 beds, this facility is at a distance greater than a half-mile from the proposed site and therefore will not cause a concentration of similar facilities in the immediate neighborhood. In addition, the operations of the project, with a portion of required support services provided on-site, will minimize interactions with and impacts to the surrounding neighborhood character. The site's location adjacent to the Bruckner Expressway also creates a natural buffer on the eastern side of the site, and planned development of mid-density residential uses on the western portion of the site will further serve as a buffer. Refer to 4.1(a) and 4.1(b) for additional information on impacts to neighborhood character.

There is no anticipated significant cumulative negative impact on neighborhood character by use of the site, nor will such use contribute to a concentration of facilities that provide similar services.

Brooklyn | 275 Atlantic Avenue

As home to the existing Brooklyn Detention Complex, Brooklyn Community District 2's 6.7 bed/population ratio (per 1,000 population) for correctional facilities is ranked as the 5th highest ratio for the city and exceeds the citywide ratio of correctional beds, according to the 2015 *List of Selected Facilities and Program Sites in New York City* issued by the Department of City Planning. For all residential beds, which also includes Nursing Homes and Residential Health Care Facilities, and Small and Large Residential Care Facilities, the Community District ranks 5th. Other residential healthcare facilities include the Hopkins Center for Rehabilitation and Healthcare and the Cobble Hill Health Center. The area also includes a 40-bed shelter facility for single adults, operated by the Department of Homeless Services.

The project will replace the existing Brooklyn Detention Complex and its current capacity and increase the number of beds in the Community District by 622 beds. As the project site is also situated in a mixed-use, high-density center with a high number of civic uses and thus the ability to absorb new beds, there will be not be significant cumulative impact. As discussed in 4.1(a) and 4.1(b), the expansion of the facility is not

expected to impact use and development of land based on recent development trends surrounding the existing detention complexes in Lower Manhattan and Downtown Brooklyn.

The site is already the location of an active detention center, and the proposed project is compatible with and will greatly benefit from proximity to the justice facilities in adjacent and nearby lots, in particular the borough's criminal court. This proximity will significantly increase the project's operational efficiencies, leading to a reduction in time and fewer City resources to transport detained individuals with hearings or arraignments at the courthouse.

There is no anticipated significant cumulative negative impact on neighborhood character by use of the site, nor will such use contribute to a concentration of facilities that provide similar services.

Manhattan | 124-125 White Street

The proposed site is in Manhattan Community District 1. As home to the existing Manhattan Detention Complex and federal Metropolitan Correctional Complex, the Community District's 26.6 bed/population ratio (per 1,000 population) for correctional facilities is ranked second-highest in the city and exceeds the citywide ratio (2.1) according to the 2015 *List* of Selected Facilities and Program Sites in New York City issued by the Department of City Planning. For all residential facilities, which also includes Nursing Homes and Residential Health Care Facilities, and Small and Large Residential Care Facilities, the Community District ranks as 12th in the city.

There are five DHS shelter facilities within a half-mile radius of the proposed site, including one commercial hotel for adult families, one shelter for single adults, two commercial hotels for families with children, and one safe haven facility for special population adults. Further details on each site can be found in the appendix.

The project will replace the existing Manhattan Detention Center and its current capacity and increase the number of beds in the Community District by 539 beds. As the project site is situated in a mixed-use, high-density area with a high number of civic uses and thus the ability to absorb new beds, there will be not be significant cumulative impact. As discussed in 4.1(a) and 4.1(b), the expansion of the facility is not expected to impact use and development of land based on recent experience with development activity around the existing detention complex in Manhattan, as well as similar experiences around the active detention complex in Downtown Brooklyn.

The proposed project is compatible with and will greatly benefit from proximity to the justice facilities in adjacent and nearby lots, in particular the borough's criminal court. This proximity will significantly increase the project's operational efficiencies, leading to a reduction in time and fewer City resources to transport detained individuals with hearings or arraignments at the courthouse.

There is no anticipated significant cumulative negative impact on neighborhood character by use of the site, nor will such use contribute to a concentration of facilities that provide similar services.

