1. Resolution to approve the renewal application DCA#907221 to the Department of Consumer Affairs by DFA Corp., d/b/a China Fun at 246 Columbus Avenue, for a five-year consent to operate an enclosed sidewalk café with 6 tables and 11 seats was adopted: 30-3-1-0.

2. Application to the Board of Standards and Appeals, BSA 258-01 BZ, by Congregation Rodeph Sholom, 168-170 West 79th Street.

Rodeph Sholom School representatives presented the results of an air and light study and gave an overview of the proposed alteration and addition. Speaker were: Sybil H. Pollet, Robert Kandel, Irwin Shlachter, David Arnold, Andrew Roberts, Nancy Solomon, Rabbi Robert Levine, Roberta Semer.

Board members Barbara Keleman, Sharon Parker-Frazier, Beth Berns, and Erana Stennett presented questions to the applicants.

Community members spoke in opposition.

John Nathanson commented in the applicant's light and air study and presented photographs that demonstrated the effects on air, light and view of neighboring tenants. Bob Lamm, resident of 172 West 79th Street spoke about the negative effect of the proposed addition on

Millicent Alter, also from 172 West 79th Street, asserted that if the school constructs two more stories on their back roof her sunlight, air and view would be totally blocked.

Madelyn Bigge claimed that Rodeph Sholom has been a bad neighbor. The have ignored this neighborhood's concerns.

Karen Cornelius, resident of 164 West 79th Street, commented on the wisdom of granting a variance on a variance.

Elizabeth Bing of 164 West 79th Street expressed the concern that the addition will block her view. Marilyn Stasio, resident of 164 West 79th Street, made an appeal on behalf of the many the

professional residents in her building whose lives and work would be impaired by the addition.

Elizabeth Klaber and residents of 173 West 78th Street complained about that 39 apartments would have reduced light.

Board members posed questions then engaged in comment and debate. Hope Cohen explained the substance of the application and the Committee's decision to present two resolutions.

Transportation Committee Co-Chairs: Andrew Albert and Dan Zweig December 11, 2001

After a brief discussion of aircraft noise over the West Side, and the possibility of an aircraft disaster due to the ever-increasing proliferation of over-island flights, the Committee adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Community Board 7/Manhattan acknowledges and thanks the FAA for rerouting air traffic bound for and originating at both Newark and LaGuardia Airports over-the-water immediately following the World Trade Center tragedy on Sept. 11, 2001, instead of traversing the skies over our densely populated neighborhood; and

WHEREAS, since May 1996 and prior to Sept. 11, 2001, passenger and cargo overflights had been increasing at alarming rates, due especially to the increase of 159 flights per day to/from LaGuardia Airport, significantly adding more danger and pollution to our neighborhood; and

WHEREAS, the recent American Airlines crash of November 12, 2001 underscored the need to keep both commercial and cargo flights over water as much as possible; and

WHEREAS, given the events of Sept. 11, 2001, it seems appropriate, in view of safety concerns and environmental factors involved, as well as the anxiety and concern felt by New Yorkers, that overflights over Manhattan be re-routed over water on a permanent basis,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT Community Board 7/Manhattan does hereby urge the FAA, the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, the Secretary of the Dept. of Transportation, Norman Mineta, Senators Charles Schumer and Hillary Clinton, Representatives Jerrold Nadler and Carolyn Maloney do all within their respective powers to restore and implement immediately and permanently, the over-the-water routes adopted by the FAA in the immediate aftermath of the World Trade Center tragedy, for both day and night flights – both commercial and cargo, keeping these flights out of the Upper West Side and similar densely populated neighborhoods. *Committee: 7-0-0-0. Public Members: 2-0-0-0.*

1. 430 Amsterdam Avenue

Michael Asch, owner, and Robert Bookman, attorney, presented the application for a new unenclosed sidewalk café with a removable platform. At the request of the Committee, the applicant agreed to remove the platform from the application.

The Committee adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS the applicant has agreed to eliminate the platform from the proposed sidewalk café, and has agreed to submit to Community Board 7/Manhattan plans revised to document this change and stamped by the NYC Department of Consumer Affairs; and

BE IT RESOLVED THAT Community Board 7/Manhattan **approves** the new application DCA# 1096363 to the Department of Consumer Affairs by Third Avenue Restaurant Inc., d/b/a Jakes' Dilemma at 430 Amsterdam Avenue (West 81st Street) for a one-year consent to operate an unenclosed sidewalk cafe with 10 tables and 20 seats.

2. 51 Columbus Avenue

Doug Griebel, owner, and Robert Bookman, attorney, presented the revised application. The Committee adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS Community Board 7/Manhattan approved, on July 26, 2000, the application for an enclosed sidewalk café at 51 Columbus Avenue with 13 tables and 28 chairs; and

WHEREAS the application has been revised and the café reduced in size;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT Community Board 7/Manhattan **approves** the new/revised application DCA#1035647 to the Department of Consumer Affairs by West 62nd Street Operating LLC, dba Rosa Mexicano at 51 Columbus Avenue (61st Street), for a one-year consent to operate an enclosed sidewalk with 11 tables and 24 seats.

Committee Member vote: 1-0-1-1.

3. Discussion of enclosed sidewalk cafes

Because of the sparse attendance, discussion was brief. Robert Bookman stated his belief that applications for enclosed cafes should be considered case by case, rather than adopting a district- or city-wide policy. He agreed that it is a problem when structures remain vacant for long periods of time; he suggested requiring specific language in the landlord consent to an application, which language would obligate the landlord to fill the space within a defined time period or dismantle the structure.

4. Discussion of CB7 sidewalk café 'spot check' letter

At the suggestion of Board Member Dan Zweig, the Committee has developed a form letter for use by the Board to notify café operators when they are out of compliance with café regulations. Board Members and other interested members of the community can use the letter's checklist to record violations; Board staff will then send the letter to the operator. Please see attached.

5. Discussion of Committee meeting time

Because of the sparse attendance, discussion was brief. There is interest in moving the Committee's start time to 7pm from the current 7:30pm. This issue will be discussed further when more Committee Members are present.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