Queens | 126-02 82nd Avenue

The proposed site is in Queens Community District 9, which has a 0.0 bed/population ratio (per 1,000 population) for correctional facilities and is not ranked among the top twenty highest ratios in the city as it does not exceed the citywide ratio (2.1) according to the 2015 List of Selected Facilities and Program Sites in New York City issued by the Department of City Planning. For all residential beds, which also includes Nursing Homes and Residential Health Care Facilities, and Small and Large Residential Care Facilities, the Community District ranks as 54th. Within a half-mile of the facility, there is one DHS shelter facility for families with children with a total capacity of 91 units.

There is no anticipated significant cumulative negative impact on neighborhood character by use of the site, nor will such use contribute to a concentration of facilities that provide similar services. For the reasons stated above, section 6.53 does not apply to the proposed Queens site.

6.53(b) Whether the site is well located for efficient service delivery.

Bronx | 745 East 141st Street

The proposed site is well-located for efficient service delivery due to its proximity to the Bronx County Criminal Court, accessibility via transit, sufficient size to support necessary programming (including parole court facilities), and ownership by the City. Refer to section 6.52 for additional information.

Brooklyn | 275 Atlantic Avenue

The proposed site is well-located for efficient service delivery due to its proximity to the Kings County Criminal Court, accessibility via transit, sufficient size to support necessary programming, and ownership by the City. Refer to section 6.52 for additional information.

Manhattan | 124-125 White Street

The proposed site is well-located for efficient service delivery due to its proximity to the New York County Criminal Court, accessibility via transit, sufficient size to support necessary programming, and ownership by the City. Refer to section 6.52 for additional information.

Queens | 126-02 82nd Avenue

Since the Queens site is not located within a community district that contains a high ratio of residential facilities, defined as among the 20 highest or exceeding the citywide ratio, section 6.53(b) does not apply.

6.53(c) Whether any alternative sites actively considered by the sponsoring agency or identified pursuant to Section 204(f) of the Charter which are in community districts with lower ratios of residential facility beds to population than the citywide average would add significantly to the cost of constructing or operating the facility or would impair service delivery.

Bronx | 745 East 141st Street

The alternative site explored in the Bronx, adjacent to the Bronx County Criminal Court, would not have been of sufficient size to feasibly accommodate the operations of the jail and the proposed support facilities.

Brooklyn | 275 Atlantic Avenue

No alternative sites located adjacent to the courts satisfied the criteria called out in 4.1(c). The existing jail site at 275 Atlantic Avenue was therefore selected, having met all the selection criteria.

Manhattan | 124-125 White Street

In the original Draft Scope of Work, 80 Centre Street was explored for siting. In response to public comments provided on the Draft Scope of Work and through the City's community engagement process, the City is now proposing to site the Manhattan borough-based jail facility at 124-125 White Street. As currently proposed, 80 Centre Street is not part of the proposed project. The existing uses in 80 Centre Street, including the Manhattan District Attorney's office, will remain in place with the proposed project.

Queens | 126-02 82nd Avenue

No alternative sites located adjacent to the courts satisfied the criteria called out in 4.1(c). The decommissioned detention facility at 126-02 82^{nd} Avenue was therefore selected, having met all the selection criteria.

SECTION 8 | Criteria for Closing or Reducing Facilities

8.1(a) The extent to which the closing or reduction would create or significantly increase any existing imbalance among communities of service levels relative to need. Wherever possible, such actions should be proposed for areas with high ratios of service supply to service demand.

As indicated in the FY2020-2021 Citywide Statement of Needs, under a future borough-based jail system, the Manhattan Detention Complex and the Brooklyn Detention Complex would be demolished and rebuilt, after which the existing jail facilities on Rikers Island and the Vernon C. Bain Correctional Center would be decommissioned. Closing the existing jail facility at Vernon C. Bain Center in the Bronx will not create or significantly increase any existing imbalance among communities of service levels relative to need, as the facility will be replaced with the new facility at 745 East 141st Street in Mott Haven.

Closing the existing jail facilities at the Brooklyn Detention Center and the Manhattan Detention Complex will not create or significantly increase any existing imbalance among communities of service levels relative to need. Current detainees will be relocated to temporary swing space on Rikers Island during construction of both the Brooklyn and Manhattan sites. Services and programs for individuals in detention will be provided on Rikers Island during the construction period. Detainees will be relocated to the new facilities upon completion.

8.1(b) Consistency with the specific criteria for selecting the facility for closure or reduction as identified in the Statement of Needs.

The construction of new borough-based jail facilities is included in the FY2020-2021 Citywide Statement of Needs. The Vernon C. Bain Center facility is expected to be closed following the construction of the new facilities. For further details, please refer to Appendix G-1.

8.2 In proposing facility closings or reductions, the sponsoring agency shall consult with the affected Community Board(s) and Borough President about the alternatives within the district or borough, if any, for achieving the planned reduction and the measures to be taken to ensure adequate levels of service.



Bronx Site will not utilize entire lot, the portion of the site to the west, fronting Concord Avenue is planned to be used for development of affordable housing.



MAP B2: BROOKLYN | FACILITIES WITHIN 400 FEET OF 275 ATLANTIC AVENUE











APPENDIX D:

Classification of Regional and Neighborhood Uses

For this analysis, we used the following assumptions on the characterization of regional and neighborhood uses, as depicted in the above maps. Information on the facilities was sourced from the New York City Department of City Planning Facilities Database. Regional facilities are uses that serve a larger area and could have been located elsewhere without impairing operating efficiency, such as a museum or homeless shelter. Neighborhood facilities are those intended primarily to serve the neighborhood in which they are located, such as a day care center or parking garage. Neighborhood/regional facilities encompass uses where the scale of the focus of services vary by facility, such as high schools that can either primarily admit students in the neighborhood or accept students city-wide. Due to the number of individual facilities within the half-mile radius of each proposed site, we defined the breakdown of facility categories by regional, neighborhood, and neighborhood/regional as follows:



MAP E1: BRONX | CORRECTIONS FACILITIES BY BOROUGH





MAP E2: BROOKLYN | CORRECTIONS FACILITIES BY BOROUGH





Site Specific Proposals

- 1. Relocation of Division of Child Protection Offices
 - a. Borough President agrees the proposed location for the ACS Division of Child Protection at 1260 Water Place. The construction of the new Metro North stations, specifically the Morris Park Station, will provide better access to clients and members of the public. In addition, its close proximity to other health institutions would provide better access health and mental services to ACS clients.
- 2. Relocation of Distribution and Fleet Services
 - Borough President does not agree with the relocation of the fleet and operations of Department of Homeless to The Bronx site located at 885 East 149th Street. The Bronx is home to the DHS PATH Family Center, various shelters, and a majority of cluster sites. The Bronx has committed to its fair share of DHS needs and would recommend the site be located in another borough, and this site be used to create affordable housing in the Bronx.
- 3. New Animal Care and Control Shelter
 - a. Borough President agrees with the need for an Animal Shelter, but concurs with the residents of Co-op City, as noted in my ULURP recommendation that the site selected for the shelter at 2050 Bartow Avenue is not the ideal site. The neighborhood in which the site is located, is an area that experiences high traffic congestion and has limited public transportation access. The site itself was identified by the community for a community recreational center. Lastly, Co-Op City does not allow its residents to have pets, making it difficult for residents to benefit from the site themselves.
- 4. Expansion of Mechanic Facility for Sanitation Vehicles and Equipment
 - a. No Opposition.

- 5. Expansion and Relocation of Citywide Concrete Program
 - a. No Opposition.
- 6. Expansion of Sidewalk Inspection Management- Fleet Support
 - a. Borough President disagrees with the proposal to expand this location to support both the Bronx and Brooklyn boroughs and recommends the alternative solution listed by DOT. It is unclear if the Webster Avenue expansion alternative would serve only The Bronx, or both The Bronx and Brooklyn. The preference is that each borough
- 7. Relocation of Emergency Medical Services Station 17
 - a. No Opposition.
- 8. New Office Space for Family Court Division Raise the Age Program
 - a. No Opposition.
- 9. Bronx Borough Jail
 - a. Borough President agrees with the closure of Riker's, but does not agree with the proposal to locate the Bronx Jail Site at 320 Concord Avenue at the current NYPD Tow Pound. My office has proposed viable alternative sites, one of which would build be built on land adjacent to the Bronx Hall of Justice and replace the existing, underutilized Family Court building next door. If all boroughs, including Staten Island, received their fair share in the closing or Riker's, each receiving a jail site, the proposed size of the facility would not be 1.5 million square feet. We have not been provided clear rationale for the need of this amount of square footage. As proposed the 27-story facility, with a proposed height of 275 feet would impose on any built environment, let alone this neighborhood in Council District 1 with mostly 2-story buildings.

The proposed Jail Sites in Queens, Manhattan, and Brooklyn, are all located adjacent to arraignment courts, the selected site in the Bronx is located 2.2 miles from the transit accessible court facilities. Furthermore, given the inability of the City to move forward with the Manhattan site, the ULURP process must restart that decouples each proposed court facility from a single ULURP into a ULURP for each.

The same site has also been proposed for housing and a community facility, in the Diego Beekman plan, a plan created through a two year community-driven planning process. Lastly, the limited outreach to the community and elected officials during the site selection process demonstrated an unwillingness to consider the needs of the community and borough. I cannot not support the plan as proposed.

- 10. Relocation of Sanitation Garage
 - a. The Borough President does not approve of the site being considered for this relocation. The site is located within a relatively short distance of the Bronx River and is surrounded by mature wooded areas. The site also poses accessibility challenges for Sanitation Department vehicles and employees, as the only way access can be realized is via streets from Mount Vernon, New York. As the Bronx Parkway prohibits trucks, large Sanitation vehicles arriving and departing this site would be limited to local streets,

many of which are narrow and lined with one and two family homes. The proximity of the Sanitation facility to the Bronx River may result in airborne particles and debris impacting the river and its water quality. The Borough President contends that the proximity of this garage to the Bronx River Greenway presents unwarranted safety hazards for cyclists as debris will likely interfere with greenway activities. During severe rain storms the hilly terrain of this site poses additional environmental challenges including additional storm water runoff prompted by the site's development.

- 11. Relocation of Bainbridge Job Center
 - a. The District Manager of Community District #7 indicates that the Bainbridge Job Center is a "good neighbor," as they offer the community essential services that many rely on. The City has not identified a site for a new facility. The Borough President believes that any new facility should remain in Bronx Community District #7.
- 12. Board of Elections-Relocation from 1780 Grand Concourse is being sought
 - a. No Opposition
- 13. Department of Probation, Bronx Juvenile Operations
 - a. The Department of Probation is seeking additional office space for 64 Probation officers. The City notes that this new facility will be configured based on its proximity to current space which is the Family Court building located at 900 Sheridan Avenue. The Borough President believes that when a site is identified it NOT occupy space originally intended for commercial /retail functions.
- 14. Relocation of Bridges Preventative Maintenance Unit
 - a. No Opposition
- 15. Relocation of Bronx Tow Pound
 - a. The Borough President supports relocating the Bronx Tow Pound site and that any use of this vacated property be developed exclusively for residential use.
- 16. Relocation of Bronx Special Victims Unit
 - a. The Borough President supports the relocation of this unit to a facility that is appropriately designed for such purposes. The new site must NOT be located in a facility designed for commercial/retail development. It should be easily reached by mass transit.

Brooklyn Community Board 2 (CB2) has reviewed the *Citywide Statement of Needs for City Facilities/Fiscal Years 2020 and 2021* ("the SON"). Three facilities are proposed to be located in Brooklyn Community District 2 (CD2) and another 12 facilities are proposed for undetermined locations that conceivably could be sited within the community district. The community board's comments on these proposals are as follows.

Facilities Proposed for Brooklyn Community District 2

Consolidation of Division of Child Protection Offices

Community Board 2 understands that consolidation of the six Brooklyn offices of the Administration for Children's Services' child protection offices provides for improved agency operational efficiencies. However, a consolidated office may be less convenient for clients and for this reason, the community board opposes the proposal. If the consolidation moves forward, however, CB2 acknowledges that 12 Metrotech Center would be an appropriate location for a borough-wide office because it is in the same building as the Kings County Family Court, located at 330 Jay Street.

New Office Space for Family Court Division's Raise the Age Program

On December 22, 2015, then-CB2 Chairperson Shirley A. M^cRae wrote to waive the community board's opportunity to comment on a Section 195 application for the acquisition of approximately 30,000 square feet of space at 1 Pierrepont Plaza for the Family Court Division. The additional space will be for staff handling cases involving 16- and 17-year-olds, which are now part of the juvenile delinquency practice as a result of a change in state legislation. Consistent with this prior action, the community board has no opposition to this proposal.

New Borough-Based Jail

Certification of the land use applications associated with four planned borough-based jails, including one at 275 Atlantic Avenue, is currently anticipated to occur at the March 25, 2019 City Planning Commission review session. Community Board 2 will schedule a public hearing on the applications and render its determination within the time established by the Uniform Land Use Review Procedure.

Facilities Proposed for Undetermined Locations

Relocation of Water Maintenance & Sewer Maintenance Field Offices and Garage Community Board 2 has no objection to the possible relocation of the Department of Environmental Protection's data center and other administrative functions. If DEP is to lease office space in CD2, however, all fleet and staff vehicles must be parked off-street. Authorized and improper placard use is rampant in the community district.

New Warehouse Space for File Storage

The community board's only potential objection to a facility for file storage for the Kings County District Attorney's office would be if space is leased that could be used for more productive purposes.

New Office Space for Raise the Age

Community Board 2 supports the "Raise the Age" initiative approved by the state legislature. However, there were several instances of gunfire in the preceding months on the streets of Downtown Brooklyn, with most of the occurrences tied by the police department to youth who had court dates or appointments with the Department of Probation. If DOP's Brooklyn Juvenile Operations are to expand, strategies for ensuring public safety must be in place.

Relocation of Services and Offices

The community board does not object to a five-to-seven year extension of the lease at 250 Livingston Street as the Human Resources Administration (HRA) seeks less expensive office space for its Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, Adult Protective Services and certain administrative functions. Community Board 2 asks HRA staff to do more to address the loitering and panhandling that occurs outside of 250 Livingston Street.

Relocation of Special Victims Offices

Community Board 2 does not object in principle to the police department relocating the Brooklyn Special Victims Squad to a location in the community district. The community board notes that department and officers' personal vehicles are often parked haphazardly if not illegally at many commands. Any lease of office space for the Detective Bureau must include provision for the orderly parking of department, staff and victim vehicles.

Relocation of Appellate Term, 2nd Department Offices

The community board does not object to the relocation of the Office of Court Administration for the Appellate Term, 2nd Department, currently located at 141 Livingston Street.

Relocation of Laboratory

In its response to the *Citywide Statement of Needs for City Facilities/Fiscal Years 2018 and 2019*, Community Board 2 noted that its health committee was concerned about possible risks to the public arising from the DEP laboratory, which the SON states would test "various bulk samples of potentially hazardous materials (such as asbestos, air fiber samples, sulfur in fuel oils and PH of soils)". The committee's concern was made a part of the community board's February 10, 2017 letter to the Department of City Planning and is reiterated here.

New Transitional Shelter Facilities for Homeless Individuals and Families

On February 10, 2016, Community Board 2 voted unanimously (34-0-0) to state that it had no objection to "Replacement or Upgrade of Transitional Shelter Facilities for Homeless Individuals and Families," which the Department of Homeless Services submitted for inclusion in the *Citywide Statement of Needs for City Facilities/Fiscal Years 2017 and 2018*. The community board's position is unchanged.

Consolidation of Parks Opportunity Program

Community Board 2 has no objection to the possible siting in CD2 of a consolidated office for the Parks Opportunity Program, managed by the parks department in partnership with HRA and the Department of Social Services.

Relocation of Vector and Pest Control

The community board has no objection to the possible relocation to Community District 2 of the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene's Bureau of Veterinary and Pest Control. As noted with regard to another proposal above, all fleet and staff vehicles must be parked off-street. Both authorized and improper placard use is an ongoing concern for CB2.

Relocation of Sidewalk Inspection Management - Concrete Crushing

Community Board 2 has no objection in principle to the Department of Transportation relocating its concrete crushing facility to the community district. The community board believes that it is unlikely that the City will be able to identify space for such a purpose within the limited area in CD2 that is zoned for industrial use.

Relocation of K9 Unit

Similar to its response above regarding the police department's Brooklyn Special Victims Squad, the community board does not object in principle to the police department relocating the Special Operations Division's K9 Unit to a location in the community district. However, any lease must include provision for the orderly parking of department and member of service vehicles.

School Buildings Included in the Department of Education's Adopted Five-Year Capital Plan for Fiscal Years 2015-2019

Community Board 2 is pleased to learn that a building planned for the southeast corner of 6th Avenue and Dean Street, which is to include a primary/intermediate school, is to begin

construction in early-2019 after a significant delay. Pacific Park developer Greenland Forest City Partners sold a development lease for the site—known as B15 and 664 Pacific Street, with a school address of 491 Dean Street—to The Brodsky Organization.

Community Board 2 reviewed this letter at its general meeting on February 13, 2019 and voted unanimously (38-0-0) to submit it as written. CB2 Chairperson Lenue H. Singletary III was called out of town to attend to a family matter shortly after the general meeting. Facing the imminent deadline for responding to the *Citywide Statement of Needs for City Facilities/Fiscal Years 2020 and 2021*, I have taken the non-standard action of signing this letter in his stead.

PROPOSAL:	New Borough-Based Jail
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- AREA SERVED: Citywide
- PROPOSED LOCATION: Brooklyn, CD 2

SITING CRITERIA: 1,400,000 sq. ft.; transit access; easy access to public transportation; proximity to arraignment courts; City owned property; sallyport/loading dock with street access.

COMMENTS: The DOC has been moving forward with the preparation of a Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) and a ULURP application to eliminate, discontinue and close street volumes on State Street by establishing horizontal planes elevated 20 feet above the legal street grade and at a point 15 feet below its subsurface. The Street mapping action would allow access to the Brooklyn Central Courts Building at 120 Schermerhorn Street. Borough President Adams recognizes that this is an opportunity to comment on the initial consideration towards implementing a borough-based jail system as part of the City's continued commitment to create a modern, humane, and safe justice system through the establishment of four new modern borough-based detention facilities, with each of the proposed facilities targeted to provide approximately 1,510 detainee beds. He understands the intent is to ensure that each borough facility has ample support space for quality educational programming, recreation, therapeutic services, publicly accessible community space, and staff parking. Furthermore, that the support space is intended to include a public service-oriented lobby, visitation space, space for robust medical screening for new admissions, medical and behavioral health exams, health/mental health care services, infirmary and therapeutic units, and administrative space. In addition, the community space is intended to provide useful community amenities, such as access to supportive services and facility programming or street-level retail space. Borough President Adams will reserve his right to comment on this requested siting after CB 2 have had the opportunity to take a position, and following his public hearing to take place when the land use applications have been certified thereby initiating the ULURP process.

Dear Mayor de Blasio:

In light of the reported delay to the ULURP certification date for the borough-based jails plan to house inmates after Rikers Island is shuttered, I'd like to take this opportunity to express my substantial concerns about the manner by which the plan has been developed and implemented thus far.

As you know, I have been – and continue to be – a strong proponent of closing Rikers Island, and share with you the goal of reforming and modernizing our city's jail system. The irony, however, of unveiling a citywide plan for "modern community-based jails" in the absence of community input is not lost on the boroughs, including Queens.

From the beginning, I have emphasized the importance of community input in the development of this plan and, in particular, the siting and design of any new jails. Unfortunately, I am deeply disturbed by the lack of meaningful local engagement on the borough-based jails project to date. The affected communities simply were not consulted during the development of the plan, especially the proposal to erect a 1.9-million-squarefoot facility at 126-02 82nd Avenue in Kew Gardens.

The process of developing the borough-based jails system must start anew. Fortunately, because the closure of Rikers Island in the current plan is nearly a decade out, there is still opportunity to restart borough-based jail planning – this time in collaboration with communities – while continuing to employ smart criminal justice strategies to reduce the jail population.

We have the obligation and opportunity to develop a system that is safer, more efficient, more humane and less costly. The backlash to the current plan is what happens when affected communities are not treated as partners in reform. Relocating the jail system currently housed on Rikers Island necessitates careful planning and community engagement every step of the way.

I look forward to your response and working together on this moving forward.
